FA Cup third round day has always been a very special occasion in the English football calendar, so I'm delighted that we have battled through two ties to take part this afternoon.

I'm pleased to welcome Richard Money's Luton Town side to St Mary's and while they are currently playing non-league football, everyone in the game views the Hatters as a league club. Their great history suggests they will still have the mentality of a Football League outfit, so Luton will be dangerous opponents for us this afternoon.

Financial mismanagement left Luton in a very difficult position last season and the 30 point penalty they were burdened with made their battle to beat the drop from League Two almost impossible, but they have started the fight back this season and their commitment will be high this afternoon as they have already fought through five FA Cup ties to reach the third round.

I have always felt that the non-league sides who make it through to this stage of the FA Cup should receive some kind of prize from the Football Association because Luton's achievement in being here today is arguably more impressive than it would be for Manchester United or Chelsea ending up as winners of the competition next May.

My FA Cup memories stretch back many a long year. I started out in the competition as a non-league player and then went all the way to the 1990 Final at Wembley with Crystal Palace, before coming within a few seconds of winning the competition as West Ham manager back in 2006.

Having experienced every emotion possible in the FA Cup, I appreciate that underdogs can achieve success when you least expect it and I also fully understand just how important this competition can be in a player's career. Some of your most memorable moments can come in FA Cup ties and I'm sure Luton are looking on this game as a real chance to announce that they are on their way back from a difficult period in their club's history.

We are coming into this tie on the back of two tough fixtures over the festive period and our 3-1 home win against Exeter on Boxing Day was not as comfortable as the score line suggested. The most important thing is we got the right result, even though we didn't play as well as we would have wanted in the second half.



CAPTAIN'S CHAT

I have been looking forward to this fixture from the moment our name was placed alongside Luton Town in the FA Cup third round draw.

Luton had to come through a second round replay before this tie was confirmed, but I'm delighted to be playing against my old club and it's fair to say this match has been the talk of the Davis household for the last few weeks. My wife's family are big Luton fans and will be coming to this game, but they better not be cheering too loudly for the opposition if they want to have a nice dinner at my house later on tonight!

I have a lot of affection for Luton. I was born up the road from the club in Leighton Buzzard and came through the ranks at Luton before playing over 100 games for the Hatters at the start of my career. I had some very happy times at Kenilworth Road and I'm delighted to see them climbing back from the despair they found themselves in over the last couple of years.

The treatment handed out to Luton last season was unbelievable, with the Football League's decision to hand them a 30-point penalty in League Two being way too harsh in my book. The only people hurt by such an excessive punishment were the players, the supporters and the people working at Luton Town FC who had nothing to do with the financial problems that got the club into trouble.

A lesser club would have been sunk without trace by a penalty like that, but Luton have always had a loyal supporter base and it has kept them going. My hope is they can bounce back into the Football League very soon and even though it's pleasing to see them enjoying a good FA Cup run, I'm hoping it comes to an end here today.

We are playing so many games at the moment and you could be forgiven for wondering where the FA Cup fits into our schedule for the New Year, but we have to find a way of squeezing in a run if possible. This is a great competition and a club of our size should put our all into it.

We have proved to be a formidable team in cup football at St Mary's Stadium this season and our win in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy against Norwich a few weeks back highlighted our great never say die spirit as we came back from a goal down in the 93rd minute before eventually winning the tie on penalties.

If I'm being honest, I actually missed Papa's late equaliser in the tie because I was in the lift coming down from my seat in the stands having accepted that we had run out of time to get back into the game. As this team does not know when it is beaten, I should have known not to give up until the final whistle had been blown.

Happy New Year to you all and let's get 2010 off to a flying start with a win against my old club.



Ambitious Huddersfield Town manager Lee Clark has vowed to carry on attacking each and every League One opponent for the rest of the season as he targets promotion in 2010.

Former Newcastle midfielder Clark has made a huge impression in his first

managerial posting and he is determined to cement his reputation as one of the brightest young coaches in the game by finishing off the job he has started at Huddersfield.

"Some of the attacking football we have been playing this season has been of the highest order and that style of play will give us our best chance to achieve our ambitions this season," believes Clark. "I have been at this club for a year now and while I inherited some of the players, I've brought a good number of the lads to the club who are all good passing footballers.

"It's important to me to see our team play with a style and that's enjoyable for everyone and we will continue to try and produce quick passing to create our goal scoring opportunities. I think we have proved we are good enough to beat any side in League One when we are at our best."

Clark admits he will be looking to boost his squad strength now that the transfer window is open and it seems as if he is determined to scour all levels of the game to bring in players to boost his promotion charge.

