

We've already seen two terrific games of football between the sides in the league

this season and I'm sure this afternoon will be another exciting encounter as both teams look to book their place in the next round of the competition.

With our exit from the FA Cup against York a fortnight ago, the FA Trophy is now our last remaining cup-competition and provides a good opportunity to raise some income for the Club. Winning the final at Wembley would see us earning a total of £92,000 in prize money, which would be a very welcome boost to our finances.

Over and above that, as we've seen in the last two seasons for the Play-Off matches, to play at Wembley Stadium increases the profile of the Club in our community immeasurably.

Speaking of increasing our profile in the local area, the Club Shop in the Grafton Centre has been open for two weeks now and a huge thanks must go to Clive Jones for all of the work he's been putting in.

It's very much a case of testing the long term viability of this project over the next few months with us all hoping things stack up financially and enable us to make a long term commitment. 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# Mortin Ling THEGAFFER



Welcome back to the Abbey for today's game and, for the second time this season, welcome to the players, officials and fans from Luton Town.

The last two matches have brought us four points, and although it wasn't a particularly pleasing performance against Chester we got a very welcome three points. Then it was a hard-fought draw at Eastbourne on Saturday and we should really have got three points from that one too.

It's frustrating me that we always seem to be chasing games at the moment. We got our noses in front against Chester but not until the last minute of the game so it would be nice to get in front for a change and have teams chasing us.

The upside is that we are showing character to keep coming back from behind, as we did at Luton last month, but I'd rather we were taking the lead and trying to control the game from there.

With suspensions and injuries and illness we've included quite a few of the younger lads in recent games and it's been pleasing to see them stepping up and doing well. Against Chester the performance was disappointing but the pleasing thing was the clean sheet when the back four was so young.

Brian Saah was the oldest at 22, Josh was playing his first game since August and Rory and Darryl are only 19 and 20 so it was a young and inexperienced back line. If you'd offered me a clean sheet beforehand I'd have snapped your hand off because they hadn't played together before as a back four, and they did well to earn our first clean sheet for a little while.

Welcome to Richard Money and his staff. Obviously we've already met twice in the league in two enthralling matches and Richard has taken charge there quite recently, and it's hard to know what to expect from their form at present.

Last weekend they couldn't beat a Chester team that was down to ten men for the second half, but on Tuesday they put on a super show against Rotherham in the FA Cup and won 3-0.

We know they have some quality players there, but we also know they could have an Achilles heel because we got two late goals there last month and at Chester they couldn't get what they wanted. So we go into today's game knowing all about them but they'll know all about us too.

The FA Trophy is a good competition and we're looking forward to today's game. When I was at Leyton Orient I would play a weaker side in the early rounds of the Football League Trophy to give players a game, but I certainly won't be doing that with the FA Trophy. I feel this is a big opportunity to have a good cup run and win a trophy, and a Wembley final and thincome from that is a big incentive.

It's the FA Cup of non-league, and although Wembley has been a bitter plac for Cambridge United supporters in the last two years I don't think many people would turn down the chance of a cup fine there.

This is the beginning of a big period in our season. We have Oxford here next Friday in the first of four games in thirteen days, and it will be a massive thirteen days for us. After Oxford we play Stevenage, Mansfield and then Stevenaga again, and they're all top four teams.

We're at the halfway stage now and those games represent twelve points, so although there will still be a lot of games to go afterwards I think those games will have a big bearing on where we'll be at the end of the season.

With today's game being close to Christmas and an extra one for season ticket holders to pay for, we know that some fans will struggle to get to this one But the Cambridge United support has always been excellent and I hope you'll get behind us today like you always do and help to make up for those fans who might not be able to be here.

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
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# LUTON TOWN

### MANAGER

Lowestoft-born Richard MONEY (below) became the Hatters' 24th post-war permanent manager to succeed Mick Harford. Dubbed "Dicky Dosh" by Walsall fans after he guided the Saddlers to the League Two title in 2006/07, Richard played 49 times during his season-long stay at Kenilworth Road in 1982/83. He scored once - in a 2-2 draw at Rotherham - and made his final appearance in a Luton shirt at Old Trafford as the Town went down 3-0 to Manchester United just days before the famous victory at Maine Road which kept the Town in the top-flight.



Richard cut his managerial teeth at Scunthorpe United - who he also served as a player, before going continuing his education overseas with two clubs in Sweden. After a brief stint in Australia it was to the Bescot where he enjoyed his most successful spell before joining Newcastle United as academy director prior to returning to Bedfordshire.

### **GOALKEEPERS**

Experienced goalkeeper Mark TYLER signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in June 2009 following his release from Peterborough United. Mark made 483 appearances in 15 years at London Road and was rewarded for his loyalty with a testimonial against Liverpool in 2007. After falling down the pecking order at Posh he found first team opportunities hard to come by and in 2008/09 he was loaned out to League Two Bury. A former England Youth international, Tyler was handed the number one shirt by the Hatters boss who admitted he'd failed in an attempt to sign the stopper the previous summer.

Former Wimbledon stopper Shane GORE. arrived at Kenilworth Road on a short-term deal on the eve of the 2009/10 season. He came through the ranks at Selhurst Park but could only make one substitute appearance before leaving for Peterborough in 2003. Shane has also had spells with Barnet and Stevenage and featured for Maidenhead United in 2008/10 prior to joining the Hatters.

Vastly experienced stopper Kevin PILKINGTON has signed on a one month loan deal from League Two side Notts County.


#### DEFENDERS

A defender capable of playing centre back or full back, Claude GNAKPA joined on a free transfer in August 2008, Having plied his trade across Europe with Montpellier HSC, Racing de Santander, Deportivo Alaves and FC Vaduz of Liechtenstein, Claude moved to Swindon Town for a brief spell. He was then off again in July 2007 to Peterborough United and was a regular in the League Two promotion winning side. A favourite with the Kenilworth Road crowd the Frenchman scored the Hatters' winning goal in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final against Scunthorpe United in April 2009.

Having made his debut as a 16-year-old in November 2003, Keith KEANE went on to enjoy an extended run in the side from February onwards whilst Kevin Foley was out injured. Such was the contribution he made that the return of Foley didn't signal the end of his involvement at first-team level and he finished the season with 14 appearances under his belt, all this whilst still in the first year of his scholarship. Another of the youth team who regularly appears for the Republic of Ireland at schoolboy level, he joined the Hatters at the age of nine having been scouted in local football, and has made a rapid progression through the club's centre of



excellence and youth teams. Over the course of his career at Kenilworth Road Keane has proved to be one of the, if not the most, versatile players to pull on a Luton shirt. Capable of playing right the way across the back four or in midfield the only positions he's not featured for the Town (yet) are in goal and up-front.



Highly experienced defender George PILKINGTON (above) joined the club on a free transfer in August 2008. Having began his career as an Everton trainee, Pilkington joined Port Vale in June 2003, after a loan spell at Exeter City. Having started 223 league games for the Valiants, the highly regarded defender was named player of the year twice and club captain.

Lewis EMANUEL arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2006 after deciding to leave his home town club Bradford City, the place where the defender started his career. Lewis is a pacy full-back but can also play on the left side of midfield, a position where he started on his league debut for the club. Lewis made over 150 appearances for Bradford in sixyears at the club, scoring four goals. In his first season at Kenilworth Road he made 40 appearances, scoring twice. Out of contract at the end of the 2008/09 campaign, Lewis signed a new contract in July 2009.


Capable of playing in any position across defence, Ed ASAFU-ADJAYE has made significant progress through the Club's youth set-up. Sent on on-loan to non-league side Walton & Hersham, he made the breakthrough into the first team under former boss Mike Newell, when the Club was stretched to the limits through injury and suspension. Although the youngster was an unused sub for three matches, Youth Coach Marvin Johnson gave Ed a glowing reference to incoming boss Kevin Blackwell, who gave him a one-year contract. However with first team opportunities still blocked. Ed went onloan to Salisbury City where he earned rave reviews and when Mick Harford arrived as manager at Kenilworth Road one of the first things he did when he was in charge was to

recall the young defender.

Young left back Jake HOWELLS came through the ranks at Kenilworth Road and made his first team debut as a second half substitute in May 2008. He made his full debut in the Hatters colours away at Bradford City in October 2008. After making 36 appearances for the Hatters in the 2008/09 he was rewarded for his efforts with a professional contract in May.

