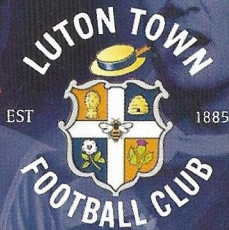

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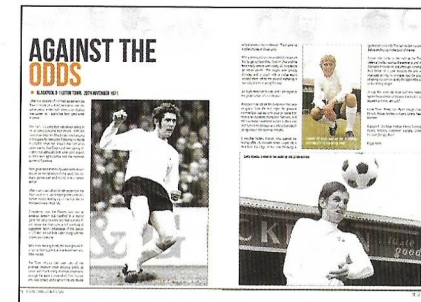
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Cover picture: Luton supporters try to gain any vantage point possible to see the Town take on Tottenham in 1949.

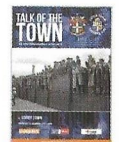
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# MONEY TALK

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road for tonight's important FA Cup replay against Corby Town.

I'd like to welcome Graham Drury and his players plus the directors, staff and supporters from Corby for this evening's tie.

We were given a tough test at the Rockingham Triangle and we are expecting another difficult match here at Kenilworth Road.

Graham will have prepared his side to cause an upset and we are well aware of the threat they will pose. The magic of the FA Cup will give the Corby players that extra incentive of causing an upset, as will the prospect of earning a place in the second round.

That is a prize that we are determined to take too with either Barnet or Charlton waiting for the winners in the next round.

I thought we deservedly earned ourselves a replay in the original tie on an afternoon when we were missing a number of key personnel through injury.

After going behind we dominated and could have easily scored enough goals in the first half to win the game but fine goalkeeping thwarted us.

As ever the FA Cup threw up a number of shocks that afternoon so we were just happy to get our names in the hat for the second round and avoid results like the one Gillingham suffered at the hands of Dover.

It further goes to show the quality of teams and players that ply their in non-league football as well as the spirit and passion that the competition brings out.

We have to be on our guard to make sure we aren't on the receiving end of a cup shock this evening. If we are professional and patient, like we were against St Albans in the last round, I have every confidence in this group of players.

It's been a while since we were last at Kenilworth Road but, with cup tie at Corby in between, we have continued to make good progress in the league with two wins from the last three games.

That included victories over Bath City, in our last match here, as well as Saturday's excellent win at Altrincham.

Between those wins was the defeat at Wrexham last Thursday when we battled against the elements but could not find a goal which we would have thoroughly deserved.

A point, in those wet and windy conditions, would have been reward for both teams but unfortunately an error led to their winning goal as early as the fifth minute.

36 hours later we bounced back really well with three valuable points at Altrincham.

Moss Lane is never an easy place to go and Altrincham are always tough opponents - as we have found out over the past 12 months.

There was a lot of talk about our winning goal from Alex Lawless being controversial but from my view the ball was at least a yard over the line and capped a hard-working and effective performance from the team.

We felt it was the right decision to play Thursday/Saturday given the geographical proximity between Wrexham and Altrincham

and while we would have liked to have picked up more than three points I was delighted with the way the players performed across the two matches.

Our medical staff need to take a lot of credit for the hard work they have done over the past week in aiding the players' recovery and rehabilitation from three tough away games in the space of a fortnight.

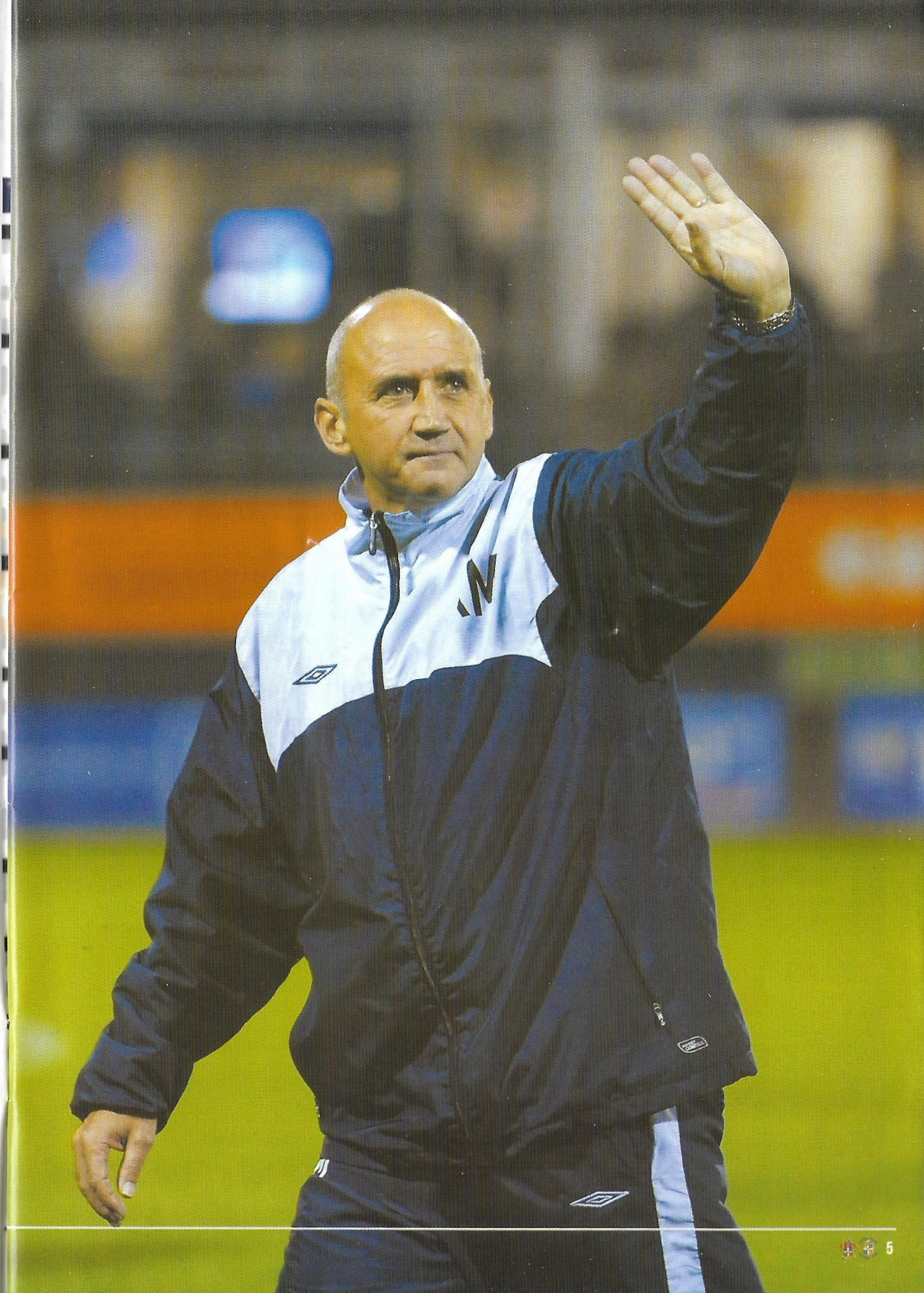
Finally I'd like to welcome Alex Lawless to the club. Those supporters who witnessed our last two matches will have seen already what qualities Alex will bring us.

