





Tonight's Visitors...

Mark Tyler... Hugely experienced goalkeeper who signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in June 2009 to become Mick Harford's fifth signing of the summer following his release from Peterborough United.

Mark made 483 appearances in 15 years at London Road and was rewarded for his lovalty with a testimonial against Liverpool in 2007.

After falling down the pecking order at Posh he found first team opportunities hard to come by and in 2008/09 he was loaned out to League 2 Bury where he made 11 appearances for the Shakers.

A former England Youth international, Tyler was handed the number one shirt by the Hatters boss who admitted he'd failed in an attempt to sign the stopper the previous summer.

Kevin Pilkington... Vastly experienced goalkeeper who joined the Hatters in May 2010 after his release from Notts County.

Pilkington began his career with Manchester United playing six times in the Premier League under Sir Alex Ferguson.

During his six years at Old Trafford Pilkington enjoyed loan spells at Rochdale, Rotherham and Celtic before a two-year stay at Port Vale.

After 23 league appearances for the Valiants, he was on the move once more, with Aberystwyth Town and Wigan Athletic his next two ports of call.

However, he found stability at his next club, Mansfield, joining the Stags in 2000 and went onto feature 167 times in league action over the next five years.

In 2005 the Hitchin-born stopper made the short hop down the M1 to sign for Notts County and another five year stay resulted in him making 141 appearances at Meadow Lane

However, Notts began flashing the cash at the start of the 2009/10 campaign with goalkeeper Kasper Schmeichel one of many high-profile arrivals.

Frozen out of the County team, and with Mark Tyler injured. Pilkington joined the Hatters on-loan in November and went onto make 11 appearance between the sticks whilst at Kenilworth Road before injury curtailed his stay.

But when the Magpies released him in the summer of 2010. Money was quick to snap up the veteran permanently, giving the Town the choice of two excellent goalkeepers.

Zdenek Kroca... Centre-half who



impressed in assured display alongside George Pilkington in two pre-season fixtures in 2010 to earn a one-year

Kroča made 169 league appearances belt in 10 years with hometown club Tescoma Zlín in his native Czech Republic.

Last season the imposing 6ft 5in defender was in fine, commanding form, scoring four times in 27 league appearances with the Letná Stadium outfit as they finished in second place in the Czech second division a position - like the Town last season - that was not enough to earn promotion.

George Pilkington... Highly experienced defender who joined the club on a free transfer in August 2008. Having began his career as an Everton trainee. Pilkington joined Port Vale in June 2003, after a loan spell at Exeter City. Having started 223 league games for the Valiants, the highlyregarded defender has been named Player of the Year twice.

Injury frustrated the centre-half in his first season at Kenilworth Road in 2008/09 but he still managed to pick-up a Johnstone's Paint Trophy winners' medal.

Pilkington hit the headlines for his goalscoring exploits in the Town's first season in the Conference, twice scoring braces in early season victories over Mansfield and Crawley.

His impeccable form on the pitch led to him winning a string of end-of-season awards and underlined his loyalty to the Hatters by signing a new contract at the end of the

Dan Gleeson... Tall and athletic defender, primarily a right-back, Gleeson signed for the Hatters in the summer of 2010 from his home town club Cambridge United.

A product of the U's academy, Gleeson made his debut at 18 and soon became a regular at the Abbey Stadium making 61 league appearances before Notts County snapped up his signature in 2006.

Gleeson only lasted a season at Meadow

Lane, featuring 17 times before he was back at the Abbey, firstly on-loan before resigning permanently in 2007.

Recognised as one of the best right-backs outside the Football League, Gleeson's performances have seen him rewarded with seven England C caps.

Ed Asafu-Adjaye... Capable of playing in any position across defence. Asafu-Adiave has made significant progress through the Club's youth set-up.

After a loan spell with non-league side Walton & Hersham, he made the breakthrough into the first team under former boss Mike Newell, when the Club was stretched to the limits through injury and suspension.

Although the youngster was an unused sub for three matches. Youth Coach Marvin Johnson gave Ed a glowing reference to incoming boss Kevin Blackwell, who gave him a one-year contract.

However with first team opportunities limited, Ed went on-loan to Salisbury City where he earned rave reviews and when Mick Harford arrived as Manager at Kenilworth Road one of the first things he did was recall the young defender.

Making his full debut in March 2008 at Kenilworth Road against Crewe Alexandra he has gone from strength to strength and was part of the Town team that won the Johnstone's Paint Trophy at Wembley in

Shane Blackett... Luton-born Shane became Mick Harford's sixth summer signing of 2009 after penning a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road.

Equally adept at centre-back or at leftback, Shane began his career with Dunstable Town before a switch to Arlesey Town in 2003.

His form with the United Counties side alerted the attentions of Dagenham & Redbridge who signed the 6ft 3in defender in May 2004.

He made 83 appearances during his time at Victoria Road and helped the Daggers win the Conference title and earn promotion to the Football League in 2006/07.

His reputation as a pacey defender alerted the attention of Peterborough who snapped him up with Dagenham teammate Craig Mackail-Smith in January 2007. He went on to make 38 appearances during his time at London Road.

Freddie Murray... Left-footed versatile defender who joined the Hatters on a sixmonth loan deal from Blue Square Premier side Gravs Athletic in August 2009 and the deal was made permanent in January

Luton Town FC

Murray only signed for the Essex club in August before making his debut for the Town in the 4-1 victory over Mansfield Town just hours after putting pen to paper. Previously with Northampton Town, Stevenage Borough and Cambridge United the Irishman began his career as a trainee with Blackburn Rovers.

