

safety MATTERS

WELCOME TO BRIDGE ROAD, we the Safety staff, Stewards and Officials wish that you have an enjoyable and safe afternoon at the Glass World Stadium.

Your attention is brought to the fact that for the safety of yourselves and that of the players and Officials we ask that you remain behind the pitch barrier at all times.

Ground Regulation 7.2

The following acts are arrestable offences under the Football (offences) Act 1991, as amended: Conviction may result in a banning order being made.

Ground Regulation 7

The use of threatening behaviour, foul or abusive language is strictly forbidden and will result in arrest and / or ejection from the ground. The club may impose a ban for one or more Matches.

Ground Regulation 7.1

Racial abuse, chanting or harassment is strictly forbidden and will result in arrest and / or ejection from the ground the club may impose a ban of one or more Matches.

Ground Regulation 7.2.2

The chanting of anything of an indecent

or racialist nature.

Regulation 7.2.3

The entry onto the playing area or any adjacent area to which spectators are not generally admitted without lawful authority or excuse.

Please note that the Hashed Areas in front of the terracing and stands are Pedestrian Free Zones, we request that you do not stand in these areas, you will be asked to move in the interest of public safety.

We also ask that you respectfully commit to report any foul, abusive or racial language that is used to a steward who will report the incident for any relevant actions to be taken.

Once again if could please remain behind the barriers at full-time.

Smoking Policy: two areas inside the stadium have been designated as Smoking Areas, they are in the two corners of the far side of the ground (opposite the main stand) one in each of the home and away ends.

Parking Policy: Due to the increased restrictions and enhanced safety

measures that we are required to comply with we have unfortunately had to reduce the number of spaces available within the stadium car park.





MANAGER

Lowestoft-born Richard MONEY (below) became the Hatters' 24th post-war permanent manager to succeed Mick Harford. Dubbed "Dicky Dosh" by Walsall fans after he guided the Saddlers to the League Two title in 2006/07, Richard played 49 times during his season-long stay at Kenilworth Road in 1982/83. He scored once - in a 2-2 draw at Rotherham - and made his final appearance in a Luton shirt at Old Trafford as the Town went down 3-0 to Manchester United just days before the famous victory at Maine Road which kept the Town in the top-flight.



Richard cut his managerial teeth at Scunthorpe United - who he also served as a player, before going continuing his education overseas with two clubs in Sweden. After a brief stint in Australia it was to the Bescot where he enjoyed his most successful spell before joining Newcastle United as academy director prior to returning to Bedfordshire.

GOALKEEPERS

Experienced goalkeeper Mark TYLER signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in June 2009 following his release from Peterborough United. Mark made 483 appearances in 15 years at London Road and was rewarded for his loyalty with a testimonial against Liverpool in 2007. After falling down the pecking order at Posh he found first team opportunities hard to come by and in 2008/09 he was loaned out to League Two Bury. A former England Youth international, Tyler was handed the number one shirt by the Hatters boss who admitted he'd failed in an attempt to sign the stopper the previous summer.

Former Wimbledon stopper Shane GORE arrived at Kenilworth Road on a short-term deal on the eve of the 2009/10 season. He came through the ranks at Selhurst Park but could only make one substitute appearance before leaving for Peterborough in 2003. Shane has also had spells with Barnet and Stevenage and featured for Maidenhead United in 2008/10 prior to joining the Hatters.

Vastly experienced stopper Kevin

PILKINGTON has signed on a one month loan deal from League Two side Notts County.

DEFENDERS

A defender capable of playing centre back or full back, Claude GNAKPA Joined on a free transfer in August 2008. Having plied his trade across Europe with Montpellier HSC, Racing de Santander, Deportivo Alaves and FC Vaduz of Liechtenstein, Claude moved to Swindon Town for a brief spell. He was then off again in July 2007 to Peterborough United and was a regular in the League Two promotion winning side. A favourite with the Kenilworth Road crowd the Frenchman scored the Hatters' winning goal in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final against Scunthorpe United in April 2009.