After three consecutive away trips, it's certainly good to be back home. The televised match at Wrexham was a lottery.

Richard Money and Gary Brabin said beforehand that it was likely to be decided by a mistake because of the viciously high winds and they were right.

Sadly, we were the victims, but we still did enough to have got something out of it, so the players and all of us were bitterly disappointed to lose. Happily, the decision to stay on in the North West and play Altrincham on Saturday, rather than the Sunday, paid off. We played some excellent stuff and, although the score was only 1-0 to us, it was a comfortable victory.

We are now lying in third place, just two points off the top. We'll settle for that at this stage, but make no mistake, we are seriously ambitious and we are going all out for automatic promotion.

We've made yet another signing, as you know, and this seems a good moment to welcome Alex Lawless from York City.

He's already made an impression in the dressing room and on the field. Of course, he scored the all important winner at Altrincham and I'm sure he'll become a vital part of our squad. All the best to you Alex, it's good to have you with us.

And so to the FA Cup. If history is anything to go by, we need to be on our mettle! Older fans like myself need no reminding of the dismal (from our point of view!) events of December 1965,

when, before a crowd of 13,284, we were dumped out of the competition by Corby here at Kenilworth Road.

That too was a replay after we'd drawn at Corby. Let's hope that didn't set a precedent and may there be no repeat tonight!

A quick recap of that era. It was the year that Sir Winston Churchill died, Sir Stanley Matthews played his final top flight football match at the age of 50 (yes, astonishing, isn't it?), the Sound of Music premiered and, besides bringing out Help! and Rubber Soul, the Beatles became MBEs and met Elvis for the one and only time!

The Luton side that night contained the likes of John O'Rourke, Matt Woods, Ray Whittaker, goalkeeper Tony Read, playing upfront, and the

timeless, legendary John Moore in his very earliest days here at Kenilworth Road.

Things were pretty grim at that time after we'd crashed down the divisions. We almost won promotion that season but missed out after a dispute with the players. We sailed close to the bottom of the Fourth Division the following season, but then came the new dawn under Allan Brown and some glorious years as we headed back up the leagues.

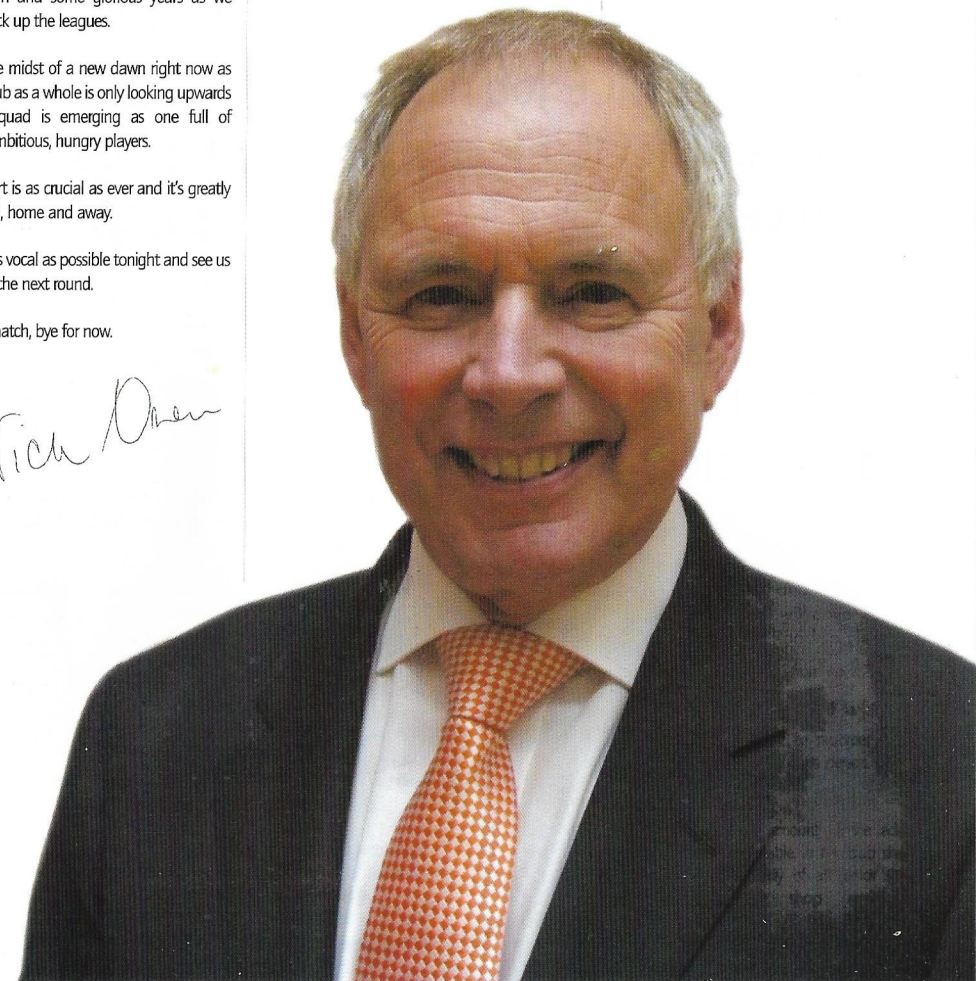
We're in the midst of a new dawn right now as well. The club as a whole is only looking upwards and the squad is emerging as one full of talented, ambitious, hungry players.

