Good afternoon and welcome to Kenilworth Road for today's important Blue Square Premier match with AFC Wimbledon.

I would like to extend a warm welcome to Terry Brown, his players and staff, directors and supporters of Wimbledon.

Since my last programme notes we have picked up seven points from a possible nine following our games with Oxford, Eastbourne and York.

I believe that is a very good return considering the class of opposition we have faced and the challenges all three sides put to us and the players deserve a lot of credit for such consistent displays.

It's interesting that since we lost against Ebbsfleet at Kenilworth Road the same team have also gone on to record a sequence of encouraging results which included beating one side above us in the league table.

I thought our last-gasp win over league leaders Oxford was thoroughly deserved. I think it would have been a travesty had we gone on to lose that game.

We dominated the game for long spells, hit the woodwork and at one point it looked as thought it wasn't going to be our night.

But the players kept playing until the very last kick and our determination was rewarded with two late goals that almost took the roof off the old ground.

The victory achieved at Eastbourne was done in a very professional manner and once again epitomised the way in which we are performing away from home at the moment.

We got our noses in front very early on and in truth, if there was to be any complaints, it was that we should have been out of sight before half-time.

We faced a much sterner challenge at York on Tuesday night but came away with a well-earned point in a match played on a very tricky surface.

We like to play a passing game, and while we were able to do that to good effect in the first half, it became difficult to get the ball down and play in the second and that meant York were almost allowed to take advantage.

Continuing and maintaining the application and mentality of the players is key to our success as we enter the final few months of the campaign.

With games coming thick and fast we believe we have a great chance to shape our own destiny.

We were able to turn things around against Oxford to earn a vital home win and today is the first of two successive home matches that can help us overturn out inconsistent form at home.

We have talked about the pressures of playing in front of large and expectant crowds and must start to use it as an advantage. Teams must start fearing their visits to Kenilworth Road instead of enjoying them and another three points today will go some way to restoring that.

Your support has been nothing short of incredible which has become even more apparent over the last few weeks.

Against Oxford you were as loud as I've heard while I must praise those fans who made the trips to Eastbourne and York,

Keep it up and keep the faith.

# MANAGING DIRECTOR GARY SWEET WELCOMES THE DONS

Today's encounter with AFC Wimbledon presents a very intriguing and exciting clash, not just between two ambitious, progressive sides competing for promotion to the Football League from the Blue Square Conference Premier, but also as two clubs who currently sit in a similar league position at diverse stages of recovery after similar crises had plagued both clubs.

Please join me in warmly welcoming AFC Wimbledon to Kenilworth Road today. We welcome their officials, staff and players but, above all, their supporters. Given the fact that Wimbledon are possibly the only club Luton Town fans would prefer not to have exchanged places with over recent years, the commitment and compassion of the travelling faithful today is without question.

As both clubs proudly boast 1980's Wembley Cup success, a mutual respect exists between us and one which both clubs will adhere to todav.

As a founder director of Trust In Luton, I am personally indebted to the assistance and advice the Dons Trust gave us back in the dreaded Gurney era when a phoenix club for Luton was being planned, just in case. Perhaps without their help our own Trust may not have mobilised so quickly and who knows what 'sliding door' consequences may have occurred.

So many players have represented both clubs well and whom we would remember so fondly; Mick Harford, John Hartson, Ceri Hughes, Kelvin Davis, Chris Willmott, Clive Goodyear to name but a few (no disrespect to Messrs Kimble, Perry and Jupp).

Even Curtis Davies who left Wimbledon as a 15-year-old to join our Centre of Excellence, the illustrious Mr Joe Kinnear and, our current reserve keeper Shane Gore, extend the dynamics of our relationship on the footballing side.

Off the pitch, the infamous march

against a Hatters move to Milton Keynes over 25 years ago and the potential mergers between newly formed MK Dons and Luton Town in 2003, and the ethical resistance of such actions which go against football's traditions, are political issues that unite our two sets of supporters.

Of course, it was the relationship between the two supporters' trusts that enabled the memorable friendly at the beginning of 2003/04 season which is still vivid in my memory.

