



> There were so many positives to come out of that game, none more so than our excellent second half showing although we were a little disappointed not to have won by more



It seems a long time since our last home league game against Eastbourne just after Christmas



community of members who bought at 75% share in the Kent club.


All members have a say in all of the club's transfer activity where they have the opportunity to vote to accept or reject any bids for the club's players.

LIAM DAISH

Born in Portsmouth, Liam began his career at his hometown club. From there, he moved to Cambridge United, enjoying considerable success alongside Steve Claridge, Alan Kimble and Dion

A £50,000 move to Birmingham City was followed by a £1.5 million move to Ron Atkinson's Coventry City, where he made 31 appearances. A towering defender. Liam won five caps for the Republic of Ireland between 1992 and

His playing career was brought to a premature end by a knee injury and he made the step into football management with Havant and Waterlooville. Liam led the Hawks to an FA Trophy semi-final in 2002/2003, but results didn't go their way in 2003/04 and he departed in January 2004.

He subsequently joined Kent side Welling United in the Conference South as caretaker manager and made an immediate impact, taking 10 points from a possible 12.


A fans' favourite, many were surprised when he didn't get the job permanently. That however, left him free to take up the job as Fleet manager in February 2005, and took charge for the first time in a 2-2 draw away at Carlisle.

LANCE CRONIN

GCALKEEPERS

LANCE CRONIN

A 23-year-old shot stopper who came to the Fleet in the summer of 2006 as an emergency signing after injury to former number on Craig Holloway. Having started his career with Crystal Palace, where he appeared on the bench at the tender age of 15, Brighton-born Lance spent time with both Oldham Athletic and Shrewsbury Town, as well as a loan spell with Wycombe Wanderers. He has established himself in the last two seasons as the number one keeper, not only for the Fleet, but for the England C team too.

MATTHEW LAMPRELL

Matt spent time at Millwall as a schoolboy and also played for Margate's youth side before joining the Fleet's PASE setup. He was elevated to the first team squad in August 2009 to act as back-up for first-choice keeper Lance Cronin.

DEFENDERS

DEAN POOLEY

Sidcup-born Dean and began his career with League 1 side Millwall. He spent the latter part of last season playing in the League of Ireland with Bohemians. A 6ft 1in versatile defender, Dean arrived at the Fleet on trial during the 2008/09 pre-season, and impressed on the pre season tour of the West Country.

DARIUS CHARLES

Darius began as a trainee with Brentford back in 2004, and signed professional forms in 2006. He was originally a centre-back, but was converted to be able to play left-back under Terry Butcher, and can also fill a gap in left midfield. At just 20, he made his league debut for the Bees in May 2005, and has since played more than 40 League Two games for the club. He also made six Conference appearances in a loan spell with Crawley Town in 2007, and spent the early part of last season on loan at Sutton United. After initially arriving on loan, Darius signed permanently for the club in January 2009.

IORDAN COLLINS

Former Cambridge United left-back Jordan joined the Fleet ranks during summer 2009. A former Ipswich Town schoolboy, Collins joined Cambridge City on his release from the Suffolk side, and was one of a number of players who transferred to United along with most of City's youth development side in Summer 2006. Left footer Jordan broke into the U's first team after sterling performances for the CRC and youth teams, filling the role at left-back, although he can play in midfield. He was one of three scholars to earn pro deals at Cambridge at the end of the 2006/07 season, but only managed one substitute appearance the following season.

CHRIS RILEY

A product of Tottenham's youth Academy, joining the club's Under-9s in 1996, right back Chris is a versatile defender who progressed through the Spurs youth sides to break into the reserve team in 2006. Capped by England at Under-16 level, he also played district football for Middlesex. The Londonborn player captained his school, Enfield Grammar, to victory in the Middlesex Cup. Chris enjoyed a spell at the Glenn Hoddle Academy in Spain and had trials with a view to signing for League 2 side Burton Albion before arriving at Stonebridge Road in October 2009.