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## CAPTAIN SPEAKING

After three successive away fixtures it is good to be back at Kenilworth Road for the first of two home games in four days, starting with tonight's FA Cup replay with Corby Town.

Once more we go into this evening's game full of confidence having picked up three vital points in the league following the 1-0 win at Altrincham.

Looking back to our last meeting with Corby we were frustrated to find their goalkeeper in such inspired form. That day he made several excellent saves to keep them in the lead.

But we showed the determination required to haul ourselves level and to earn another shot at progressing to the second round where either Barnet or Charlton await.

We hope that we succeed tonight because we'd like to test ourselves against Football League opposition.

Last season, we enjoyed a successful run in this competition, with wins over Grays, Rochdale and Rotherham rewarding us with a place in the hat for the third round where we were unlucky not to take Southampton to a replay.

Our performances, especially in both games against Rochdale and Rotherham, highlighted the small difference between sides in the Football League and in the Blue Square Bet Premier.

We weren't surprised that both Rochdale, Rotherham and Southampton all went onto enjoy success in one way or another and it is a testament to the way we played and our desire to succeed against sides in the league above us.

Corby may be a league below us but come the first whistle this evening it will be 11 versus 11 - just like it was in the first game at their place.

Following positive results in the past week our confidence has been sky high but we must not get too over-confident today because that may lead to our downfall.

The pitch at Corby wasn't the greatest to play football on but that will be a different story tonight because our pitch has been in fantastic condition so all credit to the ground staff for their hard work. It really does make a difference.

Our last two league fixtures have seen mixed results and I thought after being frustrated by Wrexham on a wet and windy night last Thursday our performance at Altrincham on Saturday was excellent.

Altrincham might be bottom of the table but as we know, they are a very tough nut to crack, especially on their home turf.

It was great to see Alex Lawless hit the winner. Although I was a long way from the incident I don't think there was any doubt about the goal but it was strange the way in which the officials signalled for the goal. If we were in Altrincham's shoes we'd probably be aggrieved too.

But it was no more than we deserved. It was a solid display and as a defender it was pleasing that we restricted them to shots from distance and Mark Tyler was rarely troubled.

That was our second game in the space of 36 hours but we looked and felt as fresh

as we've ever done and that is down to no small part of the medical staff who have made sure we have recovered properly and for that we are grateful.

I'd also like to thank all the supporters who turned out for all three away games, especially those at Wrexham, plus everyone who made the 125th anniversary celebrations against Bath so special the last time we were at Kenilworth Road.

# INTRODUCING CORBY TOWN

## HISTORY

Formed in 1948, the Club started out playing in the United Counties League and were champions of that competition in 1950/51 and 1951/52.

They then switched to the Midland League and almost completed a hat-trick of league titles, finishing as runners-up to Nottingham Forest Reserves in 1952/53 after losing a last game of the season decider.

Corby remained in the Midland League for six years and although they never quite reached the heights of that first season they did enjoy some successful times.

In 1954/55 they reached the first round proper of the FA Cup for the first time ever and were beaten 2-0 at home by Watford in front of a crowd of 6,763. In 1956/57 the Steelmen beat Gainsborough Trinity 1-0 at Occupation Road in a Midland League fixture – still the club's record victory.

In 1958 Corby moved to the Southern League, where they remained until 2009. During their time in this competition the Steelmen scaled the heights of topping the Premier Division in 1965 and finally winning the title in 2009 and plunged to the depths of finishing bottom of the league on several occasions.

In 1963/64 Corby lifted the Merit Cup as the highest scoring team in the Southern League and repeated the feat during their 1990/91 promotion campaign. During their time in the competition they have also played in Division One (North), Division One (West), Division One (East), Southern Division and Midland Division.

For the first time in their history Corby played some of their home games outside the town at the start of the 2005/06 season. Work at Rockingham Triangle meant that the Steelmen played their opening games at Kettering Town's Rockingham Road ground. This did not prevent them from returning to the Southern League Premier Division after an 11 year absence by finishing as runners-up to Boreham Wood in Division One East.

As well as being their 62nd season, the current

campaign marks the 45th anniversary of the club's greatest achievement: knocking the Hatters out of the FA Cup in a second round replay at Kenilworth Road.

The Steelmen moved to their current Rockingham Triangle ground on the outskirts of the town in 1985 having previously played at Occupation Road since their formation. Work has recently begun on a new ground adjacent to the current location and the club hope to be playing on the new pitch by the end of the current season.

## GOALKEEPERS

### JACK DRURY

Highly-rated youth team goalkeeper who has joined the first team squad for the current season.

### CHRIS MACKENZIE

A Northampton-born goalkeeper who originally joined Corby as a teenager from Higham Town in 1990 and made his first team debut in November of that year. Took over as first choice goalkeeper in 1992/93 and his impressive form earned him trials with Derby County and, in the summer of 1994, a move to Hereford United. Since then Chris has played for Rothwell Town (loan), Rushden & Diamonds (loan), Farnborough, Leyton Orient, Nuneaton Borough, Telford United, Chester City, Shrewsbury, Kidderminster and Hinckley United – where he scooped a hat-trick of Player of the Year awards last season. Rejoined Corby during the summer.

## DEFENDERS

### ASA CHARLTON

A full-back born in Cosford, Asa had a spell on the books of Stoke City as a youngster and then joined Kidderminster Hamiers. Since then he has played for Willenhall, Redditch United and Telford twice, as well as Sandwell Borough, Rushall Olympic, Stourport Swifts, Worcester City, Halesowen Town, Mansfield Town and Hednesford Town. Was captain at Redditch last season and joined Corby in the summer.

### LIAM DOLMAN

A Brixworth-born centre back who is a strong tackler, good in the air and distributes the ball

## MEET THE MANAGER:

### GRAHAM DRURY

Graham was a reserve team player at Grantham Town under Martin O'Neill and also played for Harrowby United and Boume Town.

