To many outsiders, Mick Harford's departure from the club in October came as a surprise. but Richard Money was not complaining as he landed the task of getting the Hatters back to the Football League at the first time of asking.

Money made his name as a player as a tough-tackling defender for Scunthorpe. Affectionately known in the game as Dickie Dosh, Money had two spells with the Iron, making over 100 appearances in both, starting and ending his career with the club.



His first chance in management also came with the Lincolnshire club in 1993 before spells abroad with AIK and Vasteras in Sweden and Newcastle Jets in Australia.

He had a two-year spell with Walsall between 2006 and 2008 before leaving his post.

He has made an encouraging start at Kenilworth Road and will hope to continue that into the New Year and lead his team back into the Football League.

Club News

When Luton were forced to start last season on -30 points, their Football League fate had been as good as sealed before a ball had been kicked in anger. They were playing catch up to the rest of League Two all season and their stay in league football was over by April.


Despite bouncing straight back into the Football League at the first attempt being notoriously hard, the Hatters made a promising start to the campaign and only lost one of their first nine games. However, despite this start. manager Mick Harford, who managed Rotherham in 2005, left the club in October and was replaced by former Walsall manager Richard Money. Consistent results have followed and four losses in their opening 20 Blue Square Premier games sees them on the brink of the top six and sure to be involved in a play-off chase come May.

They arrive at Don Valley in the FA Cup, having caused a first round shock when they beat Rochdale. They were 3-0 up at half-time in the original first-round tie, but the League Two men came storming back in the second half to earn a replay. However, Kevin Gallen's double in a televised replay saw the Hatters progress with a 2-0 victory at Spotland.









Currently on-loan from Notts County, Pilkington is a goalkeeper who has a wealth of experience at Football League level. He began his career at Manchester United, where he had a loan spell at Rotherham, but he could not forge a career at Old Trafford and only made six appearances. He spent most of his career at Mansfield before joining Notts County in 2005.

Ed Asafu-Adaie



Asafu-Adaje is a 20-yearold full-back who has come through the ranks at Kenilworth Road. He made his debut in 2008 and has become Luton's regular right-back for the last two seasons. His impressive form saw him earn a contract extension in the summer and he will now stay with the club until 2011.

The Engine



Keane has been an integral part of Luton's side over the recent years, having made his debut aged just 16. A versatile and composed midfielder. Keane is undoubtedly playing below his level in non-league as his Republic of Ireland Under-21 caps testify. He is the vice-captain and one of the first names on the teamsheet

An imposing and creative midfielder. Nicholls is the club captain and currently in his second spell at Kenilworth Road. Despite having the ability to play at a much higher level, Nicholls quickly committed his future to the club following their relegation last season. Beginning his career at Charlton, he has also played for Wigan, Leeds and Preston.





Lewis Emanuel



Emanuel is a Bradfordborn left-sided player, who began his career with his hometown. He made his debut in 2001 and played through their Championship days, eventually joining Luton in 2005 when they were still a Championship club. Equally adept in either an attacking or defensive role, Emanuel has earned a Republic of Ireland B cap.

Adam Newton



Newton is a pacy winger who has represented St Kitts & Nevis at international level. He joined in the summer following his release from Brentford and has plenty of Football League experience having spent six successful seasons with Peterborough. He is a product of West Ham's prolific academy.

Andy Burgess



Burgess is a lifelong Luton fan and signed for the club in the summer of 2009 following his release from Rushden & Diamonds, A cultured left-footed midfielder. who is comfortable anywhere across the midfield four, Burgess had spent all of his career at Nene Park, barring a two-year stay with Oxford.

Ryan Charles



A 20-year-old striker who began his career with Hitchin Town, Charles joined Luton in 2007. A nippy striker, who spent time on loan at Kettering last term, he has struggled to make a full impact at Kenilworth Road and has only featured as a sub this year.

Liam Hatch





Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS profiles four leading post-war Luton goalkeepers

TONY READ

Goalkeeper Tony Read featured prominently in Luton Town's 1967-68 Fourth Division title triumph. A former Wolves amateur, he joined Sheffield Wednesday in January 1960 and moved to Peterborough United in May 1964. He joined Luton in March 1965 and had a spell as a striker during the 1965-66 campaign, netting a hat-trick in the 5-1 victory at home to Notts County. Returning to goalkeeping duties by the end of that season, he helped the Hatters clinch promotion in 1969-70 and scored 12 times in 199 League games before leaving Kenilworth Road. He later concentrated on his used car business and now lives in Dersingham in retirement.