SFELEIFICIIM

RICKY SHAKES

A London-born winger, Ricky progressed through the youth ranks at Charlton, and later featured as an Academy player for Bolton Wanderers, scoring during his one appearance for them, in cup tie with Tranmere. Shakes was released by the Trotters in 2005 and spent a period with Bristol Rovers and then Bury, before signing for Swindon Town, where he clocked up 75 appearances and scored five times. He spent last season at Brentford, making 40 appearances and scoring three goals before being released at the end of the season and signing for the Fleet in July. Ricky has also won an international cap for Trinidad and

Tobago – who he qualifies to play for through his mother - appearing against Iceland in 2006.

ISHMAEL WELSH

An arrival at Stonebridge Road during the summer of 2009, Ishsmael was signed by Liam Daish having impressed during trials. A former West Ham United youngster, he signed professional forms in 2005, but failed to break into the first team and was released in May 2006. He subsequently signed a twoyear contract at Yeovil, but struggled to establish himself before joining Weymouth on loan in March 2007. The following season he joined Torquay on a season-long loan deal, but was called back in January, before heading out on loan again, this time to Forest Green Rovers. He spent the remainder of the season at the New Lawn, before signing for Grays, where he spent the 2008/09 season.

CRAIG STONE


Craig arrived at Stonebridge Road during the summer, having been released by League 2 side Gillingham. A local player, he progressed through the youth ranks with the Gills having joined them at the age of 10. Stone broke into the first team at the age of 16 under then manager Andy Hessenthaler in November 2005. He spent part of the 2007/08 season on loan at Brentford, and appeared 15 times for Gillingham in all. 'Stony' is well on the road to recovery having suffered a broken leg in the FA Trophy quarter final with Wrexham towards the end of last season.

JAMIE FORSHA

Young midfielder Jamie is another summer recruit, signing for the Fleet having impressed Manager Liam Daish during preseason trials. Having spent eight years as a youngster with Norwich City, and appearing for Scotland Under-16s during that time, he moved on to Southend United where he spent the last three seasons, progressing from their Under-18s to the reserve side. He began his career as a scholar with Queens Park Rangers in 2004 before making his first team debut for them aged 17 in 2005/06, going on to play more than 20 games in the Championship. He played three times for Oxford during a loan move in 2007, and a year later signed for Grays following his release from QPR. He ended last season on-loan at Farnborough.

ALEX STAVRINOU

Alex arrived at Stonebridge Road on a month's loan from Charlton on loan transfer deadline day. A Cyprus Youth international, 'Stav' was converted from a centre-back to a centre midfielder at Under-16 level. He made 23 appearances in both league and cup for Charlton's Under-18s last season, and also made 12 appearances for the reserves, captaining both sides.

KANE WILLS

Shoreham-born Kane joined his local Football League club Brighton as a youth team player, progressing to the reserves before his release by the Seagulls in May 2009. After trialling with the Fleet and catching the eye that summer, he was

snapped up by Liam Daish in August 2009 to form part of a very young Fleet midfield this season.

PETER HOLMES

A familiar name with Town fans, the former Luton midfielder arrived at Stonebridge Road in October 2009. He began his career back in 1997 as a youth player at Hillsborough with Sheffield Wednesday, before moving to Kenilworth Road in 2000, playing more than 100 games in the Football League for the Hatters, including a season in the Championship. He had loan spells at Chesterfield and Lincoln before signing for Rotherham in 2007. Last season he made five Conference appearances for York City, before signing for Harrogate Town earlier this season, but he departed them having played only one game.

CLINT EASTON

Essex-born Clint began his career in the mid-nineties at Watford, progressing through their youth system and winning England caps. He made more than 80 appearances for the Hornets, through two successive promotions, before becoming Nigel Worthington's first signing as Norwich manager for £200,000 in 2001. Clint enjoyed three seasons at Carrow Road, scoring a penalty in the Division 1 Play-Off final, before signing for Wycombe Wanderers in 2004. He moved to Gillingham in 2006. and then spent two years at Hereford United, helping them to promotion, before his release in April this year.