Taylor Nathaniel... Versatile young defender who signed a professional contract with the Hatters in June 2010 after impressing in the club's Under-18s.

Capable of playing on either flank in defence or midfield. Nathaniel made his first senior appearance for the Town when coming off the bench in a 3-0 victory over Gravs Athletic, in the FA Cup in October 2009, making an instant impact when setting up the third goal.

Alex Lacev... Up-and-coming second year scholar who impressed Richard Money in the 2010 pre-season to earn a squad number

The centre-back has vet to make a first team appearance but was an unused substitute at the Hatters' FA Cup third round tie with Southampton in January 2010

MIDFIELDERS

Pavel Besta... Assured, tenacious and a good passer of the ball, the Town snapped up the former Czech Under-21 international after impressing in the preseason friendly against Newcastle.

Besta began his career with his hometown side Banik Ostrava, and in a seven year period, helped them win the Czech league title in 2004 which led to appearances in the Champions League qualifying rounds and made a UEFA Cup appearance against Middlesbrough.

He joined the Hatters alongside fellow countryman Zdenek Kroca in August 2010 after a campaign in Slovakia with Ruzomberok.

Jake Howells... The young winger, who can also play at left-back, came through the ranks at Kenilworth Road and made his first team debut as a second half substitute in May 2008. He made his full debut in the Hatters colours away at Bradford City in October 2008

After making 36 appearances for the Hatters in the 2008/09 the England C international was rewarded for his efforts with a professional contract in May.

In his first season as a pro, Howells made huge strides with impressive performances on the left-side of midfield, ending the 2009/10 campaign with six goals, including his first senior goal in the incredible 4-3 win over Cambridge in September.

Godfrey Poku... Tenacious defensive midfielder who signed together with JJ O'Donnell from Blue Square South outfit St Albans City in January 2010 on an 18month contract.

A tough-tackling and no-nonsense midfielder, the Town beat off competition from several Football League clubs for his

He featured and impressed in the Hatters' reserves in 2009/10 and was an unused substitutes in the Blue Square Premier but made his debut as a substitute in the 1-0 win at Barrow in October 2010.

JJ O'Donnell... Tricky winger who joined the Town with St Albans team-mate Godfrey Poku in January 2010.

Also capable of playing in attack the youngster featured for the Hatters' reserve and youth teams during 2009/10.

Claude Gnakpa... A defender capable of playing centre back or full back, who joined on a free transfer in August 2008.

Having plied his trade across Europe with Montpellier HSC, Racing de Santander, Deportivo Alaves and FC Vaduz of Liechtenstein, Claude moved to Swindon Town for a brief spell.

He was then off again in July 2007 to Peterborough United and was a regular in the League 2 promotion winning side, starting 25 league games.

A favourite with the Kenilworth Road crowd the Frenchman scored the Hatters' winning goal in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final against Scunthorpe United in

He continued in fine style down the righthand side of midfield in 2009/10 finishing with nine goals including a remarkable second-half hat-trick in a 6-1 win at Ebbsfleet in March 2010.

Keith Keane... Having made his debut as a 16-year-old in November 2003. Keith Keane went on to enjoy an extended run in the side from February onwards whilst Kevin Foley was out injured.

Such was the contribution he made that the return of Foley didn't signal the end of his involvement at first-team level and he finished the season with 14 appearances under his belt, all this whilst still in the first year of his scholarship.

Another product of the youth system who regularly appeared for the Republic of Ireland at schoolboy level. He joined the Hatters at the age of nine having been scouted in local football, and made a rapid progression through the club's centre of excellence and youth teams, demonstrating enough potential to convince Mike Newell to give him his first

taste of senior action

Keith has featured most prominently on the right of midfield, bursting forward to great effect to provide many goals for himself and his team-mates.

Over the course of his career at Kenilworth Road Keane has proved to be one of the, if not the most, versatile players to pull on a Luton shirt.

Capable of playing right the way across the back four or in midfield the only positions he's not featured for the Town (yet) are in goal and up-front.

Out of contract at the end of the 2009/10 campaign the winner of the Hatters' Goal of the Season award delighted everyone at Kenilworth Road by penning a twoyear deal to keep him at the club until

Adam Newton... Ascot-born Adam became Mick Harford's second summer signing of 2009 after agreeing a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road following his release from Brentford

Predominantly used as a right winger, the pacey wide man is equally as comfortable at right-back

Adam started his career at West Ham United, coming through the Hammers' respected Academy only made three substitute appearances during his time at Upton Park before signing for Peterborough United in May 2002.

The former England Under 21 international went onto make a name for himself with the Posh making 249 appearances in six years at London Road going onto win promotion at the end of the 2007/08 campaign.

After leaving Peterborough at the end of the 2007/08 season, Adam was snapped by Andy Scott and Brentford where he helped the Bees to the League 2 title.

A St Kitts and Nevis international, he has spent time on-loan at Portsmouth, Notts County and Leyton Orient.

Andy Drury... A highly-rated box-to-box player who is capable of playing in any position across the midfield or in attack, Drury signed for the Hatters in the summer of 2010 from Conference Champions Stevenage.

He started his career at Sittingbourne as a youngster before making the short hop to sign for Gravesend and Northfleet (now Ebbsfleet United) in 2003.

