You only have to look what a few bad results have done to Mansfield and York to see that a so-called 'secure' place in the Play-Offs is never guaranteed.

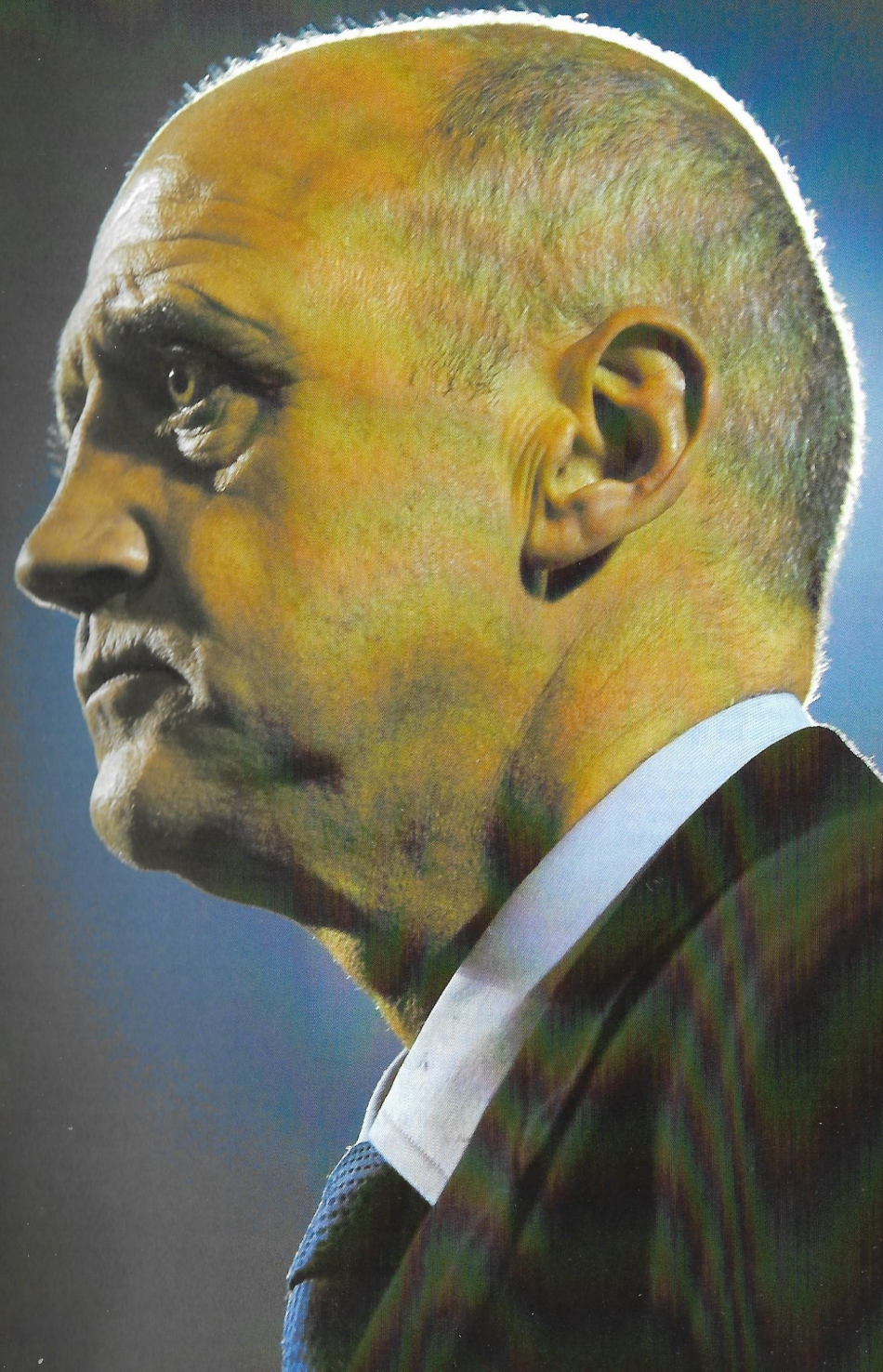
Every team in the league will have something to play for, whether it be promotion or relegation and that is why we need to continue the hard work up until the end of the season.

CHAIRMAN NICK OWEN LOOKS AHEAD TO ANOTHER NIGHT UNDER THE KENILWORTH ROAD FLOODLIGHTS



Good evening and welcome to Kenilworth Road, as we enter the final straight - the last 10 matches of the season.

We seem to be hitting form at just the right time, with three wins on the trot, with the players showing tremendous spirit and determination.

I thought we were superb in the first half against Wrexham on Saturday and could have easily scored more than that belter from Tom Craddock.

Then, in the second half, we had to show a different type of quality - grit and determination in the face of a predictable fightback from the visitors.

We never gave up and, despite the closing minutes of agony that we've become so used to, we made it nine points in eight days.

Well as all the lads played, I must

make special mention of Simon Heslop. He had a terrific game, covered just about every blade of grass, made some telling tackles and passes and overall played a vital part in the engine room of the side towards victory against tough opposition. Welcome, Simon, and here's to a happy and successful stay with Luton Town.

Welcome also to the players, staff, directors and fans of Kidderminster Harriers. Our away game at Aggborough in October was memorable from our point of view because of our exhilarating second half performance when both sides were down to ten men.

You may remember, a certain Matthew Barnes-Homer put Kidderminster ahead in the first half before our storming efforts after the break.

I have memories of Nico spraying the ball about in one of his best

displays of the season and Claude's surging runs down the right, which really took the game to the Harriers. Adam Newton and Ryan Charles hit cracking goals to give us the points. Matthew, of course, is now a Luton Town player and I just want to say a few words about him.

He dropped out of the squad at the weekend after the death of his father Ken. He and his Dad were very close - he'd been a constant support in Matthew's burgeoning career in football.

You can imagine what a shattering blow it was for Matthew when he learnt two months ago that his father had terminal cancer and how difficult it must have been to cope with the inevitable distress that followed.

Matthew says he's not one for moping about and doing nothing, so he returned to training

yesterday and was desperately keen to play a part against his old team-mates tonight.

While hoping we could win automatic promotion, Ken had said he was determined to hang on in the event of our reaching Wembley for the final of the Play-Offs, but, sadly, time ran out.

Matthew's mother Heather was hoping to be with us at the game tonight. Our thoughts are with all the family. It's amazing how many people in diverse places or age groups are affected by our results.

We realise from last season's Johnstone's Paint Trophy final, when around 42,000 Luton fans took Wembley over, that we have a tremendous following.

Supporters travelled to north London from 20 countries on that wonderful day and how glad they must be that they made the effort!