He began his managerial career with Sunday side Harrowby Athletic and in seven years with them he won a total of 16 trophies.

He also led Bottesford to promotion in the Notts Alliance before having a successful four-year stint with Harrowby in the United Counties League.

During his time with the Arrows he steered them into the Premier Division for the first time in their history.

Graham was appointed manager of Stamford in May 2005 and in his first season with the Daniels he led them to promotion to the Southern League Premier Division via the Division One Play-Offs.

In 2006/07 Stamford finished in a creditable eighth position in the Premier Division but his team building plans for the 2007/08 campaign were thrown into disarray when the club was switched to the Unibond League.

After a difficult start Stamford got to grips with their new surroundings and they were ninth in the table when Graham, and his assistant Paul Holden, switched to Corby Town in January, 2008.

Following his arrival he lifted the Steelmen out of the relegation zone and after rebuilding the team he led Corby to the Southern League Premier Division championship last season.

well. He began as a trainee with Northampton and signed his first professional contract in July 2006. He gained vital experience with loan spells at Aylesbury United, Bishops Cleeve and Kettering during 2005/06. After making his debut in an LDV Trophy tie in October 2005 Liam appeared briefly in Northampton's first team in 2006/07 and then established a more regular place at the heart of the Cobblers defence the following season. He was released from Sixfields at the end of 2008/09 and signed for Kidderminster in August 2009. He arrived at Corby on a month's loan in February 2010 and has now signed permanently for the Steelmen.

### PHIL CULLIVER

Commanding 6ft 2in-tall centre half who joined Corby in December 2008 and scored once in 23 appearances during the Southern League championship run in 2008/09. Phil began his career at Middlesbrough and had loan spells at Blackpool, Carlisle and Bournemouth. After leaving Middlesbrough he played for Rushden & Diamonds and Hereford United.

### CHRIS HOPE

The other half of Corby's experienced central defensive partnership, 36-year-old Chris was born in Sheffield and began his career with Darlington Juniors before signing for Nottingham Forest in September 1990. Had a loan spell with Kettering Town in 1992/93 and in July 1993 he was transferred to Scunthorpe. In July 2000 a £250,000 fee took him to Gillingham, where he was an ever present in his first three seasons. Following his release by the Gills Chris joined Rushden & Diamonds in July 2006. During three seasons at Nene Park he scored 11 goals in 132 appearances for Diamonds and in 2008/09 took on the added responsibility of player/coach. He also picked up a couple of Player of the Year awards but rejected the terms offered to him in the summer and was snapped up by Graham Drury in June 2009.

### DANNY PITHAM

A full-back or central defender who was with Coventry City and Burnley as a youngster. He has also had two spells with Hinckley United and one piece with Nuneaton and Bedworth. Joined Corby Town from Hinckley in the summer.

### PHILIP WATT

A central defender or left-back who appeared in the first team at Lincoln City and also had a spell on loan at Grantham Town. Phil was one of Graham Drury's first signings for Corby when he joined on a month's loan from Lincoln City in January 2008. Was signed on a permanent basis after having his contract at Lincoln cancelled and made 39 appearances in the 2008/09 Southern League championship success.

### DEAN WEST

Experienced 36-year-old right-back who joined Corby in July 2008 from Kings Lynn. Dean made his full Football League debut for Lincoln City at the age of 17. Also played professionally for Bury, Burnley and Boston United. Had an excellent first season as a Steelman, making 48 appearances and being voted the Supporters' Player of the Year.

## MIDFIELDERS

### ANDY GOODING

Another summer arrival from Hinckley United, Andy began his career with Coventry and played alongside Theo Walcott for England Under-19s. He had spells on loan to Rushden & Diamonds and Burton Albion and following his release by Coventry he joined Hinckley in 2008.

### ANDY HALL

An exciting rightsided player who arrived at Corby in the summer having begun his career as a trainee with Coventry. Following his release from the Sky Blues Andy joined Kettering and then had a spell with Halesowen Town before joining Hinckley United in 2008.

### RICHARD LAVERY

A strong tackling midfielder player who was born in Coventry, Richard has traveled around the Midlands' non-league scene having played for Bedworth, Hinckley Athletic, Nuneaton Borough, Stratford Town, Massey Ferguson, Atherstone United, Tamworth, Hinckley United and Telford. Was captain of Hinckley last season and came to Corby in the summer.

### STEVE TOWERS

Steve played in the first team at Oadby Town as a teenager and then had a spell with Rothwell Town. He first joined Corby in 2006 and was voted Player of the Year for 2006/07. He signed for Graham Drury at Stamford and picked up another Player of the Year award there in 2007/08. Steve made a welcome return to Corby in May, 2008 and picked up the Managers' Player of the Year accolade after scoring nine goals in 48 appearances in our Southern League championship success in 2008/09.

### ADAM WEBSTER

Born in Leicester, Adam started out in the Leicester Senior League with Thurmaston and was then snapped up by Notts County. Gained limited first team experience at Meadow Lane before joining Bedworth United and then having seven prolific years with Worcester City. Continued to score regularly following a move to Hinckley United and it is hoped he can carry on that form now he is a Steelman.

## STRIKERS

### SIMON BROWN

An extensively-travelled forward born in West Bromwich. Having started out with West Brom he has since had spells with Kidderminster, Mansfield, Wrexham, Rushden & Diamonds, York City, Wrexham and Eastwood Town. Joined Corby Town in the summer.

### STEVE DIGGIN

A 21-year-old Northampton-born striker signed in June 2007 from Cogenhoe United where he had been a prolific goal scorer in 2006/07. To date 'Digger' has an impressive strike rate for the Steelmen, being our top scorer in his first two seasons with 30 and 25 goals respectively. This form earned him both the Supporters' Player of the Year and Players' Player of the Year awards in 2007/08. Was previously with Kings Lynn.

### MICHAEL FREW

Michael was with Peterborough United as a scholar. He then had a prolific spell at Yaxley which earned him a trial with Lincoln City and a move to Nuneaton Borough. Has also played for Hucknall Town, Kings Lynn, Cambridge City, Histon and Brackley Town. He arrived at Corby Town in the summer.