JAKE FINDLAY

Scottish goalkeeper Jake Findlay starred in Luton Town's 1981-82 Second Division title triumph. A former Aston Villa apprentice, he helped them win the FA Youth Cup shortly before turning professional in June 1972. He had few top-flight opportunities behind Jim Cumbes and Jimmy Rimmer, moving to Kenilworth Road in November 1978. Missing just one match for Luton in 1979-80, he was a key figure in their 1980-81 promotion nearmiss but lost his place to Les Sealey after injury. He made 167 League appearances and was loaned to Barnsley and Derby before joining Swindon Town in July 1985. Now assistant-manager at Stourport Swifts.



LES SEALEY

Brave goalkeeper Les Sealey played for Luton Town in the 1989 Littlewoods Cup final. Signing professional for Coventry City in March 1976, he starred as they were League Cup semi-finalists in 1980-81 and moved to Luton for £120,000 in August 1983. He helped them twice reach the FA Cup semi-finals and the 1988 Littlewoods Cup final but missed their Wembley triumph through injury. Making 207 First Division appearances for Luton, he joined Manchester United in March 1990 and gained FA Cup and ECWC winners medals. He later played for Aston Villa, Birmingham and West Ham, becoming a goalkeeping coach, but tragically died in August 2001.

ALEC CHAMBERLAIN



Chamberlain was everpresent for Luton Town in two consecutive seasons Starting with Ramsey Town. he moved via Ipswich Town to Colchester United in August 1982 and was ever-present in four successive campaigns. He joined Everton in July 1987 and moved to Luton for £150,000 in July 1988. Making 138 League appearances for the Hatters, he ioined Sunderland in

July 1993 and helped them win the First Division title in 1995-96. He moved to Watford in July 1996 and was ever-present in their 1997-98 and 1998-99 promotion successes, then was an FA Cup semi-finalist in 2002-03 before becoming their goalkeeping coach.


Players who played for both...

Today's visitors Luton brought Welshman Bob Delgado into English football in 1970, however the centre-back never made an appearance for the club. Delgado found his way to Millmoor during the 1973/1974 season and was a regular for one-and-a-half seasons before moving on to Chester in 1975, Striker Vic Halom, who was part of the 1973 FA Cup winning Sunderland team, ended his career at Millmoor though his time at the Millers was relatively unsuccessful. Halom joined Sunderland from Luton earlier in that FA Cup winning year. Former Republic of Ireland midfielder Tony Grealish had a spell with the Hatters early in his career, before spending three rather productive years


with the Millers. Defender Julian Watts started his career at Rotherham, making his debut at just 19 before being signed by local rivals Sheffield Wednesday. Watts' career stalled following the move and he represented various clubs before moving south to Luton in 1999, initially on loan before making the move permanent. Current Blackpool assistant manager Steve Thompson had already amassed over 600 career appearances, including five for Luton during a short spell with the Hatters before joining Rotherham in 1997. The dead-ball specialist added another 100 appearances during his stay at Millmoor. Another former Millers midfielder who had a significant impact in South Yorkshire is now first team coach at Kenilworth Road, Kevin Watson was captain of the Rotherham side that gained successive promotions to Division Two in the late 1990s-early 2000s. Also in more recent years, fellow midfielders Paul McLaren and Peter Holmes

have both played for the Millers

and the Hatters.

Did you know?

Alan Kirkman was the first player to ever score in a League Cup Final, scoring the opener in the 1961 final first leg. The Millers won that game against Aston Villa 2-0, however lost the second leg 3-0 at Villa Park and lost out on the trophy 3-2 on aggregate.



"The lads have made me feel welcome straight away," he revealed.



Monty goes from Keeper to Cricketer


Former Rotherham United player Gary Montgomery is ready to begin the next chapter of his career after swapping his goalkeeping gloves, for cricket gloves.

"It's going to be very different to what I'm



"I played a little one-two with Warney, dribbled into the box and nobody challenged me, so I just hit it with my left foot and fortunately it went in," said Law.


The game brought a new challenge for Law, who started the game in the centre of midfield after spending most of the season out wide.







