MONEY TALK

Good evening and welcome once again to Kenilworth Road for tonight's televised fixture with Grimsby Town.

I'd like to extend a warm welcome to Neil Woods, his staff and players, plus the directors and supporters of the Mariners who have made the long journey south from Humberside for this match.

Grimsby's first season at this level will have no doubt opened their eyes and now, halfway through the campaign, they will be suitably familiar with what is required to eam results in this tough division.

Neil has done a very good job to steady the ship following their relegation last season. Picking up a team low on confidence is never easy and they have shown in their results this season that they are real contenders to be involved in the promotion shakeup come the end of the campaign.

Certainly, their results at the beginning of this year made everyone sit up and take notice. Beating Mansfield 7-2 and Histon 6-1 in successive matches gave everyone at Blundell Park the belief of a successful season.

Furthermore our visitors come into this evening's match on the back of a goalless draw against Crawley – no mean feat considering Crawley secent form and by all accounts Neil's side were unlucky not win all three points right at the death.

The same could be said of ourselves following saturday's 3-3 draw with Gateshead.

It was a thoroughly frustrating 90 minutes. Two

goals down we looked down and out and it says so much about our expectations of the players that we were disappointed not to have taken all three points come the final whistle.

However for me it was one of those days when we weren't at our best, usually at Kenilworth Road we find an extra gear but I felt our attacking play wasn't as ruthless has it has been in previous games.

There may have been mitigating circumstances: the pitch was tough to pass through, our busy schedules may have affected some of the players and we did have half a team injured watching from the stands.

But I don't like making excuses and tonight we must make sure we sure we don't slip up again.

The team do deserve credit, however, for battling back from two goals down. Football is a funny old game, so they say, and indeed when we came off the pitch it felt as though we'd lost.

I wamed the players and said in my prematch press conference that Gateshead would come and take the game to us and that was proved right. In the second half it was tough for us to break down their resistance. Strangely, having a man sent off may have worked in their fayour.

People who know me will tell you I am in the glass half-full category and after a disappointing result I look on the positives.

We came off the pitch with a point in a game we could have lost. We didn't lose and we go into tonight's game having not lost since the October defeat at Wrexham.

There is a long way to go – still just under half of the season to play.

We know there are no easy games in this league. The current dimensions of the table indicated that every club is battling for something, whether it be the championship, the Play-Offs or survival.

Not many people would have thought Gateshead would take four points off us this season but that's exactly what has happened. We will not dwell on Saturday and go in tonight's game confident of continuing our good form.


Gateshead earned a point at Fleetwood, lost by the odd goal at both AFC Wimbledon whilst Crawley beat them with a goal in injury time.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

Good evening and welcome to Kenilworth Road for the third of our seven consecutive matches at home.

Welcome also to the players, directors and fans of Grimsby Town who are experiencing their first season in the Blue Square Bet Premier.

We have a bit of a score to settle after we failed to perform in the away game in front of the television cameras and lost 2-0. We have become far more consistent since then and the cameras are here again tonight when, hopefully, we can prove that point. Saturday was a strange one, wasn't it?

I felt sick afterwards - as if we had lost. First of all, there was the shock of going two down so quickly...in 16 minutes, in fact. Both really infuriating goals too.

One a long distance shot that squeezed in off the inside of the post, and the other a hornible deflection. After that came the exhilaration of pulling those two goals back, followed by the Gateshead sending off.

So we started the second half all square, against 10 men and on our home turf. Surely we had to win?

The next 45 minutes were cruelly frustrating. Gateshead played really well, I thought, and were sometimes threatening, but towards the end we camped in their half, racked up the chances but simply couldn't score. In fact, I see from the match stats, we only had three shots on target all match.

Doesn't sound like us at all, but there it is. As I said, it felt as if we had lost, but we hadn't. We got a point and we remain unbeaten in the league since 11th November.

Alright, I know we didn't play a single league match in December but it's still eight matches and the best part of 11 weeks! So we just have to say, in the old cliché, it was a bad day at the office.

Or to quote the Shirelles, "Mama said there'll be days like this, there'll be days like this, my Mama said". Mixed feelings for us all afterwards, as we hard that AFC Wimbledon had hit five, but Crawley had only managed to draw against our opponents this evening.

We still have 60 points to play for and we start on those tonight. A new game, new momentum and fresh legs after two matches on very heavy pitches.

Let's hope there's been no more rain before tonight's match so that the surface has had to time to dry out a bit.