### NATHAN JARMAN

Scunthorpe-born forward who joined Barnsley as a trainee and signed his first professional contract in May 2005. He made 19 first team appearances for the Tykes and also had a loan spell with Bury before joining Grimsby Town on a free transfer in September 2007. Gained significant Football League experience during his three years with Grimsby and came to Corby Town in the summer.

### BEN MACKAY

Joined Corby from the latter in the summer having begun his career in the Coventry City Academy and became the club's youngest ever first team player when he made his debut as a 16-year-old. He also played for Irish club Linfield before making his name in non-league circles as a prolific goalscorer with Leamington and Brackley Town.

### JAMIE MCGHEE

A 19-year-old winger born in Grantham. Jamie made his Football League debut for Mansfield Town as a 17-year-old in 2006/07 but didn't appear in the first team the following season, at the end of which the Stags lost their Football League status. Speedy, skilful and direct, he joined Corby Town in June 2009.

### GLENN WALKER

A fast and skilful left winger who joined Corby from Banbury United in January 2010. Started the 2009/10 season with Long Buckby.

The match at Kenilworth Road on Saturday 18th December will now kickoff at midday instead of 3pm.

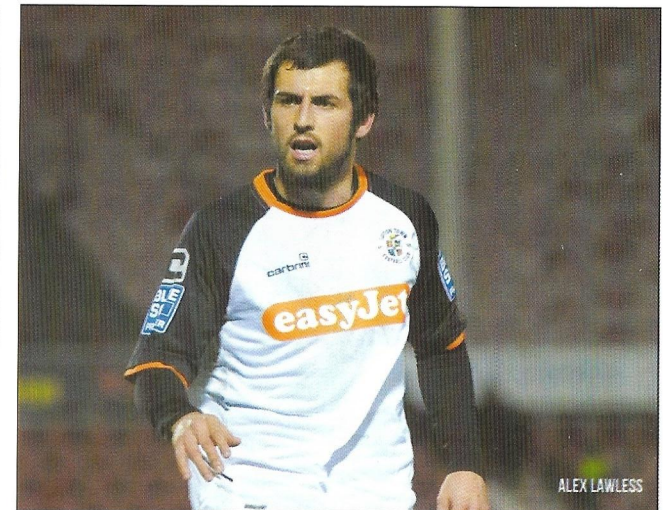

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# COVER STORY

● LUTON SUPPORTERS TRY TO GAIN ANY VANTAGE POINT POSSIBLE TO SEE THE TOWN TAKE ON TOTTENHAM IN 1949.



Immediate postwar Britain was said to be cold, grey and miserable. Troops returning from all corners of the world found bomb sites, power cuts and ration books.

Everyone needed some cheering up and with entertainment at a premium, few people had television remember, football enjoyed a boom time.

The Hatters were in the old Division Two and crowds flocked to Kenilworth Road, none more so than when the aristocrats from North London, Tottenham, rolled into town.

As well as attracting large support, Spurs were our closest neighbours at the time and so it was a near certainty that the ground record

would be smashed each time they visited.

The Kenilworth Road record stood at 25,746 for the visit of Swindon in the FA Cup in 1938 but Spurs attracted 26,362 for their first post-war visit in 1946.

The following season the record was broken again when 26,496 squeezed in and although the crowd was a little down in 1948/49 a massive 27,319 were shoehorned in on 22nd October 1949, although some spectators could not find a spot to stand on the terraces and so had to make do with balancing on the corrugated iron fence which separated the ground from a long drop to the railway line. No health and safety in those days!

For the record, Tottenham were all over the Town in the first half with their 'push and run' football but tended to over elaborate and only had one goal, scored by Sonny Walters after 29 minutes, to show for their superiority by the interval.

A strong talking to by manager George Martin at halftime had the desired effect as George Stobbart levelled on 53 minutes and from then on the game could have gone either way but finished in an honourable draw.

That was to be the parting of the ways for a while as Tottenham won Division Two that season before winning the League Championship the following year.

# AGAINST THE ODDS

● BLACKPOOL 0-1 LUTON TOWN. 20TH NOVEMBER 1971.

After four seasons of non-stop excitement the Town's hopes of a third promotion over the same period ended with three poor displays over Easter 1971, but it had been good while it lasted.

The 1971/72 campaign was always going to be an anticlimax and so it proved. With ace marksman Malcolm Macdonald now banging in the goals for Newcastle following his record £165,000 move, the striker's role had been taken over by Don Givens and new signing Vic Halom but although both were good players in their own right neither had the explosive power of Supremac.

With goals hard to come by, extra pressure was placed on the defence with the result that too many games were ending 00 or in a narrow defeat.

After a win over Fulham in late September the Town went on a run of eight games without a further victory leading up to the first visit to Blackpool since 1959/60.

Considering that the Hatters had lost at eventual bottom club Watford in a dismal game the previous week and had slumped to just above the drop zone, a full trainload of supporters, taking advantage of the special £1.25 fare, set out from Luton along with the players and directors.

With snow starting to fall, the train ground to a halt at Warrington due to a derailment and there we sat.

The Town officials had been told of the potential problem when stopping briefly at Crewe and coach Jimmy Andrews telephoned through the team to centre-half Chris Nicholl who was already at the ground having stayed



SCORER OF THE ALL-IMPORTANT GOAL, DON GIVENS

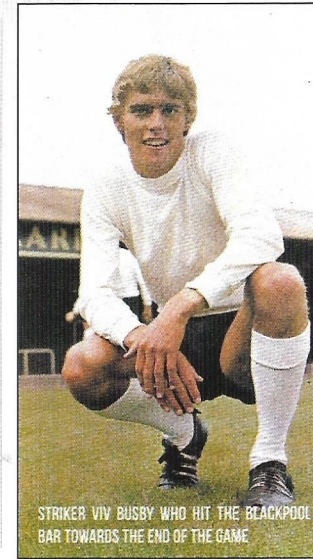
with relatives in the north-west. There were no mobile phones in those days!