They were all totally different managers. Gudjon was a great character but he just loved running! We


started the season brilliantly under him and we were top at Christmas but then we blew up and just finished




The Match...

player who enjoyed two spells with the Millers, estate agent Mick Gooding was a popular performer who played a major role in Rotherham's Division Three title winning season in

Mick joined Rotherham in 1979 during a successful period in the Millers' history culminating in the title winning season under lan Porterfield.

"lan put together a really good side; we played some great football, scored lots of goals and won the Championship so that was probably my highlight during my time at Rotherham," said Mick.

"lan had a vast knowledge of the game and his players. He was so enthusiastic on the training ground and that got the best out of all the players."

Mick left the Millers in 1982 after the arrival of Emlyn Hughes as Rotherham manager before returning again in 1983.

"Myself and Emlyn never really saw eye-to-eye, he was the boss and subsequently he didn't want me there, which was fine," added Mick.

"I went to Chesterfield but I had a really bad time

with a broken leg, missed the majority of the season and the club were relegated. Then Chesterfield manager Frank Barlow got the sack and at the same time Emlyn had left Rotherham so I got the call to go back and I was delighted to.

"I played under Norman Hunter who was a fantastic man to work for and I also played for George Kerr, who everyone enjoyed playing for. I thoroughly enjoyed the next four seasons but eventually I just felt it was time to move on."

Mick then had spells at

Peterborough, Wolves and Reading and it was with the Royals when he became joint player/manager with Jimmy Quinn.

"I enjoyed working with Jimmy and we got on well," Mick continued.

"When we took over, Reading had won only one game in their last six but we brought in some decent players and had a good run, and in the end we finished second. We didn't go up automatically because the Premier League numbers were being restructured so we ended up in the play-offs. We got to the final but lost narrowly to Bolton after having a two goal lead."

Jimmy left Reading in 1997 but carried on playing for Southend United before hanging up his boots in 1999 aged 40. After his departure from football Mick became a full time estate agent.

"I fell into it to be honest," said Mick.

"I was out of work at the time after leaving Southend, someone I knew was running an estate agency and I needed a job so I started off working in one branch, and then a few months later I was given a branch to

> run on my own. After success with that I was offered a bigger branch in Bracknell and after that went well I became an area manager."

> Mick has not lost touch with the game and still keeps involved as BBC Radio Berkshire's expert summariser on Reading games.

> "The BBC job is brilliant for me because I get to watch all the Reading games and it allows me to give my opinion. I would much rather be managing or playing but this is the next best thing," Mick concluded.





Ground

Away Days

The ground is almost unreconisable from its condition in the early to mid-nineties with significant investment made to half of the stadium. City were in the Premier League not so long ago and with an impressive two-tiered Kop and Main Stand that half of the ground did not look out of place with the country's elite. The TL Dallas Stand behind the goal still gives the ground an old fashioned charm and provides good acoustics to the City fans that occupy the upper tier. Altogether Valley Parade, or the Coral Windows Stadium as it is now known as, has a capacity of just over 25,000.

Directions by car

Take the M1 North exiting at junction 42 onto the M62 to Manchester. Exit at junction 26 onto the M606/A58 (Bradford). Keep on the M606 then left onto the A6177 (Ring Road, West). At the roundabout take the third exit onto Rooley Lane and then right onto Manchester Road. Take the first exit on the roundabout onto Princes Way, then left on Sunbridge Road, and right onto the A6181. Take a left onto Westgate, and then right onto Drewton Road, and left again onto Manningham Lane and finally take a right onto Cornwall Road where you will see the ground.



Directions From **Bradford Station**

Just one change required at Leeds but it is a fair walk from the station to the ground. A bus ride is probably the best option with buses frequently running to the ground from the bus station adjacent to the railway station.





There are one or two small car parks around the ground but the likelihood is that it will be street parking for most. Plenty of space on the roads but watch out for the residents only signs.

Facilities

Valley Parade these days is a very well presented and smart looking ground after much redevelopment over the past 10 years. Away fans were for a long time situated behind the goal in the TL Dallas stand but after a campaign by City supporters it is now occupied by home supporters. As a result last season Millers fans were housed in a section of the Midland Road Stand which provides a decent view of the action without being obstructed by any supporting pillars.



Despite all the new arrivals it has been the