The gluepot conditions on Saturday didn't exactly help our fast flowing one-touch football, but the pitch has taken quite a battering from the weather recently and the important work we carried out in the summer has been put to the test.

It's held up extremely well. Something else that added to the frisson on Saturday was the rumour of the possible sale of Andy Drury. Let me stress that this is indeed only a rumour.

At any dub, there is the constant ebb and flow of interest and potential bids for players. When a side is doing well, that interest intensifies from dubs higher up the slippery slope...particularly during transfer window time.

A number of our players are attracting interest, inevitably, but, at the time I am writing this, we have had no talks with any other club and we are slightly disappointed that someone somewhere has put out information that is simply not fact, just gossip.

Whatever happens in the remaining six days of the window let me assure you we do not want to lose our best players. At this moment in time, we have no specific intention of letting any of our best players leave Luton Town.

On the other hand, it has to be said you can't stand in the way of a player moving up to, say, the Championship. Luton Town have always allowed players to progress for their own goodbut we also have a fine tradition of finding more talent to take their place.

We don't make a habit of confirming or denying rumours...transparent as we like to be, we try to deal only in facts. Before I go, I thought I'd mention that it's 50 years ago this week that Luton Town took part in one of football's most memorable cup ties.

Older fans will need no reminding that we took on Manchester City at home in the fourth round of the FA Cup. We were then in the old Division Two, while City were in the top flight.

In dreadful conditions of heavy rain, City and Denis Law ran riot, even though we went two up. Law scored six as City looked certain to go through, but then the ref abandoned the match with about 20 minutes to go!

City fans were incandescent, but the game had to be played again the following Wednesday afternoon. City thought our floodlights were so poor, they wouldn't play at night.

Well, Law scored again, his seventh of the tie, but we won 3-1 with two from Alec Ashworth and one from Jim Fleming. What a tumaround! I was unable to go, but my father went to both games and talked about them for years!

Back to tonight and our vastly improved floodlights. There's nothing like the atmosphere under the lights at the Kenny!

Enjoy the game, bye for now.

CAPTAIN SPEAKING

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road once more for this evening's game against Grimsby Town.

We were on the receiving end of a disappointing and frustrating defeat at Blundell Park earlier in the season.

I thought we were unlucky not to score in the first-half and we went a goal down from the penalty spot after a harsh handball decision.

Since that defeat we have only lost a further two matches in league competition – a statistic that should not be overlooked and an indication of our improved consistency.

This is Grimsby's first season at this level and they will feel they have now got to grips with what this league is all about.

There is no doubt we found it tough in the firsthalf of last season before we gradually came to terms with what the opposition threw at us.

Like ourselves Grimsby are a former Football League dub and many teams in this division view even a point as a significant result against teams like us.

With so many ex-Football League clubs in the Blue Square Bet Premier this season the competition has never been tougher.

There have been calls for extra promotion places to be installed but we knew at the start of the season that just one automatic place is up for grabs and it's up to us to ensure we finish in top spot come the end of the season.

Tonight Grimsby visit looking to build on their goalless draw with Crawley Town on Saturday. That result shows that they will be a tough side to heat

We knew that this run of consecutive home games wasn't going to be as easy and so that proved on Saturday when we held by Gateshead.

With Darlington - currently 12th - and Fleetwood - currently sixth - next up in the league, we know that this sequence of matches at Kenilworth Road isn't going to get any easier.

Saturday's draw was very, very frustrating. Both of Gateshead's goals were deflected efforts – the second particularly took a massively change of direction which, despite his best efforts, Mark Tyler could not daw out.

However, as we often find playing at home we bounced back quickly and scored twice in a 10 minute spell to draw level.

Danny took his goal very well from a tight angle whereas Claude was in the right place at the right time to hit the equaliser.

After Gateshead were reduced to 10 men we felt we could go on and complete the tumaround but football is never that simple

Perhaps the sending off was the worst thing that could have happened. We felt we could exploit Gateshead's open game plan with 11 men but once they were a man lighter their tactics changed and they protected what they had.

Usually we are able to open up and pick teams off when we have a man advantage but it wasn't to be, it was a difficult task trying to break down a determined backline.

We failed to turn our possession into clear-cut charces but I think we all thought we'd earned all three points when Tai saw his terrific shot on the turn somehow bounce the wrong side of the post.

Sometimes you just know it's not going to be your day.

But we take the fact we came from two goals down to earn a point as a big positive. It's a sign of what good teams do – they never give up.

We know tonight will be tough but if we show the same kind of spirit that we showed on Saturday, and we have luck on our side, then with the confidence we have in our ability we believe we can produce a positive result.