Having made his debut as a 16-year-old in November 2003, Keith KEANE went on to enjoy an extended run in the side from February onwards whilst Kevin Foley was out injured. Such was the contribution he made that the return of Foley didn't signal the end of his involvement at first-team level and he finished the season with 14 appearances under his belt, all this whilst still in the first year of his scholarship. Another of the youth team who regularly appears for the Republic of Ireland at schoolboy level, he joined the Hatters at the age of nine having been scouted in local football, and has made a rapid progression through the club's centre of excellence and youth teams. Over the course of his career at Kenilworth Road Keane has proved to be one of the, if not the most, versatile players to pull on a Luton shirt. Capable of playing right the way across the back four or in midfield the only positions he's not featured for the Town (yet) are in goal and up-front.

Highly experienced defender George PILKINGTON joined the club on a free transfer in August 2008. Having began his career as an Everton trainee, Pilkington joined Port Vale in June 2003, after a loan spell at Exeter City. Having started 223 league games for the Valiants, the highly regarded defender was named player of the year twice and club captain.

Lewis EMANUEL arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2006 after deciding to leave his home town club Bradford City, the place where the defender started his career. Lewis is a pacy full-back but can also play on the left side of midfield, a position where he started on his league debut for the club. Lewis made over 150 appearances for Bradford in six-years at the club, scoring four goals. In his first season at Kenilworth Road he made 40 appearances, scoring twice. Out of contract at the end of the 2008/09 campaign, Lewis signed a new contract in July 2009.

Capable of playing in any position across defence, Ed ASAFU-ADJAYE has made significant progress through the Club's youth set-up. Sent on on-loan to non-league side Walton & Hersham, he made the breakthrough into the first team under former boss Mike Newell, when the Club was stretched to the

limits through injury and suspension. Although the youngster was an unused sub for three matches, Youth Coach Marvin Johnson gave Ed a glowing reference to incoming boss Kevin Blackwell, who gave him a one-year contract. However with first team opportunities still blocked, Ed went on-loan to Salisbury City where he earned rave reviews and when Mick Harford arrived as manager at Kenilworth Road one of the first things he did when he was in charge was to recall the young defender.

Young left back Jake HOWELLS came through the ranks at Kenilworth Road and made his first team debut as a second half substitute in May 2008. He made his full debut in the Hatters colours away at Bradford City in October 2008. After making 36 appearances for the Hatters in the 2008/09 he was rewarded for his efforts with a professional contract in May.

Vastly experienced centre half Alan WHITE resigned for the Hatters nine years after leaving Kenilworth Road. Darlington-born Alan started his career with Middlesbrough making his debut for Boro in a 3-3 draw with Liverpool in 1996. However, with first team opportunities limited at the Riverside, Alan jumped at the chance to sign for the Hatters in September 1997 for £40,000. After 98 appearances in Luton colours, Alan left Kenilworth Road in 2000, joining Colchester United on a free transfer. Four years at Layer Road came and went before he spent one season-spells at Leyton Orient, Notts County and Boston United. He signed for home-town team Darlington at the start of the 2007/08 season and went onto make 85 appearances for the Quakers before joining the Hatters for the second time in the summer of 2009.



Luton-born Shane BLACKETT (above) penned a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2009 after joining the club from Peterborough United. Equally adept at centreback or at left-back, Shane began his career with Dunstable Town before a switch to Arlesey Town in 2003. His form with the United Counties side alerted the attentions of

Dagenham & Redbridge who signed the 6ft 3in defender in May 2004. He made 83 appearances during his time at Victoria Road and helped the Daggers win the Conference title and earn promotion to the Football League in 2006/07. His reputation as a pacey defender alerted the attention of Peterborough who snapped him with Dagenham team-mate Craig Mackail-Smith in January 2007 going onto make 38 appearances during his time with the London Road outfit.

Young Luton-born defender Callum REYNOLDS signed a six-month loan deal from Premier League side Portsmouth in July 2009. Reynolds began is career with Rushden & Diamonds having been spotted playing for the Crawley Green club in Luton. Despite not making a senior appearance at Nene Park, his promise playing for the Diamonds' youth team alerted the attention of visiting Portsmouth scouts and he subsequently signed for Pompey in the summer of 2007. Also capable of playing in midfield, Reynolds also spent time on-loan at Basingstoke Town making eight appearances for Stoke during 2008/09.

Left-footed versatile defender Freddie MURRAY joined the Hatters on a six-month loan deal from Blue Square Premier side Grays Athletic in August 2009. Murray only signed for the Essex club in August before making his debut for the Town in the 4-I victory over Mansfield Town just hours after putting pen to paper. Previously with Northampton Town, Stevenage Borough and Cambridge United Freddie began his career as a trainee with Blackburn Rovers.