STRINGERS

MOSES ASHIKODI

Nigerian-born Moses began his career as a youngster with Millwall, and as a 15year-old became their youngest ever player, and the then youngest player in the Football League when he made his debut in March 2003. Having represented England at Under-16 level, he moved to West Ham on a two-year deal in 2004, before going on-loan to Gillingham, then signing for Rangers in January 2006. He appeared in an Old Firm derby, but it was his only appearance for the Ibrox club, and a year later he joined Watford in the Premier League. A broken leg sustained in a loan spell at Bradford left him out of the game for nine months, and he spent further loan spells at Swindon and Hereford to regain fitness. Moses joined Shrewsbury in February 2009 after his release by the Hornets, appearing as a sub in the Shrews' Play-Off Final at

Wembley. He went on to join Kettering in August, scoring eight goals in 18 games, before arriving at the Fleet in January 2010. Ironically, his first game, and first goal, came against his former club Kettering.

SCOTT GINTY

Versatile striker Scott joined Peterborough as a schoolboy and was part of an academy side there rated one of the best in the country before financial problems meant he spent a time at Boston United. He rejoined Posh in 2007, becoming an important member of their youth side and also spent time at Stamford and St Neots on work experience. The promising youngster signed for the Fleet in August 2009.

MAGNO VIEIRA

A pacy and skilful Brazilian front-man, 'Mags' first arrived in England to ply his trade with Wigan Athletic, He had loan spells with Northampton Town and Carlisle United, helping the latter to the Conference title. After work permit problems held up a permanent move to the North West, Vieira took a year out before returning to the UK and playing for Barnet, Crawley Town and Cambridge United on loan, appearing in the 2008 Conference Play-Off final at Wembley. He was signed by Wycombe in summer 2008, and spent a season there, before arriving at Stonebridge Road following a successful trial in August



It's the oldest cliché in the book but the Hatters now have the league to concentrate on after a stunning first-half free-kick from Rickie Lambert ended their run in the FA Cup at St. Mary's.

The Saints had the best of the chances in the opening period and the Town were indebted to a combination of superb goalkeeping from Kevin Pilkington and last ditch defending to keep them in the game.

On 25 minutes Lambert, who cost the home side £1m in the summer after signing from Bristol Rovers, was foiled in superb fashion by Pilkington flinging himself high to his right to keep out the striker's effort from 25 yards.

However 10 minutes later the Town weren't so lucky when Lambert opened the scoring when curling home from fully 35 yards after Kevin Nicholls was unfortunate to be penalised for a soft challenge on Adam Lallana.

Despite the 42 places between the two sides in the pyramid, the Town performed admirably against Alan Pardew's side, especially in the second period.

Richard Money made two changes at half-

time introducing Claude Gnakpa and Mark Nwokeji for Kevin Gallen and Kevin Nirholls

Southampton could and perhaps should have put the game beyond doubt just 13 seconds into the second half but Michail Antonio blew his lines when well placed in the six yards box and was thwarted by the legs of Pilkington.

That scare woke the Town up with Nwokeji and Gnakpa's pace causing the hosts all kinds of problems. Asa Hall called former Hatters' goalkeeper Kelvin Davis into action five minutes into the second period after good work from Rossi Jarvis and Nwokeji.

But it should have been all square on 57 minutes when Adam Newton somehow missed his kick from close range with the goal gaping following good work down the right flank by Gnakpa and as Southampton failed to clear their lines Nwokeji sent a left-foot shot wide of the post.

Half chances fell to either side as the clock ticked down but Hatters couldn't break down their League One opponents to find what would have been a deserved equaliser.





On 19th October 1985 the Hatters were due to take part in a run of the mill Division One game against Southampton at Kenilworth Road but, by the time of the final whistle, the word 'ordinary' was the last one that could be used to describe an amazing match.

The 1985/86 season had started off to a fanfare of trumpets as the club unveiled its new artificial surface at Kenilworth Road but, after the London press had travelled up the M1 to take a look and offer their grudging approval, the football started off in a gentle fashion.

