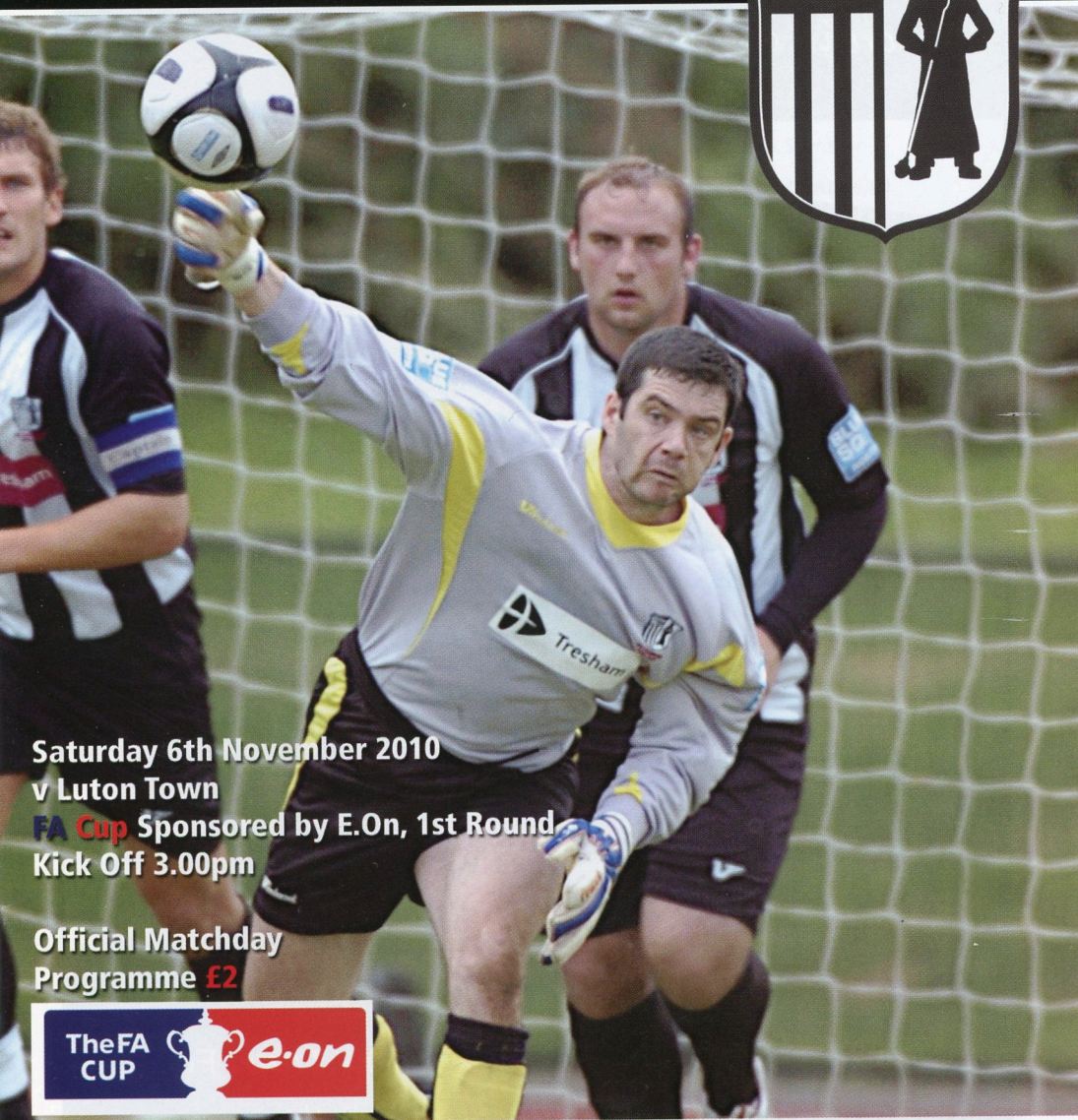

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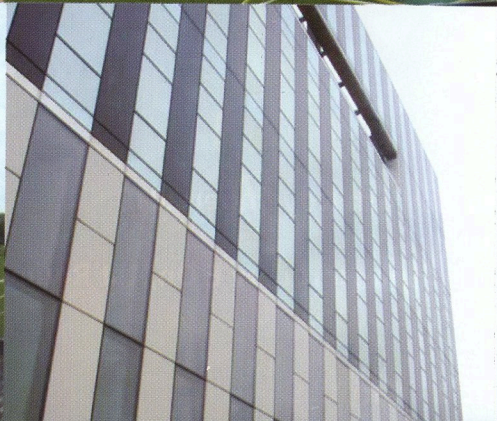
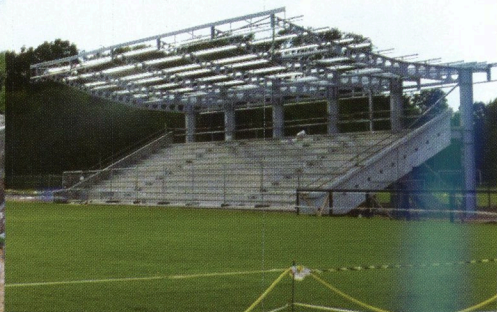

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## MANAGERS NOTES

Today I would like to welcome to the Rockingham Triangle everyone connected with Luton Town for this F.A Cup First Round tie. It is a game we have all been looking forward to since the draw was made. Generally speaking we have been in good form at home and we are scoring plenty of goals and entertaining people.