Well, that support doesn't fade away. Even though we are

(temporarily!) non-league, we know they are still keeping up to date at all times of day and night wherever they may be in the world via the internet.

I've had a few post-match texts recently from Eric Morecambe's son Gary who's been out in the Far East. There are fans with their fingers on the pulse in Australia, North America and Scandinavia.

My son Chris is in Australia and he heads for bed, utterly bleary eyed, after following our Saturday games on the internet through the early hours of Sunday morning or it's a crack of dawn start on Wednesdays to follow the Tuesday matches like tonight's!

And my mother, who's 88 next month, is still on the edge of her seat every game praying for the right result via Sky Sports. She was watching Luton matches in the old First Division in the Fifties.

My late father, who was still asking for Kenilworth Road

gossip a couple of days before he died aged 93, used to call Saturday afternoons 'torture by teletext'! It just goes to show how much we all care for this Football Club. Our support is as important right now as it has ever been.

We know we have an excellent chance of promotion, however it may happen, and encouragement from the stands home and away has a big part to play.

The turnout home and away has been excellent. The players are aware of it and really appreciate it.

The team is flying at the moment, the spirit is good, the end of the season is in sight and we all need to be positive from the first minute to the 90th (or 96th in special cases!) Here's to a fourth consecutive victory.

Wrexham showed in the second half why they are a good footballing side. They flooded the midfield, made the pitch big and got stuck in.

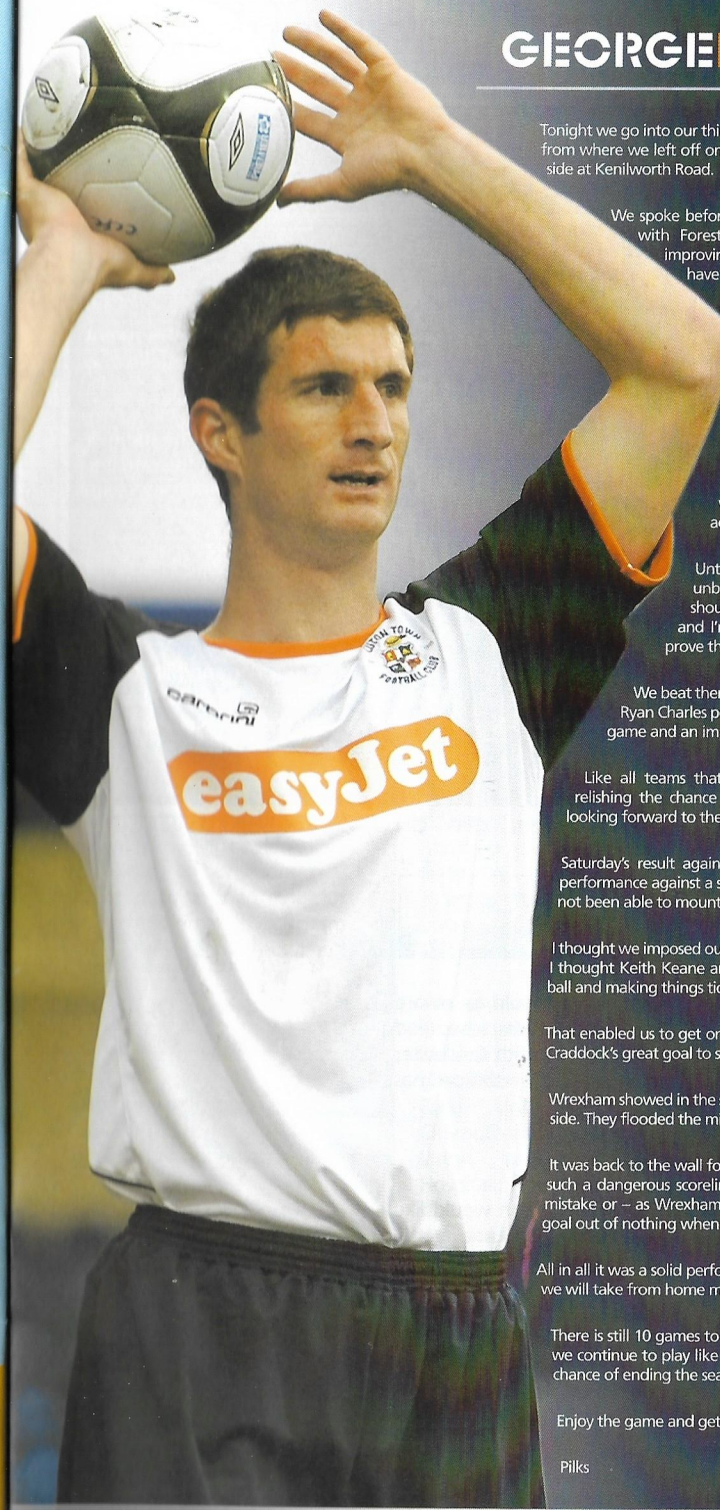

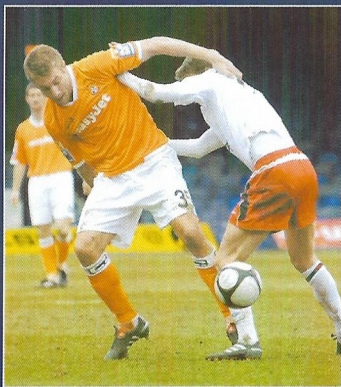

BILL BURTENSHAW
13/12/1925 - 23/02/2010

All at Kenilworth Road were saddened to learn of the recent death of Bill Burtenshaw who, with his older brother Charlie, was on the books of the Hatters in the 1940's.

The Portslade-born inside-forward came to Luton in the summer of 1948 and was immediately thrust into the Town's forward line on the opening day of the 1948/49 season in 0-0 home draw with QPR.

Sadly, Bill did not make any further first team appearances for the Hatters but finished up as leading scorer for the reserve side in his first season.

In October 1949, Bill together with his brother and Billy Collins were subject to a £10,000 triple transfer to then non-League Gillingham who they helped back into the Football League in 1950.

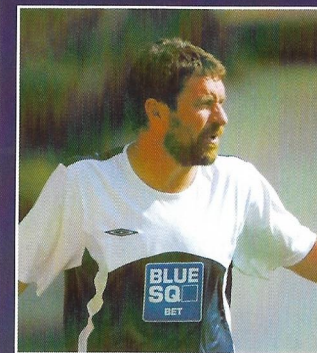


Matthew, who has been following the Hatters' fortunes since he was 12, is in training for the London Marathon.

We first met the Harriers in 2001/02, our promotion season from Division Three, winning 4-1 at Aggborough and 1-0 at Kenilworth Road.

