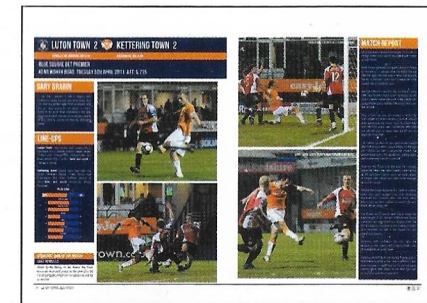

GARY BRABIN

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road for this afternoon's Blue Square Bet Premier match with Southport.

I would like to extend a very warm welcome to our visitors from Haig Avenue today including, manager Liam Watson and his team, plus the directors, staff and supporters of the Sandgrounders.

I have fond memories of my time as a player and manager at Southport – but obviously less so of the meeting between the two clubs two weeks ago.

A lot has changed since then and from a personal point of view a fortnight ago I didn't envisage myself sitting writing programme notes.

In the three games since I have taken over I have tried to instil confidence into the talented group of players we have at this club and I think that has shown, especially in the last two matches.

Obviously for the second match running I was gutted to see us concede a last minute goal which denied us all three points.

Three draws is by no means a disaster but I want to win every game. It's frustrating for everyone involved, not just for me, but the players and of course you, the supporters.

Against Kettering it was naturally disappointing once more that we didn't win but we earned a point. The thing that pleased me the most was that our attacking players are now flourishing.

I know that our defensive players are good enough and I trust them with the pressure and added responsibly I have given them.

After we drew with Barrow the press were saying "Rome wasn't built in a day" and yes, it might take a bit of getting used to.

We're trying to be a bit more adventurous and play attacking football that we know we are capable of but need to counteract that by defending better.

I don't want players committing themselves that puts us under pressure but on three occasions we've switched off and it happened twice against Kettering and once at Kidderminster and we've been punished. It means instead of having taken a possible seven points from three games we're left with just three.

I've said already and will continue to do so that I want us to be going into the Play-Offs prepared and ready. I want to get it right. I do not want to go into the Play-Offs hoping the players are in form, I want them to hit the ground running once it starts.

In the last two games I've seen the confidence of players like Jason Walker, Claude Gnakpa, Amari Morgan-Smith and Robbie Willmott soar and that's exactly what we need. Players in top form, enjoying their football.

Throughout the squad we have talented individuals. The whole squad is capable – and from a manager's point of view, that's fantastic.

I know they are all certainly good enough - I just have to get everyone firing and I think we're getting there.

From the first minute until the last against Kettering I thought we were excellent but I'm gutted for the you and the players because I thought we deserved three points but were

denied at the death.

It's never easy to lift a group of players after conceding such a late equaliser but with the games coming thick and fast, like today, it gives the players an ideal opportunity to bounce back.

Today Southport will be wanting to repeat the performance against us up at Haig Avenue two weeks ago whilst I will be hoping for a reaction to what was our worst performance of the season.

Given the competitive nature of the division this season all our remaining games have an edge to them influencing issues at both ends of the table.

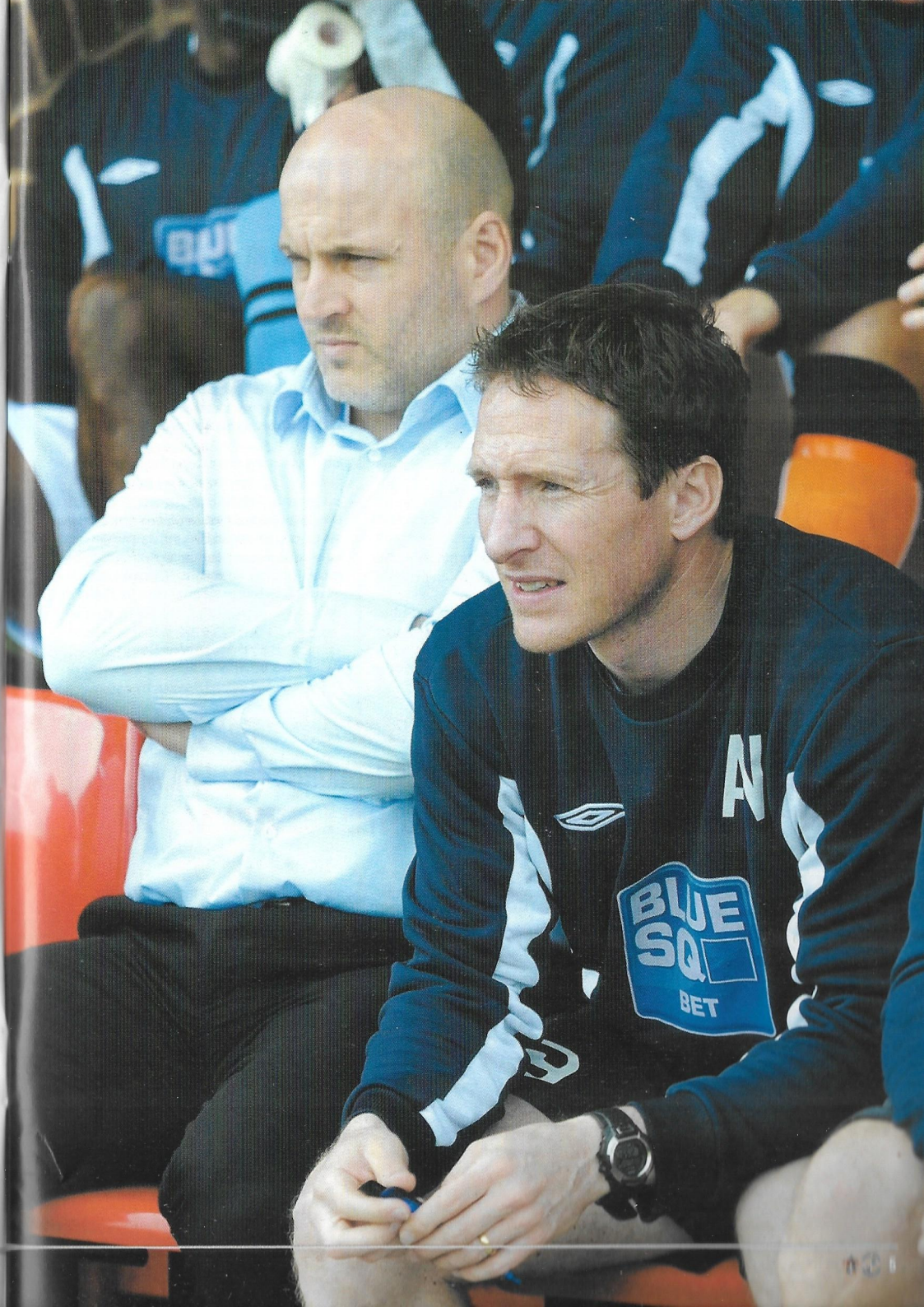
Your support and backing of the team since I have taken charge has been terrific and long may it continue.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

Good afternoon and welcome to Kenilworth Road for this afternoon's match against Southport.