"Nothing annoys me more than missing out on a player because you haven't had the chance to watch him in action, so it means I go to as many games as possible," says Clark. "We have expanded our scouting network at the club, which is important for the future of Huddersfield Town and hopefully we will reap the rewards soon.

"It is also important for my development as a coach to watch as many games as possible. I love to go to Premier League matches because it helps my development as a coach. You see a team like Arsenal and cannot help but enjoy the way they play the game. That is the way all managers would like to see their teams perform and you can pick up little things by watching a side with so much quality.

"We are looking at ways to strengthen the squad all the time and while I'm happy with what I have here already, it would be great to add a couple more pieces to the jigsaw for the second half of the season."



AN INTERVIEW WITH...

BARTOSZ BIALKOWSKI

Luton Town are back in the big time today for FA Cup third round action against Saints and Bartosz Bialkowski has bitter-sweet memories of cup encounters for the host club.

The 6ft 4 ins Poland Under-21 international goalkeeper was the hero of the club's recent Johnstone's Paint Football League Trophy southern semi-final triumph over Norwich.

He brilliantly saved three times in the penalty shoot-out to pave the way towards Wayne Thomas's match-winning spot kick.

Yet it was in another cup four years ago that Bialkowski was to suffer an injury which effectively put him back to square one in the pecking order for the Southampton goalkeeping jersey.

At just 18 he had performed quite brilliantly in six games for Saints leading up to their big FA Cup fifth round showdown with Newcastle United at James's Park.

It was a chance for Saints to rub noses with the big boys again after their relegation from the Premiership the season before.

And deep into the game they were still hanging on in there at 1-0 down with little over ten minutes left when Bialkowski, who had made three excellent saves, went up for a high ball, landed awkwardly and damaged the cruciate ligament in his left knee.

The young goalkeeper, who had imperiously brushed Paul Smith aside for the regular number one spot at St. Mary's, didn't play again for nine months and had to wait until the end of the 2006-2007 season before he got another decent run in the side.

He came in for the suspended Kelvin Davis and did so well in the club's strong promotion push that season that he got the nod for the first of the play-off semifinals against Derby at St. Mary's. Saints, disastrously lost 2-1 and Bialkowski was out for the return leg when his side eventually lost out in a penalty shoot out.

Since then he's had to feed on scraps. The odd appearance here, the odd appearance there and he was glad of a change of scene when first Ipswich Town (at the end of last season) and then Barnsley (at the beginning of this) took him on loan.

He played twice in a week for Barnsley and did so well that he was ready when the call came from Saints. Kelvin Davis was injured at Hartlepool in a night match on November 24, Bialkowski replaced him off the bench and has gone on to perform as well as at any time with the club.

Bart has regained all the old agility and athleticism which persuaded George Burley to bring him to St. Mary's halfway through the 2005/2006 campaign. It was during his short and glorious spell as manager of Hearts that Burley got his first close up of the young keeper. He went to Tynecastle and not long after Burley left the Edinburgh club and linked up with Saints, he brought Bialkowski to St. Mary's from the Polish League club Gornik Zabbrze. And within a week or two, he was in the first team.

Bart was rated by Burley as one of the most promising young keepers in the game so it's hard to believe that the Pole is still striving for regular first team football, but there's no doubt that his recent displays have been a major contributory factor towards Saints heartening rise up the League One table.

The momentum was broken at Leeds just before Christmas but it has to be said that Saints lost through no fault of their goalkeeper. In fact it was Bart's brilliance (one stupendous second half save comes to mind) which kept them in the game for so long.

There's no doubt he has become a more accomplished goalkeeping working alongside

one of the finest in the game, the Saints captain Kelvin Davis. He learned a lot, too, from goalkeeping coach Malcolm Webster, counting him as one of the biggest influences in his career.

Right now he loves Saints and wants to stay and fight for his place, but there have been times when the doubts set in, especially last season when with Saints in turmoil at the bottom of the table, their Dutch coaches sometimes picked Tommy Forecast ahead of him on the bench.

Davis' form last season was so outstanding that Bialkwoski accepted his fate but when he slipped to number three, he started to fret.

But all credit to the young man, he's kept working hard and most important he's is regaining his confidence to a degree that when he was needed again by Alan Pardew, he responded magnificently.

As he cast an eye on the Christmas programme and today's FA Cup clash with Luton, Bialkowski said: "All I can do right now is to keep playing well and making it hard for the manager to leave me out.

"Kelvin came back to training just before Christmas and is getting close again so I shall have to stay on my toes to make sure I stay in the side. Right now I'm just glad to be playing again. There's nothing like a few games to give you confidence and my confidence is growing all the time.