I admit I was shell shocked after last week's defeat and I think all the players were as well. At times the game was too easy for us. We had no urgency and it cost us.

I just hope Luton had someone watching. We don't normally have gaps like that and that might have given them a false idea about Corby.

I don't think it was the case that we had one eye on the F.A Cup. For twenty minutes at the start we were in control so we were definitely there. At times we probably had ninety per cent against ten per cent in terms of possession. But we did nothing with it.

You can look at it and ask whether our lads put so much into twenty minutes of football that they were tired. That's a cop out. They were only ever going to hit us on the break and we needed to stay solid as a back four. But we didn't do that.

Conditions were awful for our Senior Cup tie at Cogenhoe on Tuesday and there wasn't much football played. We had five under-18's who gained experience and it was important for them to get a run-out, even though they had been involved on Monday in the Northants Senior Youth League.

Dean West, Liam Dolman and Michael Frew also got ninety minutes but unfortunately they won it in the last minute.

Yet again we have been drawn away in the F.A Trophy – to AFC Telford. We don't seem to have a lot of luck with the draws in that competition. But that's life and we'll have to take it on the chin.

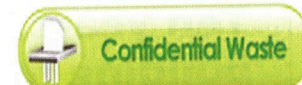

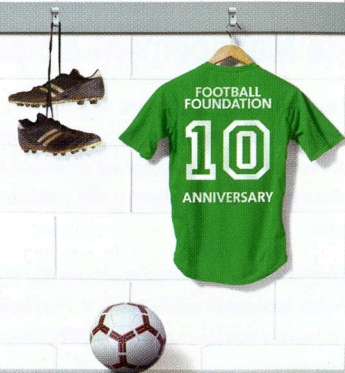

“I think the fact that we’re at this stage of the competition shows just what big strides the club has made in the last few years. Not too long

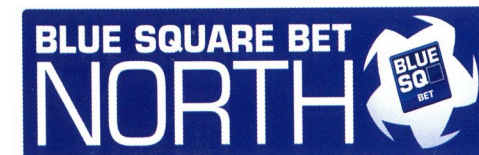
ago, this sort of game would have been unheard of for Corby Town.

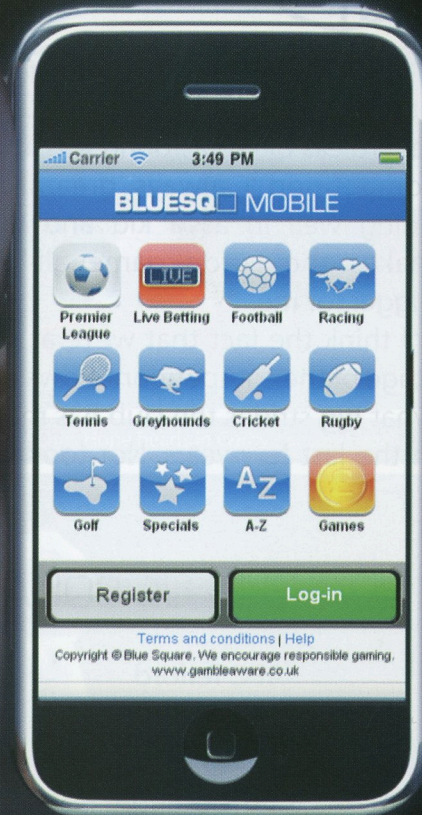
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## PREVIOUS F.A CUP MEETINGS WITH THE HATTERS



Following Corby's 6-3 FA Cup First Round victory over Burton Albion the Steelmen were drawn at home to either Fourth Division Luton Town or fellow Southern Leaguers Romford in Round Two, the tie to be played on Saturday 4th December 1965. Manager Tommy Hadden, trainer David Yates and a number of the players attended the midweek Kenilworth Road replay and saw Luton win 1-0 through John O'Rourke's 12th goal of the season.

Preparations for the visit of the Hatters soon began as the club were swamped for requests for tickets. Luton quickly sold out their full allocation and asked for more while Corby supporters were restricted to just two tickets per person.

When the players assembled for training the Tuesday before the tie manager Tommy Hadden's first duty was to do a roll call of the sick and injured. Full back Alan McBain, wing half George Armour and skipper Alex Stenhouse had all picked up knocks during the previous Saturday's Southern League defeat at Margate while half back Bob Riley had been struggling to overcome a leg injury for a number of weeks, inside left Alex Garden reported in with a sore throat and left back Dave Pollard was laid up in bed with flu. There was also the little matter of the Occupation Road pitch being covered with two inches of snow!

Progress reports on the fitness of the squad continued throughout the week with McBain and Riley – both ironically former Luton players – being the most doubtful. McBain didn't have the stitches removed from his injured leg until the eve of the game but both were fit to take their places in the line up.