I know the result on Saturday was a big disappointment but we need your magnificent support with us. After all, you urged us on from two goals behind and it was unfortunate we couldn't find that all important winner.



INTRODUCING GRIMSBY TOWN

HISTORY

The club was formed in 1878 after a meeting held at the Wellington Arms public house in

Several attendees included members of the local Worsley Cricket Club who wanted to form a football club to occupy the empty winter evenings after the cricket season had finished.

The club was originally called Grimsby Pelham, this being the family name of the Earl of Yarborough, a significant landowner in the

The name was changed the following year to Grimsby Town, In 1880 the club purchased land at Clee Park which was to become their ground until 1889 when they relocated to Abbey Park, before moving again in 1899 to their present home, Blundell Park - named after Peter Blundell, whose money enabled Sidney Sussex College to buy the land in 1616.

The dub brought two stands with them from Abbey Park, although the players had to change at the Imperial Hotel.

This season is the club's first outside the Football League following their relegation from League 2 last season.

PREVIOUS MEETING

The Hatters twice hit the woodwork but slipped to their second defeat in four games after a goal in each half from the Mariners.

In front of the live television cameras - the game was the first to be screened live on Premier Sports TV - the Town began the brighter of the two sides and Kevin Gallen came close to giving them the lead when he volleyedover on seven minutes.

A minute later the Hatters hit the woodwork for the first time when Adam Murray struck the crossbar with a rasping shot from 25 yards.

But while the Town were dominating, Grimsby looked dangerous on the counter, and against the run of play, the hosts had the lead on the half-hour mark after being awarded a contentious penalty.

Darren Kempson's header from a rightwing comer was handled by Shane Blackett, jumping up to head the ball, and after referee Simpson signalled for the spot-kick, home striker Alan Connell slammed from 12 yards.

The Hatters responded well and Murray, clearly in the mood for a goal, saw a shot blocked on

As the Town continued to press, Claude Gnakpa leapt to head a Murray comer from the right but the Frenchman saw his effort cleared off the line by Mark Hudson in firsthalf injury time.

Again, just like in the firsthalf, the Town started well, and after Matthew Barnes-Homer blazed over a minute into the second period, the striker was denied by the foot of the post on 54 minutes after he had robbed Kempson of the ball and bared down on the Mariners' goal.

After being let off the hook Neil Woods' side upped the ante and they made the game safe with 19 minutes left when a Lewis Gobum comer from the left was headed in by Mickey

That knocked the stuffing out of the Hatters but they continued to battle but despite half chances from Adam Newton and debutant Taiwo Atieno the hosts held on to record all three points.

MEET THE MANAGER:

A fans' favourite at Blundell Park in his playing days, Woods has excelled with the Mariners' youth team in recent seasons, taking up the role of manager in October 2009.

Woods was part of the Mariners' promotion side in 1990/91 and also took part in many Cup giant-killings with the club but he left in August 1998 after previously having loan spells at Mansfield, Wigan and Scunthorpe.

He joined York City but injuries were beginning to catch up with him and he stayed for just one season at Bootham Crescent before slipping into non-league football with Southport.

After his playing career came to an end, Neil turned his attentions to coaching and became a highly regarded youth team coach. In the 2005/06 season Woods' side won the Midland Floodit Youth Cup with a 1-0 victory at Walsall and several of that squad progressed into the first team.

Woods' side went one better in 2008/09 when they defeated QPR 2-1 at Loftus Road to lift the Puma Youth Alliance Cup.

Despite relegation to the Blue Square Bet Premier, the Mariners board showed confidence in Woods, thanks to some stirring displays and an overhaul of the squad in the closing months of the 2009/10 season.

The former striker has been charged with plotting the Mariners' route back into the Football League.

Grimsby Town's start to 2011 threatened to overshadow the Hatters at one point with Mansfield Town and Histon despatched 7-2 and 6-1 respectively in the opening three days of the month.

However the Mariners weren't able to sustain that fortune in front of goal and three consecutive defeats followed.

Two of those losses were in the Blue Square Bet Premier and the other was a disappointing FA Trophy defeat at the hands of Chasetown. A return to League action against Kettering Town last Tuesday allowed the Mariners to get back to winning ways.

Having fallen behind to Tom Flanagan's third minute strike, a goal in each half from Rob Atkinson and Rob Eagle gave Grimsby the points that took them up to eighth place and within five points of a Play-Off position.