Three successful years at Stonebridge Road followed before Lewes secured his signature in 2006 helping the Rooks lift the Conference South title in 2007/08.

...Luton Town FC

alerted the attentions of several clubs and Boro boss Graham Westley was quickest to move in the summer of 2008 to take him to Hertfordshire.

The driving force behind Stevenage's Play-Off campaign in 2008/09 that also saw the club win the FA Trophy, Drury scored six times but was the creator of many more.

It was a similarly successful season for the midfielder in 2009/10 earning rave reviews at Broadhall Way with his creative and industrious performances, dangerous set pieces and eye goal that cumulated in a super strike in the FA Trophy final against Barrow that Boro went onto lose.

Adam Watkins... Young midfielder, capable of playing in attack, who signed professional forms at Kenilworth Road in June 2010.

A self-confessed Hatters fan, he made his first team bow in a 1-0 defeat at Southampton in the FA Cup third round in January 2010.

He spent the tail end of the 2009/10 campaign on-loan at Arlesey Town.

FORWARDS

Kevin Gallen... A Shepherds Bush native, Gallen established himself as something of a legend at QPR. He notched up over 400 appearances and hit 97 goals for the R's in two spells spanning nearly 14 years. Gallen joined Huddersfield 2000 and after 10 goals in 30 starts for the Terriers, Gallen moved across Yorkshire to join Barnsley the following summer, but the call of West London saw him return to QPR within a few months. He then scored nine goals in 16 league starts for MK Dons before joining Luton on loan.

After a successful loan spell Gallen joined permanently in January 2009.

The striker enjoyed a prolific season in non-league football with his football know-how often too good for opposition defences. He struck-up a partnership with Tom Craddock and finished the campaign with 21 goals in all competitions.

Remarkably, given the length and success of his time in the game, it therefore came as a surprise when he revealed that his hat-trick in the 6-0 win over Grays Athletic in April 2010, was the first of his career.

Matthew Barnes-Homer... Prolific striker who joined the Hatters initially on a month's loan from Kidderminster Harriers before agreeing a two-and-a-half year contract to move permanently when the transfer window re-opened on 1st January 2010.

The powerful forward followed up his 21 goals in all competitions during 2008/09

with nine goals in 20 league appearances last term.

Barnes-Homer also enjoyed a dream start to his international career when he netted the winner on his debut for England C in their 2-1 win over Poland in November.

An energetic talent, the front man began his career as a trainee at Wolves before going on to lead something of a nomadic life prior to finding his feet at Kidderminster.

After leaving Molineux he tried his luck in the United States before returning to England and, following success with a clutch of non-league sides, he was snapped by Wycombe Wanderers.

He struggled to make an impression at Adam Park but, after being released at the end of the 2006/07 season, Harriers Manager Mark Yates beat off competition from a host of sides to capture his signature.

His form in front of goal at Kidderminster had alerted the attentions of a number of Football League teams but Barnes-Homer was suitably impressed by the Hatters' vision and became Richard Money's first signing for the club.

Danny Crow... A nippy poacher of a striker, Crow joined the Hatters from Cambridge United in May 2010 following the expiry of his contract at the Abbey Stadium.

The front man started his career as a trainee with Norwich City and made his senior bow in the Premier League for the Canaries in December 2004.

A loan spell at Northampton followed towards the end of the 2004/05 season before he was released by Norwich and signed for Peterborough in the summer of 2005, notching 17 goals in his debut season at London Road.

Following a short loan spell at Notts County, Crow was released by Posh and was snapped up by Cambridge in September 2008.

The energetic forward's strike-rate of 22 goals in 43 league starts won him many admirers and his 19 goals during 2009/10 saw him scoop the U's online Player of the Year award.

Dan Walker... Quick young forward capable of playing down the flanks who signed a one-year deal in July 2010 after impressing in pre-season in games for and against the Hatters.

Previously with Bedford Town, Walker has also played for Stony Stratford Town and Leighton Town.

He made his first team debut for the Hatters as substitute in a 3-0 win over AFC

Wimbledon in September 2010 before scoring his first senior goal against Forest Green a month later.

Taiwo Atieno... Kenyan international striker Taiwo originally signed in March 2010 until the end of the 2009/10 season after returning to the UK after a spell playing in Puerto Rico and America.

The big, strong frontman was released at the end of the campaign but after a deal in South Africa fell through Richard Money was first to re-sign him in on 3rd September until the end of the 2010/11

Starting his career as a scholar at Walsall he failed to make the breakthrough at the Bescot and was send out on loan gain first team experience to a number of Football League sides.

After failing to make the grade with the Saddlers he was snapped up by Tamworth and scored 12 goals in his first season with the Lambs before signing for the Puerto Rico Islanders in 2007.

Amari Morgan-Smith

Striker or wide man who arrived at Kenilworth Road as a free agent following a two-year spell at Ilkeston Town.

He put pen to paper on a two-year deal after two years with the Blue Square Bet North side in which he scored 34 goals in 77 starts

The fast and skilful frontman's impressive form for the Robins earned him a call-up to the England C squad at the end of last season, earning his first cap against the Republic of Ireland in May.

Wolverhampton-born Morgan-Smith started his career as a trainee with Wolves. He then signed for Crewe and then Stockport where he made one Football League appearance before moving to likeston.

Before the 2009/10 season began the striker impressed in a trial for Championship side Derby County and has since gone on to score three goals in seven appearances for likeston.