Vastly experienced centre half Alan WHITE resigned for the Hatters nine years after leaving Kenilworth Road. Darlington-born Alan started his career with Middlesbrough making his debut for Boro in a 3-3 draw with Liverpool in 1996. However, with first team opportunities limited at the Riverside, Alan jumped at the chance to sign for the Hatters in September 1997 for £40,000. After 98 appearances in Luton colours, Alan left Kenilworth Road in 2000, joining Colchester United on a free transfer. Four years at Layer Road came and went before he spent one season-spells at Leyton Orient, Notts County and Boston United. He signed for home-town team Darlington at the start of the 2007/08 season and went onto make 85 appearances for the Quakers before joining the Hatters for the second time in the summer of 2009.

Luton-born Shane BLACKETT (below) penned a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2009 after joining the club from Peterborough United. Equally adept at centre-back or at left-back, Shane began his career with Dunstable Town before a switch to Arlesey Town in 2003. His form with the United Counties side alerted the attentions of Dagenham & Redbridge who signed the 6ft 3in defender in May 2004. He made 83 appearances during his time at Victoria Road and helped the Daggers win the Conference title and earn promotion to the Football League in 2006/07. His reputation as a pacey defender alerted the attention of Peterborough who snapped him with Dagenham team-mate Craig Mackail-Smith in January 2007 going onto make 38 appearances during his time with the London



Young Luton-born defender Callum REYNOLDS signed a six-month loan deal from Premier League side Portsmouth in July 2009. Reynolds began is career with Rushden & Diamonds having been spotted playing for the Crawley Green club in Luton. Despite not making a senior appearance at Nene Park, his promise playing for the Diamonds' youth team alerted the attention of visiting Portsmouth scouts and he subsequently signed for Pompey in the summer of 2007. Also capable of playing in midfield, Reynolds also spent time on-loan at Basingstoke Town making eight appearances for Stoke during 2008/09.

Left-footed versatile defender Freddie MURRAY (below) joined the Hatters on a sixmonth loan deal from Blue Square Premier side Grays Athletic in August 2009. Murray only signed for the Essex club in August before making his debut for the Town in the 4-1 victory over Mansfield Town just hours after putting pen to paper. Previously with Northampton Town, Stevenage Borough and Cambridge United Freddie began his career as a trainee with Blackburn Rovers.



#### **MIDFIELDERS**

Ascot-born Adam NEWTON signed in the summer following his release from Brentford. Predominately used as a right winger, the pacy wide man is equally as comfortable at right-back. Adam started his career at West Ham United, coming through the Hammers' respected academy but could only make three substitute appearances during his time at Upton Park before signing for Peterborough United in May 2002. The former England Under 21 international went onto make a name for himself with the Posh making 249 appearances in six years at London Road going onto win promotion at the end of the 2007/08 campaign. After leaving Peterborough at the end of the 2007/08 season, Adam was snapped by Andy Scott and Brentford where he helped the Bees to the League Two title. A St Kitts and Nevis international, he has spent time on-loan at Portsmouth, Notts County and Leyton Orient.

An adaptable player who can play on the left or right hand side of defence or midfield,

Rossi JARVIS came through the Norwich City youth system, becoming the youngest player to appear for the reserve team at the tender age of 14. He went on to spend loan periods at Torquay United and Rotherham United and after finding first team opportunities hard to come by Jarvis joined Luton Town in August 2008 on a free transfer.

A versatile player capable of playing in midfield or defence, Asa HALL began his football career in Wolverhampton Wanderers youth system, before signing his first professional contract with Birmingham City in 2004. While at the Blues he was a regular in the reserve team and was named young player of the year in the 2004/05 season. He also received caps for England at Under-19 and Under-20 levels and went on to have loan spells with Boston United, Ashford Town and Shrewsbury Town.

Hard-working midfielder Kevin NICHOLLS enjoyed six successful seasons at Kenilworth Road between 2001 and 2006, captaining the side to the League One title in the 2004-2005 season. Nicholls began his career at Charlton Athletic, before moving to Wigan Athletic in 1999, where he made 28 appearances in two years. He moved to Luton in 2001, and in the next six seasons went on to appear 175 times. scoring 30 goals. Following Luton's successful first-season in The Championship and the spirited FA Cup performances, Nicholls was a player very much in demand. He moved to Leeds United for £700,000 in July 2006 and was made club captain by then boss Dennis Wise. However, his very public fall-out with Wise saw him fall down the pecking order at Elland Road, and the following summer he moved to Preston North End for a fee of £750,000. His time at Preston began encouragingly, however a change in the management team saw his first-team opportunities limited. Kevin was delighted to re-sign for Luton, signing a three-year deal in August 2008 and being named as club captain.

Lightening quick winger Ashley CAIN signed on a month's loan from Championship side Coventry City at the end of November. A product of the Sky Blues' academy, he made his debut for City in the Championship at the tail end of the 2008/09 campaign when coming off the substitutes' bench against Charlton Athletic at the Ricoh Arena. Since then, the wide-man has gone on to make a further seven appearances for Chris Coleman's side and made his full debut against Hartlepool United in the Carling Cup in August.

#### FORWARDS

Originally a defender, Tom CRADDOCK developed into a promising forward who has done well at youth and Reserve team levels with Middlesbrough. He was the eighth member of Boro's 2004 FA Youth Cup-winning side to progress to first team level, following James Morrison, Tony McMahon, Andrew Taylor, David Wheater, Matthew Bates, Adam Johnson and Jason Kennedy. He joined the Hatters on-loan from the Riverside in October 2008 and scored twice on his debut in a 2-2 draw with Grimsby Town. Two further goals followed in the games against Bury and

Chesterfield and once his loan expired Mick Harford moved quickly to snap up the striker on a permanent basis. A £80,000 bid was accepted by Middlesbrough and Tom signed a two-and-half year contract in January 2009. Craddock (below) has previously spent spells on loan with Wrexham and Hartlepool United.



Promising young forward Jordan PATRICK became the youngest ever player to feature for the Hatters when he made his first team bow when appearing as a substitute at Grimsby Town in October 2008 aged 16 years and seven days. With pace to burn the striker is tipped to have a big future ahead of him and is a regular for the Town's Under 18s.

A Shepherds Bush native, Kevin GALLEN established himself as something of a legend at QPR. He notched up over 400 appearances and hit 97 goals for the R's in two spells spanning nearly 14 years. Gallen joined Huddersfield 2000 and after 10 goals in 30 starts for the Terriers, Gallen moved across Yorkshire to join Barnsley the following summer, but the call of West London saw him return to QPR within a few months. He scored nine goals in 16 league starts for MK Dons before joining Luton on loan. After a successful loan spell Gallen joined permanently in January 2009, signing until the end of the season before agreeing a one year contract extension with the club in May keeping him at Kenilworth Road until June

6ft 3in striker Liam HATCH signed for the Hatters on a season-long loan from Peterborough United in June 2009. Hatch started his career with Herne Bay before a move to neighbours Gravesend & Northfleet in 2001. A successful spell at Stonebridge Road saw him transferred to Barnet for £17,500 where he helped the Bees to promotion to the Football League with 11 league goals in the 2004/05 campaign. His form at Underhill alerted the attention of Peterborough United who paid £150,000 for the striker's services. With first team opportunities limited at London Road Hatch was sent on-loan to Darlington during the 2008/09 campaign where he hit nine goals in 29 league and cup appearances at the Darlington Arena.

Lightening quick striker with superb goalscoring record at non-league level, Mark NWOKEJI signed on loan until January from League Two outfit Dagenham & Redbridge.


Prolific striker Matthew BARNES-HOMER ioined the Hatters initially on a month's loan from Kidderminster Harriers and has agreed a two-and-a-half year contract to move permanently when the transfer window reopens on 1st January. After notching 21 goals in all competitions last season, the powerful forward has scored nine times in 20 league appearances this term and, since arriving at the Worcestershire club in 2007, has hit an impressive tally of 34 goals in 77 starts. Barnes-Homer also enjoyed a dream start to his international career when he netted the winner on his debut for England C in their 2-1 win over Poland in November. An energetic talent, the front man began his career as a trainee at Wolves before going on to lead something of a nomadic life prior to finding his feet at Kidderminster. After leaving Molineux he tried his luck in the United States before returning to England and, following success with a clutch of non-league sides, Barnes-Homer was snapped by Wycombe Wanderers. He struggled to make an impression at Adam Park but, after being released at the end of the 2006/07 season, Harriers manager Mark Yates beat off competition from a host of sides to capture his signature. His form in front of goal at Kidderminster had alerted the attentions of a number of Football League teams but Barnes-Homer was suitably impressed by the Hatters' vision and became Richard Money's first signing for the club.