As both teams usually played in white shirts and black shorts they wore change strips for the tie. Luton took to the field in red shirts and white shorts while Corby emerged from their dressing room in amber shirts with a maroon band across the chest and black shorts – a kit which had been borrowed from neighbours Stewarts & Lloyds F.C. The game was watched by a crowd of 6,421 and was filmed by Anglia Television cameras for showing in their 'Sports Pages' feature during the following Monday evening's 'About Anglia' programme.

Corby began the game in aggressive mood and showed far greater determination than their higher ranked visitors. Leading goalscorer Maurice Goodall had two early chances but completely miskicked the first and, after rounding former Everton and Blackburn centre half Matt Woods, fired the second straight at goalkeeper Colin Tinsley who had narrowed the angle well.

John O'Rourke was the star man of the Luton attack but he was having no better luck in front of goal. He fired one shot wide, had another saved by Alan Alexander and was then tackled strongly by Dave Pollard as he lined up a third attempt. Pollard was playing out of his skin at left back and showed little sign that he had climbed out of his sick bed only 48 hours earlier. He completely blotted out the threat of Billy Harber and one tackle on ex-Newcastle United man Jimmy Gibson almost registered on the Richter Scale!

The Steelmen took a deserved lead in the 17th minute when Alex Garden swung the ball out to the unmarked George Jagger and the bearded left winger fired in a shot which gave Tinsley no chance as it flew into the net. Maurice Goodall then thought his luck had changed when he got the ball into the net – but his effort was ruled out because of a foul on Tinsley.

Corby continued to press forward and a long ball sent Jagger clear again but this time Woods stepped in to avert the danger.

Great Yarmouth referee Mr Rex Spittle had to speak to Alex Stenhouse and Billy Harber following a tussle for possession near the corner flag, but generally the game was played in good spirits throughout.

Luton were clearly the faster of the two sides and just before half time O'Rourke lobbed another effort over the bar. At half time, however, the Steelmen were still in front.

Corby launched an attack straight after the restart but Stenhouse miskicked his shot when in a good position. As the game progressed the Occupation Road surface, which had become almost waterlogged as the midweek snowfall thawed, turned into a mud heap and both teams struggled with the underfoot conditions.

Luton should have equalised in the 48th minute but Gibson failed to convert a good cross by Harber and then Tony Read – a goalkeeper who was enjoying a prolific spell in the forward line – missed a good opportunity when he slipped at the vital moment. The Hatters finally claimed the equaliser they had been threatening in the 62nd minute. John Reid sent a free kick into the Corby penalty area and although Gibson's initial effort crashed down off the crossbar O'Rourke managed to scramble the rebound into the net. The visitors now had their tails up and another Gibson shot flew just wide with Alexander beaten.

Corby were far from finished themselves, however, and at the other end Goodall again shot off target after a cross by Haasz had been teed up for him by Jagger. It looked as if the usually deadly Goodall would rue those missed chances but they were all forgotten in the 78th minute. A long through pass looked destined for the safe hands of Tinsley but Goodall refused to give up the chase and when the ball was held up in the clinging mud he got to it first to chip in a delightful goal.

Luton then piled on the pressure in search of an equaliser and with five minutes remaining they forced a corner on the right. The Corby penalty area was packed with the entire home team and eight Luton players as the visitors sensed this might be their last chance to at least earn a replay. There was pushing, shoving and elbowing galore going on in the crowded box as the kick was swung over but Mr Spittle singled out a handling offence by Haasz as being worthy of a penalty – which was converted by Ray Whitaker via the crossbar.

The scores were still level when Mr Spittle blew the final whistle and although there was great disappointment in the Corby ranks that they had failed to hold on they did have a replay at Luton the following Tuesday to look forward to. And, as the local press said: "Corby can feel proud of its brave fighting footballers."

Stand tickets for the replay went on sale at the Supporters Club hut at 10.30 am the following morning and were quickly snapped up. And on the Monday evening six coaches were fully booked for the trip.

Alan McBain had aggravated his leg injury during the first game

and was ruled out of the replay but Corby were fortunate to have ex-Republic of Ireland international Dick Whittaker in reserve to replace him. The only unenforced chance saw Johnny Haasz dropped in favour of Charlie McGlinchey. The enigmatic Scotsman had already made it known he was anxious to leave Corby after losing his first team place but he had put in some impressive performances in the reserves and manager Hadden knew that on his day he could be a matchwinner.

Luton, who retained an unchanged line up, began the replay as if they really meant business and O'Rourke wasted two good chances in the opening five minutes. For most of the game, however, the threat of the Luton centre forward was blotted out by Tony Needham and with the rest of the Corby defence playing their hearts out the Hatters attack could find no way through. Despite their undoubted talents in ball control and ability to evade tackles, Luton's forwards soon ran out of ideas of how to overcome the well-drilled Southern League defence.

Having fought off the early onslaught Corby gradually began to take control of the game as they played the better and more effective football. They forced four corners in quick succession, George Jagger drove a shot just wide and George Armour almost beat Tinsley when he ran in to meet a throw in by Alex Garden.