"I'm enjoying every game be it league or cup. Luton today in the FA Cup will be every bit as important as the league because we see it as a great opportunity to progress to the next round and the chance of perhaps playing a Premiership club."

The bigger picture, though, is the league and Bialkowski shares the belief that Saints can make the play-offs. "Southampton are worthy of at least a place in the Championship and now have the players to compete well there. We're more confident, we're more experienced and we're more organised than we were a year ago.

"As for myself I've spent a lot of time at this club and have grown to love it. I'm a better goalkeeper than I was when I first came in four years ago. I've played nearly 30 games and experience makes you better. I just want to stay and fight for myself. Kelvin is so good and so professional that I accept it's going to be hard."


Bart Bialkwoski has been the essence of patience as he's hung around waiting for his chance.



Luton manager Richard Money believes the pressure his side are under to achieve instant success in the Blue Square Premier League has made their life difficult in the first half of the season.

Their demotion from the Football League last summer was due primarily to the Football League's decision to hand the club a brutal 30-point penalty for financial irregularities, leaving manager Mick Harford with little or no chance to keep the Hatters afloat.

However, a club of Luton's stature were not expecting to be languishing in non-league circles for long, so an indifferent start to the season saw Harford replaced with ex-Walsall boss Money and he accepts his side face an uphill battle to claim automatic promotion back into League Two.

"Oxford are flying at the top of the table and we have probably given ourselves a bit too much to do to catch them, but we have to keep working hard and put ourselves in a position to take advantage if they implode," he says. "Oxford are well on course to finish with 100 points for the season and it means we have to try and win every game to put them under a bit of pressure.

"Some of the fans have been disappointed by our league results so far this season, but I've been in this game long enough to know you should not look too far ahead. We need to stay together on and off the pitch to try and solve the problems that have been affecting this club. Stability and consistency is what we need at Luton and I'm determined to make the most of the opportunity I've been presented with here.

"There are some good players at Luton and while I know people hoped the club would return to the Football League via the automatic promotion route, this game is never as easy as that. There is a lot of hard work to do before we get Luton back into League Two."

Inconsistency in the Blue Square Premier Division has been replaced by impressive displays in the FA Cup since Money took charge at Luton, with their fine victory against League Two promotion chasers Rotherham in the second round confirming they deserve to be respected at St. Mary's this afternoon.

"We played well against Rotherham and our finishing on the night was excellent," reflects Money on his side's 3-0 replay victory. "Now we have this great fixture at Southampton to look forward to and we want to make sure we give them a good game.

"I'm sure Alan Pardew and Southampton are looking at a tie against a non-league side at home and thinking this is a decent draw for them, but we will do everything we can to make life difficult for them."







When you have lived through the sort of traumas that have befallen Luton Town in the last couple of years, it was hard to set an appropriate level of expectations as they faced up to life as a non-league side this season.

However, Mark Wood from the Luton News admits there has been some frustration among Hatters followers in recent months as their march back to the Football League has not been as convincing as many had hoped.

"Some of the supporters have been frustrated by the team's performances this season, but there has also been a degree of surprise about the quality of opposition in the Blue Square Premier League," says our reporter. "There are a handful of teams at the top of the league who are playing at a high standard and it means the competition for promotion will be strong in the second half of the season.

"What cannot be in doubt is that Luton have players who are good enough to be succeeding at a much higher level, with the likes of Kevin Nicholls and Kevin Gallen proven performers in the top two divisions of the Football League. The hope is that the quality at the club will shine through in the second half of the season."

The departure of Luton hero Mick Harford from the managerial hot-seat in October was a sad day for all associated the club and it means replacement Richard Money will need time to find his feet at Kenilworth Road.

MANAGING TO SUCCEED

Football historian Leigh Edwards profiles six leading Luton Town managers.

SYD OWEN

Long-serving England international centre-half Syd Owen was both a player and manager at Luton Town. Signing professional for Birmingham City in October 1945, he moved to Luton in June 1947 and starred in their 1951-52 FA Cup run, 1952-53 promotion near-miss and 1954-55 promotion success. He was voted 'Footballer of the Year' as Luton were FA Cup finalists in 1959 and netted three goals in 388 League games before becoming manager for a year in May 1959. Later Leeds United's chief coach under Don Revie until October 1975, he then coached at Birmingham, Hull City and Manchester United. He died in August 1998.