The Hatters were not made particularly welcome on their first visit to Worcestershire in January 2002 when a flu epidemic amongst the Luton squad led to Joe Kinnear calling off the original game in December.

October's 2-1 win at Aggborough – thanks to goals from Adam Newton and Ryan Charles – made it three wins from three meetings.

RECENT HISTORY:

Harriers are another club plying their trade in the Conference who have

experience of playing league football. Their stay among the top 92 teams in the country ended following relegation in 2004/05 – the season the Hatters were promoted to the Championship.

It was former Liverpool midfielder Jan Molby that brought league football to Aggborough for the first time in their history when the Harriers stormed to the Conference title in 1999/2000 – beating off title rivals Rushden & Diamonds by nine points.

The Worcestershire outfit were first promoted to the Conference (then known as the Alliance Premier Division) in 1983 and 11 years later they were crowned the kings of non-league football after winning the Conference title in 1994.

However, the Football League refused the Kiddy faithful the chance to witness league football as Aggborough failed to reach the required stadium criteria.

That season, 1993/94, Harriers shot to prominence in the FA Cup, reaching the fifth round, losing to West Ham

United – who then went on to lose out to the Hatters in the quarter finals.

The club's fine cup pedigree extends to the FA Trophy with a victory in the 1987 final as well as finishing runners-up four times including their most recent trip to Wembley when they lost to Stevenage Borough 3-2 (after leading 2-0) at Wembley in 2007.

Stevenage also pipped Harriers to a place in the Conference Play-Offs last season by two points in their best finish in the league since returning to the division.



THE MANAGER

STEVE BURR

A prolific striker in non-league football, Burr began the gradual transition into management with Nuneaton Borough, where he was player-manager and then full-time boss. After three years there he moved on to become manager of Hucknall Town.

Hucknall cruised to the UniBond Premier Division title in his first season and only season in 2003/04 before taking the reins at Conference side Northwich.

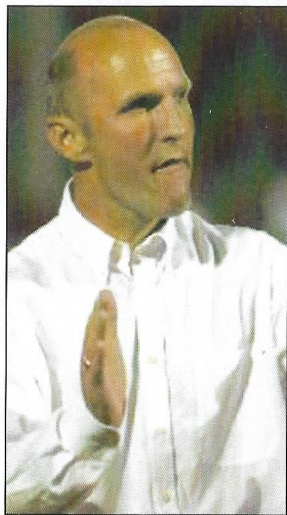
Burr was dealt a huge blow with a 10-point deduction, which threatened the Vics' survival. Against all odds, the side achieved what was considered the impossible by battling to survival on the pitch – only for 'non football' issues to heartbreakingly see them relegated.

However, Burr swiftly led Northwich straight back to the Conference by winning the Conference North Championship.

He finally left troubled Vics that summer, but understandably he was not out of work for long, as he was quickly unveiled as manager of Stalybridge Celtic.

His magical touch continued to rub off – Burr took his new side all the way to the Blue Square North Play-Off Final in 2008, only to be beaten by a single goal as Barrow went on to claim promotion to the BSP.

After impressive results with the Bower Fold outfit last season and again during this, Burr signed a two-and-half-year deal at Aggborough following Mark Yates' departure to Cheltenham.

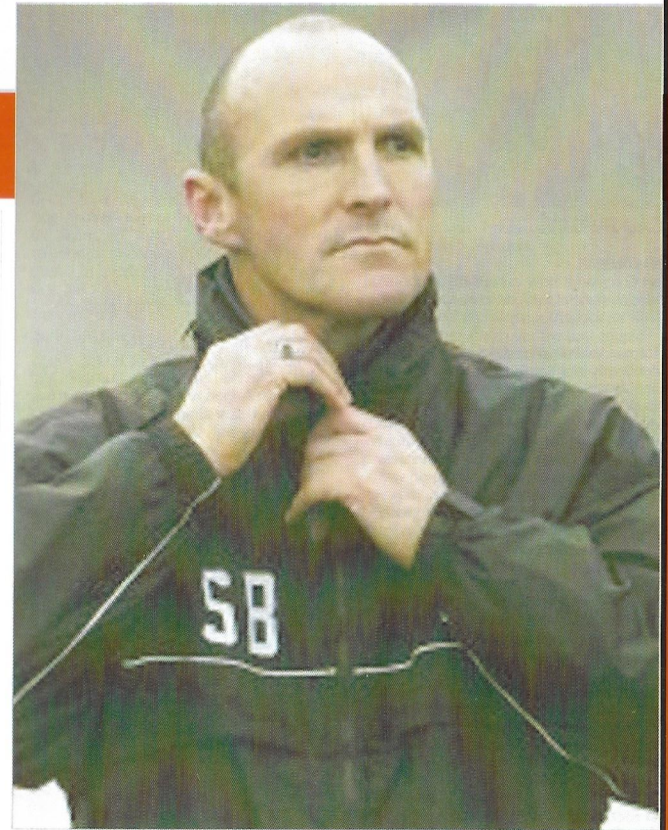


Kidderminster Harriers manager Steve Burr was only appointed in January but has already had an instant impact as the club push for promotion after a string of impressive results.

He knows the criteria to succeed in non-league football after a 12-year playing career at Macclesfield Town.

Since switching to management in 2001, Burr has been in charge of Nuneaton Borough, Hucknall Town, Northwich Victoria and Stalybridge Celtic before taking up his new post.

He feels Luton Town may have initially underestimated the quality of non-league football

and said: "Obviously it is Luton's first season in the Conference and probably they have realised it is a tougher league perhaps than they first thought when they were relegated.

"But in saying that, they are a club that really should be in the League, with the massive support they get."

Putting Saturday's 5-1 defeat at the hands of Stevenage in the FA Trophy to one side, the Harriers had gone 10 games unbeaten since the turn of the year.

Obviously it is Luton's first season in the Conference and probably they have realised it is a tougher league perhaps than they first thought when they were relegated.

Looking to prove Saturday's results was a one-off and gain some momentum for the massive task of trying to overturn that scoreline in next week's semi-final second leg, Kidderminster will arrive tonight a determined side.

Burr added: "We'll go there with the way we have been

playing and hopefully be good enough to get the three points.

"We have got a lot of confidence about the place at the minute and we'll obviously just concern ourselves with how we play and try and get the three points."





GOALKEEPERS

DEAN COLEMAN

Dean Coleman is now in his third season as Kidderminster Harriers custodian having first arrived at Aggborough Stadium in 2007.