Blackpool had not set the division on fire since relegation from the top flight the previous summer but had lost only once at home that season, to eventual champions Norwich, and still had some household names in their side with Tommy Hutchinson and Micky Burns both going close in the opening minutes.

It was the Hatters, though, who opened the scoring after 35 minutes when Givens hit a shot from the edge of the area following a

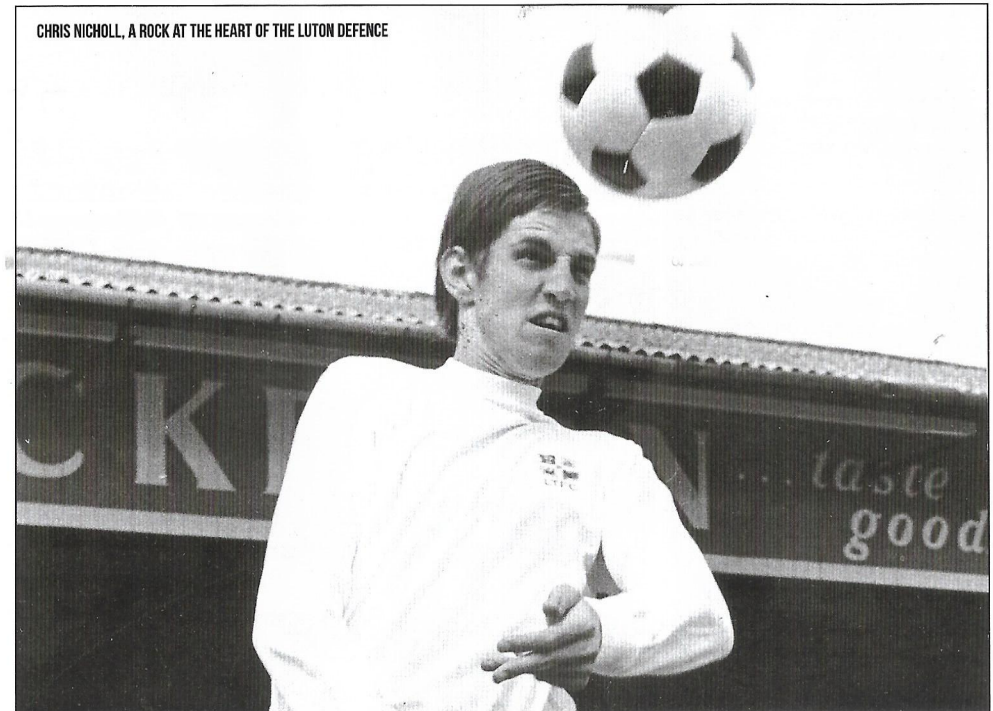
To cap the 'Train ride from Hell' the heating system broke down on the way home and I can assure you it was very cold!

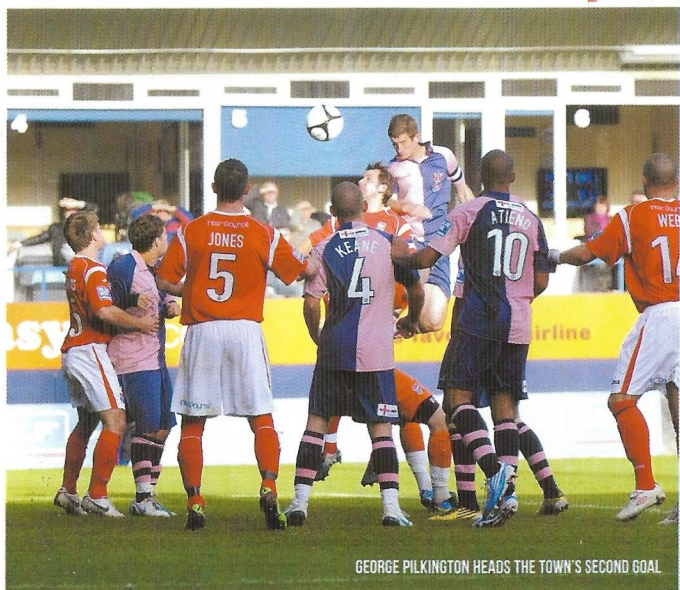

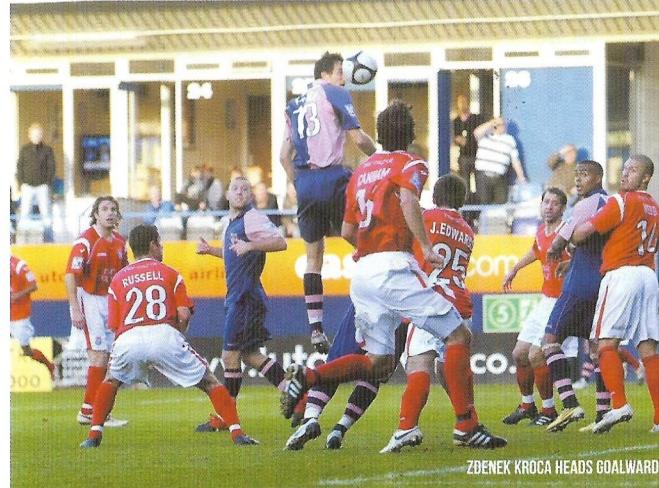

## MATCH REPORT

The Town notched their sixth win in seven matches to go three points behind the league leaders as they marked their 125th anniversary weekend with a victory.

On a day of poignant celebration on the eve of the Hatters' first competitive game in 1885, it was three goals in a 18 minute spell that proved to be the difference.

Danny Crow, George Pilkington, Taiwo Atieno put the Hatters in command at the break as the goals and smiles flowed before the Romans grabbed a consolation in what was a low-key second 45 minutes.

With the Town support still flooding through the turnstiles they almost missed a goal within the first 20 seconds when Atieno saw an effort hacked off the line.

Crow and Atieno both went close to breaking the deadlock but that changed on 16 minutes when Andy Drury was able to slam down the right flank, cut inside and arrow a shot goalwards from 22 yards that was split by Ryan Robinson in the Bath goal and Crow pounced on the loose ball to poke home the opener.