Popular manager Harry Haslam steered Luton Town back to the top-flight in 1973-74. Starting with Rochdale, the full-back played for Oldham Athletic, Brighton, Leyton Orient, Guildford City and Hastings United, then managed Eastbourne United, Barry Town and Tonbridge before becoming Fulham's chief scout. He assisted Alec Stock at Luton prior to succeeding him as manager in May 1972, remaining in charge of the Hatters until leaving in January 1978 to manage Sheffield United. He scouted for England under Bobby Robson and died in September 1986. His son Keith was Mansfield's managing director.

DAVID PLEAT

Articulate manager David Pleat guided Luton Town to the Second Division title in 1981-82. A former winger, he played for Nottingham Forest, Luton, Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough before becoming

Nuneaton's player-boss. He rejoined Luton as coach in July 1972 and became manager in January 1978, guiding the Hatters to the FA Cup semi-finals in 1984-85. Taking charge of Spurs in May 1986, he led them to the 1987 FA Cup final, then managed Leicester City before rejoining Luton in June 1991. He took the Hatters to the FA Cup semi-finals again in 1993-94, leaving in June 1995. Now working in the media.



RAY HARFORD

Ray Harford plotted Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. A centre-half with Charlton, Exeter, Lincoln, Mansfield, Port Vale and Colchester, he was appointed youth team coach at Layer Road. He joined

Fulham in a similar capacity in June 1981 and was manager for two years before moving to Luton as assistant-boss in July 1986. Becoming manager in June 1987, he also guided them to the Simod Cup final and FA Cup semi-finals in 1987-88, then the 1989 Littlewoods Cup final. Sacked in January 1990, he later managed Wimbledon, Blackburn Rovers, West Brom and QPR. He died in August 2003.

JOE KINNEAR

Former Republic of Ireland international right-back Joe Kinnear plotted Luton Town's 2001-02 promotion success. Initially with Spurs, he helped them win the FA Cup in 1967, League Cup twice and UEFA Cup in 1972. He moved to Brighton in August 1975, then coached overseas before assisting Dave Mackay at Doncaster Rovers. Joining Wimbledon as coach in September 1989, he became manager in January 1992 and led them to the semi-finals of both the FA Cup and League Cup in 1996-97. He left after a heart-attack, then managed Luton from January 2001 until June 2003, Nottingham Forest and Newcastle United.

MIKE NEWELL

Ex-England U-21 striker Mike Newell managed Luton Town to the League One title in 2004-05. Initially with Liverpool, he moved via Crewe to Wigan Athletic in October 1983 and scored in their 1985 Freight Rover trophy final

triumph. He played for Luton, Leicester City and Everton prior to joining Blackburn Rovers in November 1991, helping win promotion in 1991-92 and the Premiership title in 1994-95. Later with Birmingham City, he became Hartlepool's boss in November 2002, plotting their 2002-03 promotion success. He rejoined Luton as manager from June 2003 until March 2007, since managing Grimsby Town.

Saints suffered their first defeat in eight games as league leaders Leeds United took a narrow 1-0 win at Elland Road.

Robert Snodgrass hit a 77th minute winner as the hosts edged a match which saw Saints match up to the table toppers for much of the game. The goal put a blemish on an otherwise flawless display at the back from Alan Pardew's side which proved his side can mix it with the top teams in the division.

A late flurry of shots from the visitors almost brought an equaliser and Saints also had a strong looking claim for a penalty in the dying moments of play, which unfortunately fell on deaf ears.

Both sides struggled to take a hold of the game in the first half, with chances generally coming from counter-attacks. Saints seemed to have done enough to earn a shut out at Elland Road until Snodgrass collected the ball on the left hand side and the midfielder arched a measured effort into the top right of Bialkowski's goal to make it 1-0

Alan Pardew introduced Michail Antonio for Papa Waigo inside the last fifteen minutes before Oscar Gobern replaced Wayne Thomas as Saints sought another late goal. Both substitutes came close to forcing goal scoring opportunities late on, with Gobern heading Lloyd James' corner wide.

Deep into stoppage time, Antonio was pushed to the deck inside the area, but play continued as the ball broke for Lambert as who couldn't find the target as his well struck effort agonisingly squirmed across the face of goal.

Dan Harding almost got in on the act against his former Club late on. He fired wide with the last kick of the match following a corner that Bialkowski had come up for but was unable to rescue anything from West Yorkshire.



PROMOTION WINNER

Former Luton Town central defender

CHRIS NICHOLL was a key figure in Southampton's 1977-78 promotion success. Moving to Luton from Halifax Town in August 1969, he starred in their 1969-70 promotion campaign and netted six goals in 97 League games before sold to Aston Villa for £90,000 in March 1972. The Northern Ireland international joined Saints in June 1977 and was a League Cup finalist in 1979, scoring eight times in 228 League outings prior to joining Grimsby Town in August 1983. He managed Saints between August 1985 and June 1991.