The showcasing of one Enoch Shomunmi came only second to my memory of being able to walk around the ground, beer in hand, to watch the Hatters attack in each half; something I used to do at many other grounds in my early days as a Hatter.

So, as Wimbledon can be heralded as the ultimate Phoenix club and with a new, confident and positive era at

Luton Town in sight, it must provide some comfort to the many other clubs all the way up to the Premier League, that despite catastrophic unrest, proper community clubs who look after their finances can survive and thrive

I have frequently expressed the theory that to establish longer term boardroom and financial stability is the most important job we, as a board of directors and a pack of Hatters fans, have.

Whilst Luton Town and Wimbledon steadily and patiently climb our way back to where we belong in the echelons of the League, others will increasingly crumble and fall - accelerating our own progress in the process.

I make no apology for being boring in writing about the politics in football. While stability and perseverance doesn't necessarily make good reading or sell tickets, with so many other clubs facing financial challenges at present, it is clear to us that ambition can only follow prudent executive management.

We shall always remain as ambitious a football club as we possibly can be at Luton and we hope that, this season, your perseverance will pay off as our performances improve on the pitch.

Today, I would also like to welcome Mr Brian Lee, Chairman of the Blue Square Conference, and his wife, for their first, and hopefully not their last, visit to Kenilworth Road this season.

It has been a busy and tough week for the Conference Board, which both Erik Samuelson, Wimbledon's Chief Executive, and I are members of, particularly in light of the situation surrounding Chester City's potential expulsion.

Whilst, from an external perspective, it may seem to some as though aimless deliberation or splinter-breeding fence-sitting has been the order of the day over the last couple of weeks, I can assure you that this is miles from the truth.

In fact, I am proud to be a member of a board which has sought to preserve the honour of

the game, and Chester's inclusion within it, by carrying out the correct and proper procedures according to company law and its own rulebook.

Whatever happens to Chester, you can be assured that the lavish image of boardroom politics some may have is far removed from the serious, considerate and sensitive debate that actually exists in order to protect both the game of professional football and Chester City.

Despite the fact that both Luton Town and AFC Wimbledon may benefit from Chester's exit, I can categorically assure you that even if a vested influence may be able to have any impact on the end result, any such outcome would significantly dilute the pleasure for us should Luton Town's progress this season because of another club's demise.

Enjoy the game and celebrate the future of two great clubs by creating a special atmosphere!

Our victory over Oxford was massive. It a must a very important game for us and one which we all thought at one point did not look like winning. However, we just kept banging on the door and eventually we got our reward with two late goals to give us all three points.

The first goal came from a Keith Keane corner which was headed in by George Pilkington before Keano curled in a corner of his own in the 96th minute to cap an incredible night. The scenes at the end of the match reminded me of the good times at Kenilworth Road. ### RECENT HISTORY:

The 2008/09 campaign saw Wimbledon's meteoric rise through the Non-League pyramid continue



following their fourth promotion in seven seasons. It all started back in 2002 for the club reborn following the original Wimbledon's relocation to Milton Kevnes.

Starting in the Combined Counties League their first promotion was sealed in their second season of existence in 2003/04 when topping the CCL and earning promotion to the Ryman League.

A second Championship followed in the next campaign when lifting the Ryman League Division One title in 2004/05.

The Dons had near misses in the semi-

finals of the Ryman Premier League Play-Offs two seasons running before making it third time lucky in 2007/08 when beating Slough Town in the Play-Off final.

Quickly acclimatising to life in at a higher level, the Dons' title triumph in the Conference

South last season means they're now one step from reaching the Football League.

"I left with Oxford winning thinking that it would be good news for us if that stayed the same.

"I look at the table now and it's looking like York, Stevenage and Oxford as the top three so it would be a benefit to us if they pulled away and then there was a scrap for the other two places in the top five.

"Luton look like catching them up now and if they can do that there will be only one place to play for, making it more difficult, so we've got to try and stop Luton if we can.