A former Walsall shot-stopper, Dean was undoubtedly highly-rated when he came on board but his first-team opportunities limited due to the strong form of Scott Bevan between the sticks. When his chance came, Dean didn't disappoint and put in some strong performances as Harriers finished 2007/08 on a high. Last season was also something of a frustration for him – without question he'd have played regularly but once more the outstanding form of another goalkeeper, Adam Bartlett, kept him waiting.

Dean was a regular between the sticks for Harriers for the most part of this season until a groin injury in February 2010 ruled him out, possibly until the end of the campaign.

ROSS ATKINS

Young shot-stopper who joined Harriers on loan from Derby County in February 2010, Atkins progressed through the youth and reserve teams at the Championship side and, although he's awaiting a first-team debut at Pride Park, he has spent time out on loan with Southport last term, and Burton Albion earlier this year. Ross made his debut in Kidderminster colours away at Oxford United, putting in a fine performance as the club made progress in the FA Trophy.

DEFENDERS

LEE BAKER

Young Redditch-born left-back who began his career before he hit the age of 10 when joining the youth ranks of West Bromwich Albion. He rose through the ranks at the Hawthorns all the way to earn a professional deal back in 2007 – only soon after to suffer a potentially career-threatening ligament injury that would rule him out for his entire first pro season. Impressed by his attitude during rehabilitation, Albion offered Lee a second pro year deal and sent him out on loan to Aggborough in August 2008 to pick up some match practice. He quickly impressed and by the turn of the year he was a Harriers player for keeps.

With good pace and agility as well as sound defensive attributes, Baker is a key part of Harriers' plans this term.

MARCUS BIGNOT

Versatile 35 year-old defender who is back at Aggborough for a second spell, following a hugely successful season at the club in 1996/97 – during which his performances landed him a move to the Football League with Crewe in a deal that went on to fetch

the club £100,000. A former Telford and Birmingham City youngster, he made 56 appearances for Harriers and was capped at England C level prior to his move to Gresty Road where he became an instant hit, and Player of the Season in his first campaign.

After close to 100 games for the Alex he moved on to spend time at Bristol Rovers and QPR (twice), as well as Rushden and Diamonds. A loan-turned-permanent move to Millwall saw Bignot arrive at his last playing club, but after 23 games there he parted company with the New Den outfit on transfer deadline day this year.

MARTIN RILEY

Former Wolverhampton Wanderers centre-back who joined the club prior to the 2008/09 season.

Riley went on to make a total of 34 appearances – and also chipped in with three important goals – perhaps most notably a memorable rifled finish away at Torquay United back in dark December of that year. His impressive display eventually ensured that the former England Under-20 International added England C International to his list of impressive credentials.

GAVIN CAINES

Commanding Birmingham-born defender who boasts 170 career first-team appearances.

Gavin began his career with Walsall back in 2003, but his only first-team outings while on the Saddlers' books came with an 11-game stint with Stafford Rangers. In 2004 he joined Cheltenham Town and capped his first full season by winning their Young Player of the Year award – capped a season later by playing a huge part in their promotion to League 1.

For the following two campaigns, Caines again featured regularly, racking up more than 30 appearances each. He started last season in the side but under new management his opportunities became limited – following his release from Martin Allen's outfit he came to Aggborough ready for a fresh start on a one-year deal.

DUANE COURTNEY

Highly-rated defender, who can play anywhere along the back-line, Duane began his career at youth level with Derby and Birmingham – but after failing to secure professional terms with the latter he joined up with AFC Telford to kick-start his career. His first campaign there could barely have gone better – his impressive performances landed him not only the club's Player of the Year award but also a dream move into the Football League with Burnley, the Clarets paying £25,000 for his services and snatching him from under the nose of Wolverhampton Wanderers.

He spent just one season at Turf Moor, making eight appearances before the search for more regular first-team action took him to the Premier League of Wales and T.N.S. in 2006.

Once again he wasted little time making his mark and he ended his first term in the country's Team of the Year. He remained a regular in the Saints' side for the next two seasons – making 35 appearances in 2008/09 alone. After leaving the club he came to Aggborough on trial – and landed a one-year contract.

MIDFIELDERS

NATHAN HAYWARD

Part of last season's massively successful Youth side at Aggborough, Nathan's exploits not only earned him a first-team, League Cup appearance at Burton Albion last term, but also a trial at Wolverhampton Wanderers.

He turned down their advances after just a couple of days there to remain at Harriers and chase further success, capping a League and Cup treble winning season as a Youth player last term by winning a professional contract in the summer.

DEAN BENNETT

'Deano' needs little by way of re-introduction to anyone familiar with the club – the former Bromsgrove player has made more than 300 appearances in a Harriers shirt over various spells.

After helping the club into the Football League in 1999, he was a regular in League Two for the next five years before his eventual departure for Wrexham in 2004. He also spent time with Chester but, after two loan spells back at Aggborough, the ex-West Bromwich Albion youth teamer finally made a permanent return last summer.

Bennett rolled back the years with some increasingly influential performances in the side, last term he turned out 43 times in total.

JOHN FINNIGAN

Experienced campaigner John Finnigan penned a two-year deal with Harriers in the summer of 2009 following his release from League Two side Cheltenham where he had been captain.

Wakefield-born, he started his professional career with Lincoln City in 1997 where he featured regularly for more than four seasons before his switch to the Robins.

One of his goals at the Millennium Stadium helped win them promotion to what is now League 1 – this just months after his arrival. The following season saw him Players' Player of the Year award, as well as being handed the skipper's armband.

His exploits helped them up once again in 2006 – a magnificent season for Finnigan also saw him net against Newcastle United in the FA Cup in a live televised fixture. He skipped the side to survival in League One the following season.

The 2007/08 term saw his first-team outings limited by a heel injury but, after eventually undergoing surgery he was able to make his comeback to the side last season – returning in December he made 19 appearances, scoring twice.

CHRIS MCPHEE

Harriers beat off Football League competition to bring midfielder McPhee back to Aggborough on a two-year deal during the summer of 2009.

His cameo in a Harriers shirt towards the end of last season was arguably one of the most memorable in recent history – following his departure from troubled Weymouth, McPhee made an instant impact with the club from the end of February. He was an influential part of the midfield that made major strides towards the Play-Offs – the 26-year old somehow crammed in 16 all-action appearances in a little over two months, scoring three goals as Harriers came within a whisker of making the top five.

A free agent in the summer, McPhee remained in close contact with former boss Mark Yates but looked to be set for a return to the Football League with Cheltenham Town expressing huge interest. But the former Torquay United man pledged his future to Kidderminster by penning a new deal that will keep him with the club until the end of the 2010/11 campaign.