# \* FIVE MORE THINGS YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW ABOUT ..

# LUTON

- \* Luton first played in the top flight on English football in 1955. They may have done so earlier but for the intervention of the Adolf Hitter! They were top of the old Division Two when the outbreak of the Second World War brought the suspension of the league in September 1939.
- \* Luton were FA Cup finalists 50 years ago; losing the 1959 final 2-1 to Nottingham Forest.
- \* This is Luton's first appearance in the FA Trophy.







# THE GHOSTS OF PROGRAMMESPAST

No-one who was there will forget Paul Carden's stunning forty-yard strike against Rushden at the Abbey last month. There may have been an element of assistance from the strong wind, but there can be no doubt that the United skipper's shot went more or less where he had intended it to go. The programme from a match with Exeter City on this day in 1997 revealed an altogether more modest goalscorer:

"It's not often you'll find a footballer a little bit sheepish after scoring with a long-range effort. But that's exactly what Paul Wilson was after his 35-yard free-kick sailed in at his former club Scunthorpe last month.

"The experienced left-back recalls the goal saying: "It was all a bit embarrassing really and I'm afraid I've got to tell you, it was a fluke. I'd seen Paul Wanless make a little bit of a run at the near post so I tried to hit him with the free-kick. And then, what happened was just one of those things.

"Initially, I thought the ball had gone over the bar because everything just fell quiet. But then their keeper starts to pick the ball out of the net and all our lads start running towards me to celebrate.

"I spoke to their lads after the game and they all said, 'You can't have meant that?' I've had to hold my hands up then and say 'No I didn't!"


Full marks for modesty, and honesty, too. Modesty of a rather more unintentional kind was recorded by Mark Johnson in his Traveller's Tales from the programme on this day in 1998, reviewing a recent 3-3 draw at The Shay:

"Halifax Town have selected an unusual tune to play when the teams run out. It's called 'The March of the Gladiators,' and you might think 'that sounds all very impressive ... but I've never heard of it!"

"If that's the case, let me enlighten you - it's the tune they play at the circus when the clowns appear!"

One organisation never afraid to blow its own trumpet is our very own Supporters Club. On this day in 1953 United were facing the biggest FA Cup game in their history, the Eastern Counties League U's taking on Third Division giants Bradford Park Avenue in the Second Round Proper. The Secretary of the Club wasted no time in his programme notes in singing its praises to drum up more custom from a capacity crowd of 10,000:

"I am pleased to state that our membership has been swelled by some 200 members during the past three weeks



and the Management Committee extend a warm welcome to those who have recently joined our ranks.

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






Brian Saah receives the Man of the Match award for the game against Chester City from a representative of Match Sponsors Camlab.

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

Their World Cup qualifying campaign seemed to take forever to get going, but Portugal eventually made it to South Africa, where a possible semifinal encounter with England awaits them.

A 4-0 win over Malta began their quest for a place in next summer's finals. but after that the Portuguese struggled to convince anyone but their most loyal followers that they even had a chance. Defeat by Denmark in Lisbon followed by two goalless draws against Sweden and a third against Albania increased the pressure on coach Carlos Queiroz before back to back wins over Hungary renewed their hopes and another 4-0 victory against Malta secured a play-off spot at Sweden's expense.

Leading 1-0 from the home first leg against Bosnia-Herzegovina courtesy of a Bruno Alves goal (pictured), Portugal emerged triumphant from the lion's den in Zenica after Raul Meireles' second-half strike gave them a 2-0 aggregate victory and a berth in South Africa.

Benfica fan Ricardo Alves told Planet Football of his reactions to the draw and his hopes for next summer. "After the draw, we know that Brazil (our brother country), Ivory Coast (the Elephants) and North Korea (the impenetrable country) are in our group. At first glance we are tempted to say that Brazil and Portugal are the favorites to reach the next stage, but Ivory Coast is no longer unknown. In fact, they are the second best placed African team - 16th in the FIFA rankings - after Cameroon.

"Brazil needs no explanation and the probability of them reaching another World Cup Final is huge," Ricardo



continued. "History is on their side and their current squad is full of talent and quality. Many of the Ivory Coast's players have performed at the highest level in Europe - and, ironically, their coach is Bosnian!"

Ricardo is certain that North Korea will prop up the group and, like all his compatriots, knows well their place in Portuguese World Cup history. "Their only participation in the World Cup was in 1966 when they upset Italy 1-0 to reach the quarter-finals. There, they lost 5-3 to Portugal despite taking a 3-0 lead in what is even today remembered in Portugal as an amazing game, with the great Eusebio scoring four of our goals."

Like most observers, Ricardo thinks his country will qualify from the knock-out stage in the 'group of death', together with Brazil, but knows that the crunch match could be Portugal's opening clash with Ivory Coast in Port Elizabeth. The Africanborn Queiroz will not be taking Drogba and Co lightly, but he does have a

substantial amount of talent at his disposal, notably Cristiano Ronaldo.


"It's a fantastic group for world football," said Queiroz after the draw, "but deep down I hope that we're already qualified by the time we face Brazil in our third match." Dunga, his Brazilian counterpart retorted: "I don't like all that 'group of death' stuff. Of course, we've got a huge rivalry with Portugal. We've played twice against them recently, winning one and losing one, but this will be a different story altogether - it's the World Cup. Portugal have got three Brazilians (Pepe, Deco and Liedson) in their team so it's going to be like Brazil versus Brazil B!"


Vahid Halilhodzic, Ivory Coast's Bosnian coach, took a different view. "To be honest it's a terrible group," he said. "Brazil are second in the FIFA rankings and Portugal are fifth. It's hard to imagine anything worse than that.

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# WHO NEEDS A MAGIC SPONGE THEBEAUTIFUL

So, how long will it be before the physio decides to do away with the day to day contents of his bag? Will there come a day when the 'magic sponge' ceases to be the miraculous cure it's been for ... well forever. When a player hits the deck after a crunching tackle, what will the physio produce from his bag as a replacement for the enchanting drenched sponge in his bid to bring the player to his feet? It seems the 'new' trendy treatment for football players [rich ones at least] is the magic horse-placenta!

Have you ever heard of anything so ridiculous? Yeah, we know there are stem cells research results which show that scientists have found a way to make human sperm from embryonic stem cells in a laboratory and they can even use human embryonic stem-cells to produce temporary skin substitutes for patients awaiting skin grafts after serious burn injuries. But the use of horse placenta on injured football players' injuries - who can possibly back that up as a way forward for physio's treatment?

There have recently been a string of Premiership footballers opting for the 'placenta treatment' from a certain Serbian housewife at her 'clinic' in Belgrade. Of course, it could only happen in the Premiership couldn't it? They're the only ones rich enough and daft enough to believe in it's healing qualities!

It's probably another one of those old wives tales you hear about isn't it. Sure, some of these old wives tales do carry some weight and are believed to be true. As a kid, if you got nettled on your ankles whilst retrieving the ball from the over-grown grass around the pitch, you could grab a dock leaf, rub it on the stinging wound and immediately, the painful sensation was relieved. Then there's the other one that used to catch me out. If you pick too many dandelions, you wee the bed



that night! Well, sadly, I was often the first one out when we played 'One-man-Wembley' and when the rest of your mates are still playing, what else is there to do when you're sat at the back of the goal but make daisy chains and pick dandelions? No wonder I needed a special mattress cover into my teens!

The radical physio Mariana Kovacevic who is reported to have treated such players as Robin Van Persie, Glen Johnson and Frank Lampard (for starters) uses the liquid from a horse-placenta to treat the players' injuries. She has now apparently done a runner (recently spotted carrying big bags of Premiership club supporters' cash) and is under investigation from health officials.

It's no substitute for the legendary 'magic sponge' though is it? Let's look at the facts, our physio's have used the 'sponge' for generations and the players often make an almost immediate recovery after it's been applied to the injury. The 'sponge' is inexpensive, convenient, easily obtainable and has never been under investigation by the NHS. The horse-placenta treatment however, is messy, very expensive, messy, far away in

another country, messy, never been researched, unethical and could (according to medical experts) cause long term damage to muscle injuries, and it's messy!

No argument there then - it's the magic sponge for me every time.