"Our role model will be Ebbsfleet United Irecent 3-2 winners at Kenilworth Road], I know Liam Daish well, and I know they came and played well at Luton.

"Luton are on a fantastic run of form, but they're certainly not invincible."

TERRY BROWN


Appointed AFC Wimbledon's first fulltime manager in May 2007, Terry's managerial prowess became evident during a nine-year spell in charge of Haves, whom he took from the lower half of the Ryman Premier Division to third place in the Conference in 1999.

He moved to Aldershot Town in 2002 and in his five years in charge at the Recreation Ground he steered the Shots to a Ryman Premier League title and a 2004 Conference Play-Off final in which they missed a Football League place only by losing to Shrewsbury Town in a penalty shoot-out.

Terry left Aldershot amid emotional scenes in March 2007, but returned to football with the Dons.

He and trusted lieutenant Stuart Cash are relishing the challenge of managing the Dons in the Blue Square Premier, having steered the side to two promotions in their two seasons at the





### **GCALIVEEPERS**

### lames Pullen

Agile and commanding goalkeeper who arrived from Eastleigh on a shortterm loan in January 2008 and was signed on a permanent basis two months later. James, who joined Eastleigh from Fisher in October 2006, began his career at Heybridge Swifts before stints at Ipswich Town, Blackpool, Peterborough, Dagenham and Redbridge and Ebbsfleet. He established himself in the side following injuries in the past two seasons to former regular No.1 Andy

### Seb Brown

A product of Brentford's youth system, Sutton-born Seb was signed in August 2009 to provide extra cover for the injured Andy Little. He made the Bees' first-team squad just once, as an unused sub in a League Cup game when only 16-years-old. He signed professional forms at the end of 2007/08 and made his competitive debut in September 2008 in a Football League Trophy tie against Yeovil Town, which ended in a penalty shoot-out victory for Brentford. He was released in the summer, and impressed for the Dons during pre-season.

### DIEFENDERS

### Jay Conrov

Tall right-back who began as a trainee with Crystal Palace and had two loan spells with the Dons in 2004/05. Jay signed for Canvey Island in August 2005 and moved to Chelmsford the following season. He made 35 appearances for the Lewes Blue Square South championship side of 2007/08, and was one of five players to move from the Dripping Pan to Havant and Waterlooville at the start of 2008/09. After his release in January 2009 he played briefly for Northwich Victoria before signing for the Dons in March 2009 as cover for the injured Luke Garrard.

### Ben ludge

Experienced defender who started at Croydon, where he made 293 appearances in seven years. At the age of 24 he joined Crawley, where he played 265 games and became the club's joint player-manager. At the beginning of 2007/08 he moved to Bromley, where he was appointed captain, but left Hayes Lane to join the Dons on the last day of that season's transfer window. In 2008/09 Ben scored three times in 40 starts, and was voted AFC Wimbledon's Player of the Year.

Imposing centre-back and club captain who began his career at Erith and Belvedere. He then moved to Welling United, and in 2004 to Braintree Town, for whom he made over 100 appearances, helping the Iron to the Ryman Premier Division in the process. Paul then joined Fisher Athletic, from where was loaned to the Dons in 2006/07 and then signed a permanent deal. He moved to Woking in search of regular first-team football, and became club captain and was the Cards' Player of the Year last season. He rejoined the Dons when Woking were relegated.

### **Danny Blanchett**

Attacking, left-sided full-back signed in January 2010 from Peterborough United until the end of the season. Danny started his career in non-League football playing for Hendon, Harrow Borough and Cambridge City. In March 2007 he signed for Peterborough United, making his debut as a substitute against Mansfield Town. In August 2009 he went on loan to Stevenage Borough for a month and then to Hereford United, where he made 15 appearances.