BRIAN SMIKLE

Wing-wizard who continues to impress year-on-year for Harriers having enjoyed his most fruitful season last time around. Having first joined in 2006, 'Junior' was forced to make do with a substitutes role for the majority of his first two campaigns at Aggborough – though it should be stated he never once wasted an opportunity to impress when called upon.

Unleashed last term, Brian made a total of 50 appearances and notched 10 goals.

KYLE HADLEY

Local lad Kyle Hadley joined the club in the summer of 2009 after impressing throughout the non-league circuit.

After spending two seasons at Lye he was spotted by a scout for Stourbridge who wasted no time in securing his signature. He played a major part in getting the club promoted in his first season as they secured a place in the Southern

Premier Division. Beginning last season full of promise, he was rocked by injury after breaking his leg in one of the very first games of the campaign. He was to return later that term, though, and after finishing the last couple of months of the season as well as getting a full pre-season under his belt at Aggborough, it's clear he's fitter, stronger and hungrier than ever.

MARC GOODFELLOW

Harriers signed Burton Albion winger Marc Goodfellow on loan until the end of the season in early February 2010.

The 28-year-old has plenty of Football League and Blue Square Premier experience following spells at Stoke City, Bristol City, Swansea City and of course Albion. He began his career at the Potteries as a youth team player before breaking through to the first team and making more than 50 appearances.

This led to a £50,000 move to Bristol some six years ago, where he featured regularly during the 2004/05 campaign before spending spells out on the loan at likes of Port Vale and Colchester United. He became a Swans player permanently in 2005, before spending time at Grimsby where helped them to the League 2 Play-Offs. His move to Burton came in the 2007 January transfer window and in amongst close to 90 games for the Brewers was last term's dream promotion to the Football League. He featured heavily, scoring six goals in 30 appearances as the Pirelli Stadium outfit clinched the title on the last day of the season.

Although he has failed to hold down a firm League Two place this season, he has impressed out on loan at Barrow in the BSP where he scored twice in five games – as well as featuring in the huge FA Cup tie at Sunderland just a few weeks ago. Right-footed, Goodfellow can play on either flank and is sure to be a handful once again to Blue Square Premier defences between now and the conclusion of this campaign.

STRIKERS

DARRYL KNIGHTS

With the ability to change a game in an instant, Darryl Knights remains one of Harriers' biggest assets. He made the move to Aggborough following his release from Yeovil in the summer of 2008.

Former boss Mark Yates quickly snapped him up having seen first-hand what he was capable of during an explosive loan spell during the previous campaign. Four goals and a whole lot more in 18 games made him a sought-after property and he

committed his future to Harriers by penning a two-year deal.

ROBBIE MATTHEWS

Striker who arrived at Aggborough after leaving fellow Blue Square Premier outfit Salisbury City, where over the past couple of seasons he established himself as one of the most formidable front men at this level. After spells as a youngster at AFC Bournemouth and Swindon, he continued his development with the Whites where he eventually turned professional.

It was in his second spell as a City man that he really began to find his form and after helping the Whites win promotion to the Blue Square Premier, he's been a big part of both their seasons in non-league's top tier.

He spent the final part of last season out on-loan at Crawley Town where he made another big impression, and left Salisbury after enjoying a prolific eight-goal pre-season, including hat-tricks against League 1 sides Exeter and Southampton before signing a two-year deal in August 2009.

JAMES LAWRIE

Port Vale hit-man who joined Harriers on loan in February 2010, the 19-year-old is regarded as one of the finest products of the youth system at the League Two outfit, and after rising through the International ranks from Under-17s all the way through to the senior side, there's little doubt that the front man has a huge career in the game.

Lawrie joined Vale as a teenager and was offered a first professional contract three years ago and, at all levels as an International, he has scored seven goals for his combined 22 caps, including a first senior appearance against Italy in the summer.

ADAM BOYES

Hot-shot striker on-loan from Scunthorpe, who graduated through the youth set-up at York City. Whilst a trainee at Bootham Crescent, the player spent more than one trial spell with Manchester United as he etched out a reputation as one of the game's brightest potential stars.

After breaking through into the first team with the Minstermen, Boyes went on to feature almost 30 times last season and finished with their showpiece FA Trophy Final at Wembley as City lost out to Stevenage Borough. His energetic, raw style led to interest from a number of clubs and it was the Iron who stumped up an undisclosed fee to take him to Glanford Park this past summer.

CRADDOCK STRIKE SLAYS DRAGONS

LUTON TOWN 1 - 0 WREXHAM

A solitary goal from Tom Craddock - his fourth in three games - earned the Hatters' their third straight victory and moved them to within five points of the top of the Blue Square Premier.

The striker's 36th minute effort, together with a solid defensive display, was enough to ensure the Town's first clean home clean sheet in the league since a 1-0 win over Barrow on 12th September last year.

The Town started the second half the way they started the first and, after Keane had got the crowd in stitches after accidentally kicking the corner flag instead of the ball, his second attempt led to Jake Howells drilling a shot inches over the crossbar on 52 minutes.

After that escape, Dean Saunders' side got a grip on proceedings and came within a whisker of finding an equaliser on 68 minutes when Andy Fleming saw Mark Tyler tip a thunderous shot from the edge of the area onto the crossbar.

But despite some nervy late aerial assaults from the visitors, the Hatters held on comfortably enough to rack up win number three on the spin to keep them third in the table.

"I thought that the first half was arguably the best since I have been manager. We were switched on, got bodies in the right holes and were concentrated."

GOALKEEPER

Ian Feuer

While Kelvin Davis went on to have the better career and was perhaps more technically gifted, there was a period - before injuries took their toll - when the giant American looked invincible. Filling the goal with his colossal frame and patrolling his 18-yard box with a confident swagger, he made goalkeeping look easy.

RIGHT BACK

Emmerson Boyce

Stepping in for Stuart Fraser to make his 1998 debut in a pretty awful Town team, Boycey showed instant quality. We always knew he'd make the step up to the Premier League, and he's now doing well with Wigan in the top flight.

LEFT BACK

Matthew Taylor

Breaking into the team as a 17-year-old at the start of the 1999/00 season, he only just qualifies for this '90s XI. But even though his best years were still to come I'd still include the '99 vintage here; as a teenager he was already the complete wing-back.

CENTRE BACKS

Steve Davis

He'd be my captain, a true leader. Class on the deck and strong in the air, he even weighed in with more than his share of goals with his heading ability and strong shot.

Marvin Johnson

A Hatters legend, Luton through-and-through. He was solid if unspectacular at the back, and his marauding forward runs were great fun to watch. Equally at home at full-back, he could cover well for Taylor's attacking play.