If the horse-placenta treatment becomes part and parcel of the modern day game, then so be it. We'd see the last of the dreaded queue for the physio treatment room as the injury list piles up, there would be no selection headaches for the gaffer with regard to team selection on matchdays and all the players would give there all as there would be more competition for places within the squad.

For now, let's stick with the traditional approach to injuries and tackle them in an ethical manner!

Let's hope the magic sponge stays in the physio's bag during today's game and our boys remain injury free as we march on to victory and the three points we need. If the game does start to look a little stale, you could always clear the perimeter of the pitch and pick the dandelions, if you dare!

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
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# Stuart Wood CLUBCHAPLAIN


Well now there's no need for the great escape to the pub with the new mother in-law rate.

# A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A LEARNING MENTOR

My name is Mike Langran, I am retired and on Tuesday afternoons I voluntarily give time to the Playing for Success sessions at the Learning Centre. My day is totally different to the staff of the Cambridge United, United in Learning centre based in the South Stand. They are Jez Daniel (Study learning centre manager) Helen Paterson (Study Learning Centre teacher) and Franco Nacca (Study Learning Centre Mentor) and they work full time in teaching where as I only work 3.00pm to 6.00pm on Tuesday afternoons.

# What time do you get up?

I usually wake up about 5.30am to 6.00am; I listen to either Radio 4 or the BBC world Service until my wife decides I should be up and about preparing breakfast. Her right foot in my back helps me along! That is about 7.30am.

We have an elderly lady who lives across the road that we keep an eye on; we just make sure she is about by noting if her curtains are drawn, if they are, we know she is O.K. if they are not, we give it a bit more time like half an hour, if they are still not drawn we go over and see that she is getting up otherwise we take the necessary action required.

# What do you do before coming to the Learning Centre?

It's between the practical things keeping the house in good order such as running repairs and maintenance or leisure things. I am learning to paint using watercolours. This is the one I like to get into; I am currently attempting to paint a winter's scene that I can use for home made Christmas cards. I might go over to see our lady across the road for a chat.

### What time do you arrive?

I arrive at ten to three; speak to Jez, Helen and Franco about what's on that afternoon. Sometimes we will be going around the stadium giving information about different parts of the ground, other times we will go around the Boardroom, changing rooms etc. Another day we interview a player. Then the children arrive.

### What do you do then?

Obviously, Jez, Helen or Franco lead the sessions, I help out giving out paper,

pencils etc. When the children are working I help them along with encouragement. Sometimes when they are stuck I ask questions that the answers they give will lead them to the answer. This could be in relation to going around the ground or writing out the questions they will ask when they interview a player. The highlight for the youngsters today was when they got on the computers and did their projects. We worked on Apple Macs with an application called "Garage Band". With this you can create all types of music with all kinds of instruments, add your own voice, the staff had a good time as well with this programme!

#### What time do you leave?

I leave about five past six in the afternoon. I get home about quarter past six. I have tea and then I either go to my self-help Art Group or back to the stadium for a football match. Back home at about 10.00pm


#### What time do you go to bed?

# MARTIN LING

Before his appointment as Cambridge United manager at the start of this season, Martin Ling was in charge of Leyton Orient for five and a half years, making him the sixth longest-serving boss in English football as he led the O's from the brink of dropping out of the Football League up to League One.

\*After reading the first part of our interview in the previous programme, you'll know that Martin enjoyed an eighteen year playing career that began at Exeter City in 1982, ended with eight appearances for Brighton in 2000, and took in lengthy spells with Southend, Swindon and Leyton Orient, including a season in the Premiership with Swindon.

Finishing the 1999-2000 season at Brighton, he decided to hang up his playing boots at the age of 34 and take up Tommy Taylor's offer of a job as youth coach with his former club Leyton Orient.

Taylor knew Ling had embarked upon the lengthy process of gaining his coaching qualifications four years earlier and was already coaching Orient's under-15 side. As Martin said in our first instalment, "I was interested in taking that next step, and although I may have been able to play for another one or two seasons, coaching was something I always wanted to do.

"There's no better way to learn coaching than getting among the young kids and teaching them."

His youth role was two-fold; taking the under-19s (in those days most clubs operated U17 and U19 squads) and also coaching the U15s on Monday and Wednesday nights and taking their games on Sundays.

"It was a big workload but also a sharp learning curve," he says of that 14-month period, which resulted in silverware for the O's as he led the under-19s to the Football League Youth Alliance league and cup double in 2001.





The next step up came when Taylor resigned in October 2001 after five years in charge and first team coach Paul Brush took over, making Ling his assistant manager. But Brush's reign lasted just under two years before he was dismissed and Martin was appointed as caretaker manager.

Taking over a side second from bottom of the league on 27th September 2003, he knew it was a tall order: "Results have to be good when you're a caretaker manager. My first game in charge was Carlisle away, they were bottom and we were second bottom, and if we'd have lost that night we would have gone bottom of the Football League.

"But we won 1-0 and had a run of good results, and in the December they gave me an 18-month contract. Every year we finished higher than we had the previous year and I think by last season I'd taken them as high as I could at that time."

Martin led Orient (above) to automatic promotion from League Two in 2006 and successfully kept them up the following season, but he feels that their start to the 2007-08 season created unrealistic expectations for an unfashionable club struggling to attract larger crowds despite their elevation.

"If I'm honest I think I probably shot myself in the foot in my second to last season," he admits. "We were top of the league for about four months and ended up fourteenth, and that was seen to be a failure rather than a success, even though the previous season we had finished fifth from bottom.

"If we'd just finished fourteenth it would have been seen as a successful season and progression, but because we'd been top of the league for a while it was seen more as a let-down and that created pressure for the following season."

With limited funds, last season was tough and when the O's dropped into the relegation zone, chairman Barry Hearn made what he described as "the hardest decision I have had to make in 14 years as Orient chairman" and Ling and his assistant Dean Smith left the club by mutual consent in January.

"I was at Leyton Orient for twelve and a half years as a player, youth coach, assistant manager and manager and I got them success while I was there," says Martin. "He was a loyal chairman but I gave him progress each year, and if a manager gives you that then it's easy for a chairman to be loyal.

"I think if I was to walk into Leyton Orient now I would be seen as successful," he reflects. "Gordon Strachan said the other week that you should only be judged as a manager once you've finished at a club, and I think that's a good statement."

After leaving Orient, Martin did some scouting for Hibernian and set up a network of scouts for the Scottish Premier League side, and was also linked with the vacant managerial post at Port Vale before joining United in July.

After two successive play-off final appearances, he understands all too well the expectations among U's supporters, especially those who don't realise how much the playing budget has been slashed this year in comparison with the last two seasons.

"Where the difficulty lies here is that the

club has finished second and missed out in the play-offs two years running, so people say 'hold on a minute, how come Martin has come in and now we're midtable?'," he comments.

"But the playing budget this season is a lot different to the budget in the last two seasons, and what the club needs now is some stability. You get stability by earning it, not just by saying the word.

"Supporters want us to get back in the Football League, and so do I, but it may take a little bit of time," he cautions. "That's not to say it won't happen this year, but we have to cut our cloth according to the finances and they are very different from the last two years.

"My hands are tied in that respect; people can see that the only person I've brought in is Brian (Saah) and the only person who's gone out is Challinor on loan, so there's not an abundance of money to throw about."

At the halfway stage of the season now, with United in mid-table and key games coming up against three of the top four clubs, Martin is at pains to say that the play-offs are not out of reach.

"If we can stay free of injuries and suspensions and if we can keep putting our best team out there, then we have a chance of finishing in the top five. It can happen if we can put a run of results together; teams like Kettering have shown that with their good form," says the 43-year-old.

"But the main thing is to work within the budget make sure that we don't 'chase the dream' and shoot the club in the foot



financially."

Unsurprisingly for someone who was a skilful midfielder who played alongside and for Glenn Hoddle, Martin is a great believer in playing attractive football and holds the former Chelsea, Tottenham and England manager in high regard.

"I learned a lot of good things about manmanagement from him. He was excellent at Swindon and made the right decisions at the right times. He criticised players when they needed it but also praised them when they needed picking up.

"It was his first managerial role and we were encouraged to pass the ball, and he saw the long ball game as a slight against his methods. Obviously he regarded John Beck's methods that way when we played against Cambridge, but I was at a club function the other night and John Taylor and Dion Dublin were speaking, and they said they were brilliant times.

"They said they were told what to do and they did it, and you can't knock the success of those methods. Everyone has their own beliefs about football and mine are that we'll be an effective passing team.