After an opening day draw at

home to Nottingham Forest the Town drew at Newcastle before winning 1-0 at West Ham with Mick Harford netting the only goal from the spot.

The next three away games were all lost and although points were still being picked up at home, the season was rapidly turning into a disappointment given the high expectations of the club following the massive investment on the playing side during the previous campaign.

At great cost, by normal Luton standards, Harford, David Preece, Peter Nicholas and Steve Foster had been brought to Kenilworth Road and a position in the bottom half of the table was seen as unacceptable.

The season then actually turned with, of all things, a home draw.

Manchester United came to Kenilworth Road in early October on the back of 10 straight wins and were hoping to equal the winning start to a campaign set by Tottenham in 1960.

In a tremendous game, watched by a crowd of 17.454, the Town were more than a match for United and, but for a glaring late miss by central defender Paul Elliott, all three points would have been won.

Manager David Pleat felt that he still needed more firepower and was on the lookout for another forward, after narrowly losing out in the chase for Frank McAvennie who had decided to opt for West Ham rather than the Town in the summer.

In the lead up to the Southampton game Pleat was quoted as saying that he was frustrated by the lack

of goals which the general build up play deserved.

Equally frustrated were the Luton supporters as only 8,876 bothered to turn up for the visit of the Saints, half the attendance that had witnessed the game with United only a fortnight previously.

The fans who stayed away missed a treat as the Hatters went goal crazy making a complete mockery of Pleat's misgivings.

Seven goals were slammed past England goalkeeper Peter Shilton without reply making it the most miserable day of his career.

He was offered no protection by his defenders when Harford and Brian Stein interchanged passes to set up Emeka Nwajiobi to open the scoring after only five minutes.

Ricky Hill and Harford combined to put in Stein to double the score on the half hour and, when Hill sidefooted home the third before the interval, the game was as good as over.

Harford was dragging another England international, Mark Wright, around in circles as the Town continued in the second period as they finished the first.

With gaps appearing all over the place, Foster found time to join the attack and when his shot was blocked Stein followed up to make it 4-0.

Preece was on hand to touch in a far post cross for the fifth with substitute Ray Daniel knocking in number six just before the end.

Stein's hat-trick was completed in the final minute when he converted a penalty after Harford was pushed by Wright in the area.

Pleat was as dumbfounded as the crowd and could only say at the post-match press conference: "Just write about the football, it spoke for itself."

Saints manager, and ex-Luton centre-half, Chris Nicholl bravely attended the conference even though he was shell-shocked.

"It was just rank bad defending," fumed Nicholl, "My defenders badly let me down. I was always an honest player but there are a few in the dressing room who can't look me in the face right now."

Exonerated from blame was Glenn Cockerill who was making his debut for the Saints after turning down the overtures of David Pleat and probably regretting the decision.

Also blameless was Shilton who had not let in seven goals since he was a 19-year-old at Leicester and who kept the score down with a string of fine saves.

He said: "No-one likes letting in seven but I don't think I made a bad mistake for any of them. There is no self pity. I don't want to talk about how I felt after the match, but I can tell you that the dog was in its basket when I got home!"



After a pre-season that saw the Town win the South West Challenge Cup in North Devon, the season begun with a 1-1 draw at newly promoted AFC Wimbledon.

A Tom Craddock penalty gave the Hatters the lead but a second-half dismissal of Shane Blackett saw the Dons equalise from the spot.

The first victory of the season was achieved in their second fixture when Mansfield were seen off in convincing fashion at Kenilworth Road with George Pilkington the star of the show when scoring twice in a 4-1 win.

The Hatters found themselves a shock-goal behind in their following game when Gateshead silenced Kenilworth Road by taking the lead, but two guick goals from Asa Hall and Kevin Gallen sealed another three points to take the Town to the top of the table. A solitary Tom Craddock

goal was the difference at the New Lawn where the Town recorded their third straight victory with victory at Forest Green but they failed to make it four wins in a row four days later when being held to a goalless home draw against Chester

A second successive 0-0 draw followed at Kettering in a game where over 1,800 Luton fans outnumbered the home support but their next outing saw a return to winning ways when another two goals from George Pilkington helped them earn a 3-0 home win over Crawley.