A special welcome to the directors, players and fans from Lancashire just two weeks after we visited them at Haig Avenue.

I think it's fair to say we have a bit of a score to settle with them! Our performance in the north west was possibly the most disappointing I've ever witnessed from a Luton side.

It was a long and dismal journey home and, as you know, it prompted a conversation between Richard Money and Gary Sweet, instigated by Richard, that led to Richard's departure after the weekend.

I have known Richard ever since he played for us in the early eighties. He cares very much for this football club, he is a deep thinker about the game and extremely highly regarded as a coach.

He has achieved a terrific amount for us and I want to take this first chance I've had to express my thanks publicly. Football, though, is an unforgiving game and one man's departure is another man's golden opportunity, so this is also the moment for me to wish Gary Brabin all the best in his new role as manager of Luton Town Football Club.

Gary, as I'm sure you know, is a charismatic scouser, with a friendly word for everyone while being very much his own man. He's already adapted our approach and given certain players the chance they'd been yearning for earlier in the

season. Although he's yet to land his first victory, I hope you'll agree the signs are very encouraging. I have to pick out the match at Kidderminster Harriers a week ago.

It was exhilarating, breathtaking and ultimately frustrating, but utterly memorable. I thought we were superb, particularly in the second half, when our three goals were simply brilliant. If we can cut out the curse of 90th minute goals (as we've suffered in so many games it seems this season, including Kettering on Tuesday) I am sure we will be right on our game come the Play-Offs.

We are all bitterly disappointed for Danny Crow. He was the victim of a fearsome tackle at Aggborough and suffered a serious knee injury,

just at a time when he was thriving and looking really sharp after a frustrating season for him.

Luckily, we have a talented bunch of strikers to share the load, but it's a cruel blow for Danny at such a crucial time and we wish him a speedy recovery. On the positive side, the injury's nothing like as serious and long-term as we first feared, so there's a real chance we'll see him on the field again before the season's out.

So, it's been a fortnight of mixed emotions, but nothing comes close to the shattering news about Ian Pearce last week.

Obviously, I had known him for a long time, as so many of us had, and regarded him as a fixture in the commentary box for Luton matches,

whatever division we were playing in.

My family and I have listened to him on BBC Three Counties Radio countless times over the years and share the sense of loss experienced by all Luton fans.

I am so glad his family were able to join us for the Kettering match to understand the esteem and affection in which he was held. The minute's applause was deeply impressive and very moving.

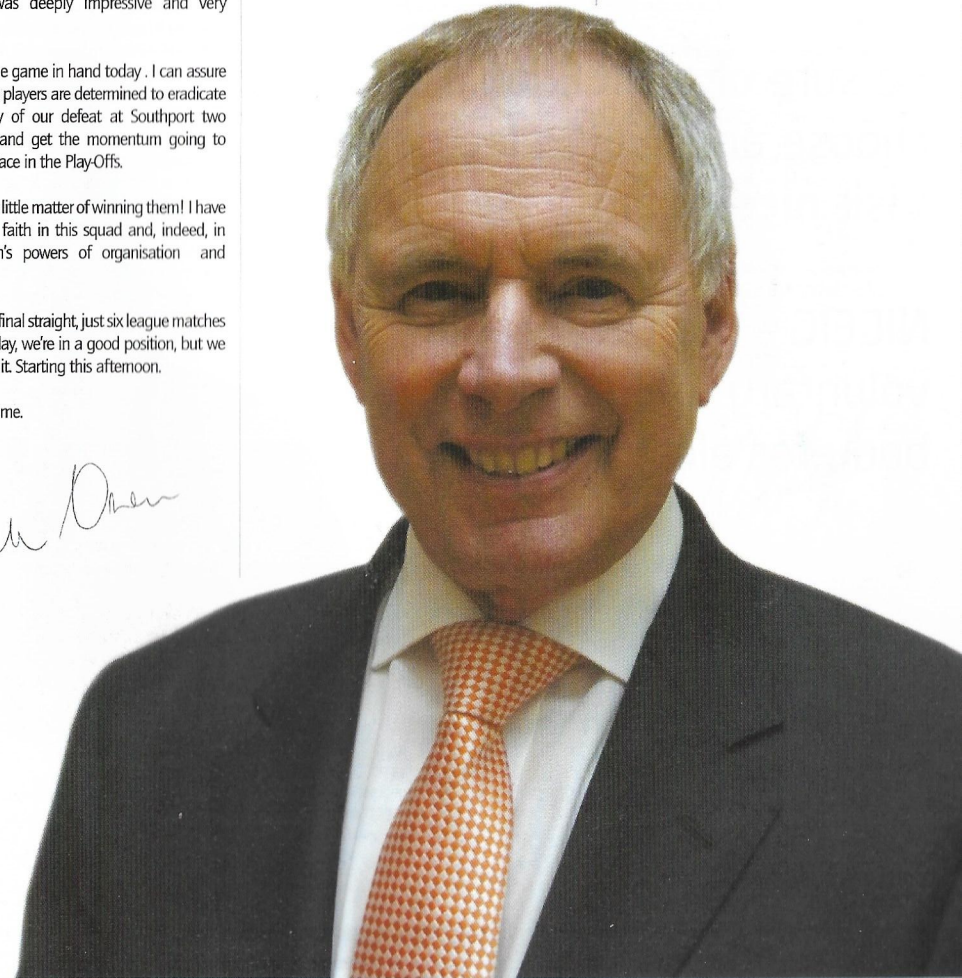
And so to the game in hand today. I can assure you that the players are determined to eradicate the memory of our defeat at Southport two weeks ago and get the momentum going to clinch our place in the Play-Offs.