MIDFIELDERS

Ascot-born Adam NEWTON signed in the summer following his release from Brentford. Predominately used as a right winger, the pacy wide man is equally as comfortable at rightback. Adam started his career at West Ham United, coming through the Hammers' respected academy but could only make three substitute appearances during his time at Upton Park before signing for Peterborough United in May 2002. The former England Under 21 international went onto make a name for himself with the Posh making 249 appearances in six years at London Road going onto win promotion at the end of the 2007/08 campaign. After leaving Peterborough at the end of the 2007/08 season, Adam was snapped by Andy Scott and Brentford where he helped the Bees to the League Two title. A St Kitts and Nevis international, he has spent time on-loan at Portsmouth, Notts County and Leyton Orient.

An adaptable player who can play on the left or right hand side of defence or midfield, Rossi JARVIS came through the Norwich City youth system, becoming the youngest player to appear for the reserve team at the tender age of 14. He went on to spend loan periods at Torquay United and Rotherham United and after finding first team opportunities hard to come by Jarvis joined Luton Town in August 2008 on a free transfer.

A versatile player capable of playing in midfield or defence, Asa HALL began his football career in Wolverhampton Wanderers youth system, before signing his first professional contract with Birmingham City in 2004. While at the Blues he was a regular in the reserve team and was named young player of the year in the 2004/05 season. He also received caps for

England at Under-19 and Under-20 levels and went on to have loan spells with Boston United, Ashford Town and Shrewsbury Town.

Hard-working midfielder Kevin NICHOLLS enjoyed six successful seasons at Kenilworth Road between 2001 and 2006, captaining the side to the League One title in the 2004-2005 season. Nicholls began his career at Charlton Athletic, before moving to Wigan Athletic in 1999, where he made 28 appearances in two years. He moved to Luton in 2001, and in the next six seasons went on to appear 175 times, scoring 30 goals. Following Luton's successful first-season in The Championship and the spirited FA Cup performances, Nicholls was a player very much in demand. He moved to Leeds United for £700,000 in July 2006 and was made club captain by then boss Dennis Wise. However, his very public fall-out with Wise saw him fall down the pecking order at Elland Road, and the following summer he moved to Preston North End for a fee of £750,000. His time at Preston began encouragingly, however a change in the management team saw his first-team opportunities limited. Kevin was delighted to re-sign for Luton, signing a three-year deal in August 2008 and being named as club captain.

FORWARDS

Originally a defender, Tom CRADDOCK (below) developed into a promising forward who has done well at youth and Reserve team levels with Middlesbrough. He was the eighth member of Boro's 2004 FA Youth Cup-winning side to progress to first team level, following James Morrison, Tony McMahon, Andrew Taylor, David Wheater, Matthew Bates, Adam Johnson and Jason Kennedy. He joined the Hatters on-loan from the Riverside in October 2008 and scored twice on his debut in a 2-2 draw with Grimsby Town. Two further goals followed in the games against Bury and Chesterfield and once his loan expired Mick Harford moved quickly to snap up the striker on a permanent basis. A £80,000 bid was accepted by Middlesbrough and Tom signed a two-and-half year contract in lanuary 2009. Craddock has previously spent spells on loan



with Wrexham and Hartlepool United.

Promising young forward Jordan PATRICK became the youngest ever player to feature for the Hatters when he made his first team bow when appearing as a substitute at Grimsby Town in October 2008 aged 16 years and

seven days. With pace to burn the striker is tipped to have a big future ahead of him and is a regular for the Town's Under 18s.

A Shepherds Bush native, Kevin GALLEN established himself as something of a legend at QPR. He notched up over 400 appearances and hit 97 goals for the R's in two spells spanning nearly 14 years. Gallen joined Huddersfield 2000 and after 10 goals in 30 starts for the Terriers, Gallen moved across Yorkshire to join Barnsley the following summer, but the call of West London saw him return to QPR within a few months. He scored nine goals in 16 league starts for MK Dons before joining Luton on loan. After a successful loan spell Gallen joined permanently in January 2009, signing until the end of the season before agreeing a one year contract extension with the club in May keeping him at Kenilworth Road until June 2010.