Earlier this season his former boss Kevin Wilson hailed the striker, who scored 23 goals last season, as the "hottest property in non-league football".

With huge interest in the forward, Town boss Richard Money was delighted to beat off competition from a number of Championship and League One sides for Morgan-Smith's signature.

And, hours after completing the paperwork, Morgan-Smith was thrust into action for his debut against Mansfield and scored in the 2-0 victory.



Captain's Log...

There is no point trying to dress it up any other way. Gifting AFC Wimbledon a goal after 29 seconds last Tuesday night represented the worst start to a game I can ever remember us making, regardless of who we have been up against.

All our preparation focused on the first 10-15 minutes and what we hoped to achieve, in terms of contesting every ball, winning some cruching tackles and generally letting Wimbledon know they were in a

They have travelled up from South London, and it's a bitterly cold night, so let's get in amongst them and let them have it. That was the idea, anyway, but it soon unravelled, as we did the exact opposite inside the opening minute.

It's not as if they carved us open with clever play, either, and that made it all the more galling. It was a really poor goal, a straightforward ball from back to front, and while we tried to decide who should take responsibility for it, Danny Kedwell nipped in to finish it off.

Fair play to Kedwell, his second, on the stroke of half-time, was a great finish and showed why he is a top striker who already had a stack of goals to his name, coming into the game.

But there was no excuse for the opener. We stayed in contention for most of the first half, but all our tactical and strategic approach had to change, because we suddenly found ourselves chasing the game.

It's unfortunate, to say the least, because when we looked at our run of games, against Wimbledon, Luton today and Crawley away next Saturday, our aim was to take as many points as we could. It may look a daunting run of fixtures, but we have been in decent form and had no intention of simply making the numbers up.

You could see why Wimbledon are up at the top. They knocked the ball

around crisply and accurately, but it still rankled that we gave them the platform to turn it on like that, instead of making it difficult for them and forcing them to scrap for everything they got.

When the second goal went in, it changed the tone of the half-time team talk dramatically, from still being in it to simply trying to salvage what we could. If we could pull one back, we might still be in with a shout. But we were facing a far steeper uphill battle than we should have, and the manager was not happy.

In fact, he was very upset-strokeangry at the manner in which we had conceded. He was absolutely fuming, and the general sense of frustration scarcely got any better when a debatable offside flag denied Michael Twiss, with enough time left for us to mount a late charge for a point.

I was off the pitch by then, after being substituted, and couldn't be sure from my vantage point, though my impression was it looked no worse than level. What I can say, is that I cannot imagine a striker of Michael's calibre seeing a cross is about to be delivered and allowing himself to be caught in an offside position.

Michael said afterwards that he had been in front of the last defender when he met the ball but behind him when the cross left Chrissie Denham's boot. In other words onside, and exactly what you would expect of a goalpoacher with his experience and scoring record.

It was good forward play, in my book, and such a shame it didn't count, because you never know what might have happened with a bit of momentum behind us. We would have gambled and thrown bodies forward, like others have done to us, and we could have ended up celebrating a hard-earned point,

instead of reflecting on


Wimbledon being a good side who really don't need a goal start.

Luton will no doubt come here with the intention of securing a winning position as early as possible, so they can withdraw one or two key players and rest them for their next game, but we must make sure we have none of that

We have to set ourselves up like we were supposed to on Tuesday night and let them know they are going to be in for a tough afternoon. You get the impression Luton probably feel they should already have climbed out of this division and reclaimed their place in the Football League. But they have not. The reality is, they remain a Conference club. A big one with a massive budget, but a Conference club, all the same.

They are clearly in a hurry to put that right, and a glance at the table shows they are handily placed to do it this season, but we must try and ensure it is not at our expense.

ALTY IN THE APL 1979/80

PART 36: FIVE STRING **SERENADE**

After negotiating eight cup ties in their opening nine fixtures of the nascent decade, Saturday, 16th February 1980 saw the Robins resume their pursuit of the Alliance Premier League (APL) title via a prospectively arduous assignment at York Street, the well-appointed home of Boston United FC.

In common with Alty (plus Worcester City and Gravesend & Northfleet), the Pilgrims boasted an unbeaten record on their own turf in the APL, having attained six wins and five draws from their 11 home league fixtures to date. The fourtimes Northern Premier League (NPL) Champions occupied eighth position in the APL table, five spots and five points respectively behind the third-placed Robins, whilst still possessing a game in hand on the Moss Lane club

The Alty manager, Tony Sanders, still deemed Boston United to be ambitious outsiders for the APL crown and he had more than a feeling that the Pilgrims represented the potential dark horse in the title race, an opinion that he had repeatedly expressed in various press interviews. In the 18th January 1980 edition of The Daily Telegraph, the regular column covering the APL had included the statement that: "Mr Sanders still expects Boston United to pose a major threat." This caveat was duly corroborated in the issue of the Altrincham Guardian published two days prior to the York Street encounter, in which the Robins' boss cautioned that the Pilgrims were "still in contention for

Since the dawn of the NPL back in August 1968, the Robins' visits to York Street had proved to be generally unprofitable. In the 11 league clashes between the two clubs staged in Lincolnshire, Alty's record read as follows: won: two; drawn: two; lost: seven; goals scored: 12; goals conceded: 21 and points accumulated: merely six out of a possible tally of 22.