RIGHT MIDFIELD

Scott Oakes

Being so young at the time, I don't quite remember seeing Oakes perform so much as I remember the excitement that surged through the crowd every time he had the ball. I loved the way Kenilworth Road seemed to crackle with electric anticipation as cries of "Go on Oakesy! Beat him Oakesy!" ringing out all around me.

One of a batch of young Welsh players we had at the time, Ceri was a real battler with a decent amount of skill and added bite and flair to the team.

STRIKERS

John Hartson

I remember being in tears when he left the club, his 1995 transfer to Arsenal was my first taste of how cruel football can be. Strong and intelligent, he was a cracking player as he proved at the very top level for many years.

Rory Allen

Tough choice here - Tony Thorpe is an obvious contender for his goal-scoring record but I've decided to be a bit different and go for Allen, whose stunning form during a brief loan spell pretty much single-handedly kept us up in 1998 before he disappeared for ever, job done.

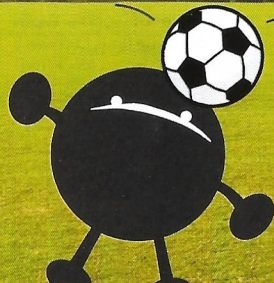

On-loan midfielder Simon Heslop made an immediate impact for the Hatters as they defeated Wrexham 1-0 at Kenilworth Road on Saturday.

With injuries to key midfield players Richard Money used the loan market to good affect as he brought the defensive midfielder in from Coca-Cola Championship club Barnsley on a month's loan.

Town's newest recruit has seen the insides of seven different clubs in the last four years as a professional footballer and is still at the tender age of just 22-years-old.

His deal at Oakwell is due to expire at the end of this season so the York-born man is keen to get some much needed games under his belt to help his career progress.

"The manager inquired about me and I was interested straight away because I'm in the last couple of months of my contract at Barnsley," Heslop explained.

"I've been there since I was 13 and have been out on loan for a long time during my professional career.

"I need to be playing games so joining Luton was something that I was very interested to do.

"Hopefully I can do well here and put myself in the shop window and who knows I might even be offered a contract here if I do well."

Heslop started his first match in a Luton shirt against the Welsh side on Saturday and played his part in helping the Hatters record their ninth home win of the season.

They also claimed their first clean-sheet at Kenilworth Road since the beginning of

September last year and after the match the midfielder gave his reaction to his debut in Town colours.

"It was a very tough game against Wrexham especially towards the end of the game," he said. "I've only played one game in the last couple of months so it was good to get out there and get another game under my belt.

"It is important to have two hard-working midfielders in the side especially with the state of the pitch. The ball was bobbling about throughout the game so it was important to get challenges in which I thought we did well at.

"The lads said in the dressing room afterwards that was the first time since September that the team had kept a clean sheet at home so it was pleasing to get one on my debut.

"First-half we were really good, pressing the ball and then passing it well in the final third of the pitch and in the second-half we showed our discipline to get through the second period and win the game."

Now that Heslop has started his Luton career with a win

he is determined to keep his head and work hard for his new team in the remaining three weeks of his loan deal.

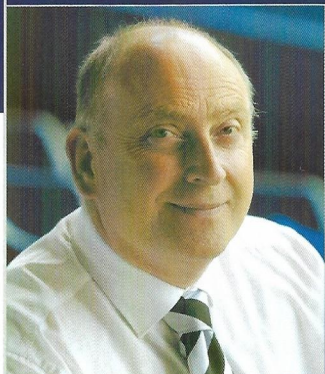

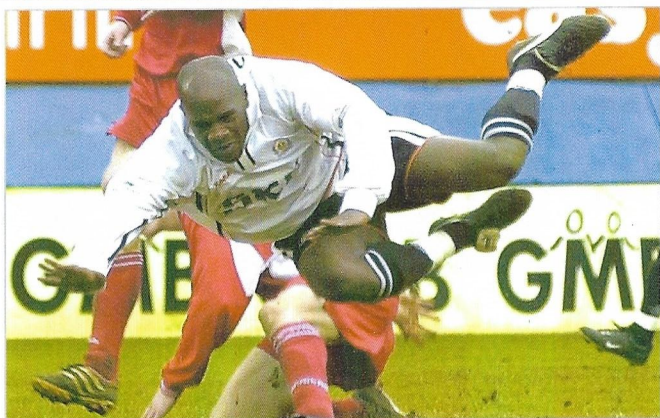
DAYS PAST

LUTON TOWN 1 - 0 KIDDERMINSTER HARRIERS. 16TH MARCH 2002.

At the start of the 2001/02 campaign the Town found themselves back in the basement division for the first time since 1968.

A major clearout of players by manager Joe Kinnear prefaced a bewildering number of new signings with the result that five players made their Luton debut in the opening day win at Carlisle with a further two the following week.

Quite naturally, it took the new players a while to gel and early results were patchy, but all this changed with the introduction of Jean-Louis Valois at the end of September. Valois was a cut above anything else in the division and when he was allowed to play he could destroy defences with his repertoire of silky skills and deft touches allied to fierce shooting.

The Town suffered a run of three defeats in November followed by a flu epidemic which culminated in no fewer than 24 players being unavailable for an away fixture at Kidderminster.

Joe Kinnear pulled out of the fixture which left neither the Football League or Kidderminster best pleased. There was talk of a points deduction at one time but in the end a fine of £30,000 was deemed sufficient punishment.

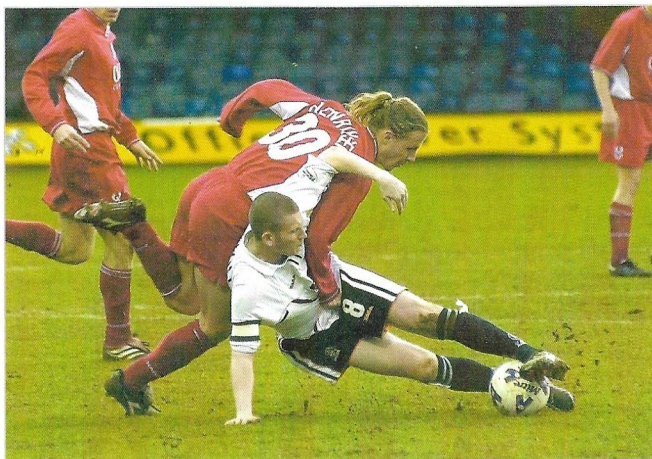
Once Kinnear was able to pick from a virtual full squad the team moved up the table once more leading to the long-awaited clash with leaders Plymouth in early February. The Pilgrims had been remarkably consistent and stood seven points ahead of the Town who were in second spot.