### Brett Johnson

Tall defender, equally comfortable at left-back or centre-back, who joined from Brentford in the summer. He began his career with Ashford Town and in 2004 moved to Terry Brown's Aldershot, where he helped the club to the Play-Offs. He attracted the attention of several League sides and in June 2005 moved to Northampton Town. After spells on loan at Gravesend and Grays Athletic in 2005/2006, he was released and joined Brentford on a free transfer for last

### SEICLEIFICIIM

### Kennedy Adjei

Versatile and pacy young Ghanaianborn midfielder, who came to the UK in 2001 and trained with Barnsley, Southend United and Millwall. In 2007 he joined Croydon Athletic and made one appearance for the Ryman League side before moving to the Dons and becoming a regular in the Reserves. Following some good performances, Kennedy signed a first-team contract in summer 2008. He scored three goals last season from 34 starts.

A product of the Stevenage Borough vouth academy, Sam made the Boro first team on two occasions in 2005 before loan spells at Yeading, Maidenhead United, Northwood and Diss Town. A tall skilful midfielder that can also fill in at full-back, he was a prized capture by the Dons in May 2007. One of the first names on the teamsheet last season, he was the club's third highest scorer with 12 goals, including some spectacular strikes from set pieces.

Emerged from the Dons' youth system and impressed in the pre-season of 2003/04, maturing into a confident centre-back. Frustrated at the lack of first-team opportunities he moved to Whyteleafe in 2004 and then to Horsham in summer 2006 where his career blossomed. Some energetic displays and 22 goals in 94 appearances for the Hornets attracted Terry Brown, and Lewis was the Dons' first signing after promotion to the Blue Square South was secured. Unfortunately he suffered cruciate knee ligament damage in preseason and made only two appearances, at the end of 2008/09.

### **Elliott Godfrey**

Although he was born in Toronto and represented Canada at Under-21 level, Elliott has spent most of his life in the UK and came through the Watford youth and reserve set-up, making one appearance for their first team in March 2003 as a late substitute against Preston. He was released in 2004 and was immediately signed by Hampton and Richmond, and made 104 appearances in a four-year stay. He signed for the Dons in the summer of 2008 and appeared 33 times last season, netting seven times.

### Derek Duncan

A left-winger with good crossing ability, also comfortable at left-back. He started at Levton Orient, making over 20 appearances in four seasons. He spent time on loan at Lewes in 2006 and was released the following vear. Derek joined Wycombe Wanderers on a two-year deal but never broke into the first team and his contract was cancelled in January 2009. He moved to Ebbsfleet for the rest of the season and was signed by the Dons in June.

### Steven Gregory

Tall central midfielder who came through the youth ranks at Wycombe Wanderers and made his League debut in May 2006. He captained the side that beat MK Dons in the 2006 Berks and Bucks Cup final. Steven spent most of 2007/08 on loan at Hayes and Yeading and Havant & Waterlooville and moved to the Middlesex club at the end of that season. He joined the Dons in the summer of 2009.

### Ricky Wellard

Another tall midfielder known for his passing ability. Ricky was signed from Ashford Town in June 2009 after several previous unsuccessful attempts by Terry Brown to prise him away from the club where he has spent nearly all his football career.

### Glenn Poole

Attacking midfielder signed from Grays Athletic in January 2010 until the end of the season. A former Tottenham junior, he signed for Yeovil Town in 1999 and in 2002 moved to Ford United where his goalscoring abilities - one goal every three games - earned him a move to Thurrock. After a season he joined Gravs Athletic, scoring 19 times in 75 appearances. A loan spell with Rochdale was followed by a permanent move to Brentford, where he was top scorer in 2007/08, but he then fell out of favour and was released at the end of 2008/09. He rejoined Grays last August.

Pacy young player equally effective as a striker or on either flank. He was signed in January 2010 on loan from Queens Park Rangers until the end of the season. Parker was with Wycombe Wanderers before moving to QPR, where he scored regularly for the youth and reserve

### Will Hendry

Attacking midfielder who began his career with Millwall and was an influential member of the Hayes and Yeading team that won promotion to the Blue Square Premier via the 2009 Play-Offs. He first joined Hayes in October 2006 on his release by the Lions, returning there in January 2007 after playing a few games for Grays in the Conference National. After 77 appearances and 22 goals he signed for Dagenham and Redbridge at the start of this season, moving to Maidenhead in September.