"Passing with a purpose' is what I call it, so I'm probably somewhere between the two beliefs. I like my teams to pass the ball and when I was at Orient people said you can't pass your way out of League

Two, but I think we passed our way out of League Two and passed our way to the top of League One for a period.

"But sometimes you have to play the conditions so as a manager you adjust between the times when it's right to pass and the times when it's right to go a bit longer. You have to earn the right to play and obviously I was a passing player, but you do what's effective for your team, and sometimes the way you play is dependent on the players you have at your club."

Martin names David Webb, who he played for at Southend, as another influence on his managerial career, but he adds, "You take good and bad from everyone that you've worked for and try to enhance the good and avoid doing the bad things yourself."

Married to Caroline for 20 years and based in Broxbourne for 13 years, Martin has a daughter Charlotte [14] and son Samuel [12], who plays for Leyton Orient's Centre of Excellence.

"People might think it strange that I've left there and he still plays there, but he's been there since he was ten and it's probably easier for him now than it was when I was manager there," he says.

"People might have said that he was only there because of me but now they'll see he's there on his own two feet because he's a good little footballer. But for me the main thing is that he's enjoying playing."

When not working, watching games or spending time with his family, Martin plays the odd round of golf but admits to being a "summer golfer".

"My golf clubs come out on the first of March and go back in the cupboard on the first of November - I can't see any point in being soaking wet and freezing cold on a golf course!"

There are likely to be some cold and wet afternoons and evenings ahead as United embark in the FA Trophy today and return to league action next Friday, and Martin is relishing the challenge of bringing both stability and success to Cambridge United.

"I know 'stability' isn't necessarily a word that supporters want to hear, but in the current climate a lot of clubs are suffering from chasing the dream. I want to chase the dream but we have to do it in a calculated and financially measured way," he concludes.

"This club has been within 90 minutes of the Football League in the last two years and I'm definitely not saying it can't happen this year, but we have to build and do the best we can this year within a budget that is sustainable."



TOMORROW'S U'S TODAY

Wivenhoe Town 1 CRC 5

This was another big test as for the first time since August none of our U19/U20 players were available for selection.
Second year scholars Blaine Hudson, Luke Berry, Liam Hughes, Jack Eades and Jack Bailey were restored to the starting XI, plus Martin Davies in goal, from our midweek defeat at Newmarket Town in the Ridgeons League Cup, and we were determined to maintain our long unbeaten record in the league.

Our hosts had taken a point off Leiston the previous weekend to belie their lowly position and on arriving at the ground, we knew the pitch would prove just as big a danger. I wouldn't be able to find words that could do justice to a description. Suffice to say it was unacceptable and it was a marginal decision by the referee to play the game. There was surface water and areas where your feet would sink like you were walking on quick sand! It is the first time I have ever seen a team have forking, sanding and digging up areas of the pitch as part of their warm up but that was the case (in their kit!) until they convinced the officials to give it the thumbs up at 2.20pm.

Credit should go to our boys for their professionalism in handling these conditions, especially with such a young side. We had to adapt our preferred style of play to be much more direct and look to either play off the front men or hit holes beyond their back four. Thankfully, whilst having a couple of dangerous players going forward, they were very poor defensively. A forward pass did not have to be that accurate to cause them problems and we could have been out of sight within the opening quarter of the game. Christy Finch, our recent signing from Lowestoft, should have opened his account twice but was denied once by the keeper and stretched to toe poke another chance wide from close range after a good low cross by Liam Hughes. Jack Eades was also providing his usual stream of crosses from the right but the finishing touch remained elusive. Set plays looked another potential source of a goal as the home team couldn't cope with the quality of our deliveries. It would be no exaggeration that we could/should

have scored from any of our first seven corners. Ironically, we broke the deadlock with an inswinger from **Owen Kessack** (pictured) that eluded everyone, including the home keeper. If we had managed to make contact, no doubt we would have found another way to miss!

The floodgates then threatened to open with two goals following in quick succession. Firstly **Jack Bailey** side footed home after capitalising on a misplaced back pass and then **Christy Finch** opened his body to stroke home a cool left footed strike into the opposite bottom corner after some decent approach play. The half ended with one or two scares at the other end to warn us against complacency and indicated the points were far from secure without more work after the break.

Our start to the second half was very disappointing. We did almost the opposite that Nolan and I had asked during the interval and allowed our hosts to gain some momentum. If they had not missed an absolute sitter, although Martin deserves credit for the save, the final half an hour could have been different. With none of our players capable to sorting out the problems themselves, and they were very basic, we had to verbally bully the players from the sideline into working with the right level of intensity. With a poor mentality comes poor decision making and that would sum up the team in this spell. The key to success on such a poor pitch is to keep things simple. We complicated things by constantly picking the wrong option. To compound this lack of intelligence, we also executed our skills poorly by not working hard or early enough to get a good body shape. As we keep stressing to the players, the little details make a big difference.

Having weathered the storm, **Luke Berry** took the wind out of the home team's sails by leaping above their keeper to head home from Owen Kessack's centre. Christy Finch then shot wide with just the keeper to beat and Jack Eades forced a smart save with a left footed strike before a collection of errors from a long throw gift wrapped Wivenhoe a consolation goal. Every one of our back four had the



chance to clear but we looked more like the Keystone Cops than prospective professionals. Put simply, the goal was embarrassing. At least **Luke Berry** ensured we finished on a high with a great goal. He ghosted past two players before unleashing a bullet with his wrong foot into the bottom corner.

Considering the conditions and the absentees, we should have been happy with our afternoons work. There is a big difference though in being a "first team" in this league versus a "development team". In striving to produce young players for Cambridge United's first team and higher, we must always demand performances rather than being satisfied simply by the right result. We want both and invariably the former will ensure the latter. On Saturday, we lacked application in the second half and our performance suffered. We must take note of the old adage - 99% concentration equals 100% failure. The players must understand that to become a professional, they must apply themselves for every minute of every training session and every minute of every match. Then they will have a chance of fulfilling their potential.

Second-bottom Harwich will lose three of their four points if Lynn reserves cannot continue. Tony Armstrong, boss of the Essex outfit, reacted philosophically: "We will have to see what happens," he said. "We haven't got the resources to compete at this level. And until we address that problem nothing will change, we may be playing at a lower level next season.

PROMOTING THE SCHOLARS?

I thought that I should clarify our position regarding possible promotion for CRC from the Ridgeons Premier League following a recent article in the Cambridge News.

The rules state that to be considered for promotion to step 4 of the pyramid, you must finish in the top two and submit an application to the Football Association by 31 December. Assuming this has been done and you then win the league, provided your ground meets the criteria, you are guaranteed promotion. If you finish second, you can be considered for promotion if the first placed team declines to go up. This application can subsequently be withdrawn but cannot be made retrospectively. This is why speculation will always be rife within all Step 5 leagues in the second half of the season as no-one's intentions are clear until they make their final decision. Lowestoft were the constant source of a "will they/won't they" debate and I will now admit to my huge relief in them accepting promotion. Last season, with Leiston and Lowestoft having hardly dropped a point between them at Christmas and with league finishes of 17th and 13th in our first two seasons, I did not even think about applying for promotion. Our subsequent second placed finish was a surprise and thankfully Lowestoft's promotion to the Ryman League meant that oversight was academic. Having looked at the rules more closely, it seems that apart from costing £150 for a ground inspection, there is nothing to lose in applying for promotion every year. Then all options remain open should you finish in the top two.

The question of "Do you want to go up?" is easy to answer. Yes. That is because you always want to develop young players by testing them at the highest possible level. To close the gap between CRC and the first team would be fantastic for the best young players and everything we do must always be aimed at the best. We are constantly trying to raise the bar in terms of our demands on the players and the standards we set on and off the pitch, so playing at a higher level of football is something we believe that would enhance and not hinder development. It would be particularly important for players immediately outside the scholarship scheme, who would already have two years of Ridgeons League experience. This development group of players aged between 18-20 and currently including Rory McAuley, Sam Ives, Adam Marriott, Jordan Patrick and Darryl Coakley, need pushing when they

are not in the first team. At present the only option would be for them to go out on loan but if we could offer them a higher level of football under our roof, even better. The benefit of these players being able to play for CRC beyond their scholarship, training with the first team but doing additional individual development sessions with Nolan Keeley and remaining under Matt Walker's tutelage in the gym has been seen when they have been called upon for first team action.