Alty's debut at York Street had comprised the third match of the inaugural NPL season back on Saturday, 17th August 1968. Geoff Barrowcliffe had given the Pilgrims the lead on the half hour, eventually scoring after his initial penalty kick had been saved by Steve Fleet, the erstwhile Manchester City and Stockport County goalkeeper, Jackie Swindells

stemmed the Pilgrims' progress by equalising for the Robins five minutes later but a last minute header from Peter Thompson clinched the two points for the hosts in front of an attendance of

The evening of Monday, 30th September 1974 witnessed the Robins finally achieve their first NPL victory at York Street at the seventh time of asking. Watched by 1,042 spectators, Alty overcame a Boston United side that included the subsequent England Caretaker Manager and current Sheffield Wednesday Chairman, Howard Wilkinson, courtesy of strikes from lan Morris and the prolific John Hughes (his 10th goal in the opening 13 games of that season). This triumph marked the completion of a league double over the reigning NPL Champions, who had been annihilated 5-1 at Moss Lane just seven days earlier.

The 1978/79 NPL campaign saw the Robins accomplish their second league double over a Boston United team who were once again the presiding league Champions. The Pilgrims would eventually conclude this season in 6th spot in the league table, four places adrift of the Robins, and duly ascend into the

Saturday, 11th November 1978 marked the date of a memorable 4-1 success for the Robins at the Pilgrims' headquarters. Jeff Johnson put the visitors ahead after only 93 seconds but Jim Kabia levelled matters five minutes prior to half-time. However, a 62nd minute John Rogers strike and a Graham Heathcote brace (64 minutes and a 73rd minute penalty) duly secured an impressive win for Tony Sanders' charges. However, exactly how much of this action had been visible to the crowd of 1.640 remains questionable, as Alty diehard Bill Waterson recollects that York Street was largely enshrouded by dense fog on that particular afternoon and he spent the majority of the second half praying that the match would not be abandoned.

For the Robins' first APL fixture at York Street, Tony Sanders introduced several changes to the team which had defeated Runcorn 2-1 in that delayed Cheshire Senior Cup Quarter-Final at Moss Lane just three days previously. Stan Allan; John Davison and John Owens were all restored to Alty's starting XI, as were Jeff Johnson and club captain John King, both of whom had shaken off respective

injuries comprising an ankle knock and a burst blood vessel in the calf. Graham Heathcote was demoted to the role of substitute and Ivan Crosslev: Mickey Brooke: Graham Tobin and Phil Wilson were all omitted

This heavyweight contest between the Pilgrims and the Robins attracted a gate of 2,284 to York Street, which constituted Boston United's highest home attendance to date in the APL. Striving to gain their first league points of the decade, the Robins made a dream start by opening the scoring after merely 50 seconds of the first half had elapsed. The Pilgrims' midfielder, Gary Mallender, was dispossessed by Barry Whitbread and the latter's subsequent cross into the home side's penalty area was directed into the net from an acute angle by Jeff Johnson. who thereby registered his eighth goal of the season.

In the sixth minute, the Robins survived an anxious moment when Boston United's leading goalscorer, Bobby Brown, squandered a good chance to restore parity. However, Alty proceeded to double their advantage eleven minutes later, when the perceptive Barry Howard intercepted a careless backpass from Jim Kabia and duly slotted the ball into the net past the hosts' goalkeeper, Kevin Fox.

Barry Whitbread was booked for a foul on Neil Callery after 28 minutes and 60 seconds later it was 3-0 to the rampant Robins, as the Pilgrims were again the victims of another errant backpass, the blunder on this occasion being committed by full back Denis Leigh. Alty's leading goalscorer, John Rogers, was the latest beneficiary, as he pounced upon this gaffe and promptly bewitched Kevin Fox by virtue of an astute chip, which elicited his 12th strike in the APL and his 17th goal of the campaign in all competitions.

Two minutes prior to the interval, the Robins emphasised their supremacy even further, as Barry Howard conjured up the pick of the Alty goals. The mercurial winger beat two defenders and rounded the goalkeeper before claiming his second goal of the match, which increased his personal total for the season to 11, seven of which had been recorded in league fixtures.

The early stages of the second half failed to produce any much-needed respite for the beleaguered Boston United players

and their shellshocked supporters. Indeed, the Robins added a fifth goal after 51 minutes, when Barry Whitbread headed home a John Rogers cross from point blank range for his 15th goal for the club since his £6,400 transfer from Runcorn at the advent of October 1979.

As the game progressed towards its finale, the Robins eased off somewhat and. consequently, allowed the hosts to grab a couple of consolation goals. In the 66th minute, the Pilgrims' towering central defender. Dave Poplar, notched his seventh goal of the season and Bobby Brown's 83rd minute effort took the former Sheffield Wednesday striker's tally for the campaign up to 17.

Thus, Alty's breathtaking 5-2 drubbing of the Pilgrims signified that they had executed consecutive league doubles over their adversaries from Lincolnshire and, in the process, demolished Boston United's proud unbeaten home record in the APL.

Understandably, Tony Sanders' synopsis of events brimmed with elation at his team's accomplishment: "We put on one of our best displays of the season to inflict their first home defeat this term." This verdict was shared by Alty devotee Paul Murray, who duly reflects on Alty's own Boston tea party: "I was there and I remember it being totally unreal. I was used to us letting in four at Boston, after all. The first half was one of the most complete Alty performances ever."