Boss Neil Woods was pleased with the manner in which his players bounced back. "We tried to play on Tuesday and in the last third of the pitch played some really good football," he


"We huffed and puffed a bit at first but the players showed endeavour and an enthusiasm to play.

"They showed character that everyone in the club knows they have. It wasn't about playing for me, it's about Grimsby Town.

"For the players it's about their reputations and people questioning them. The players and I haven't done our jobs in those previous three games because we were poor. I thought they showed a real togetherness the other night. Without patronising anybody, I thought the fans were fantastic too.

"We expected and were prepared to deal with a critical atmosphere but it was nothing like that. Some people will always want to have their say and there was clearly disappointment when we conceded. But I thought the fans stuck with the team and the club very well and it was much appreciated by everyone.

"The players talked about it afterwards; it was a real tonic for us and hopefully we'll get that backing again. We are eighth in the league now, we are in touching distance and believe

we still have a big chance this season."

The Blundell Park outfit followed up their win over the Poppies by holding leaders Crawley Town to a goalless draw on Saturday, allowing AFC Wimbledon to climb back to the summit of the Blue Square Bet Premier.


The result means that the Mariners arrive at Kenilworth Road with just those two defeats to their name from their last 10 league matches, a run stretching back to the end of October.

That's not far off the pace of the Hatters who have lost just the once in the same time frame.

KENNY ARTHUR



Manager Neil Woods moved quickly to secure the services of Scottish goalkeeper. bringing the 31-year-old to Blundell Park from Rochdale. Arthur made his name in Scotland with Partick, where he spent 10 successful years, earning himself two callups to the national squad in the process. He impressed in two seasons with Accrington before helping Dale to promotion to League 1. Kenny is a tall, imposing presence between the sticks and he has excellent agility and is a good communicator.

DEFENDERS

ROBERT ATKINSON

Powerful defender who completed a permanent switch to Blundell Park in January 2009 after two successful loan spells on the East Coast. The 23-year-old centre half came through the ranks at Barnsley and has gained experience on loan at Scarborough, Halifax and Rochdale. Rob is a popular player amongst the supporters and impresses with his aerial ability and reading of the game.

PETER BORE

Exciting prospect who burst onto the Blundell Park scene back in 2006 with a debut brace against Boston. The 23-yearold is comfortable all along the right or up front and is an expert finisher in front of goal. Peter was successfully converted into a right back by Neil Woods and impressed by winning the club's Player of the Year Award for the 2009/10 campaign.

DARRAN KEMPSON

Well-travelled centre half who joined the Mariners from Accrington Stanley in June 2010. The 26-year-old is a robust, physical presence at the back and he loves to command games in the air. The Blackpool-born defender has previously impressed in spells at Stanley, Shrewsbury and

STEVEN WATT

Scottish defender who sealed a move to Blundell Park after impressing on trial during July 2010. A former Chelsea trainee, the 25-year-old can boast Premier League and FA Cup experience during his time at Stamford Bridge.

Steven suffered an injury-hit spell at Swansea but recovered for a successful two-season stint with Ross County, helping the Highlanders to the Scottish FA Cup Final last season, although he missed out on the match. The Aberdeen-born centre half is dominant in the air, a threat from set pieces and has excellent distribution.

SMICKY CUMMINS




ROBERT EAGLE


DEAN SINCLAIR

George Pilkington's header three minutes after the break almost made it five and on 56 minutes the Town hit the woodwork for the sixth time in four matches when Gnakpa saw a header thunder off the crossbar following another Drury

However the Hatters didn't have long to wait for their fifth of the evening when Barnes-Homer took a pass from Drury to find substitute Taiwo Atieno with a cross that the striker headed past an exposed Young.

Chances dried up as the Town changed things but therere was still time for more drama. the visitors' Jonathan Smith became the second player to head for an early bath after picking up a second yellow card with nine minutes left.

Another five goals took the Hatters' tally to 13 from six matches so far in January, a statistic that becomes even more impressive when you consider there where two goalless draws in there but more significantly, another clean sheet meant the Town had gone 540 minutes without conceding in 2011.





MATCH REPORT

The Hatters came back from two goals down but could not find a winner as they were held to a frustrating draw against Gateshead.

After Danny Crow had missed a great chance to open the scoring after two minutes, the visitors stunned Kenilworth Road by taking a two-goal lead inside the first 16 minutes.

However two minutes later the Tynesiders' lead was halved when Crow finished well from a tight angle after being played by Barnes-Homer's slide rule pass.

Owusu had two half chances to equalise but the visitors were still confident of scoring again and they should have made it 3-1 on 34 minutes when Jon Shaw powered a header wide of the target when left unmarked six yards out.