The clean sheet against the Red Devils was the Town's fourth in succession but goalkeeper Mark Tyler was beaten for the first time in 488 minutes at Salisbury City when Matt Tubbs cancelled out Kevin Gallen's opener.

The point earned down in

Wiltshire ensured the Hatters stretched their unbeaten start to the campaign to eight games but that record came down crashing down when Mick Harford's side travelled to league leaders Oxford United three days later.

Inside an almost full-capacity Kassam Stadium, with hundreds of Hatters fans locked outside, the Town found themselves two goals down inside the first 16 minutes.

The Town bounced back from that disappointment by beating Barrow at Kenilworth Road in their next match with Adam Newton scoring the all important and only goal of the game.

However it was back to drawing board for the Hatters after a dreadful 3-0 reverse at Wrexham in a performance manager Mick Harford described as the "worst ever" in the history of the Club.

ANOTHER YEAR, ANOTHER EUROPEAN TROPHY WON BY LUTON TOWN.



While senior football has come to a standstill in the UK due to cold weather, the Hatters' Under-15s shone in Germany this weekend beating the big freeze to win the Hassia Bingen International Tournament.

On Saturday the team took part in a warm-up tournament for the international teams and local clubs and finished as runners-up, winning seven out of their eight games and only losing to eventual winners Brondby IF.

The main tournament was on the Sunday and was held in Bingen's impressive indoor Arena in front of a capacity crowd.

Luton faced the hosts in their first game in front of a noisy and impartial crowd and soon found themselves 3-0 down. Despite a late goal from Jordan Davis the final score ended 5-1, with the young Hatters failing to pass the ball quickly enough and deal with their opponents in one versus one defendina.

The performance proved to be a massive wake-up call for everyone involved as it meant there was now no room for errors in any of the remaining games.

Next up were Frankfurt, and the Town came out and played at a great tempo with Moses Nakabale scoring a hat-trick in the first five minutes of

the game to set the team en-route to a 5-0 victory.

This result meant that the Hatters needed to beat German giants and group leaders Kaiserslautern in their final game to qualify for the second round.

In a tense and evenly-balanced game, goalkeeper Steven Fenner kept the team in the match in the early stages with some great saves and it took a moment of brilliance from Under-14 player Charlie Smith to win the game.

With two minutes left on the clock it was his great strike from 20 yards that was the difference between the two teams and meant that the

Hatters qualified at the expense of their German opponents.

This put Luton into the second round and a group of three with Brondby and Borussia Mönchengladbach.

First up were the ten time Danish Champions and tournament holders Brondby and the message before the game was one of a need for focus in defense and to be clinical in front of goal.

An early goal was scored by Newman Carney and Cauley Woodrow calmly slotted home after rounding the goalkeeper to double the lead.

Brondby rallied and the Hatters were left hanging on after Woodrow received a two-minute sin-bin, but fine saves from Fenner along with a heroic defensively effort allowed the Hatters to win the game 3-2.

Needing one more win to qualify for the semi-finals, Michael Cain scored in the last minute to mean the Hatters became only the second English team after Manchester United to make it through to this stage in the tournament's long and illustrious history.

Their opponents were Wieseck and again it was a close game with a clinical finish from Woodrow separating the two teams and putting Luton Town into the final.

Their opponents were Bundesliga team Mainz 05, and before the game there was the ritual snow bath to clear the minds and focus on the cool heads needed to beat their talented opposition.

The final was the rollercoaster ride that any Luton fan should have expected, and after taking the lead

through Mason Blake, two superb strikes from Mainz's centre forward - who was the player of the tournament - meant that the Hatters were 2-1 down with just three minutes left on the clock.

Just when it looked as though it was slipping away from the Hatters, Cauley Woodrow popped up to equalise and send the game towards extra-time. With just 20 seconds left on the clock a intricate passing move was met with an calm finish by Nakabale to win the game and send the crowd wild.