The aforementioned Bill Waterson had undertaken his third visit to York Street and he was overjoyed to observe this gratifyingly comprehensive evisceration of Boston United. He recalls: "This match had a very different feel about it than the previous season's fixture. It is difficult to remember now just how dominant Boston United were in the early to mid-1970s. Indeed. I always used to feel that both themselves and Wigan Athletic were a much stronger bet for the NPL title than Alty, even when we were at our best. I do recollect that Boston invested heavily in making York Street reportedly the 'best ground in Non League football' and this diverted funds from the playing staff. So, from circa 1978/79 onwards, they had become a relatively weaker proposition on the field.

"Given that the home 3-0 victory over Boston United earlier in that 1979/80 season was our third successive win over the Pilgrims by that margin at Moss Lane and taking into account that we had been

indomitable in the league since the onset of October 1979 (except, alas, against teams whose name began with the letter 'N') I never doubted that we would win

"And, in fact, we stroked the ball around maiestically in the first half, as Boston chased shadows and we scored at will. It was much more like a visit to the Giant Axe: Northolme or the Moss Rose than a game against a formidable Non League side. "Great ground, rubbish team!" I commented (albeit somewhat sotto voce, admittedly) as we walked past a coven of inbred racist Lincolnshire thugs whilst departing from the stadium."

Notwithstanding Alty's vanquishing of Boston United, the Robins remained in third position in the APL table, having gleaned 33 points from their 23 fixtures to date. Leaders Weymouth had maintained their two point advantage over the Robins by dint of a 6-0 home trouncing of basement club Redditch United although Tony Sanders' men did still possess two games in hand on the Dorset club, Meanwhile, second-placed Bangor City's 1-0 win against Wealdstone at Farrar Road kept them just a single point ahead of Alty but having played five games more than the Robins.

Elsewhere, back at Moss Lane, Alty's recently-acquired goalkeeper, John Connaughton, had been making his bow for the club in a 1-1 draw between the Robins' second string and Everton 'A' in a Lancashire League fixture.

Tuesday, 19th February 1980 found the Robins exploring unknown territory, as they made their debut on the infamously sloping pitch at Barnet's Underhill stadium for the APL Cup Semi-Final First Leg against Barry Fry's side

The Hertfordshire club had progressed to this stage of the competition via a 2-0 home success versus Bath City and an ensuing 2-1 Quarter-Final Replay victory (after extra time) at Underhill against Nuneaton Borough, The Bees occupied 16th position in the APL table, having accrued just 18 points from their 23 league fixtures up to that point. Unusually for a team under the supervision of the ebullient Barry Fry, goals had been at a premium and they had only contrived to find the back of the net on 21 occasions in all of their league matches to date.

In the week prior to this second meeting between the Bees and the Robins, Barry Fry had endeavoured, in vain, to sign an

experienced player to bolster his young squad. His target had been Peter Simpson, the ex-Arsenal defender who had amassed 458 (+19 as sub) appearances for the Gunners and been a member of their 1970/71 league and FA Cup double-winning team.

Barnet's match programme stipulated their avowed objective for this First Leg clash: "We will be trying to build up a lead to take to Altrincham next Monday and, when one looks at our visitors' home record, it will probably have to be by two or three goals. This is a tall order but anything can happen in football."


Tony Sanders was obliged to invoke one amendment to the Alty side that had perpetrated that convincing away triumph at Boston United on the preceding Saturday, which saw Graham Tobin replace John Owens in central

The opening 45 minutes found the Robins kicking up the notorious Underhill gradient on a heavy and clingy surface. Early opportunities fell to both Barry Whitbread and Barry Howard, the latter testing the agility of the Bees' goalkeeper, Kevin Blackwell, after being set up by a leff Johnson pass.

However, the solitary goal of the contest didn't arrive until the 53rd minute, as the Robins duly emulated the scoreline of that premier meeting between the two clubs in an APL fixture staged at Moss Lane back on Monday, 26th November 1979. John Rogers pilfered the ball off a defender and his resulting cross picked out his skipper (and fellow Altrincham FC 'social club' guru) John King, who delighted in slamming the ball into the hosts' net from close range for his second goal in this particular competition (and his fourth goal of the season to date).

In front of 804 onlookers, the Robins created a pair of decent chances to extend their lead but a John Rogers drive was inaccurate and then a Jeff Johnson shot was cleared off the goal line. However, Alty did endure one late alarm, when Barnet's striker, Elwyn Roberts, latched on to a slack backpass from Barry Howard. His ensuing shot was parried by Alex Stepney before Mal Bailey interceded to clear the loose ball to safety off the Robins' goal line and thereby ensure that Alty would go into the following Monday's Semi-Final Second Leg having established a one goal cushion.

Where two or three are gathered together...

A fortnight ago there was a classic contrast in the attendances at our respective games. 7,003 people went to Kenilworth Road to see Luton play Bath City; meanwhile at Church Road, Hayes 274 spectators saw Hayes & Yeading United entertain the Robins - it should be pointed out that about 60 of those were Alty fans, which is a more than respectable percentage. Apart from raising the perennial question in my mind as to quite how the home club pays its way on gates like thata matter which is entirely the business of Hayes & Yeading, its board, backers and bankers, and nothing to do with you or me, of course - these gate figures left me wondering if we had ever played a game at this level in front of less people than were at Hayes or more than were at Luton two weeks ago.