Off the hook, the Town responded and they found their equaliser on 36 minutes when a Howells freekick eludes everyone in the box and hit the post but Gnakpa was first to react and the Frenchman poked home to make it 2-2.

As the break approached and the Hatters pressed, referee Merchant reduced the visitors to 10 men in first half stoppage time when showing a second yellow card to captain Ben Clark.

After such a frantic first half the second was anything but. 11 against 10 it may have been but the Tynesiders closed ranks, the Town faced by a nineman wall of white.

It meant, on a bog of a pitch, the Hatters struggled to find their rhythm and Deasy in the visitors' goal was largely untroubled, despite the Town's dominance.

The hosts came close to snatching all three points in the dving minutes when substitute Taiwo Atieno sent a low shot on the turn past the post with the very last kick of the game.

POST-MATCH REACTION

"Another home game follows against Grimsby tonight and one man hoping he did enough to impress on Saturday is Asafu-Adjaye who made just his first league start of the campaign.


"It's another big game on Tuesday we will be working hard and preparing well over the weekend and Monday.

NEW SIGNING LLOYD OWUSU WANTS TO GET HIS GROOVE BACK WITH THE HATTERS

When a player hasn't played a competitive game for 11 months you'd think the last thing he would want would be to play a leading role in a crucial Blue Square Bet Premier against a side who had beaten your new club in the Play-Off semi-finals last season.

But, for new signing Lloyd Owusu that's exactly what he had to do, and just an hour and threequarters after meeting his new team-mates for the first time he was thrust into the Hatters'

starting XI to face York City at Kenilworth

Better still, 35 minutes later and with his new club already 20 to the good, he celebrated his whirlwind debut with a goal, heading home Andy Drury's right wing corner.

"I'm very happy, it's good to be back and I'm pleased to have capped my debut with goal." the 34-year-old grinned after the 5-0 victory

over the Minstermen.

For the Slough-born Ghana International, ioining the Hatters' push for promotion is a welcome relief after what he describes as a "nightmare" Down Under with Adelaide United

The forward contracted swine flu and pneumonia and that only tells half of a story that promised so much on his arrival.

"It's been a bit of a nightmare 18 months," he tells Talk of the Town, "It was very up and down. I got swine flu and pneumonia which knocked me for six.

"The manager there threw me in at the deep end and I scored on my debut but six games later I was told I wasn't in his plans.

"So there I was seven games into a two-year contract and not wanted by the manager so I had to look elsewhere.

"I went to China but nothing really worked out so I was back at Adelaide but I kept my spirits up, stayed positive and helped along some of the young players there. I've never been a bad egg wherever I've played but I knew I had to leave because I want what's best for Lloyd Owusu."


The striker is of course no stranger to Town fans or the English game: 144 goals in 350 starts in the Football League took him from Slough Town in the Conference all the way to the Championship Sheffield Wednesday via two prolific spells with Brentford.

Throw in short stints at Cheltenham and Brighton as recently as 2009 - and you get the picture.

"I had a fantastic spells at Brighton," he says. "We were facing relegation and I scored seven goals in 14 games and we stayed up which was brilliant. I was hoping they would offer me a twovear contract because I felt I deserved it. But I was only offered one - then came the opportunity to go to Australia and I thought 'let's try something different."

Now he's back where it all started with Slough in the top flight of non-league football.

"It seems so long ago!" he jokes. "I'm back in the Conference but it doesn't matter to me. I'm glad I'm playing and I'm lucky a dub like Luton showed an interest in me. This is a club back on the way up. We've got a good chance of winning promotion and if we do then we'll see what happens.

"But the Conference has changed massively since those days. There's 10-15 former Football League clubs with some very good teams so it's thrivina."

His goalscoring record has been impressive wherever he's played and that's one thing the striker is proud to talk-up.

"I'm a goalscorer and I'm not being big headed because my record speaks for itself," he says.

"I am older now. I bring a wealth of experience and I work hard and I know the fans always appreciate a trier."

His goal against York was typical Owusu - a thumping header at the near-post. With Drury supplying the cross, the new man believes that

combination could be key to his and the Hatters success for the remainder of this season.

"I was pleased with the header and I love delivery in the box. I call it food in the box," he explains. "I believe in Drury's ability to deliver a good cross or setpiece and I hope that continue for the rest of the season."

And, of course, no Owusu goal is complete without the obligatory celebration - as those Hatters fans saw - and partook in moments after his goal against York.