CUP FINALIST

Former Luton Town midfielder PAUL TELFER played for Southampton in the 2003 FA Cup final. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in November 1988, he starred as Luton reached the FA Cup semi-finals in 1993-94 and was ever-present in 1994-95. moving to Coventry City for £1,500,000 in July 1995.

The Scotland international followed Gordon Strachan to Southampton in November 2001 and his solitary goal in 128 Premiership games came in the 3-1 victory at home to Newcastle United six months later, reuniting with Strachan at Celtic in July 2005.

WELSH INTERNATIONAL

Ex-Luton Town defender ALAN NEILSON gained the last of his five Welsh caps whilst at Southampton. Moving to The Dell from Newcastle United for £500,000 in June 1995, he made 55 Premiership appearances for Saints before being sold to Fulham for £250,000 in November 1997. He joined Luton from Grimsby Town in February 2002 and helped them win promotion in 2001-02 and 2004-05, scoring once in 57 League outings for today's opponents. Kelvin Davis, Richard Dryden, Paul Hughes and Chris Perry have also played for both clubs in recent times.



IRISH INTERNATIONAL


Northern Ireland international striker IAIN DOWIE was capped whilst at both Luton Town and Southampton. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Hendon for £30,000 in December 1988, he netted 15 goals in 66 First Division games for Luton before being sold to West Ham for £480,000 in March 1991.

He joined Southampton for £500,000 in August 1991 and featured prominently as Saints were Zenith Data Systems Cup finalists in 1992, scoring 30 times in 122 League outings while at The Dell prior to joining Crystal Palace for £400,000 in January 1995.

LEADING MARKSMAN

Ex-Luton Town centre-forward **RON DAVIES** was

Southampton's leading marksman in three successive seasons. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Chester for £10,000 in October 1962, he was Luton's top scorer in 1962-63 and netted 21 goals in 32 League games for today's opponents before being sold to Norwich City for £35,000 in September 1963. He joined Saints for £55,000 in August 1966 and was capped 23 times by Wales while at The Dell, scoring 134 goals in 240 First Division outings before moving to Portsmouth for £45,000 in April 1973.



ENGLAND INTERNATIONAL

Former Luton Town midfielder STEVE WILLIAMS was capped six times by England while at Southampton, Signing professional at The Dell in July 1976, he starred as Saints won promotion in 1977-78 and were League Cup finalists in 1979. He also skippered Southampton to League Championship runners-up in 1983-84 and netted 18 goals in 279 League games before sold to Arsenal for £525,000 in December 1984. Moving to Luton for £300,000 in July 1988, he scored once in 40 First Division outings prior to reuniting with Alan Ball at Exeter City in August 1991.

PROMOTION PLAY-OFFS

Former Southampton central defender STEVE DAVIS featured prominently as Luton Town qualified for the Second Division play-offs in 1996-97. Signing professional at The Dell in July 1987, he made his League debut in Saints' 4-1 victory at home to Norwich City in February 1990 and played six First Division games before being sold to Burnley for £60,000 in August 1991.

He joined Luton for £750,000 in July 1995 and scored 21 times in 138 League outings for today's opponents prior to rejoining Burnley for £800,000 in December 1998.

CUP HERO

Former Southampton striker KERRY DIXON was leading marksman as Luton Town reached the FA Cup semifinals in 1993-94. Moving to The Dell from Chelsea in July 1992, the England international scored twice in nine Premier League games for Saints prior to joining Luton in February 1993. He netted 19 goals in 75 First Division outings before moving to Millwall in March 1995.

Billy Boyd, Sandy Davie, Walter Fairgrieve, Tommy Hare, Les Harfield, Billy Henderson, Alex McDonald, Forbes Phillipson-Masters and Doug Rowe also played for both clubs.

A season high crowd of 30,890 at St. Mary's witnessed Saints defeat Exeter 3-1 in League One on Boxing Day.

It wasn't all plain sailing for Alan Pardew's side who, despite the fairly comfortable looking scoreline, had to contend with a valiant display from the ten men of Exeter after the Grecians had Troy Archibald-Henville dismissed in the first half.

In an open start to the game, Saints stole a march on their opponents just short of the quarter hour mark with a first professional goal from Lloyd James.

The Welshman collected Rickie Lambert's pass on the right before cutting inside and hitting an opportunist strike from the edge of the area that took a deflection off a defender which wrong footed Paul Jones in City's net.