Then, it's the little matter of winning them! I have tremendous faith in this squad and, indeed, in Gary Brabin's powers of organisation and motivation.

We're in the final straight, just six league matches left after today, we're in a good position, but we need to nail it. Starting this afternoon.

CAPTAIN SPEAKING

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road once more for this afternoon's game against Southport.

We were on the receiving end of a disappointing and frustrating defeat at Haig Avenue only two weeks ago.

There was not much quality on show that day and the first real bit of good play resulted in us taking the lead and having been a goal up with 15 minutes left we always back ourselves to win games.

However, we all agreed that we got what we deserved and came off the pitch defeated. Southport wanted it more and that's the most disappointing thing about the result.

We know you expect more from us and we expect exactly the same. We knew it wasn't good enough.

We let you down massively and it's up to us to restore your faith in us by putting in a good show this afternoon.

Southport are fighting for their lives and at this stage of the season every team is scrapping for points for different reasons.

The cliché of there being no easy games has never been more true and we will endeavour to right the wrongs of a fortnight ago.

Southport showed what a good side they can be and scored two late goals which have, unfortunately, been something of an Achilles heel for us in recent weeks.

At Kidderminster we were denied three points by a goal at the death when we'd thought we won and it was the same story against Kettering here on Tuesday night in our last home game.

As players it is obviously hugely frustrating when all the hard work is undone with the final kick of the game so for it to happen twice in as many games is a real sickener.

We are desperate for success and none more so for the new manager. We feel we should have won the last three games and collected nine points given the way we've performed so it's annoying that we've only got three to show for it.

Against Kettering I thought we were excellent, playing some high-tempo, attractive football, but despite having taken the lead twice we could not earn Brabs his first win in charge.

You would think morale in the dressing room would be low given our failure to earn victories in the last two games but that couldn't be further from the truth.

Confidence is high and we're beginning to show signs of the cohesive, fast, attacking football that we know we are capable of and have shown this season.

The games continue to come thick and fast so we know we're in a good position to cement our position in the Play-Offs and ensure we're ready for them in-form.

The manager wants the whole squad to be ready for them in the right frame of mind and to be in peak physical and mental condition.

There's a lot of football to be played between now and then, though, and we face a number of tricky matches before the end of the regular season football begins.

With the exception of mid-table Mansfield every team we face is playing for something and after this afternoon we play three tough away matches at Crawley, York and Mansfield.

Eastbourne and Histon are fighting to avoid the drop whilst Wrexham on the final day will be a massive game should both teams need the points to secure a top five berth.

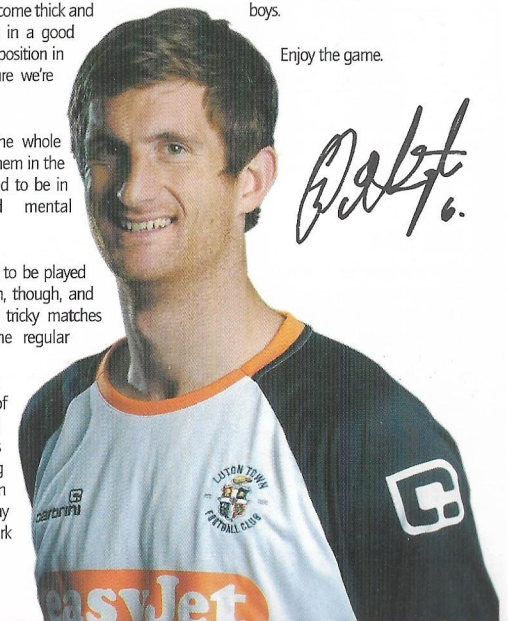
At this stage last season most teams knew their fate so it promises to be a tense finale to the campaign with clubs either battling for either promotion or survival.

We want to finish as high as possible in the table and to win as many games as we can too.

We finished last season in second place and, while it will be frustrating to finish there for a second successive season given the fact that spot doesn't hold an automatic promotion place, it would mean that we will have come through some hard games in top form.

Sisters Joyce Shuter and Joan Robbens have been coming to Kenilworth Road for the



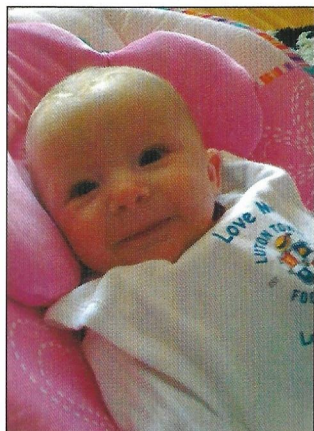

DIVERSE OPENS ITS DOOR

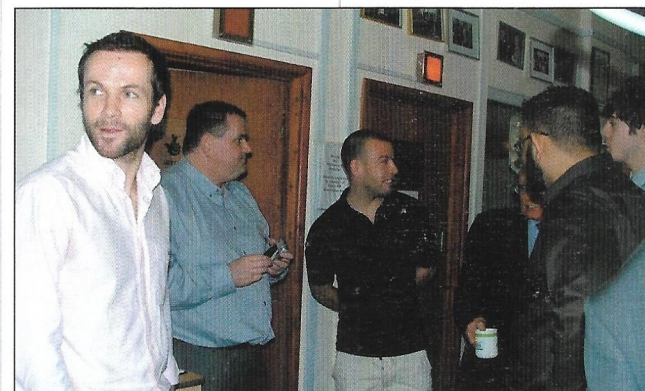
Joint media partner Diverse FM celebrated it's re-opening with a little help from three Hatters players on Thursday.

INTRODUCING SOUTHPORT

HISTORY

The highlights of Southport Football Club formed in 1881 include a Football League Championship, winning Division Four in 1973, an appearance at Wembley, an FA Cup sixth round appearance, a Northern Premier League title and a Conference North title.

Southport were founder members of the new Third Division North in 1921 just as they were of the Conference North.