6ft 3in striker Liam HATCH signed for the Hatters on a season-long loan from Peterborough United in June 2009. Hatch started his career with Herne Bay before a move to neighbours Gravesend & Northfleet in 2001. A successful spell at Stonebridge Road saw him transferred to Barnet for £17,500 where he helped the Bees to promotion to the Football League with 11 league goals in the 2004/05 campaign. His form at Underhill alerted the attention of Peterborough United who paid £150,000 for the striker's services. With first team opportunities limited at London Road Hatch was sent on-loan to Darlington during the 2008/09 campaign where he hit nine goals in 29 league and cup appearances at the Darlington Arena.

Lightening quick striker with superb goalscoring record at non-league level, Mark NWOKEJI signed on loan until January from League Two outfit Dagenham & Redbridge.

Prolific striker Matthew BARNES-HOMER joined the Hatters initially on a month's loan from Kidderminster Harriers and has agreed a two-and-a-half year contract to move permanently when the transfer window reopens on 1st January. After notching 21 goals in all competitions last season, the powerful forward has scored nine times in 20 league appearances this term and, since arriving at the Worcestershire club in 2007, has hit an impressive tally of 34 goals in 77 starts. Barnes-Homer also enjoyed a dream start to his international career when he netted the winner on his debut for England C in their 2-1 win over Poland in November. An energetic talent, the front man began his career as a trainee at Wolves before going on to lead something of a nomadic life prior to finding his feet at Kidderminster. After leaving Molineux he tried his luck in the United States before returning to England and, following success with a clutch of non-league sides, Barnes-Homer was snapped by Wycombe Wanderers. He struggled to make an impression at Adam Park but, after being released at the end of the 2006/07 season, Harriers manager Mark Yates beat off competition from a host of sides to capture his signature. His form in front of goal at Kidderminster had alerted the attentions of a number of Football League teams but Barnes-Homer was suitably impressed by the Hatters' vision and became Richard Money's first signing for the club

from the

BAR

THIS EVENING WE welcome the supporters of Luton Town to the Glass World Stadium for a match that I have been looking forward to since the fixtures were announced at the start of the season. This should be a good distraction from all the turmoil that the club has been going through since I last penned my notes.

Much has happened both on and off the pitch recently and I think we all need a good game to clear the air. I, like most fans, have been both angry and confused about exactly what has been going on but, following a very productive meeting last week between a group of fans and the Chairman, Angelo Dama and Alan Lewer, I really feel it is time to put all our differences behind us and move on for the good of the club. I sincerely hope we do not witness protests from the bridge tonight as it is merely counter productive and simply reduces club revenue which is much needed to help get us back on our feet. If you have concerns ask the questions like we did last week.

This will be a very big match for us tonight. I would hope that we got something out of Saturday's game away to Salisbury, which I am listening to as I put these notes together. But if we failed then this game is even more important. You have to admit that even at this level, Luton Town are a very big club compared to ourselves and if we had drawn them in the FA Cup last season it would have drawn much the same sort of publicity that the Leeds United game did.

We sit in a pretty good position in the Conference at the moment and a play off place is still a possibility. I think Alan has a good chance with



our remaining games if he can find the right blend of youth and experience. The lads that have progressed into the team this season have excelled and Callum Stewart has been a revelation. The youth team has to produce for us in the current climate as I fully expect several more players to move on at the end of the season. Getting replacements in is not going to be easy but a few old and skilled heads mixed with youth and enthusiasm can work wonders! I think we may be surprised by some incoming players at the end of the season.

I must say I have been very surprised by the way Cambridge United have fallen away over the past few games. I had them down to push for a top six place this season. I know it is far too early to write them off but it is nice to be sitting above them with games and points in hand.

How to Get There - From the M25 (North)

After coming over the bridge keep to the left hand lanes and after passing through the toll booths turn left onto the A226, towards Northfleet. Keep on this road until you reach the ground on your left.

There is no parking available as such at the ground for away supporters, so it is a case of finding some nearby street parking.

What's It Like when I get there?