"I love raising the roof!" he says, smiling. "It's been a while...not since 2009 but it's a little thing I do toinvolve the crowd and get them participating. At the end of the day they pay our wages and we have to respect them, especially here because the support is brilliant"

Although he was the first to admit he was a bit rusty - he left the field to a standing ovation an hour into his debut -Owusu believes his introduction acupuncture and yoga whilst in Australia has helped him in his quest for superior fitness.

"I learned a lot Down Under," he said. "It was a good insight and I wish I knew about it when I was younger. It keeps you supple and fitter and helped me tick along.


"I just love the game, I want to keep playing and I fully believe in looking after your body; eating properly, training properly and resting and recuperating.



NUMBERS GAME


- The number of matches previously played at Kenilworth Road on this date.

 The Hatters have won all of these fixtures scoring 12 goals and conceding just one.
- The most common scoreline, 1-0, has happened on three different occasions and the first of these was in 1930 against Boumemouth in a Division Three (South) fixture. Jimmy Yardley scored the only goal of the game.
- There have been two FA Cup fourth round fixtures previously on this date, with Luton beating Swansea Town 2-0 in 1947 and Bristol Rovers 4-0 in 1986. Mel Daniel and an Swansea own goal settled the first tie, whilst Ricky Hill, Mick Harford, Marc North and another own goal gave the Hatters a comfortable victory against Rovers. The attendance against Swansea, of 24,327, was the highest on this date at Kenilworth Road.
- 3 It was all the threes in 1964 as Luton scored three goals in a Division Three match against Colchester United. Harry Walden and John O'Rourke both scored with Gordon Turner also converting a penalty for the Hatters. This game ended a run of four League matches where the Hatters had conceded three goals.
- A solitary goal decided the game against Walsall in 1969 as Bruce Rioch scored for the Hatters, and the same scoreline was repeated in 2003 when Matthew Spring netted against Wycombe Wanderers.
- The number of games against Grimsby previously played at Kenilworth Road. Luton have won six, drawn six with the visitors winning five times. The Hatters have scored 33 goals whilst the Mariners have netted 26 goals.
- The biggest margin of victory came on 17th November 1981 when the Hatters



netted six times without reply. Lil Fuccillo opened the scoring before David Moss added a second from the penalty spot after Brian Stein was fouled. Steve White netted before halftime to make it 3-0, before then netting a further three goals in a 15 minute spell after the break

2 It's two seasons since Hatters have met the Mariners at Kenilworth Road, when the Town won 2-1. Ryan Bennett had opened the scoring for the visitors just before half time, but almost immediately Mark Bower, on-loan from Bradford, netted the equaliser with his only goal for Luton. Asa Hall scored a late winner to secure three points for Luton. The attendance for this game was 5,830, which was just three more than for the previous meeting in August 2003. In November 1994 the attendance was 5,839, and co-incidentally all three games have ended 2-1, albeit the other two were victories for Grimsby.



THE RELUCTANT GOALKEEPER

ROGER WASH LOOKS BACK ON THE CAREER OF ENGLAND INTERNATIONAL GOALKEEPER RON BAYNHAM

For most Hatters supporters of a certain age, memories of Kenilworth Road in the 1950's conjure up the likes of Stanley Matthews, Nat Lofthouse and Tom Finney bearing down on the Luton goal where a tall, strong and athletic goalkeeper was there to see off their efforts.

Ron Baynham was the goalkeeper whose name was on everyone's lips as he formed the last line of defence behind an accomplished side that more than held its own in the top flight of English football.

Yet Birmingham-born Baynham may not have enjoyed his long career between the sticks if he had followed his first instincts which were to play cricket.

"I was cricket daft and until I left school had probably not kicked a 'competitive' football more than twice," recalled Baynham. "My brother organised a local side and I was dumped in goal which was thought of as the best place for someone who had never played."

Baynham stayed in goal and whilst in the army was spotted by a Wolves scout who offered him a trial at Molineux.

I turned it down because I did not think I was good enough and on leaving army joined orcester City in the outhern League." Bavnham said.

Two years later he was offered another trial, this time at Kenilworth Road. and was now more confident in his abilities and was ready for the step-up and signed on in November 1951 exchange for £1,000.

Up until the previous summer the Hatters had the luxury of two international goalkeepers on their books in Bernard Streten, who had earned a solitary England cap in 1949, and lorwerth luahes who won four Welsh caps in 1950/51



England cap or appearing for the Hatters in the 1959 FA Cup final was his biggest achievement Ron replied: "Both were tremendous highlights but I rated Wembley for the Cup Final, even though it bought me the biggest disappointment of my career when we lost to Nottingham Forest. Sadly, the team that day did not play like the team I knew."