Coincidentally both Barrow and Stalybridge Celtic hold the same double. Southport enjoyed their Football League status until 1978. From 1978 to 1993 the Sandgrounders were Northern Premier League members and from the 1993/94 season became an established Conference club for a decade.

In the last five seasons Southport have played in the Conference, the Northern Premier League, Conference North and they have returned to the Conference this term as champions of the Northern section last season. Southport have played at Haig Avenue for over 100 years and two seasons ago the club celebrated its centenary at Haig Avenue, having previously been based at the Central Ground.

Southport were founder members of the Central League in 1911 and in 1918 were taken over by the Vulcan Motor Company - playing as Southport Vulcan for one season, the first club to use a sponsorship title as part of their name.

LAST MEETING

SOUTHPORT 2-1 LUTON 26/3/11

Southport staged a remarkable late comeback to stun the Town and end their six-match unbeaten run.

The relegation threatened hosts enjoyed the lions' share of the first period as the Hatters struggled to get to grips with the Sandgrounders' diamond formation.



John-Paul Kissock, a constant menace throughout the game, was at the heart of most of the hosts' attacking play and fine play from the former Everton trainee in the sixth minute saw Karl Ledsham strike the post inside the six-yard box.

The Sandgrounders continued to boss possession but without troubling Mark Tyler whilst the Town were restricted to half chances at best in a forgettable first half that saw Richard Money haul off Luke Graham and Claude Gnakpa in favour of Danny Crow and Amani Morgan-Smith.

Southport continued from where they left off as they started the second 45 minutes but despite dominating could not force Tyler into a meaningful save.

Money made his third change of the afternoon on 66 minutes when Lloyd Owusu made way for Dan Walker and within nine minutes the substitute helped put the Town in front.

The striker, playing out on the right wing, sped down the flank and crossed low for Morgan-Smith whose instant lay-off found Matthew Barnes-Homer who rifled a fine low finish past Tony McMillan in the home goal.

The Hatters thought they should have had a penalty on 79 minutes when Earl Davis sent both Morgan-Smith and Barnes-Homer tumbling in the box but three minutes after their appeals had been waved away Southport equalised.

Shaun Whalley whipped in a right-wing cross and captain Alan Moogan was on hand, unmarked in the Hatters penalty area, to head past Tyler.

As the game finally sprung into life the Town should have retaken the lead two minutes later when a Morgan-Smith shot from an acute angle was spilled by McMillan but Crow, with the goal gaping, failed to convert.

That miss ultimately proved costly four minutes later and two minutes from time when more slack defending from the Hatters from a set-piece saw right-back Kevin Lee to steal in unmarked at the back-post to send a header past Tyler to complete the turnaround and leave the visitors pointless.

MEET THE MANAGER:

LIAM WATSON

There is a huge debt of gratitude at Haig Avenue for the work Liam has done since he first arrived seven years ago.

Transforming the Sandgrounders into championship winners once was achievement enough, but to have done so again last season merits a unique place within club history.

As Southport's youngest ever manager, Liam landed the Conference North title in 2005 and a repeat last season was again testament to his ability to make the most of the available resources.

Liam, formerly a player with Preston North End and Marine amongst others, led Burscough to the Northern Premier League title in 2006, having begun his managerial career at Runcom Halton.

He also boasts an impressive track record of helping to convert raw talent into Football League material.



Southport bounced back from the disappointment of a 3-1 defeat at the hands of Eastbourne Borough at the weekend to draw 2-2 at Mansfield Town on Tuesday.

The Sandgrounders came from two goals down to record a point at Field Mill but it was a result that ended up disappointing Manager Liam Watson who felt his side should never have put themselves in the position where they were chasing the game.

Conor Higginson and Louis Briscoe saw the Stags take a 2-0 lead into the break and they could have had an even more comfortable advantage had Tony McMillan not saved Paul Connor's penalty.

Southport promptly pulled one back through Aaron Turner just before an hour had been played and they completed the comeback within seven minutes to go when Matty McGinn converted from the spot.

The result leaves the Sandgrounders two points above the relegation zone heading into this afternoon's match with five games left to go to secure Conference football next season.

"It was a great comeback but we shouldn't be having to make a comeback. The goals we conceded in the first half were an absolute joke," boss Liam Watson said afterwards.

"We had a great chance at 0-0 and then they went down the other end of the pitch and we are suddenly 1-0 down. We then had a chance to draw level but again we missed it and they've gone down and scored a second.

"When that happens you just hope you can get something back before half-time and we should have, Steve Daly has probably the easiest chance of the game, a free header and he's hit the bar with it.

"We changed the team around at the break to give ourselves a chance and I think in the second half we pumelled them. I always felt if we got one, we were just as likely to go on and get three. Once we equalised I really thought we'd go on and win it.

"We'll only know if it's a good point on 30th April. If we stay up it's a good point but to be honest if we'd done what we should have in the first half we would have been going home

with three points.

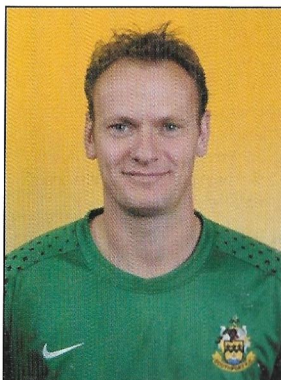
"I didn't have a go at the players on Saturday because I thought that we played really well, we created so many chances during the game and I put that down as a bit of a freak result.

"We have managed to leave with a point and it's gone now, now it's just a case of having to show that we have the desire that we want to play at this level in all of our remaining games and to make sure that we are here next year."



GOALKEEPERS

Steve Dickinson



The word legend is often overused in football, but few names in Southport's history command greater respect than Steve. In 2006, he set a new club record of 283 non-league appearances, having previously made a landmark 126 consecutive starts. Yet the goalkeeper's place in Haig Avenue hearts extends beyond mere statistics. A consummate team player who has shown extraordinary consistency, Steve also remained loyal during some trying times. Now 37, he returned this season as backup after a four-year absence.