It is a far better system than any that previously existed and gives these talented youngsters the best chance of progression and bridges the gap between a scholarship and professional contract. It also gives youngsters with potential more time to develop as very few are physically ready at 17 or 18 to play regularly in the BSP or higher. What happens between the ages of 18-21 is a graveyard for many players in this country due to a lack of truly competitive reserve team football and little structure in place for their development. Therefore, they play youth football for too long and then reserve football, which is basically just an extension of youth football. A lot of much bigger clubs are intrigued by our model and believe it to be preferable to their own, and that includes clubs in the Premiership. We get players out of their comfort zone at 16. Playing men's football gives them an early taste of the real world, preparing them mentally and physically for the first team at a much younger age. Even if the club was promoted and our Under 18's were able to return to the Football League Youth Alliance, we would not choose this option ahead of our current arrangements.

Therefore, I would put a rider on our ambitions of winning the league. We will never chase promotion if it would hinder our primary aim of developing young player. As the season progresses, our team will always get younger as McAuley, Ives, Marriott, Patrick and Coakley hopefully get first team call ups. We never want to hold up their progress by wanting them to remain with us to get Ridgeons League points. We know that our strongest team, including those five players, would probably win the league but that would defeat the object of everything we are doing. On the other hand, if we win the league remaining true to our beliefs and philosophy then it would be an unbelievable achievement. All of our players are Under 20 except for goalkeeper Martin Davies and on many occasions we will be almost entirely Under 18. Blooding

16 year olds like Jonathan Thorpe, Alex Bevan and Chris Tonks, who have all started a number of games already, is something we must never be afraid of doing. Nolan and I always tell the players to concentrate on performances and the results will follow. We must do the same by concentrating on development. Promotion will follow when we are good enough as a group.


We would always rather a first team appearance for one of our players than a win in our league because our job is to produce players ahead of winning matches. Obviously it is important to create a winning environment because that helps to develop players but we should never and won't ever be afraid of risking a result by a team selection. It is almost unbelievable to think about now but Sam Ives and Luke Berry were only paired together in midfield for CRC last September because Rory McAuley was suspended after getting sent off at Ebbsfleet. The two were magnificent in tandem for the rest of the season when at first we were not sure about playing two such young players together in that

Youth development is fascinating because the group is constantly evolving and with every day comes another situation, whether it's on or off the pitch, which provides a learning opportunity. The next four months will be very interesting as we get to the business end of the season in terms of decisions on our second year scholars and the recruitment of a new group. Blaine Hudson and Luke Berry have been a model of consistency over the last eighteen months while Jack Eades has made tremendous progress this season. We are looking for others to show the same improvements and respond to the challenge plus some of the first years to push ahead. Then we have the exciting prospect of how Maz and JP can take their first team opportunities when they arrive following Rory, Ivesy and Daz.

Our aim is that our youth scheme provides a conveyor belt of players for the club in many years to come. Having watched our Under 8's and 9's last weekend, I know that we have unbelievable talent at these younger age groups and the structure in place to ensure this long-term aim is achieved.

They managed to hang on until deep in the second half, but then two goals in a short space of time decided the result.

The manager, Steve O'Donohue, was proud of the effort and progress the team had made since meeting MK Dons only four weeks previously at home. The women are still second from bottom, but with two teams already having withdrawn from the league this is a respectable standing for a newly formed club.

Enfield currently sit top of the table, but with only 24 points from their 11 games Gillingham still have promotion firmly on their mind - they have 21 points from only eight games. With no




teams being relegated this year all the exciting action is up the top of the table!

Following the news that Premier League Clubs spent a sickening £70 million on fees to player agents last year, I wonder if it is time for the FA to show its not-inconsiderable teeth? OK, well, errrm, it's inconsiderable teeth then. You see, this isn't money spent on transfers, it's spent on making transfers ... money that goes out of the game before the ink is dry on the cheques.

Manchester City leads the league of shame by spending nearly £13m in 'facilitators' or 'deal makers' but why do we need these people at all?

To be fair, I can see certain instances where agents serve a purpose. Imagine you're a 17-year-old having just been offered your first contract at Blackburn Rovers, fancy going into the office with Sam Allardyce to negotiate appearance money? Thought not!

Or if, as a manager of a hard-up club who would like to move on a player sitting out his contract in the reserves, you could go to his agent and say "Try to find another club for your boy, 'cause he's wasting his career here."

But even in the lower divisions, agents can be the real power brokers, here's ex-United manager, Steve Thompson (pictured): "When I was in charge at Notts County, I agreed with deal for a player with the manager of another club with no agents involved. I then got a call from the player's agent who wanted £12,000 for the move to go through."

Magnify that by a hundred and you get the picture of what is happening right now in our top-flight. It simply has to stop.

So what can be done? For a start, I would like to see the PFA becoming



more involved, if they represented their players in a meaningful way, then agents may start to become surplus to requirement. I know PFA won't see it as their job to manufacture a transfer, simply to yield a signing-on fee for the player and of course, themselves. Yes, it has to stop.

# AN A-Z OF OPPONENTS

# UPAGAINSTTHEM

**KEVIN PALMER & LEIGH EDWARDS** 

### Merthyr Tydfil

Merthyr Town were in the Football League from 1920 until their demise in 1934, but it was a new club that took over their Penydarren Park in 1945 and won five Southern League titles up to 1954. We met The Martyrs ten times in that League between April 1960 and February 1964, winning eight and losing none, with a biggest win of 6-2 at Penydarren Park in April 1961. The largest attendance for this fixture was 4,017 at The Abbey in March 1961. The Martyrs are still in the Southern League Premier, but are currently in administration.

# Middlesbrough

Another club who we have never lost to. Our first meeting was in the Second Division in December 1982, when only 2,533 saw us win 2-0. In May 1983 a crowd of 9,879 inside Ayresome Park saw us win 1-0. In the '31 consecutive matches without a win' season of 1983-84 we avoided defeat against Boro with a goalless home game [2,819] and a 1-1 draw away [5,121]. In January 1991, 9,531 saw us dump Boro out of the FA Cup 2-0 at home, whilst the following season we drew 1-1 away in the League [14,686] and drew 0-0 at home (7,318).

#### Millwall

We have won five and lost seven of our 16 competitive meetings, with all our victories being by the odd goal. Our heaviest defeat was 5-1 at home in April 2001. The two biggest games came in the FA Cup Fourth Round in January 1990. Fourth Division Cambridge held First Division Millwall

1-1 at The Den in front of 14,573, before bringing them back to the Abbey and beating them 1-0 in extra time before a 9,531 crowd. The Lions avenged that defeat by beating us 3-2 in an FA Cup Replay at The New Den in our last clash in January 2003.

### Minehead

The FA Trophy was launched in 1969-70, and in January 1970 we played Minehead in the First Round, beating them 2-1 at home, with goals from John McKinven and George Harris, in front of 2,376. Minehead were formed in 1889 and were Western League regulars, before ascending into the Southern League between 1972 and 1983. Their finest season came in 1976-77 when they finished runnersup to Wimbledon and also reached the FA Cup Second Round. They later rejoined the Western League and are currently in its Premier Division.

### Morecambe

In December 2000, the non-league Shrimps belied their nickname by claiming bigger fry in the shape of Second Division Cambridge in an FA Cup Second Round tie at Christie Park, 2-1 in front of 3,427. By November 2005 we were both in the Conference and we won 1-0 away (1,648), and drew 2-2 at home (2,129). The following season we lost 3-1 at home (3,142) and drew 2-2 away (1,493 - some of whom are pictured left). Morecambe ascended into the Football League in May 2007 by beating Exeter 2-1 in the Play-Off Final at Wembley. They are now midtable in League Two.

# New Chesterton Institute

The New Chesterton Institute was originally known as the New

Chesterton Young Men's Union in 1885, before adopting its current moniker in 1892. Its original name gives a clue as to its purpose and it was located in Holland Road. We met them in October 1922 in the Cambs League Division Two, at our home ground of Stourbridge Common and beat them 2-1 through goals from Tom Langford and Fred Stevens. We won the return match 4-0 thanks to an Albert Dring hat-trick. N.C.I. are still competing at Sunday League level.

# New Chesterton Institute Reserves

Our first-ever season in League football came in 1921-22 in the Cambs League Division Three. We met N.C.I.; s reserve team away on 10 December 1921 and came away with a win, though the score is unrecorded. We do know the result of our home game at Stourbridge Common on 7 January 1922 as we won the match 2-0 with goals from Sid Brown and Lennox Edwards. We finished that debut season as champions, with 20 wins out of 24 games, whilst N.C.I. Reserves ended up in twelfth spot [out of 13], with just three wins to their name.