To deal with these in reverse order - I recall a match at Layer Road, Colchester in April 1991 when both the U's and the Robins were in the running for promotion. Originally there was no question of my attending this game as I was due to be in charge of a school cricket match that morning; however, a snow-covered Oldham field on the Friday led to an entirely justifiable cancellation and a hurried examination of railway timetables (in the days before t'Internet!) resulting in the decision to give it a go - and hang the expense. Engineering work and a broken-down train in front of us caused 75 minutes' worth of delays on the way down to Euston and in the end I got to Colchester Station at 2.15 (having left home seven hours earlier!) and proceeded to the ground by taxi. My arrival was greeted with cries of "What the blue pencil are you doing here?" from

fellow-members of The Bench - with friends like that, as I've often thought, who needs enemies? - and we then settled down, after a bit of a rumpus before kick-off as the home club's segregation arrangements appeared to break down, to view a 1-1 draw which kept both sides in with a shout - though, as many will remember, Barnet finally won the title. The attendance was given on the day as 6,986 but was later corrected upwards to 7,221, which so far as I can discover is the largest crowd Alty have ever played before in this league, just beating the 7,090 at Cambridge for the last game of the 2008-09 season. Just to complete the story - another hour's worth of delays on the way back led to me getting home at 1.35 on the Sunday morning!

The 'booby prize' for lowest gate ever in a game involving Alty at this level does I think now go to Hayes & Yeading; the lowest Moss Lane gate I can find is 332 for a 1-0 win over Sutton United on a Wednesday night in early April 1989, and the previous lowest away from home appears to have been a gate of 317 at Merthyr in March 1992.

Alan Moorehouse...


...Fan of The Robins, Hatters and Boys in Black. Todays game is going to be a difficult one again for football fan Alan Moorhouse.

Alan, born and brought up in Sale, saw his first Alty game in 1961 when Moss Lane was graced by England international Tommy Banks. He has followed The Robins , his natural home team, to famous results in the league and to cup exploits at Everton, Tottenham, Liverpool and Luton, and to Wembley too. He recalls great Alty players of the past including Jackie Swindells, John Rogers, Jeff Johnson and Paul Showler. Alan moved to Bedfordshire in 1974 and adopted Luton Town as his home side. He handed the reins for supporting the Robins to his long time school friend David Bullock who has been a faithful regular at Moss lane ever since. Alan has also followed The Hatters to their great achievements and successes including the Littlewoods Cup win at Wembley in 1988, the recent new Wembley victory



over Scunthorpe in the Johnstones Paint final in 2008, and the great and fine decade in the highest flight and some great FA cup successes. He was there to cheer the great victory at Maine Road in 1982.He recalls great Hatters stars including Alan West, Paul Walsh, Mal Donaghy, Steve Foster, Mick Harford, and Ricky Hill. Interestingly, Alan recalls the great service both managers, as well as those of the past, have given to their





Famous but not for Altrincham



An occasional series of people who have served Altrincham AFC but made their name else where...

The announcement in the press in early October of the death of Lil Fagan aged 92 reminded us that her husband Joe was another former Altrincham player who went on to achieve fame elsewhere.

Joe Fagan was born in Liverpool on March 12th 1921 and spent his childhood in the Litherland area of the city and as a boy he watched both Everton and Liverpool play, although he preferred Anfield, he later recalled, "...as it had a better boys' pen". He was educated at St Elizabeth Central School, where he led the 1st XI to victory in the Daily Dispatch Trophy in 1935 before moving on as an amateur to Earlestown Bohemians. Playing for Bohemians as a reliable centre half, good in the air and solid on the ground. he caught the eye of several clubs. Although he was offered forms by Liverpool, in October 1938 he opted instead to join Manchester City. However, as with all his peers, Joe's playing career was severely hampered by the onset of war in 1939.

During the war Joe served his country in the Royal Navy but continued playing occasionally in the wartime league. It was during this time he first came into contact with Harry Catterick, a man who would later make an impact with Everton. Fagan eventually made his full official debut for City on New Year's Day 1947, nearly 9 years after signing for the club, helping the club attain promotion to the 1st division that he season. In the following four seasons he made 168 appearances, skippering the side for the last three.

In 1951, at the age of 30 Joe Fagan left Maine Road to become playermanager of part-timers Nelson, a job he combined with one inspecting gas meters in local factories. Under Fagan, Nelson were champions for a second time in 1951/52, this time scoring 139 goals and in 1952/53, Fagan's second and final season in charge Nelson finished in 5th place.

Joe then briefly returned to the professional game with Bradford Park Avenue before being appointed trainer at Rochdale in 1953, under the management of his old wartime friend Harry Catterick. In October 1954 Joe Joined Altrincham, playing at centre half and finished the season having scored once in 27 Cheshire County League games in addition to one league cup and two Cheshire Senior Cup games. That concluded Joe's playing career leaving him to concentrate on coaching

In May 1958, just 18 months before the arrival of Bill Shankly Fagan, on Harry Catterick's recommendation ioined Liverpool as assistant trainer. Bill Shankly had long been an admirer of Fagan's and had indeed tried to sign him when he was managing Grimsby when Fagan was playing for Manchester City. One of Shankly's first acts on arrival was to reassure the back room staff at Anfield that their positions were safe. It was the start of a footballing dynasty that Joe Fagan was to play a major role in.