Tony McMillan

An ever-present during Southport's title-winning season, Tony has barely missed a game since his arrival in the summer of 2008. The 28-year-old former Preston North End youth and reserve team goalkeeper played alongside manager Liam Watson at Runcorn Halton, making over 200 appearances for the club, before spending time with Lancaster City and Burscough. Tony made some telling saves in what proved to be important wins last year, preserving 15 clean sheets.

DEFENDERS

Paul Barratt

After starting out at Manchester City, Paul, 23, saw off his former club to win the FA Youth Cup with Liverpool in 2006. The

Warrington-born player first endeared himself to the Southport crowd during an initial six months as an attack-minded fullback, joining from Worcester City in November 2007. After brief cameos at Northwich Victoria and Fleetwood Town, he returned at the start of last season, being loaned to Hyde United, before playing an important part in the run-in.

Earl Davis

On a personal level, last season represented a remarkable year for 27-year-old Earl. Having never before scored during his five seasons and three spells at Haig Avenue, the popular defender notched seven goals, each one earning £200 in sponsorship. An imposing presence in the Sandgrounders' defence, Earl first joined in 2003 having started out at Burnley, also representing Hyde United and Burscough. His exploits last season earned him the Supporters' Player of the Year accolade.

Adam Flynn

A Player of the Year performance in his first season at Haig Avenue gave Adam the chance to captain Southport to promotion-winning glory last term. The former Prescot Cables centre-half moved to Haig Avenue from Burscough in 2008, quickly becoming a regular fixture in the team with steady and resolute performances at the heart of the backline. Having represented Liverpool at academy and reserve level, Adam, 26, is currently youth team coach at Anfield.

Kevin Lee

Kevin, 25, is one of only two survivors from Southport's last season at the top level of non-league football, when he played 32 times in the centre of the defence. Since then, the former Wigan Athletic junior has shown versatility, performing regularly at right-back and on occasions in the middle of midfield. With frequent first-team football at Haig Avenue, Kevin has also matured as a player, having initially joined after brief spells at Blackpool and Accrington Stanley.

Chris Lever

The titled-clinching match at Eastwood Town on the final day of last season carried extra significance for Chris, marking his 100th appearance for the club with a rare goal. It proved to be a fitting reward for a player who served the Sandgrounders with great consistency throughout their three years in the Conference North, establishing a reputation as a highly capable defender. Primarily a right-back, the 23-

year-old, formerly of Oldham Athletic, can also play on the left.

Rob Marsh-Evans

Having signed from Vauxhall Motors at the start of last season, Rob is now in his second year with the club. The 24-year-old played at left-back during the first part of his debut season, also filling in occasionally at centre-half and as an emergency striker. From starting his career with Chester City, the Welshman spent brief spells at Droylsden and Leigh Genesis, for whom he signed permanently in January 2008 and stayed for 10 months.

Robbie Williams

With a decade spent at Accrington Stanley and a Conference Premier winners' medal among his honours, Robbie brings a vast amount of experience to a predominately young Southport side. Able to occupy a variety of positions in the team, the 31-year-old is most comfortable at centre-back, being a strong, athletic defender who is also confident with the ball at his feet. Among Williams' three title wins is the 2000 Northern Premier League One triumph, playing alongside Liam Watson.

MIDFIELDERS

Liam Blakeman



If Liam's contribution this campaign is anything like his previous performance in the Conference Premier then Southport fans have every reason to be optimistic about his return. Signed part way through the 2005/06 season from Burscough, the 28-year-old midfielder made an instant impact as he helped steer Southport towards safety. After departing for AFC Telford United in

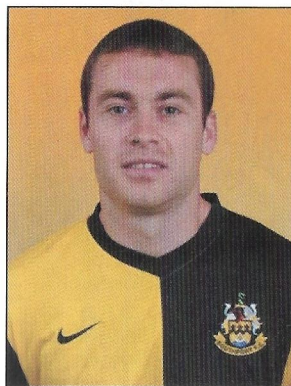
the summer of 2008, he was voted the supporters' best player of last season, before returning to Southport for the current campaign.

Karl Ledsham

Signed from Skelmersdale United at the end of November. A tall, left-sided midfielder who has great potential. Karl started locally at Burscough and made a reputation for finding the net, including one spectacular volley that won Burscough an FA Youth Cup tie against Bradford City at Valley Parade. Due to limited opportunities he moved on to St. Helens Town, where he continued to develop before Skem boss Tommy Lawson took him to Skelmersdale. Packs a powerful shot in his left foot and skilful on the floor and knows how to pick out a telling pass.

Alan Moogan

26-year-old Alan brings steel and creativity in equal measure to the Southport midfield. A former England Under-18 representative and one-time Everton team-mate of Wayne Rooney, Alan's career was put on hold as he spend two years recovering from a serious ankle injury sustained while playing for the Goodison Park reserves on a professional contract. A quality passer who also relishes a crunching challenge, Alan returned to football with Burscough, before switching to Southport three seasons ago.



Dominic Morley

Now principally at the club in a coaching capacity, Dominic is one of five members of the current squad with a Conference North winners' medal from 2005. His midfield graft

made the 33-year-old a firm favourite at Haig Avenue, having previously graced the Conference Premier with the Sandgrounders in 1999/00 under the management of Mark Wright. With his former clubs including Droylsden, Witton Albion and Runcorn Halton, he rejoined at the start of the season from Burscough.

Aaron Turner

Signed on transfer deadline day from Skelmersdale United. Boss Liam Watson had originally tried to sign Aaron in January 2010. A hard-working midfielder with a terrific workrate. Skem signed Aaron in 2006 from Ashton United where he was the North West Counties player of the year for 2005/06.

Shaun Whalley

Another player returning to the club after a spell away. Shaun initially played eight games for the Sandgrounders in the 2008/09 season with his last game in the Play-Off semi-final at Gateshead. Has since been at Droylsden and Hyde. Was a target in close season but chose to stay at Hyde before Liam finally captured his signature just before January deadline day. Made an immediate impact in his second debut winning a penalty after just 60 seconds and scoring a great goal himself after three minutes.

STRIKERS

Steve Daly

Steve led Southport's title charge from the front, top-scoring with 23 goals in all competitions for the second successive season. The former Wigan Athletic and Everton youngster, who first joined in 2003 from Runcorn Halton, also netted 12 times for the club in the Conference Premier five years ago. Steve's industry and hold-up play outside the box have helped make him a focal point of the Southport team. The 29-year-old has also appeared at this level with Droylsden.