After a brief heavy rainfall the hosts doubled their advantage with James again involved. The versatile youngster delivered a free-kick from the right into the middle of the area where Neal Trotman powerfully met the cross with his head to find the top corner, making it 2-0.

As play entered the last ten minutes of the half a spell of pressure from Exeter preceded a decision that hampered their chances of taking anything from the game when Archibald-Henville was dismissed for an ill timed challenge on Morgan Schneiderlin. The Grecians defender's protests fell on deaf ears but the decision appeared to galvanise the visitors, who gave a more spirited performance in the second half.

On 68 minutes, the ten men gave Saints a scare as they pulled goal back. A corner from the left was met at the far post by Captain Matthew Taylor, who headed through the mass of bodies into the opposite corner to give Paul Tisdale's side hope in the game.

David Connolly and Rickie Lambert had both gone close to extending the lead prior to City's goal, but the latter went on to play a key role in the decisive third which came two minutes from time through substitute Papa Waigo.

A brilliantly timed pass from Lambert set the Senegalese man through on goal and the Fiorentina loanee kept his cool to side-foot past Jones into the bottom right corner at the Chapel End for his seventh goal of the campaign.

Lambert almost put the icing on the cake was a delicious looking strike in the last minute of stoppage time which dinked the crossbar, as Saints saw out the match a little more comfortbaly.





As 2009 came to an end Alan Pardew reflected on his time at the Club since his arrival at Saints last summer.

The Londoner confessed that he initially approached the task of guiding Southampton back on track with trepidation when asked if he would consider a switch to the south coast, but admitted that it didn't take too much convincing that it would be right for him.

"At the time I was just looking to see what scenarios might come up and I got a call from somebody within the Club asking if I would be interested," he revealed. "At first I wasn't sure if it was right for me, not because of the Club, but because of the situation it had been in and the ownership of it, so I went into it with an open mind really.

"It was only after I met with Nicola Cortese that I thought, 'this looks good', it sounded right for me, I could build a team and a Club here which is something I've done well in the past, and the size of this Club and the fan base swayed that decision.

"IT WAS ONLY AFTER I MET WITH NICOLA CORTESE THAT I THOUGHT, 'THIS LOOKS GOOD', IT SOUNDED RIGHT FOR ME..."

"You can be a big Club and have a good history, but if the board isn't right and there's no drive, then it becomes a major factor for the manager. I didn't want that at Southampton, to not have the chance to give the fans what they want, so I know that I've got the power to do that with the support of the board, and I know that I can do it so those factors suggested to me that the agenda could work."

Pardew immediately set about his task by pinpointing what was lacking in the squad as he applied the ideals he has honed up on during his time out of the game.

"I found an acceptance of defeat here that was unsavoury for me," he explained. "It wasn't through the fault of anyone in particular, but constant defeat brings that, or we played the game and, 'we tried'. Trying is a word that I don't like, defeats are not what you get paid for, it's not about playing the game it's about winning, and we're in a professional not an amateur sport.


"So, from bringing a winning mentality and not accepting defeat into training, to the preparation of the ground and the food, the whole thing, it's not good enough to just try. We want to be the best, so let's deliver that. It's an example I hope to set myself. We've made it very difficult for players after the defeats in training because winning is the only thing that matters.

"We expect to win when we get on the pitch, we did that at Leeds and that was unforeseeable when I started here, so that's changed. We still need to grow and get more experience and nous on the pitch which we still lack in some areas, that needs to be improved."

The transfer window has now swung open and the manager cited examples within his squad of the type of players he's like to bring in. He also has the sort of security puts him in a desirable position compared with his rivals in League One.

"The application of the players that we've recruited and the ones we've inherited has been top drawer. There are still some improvements to come from players we've brought in and ones we've always had. Adam Lallana and Dean Hammond being two examples of players that will get better from here, they need to, in order to stay in the team because we're going to grow, but there's still some work to be done. It's still got some growing to do, we need to improve and the window is an opportunity for us.

"It's a key month in many ways. A lot of managers I know are very worried about

January because some of their important players are going to get poached and players in this division will move on which will weaken their sides, and other sides will recruit and be stronger.

"The beauty we have here at Southampton is that a team can come in for let's say Adam Lallana and I can refuse it, because I know I'll have the backing of Markus Liebherr and Nicola Cortese, and that gives me a strong feeling that we can get better. I'm in a position to do that, which is enviable and that bodes well for everyone in Southampton."

The Fiorentina loanee front man also notched one from 12 yards, but he got the scoring underway in the thirteenth minute at St. Mary's which owed much to a delightful pass with the outside of his boot from Lloyd James.