The Cup Final was the pinnacle of the playing careers of Ron and a great number of the 1959 squad, as they had all grown old together, and within twelve months they were part of the gradual decline of the club as it drifted down to Division Four.

Ron staved on but should have quit in September 1960 when he fractured his skull during a home game against Sheffield United.

He came back five months later but by this time the Town had signed Jim Standen and he had to share the goalkeeping duties with the ex-Arsenal man and even resorted to playing one game at centre-forward which was not a great success.

As the Town slipped further down the divisions, Standen was transferred to West Ham leaving the way open to Baynham once more and in 1965 he pulled on a goalkeeper's jersey for the last time after a reserve game whilst injured.

A piece of Ron's pelvic structure had been pulled away by torn muscles and tendons and he was lucky not

be left crippled. Needless to say he was not

Ron worked as a painter and decorator, as well as at Luton Airport, for some years and is now living in retirement.

He was a welcome quest of the Hatters recently as the club celebrated its 125th birthday and proved the life and soul of the party!

KIT PARADE

Nothing pulls on the heart-strings like an old Hatter's playing strip...

Another one season wonder in the history of the Hatters' strip is the home kit from 1973/74, and a significant one at that because it was the first time the Town had worn orange as their first choice colours.

It consisted of a predominately orange shirt with white and navy blue vertical bands down the left hand side of the shirt.

The look was completed with navy blue shorts with white trim and orange socks. It was so much of a success the look continued for a further five seasons and still has its admirers today.

Stephen (Steve) Mark DAVIS

Although coming from the North-East, Steve was a junior at Southampton but found first team opportunities hard to come by at the Dell so accepted a £60,000 move to Burnley in 1991 where he became a crowd favourite, helping the Clarets to successive promotions.

A £750.000 cheque took him to Kenilworth Road in 1995 where his astute reading of the game and power in both penalty areas made him indispensible in over three seasons with the Town.

An £800,000 bid from Burnley and the player's desire to return, saw Steve move back to Turf Moor in December 1998.

After a spell at Blackpool, Steve became first team coach at Burnley before following Owen Coyle to Bolton Wanderers last year.

Although bom in Jamaica, Dwight moved to England as a youngster and played his early football in London.

t was while playing in a game for Holloway schools that the referee, of all people, recommended him to Hampton and from there he moved on through the London non-League circles turning out for Leyton-Wingate, Kingsbury and finally Hayes.

By now the chances of an opening in the Football League seemed to have passed 25year-old Dwight by and he had settled down to i job as an administrator in Local Government Out of the blue came an invitation for a trial at Crystal Palace and, although he felt he did well, nothing came of it but Palace's coach Wally Downes recommended Dwight to Plymouth manager David Kemp.

Despite some misgivings, Dwight signed for Argyle and after netting on his League debut he finished as top scorer in his first season at Home

Lightning quick with a powerful shot in both feet, Dwight soon had the scouts circling, with the Hatters winning the battle when paying £150,000 for his services in the summer of 1994

Dwight was a revelation in his first season at Kenilworth Road, linking well with Kerry Dixon and later John Taylor and finishing top scorer.

Sadly, in his second season he suffered a badly broken ankle at Sunderland and most Luton supporters agreed that if he had remained uninjured the Town would not have suffered the drop to the third tier of English football at the end of the campaign.

Dwight was never quite the same after his injury and eventually returned to Plymouth before joining Kingstonian with whom he played against the Town in an FA Cup tie in

Since then he turned out for Slough and Aylesbury before hanging up his boots and taking a job in financial services.

AGAINST THE ODDS

WATFORD 1-2 LUTON TOWN. WORTHINGTON CUP FIRST ROUND. 10TH SEPTEMBER 2002

When the draw was made for the first round of the Worthington Cup, before the season started, immediate decisions were taken to make the match all-ticket which seemed a little over the top to all those football supporters away from the environs of Beds and Herts.

This was to be the first meeting of the sides since 1998 and with previous clashes being a tad tribal, the Hatters fresh from a record breaking season and Watford anxious to beat their neighbours at Vicarage Road for the first time in 15 years, the all-ticket billing seemed eminently sensible.


Neither side had started the league season well but all this was forgotten as 4,500 Luton supporters swelled the Vicarage Road attendance to over 14,000.

Crowd problems before the start delayed the kick-off by 15 minutes but by then the atmosphere had been whipped up and the Hatters clattered into a few tackles to let the opposition know they were there.