John-Paul Kissock

'JP' made his debut in the club's final game of 2010 having signed on non-contract terms at the beginning of December but the dreadful weather put paid to any chance of an earlier appearance. Signed from Formby, the 21-year-old former Everton prospect joined the in a bid to climb back up the football ladder. Having been released by the Toffees at the end of the 2008/09 season, JP embarked on a journey

to find professional football which ultimately ended in frustration. Following spells in Scotland with Hamilton Academical last year - after a brief loan spell at Gretna - JP was left in the wilderness and contemplating retirement. However the Liverpool-born forward gave a shot at glory another try and though summer trials with Football League clubs ultimately proved fruitless a call from Vodkat Premier Division side Formby breathed new life into his game before bringing him to the attention of Port manager Liam Watson.

Tony Gray

Returning this season for his second stint at Southport, it was in 2008 that Tony secured his place the annals of Haig Avenue, setting a new record of scoring in eight consecutive matches. A talented and crafty striker who can make chances for himself and others, the 26-year-old scored nine Conference Premier goals for the club in 2006/2007, having joined from Burscough. Bangor City, Newton and, most recently, Droylsden are also among his former clubs.

Matty McNeil

It was his exploits during three seasons at Hyde United that earned Matty a crack at the Football League. 47 goals during his time at Ewan Fields brought about a move to Macclesfield Town, before joining Stockport County, where he achieved promotion through the League Two Play-Offs in 2008. Matty, 34 - a strong, powerful centre forward who brings plenty of knowhow to the Southport team - began his career with Stalybridge Celtic and Runcorn Halton.

MATCH REPORT

More late drama denied Gary Brabin his first win in charge as the Town had to be content with a third straight draw.

Keith Keane fashioned the game's first real chance for himself on 11 minutes when he shifted the ball onto his right foot and sent a fierce shot towards the top right-hand corner, forcing Kettering's Willy Gueret into an acrobatic save.

Jean-Paul Marna's lay-off to the oncoming Danny Mills was bravely closed down by Keane as the visitors pressed before the Town broke up-field with Jason Walker setting Robbie Willmott to shoot over the crossbar.

After a lively opening 20 minutes in which the Town played some slick attacking football without quite opening up the visitors' back line, Mark Tyler was called into action with a smart stop after Mills was allowed space to break down the left and cut inside for a low shot.

The Hatters number one was quick to react again after half an hour when Callum Wilson ran through the midfield and fired a daisy-cutter towards the bottom-right corner, the goalkeeper getting down well to save and hold on to the ball.

However, the Town had the lead five minutes before the break when Jake Howells picked the ball up 30 yards from Gueret's goal, cut inside, played a one-two with Walker and fired home his third goal of the season.

Despite the Town's dominance it came as surprise when they were pegged back when Kettering equalised four minutes after the break when Marna teed up Brett Solkhon to round Tyler and finish into an empty net.

The Hatters didn't have to wait long to regain the lead though, on 54 minutes. Willmott and Keane combined and set Howells scampering down the left to cut a low cross back to Amari Morgan-Smith, who controlled the ball in the sixyard box and poked past Gueret.

Brimming with confidence the hosts kept the pressure on the visitors with Gnakpa, Walker and Morgan-Smith all going close.

Kettering weren't dead and buried though and, in heartbreaking fashion, the Town conceded a last-gasp equaliser in injury time for the second game running when Mills slotted home after Tyler had done well to save his original shot.

The versatile defender has filled in at different positions this campaign and gave an energetic performance in front of the Kenilworth Road faithful.

The Hatters' man-of-the-match said: "I played leftback today but I just wanted to get out there and do my best for the team. Wherever I play I'll give 100 per cent.

"There was a lot of space on the left and I managed to link up with the lads and get some nice one-twos going which created some chances."

Howells refused to let the last-gasp equaliser destroy team morale and is looking to build on the positives.

"It happens in football and we can't just stop playing," he added.

"We played well and deserved to win and get the three points like the last game.

"But we'll go to the next game and win that game. The lads know we're playing well and everyone is feeling that we're on a good run of form."