The Welshman played an inch perfect pass to release Papa Waigo, who shrugged off the advances of a defender before keeping his cool to force a shot home which took an eternity to cross the line, as Fraser Forster tried to keep the ball out, but couldn't prevent the Canaries from conceding their first goal in the Trophy.

On 32 minutes pressure from the visitors told as Norwich hit back with a goal from Gary Doherty. The Irishman collected a partially cleared free-kick inside the area, and crashed a shot in off the underside of the crossbar to regain parity.

The game moved up a gear in the second half as both sides went for it which led to City going taking the lead with a scrappy looking goal. Chris Martin took full advantage as Holt and Bialkowski clashed. The loose ball spilled out kindly for the Canaries forward to tap home from six yards.

The 15,000 strong Saints crowed did their best to re-ignite the hosts' confidence going forward, but they had to wait until three minutes of stoppage time went up on the board when Papa Waigo popped up again.

In dramatic fashion the forward poached an effort from close range as a high ball into the box fell to him, taking the match to penalty kicks.

Bartosz Bialkowski made three saves and Wayne Thomas converted the winning effort from 12 yards to record a 6-5 success in front of the Northam End, to set up a two legged Area Final with MK Dons starting later this month.







Chris Nicholl


Chris Nicholl was appointed Southampton manager in June 1985. Not good timing. There was a mutinous faction in the dressing room and Saints, along with all other English clubs, had been banned from European competition following the 'Heysel disaster'.

Saints had qualified for the UEFA Cup in four of the five previous seasons; income from European matches was essential to the club's financial strategy. Economies were required.

Chris had spent two years as assistant manager at Grimsby Town, after leaving the south coast in 1983. Lawrie McMenemy had originally brought him to The Dell in 1977, with a reputation for gaining immediate promotion with every club he'd played for – *viz*. Halifax Town, Luton Town and Aston Villa – a record maintained with Saints, with elevation to Division One in '78. A shrewd, footballing centre-back, who didn't suffer forwards gladly, he'd proved himself world-class with Northern Ireland. He had credentials, if not experience.

In his autobiography, *Taking Le Tiss* (Harper Sport 2009), Matthew Le Tissier claims that Chris's personnel methods could be scary. But he did well in nurturing some remarkable youth-team graduates: Matty, Rodney Wallace and Alan Shearer among them.

As for his tactics, they veered from too conservative to outrageous. Nobody, especially visiting fans, will forget Saints playing 4-2-4 against League-leaders Liverpool in October 1989, and winning 4-1; young Matty running – well, more strolling – riot on the right-wing. Matty observes, "We had a terrific side and were probably only one or two good signings away from being genuine title contenders." Plus ça change! But where was the money for the signings?



Having finished seventh in 1990 – with Rodders, Matty and Shearer often looking like England's future forward-line – Saints slumped to 14th in '91. Many Dellites, being convinced that financial constraints were an irrelevance, believed Nicholl was failing. A theory encouraged by tabloid gossip that Rod Wallace and his twin Ray were agitating for transfers, and 'bigger clubs' were inquiring after Shearer, Matty, Barry Horne and Neil Ruddock.

Saints' last away game of '90-91 had been at bottom club Derby County. Graham Hiley told *Echo* readers, of the 6-0 defeat: '... the charitable Saints stepped in with their usual generous handouts to gift them an incredible six goals as a farewell present.'

Was that the final straw? It certainly suggested that some players had no more confidence in Chris than his detractors around the pitch. When the axe came sympathy was limited. However, his replacement, Ian Branfoot, would quickly demonstrate that Chris had been doing – at the least – a respectable job in trying circumstances.







Emergency Procedures

Important announcements will be notified to spectators by means of the public address system.

- The announcement will be preceded by a loud warning signal.
- Listen carefully to the announcement and be ready to respond in a calm and controlled manner.
- Stewards and/or police officers will assist by directing spectators to the nearest safe exit where necessary.
- Please remain calm and keep gangways and exits clear.

Standing in seated areas

The current legislation is very clear. Persistent standing in seated areas is in breach of the Ground Regulations which are required under the Safety Certificate that allows the Club to operate St. Mary's Stadium.

GROUND REGULATION 13 STATES:

Nobody may stand in any seating area whilst play is in progress. Persistent standing in seated areas whilst play is in progress is strictly forbidden and may result in ejection from the Ground.

Ground Regulations, including Regulation 13 are posted by each turnstile and ticket holders have made an undertaking to observe this and all other ground regulations when purchasing their tickets.

