

Evans: 'Luton defeat will

## end play-off ambitions'

REDS' star men Charlie Ade-meno and Glenn Wilson are bat-tling against the clock to be ready for what manager Steve Evans has labelled the biggest league game in the club's history. Both the Reds' top scorer Ade-

meno and the club's longest serving player Wilson missed the 2-0 defeat at Wrexham on Saturday - Crawley's first defeat in eight Conference matches - and both are regarded as 50/50 for this Sat-urday's cracker at the Broadfield Stadium

Ademeno failed a pre-match fitness test with a tweaked ham-string and he was particularly missed as Evans' men played some of their best football of the season but paid the price for failing to hit the back of the net. With the 21-year-old having net-ted eight goals in his last rive ted eight goals in his last nine games Reds fans will be crossing their fingers in the hope that he makes Saturday's lineup against

Meanwhile League Two Notts County ended speculation that Evans was on their managerial hit-list by announcing the ap-pointment of Steve Cotteril for the rest of the campaign on their club website on Tuesday.

Reports had surfaced linking
the Reds boss with the cashstrapped club at the end of last

week and according to Evans he was offered the job on a tempe rary basis.

tion with (Notts' chief executive)
Jim Rodwell on Sunday and he
was looking for someone to take I said I wanted to stay here and

available to comment on this at the time of going to press. Rod-well played for Boston United when Evans took the club into the Football League in 2002 and subsequently became the club's director of football and chair-man, and the two have continued their close relationship.