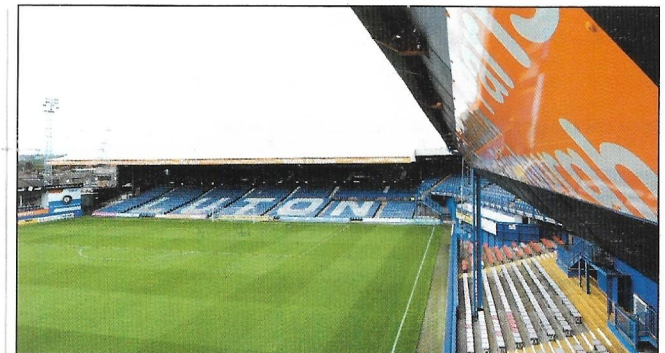

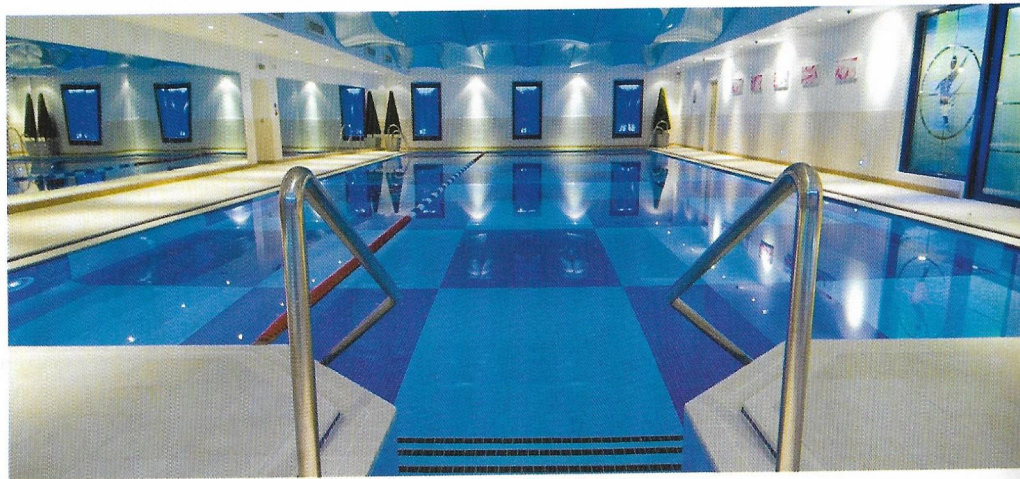

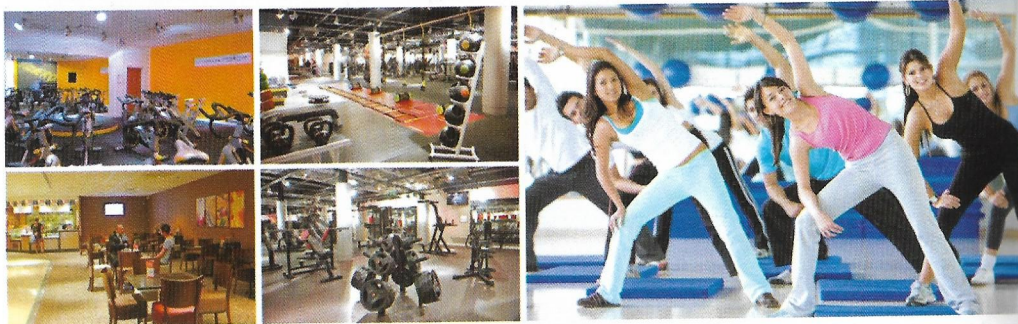

NUMBERS GAME

10 The number of matches previously played on this date at Kenilworth Road. Luton have won five, drawn two and lost three. The Hatters have scored 17 goals and conceded 10 in these matches.

0 The first of these fixtures came in 1921 when Millwall were the visitors for a Division Three match, which ended goalless, the only game to have finished without a goal on this date.

1 It was consecutive draws as the points were shared 17 years later when Plymouth Argyle came to Kenilworth Road for a Division Two fixture. Charlie Ferguson scored the Town's goal in a 1-1 draw.

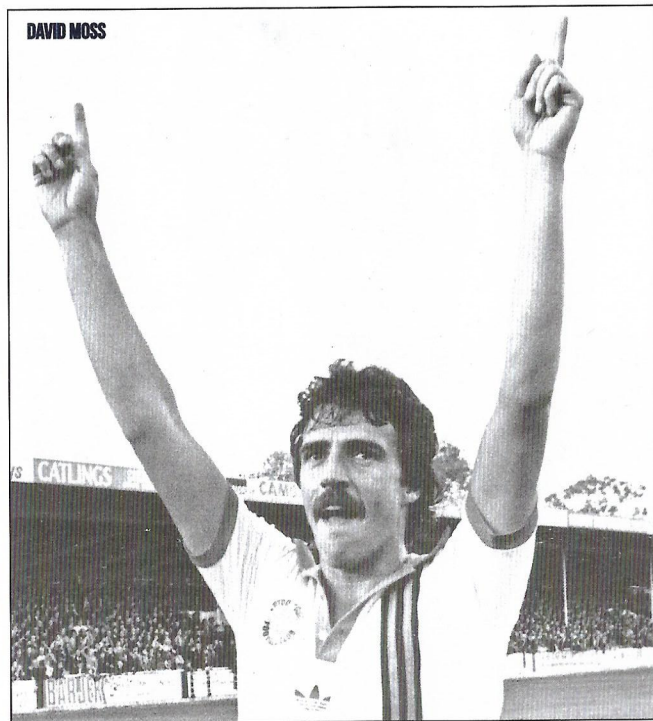
2 It was the second time in three games that the Hatters failed to score as West Bromwich Albion won 1-0 in 1949 to take the two points.

4 The Hatters managed a win from the fourth fixture at home on this date when West Ham United were beaten 2-0 courtesy of goals from Gordon Turner and George Cummins. This match saw the highest attendance for a fixture on this date at Kenilworth Road: 27,148.

5 The most goals scored by Luton on this date came with a 5-1 victory over Nottingham Forest in 1959. Allan Brown netted four of the goals with Billy Bingham also on the scoresheet in the First Division fixture.

1 A year later and the Hatters were playing host to Manchester United and, although George Cummins netted a brace, the visitors scored three goals to take maximum points.

6 It was another six years before Luton played hosts on this date again when Darlington were the visitors in 1966, and

having fallen through the leagues, this was a Fourth Division match. The Hatters won 2-0 with goals from John O'Rourke and Ray Whittaker.

9 It was a further nine years before the Hatters played host once again, and in 1975, Luton were back playing in the top flight once again. Peter Anderson netted twice as Everton were beaten 2-1 at Kenilworth Road.

4 For the fourth consecutive match at Kenilworth Road on this date Luton

scored twice, this time in 1983 when Aston Villa were beaten 2-1. Trevor Aylott opened the scoring before the visitors equalised. However, a very late David Moss goal ended a run of four consecutive defeats in Luton's first season back in the top flight since being relegated at the end of the 1974/75 season.

16 The number of years since Stoke City were the visitors in 1996. Kim Grant scored in the first half for the Hatters, but two goals in the last five minutes meant the visitors snatched all three points.



LUTON AT HEART

FORGET BARCA AND REAL, GIVE RADDY ANTIC KENILWORTH ROAD ANY DAY

Raddy Antic may well have a place in football history as one of only two men to have managed Spanish football's big two, Barcelona and Real Madrid.

He might also have coached his native Serbia having guided them through World Cup qualifying and into last summer's finals.

But no matter what else he has achieved in the

game, his heart will always have a special place for Luton Town.

Raddy's arrival in 1980 was something of a bold step as it was long before the days of English clubs looking overseas for their players.

David Pleat convinced the then 32-year-old to come over from Real Zaragoza and help lift the Hatters up to the top-flight.

Four years and 100 league games later it was undoubtedly the right move for both parties and when Raddy returned to Luton for the club's 125th anniversary celebrations, waxed lyrical about his time at Kenilworth Road.

"It was one of the best decisions in my life, to come to England," Raddy, now 62, said.