Then, in the 33rd minute, came Corby's story-book matchwinner. Charlie McGlinchey picked up the ball well inside his own half and sent skipper Alex Stenhouse racing away down the right wing with an excellent pass which alone justified his inclusion. Once Stenhouse picked up the ball he ran 35-yards almost to the goal line without being challenged and then sent over a teasing centre. Centre forward Maurice Goodall timed his run to perfection to smash the ball into the roof of the net and make a

niche for himself in Corby folklore.

Having taken the lead for the third time in the tie the Steelmen didn't panic and continued to play cool, controlled football. They didn't allow themselves to be upset by the ball-playing Fourth Division professionals who became more and more frustrated as the game wore on. Indeed, Corby twice went close to increasing their lead in the second half when McGlinchey had a header cleared off the line by Bob Thomson and Tinsley did well to save another Goodall effort.

Then came the nail-biting climax to the tie. Luton launched a series of desperate bids to snatch an equaliser and in the very last attack of the game a header by O'Rourke – for once free of Needham's attentions – beat Alan Alexander but skimmed the top of the crossbar.

Seconds later Mr Spittle blew the final whistle and hundreds of young – and some not so young – Corby fans invaded the pitch to mob their eleven mud soaked heroes. Also joining in the celebrations was Tommy Hadden. "I ran onto the field at the end of the game", admitted the Corby manager. "I was told afterwards that the Corby fans invaded the pitch at the end but I was completely unaware of anything".

As the regulars in Luton's 'Bobbars Stand' made their way home, no doubt shaking their heads in disbelief, the Corby players posed for photographs in the dressing room before getting changed and making their own homeward journey. As they boarded the coach they were each handed an envelope containing their win bonus and this was spent in a pub when they stopped for a few drinks to celebrate their evening's work. As goal scoring hero Maurice Goodall later said Corby Town were "Kings of the Night".

# MEET THE STEELMAN – BEN MACKEY

Ben Mackey was born in Leamington Spa on October 27th 1986. He rose up through the ranks at Coventry City and became the youngest player to appear for the Sky Blues when he made his debut as substitute against Ipswich Town in April, 2003 at the age of 16 years 167 days wearing the number eighteen shirt. Ben made two more substitute appearances before being released by Coventry in 2005.

At the start of 2005/06 he had a trial period with Irish Premier League club Linfield, for whom he scored once in four appearances. In 2006/07 Ben joined Leamington and, with bigger clubs showing an interest, the following year Ben became the first player to sign a contract for them since the club was reformed. He was top scorer in his two seasons with Leamington and netted an impressive total of 57 goals in 92 games for them.

In May 2008 he moved on to Brackley and continued his impressive goalscoring form for them, netting a hat trick against Corby Town during our 2008/09 British Gas Business Premier Division championship winning season.

Ben signed for Corby Town in the summer and already has an impressive record of 9 goals in 14 appearances as a Steelman.

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## CORBY TOWN IN THE F.A CUP FIRST ROUND PROPER



### 1954/55

Corby Town first reached the First Round Proper of the F.A Cup in 1954/55. After disposing of Spalding United, Bourne Town, Wellingborough Town and Worksop Town in the qualifying competition, Steelmen manager Wally Akers described the pairing with the Division Three (South) side as: "A splendid draw".

Over 1,000 blue and white bedecked Watford fans travelled by road and rail to boost the attendance at Occupation Road to 6,763 and although Saturday 20th November 1954 dawned with Corby shrouded in a blanket of thick fog by kick off time (2.15 in the days before floodlights) it had lifted to leave just a light mist.

Corby did the bulk of the early attacking and twice went close to opening the scoring when first diminutive Yorkshireman Billy Deakin shot across the face of goal and then centre forward Fred Slater, who was kept in check throughout by Bill Shipwright, escaped the visiting centre half's attention momentarily to head against a post.

The Steelmen's first half hero, however, was to be former Leeds United goalkeeper Harold Searson who made a string of fine saves and topped even those heroics by brilliantly tipping over a John Meadows blast shortly after the interval.

At the other end Danny Smith was twice foiled by former England international custodian Eddie Bennett before a story-book hero emerged - unfortunately for Watford. Debutant inside right Peter Walker was only playing because star schemer Jimmy Bowie had failed a late fitness test but he justified his inclusion in the 69th minute when he ended a solo run by scrambling the ball past Searson for the vital opening goal.

Corby responded immediately by forcing a Watford defender to hack the ball off his own line but after 78 minutes the Steelmen's fate was sealed when Eddie Smith took advantage of a defensive mix-up to stab in the visitors' second.

2-0 was how the score stood at the final whistle and even as the players were being applauded off the field the fog began to return, as if to bring down the curtain on Corby's first venture into big time football.

### 1963/64

Corby Town went into their F.A Cup Fourth Qualifying Round tie against Lockhead Leamington knowing that a plum home tie against Bristol City awaited the victors and the Steelmen responded by winning 2-0.

So, after a gap of nine years, Corby were in the First Round Proper again. The excitement had built up to almost fever pitch prior to the match with official programmes - and probably some unofficial ones - being sold in the town's pubs and clubs over a week beforehand. The tie against Bristol City attracted an attendance of over 5,000 to Occupation Road with many turning up to see the visitors' former England centre forward John Atyeo in action. One disappointment for Steelmen supporters was the absence of their former Everton and Chelsea forward Bobby Laverick who was suspended following a dismissal against Tonbridge a month earlier.