One became two 12 minutes later when Pilkington rose highest above everyone at the back-post to nod home an Drury corner.

With the Town's confidence flowing, Bath had no answer and six minutes later Atieno got off the mark for the season when rounding off a fine move, taking a pass from Crow in his stride to sweep home the third goal of the afternoon.

The second half was a different story, Bath pulled a goal back through substitute Lee Phillips on 65 minutes, after he got the better of Zdenek Kroca and slotted past Mark Tyler.

Following that mini-setback though the Hatters upped the ante in search of a fourth with Barnes-Homer, Drury and Pilkington all missing chances but in the end they had to settle for three on a day of celebration.

The skipper notched his fourth goal of the season - the 10th of his Hatters career - to double the lead in what was another solid display at the heart of the defence.

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# POST-MATCH REACTION



A 3-1 success over Bath proved the perfect way for the Town to celebrate 125 years of history. The first half performance from the current crop of Hatters players paid the perfect homage to their predecessors, some of whom were at Kenilworth Road to witness it, as Luton made it three home wins in a row.

"It was a very proud moment for all the guys," George Pilkington explained after the match, as he reflected on a special day for everyone involved. "Obviously there is such a massive history here at Luton Town and 125 years is brilliant.

"The club has had ups and downs over the last few years but we're heading in the right direction now and got a good result against Bath City."

This was certainly true as Town dominated the

opening 45 minutes with goals from Danny Crow, Pilkington and Taiwo Atieno putting Luton 3-0 up at the break but things didn't flow so well after the break as the Hatters skipper revealed.

"It probably wasn't the performance we were looking for in the second half but I think we're probably due one of those because we've been doing well as of late, so we must move onto the next game now."

After the interval newly-promoted Bath City came back into the game and frustrated the Hatters with a solid defensive display and even pulled a goal back through Lee Phillips midway through the half.

And whilst Pilkington was disappointed the side could not keep a clean sheet, it was earning three points that mattered most.

"They set out really defensively and their game plan went out the window in the first half, we managed to get a few goals and were really comfortable in the second half," he said.

"But they made a couple of subs, which gave them more up top, and their defenders got a lot of the ball for them and got them playing a bit.

"At 3-0 you fancy yourself to win the game but obviously to lose in the second period 1-0 is disappointing but we won't read too much into it as we move onto the next game.

"We've just got to keep pushing and pushing. The table is tight with only a few points gap between the top six or seven.

"So it's important we keep winning, but we should keep focusing on what we're doing more than everybody else and hopefully we can catch them and take over the top spot."

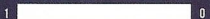

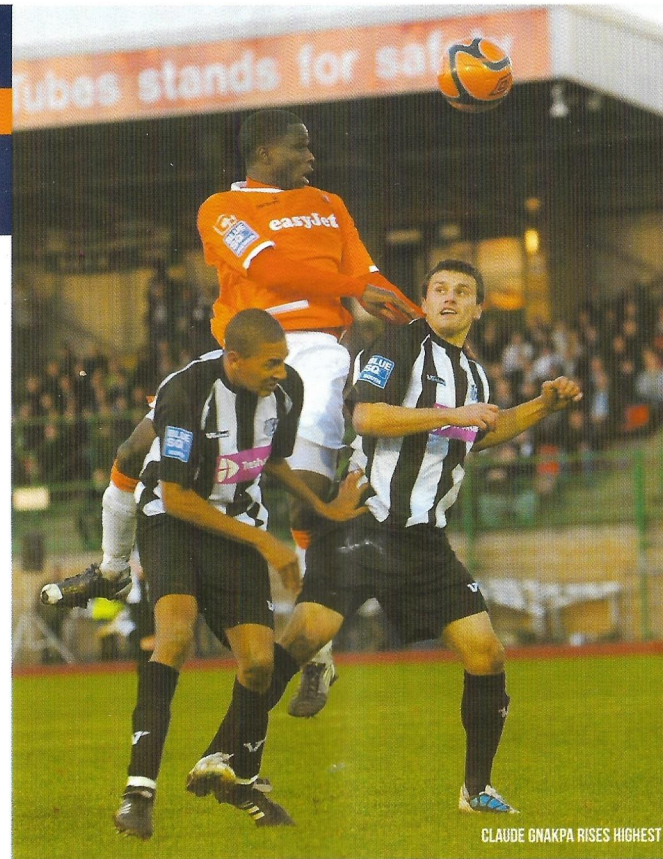

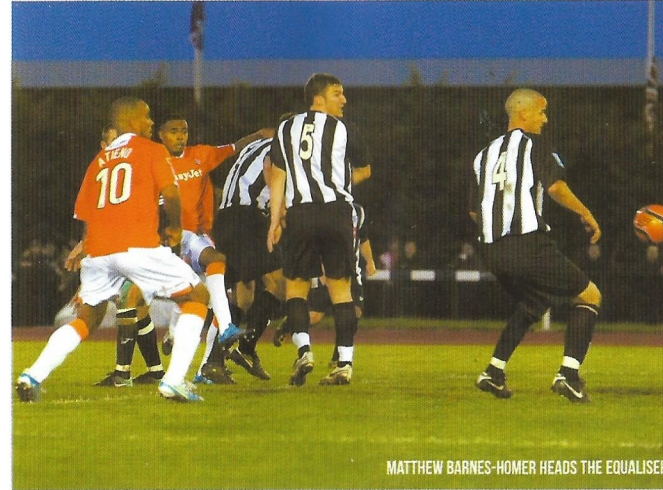

## MATCH REPORT

Matthew Barnes-Homer's 10th goal of the season seven minutes from time rescued the Town from an FA Cup upset at Corby.

The Town were reminded of their infamous defeat to the Steelmen in 1965 when Corby players on duty that they were paraded to the 2,000-strong crowd as the two sides emerged prior to kick-off.

That rallied the hosts who started the brighter of the two sides and the Town had Jake Howells to prevent Nathan Jarman from testing Mark Tyler on 10 minutes.

But that was brief respite for a Hatters side missing several key personnel through injury as their Blue Square Bet North opponents took a shock lead on 14 minutes when leading marksman Ben Mackey was left unmarked to head past an exposed Tyler.