The first chance of the evening fell to Steve Howard who had been brilliantly set up by Kevin Nicholls but the big forward dragged his shot wide.

Watford then came more into it and Carl Emberson, in the Luton goal deputising for loanee Ben Roberts, who was not allowed to be cuptied by his club Charlton, had to be alert to a long range shot from Jamie Hand.

The breakthrough came on 31 minutes, and what a goal it was. Taking a Howard pass in his stride. Matthew Spring pressed forward and unleashed a thunderbolt from 35 yards which flew past ex-Hatter Alec Chamberlain in the Watford goal into the top comer.



Buoyed by this strike, the Town pressed forward and doubled their lead 10 minutes later. Spring threaded through a perfect pass to Howard who, taking advantage of a moment's hesitancy by central defender and another ex-Hatter Sean Dyche, shot low and hard past Chamberlain.

Watford gambled after the interval by bringing on young winger Anthony McNamee and effectively playing with four up front.

McNamee saw plenty of the ball but was unable to get his crosses any further than the

near post leaving the Watford forwards increasingly frustrated. The Hornets eventually pulled a goal back when Dominic Foley headed in a Micah Hyde cross with 15 minutes left.

This set up a frantic finale but the Luton defence held firm and the last chance of the game fell to Howard who saw his shot well saved by Chamberlain.

Afterwards Luton manager Joe Kinnear said: "I was brought up in Watford, played for Watford boys and my mother and sister still live here. I am going round to see my mother now and she

will probably give me a clip around the ear and not talk to me for a week!"

"Overall we played well but at the end of the day it's another defeat to add to the results. We seem to have a bad habit of playing well but not getting the result.

"The players need to learn how to grind out results like Peterborough did."



Elsewhere AFC Wimbledon demolished Southport in a 5-0 rout to return to the top of the table at the expense of Crawley, who were held away at Grimsby.





The policy Richard Money seems to have adopted this season in predominantly signing players who have vast experience at Blue Square Bet Premier level is a wise one.

It will soon be the 11th anniversary of my joining The Non-League Paper, and all 19 sides that have been promoted to the Football League in that time have had a core of key men that know the scene.

Even if I take only the last four champions, the spine of each side had hundreds of games between in the top-flight of Non-League football.

Dagenham & Redbridge's side was built around Tony Roberts, Anwar Uddin, Glen Southam, Paul Benson and Ben Strevens - a title winner previously with Barnet.

Aldershot Town had Nikki Bull in goal, Anthony Charles - also a member of that 2005 Barnet team - at the back, Lewis Chalmers in midfield and John Grant up front.

Burton had oneclub stalwarts Darren Stride and Aaron Webster alongside Tony James and John McGrath - two players who had starred for Hereford and Dagenham in play-off campaigns.

And last year, Stevenage took the honours thanks in the main to big Jon Ashton and Ronnie Henry at the back, Michael Bostwick in midfield and Chris Beardsley, Yemi Odubade and Charlie Griffin up front.

Oh, and a certain Andy Drury, whose closeseason steal really made me sit up and think Money had worked out what it would take to get out of this division, aided in no small part by Conference veteran Gary Brabin's in-house arrival as assistant.

I'd seen Brabs on my travels last season when he was acting as Richard's chief scout, notably at Kidderminster v Stevenage in the FA Trophy semi-final - Drury impressed everyone that day - and at Cambridge, where he would have had all he already knew about Dan Gleeson and Danny Crow reaffirmed.

It's not that players who have been in the League all their careers can't adapt to this level. Mark Tyler, George Pilkington, Claude Gnakpa and homegrown products Keith Keane and Jake Howells are evidence of that.

But the Non-League regulars I've mentioned above are used to the stigma that has long been attached to life outside the elite 92. They know what it's like to play in front of 250 at Hayes & Yeading, and to face the gale blowing across the Gateshead running track.

The addition of other seasoned Non-League campaigners as the months have passed, like Taiwo Atieno, Amari Morgan-Smith, Alex Lawless, Jason Walker and Charlie Henry, have only strengthened my belief that Money has

Only problem is that Steve Evans has had the same idea at Crawley.

League captures Michel Kuipers and Pablo Mills are important to them, but Matt Tubbs, Kyle McFadzean, Craig McAllister and Scott Neilson - lads bred in the grass-roots - have been his best signings.

The title race will, I am sure, come down to a shoot-out between the Hatters and Crawley. That's why I've got Tuesday, April 12 penned in as potentially the most important night of the BSBP season.