On one side of the ground is an old looking wooden Main Stand. This single tiered covered stand, is all seated and runs for around half the length of the pitch. This stand has a fair number of supporting pillars running along the front of it, although the seating is raised above pitch level. There is also a tiny terrace in front of this stand. Entrance to the seated Main Stand is gained within the ground, on payment of a transfer fee (£2 per adult, £1 per concession). Opposite is a fair sized terrace, which has a simple rusty looking roof which covers the middle portion of it. One end is known as the Plough End, gaining its name from the pub that is situated just behind it. This is a former covered terrace (to the rear), that was made all seated in 2006. The stand looks quite picturesque with a wooded hill just beyond it. The other end, known as the Swanscombe End, is an open terrace, that is dominated by a huge electricity pylon which sits directly behind it. The Club Shop is located inside the ground.

The Club was formed in 1946, following the merger of Northfleet United and Gravesend United. It was renamed Ebbsfleet United in 2007.

How Much Seating (enter through the terrace turnstiles and pay a transfer fee inside): Adults £17, Concessions £9; Terrace: Adults £15, Concessions £7

How To Get There

The stadium is quite well signposted from the main routes into Oxford, with brown football signs pointing the way. The stadium can be found in between the Oxford Science Park & Blackbird Leys Estate. From the A423 Ring Road, take the A4074 towards Reading. After the roundabout with Sainsbury's on one corner; take the left turning sign posted Cowley/Wallington/Oxford Science Park and you eventually come to the ground on your left.

There are 1,600 car parking spaces at the stadium itself, which are free. However, the car parks tend to fill up fast, so try and arrive early if you can (at least 75 minutes before kick off). An additional 400 car parking spaces are now

available at the Ozone cinema and bowling alley complex adjacent to the stadium, which are also free to use. John Attwood a visiting Gillingham supporter adds; 'when arriving at the stadium, ignore the first stadium car park entrance that you come to and go up to the second entrance as the first will have you parking at the "open" end. There is a roundabout by the second entrance, which will take you back to the first entrance if the other half is full. I was also heavily delayed in trying to leave the car park after the game as there was only two exits available'. If you do end up arriving late at the stadium and find that the stadium car parks are full, then don't get tempted to park on a grass verge as you may well end up with a parking ticket for your trouble.

How Much to get In?

Away Fans*: North Stand: Adults £15, Over 65's/Under 16's £9, Under 7's Free**

*These prices are for tickets purchased prior to matchday. Tickets purchased on matchday can cost up to £2 more per ticket.

** Free under 7's tickets must be booked prior to matchday. Under 7's must be accompanied by a paying adult (maximum two under 7's per adult). Otherwise Under 7's admitted on matchday will have to pay the appropriate concession price, apart from the family area where the cost is £5.50.

blue square REVIEW

STEVENAGE BOROUGH STAYED on top of the Blue Square Premier on Saturday after beating Kettering Town 2-0 at Broadhall Way. The Poppies more than held their own with a determined effort but two second half goals from Stacy Long were enough to end their brave effort. It turned out to be a feisty first half as both sides showed full commitment in their challenges. That was never more evident than in the 18th minute when Poppies midfielder Andre Boucaud and home defender Jon Ashton went up for a high ball and collided in a sickening clash of heads. Boucaud was left with a serious facial injury and obvious concussion while Ashton was also forced off after the incident.

By then, Stevenage had already made the early chances with the best falling to former Histon player David Bridges, who could only fire straight at Nathan Abbey. Stevenage piled the pressure on in the latter stages of the half and former Poppy, Chris Beardsley, so nearly opened the scoring when his shot was blocked on the line by James Jennings after Abbey had saved Lee Boylan's effort. Abbey held on to Bridges' header to keep it goalless at the break and the same player had the first chance of the second period when he blazed over the har.

Marcus Kelly shot over for the Poppies but the deadlock was broken on 63 minutes and it was Stevenage's new signing Tim Sills who made an immediate impact from the bench. He nodded down Bridges' cross and Long gave Abbey no chance with a cracking volley. Chances were few and far between towards the end and Lee Harper threw on Greg Taylor in attack in an attempt to create a late opportunity. One half-chance fell to Hadfield who fired over the bar and the Poppies caused the hosts more than a few nervous moments, but Stevenage's win was sealed in stoppage-time as Long was sent clear and rounded Abbey before applying the finish.