### SHEDIKITS

### Danny Kedwell

Aggressive, powerful centreforward signed in September 2008 from Gravs Athletic. He previously played for Welling before moving to Gravs in May 2007. Danny quickly formed a powerful striking partnership with Jon Main, his hard work often setting up goals for his fellow forward. Made 44 appearances last season, scoring 15 goals.

### Ion Main

Prolific striker who became the Dons' record signing in November 2007 after joining for a substantial but undisclosed fee just days after playing and scoring against them for previous club Tonbridge Angels. At Tonbridge he bagged 52 goals in just 57 appearances, after moving there from Cray Wanderers in January 2006. Jon had a spectacular 2008/09 season, scoring 33 league goals for the Dons and passed Rocky Baptiste's previous Blue Square South record goal haul with two months of the season left.

### Luke Moore

Skilful and fast forward who can play as an attacking midfielder or as an outright striker. He worked his way through the youth and reserve ranks at Ebbsfleet and soon established himself in the first team. Although still only 21, he has made over 150 appearances in non-League's top flight. Luke joined the Dons in June 2009, turning down an offer from a League club.

### Nathan Elder

Powerful and pacy frontman signed on loan from Shrewsbury Town in January 2010 until the end of the season. Nathan started out at Hornchurch, moving on to Billericay and in 2007 to Brighton & Hove Albion. After a handful of first-team appearances he joined Brentford in January 2008 for £35,000 - and scored for both sides on his debut against Mansfield Town. Elder went on to make 44 appearances for the Bees, scoring 10 goals, and in August 2009 he signed for Shrewsbury on a three-year deal, but was transferlisted last November.

After a bright opening from the Town they failed to test U's goalkeeper Ryan Clarke and, as the first half wore on, the visitors gained the upper hand.

The Hatters had goalkeeper Mark Tyler to thank for a terrific save with his legs when Alfie Potter marched through one-on-one against the goalkeeper on 14 minutes.

TOWN SECOND - STRING LOSE TO LATE GOAL



The Hatters' reserves were unlucky to fall to their seventh straight defeat in the totesport.com Combination on Wednesday as a late deflected goal gave Norwich victory.

Captain Ed Asafu-Adjaye was the unfortunate Town man to get a nick on Jens Berthel Askou's effort with just two minutes remaining to send the ball past goalkeeper Shane Gore.

Asafu-Adjaye was one of several Hatters players with first team experience in a team that also included Mark Nwokeji and Matthew Barnes-Homer in attack.

The Canaries meanwhile fielded a strong side that included former Town men Paul McVeigh and Michael Spillane as well as Matthew Gill and Stephen Hughes.

Norwich dominated the opening 45 minutes and after a steady spell of pressure Gore was eventually called into action for the first time on 23 minutes when palming away Anthony McNamee's cross before making an even better save to deny the same man's curling shot.

The Hatters were defending well and almost took the lead seven minutes before the break when Nwokeji burst through the home defence and forced Declan Rudd to make a smart stop.

Norwich started the second period brightly but failed to test Gore again and, as the game wore on, it looked more and more likely that the game would finish goalless.

However, that all changed when the Town were dealt a late blow when the hosts stole the points at the death.

Substitute Damon Lathrope swung a dangerous corner that Askou met with a firm header that was deflected by Asafu-Adjaye beyond Gore to cruelly rob the Hatters of what would have been a deserved and well-earned point.

Hatters coach Kevin Watson, who took charge of the second string at City's training ground, was disappointed to see the side concede so late on to surrender a point.

"The boys did really well," he said afterwards. "Norwich fielded a very strong side including two familiar faces to us.

"I thought we dealt with their threat, especially from wide areas, very well and we were unlucky not to perhaps find ourselves a goal

"However, the game gave us the opportunity to get a number of our players some minutes under their belts as well as giving some of the younger players further experience at reserve team level."

Graham Alexander owes current Luton Town boss Richard Money a debt of thanks as he continues his remarkable career.

The 38-year-old is enjoying his first taste of Premier League football with Burnley after 20 years in the professional game and more than 900 senior appearances.