His place went to local boy Jimmy Stanley.

Right from the kick off Corby ser about their Third Division visitors with only poor finishing letting them down. Tommy Crawley set the tone by heading inches over the bar in the third minute and from then on City desperately clung on – giving away 42 free kicks to Corby's 9. The Steelmen took the lead when a 35-yard free kick by full back Dave Pollard found Crawley and the prolific marksman steered the ball into the net.

Rapturous delight turned to bitter disappointment, however, when Bristol scored twice in eight minutes against the run of play to lead 2-1 at half time.

Corby continued to bombard the City goal in the second half with Arthur Hukin, Jimmy Stanley and Crawley all going close before City broke away and a cross from Jantzen Derrick was hammered home by Brian Clark to complete City's 3-1 win

## 1964/65

This time Corby had to wait only twelve months to feature in the First Round again. On this occasion the Steelmen were exempt until the Fourth Qualifying Round where a brace from Terry Curran gave Corby a 2-0 win away to Arnold Town.

The First Round draw was particularly kind on this occasion as it gave Corby a home tie against perennial Fourth Division strugglers Hartlepoons and a crowd of 4,511 turned up fully expecting to see a giant killing act.

It came as a bit of a shock when Hartlepoons took the lead but the ground erupted just before half time when wing half Brian Wright

fired in a spectacular equaliser from long range.

The second half turned out to be a disappointing anti-climax as Corby battled hard without seriously testing Hartlepoons' much maligned Welsh goalkeeper Ken Simkin again and the visitors' full time training paid off as they scored twice more to repeat the 3-1 score line of the previous year.

## 1965/66

At lunch time on Monday 18th October 1965 radios in the steelworks and throughout Corby were again tuned into the draw for the First Round Proper of the F.A Cup. Having beaten Kings Lynn at Occupation Road in the Fourth Qualifying Round the Steelmen were relishing the opportunity to have another go at Football League opposition. So it must have come as a big disappointment when Corby were paired with Burton Albion, who played a division below Corby in the Southern League – although at least the tie was again at Occupation Road.

"It's a good draw", insisted upbeat chairman Fred Deeley "providing we win" while manager Tommy Hadden added: "I'm quite happy that the game is at home. It gives us the chance of going through and drawing a more fashionable club in the next round. I feel we have a great chance of going at least one round further in the cup than we have ever done before."

Burton were going well in the Southern League First Division at the time but were dealt a severe blow shortly before the tie when manager Peter Taylor left the club to become assistant to Brian Clough, ironically at Harlepoons. The vastly experienced Alex Tait was quickly installed as player/manager and at the end of the season he would lead the

Brewers to promotion.

Corby's preparations for the game began on Saturday 6th November 1965 when stand tickets went on sale. The club office at the ground was also open from 6.45 pm to 8 pm the following Monday and Tuesday evenings to sell those four shilling tickets.

On the day of the match the Occupation Road gates opened at 2.00 pm and the police were kept busy monitoring the parking of cars in West Glebe Road and other streets close to the ground. Admission to the stand was ticket only but there was plenty of work for the turnstile operators as the crowds flocked to pay their three shillings – or 1/6d for children an O.A.P's – for a place on the terraces.

At ten to three the teams took to the field wearing their regular colours – white and black for Corby and amber and black for Burton Albion – and at three o'clock referee Mr Roger Kirkpatrick from Leicester blew the first whistle of the afternoon to get the game – which for once would live up to all expectations – under way.

Corby took the lead after just six minutes when they won a corner and Hungarian Johnny Haasz's kick was met on the volley by Maurice Goodall. A second goal quickly followed, Bob Riley firing in an explosive shot from fully thirty yards out, but in Burton's next attack centre half Stan Aston reduced the arrears with a firm header which gave Alan Alexander no chance.

Before half time a swerving shot by Haasz made it 3-1 to Corby and in the 68th minute Goodall screwed a shot back from virtually on the goal line to score from a seemingly impossible angle. Two minutes later Albion right half Alan Jackson used an arm to control the ball inside the area and Mr Kirkpatrick, who would later go on to officiate at the highest level, pointed to the penalty spot.

Alex Garden stepped up to take the kick and swept his shot past Les Green. Mr Kirkpatrick had spotted an infringement, however, and ordered the kick to be retaken. Scotsman Garden showed no signs of nerves as he swaggered up to coolly knock the ball into the net again and this time the goal stood.

Stan Round scored twice in the second half to keep Burton in contention but as the minutes ticked away the visiting supporters accepted there was to be no late come back and began to drift away. In fact, in the last minute Garden headed in his second of the game to complete a 6-3 win which earned a home tie with Luton Town in Round Two.

## 1967/68

Corby Town's last foray into the F.A Cup First Round again saw them pitted against another non-league side – Boston United. A Dave Sturrock goal in a 1-0 Fourth qualifying Round replay victory away to Cambridge City had set up the Occupation Road meeting with the Pilgrims.