The reasons for the outlawing of standing in seated areas are clear:

- It is not safe and can lead to a "domino" effect as seat backs provide insufficient support to prevent fans toppling forward.
- It interferes with the enjoyment of other fans who may want to sit down during the game.

The Club recognises that supporters may stand at exciting times of the match but that at all other times, supporters should sit.

The legislation is very clear, so is the view of the regulatory authorities. In the same way that individual drivers cannot opt out of speed restrictions because they do not agree with them, individual fans cannot opt out of legislation (such as that on standing) which relates to football stadia because they believe that legislation to be a departure from tradition.

The authorities have also made it clear that this legislation has now been in place for several years and that supporters have had ample time to adjust their behaviour.

Please observe the Ground Regulations and comply with stewards' requests. We all have a duty to keep St. Mary's Stadium operating within the current legal requirements.

- The use of foul and abusive language (including racial abuse) is in breach of Ground Regulation 9 & 10.
- Smoking is not permitted in the stadium.
- Please leave the stadium and surrounding area quietly after the match.

We remind fans it is a criminal offence to throw any object towards the pitch, track or spectator areas. This could cause serious injury and could also lead to disciplinary action against the Club. We will not tolerate this sort of behaviour and will have no hesitation in banning any supporter found guilty of this.

GUIDE Millwall



All you need to know for Saints' away fixture against Millwall at The Den on Saturday 16th January 2009.



BY CAR:

With no car parking available, either at the ground or in the surrounding SE163LN areas, getting to the ground by car is not advised. Millwall have even gone to the lengths of getting local police to warn against it, who insist on away fans arriving by official travel coaches. If you have no other option, Millwall is actually situated in South Bermondsey, so follow the A2 into London from Junction 2 of the M25. Once you go past New Cross Gate tube station on your right the ground is about a mile further on. The only awkward bit is about half way in-between New Cross Gate and the ground where the road splits into two. Keep to the right following the signs A2 City/Westminster. You will come to the ground on your right.

PARKING:

As stated above, terrible. The only spaces anywhere nearby are local resident parking so park here at your peril - local traffic wardens are said to be particularly quick to impound your vehicle.

BY TRAIN:

If the travel coaches aren't your thing, your best bet is to go by rail, as South Bermondsey Railway Station is only a few minutes walk from the ground. There is a direct walkway specifically built for away fans which takes you directly to the away end and back to the station afterwards. With Millwall's reputation, don't be surprised if you are held in the stadium for sometime after the final whistle, before being allowed back up the walkway to the station.

Don't go looking for one anywhere near the ground; you will have no luck whatsoever, and will probably not be greeted with the warmest welcome. If you have chosen to travel by train, The Shipwright Arms on Tooley Street near London Bridge is recommended. In addition, there are bars at the back of the stands that serve something fizzy resembling a pint in a plastic cup, along with your standard football food - the chicken and chips is reportedly very good.

THE STADIUM ITSELF:

A trip to Millwall is always one that sticks out on the football calendar, but The Den is no longer as

formidable as it once was. Nonetheless, this is hardly a tranquil trip away, and even now some fans may find the atmosphere intimidating. Wearing club colours around the ground is generally not advised.

The ground itself is a fairly modern one that replaced the "Old Den" in 1993. With a 20,146 all seater capacity, consisting of four two-tiered stands, The Den is a stadium that is clearly set up for higher division football.

Saints' travelling fans will be housed in the North Stand, and the Club has been issued an initial allocation of 2,000 tickets. Fans will be seated in the upper tier of the stand, which can hold a total of 2,300. If additional tickets are needed, then the lower tier can host a further 1,500 supporters.

LAST TIME AT THE DEN:

The last competitive trip to The Den came in September 2006, with Saints runing out 4-0 winners as they "did not just tame the Lions, they whipped them into complete submission". Djamel Belmadi and Bradley Wright-Phillips gave Saints a 2-0 half time lead, before Wright-Phillips, and then David McGoldrick poured further misery on Nigel Spackman's team in injury time as they progressed to the Third Round of the Carling Cup.

Millwall have responded well to the play-off heartbreak they suffered last season at the hands of Scunthorpe, and at the time of writing sit just 2 points outside the play-off places. Their home form has been key to this, they have lost just once at home this season, going down 2-0 to Wycombe at the end of November.

PREDICTION:

Alan Pardew went on record after the defeat at Colchester to state how important this fixture at the New Den is. It is hoped that a victory here will give Saints the push needed to start looking at the playoff positions. Kenny Jackett will have his Millwall side well organised, and with their impressive home form Saints will have to be on top of their game in order to gain maximum points.