Alexander had a four-year spell in Luton colours during the 1990s but it was back as a teenager with Scunthorpe United where his big break came, thanks to the current Hatters'

"It was Richard who gave me my start in youth football when I went up for a trial and he offered me a YT deal and he was my coach in the first year," Alexander takes up the story.

"He was still playing at the time and when I made my debut for the first-team as a firstyear YT, in the old Leyland DAF Trophy, he ame off at half-time and I went on to replace

"Richard really was a great coach to work with and at the age of 16, fresh out of school, I looked up to him.

"He went off to Aston Villa to be their youth team manager but came back to Scunthorpe a few years later as the manager, when I was in the first-team.

"He was quite hard on me at the time! I was 21, and living the life of a 21-year-old so to speak, and he tried to get me back on the rails.

"I have a lot to thank Richard for as if he hadn't have given me the chance when I was younger I might never have made it as a player."

If Money's influence was a key factor in helping the young Alexander develop as a player, his move to Luton in 1995 was just as important further down the line.

He'd played almost 200 games for Scunthorpe but with the Iron in the bottom tier of English football, he wanted to show himself to be capable of playing at a higher level.

A fee of £100,000 brought him to Kenilworth Road to play for the Hatters in what is now the Championship and although they were relegated in Alexander's first season, it turned out to be a great move.

He was in a squad containing players like Mitchell Thomas, Scott Oakes and Trevor Peake – a hero of Alexander's having grown up supporting home-town club Coventry City as a youngster.

"I think I proved to myself that I could play at a higher level," Alexander said of the switch to Bedfordshire.

"It was good because I had joined Scunthorpe straight from school, I was just a boy then, and Luton was my first move.

"I've only had four clubs in my career and stuck with them and my time at Luton made me grow up a

"That took me out of my comfort zone and tested me, and I proved to myself more than anyone else that I could play at a higher level.

"That's why I left in the end - I wanted to get back to at least Championship level, and I didn't think at the time they would do it because of the turmoil behind the

"At the age I was at the time I knew I had to make a move, I couldn't wait for two or three more years."

Alexander opted for a move to Preston North End in March 1999 after 180 games in a Luton shirt, and he was vindicated when the Lilywhites were promoted to the second tier the following season.

He gives a lot of credit to Lennie Lawrence, his manager at Luton at the time.

"I was on a free transfer in the summer and Lennie was brilliant with me, he understood my reasons." Alexander continued.

"It wasn't money – Luton offered me a decent contract - but Lennie was first-class with me, he knew I wanted to improve myself football-

"I could have gone to another club

for more money but Lennie gave me a bit of advice and said Preston would be the best club and he was right, so I'm forever grateful to him for that.

"Lennie had a great rapport with the players and learned a lot from his time at Charlton, when they went through their struggles, and was constantly doing the same with fighting fires at Luton.

English football, and having earned 38 caps for Scotland, Alexander will always look back on his time at Luton fondly.

"I've played against Luton since leaving, it's always good to go back, and I actually scored my 100th career goal against them for Preston at Deepdale which was a big moment for me," he added.



"But he never let it get through to the players and he always wanted us to play good football, which Luton has a tradition of.

"I think he did a great job and it was just a shame we couldn't get promoted in that first year after we had gone down.

"We had a great time but it wasn't to be, and Lennie really was fantastic for me so I can't thank him enough for that."





behind leaders Cardiff City who had played one game more.

No points had been dropped at Kenilworth Road at that stage in the season and, fresh from a 4-0 victory over Bristol City the previous week, a best of the season crowd of 20,955 turned out to see if the run of home wins could be extended to six.

Watford had the best of the early play and Bill Devan scored from an opportunist effort with the Town defence all over the place. For a time it looked as though they would increase their lead but gradually the game turned and shortly before halftime, Jack Ball managed to throw off his marker, Jimmy Armstrong, and hit a fierce shot past Jim McLaren in the Watford goal.

The Hatters now attacked with purpose and only desperate defending prevented Payne from

adding to the 12 goals that he had already put away that term.