Luton Town became the first English team to win the tournament, delighting Under-15 coach Jon De Souza.

He said: "After the first game we spoke to the boys about how making mistakes in life can be a good thing as long as you learn from them and improve as a result of them

"They showed us exactly the response we were looking for, and got better in each game.

"There were vital contributions from Reeon Wiltshire, Michael Richens and Jerome Jibodu throughout the tournament, and as a group yet again they have excelled."

A similarly pleased Youth Development Officer Gregg Broughton added: "The groups' focus, preparation and attitude throughout the weekend was first class and that is why we have such high hopes for this age group.

"They are so determined to succeed and have such a drive to better themselves that it makes them mentally the strongest age group in the dub.

"In the analysis of the tournament it was great because it showed up areas that we need to continue to work hard on such as our ability to receive under pressure and our cleverness of movement to create

During the last term we have piloted a new project called 'Double Club' at two local schools.

Double Club takes the principles of our education programme at the study support centre into schools. Children spend one hour learning literacy or maths through a football based context and they also have an hour with a Luton Town community coach learning football skills.

This gives children that are not always motivated in school an extra incentive and a new approach towards key curriculum subjects.

One of the schools we have worked in partnership with this term to pilot the Double Club is Farley Junior School.

Farley is one of our key link schools and has supported us since the beginning of the Hatters Study Support Centre. We have now had two cohorts of children come

through the centre from Farley, all who have been a credit to the school, always eager to learn and have fun.

There have been two Double Clubs running this term at Farley, one during curriculum time and one after school. The club has given 30, year six children the opportunity to access key learning that will be vital to their end of year tests.

Lorraine Roe is a teaching assistant at Farley and since attending the study centre with their first group of children, has been a big fan of the work the Hatters' centre does. Lorraine has become the link teacher between the centre and the school and didn't hesitate to help us pilot the programme within her school.

Kieran Fox, one of our community coaches, has been leading the project. Some of the key topics Kieran has covered with the are: fractions. percentages, adverbs and adjectives. He has also spent time out of the classroom on the school field coaching the children core football skills and teamwork.

LUTON TOWN V OXFORD UNITED 09 / 02 / 10









The Hatters will be at home again on Tuesday 9th February as Chris Wilder brings his Oxford United team to Kenilworth Road for one of the biggest games of the season so far.

Oxford United have been in the Conference since they were relegated from League 2 in 2006 and are currently experiencing their fourth attempt at getting back into the Football League.

Nicknamed the U's, the club was founded in 1897 as Headington United, but 63 years later they were renamed Oxford United in 1960 because, the then owners, wanted to promote the club's appeal locally and nationally.

In 1962, under the guidance of Arthur Turner, United went on to win the Southern League and with it came promotion to the old Fourth Division.

Their astonishing FA Cup run in 1964 saw them reach the Sixth Round with a home tie against Preston North End, but they were beaten 2-1 in front of over 22.000 at Manor Ground.

Promotions in 1965 and 1968 saw Oxford reach the Second Division for the first time and after a further eight seasons in the second tier of football they were eventually relegated back to the Third Division in 1976.

Robert Maxwell saved the club from going bankrupt in 1982 and brought in Jim Smith as Manager at Manor Ground and he took them to the top-flight of English football in 1985 following successful promotions.

The 1985/86 season saw Oxford lift the League Cup after defeating Queens Park Rangers 3-0 at Wembley in front of over 90,000 fans.

Oxford were relegated from the top flight in 1988 and the team remained in the second tier of football until 1994 when they were relegated to the the Second Division but a year later they were back in the First Division under the guidance of Dennis Smith.

Financial problems seriously dented the team's success on the pitch for the next 10 years and after 44 years in the Football League, Oxford United were relegated to the Conference in 2006.

Currently in the top six, Oxford are one of the favourites to go up from the Blue Square Premier in 2010. They have won eight of their last 13 matches in all competitions since November and before arriving at Kenilworth Road, the U's will face tough home games against Cambridge United and Kidderminster Harriers, one of only three sides to have beaten them in the league this season.