The Town's response to going behind was swift with Claude Gnakpa causing the hosts problems with his pace and strength that almost saw the Frenchman level three minutes later with a shot that whistled the wrong side of the post.

All of a sudden the Hatters were dominating and, after Barnes-Homer saw a shot turned behind, a goalline clearance from Andy Hall kept out Taiwo Atieno's header from Keith Keane's corner before Dan Walker - making his first start for the Town - headed over.

Still the Hatters pressed but Chris Mackenzie in the home goal continued to frustrate the visitors, this time making an excellent fingertip save to turn over a powerful header from Gnakpa from a deep Howells cross on 28 minutes.

While the Town still saw plenty of the ball it took them until the 43rd minute to test Mackenzie again when the influential Gnakpa drew a smart save from the home side's custodian.

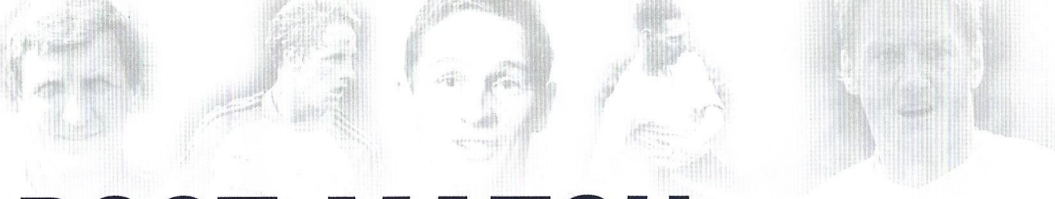
Richard Money introduced Godfrey Poku for Walker at the break as the Town changed shape but despite dominating the Hatters could only muster a flurry of off target efforts from distance.

Corby again had a super reflex save from Mackenzie to thank on 76 minutes when skipper George Pilkington saw his fierce drive from the edge of the penalty area pushed over the bar.

But just when it looked as though the Town were going to be on the wrong end of a cup shock, Barnes-Homer headed home from a similar position from which Corby scored earlier, steering Dan Gleeson's right-wing cross beyond Mackenzie.

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# POST-MATCH REACTION

The Hatters' late rally at the Rockingham Triangle forced tonight's replay and whilst many players in the Town camp left Northamptonshire just pleased to have earned a second crack at Corby, you could excuse Ed Asafu-Adjaye for having a slightly broader grin than most on the bus home.

The FA Cup first round game presented the popular defender with the opportunity to make his first start of the season and the 21-year-old was pleased to come away from it undefeated.

"It was a tough match on a difficult pitch to play on," he explained. "It's not the sort of surface we can play our game on but all credit to the lads, we kept going and eventually it paid off."

"It was positive to see all the chances we did create but it is a shame we didn't put them away. We made it harder for ourselves, there were three or four chances in the first half that we should have done better with."

Fortunately one of the chances that did fall Luton's way late on came to Matthew Barnes-Homer and his leveller set up tonight's replay. The Town's top scorer was pleased to have been able to find away past the home side's Chris Mackenzie, who to that point, had looked like picking up a clean sheet and a Man of the Match award for the Steelmen.

Speaking after the match the former Kidderminster striker said: "The important thing is we are still in the cup. The lads had to dig in and I thought we put in a better performance in the second half. "We were okay in the first period but we put ourselves in a little bit of trouble going 1-0 down, I thought I should have scored, but I got my goal in the end."

"It is not the easiest pitch to play on but we can't make excuses, we dealt with the pitch as best we could so the best thing about it is that were still in the cup."

"We kept on pushing and pushing, we kept creating chances and in the end it was just in time. Had we have done it earlier in the game, then we probably could have got another one near the end."

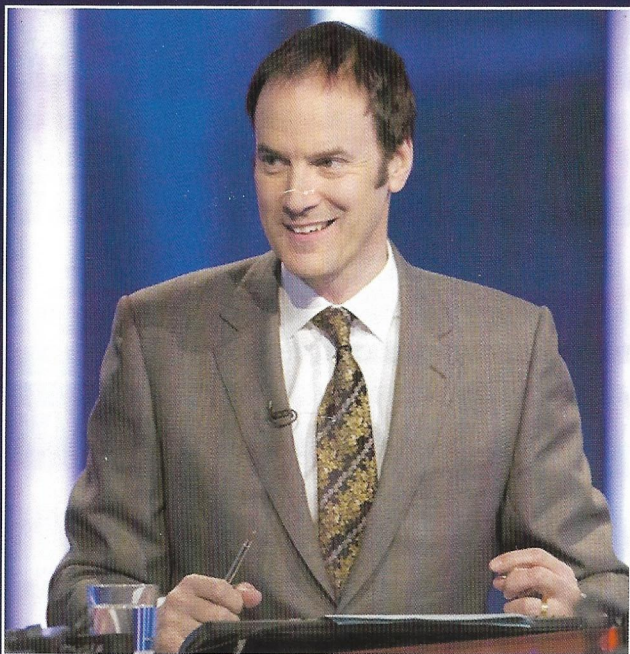
When Luton were promoted to the Championship in 2005, I couldn't get a ticket for love nor money.

Enjoy the game.

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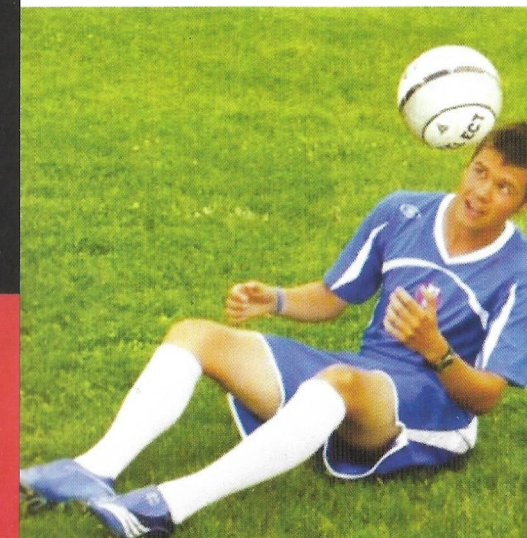