In one assault on the Watford goal, Payne was bowled over in the area with McLaren then falling on him and pushing his face in the mud.

The referee had a long chat with McLaren before restarting play, but 'Crusader' of the Luton News was moved to say: "Why did the referee not give a penalty if there was a foul? Why did he lecture the goalkeeper if there was not a foul?"

Despite the rough treatment, Payne made the second half his own as he netted a hat-trick with all three goals the result of balls played through the middle.

Payne's sheer speed and deadly finishing did the rest and his record was now a remarkable 15 goals from only nine starts.

By the time of the return, on 20th February 1937, Watford were in third position with the Town one place below, albeit with two games in hand on the leaders.

### THE HATTERS OF 1937

Such was the interest in the match that a then record crowd of 27,461 (including my grandfather who cycled to the game from Luton) packed into Vicarage Road to see if Watford could stretch their unbeaten run to seven, or whether Payne could add to his goal total which by then extended to 33 from 26 games.

First blood went to the Town, with Payne the inevitable goalscorer getting on the end of a perfect corner kick from winger George Stephenson.

Watford equalised almost immediately when Tommy Barnett put over a searching centre for Len Fletcher to score with ease, and for a time the Luton defence was under a fair amount of pressure and conceded six corners in quick succession. Gradually the storm was weathered and it was now time for Payne to show that not only was he a natural goalscorer but also a good leader of the line and a goal provider.

Firstly he set up Albert Dawes, after a flowing move, to put the Town ahead and then, when surrounded by three defenders who all expected his to try a shot, he played a clever ball to Fred Roberts who put the game out of Watford's reach.

"When the histories of Watford and Luton Town come to be written, 20th February 1937 may prove to have been a turning point in the career of one of the two club" so said the introduction to the special souvenir programme for the game.

Prophetic words indeed as Watford's promotion push fell away after this defeat, while the Town used the victory as a springboard for a run which finished in eventual promotion to Division Two.

Willock, 28, joins on non-contract terms while Roberts, 20, had his contract terminated at Chester.


"Calum has joined us on a noncontract basis to show us in the short term what he is all about," said U's boss Martin Ling.


### WHAT'S THE GROUND LIKE?

This relatively new stadium was opened in 1997 when Crawley moved from their old Town Mead ground. It is dominated by the good sized West Stand on one side which is a smart, covered, all-seated construction that runs for about two thirds





Town are again at home this coming Tuesday evening when they welcome Histon to Kenilworth Road in a rearranged fixture which fell victim to the bad weather in December.

The Stutes will make the journey down the A505 from Cambridgeshire for this Blue Square Premier fixture and, despite the Hatters grabbing a 2-0 win over the opposition at Bridge Road recently, it is set to be a tough encounter for Richard Money's men.

Histon have had some notable results and performances in their recent history winning FA Cup matches against Football League opponents which at the time gave them a reputation of something of a 'giant killing' team.

A great start to the 2004/05 season, which was mainly down to a 14 game unbeaten run, was the marker for their success that year. They reached the FA Cup second round after defeating League 2 side Shrewsbury Town in the first round which was witnessed by 2,000 fans inside Bridge Road.

Defeat to Yeovil Town in the second round did not deflate them from their league ambitions as they went on to win the Southern League Premier Division and thus were promoted to the Conference South.

In their maiden season in the Conference South in 2005/06 they had a strong run and ended up finishing fifth and with it claimed a Play-Off spot. They beat Farnborough Town 3-2 over two legs in the Play-Off Semi-Final but were undone 2-0 by St Albans City in the Final at Wembley.

The 2006/07 season proved to be the best in Histon's history as they were promoted to the Football Conference after they clinched the Conference South title in April, beating Welling United 1-0 at home.

Last season Histon produced one of the upsets of the FA Cup as they defeated Leeds United 1-0 at home in the second round after beating Swindon Town in the previous round. They were narrowly beaten 2-1 at home by Swansea City in the third round which ended their excellent run in the competition.

This season they have made steady progress in the Blue Square Premier and currently sit mid-table after a good