#### Newcastle United

There have been 16 meetings with Toon between September 1978 and November 1992 which means we have met them in all of our eight seasons in the second tier of English football. We have won four of those games (all by the odd goal), and lost nine, the heaviest being a 4-1 defeat at St James' Park in November 1992, which was watched by a record crowd for this fixture of 27,991. The largest Abbey crowd for this game was 8,404 for the first meeting, which ended goalless. Our 1-0 win in April 1984 ended our 31 match non-winning League run.



# Newmarket Town

We have met in 14 competitive fixtures, winning half of them and losing four. Our biggest attendance came in the last of those meetings in October 1969 when we won an FA Cup Qualifying tie 6-0 at home, seen by 2,514, but 2,701 were inside the Cricket Field Road ground twenty years earlier to see The Jockeys knock us out of the Cup. In 1951-52 we beat them 7-1 at home and 6-0 away, when the Jockeys contrived to lose all 34 of their Eastern Counties League games, conceding 171 goals in the process. They're still competing in that League.

# Newnham Institute

Our only Cambs League Division Two campaign [in 1922-23] saw us successfully emulate the previous Third Division season by capturing the League title. Our biggest rivals were Newnham Institute from that southwestern district of Cambridge, centred around the Hardwick Street area. We

drew our only game of that season 0-0 with them at their patch in November 1922, but won the return game 6-0 at our Stourbridge Common ground in February 1923. The Institute were more involved in table tennis and snooker after World War Two.


# **Newport County**

In November 1953 we were in the Eastern Counties League, and we met Third Division (South) Newport in the FA Cup First Round, drawing 2-2 at The Abbey in front of 7,500. In the replay at Somerton Park (action form another match at the ground pictured above) we beat them 2-1, seen by 7,434, our only victory as a non-league club over a League side. Our other 16 meetings were in the League, with seven wins and seven defeats. County (who reached the European Cup-Winners Cup Quarter-Finals in 1980-81) went bust in 1989, but a new club is currently competing in the Conference South.

# TRAVELLERS'**TALES**



**Match:** v Eastbourne Borough - Blue Square Premier

Date: Saturday, December 5th, 2009

Result: Eastbourne 2 Cambridge United 2

The Journey

Departure Time: 9.50am

Arrival at Ground: Last season's journey had been something of a frustrating one along single carriageway A roads and through bottleneck towns like Tunbridge Wells, so a Plan B was the order of the day this time - a plan that basically involved heading for Brighton and turning left just before you got there. By and large it kept to free-moving dual carriageways and although it was certainly further and probably took longer, it later transpired that this was the way the locals generally go.

So after only a little bit of winding our way through rolling countryside towards the end of the journey, we arrived in the large car park at the ground a little after 12.30pm.

# At The Ground

The Ground: Some distance from the sea, the ground is down one of the bungalow-lined side streets on the edge of one of the newer suburbs of Eastbourne and, as a result, seems to have a lot of land with which to play. This is evidenced by the large car park around the side of the

ground, the large, single-storey social club that stands deferentially a little to the side of the ground and the pitch on which Eastbourne's A Team usually play. It wasn't Eastbourne's A Team in action when we got there though; by happenstance, we arrived just in time to see the United fans' team losing narrowly to their Eastbourne counterparts.

A few turnstiles allow access from the side car park into the ground. However, you follow a wide, puddle-strewn path between the A Team pitch on your left and the social club on your right to get to the main entrance. Here, a two-storey building contains dressing rooms and corporate entertaining areas; the main turnstiles are in a corner of the ground, abutting this building.

Inside the ground, to your right, a low, covered area of terracing almost fills the area behind the goal. Set slightly to one side of this, a metal cage marks the area where the players emerge from the dressing rooms in that two-storey building behind this end of the ground. We saw various Eastbourne players disappearing down the caged tunnel to the dressing rooms before the match and they were accompanied by someone dressed as 'Stewie' from Family Guy! It turned out that the Eastbourne players were holding their Christmas party after the match and a certain Danny Brown late of this Parish - was the man in the costume.

The access to the dressing rooms is not the only way in which this part of the ground interacts with that two-storey building. The roof over the terrace here is flat and surprisingly wide - well, surprisingly until you realise that it is also the floor of corporate hospitality areas on the upper storey the windows of which peep out over the roof of the terrace.

Continuing around the ground, after a red metal gate in the corner, a short stretch of uncovered terrace runs to a point about level with midway inside the main entrance end of the pitch where it meets the end of the main stand.

The only area of seating in the ground, eight rows of comfortable red and blue flip-up seats continue to a point about level with the edge of the penalty area at the other end of the ground. The low, red brick wall that runs along the front of this stand is punctuated at regular intervals to allow access from a paved area at the front.

The final stretch along this side of the ground consists of a small section of covered terrace that, as though just getting the hang of things and not wanting to stop when it reaches the end, turns the corner and continues behind the goal and back along the remaining side of the ground until it reaches a point where it faces the start of the main stand. The low roof and metal back wall sit atop red bricks that match the front of the





main stand. These give this part of the ground a very pleasing air of continuity.

A small copse of Cordylines and a confectionary stall combine to place a full stop firmly at the end of the terrace, and we complete our tour of the ground beside the pea green walls of a Nissen hut. In front of this, the red numbers on an electronic scoreboard shine brightly, illuminating the point at which we entered the ground.

United Fans: They seemed to be there in smaller numbers than last season, perhaps due to the time of year and the novelty of it being a new ground to visit having worn off, but they were in good form with banter and songs. They unfurled a number of flags and banners of varying sizes before the match, including a large black and amber flag on an even bigger stick. Unfortunately, the combination of long stick and low roof meant a hasty retrieval was required after some over-enthusiastic waving led to the flag became detached and stuck on the adverting hoardings that hang from the front of the roof.

View from Away End: Although the match was unsegregated, most U's fans kept to the end of the ground opposite the main entrance. Here the terrace steps weren't particularly high, but there was plenty of room in which to move around and -perhaps even more importantly - reasonable cover from the inclement

elements.

Looking out from main stand and, for that matter, the end occupied by the majority of United fans, you could see the weather closing in over the hills above the town. And while it was dramatic to watch the brooding black clouds smother the hills in a swathe of rain as they headed in our direction, it was not as dramatic as the air display from the murmuration of starlings that swooped and swirled in intricate patterns as they came in to roost behind the ground.

Police/Stewards: There were no police to be seen and very few stewards present due to unavailability. Those who were about couldn't have been more helpful. This was particularly the case with the Head Steward who, when he saw me unpacking assorted broadcasting paraphernalia from the back of the car, made a point of making sure I knew where I needed to go to get my ticket. Having discovered that not being able to get into the ground until 1.30pm was not the ideal match preparation, he was only too happy to arrange for me to get in immediately.

Programme: No price on the front and no page numbers either, but you got 48 photocopied pages for your £2.50. Adverts were virtually on alternate pages, but the remaining pages contained some interesting reading, including a little bit about the City of Cambridge itself.

Food/Drink: Burger and chips (£4.20) went down well without being spectacular, while tea made up in strength what it lacked in warmth.

State of Toilets: Basic facilities were available at one end of the seated area and just inside the main entrance.

And Another Thing: With the incessant rain starting to form puddles on the pitch, many thought the game was going to be abandoned with 15 minutes to go. Eventually, it became clear that the stoppage was due to an injury to the referee, which came as a relief to many although, obviously not the referee. Pleasant as our visit to Eastbourne had been, the prospect of a Tuesday night trip in the middle of February was not an edifying thought!

# Afterwards

The Journey Home: Wet! Constant, heavy rain for the duration of the journey home threatened to make Noah's of mode of transport an appropriate option.

Mileage: 270.3 miles

# **OXFORD UNITED**

R Costings Abbey Stadium, Friday 18th December, 7.45pm

Only a points deduction deprived Oxford of a play-off place last season and they have carried that momentum into 2009/10.

Their campaign began with an 11 match unbeaten run, which was only ended at Field Mill in late September and since then Chris Wilder's men have fallen to just one further defeat. Sitting top and with a cushion over Stevenage Borough in second, it's easy to draw parallels with 2006/7 when United blew their early-season lead before eventually being usurped by Dagenham.