Despite the continued presence of Alan Alexander, Alan McBain, Dave Pollard and Maurice Goodall and the addition of Neil Burns, Jimmy Knox, Mick Addy, Les Barratt and Dixie McNeil by this time the Steelmen were a shadow of the side they had been in recent seasons and crashed out of the competition 3-0 to Boston.





# LUTON TOWN

## Club History

Luton Town Football Club was formed on 11 April 1885, the product of a merger of the two leading local teams, Luton Town Wanderers and Excelsior. Initially based at Excelsior's Dallow Lane ground, the club moved to Dunstable Road in 1897. In 1890, the club began making payments to certain individual players. The following year, Luton became the first club in southern England to be fully professional.

Luton Town was a founder member of the Southern Football League in 1894, and, after finishing as runners-up in its first two seasons, the team left to help form the United League. In the league's inaugural season the club came second, before joining The Football League for 1897–98. The club continued to enter a team to the United League for two more seasons, and won the title in 1897–98. Poor attendance, high wages, and the high travel and accommodation costs that resulted from Luton's distance from the northern heartlands of The Football League crippled the club financially, and made it too expensive to compete in that league. A return to the regionally organised Southern League was therefore arranged for the 1900–01 season.

Eight years after arriving at Dunstable Road, Luton moved again, settling at their current ground, Kenilworth Road, in 1905. Captain and left winger Bob Hawkes became Luton's first international player when he was picked to play for England against Ireland on 16 February 1907. A poor 1911–12 season saw Luton relegated to the Southern League's Second Division, but the club managed to win promotion back two years later. When war broke out, the schedule was reduced to a series of friendlies, but Luton took part in The London Combination for 1915–16. A key player of the period was Ernie Simms, a forward. Simms was wounded while serving in Italy in the First World War, but returned to score 40 goals during the following season.

The Luton side first played in the white and black colours which the club has retained for much of its history during the 1920–21 season, when they rejoined The Football League; until then, the players had worn sky blue shirts with white shorts and navy socks. Such was the quality of Luton's team at this time

that despite playing in the third tier, a fixture between Ireland and England at Windsor Park on 22 October 1921 saw three Luton players on the pitch – Louis Bookman and Allan Mathieson for Ireland, and club top goalscorer Simms for England. However, after Luton finished fourth in the division, the squad was broken up as Simms, Bookman and Mathieson joined South Shields, Port Vale and Exeter City respectively. Luton stayed in the Third Division South until 1937, when the team finished top and won promotion to the Second Division, at that time the second tier of English football. During the promotion season, striker Joe Payne scored 55 goals in 39 games; during the previous season he had scored 10 in one match against Bristol Rovers, which remains a Football League record.

During the early 1950s, one of Luton's greatest sides emerged under manager Dally Duncan. The team included Gordon Turner, who went on to become Luton's all-time top goalscorer, Bob Morton, who holds the record for the most club appearances, and Syd Owen, an England international. During this period, Luton sides also featured two England international goalkeepers, Ron Baynham and Bernard Streten, as well as Irish internationals Seamus Dunne, Tom Aherne and George Cummins. This team reached the top-flight for the first time in 1955–56, after finishing the season in second place behind Birmingham City on goal average. A few years of success followed, including an FA Cup Final appearance against Nottingham Forest in 1959; at the end of the season, Owen was voted FWA Footballer of the Year. However, the club was relegated the following season, and, by 1965, was playing in the fourth tier.

In yo-yo club fashion, Luton were to return. A team including Bruce Rioch, John Moore and Graham French won the Fourth Division championship in 1967–68 under the leadership of former player Allan Brown; two years later Malcolm Macdonald's goals helped them to another promotion, while comedian Eric Morecambe became a director of the club. Luton Town won promotion back to the First Division in 1973–74, but were relegated the following season by a solitary point. Former player David Pleat was made manager in 1978, and by 1982–83 the team was back

in the top-flight. On the last day of the club's first season back in the top tier, the side narrowly escaped relegation: playing Manchester City at Maine Road, Luton needed to win to stay up, while City could escape with a draw. A late winner by Yugoslav Raddy Antić saved the team and prompted Pleat to dance across the pitch performing a "jig of joy", an image that has become iconic. The club achieved its highest ever league position, seventh, in 1987, and won the League Cup a year later with a 3–2 win over Arsenal. With ten minutes left on the clock and Arsenal 2–1 ahead, a penalty save from stand-in goalkeeper Andy Dibble sparked a late Luton rally: Danny Wilson equalised, before Brian Stein scored the winner with the last kick of the match. The club reached the League Cup Final once more in 1989, but lost 3–1 to Nottingham Forest.

The club was relegated from the top division at the end of the 1991–92 season, and sank to the third tier four years later. Luton stayed in the third-tier Second Division until relegation at the end of the 2000–01 season. Under the management of Joe Kinnear, who had arrived halfway through the previous season, the team won promotion from the fourth tier at the first attempt.