A full house at Kenilworth Road saw late goals from Kevin Nicholls and Steve Howard clinch a vital victory but after the euphoria of the win came back-to-back defeats at Rochdale and at home to Scunthorpe. Kinnear warned the players in no uncertain terms that the defeats were unacceptable and challenged them to embark on a long run of victories.

Next up were Bristol Rovers and on a wet and miserable evening a Kenilworth Road crowd of 5,651 saw the Hatters win convincingly 3-0. This was followed by a narrow 2-1 home win over York and then 1-0 victories at both Lincoln and Torquay.

The wins kept on coming with Leyton Orient swept away 3-0 at home before, in a promotion six-pointer, a 2-1 win at windy Nene Park against Rushden more or less cemented second spot in the table.

The Hatters were on a roll and now looked to overtake Plymouth at the top.

Their prospects were done no harm when another 3-0 home win, this time against Exeter, meant that it was now seven victories on the spin and the Pilgrims were beginning to look over their shoulder as the Town made up ground.

Kidderminster had Play-Off ambitions of their own and were sitting in 10th place when they visited Kenilworth Road intent on avenging the 4-1 hammering at Aggborough in the fixture re-arranged after 'flugate'.

Joe Kinnear felt that opposing players had got wise to Valois and so kept him on the bench with Matthew Taylor playing again as an advanced wing-back which had brought him a goal against Exeter.

The match opened at a cracking pace and it soon became apparent that Harriers were out for a point when they employed only one attacker,

Hitchin born Hatters fan Drewe Broughton, who was left top plough a lone furrow up front.

Paul Hughes opened the scoring for the Town on 16 minutes when he fired in a low, 25 yard strike after being set up by Matthew Spring's inviting square pass.

Stuart Brock, who had suffered a nightmare at Aggborough earlier in the season when he gifted the Town three of their four goals, made amends when he pushed a Steve Howard effort around the post and made sharp stops to thwart both Matthew Spring and Chris Coyne.

The one-way nature of the game continued into the second half with Howard deflecting Alan Neilson's cross onto the bar before Taylor was put through with only the goalkeeper to beat. Brock came out of his area and deflected Taylor's lob away with his

hands which left the referee with no option but to dismiss him.

The Town continued to pepper the Harriers goal for the remainder of the game but could not put the ball in the net while at the other end Mark Ovendale in the Luton goal was given a quiet afternoon.

The gloss was taken off the eighth straight win when Hughes was sent off for kicking the ball away in the final minute, his second bookable offence, but the three points had all but ensured promotion.

AFC Wimbledon picked up three points at Kingsmeadow to get the better of Eastbourne Borough to get within two points of fifth place.

Meanwhile Mansfield failed to break down a resolute Tamworth team at Field Mill that leaves the Stags six points off the Play-Off places.

Steve Evans's Crawley continue to impress with a late surge towards the top five following 2-1 home win over Ebbsfleet United at the Broadfield Stadium.

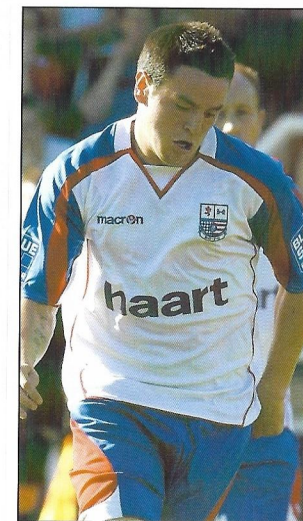
Michael Malcolm and Charlie Ademano struck to put the Sussex side to within four points of the Play-Offs.

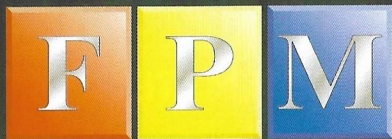

Although only in its first season, King George Football Club has grown rapidly and proved to be extremely popular with local children and parents in the Welwyn Garden City area of Hertfordshire.

From the start the club wanted to create an easy going, friendly atmosphere and this has certainly been achieved.

Currently the club has 11 league teams of varying ability ranging from Under-9 up to Under-18 along with a large number of younger children aged two to eight who train in the KGFC Tots group and Under-6, 7, 8s squads under the guidance of Head Coach David Williams.

These age groups are focused on learning through playing small sided games in a fun, safe and exciting environment.

Each team has a volunteer who holds either Level 1 or 2 Coaching badge

and shows that the club's commitment to also developing it's coaches in order to give the children the best possible coaching available and, under the Luton Town Club Partnership programme, these same volunteers have also benefited from a number training sessions laid on by experienced Luton Town coaches.

Within a very short space of time, King George has gained the FA Charter Standard kite mark which shows the club has implemented all of the Football Association's best practices, policies and guidelines to protect and develop all of their young players and this really has been a massive achievement for such a new club.

The clubs have 28 volunteers who deal directly with the coaching and managing the young players but supporting these there are another 30 plus volunteers working tirelessly behind the scenes to keep things running smoothly including a social/fundraising group who work

hard to lay on social events, outings and parties for the players, parents and families.

They also run various fund raising events so that the club can offer the best possible coaching and facilities whilst keeping costs to players as low as possible in order for more children to be able to participate.

Another popular event run by the club are regular festivals/fun days which run throughout the year and allow children/teams from any club within the local area can come along and have fun just playing the game they love.

As King George is a club for youngsters, they even pride themselves in having their very own mascot, George the Monkey, who dresses up in the club's colours of vivid orange and black and proved a big hit with everyone on their launch day back in May 2009.

There has been a wealth of research and writing recently on what goes to make a world-class performer.

Our aim at Luton Town is to produce Premier League footballers, and to become an established Premier League player you have to be truly great.

As a Luton fan we would ask you to look at your friends, relatives, work colleagues and examine how they spend their lives. Most of them work, and work very hard. Some of them will pursue hobbies and play sports, again putting everything into these activities. The question to ask yourself is how well do they do these things?

The answer is probably they do them just fine, well enough to keep doing them. At work they don't get fired, and may even do well enough to get a promotion. They may do their hobbies well, if they play golf they do

well enough to enjoy it and not give up.

However, how many of the people around you are truly great at what they do – amazingly, brilliantly world-class excellent?

How many of them are as successful in business as Alan Sugar or Richard Branson? How many play golf as well as Tiger Woods or play the guitar as well as Eric Clapton?

So here is the question we have to ask our staff about our young players. How many of our young players pass the ball as well as Andrés Iniesta and Xavi for Barcelona? How many can finish as well as Fernando Torres, how many keep goal as well as Petr Cech? The thing with most of the people you know is that they are good, conscientious folk who work hard.