But this time, Wilder would surely assure doubters, things are different. The boss is an experienced non-league head having led Halifax to the play-offs before arriving at the Kassam in 2008. And his side includes players well-versed with the demands of the division. Top scorer James Constable, formerly of Kidderminster, is the division's leading marksman with 17 goals, while Mark Creighton, another former Harriers man, has been a near-ever present in the heart of a back line which has kept 12 clean sheets in the league.

Elsewhere, the side is littered with savvy Conference faces. Peterborough loanee Alfie Potter, who was with Kettering last term, is a perennial threat from midfield alongside Simon Clist, a summer recruit from Forest Green. Meanwhile forwards Francis Green and Onome Sodje have arrived on loan from Kettering and Barnsley respectively in the last few weeks.

Friday's encounter will be the seventh between the clubs in non-league. The six so far have brought two wins, two defeats and two losses apiece, while five of those six have been evening games.





# STEVENAGE BOROUGH

R Costings Abbey Stadium, Saturday 26th December, 3.00pm

It's been over seven months since Stevenage last visited the Abbey for that unforgettable play-off semi-final but Borough haven't looked back since and currently sit in second place, gnashing at Oxford's heels.

While other ambitious clubs have seen fortunes fluctuate during the past few campaigns, the Hertfordshire outfit have been top-eight constants. This term Graham Westley has retained the bulk of his squad and that constancy has borne fruit. But most impressive has been Borough's success without Steve Morison.

The prolific striker, now with Millwall, was replaced by Salisbury's Charlie Griffin, who has contributed nine strikes. And while Griffin is a focal point for attacks, goals have come from all sources. Scott Laird, Mark Roberts and Jon Ashton have all chipped in, as has the familiar figure of Lee Boylan, who has four.

Roberts and Ashton have also been crucial at the other end, in maintaining the division's best defence. Borough have kept four clean sheets in their last five league outings, with goalkeeper Chris Day and club stalwart Ronnie Henry crucial during this run.

The only blot on that impressive copy book came on December 1st as Stevenage slipped to their second league defeat of the season at Ebbsfleet.

Along with Boylan, former U's Mark Albrighton and David Bridges both remain at the Lamex Stadium, though none have three have appeared more than 10 times in 2009/10.

Throughout our Conference tenure Borough have proved to be tricky opponents, however, they have tended to falter in CB5: United have won four of the five Abbey games.

Ok Cambridge, your starter for ten ... which Impington-based outfit, who suspended their assistant manager earlier this season, have now suspended the main man too? Yes, Steve Fallon (above) has got himself more time for Christmas shopping pending a disciplinary hearing on the 18th as the Glassworld Stadium is plunged into chaos over Histon's wage bill. According to the BBC, Fallon, who recently celebrated ten years in charge of the villagers, was meant to look at reducing four players' wages but allegedly "chose to tell the whole team they were going to be released." Chairman Tony Roach said "We'll have the meeting next week and see if anything can be resolved." If Fallon has managed Histon for the last time, his final game won't be one to remember - a 0-0 draw with Altrincham that had as much quality as it had goals.

### Kandol snuffs out Poppies

As mentioned here recently, Leeds United have a tough time with lower-division sides and Kettering pushed them all the way in the FA Cup second-round replay at Elland Road. With the incentive of a trip to Mordor to play Man United at stake, the Poppies came from behind to force extra time. However, the BSP side's tiring legs finally allowed American Mike Grella to fire Leeds back in front and good old Tresor Kandol sealed the win a minute later. A second Grella goal and the inevitable Jermaine Beckford strike gave Leeds a scoreline that was harsh on

Lee Harper's well-organised Kettering.

The defeat came after Harper was criticised for resting key players for last Saturday's BSP home game against Salisbury, which saw the visitors come from behind to win 2-1. A defiant Harper said the chance of a lucrative trip to Man United justified his selection, but the loss saw the Poppies slip to fifth.

No such problems with League opposition for today's visitors. For the second successive round Luton beat a high-flying League Two side in a replay, following up their win over Rochdale by dumping Rotherham out of the Cup with a comfortable 3-0 win. The Hatters will now fancy their chances at Southampton.

#### Leaders wilt in Furness

Also through to the third round are Barrow, who knocked out BSP leaders Oxford 3-1. Barrow have already drawn twice against Oxford this season and went into the game with just one defeat in 14 - at Oxford! Goals from Bolland (below), Logan and Goodfellow set Barrow on their way, with Constable claiming a last-minute consolation goal. The Conference side now face the trip from Barrow-in-Furness to Premiership Sunderland in January.



At least Oxford fared better last Saturday in the BSP, beating Ebbsfleet 4-2, though they'll probably be disappointed to have conceded two having taken a 2-0 lead

within ten minutes. The prolific Jamie Constable bagged a brace as did Alfie Potter, while Magno Vieira and Scott Ginty replied for troubled Fleet.



# Manager in ref gets it right shocker

Stevenage kept up the pressure with a 2-0 defeat of Kidderminster. Harriers complained vociferously about both goals but manager Mark Yates (above) was refreshingly honest: "The lads tell me he [Mitchell Cole] was offside but, on today's performance, I can guarantee that one of mine was keeping him onside". Whilst he might have defended the ref, Yates was less keen to praise Stevenage's performance: "We got beaten up, we got bullied and we got outworked and we didn't do all the horrible stuff."

Also going strongly are York, who chalked up another win, this time over Wrexham, 2-1. The result means York have equalled their club record of eight successive wins. Playing at the KitKat Stadium, in the home city of the Yorkie bar, the Minstermen will now be looking to see what comes after eight. Manager Martin Foyle was understandably ecstatic after the match, proclaiming "It's nice". In contrast, Forest Green secured their first win in eight, edging past Rushden 1-0. Centre half Mark Preece scored the only goal to leave Rovers five points adrift of safety.

# Stags staggering on

Mansfield's stuttering campaign suffered



another setback when they were held to a goalless draw by Grays. Their last five games have seen the Stags drop points against three of the bottom four sides, yet they're still clinging on to fourth place.

Meanwhile, two form sides clashed in the northwest, where Barrow, whose fine run is mentioned above, came up against Hayes & Yeading, with five wins and a draw from their previous six league outings. Perhaps not surprisingly, honours were even as the sides drew one apiece. Jason Walker put the home side ahead but Esmond James equalised late on to clinch a point.

# Chester clear debts but not deficit

Another play-off-chasing side dropping points were Luton. They may be disposing of League Two sides for fun in the Cup, but couldn't manage a goal in Saturday's clash with bottom side Chester. Fortunately for the Hatters, nor could Chester, though at least they ended their dismal run of five successive defeats despite having Kevin Roberts sent off for thinking he was playing rugby. Better news for Chester off the pitch: former owner Steven Vaughan, who's banned from being a company director, has lent his son, also Steven, enough money for him to pay off City's arrears. They're still in arrears in the BSP though, to the tune of minus three points.

Wimbledon's surge gained further momentum with victory over Gateshead.

Goals from Steven Gregory in the first half and Ricky Wellard in the second sealed the points, taking the Wombles up to sixth, just two points behind Kettering.

To the south coast, where Cambridge and Eastbourne fought out a 2-2 draw. The U's are making something of a speciality of coming from behind

to equalise these days. Last Saturday was no exception as they did it twice, Ben Austin and Brian Saah cancelling out efforts from Paul Armstrong and Liam Enver-Marum (left). Finally, Lewis Killeen's first-half goal was enough to seal the points for Crawley at Tamworth.

- the entry onto the playing area or any adjacent area to which spectators are not generally admitted without lawful authority or excuse.

Banning Order being made for all grounds in the country together with travelling abroad when England play. Supporters are also reminded that Section 9 of the regulations say that nobody may stand in any seated area whilst play is in progress. Persistent standing in seated areas is strictly forbidden and may result

Supporters are reminded that in accordance with the Ground Regulations they should remain seated if in a seated section of the stadium. Guardians are asked to take responsibility for under 14s.

#### TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT PLAN

Please could all supporters be aware of the pedestrian section of the Cambridge United Traffic Management Plan:

Pedestrians will be permitted to access the Stadium site via any of the access points subject to their being open and stewarded. Pedestrians must have the appropriate tickets for the area of the stadium entered.

Cambridge United Football Club has management boards displayed at all exits advising spectators to use the pedestrian crossing on Newmarket Road and Coldhams Lane when leaving the Stadium.

Signage is also displayed on the North Terrace exit roadway directing supporters to the pedestrian crossings