Owner John Gurney terminated Kinnear's contract on his arrival in May; replacing him with Mike Newell before leaving Luton as the club entered administration. Newell's team finished as champions of the third-tier Football League One in 2004–05. While Newell's place was taken by first Kevin Blackwell and later former player Mick Harford, the team was then relegated twice in a row, starting in 2006–07, and spent the latter part of the 2007–08 season in administration, thus incurring a ten-point deduction from that season's total. The club then had a total of 30 points docked from its 2008–09 record by The Football Association and The Football League for various financial irregularities. These deductions proved to be too large an obstacle to overcome in the league, but Luton came from behind in the final of the Football League Trophy to win the competition for the first time.

Relegation meant that 2009–10 saw Luton playing in the Conference National, a competition which the club had never before contested. The season would once again end in disappointment as the side lost to York City in the Playoff Semi-final leading to them spending a second season at this level of football.

### **MARK TYLER (Goalkeeper)**

Signed two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in June 2009 following his release by Peterborough United. He k made 483 appearances in 15 years at London Road and was rewarded with testimonial against Liverpool in 2007. When first team opportunities became hard to come by in 2008/09 he was loaned out to League 2 Bury. A former England Youth international.

### **KEVIN PILKINGTON (Goalkeeper)**

Vastly experienced, joined Hatters in May after his release from Notts County. Began career with Manchester United playing six times in Premier League under Sir Alex Ferguson. In six years at Old Trafford had loan spells at Rochdale, Rotherham and Celtic before two-year stay at Port Vale. After 23 League appearances for the Valiants he move to Aberystwyth Town and then Wigan Athletic. Found stability when joined Mansfield in 2000 and featured 167 times in League action over five years. In 2005 signed for Notts County and five year stay saw 141 appearances at Meadow Lane. However, Notts began flashing the cash at start of 2009/10 with goalkeeper Kasper Schmeichel one of many high-profile arrivals. Frozen out of the County team, he joined the Hatters on-loan in November and when Magpies released him in summer of 2010, Money snapped up the veteran permanently.

### **ZDENEK KROCA (Defender)**

Impressed in assured display in pre-season fixtures to earn a one-year contract. Made 169 league appearances in 10 years with hometown club Tescoma Zlín in his native Czech Republic. Last season imposing 6ft 5in defender scored four times in 27 league appearances with Letná Stadium outfit as they finished in second place in the Czech Second Division.

### **GEORGE PILKINGTON (Defender)**

Highly experienced, joined club on free transfer in August 2008. Began career as an Everton trainee; joined Port Vale in June 2003 after loan spell at Exeter City. Started 223 League games for Valiants but injury frustrated first season at Kenilworth Road yet managed to pick-up Johnstone's Paint Trophy winners' medal.

### **DAN GLEESON (Defender)**

Signed for Hatters in summer from home town club Cambridge United. Product of U's academy, made debut at 18 and became a regular, making 61 League appearances before Notts County snapped up his signature in 2006. Lasted a season at Meadow Lane, featuring 17 times, before back at the Abbey, firstly on-loan before signing permanently in 2007. Won seven England C caps.

### **ED ASAFU-ADJAYE (Defender)**

Has made significant progress through club's youth set-up. After loan spell with Walton & Hersham, made breakthrough into first team under former boss Mike Newell, when club stretched through injury and suspension. First team opportunities limited so went on-loan to Salisbury City where earned rave reviews and when Mick Harford arrived as manager at Kenilworth Road one

of first things he did was recall him. Made full debut in March 2008 and has gone from strength to strength.

### **SHANE BLACKETT (Defender)**

Luton-born, was Mick Harford's sixth summer signing of 2009. Began career with Dunstable Town before switch to Arlesey Town in 2003 and United Counties form alerted attentions of Dagenham & Redbridge who signed him in May 2004. Made 83 appearances and helped Daggers win Conference title and promotion to Football League in 2006/07. Peterborough signed him and made 38 appearances.

### **FREDDIE MURRAY (Defender)**

Joined Hatters on six-month loan deal from Blue Square Premier side Grays Athletic in August 2009 and deal was made permanent last January. Irishman began career as trainee with Blackburn Rovers and had spells with Northampton Town, Stevenage Borough and Cambridge United.

### **TAYLOR NATHANIEL (Defender)**

Signed professional contract in June after impressing in club's Under-18s. Made first senior appearance when coming off bench in 3-0 victory over Grays Athletic in FA Cup in October 2009.

### **ALEX LACEY (Defender)**

Up-and-coming second year scholar who impressed Richard Money in the 2010 pre-season to earn a squad number. Yet to make first team appearance.

### **ADAM MURRAY (Midfielder)**

Joined Hatters in summer from Oxford United. Started as trainee with Derby County, turning professional in August 1998. Gradually established himself in Derby first team and played regularly in Championship side but by start of 2003/04 season was out of favour and joined Kidderminster Harriers on loan. Left Derby in November 2003, joining Notts County and then rejoined Kidderminster and was regular until end of season. In June 2004 joined Mansfield Town, then moved to Carlisle United in March 2005 and played in play-off team that won promotion back to Football League. At start of 2006/07 moved to Torquay for £10,000, then in January 2007 joined Macclesfield for £17,500. Joined Oxford half way through 2007/08 and went on to make 87 appearances but last season cut short by a back injury. Hatters moved in when found out he had negotiated his release.