Some have them have been working

hard for 20, maybe 30 years. Is that enough to make them great performers? The answer worryingly is that most of us are just okay at what we do. So what can we do to ensure that our young players are better than just okay?

Why would Luton Town want to invest hundreds of thousands of pounds per year on developing players who will be just okay?

So if hard work isn't the answer can we say that all of the people listed above are born with a God-given talent? This would be the easy answer and explain why these world-class performers are one in a million.

The problem is the research doesn't back up this belief in innate talent.

Over and over again, researchers found very few sign of precious talent in the early years of world class

performers. This research goes across many different fields; musicians, footballers, artists, mathematicians and all of it comes up with the same answer, most people who become incredible in their field did not show early signs of gifts.

Of course this doesn't mean that talent doesn't exist early on, but what it does mean is that if it does exist it might be completely irrelevant.

So if hard work and a natural gift aren't the answer, how can we ensure that our talented young footballers have a chance of becoming world-class performers?

There is a vital piece of research to answer this question, and the research has been incorporated by educational institutes, corporate gurus and sporting clubs. The research is by Anders Ericsson, and talks about the 10,000 hours rule. The research is so influential that if you search the internet for '10,000 hours' you will find over 80 million websites related to it.

According to Ericsson, 10,000 hours is the amount of hours of practice required to perform at a world class level. The research goes across many fields, from the Beatles playing eight hour sets in Hamburg to Bill Gates working through the night designing new programmes as a youngster.

With regards to sport it can relate to Woods spending five or six hours a day practicing, or Maradona spending hours with a tennis ball to improve his touch.

On the very first coach education course I went on at the age of 15, our tutor taught is that "Practice doesn't make Perfect", his belief was that "Practice made Permanent".

His belief is backed up by current research that discusses "The role of deliberate practice in the Acquisition of Expert Performance". So what makes practice deliberate, to ensure that practice is making perfect and permanent?



Well firstly it must be designed, and with this in mind our coaching staff have ensured that every training session is:

- Planned
- Targetted
- Focuses on individual learning

Secondly, training must allow high repetition. When we video coaching sessions one of the things we analyse is whether a coach's session ensures that the skills and techniques are repeated over and over again.

In addition we have introduced the skills DVD to allow players to work

on their technique outside of training.

Thirdly is to ensure that players receive feedback on their performance. Luton aim to achieve this by:

- Giving continuous feedback during training
- Weekly written assessment via the players' logbook
- Games videoed and analysed

Fourthly training must be demanding mentally. All sessions must be targeted at the top end of the group. Players who need challenging must be played in older age group, and finally players are taken on tours to take them out of their comfort zone.

Finally practice must allow for self-assessment and goal-setting. This is why we insist on players grading themselves after games and for older players after training. We also encourage players to set goals at the beginning of season and readdress these throughout.

I would like to finish by quoting Geoff Colvin from his book "Talent is Overrated":

"The evidence shows that the price of top-level achievement is extraordinarily high.

"Perhaps it is inevitable that not many people will choose to pay it. What the evidence shouts most loudly is striking, liberating news: that great performance is not reserved for a preordained few. It is available to you and everyone."

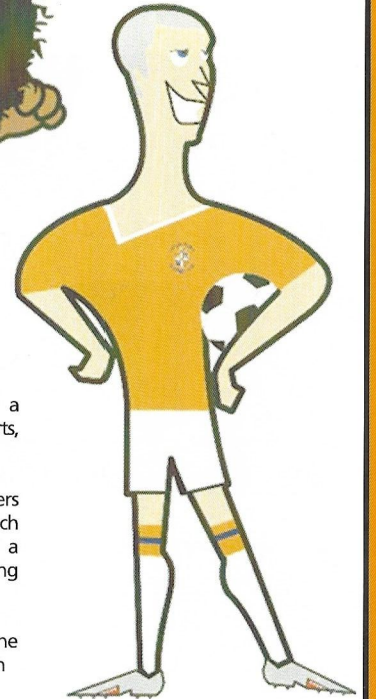
To help bring our resources to life we have worked closely with a local company, Repro Solution, to come up with a team of characters.

A crucial weekend's football did not go the way of the Town's Ladies with pivotal moments all seemingly going against the Luton sides. The first team travelled to in-form Leeds and easily matched their opponents during an even first period.

However, Leeds were awarded a free-kick on the edge of the box and took the lead via an unstoppable shot that dipped into the top corner of the net.

This brought to an end a run of eight consecutive victories over their rivals but is also likely to prove costly to their

title chances with just three games left. Shanice Jiminez was on the scoresheet. There was good news however from the Under-15s who defended well away to Watford before taking the lead when Georgia Hardy forced a Hornets defender to turn the ball into her own net.

A superb flowing move brought Town's second goal ending in Hardy setting the ball back for Hayley Watson to crash home her shot from the edge of the area.

The third goal was another beauty as Kally Wilson crossed for Chloe Battlebury to volley home to make it 3-0. It may be coincidence but Chloe does seem to have a nice habit of scoring goals in these derby matches! Watford could only manage a late consolation goal.

WHAT'S THE GROUND LIKE?

On one side of the ground is an old looking wooden Main Stand, a single-tiered covered stand which is all seated and runs for around half the length of the pitch.

This stand has a fair number of supporting pillars running along the front of it, although the seating

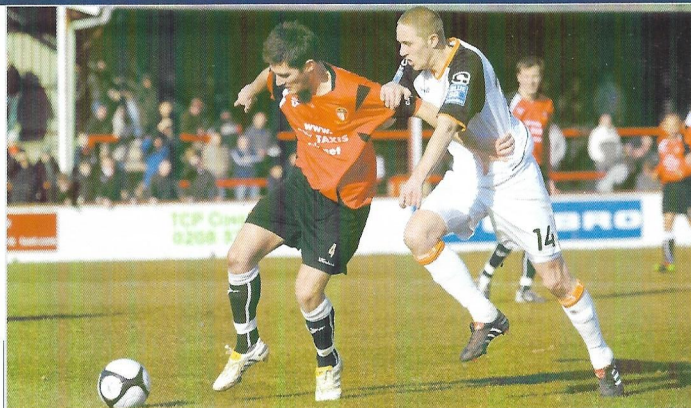

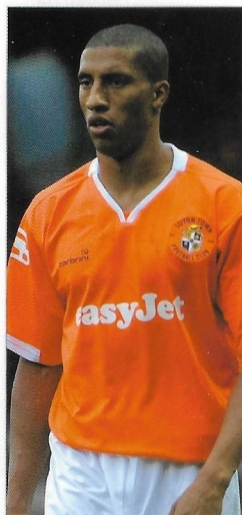