After a spell looking after the reserves, Fagan was appointed first team trainer in 1971, and stepped up to chief coach in 1974 with the retirement of Shankly forcing a reshuffle. In 1979 he continued his move up the 'Boot Room' hierarchy by becoming assistant manager and was instrumental in helping to grow the club's ever increasing pile of silverware. Joe finally took the helm at

Livernool as manage 1983 on the retirement of Bob Paisley. The following two years from were astonishing with Joe leading the club to an unprecedented treble, a treble that included the League Championship and European Cup. which led to Joe being named 'Manager of the Year' in 1984, after just one year in charge, the only English manager to achieve this feat. The following season was to be a disappointment though as the club finished second in the league to a rejuvenated Everton. Fagan had already decided to guit as manager at the season's end but the tragic events of Heysel in May 1985 with the deaths of 39 Juventus supporters before the European Cup Final was destined to cast a dark shadow over his tenure as manager. In a game subsequently rendered meaningless by earlier events Liverpool were to lose the European Cup 1-0 and ended the season without a trophy.

Joe kept a low profile in retirement, although he returned occasionally to the Liverpool training ground at Melwood, especially when Roy Evans was in charge. Joe died in Liverpool 30 June 2001.

Note* Joe's son Michael also played for Altrincham during 84/85 & 85/86, scoring 7 goals in 56 games, with the most notable achievement being his winning goal in the 1-0 FA Cup win over Blackpool.





Press Box Banter...

From our own Ken McKenna tearing his hair out to Blackpool's Ian Holloway 'getting a bit wiggy', you see managers putting themselves through it time and again, and you wonder why.

What motivates them to stand in the firing line - risking ridicule from disgruntled supporters, temper tantrums from players they have substituted and the sack from fickle directors - and still keep coming back for more?

Kick-off on matchdays is supposed to be the highlight of their week, but you would never guess it from watching them prowling the technical area for 90 tension-filled minutes, kicking every ball and disputing every decision.

Winning brings its own reward, a buzz that lasts a few minutes until the realisation dawns that another game is fast approaching, but defeat merely reinforces the view that, never mind goalkeepers, you have to be slightly mad to be a manager.

Our Ken had described, in the most convivial of chats shortly after the Cheshire Senior Cup tie with Hyde had been postponed, the effect losing has on him, by saying 'I hate it.'

To what extent became apparent a week later, after the AFC Wimbledon game at Moss Lane. A defensive mix-up in the first minute had gifted one of the Blue Square Bet Premier's top teams the sort of flying start Ken had meticulously planned against, and the Sale and Altrincham Messenger wanted his response before the evening was out.

Deadlines dictated that it wouldn't wait until the morning, and Ken, with a professionalism befitting a largely fulltime league like ours, stood in the corridor and answered each and every question. Through gritted teeth and with eyes that blazed with anger, it has to be said.

The hurt and annoyance at a result that could conceivably have been avoided was all too evident, as he reflected on Danny Kedwell's 29-second opener and said: 'Honestly, you'd be tearing your hair out at something like on a Sunday morning, never mind at this level.'

Managers' success rates may vary enormously - and Ken's returns so far must put him up among the best in our division, given the disparity over budgets and time spent with players - yet they all seem to share the same passion.

They go on about three games in a week being too much for young men who are in their prime, physically, yet they happily subject themselves to that punishing workload. It's not quite the same, I know, but while players can at least catch their breath, in between bouts of action, the likes of Gordon Strachan, David Moyes, Tony Pulis and Holloway seem to be bouncing round the side of the pitch non-stop, living and re-enacting every moment.

There is no respite for the men in charge, and if you doubt the intensity of their involvement, just think how many times an aerial chance has been missed, and the television camera has panned to the bench to show the manager staring at the ball coming over, tensing his neck muscles and then powering home an imaginary header, as though he's got number nine on his back, rather than his striker.

They must be drained, mentally and physically, by the final whistle, and it is no wonder their quotes so often fill the following morning's back pages, when they are wheeled out before the media, with all the flashpoints, controversy, misfortunes and perceived injustices still swirling through their minds.

The adrenalin is still flowing, as was evident when Holloway was asked about his 10 team changes, after Aston Villa snatched a last-gasp winner with a header that should have been cleared off the line, and whether he feared it could lead to an FA fine.

The Blackpool boss is every football reporter's dream - combustible and quoteable - and he duly let fly with a typically impassioned defence of his selection policy and glowing tribute for

those who had stepped in, followed by an apology of sorts, as he added: 'It's not surprising I get a bit wiggy with questions like that.'

Holloway's vocabulary is like no other, but he broke new ground with that one. It was clear what he meant, but no-one could quite work out the origins of 'wiggy', other than surmising it may have sprung from an outburst like his leading to a retort of 'keep your hair on.' At least Holloway has the fairytale triumph of Blackpool's elevation to the Barclays Premier League, and further examples this season of odds being defied, to compensate for the odd postmatch irritation.

You look at others and wonder what keeps them going. Mark McGhee, for example. Already no stranger to the sack, it loomed again after a 9-0 thrashing at Celtic. Another defeat, a couple of days later, would seal his fate, the rumour mill insisted, and it duly materialsed, as Terry Butcher took Inverness to Aberdeen and plotted a 2-1 win

They don't come any more ferociously committed than former England centreback Butcher. Legend has it he fired himself up for games at Ipswich by head-butting the dressing room walls shortly before going out.

Yet he was almost apologetic at Pittodrie, as he walked hesitantly towards the home bench afterwards for the most low-key of handshakes. McGhee remained defiant, amid the volley of questions about his future, but the look said it all.

He knew he was on his way, but he knew just as surely he would put his name forward the next time a vacancy arose. That's the hold the job has on managers, and it won't let go.