### **PAVEL BESTA (Midfielder)**

Former Czech Under-21 international signed after impressing in pre-season friendly. Began career with hometown side Baník Ostrava and helped them win Czech league title in 2004 which led to appearances in Champions League qualifying rounds and made UEFA Cup appearance against Middlesbrough. Joined Hatters, alongside fellow countryman Zdenek Kroca, in August after campaign in Slovakia with Ruzomberok.

### **JAKE HOWELLS (Midfielder)**

Came through ranks at Kenilworth Road and made full first team debut at Bradford City in October 2008. After 36 appearances rewarded with professional contract in May 2009. Made huge strides with impressive performances in 2009/10.

### **GODFREY POKU (Midfielder)**

Signed from Blue Square South St Albans City last January as Hatters beat off competition from several Football League clubs. Impressed in Hatters' reserves last season.

### **JJ O'DONNELL (Midfielder)**

Joined Town with St Albans team-mate Godfrey Poku last January. Featured for reserve team last season.

### **CLAUDE GNAKPA (Midfielder)**

Frenchman signed on free transfer in August 2008 having plied his trade across Europe with Montpellier HSC, Racing de Santander, Deportivo Alaves and FC Vaduz of Liechtenstein. Moved to Swindon Town for brief spell, then joined Peterborough in July 2007 and was regular in League 2 promotion winning side, starting 25 league games.

### **KEITH KEANE (Midfielder)**

Made debut as 16-year-old in November 2003 and had extended run in the side. Product of youth system who appeared for Republic of Ireland at schoolboy level. Joined Hatters at age of nine and made rapid progression through club's centre of excellence and youth teams. Out of contract at end of 2009/10, delighted everyone at Kenilworth Road by penning two-year deal.

### **ADAM NEWTON (Midfielder)**

Ascot-born, was Harford's second summer signing of 2009 following release from Brentford. Started career at West Ham United, coming through their Academy but only made three substitute appearances before signing for Peterborough United in May 2002. Former England U-21 international made 249 appearances in six years at the Posh. At end of 2007/08 was snapped by Brentford and helped Bees to the League 2 title. A St Kitts and Nevis international, has spent time on-loan at Portsmouth, Notts County and Leyton Orient.

### **ANDY DRURY (Midfielder)**

Signed for Hatters in the summer from Conference champions Stevenage. Started career at Sittingbourne before signing for Gravesend and Northfleet (now Ebbsfleet United) in 2003. Lewes secured his signature in 2006 and he helped them lift Conference South title in 2007/08. Joined Stevenage in summer of 2008 and scored in last season's FA Trophy Final against Barrow.

### **ADAM WATKINS (Midfielder)**

Signed professional forms in June. Self-confessed Hatters fan, made first team bow in 1-0 defeat at Southampton in FA Cup third round in January 2010.

### **KEVIN GALLEN (Forward)**

Shepherds Bush native, established himself as something of legend at QPR notching up over 400 appearances and hitting 97 goals in two spells spanning nearly 14 years. Joined Huddersfield 2000 and after 30 starts moved to join Barnsley following summer but call of West London saw him return to QPR within a few months. Then scored nine goals in 16 league starts for MK Dons before joining Luton on loan move made permanent in January 2009 and had prolific season in non-League football, finishing with 21 goals.

### **MATTHEW BARNES-HOMER (Forward)**

Joined Hatters initially on month's loan from Kidderminster before agreeing two-and-a-half year contract to move permanently in January 2010 transfer window. Enjoyed dream start to international career when netted winner on debut for England C in 2-1 win over Poland in November. Began as trainee at Wolves and tried luck in United States before returning to England and, following success with clutch of non-League sides, was snapped by Wycombe Wanderers. Released at end of 2006/07 and then Harriers beat off competition to capture his signature. His Kidderminster form alerted attentions of number of Football League clubs but was suitably impressed by the Hatters' vision.

### **DANNY CROW (Forward)**

Joined Hatters from Cambridge United in May 2010 following expiry of contract at Abbey Stadium. Started as trainee with Norwich City and made senior bow in Premier League in December 2004. Loan spell at Northampton followed towards end of 2004/05 season before released by Norwich and signed by Peterborough in summer of 2005, notching 17 goals in debut season. Following short loan spell at Notts County, was released by Posh and snapped up by Cambridge in September 2008. Strike rate of 22 goals in 43 league starts won him many admirers.

### **DAN WALKER (Forward)**

Signed one-year deal in July 2010 after impressing in pre-season in games. Previously with Bedford Town and also played for Stony Stratford Town and Leighton Town.

### **TAIWO ATIENO (Forward)**

Kenyan international originally signed in March 2010 until the end of the 2009/10 after returning to UK after spell playing in Puerto Rico and America. Released at end of campaign but after deal in South Africa fell through was re-signed on September 3 until end of season. Starting career as scholar at Walsall, failed to make breakthrough and send out on loan to gain first team experience to a number of Football League sides. Snapped up by Tamworth and scored 12 goals in first season before signing for the Puerto Rico Islanders in 2007.