Oxford United eased to their first league win since December 5th at the New Recreation Ground against struggling Grays Athletic to keep up the pressure on the, Simon Clist hit his fifth of the season to put Oxford ahead from close range after 19 minutes, Oxford then grabbed their second within 15 seconds of the restart. Alfie Potter firing home from the edge of the box. Top scorer James Constable then hit his first goal in five games 3 minutes from time, before Matt Green wrapped it up in injury-time. Grays handed debuts to six of their eight new signings but it was the same old story as they slipped to their 17th defeat in 28 games. After Clist's 19th minute opener, Grays were caught cold straight from the half-time restart when Potter curled home a second. Constable then struck from close range for his 19th goal of the season - his first in five games since Oxford's FA Cup exit at Barrow on 8 December. And substitute Green came on for Potter to ice the cake from the edge of the area.

York City extended their winning league run to nine games as they overcame struggling Cambridge United at the Abbey Stadium. The U's looked more likely to break the deadlock in the first half with Robbie Wilmott having several efforts on goal. Neil Barrett gave York a 48th minute lead with their first attempt on target by firing past U's keeper Danny Potter from outside the area. Lee Phillips went close to netting an equaliser but he was unable to get his shot from close range on target. The U's have now lost their last five league games and find themselves stuck in mid-table, thirteen points adrift of the play-off places.

Mansfield Town defender Luke Jones scored his first two goals for the club to set the Stags on course for a 4-0 thumping of bottom club Chester City at Field Mill. City, who face the threat of being wound up in the High Court on Wednesday over an unpaid tax debt, were buried inside little more than half-an-hour. Jones scored twice with headers before teenage namesake Ben Jones turned Ryan Williams' corner into his own net. And Jake Speight struck from the edge of the box to wrap up the points.

Veteran striker Gareth Taylor secured struggling Wrexham a vital 1-0 win over high-flyers AFC Wimbledon at the Racecourse Ground. The former Wales international fired in the winner just before the half-hour mark as Dean Saunders' men enjoyed their first game in seven weeks. Taylor's bizarre tenth goal of the season was a hopeful ball into the box. But Dons' keeper Seb Brown could only help the ball over the line under Lamine Sakho's challenge.

Luton Town closed the gap on the top six, thanks to Gateshead keeper Paul Farman's freakish own goal, After 29 minutes Claude Gnakpa's drilled cross looked to be a routine task for Farman but he made a mess of it, and could only spill the ball into the net.

Rushden & Diamonds celebrated their first league game of 2010 with another big win over Barrow. Jefferson Louis ended his loan spell by getting off the mark at Nene Park with a double before Craig Farrell and Jamie Stuart completed the rout. Having beaten Barrow 6-1 earlier this season, Justin Edinburgh's side took their tally into double figures against the Bluebirds for three more points.

New Kidderminster Harriers` manager Steve Burr saw his side come from behind twice to draw at the Broadfield Stadium against Crawley Town. In demand Charles Ademeno put the home side ahead after 13 minutes when he found some space inside the area to fire home past Dean Coleman. Former caretaker boss John Finnigan equalised for the visitors 4 minutes after the break when he shot from close range, only for Barry Cogan to give Crawley the lead again, firing in from six yards. The visitors grabbed a late equaliser when Chris McPhee struck from just outside the area 5 minutes from time.

Altrincham conjured a victory, despite being second best for most of the afternoon at Moss Lane against Hayes & Yeading United. The Robins were indebted to several fine saves from goalkeeper Stuart Coburn, restored to the side after injury, and to some indifferent finishing from Hayes. Altrincham started well, with Joe McAliskey hitting the bar after 10 minutes, but then Hayes took over. Toby Little put them ahead in the 21st minute when Alty stood off the lively James on the right and his low cross seemed to be touched in at the back post. It was 2-0 just 7 minutes later when, again, Hayes advanced unchallenged and Green's 25-yarder deflected into the net. The home side got a goal back after 31 minutes when Shaun Densmore's free kick was met by Chris Senior's flicked header. It seemed that having recovered to parity at half time. Alty would go on to win the game but they spent most of the second half on the back foot. Supporters were treated to a tense goalfest at Stonebridge Road as Leon Crooks netted an injury-time winner to help Ebbsfleet United sink fellow strugglers Forest Green Rovers 4-3. Magno Vieria bagged a brace for Fleet on 19 and 55 minutes and Daniel Powers on 23 and 71 minutes did likewise for Rovers. Isaiah Rankin from the penalty spot and Fleet's Stefan Bailey (79) also scored before Crooks popped up to snatch the winner 2 minutes into stoppage time.