"For me, the four years I had in England I liked.

I liked English people and I learned a lot about life, not just in football.

"Since I left Luton I have always said everywhere that I am very proud to have lived with these people for four years.

"For me it was more than just playing football, it is something that I try to tell my grandchildren, to show what life is all about.

"I am very proud to be a part of the history of Luton Town and since I left there has always been a place in my heart for Luton."

Raddy's most famous moment in a Luton Town shirt came on 14th May 1983 in the last-day shootout at Maine Road, when the Hatters travelled to Manchester City.

City knew that a draw would be enough to keep them out of the relegation zone and ensure their place in Division One, in turn relegating Luton, who knew that they had to win the game if they were to survive – instead sending down their hosts.

There was plenty of tension on the terraces as time ticked on with the game deadlocked at 0-0.

On came Raddy with around 25 minutes to go, replacing Wayne Turner, and Luton were still in need of a goal.

And with just five minutes left Luton went on the attack. The ball came out to Raddy who, with a swing of his right foot, powered it back into the corner from the edge of the box for the only goal of the game.

Luton were safe, City were relegated, and the image of Pleat running on to the Maine Road pitch at the final whistle before doing a jig of delight is as iconic as they come in Luton's history. It's a moment that Raddy will always recall – but he's modest about his own role in the most dramatic of escapes.

"I came on fresh for Wayne Turner, he did a good job, and I just did the easy bit!" he laughs.

"We were a big family then and we are still a big family now.

"I remember after the games at Kenilworth Road you never just finished one game and started a new one.

"After the game they would choose the best player to give a shirt for the supporters and for me, coming from abroad, that was so important.

"It wasn't just finishing the game on the field, it

was the friendships built up between us all, that's what Luton Town is."

Raddy had played for FK Sloboda Titovo Uice, FK Partizan – where he won one cap for the old Yugoslavia – and Fenerbahçe before his move to Zaragoza.

Pleat had been looking for a defender to bring the ball out from the back and had been alerted to Raddy, so went over to see him in action and was impressed.

A meeting with Raddy and his wife further increased the positive vibes and when the boss got to the airport for his trip home, he spotted a Spanish football magazine featuring Raddy on the cover – something he took as a sign to get the deal done.

Raddy came over for the start of the 1980/81 season and quickly made himself at home in Luton, having transported his family across with him.

Pleat describes him as "intelligent and articulate", two of the reasons why Raddy has gone on to enjoy a successful career in management.

Luton was his final club as a player and he later went on to take charge of Real Zaragoza, Real Madrid and Real Oviedo, before joining Atlético Madrid in 1995 for the first of three spells in charge at the Vicente Calderón Stadium.

Raddy then returned to Oviedo before taking over at Barcelona in 2003, Celta Vigo in 2004, and from 2008 to 2010 he led the Serbian national side to the World Cup in South Africa.

As well as being one of only two men to have managed Real Madrid and Barcelona, he is the only man to have led those two clubs plus Atlético, Real's big city rivals.

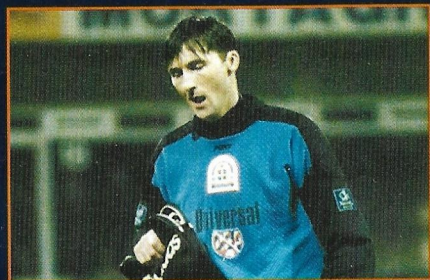

Nothing pulls on the heart-strings like an old Hatter's playing strip...

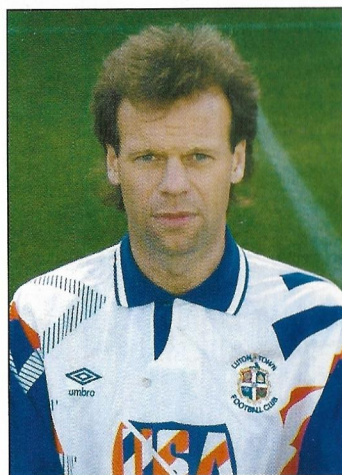

Trevor PEAKE

In a long football career, Trevor holds the record as the oldest player in the Hatters' history when turning out against Wrexham in 1997 at the age of 40 years and 222 days.

Starting off at his home town club Nuneaton, Trevor first tasted league football with Lincoln who paid £27,500 his services. After 171 league games for the Imps a £100,000 fee took him to Coventry in 1983 where his displays at centre-half earned him legendary status plus an FA Cup winners' medal in 1987.

When Luton manager David Pleat was looking for an experienced head in 1991, he turned to Trevor who went on to play 179 league games for the Town, picking up several Player of the Year awards along the way.

After taking up a coaching role at Kenilworth Road, and then another at Coventry, Trevor is now assistant academy director at Leicester City.

The FA Cup had brought some respite to a fairly mundane 1948/49 season with both West Ham and Walsall seen off at Kenilworth Road before Leicester made it three home ties in a row in the fifth round.

A near record crowd of 26,280 flocked to Kenilworth Road and paid then record receipts of £4,678 to see a remarkable game that ended 5-5 after extra-time.

Jack Lee scored first for Leicester after six minutes but within another four minutes Peter Small and Bobby Brennan had shot the Town into the lead.

By halftime, however, Lee had scored a further two goals, but this lead was wiped out when Tommy Kiernan netted from a Billy Vaugh cross shortly after the break.

Shots and chances were then, according to the local scribe, far too numerous to mention as this pulsating game entered extra time.

When Mal Griffiths scored a soft goal for the Foxes early in the first half of extra time Luton followers expected the worst as teams scoring first in this period normally went on to win, but when first Kiernan and then Charlie Watkins - with a 20-yard shot - put the Hatters ahead again, a famous victory was anticipated.

With only seconds remaining, however, City gained a corner and a tired Griffiths could only muster the strength to send a short lob to the near post but somehow Lee managed to screw the ball home with his head as the referee blew the final whistle.

Although massively disappointed, several thousand Luton supporters made the trip to Filbert Street for the replay the following Saturday, swelling the crowd to 38,322, but in another end-to-end thriller the Town went down 5-3 to the eventual Cup finalists.

AGAINST THE ODDS

● LUTON TOWN 3-2 ORIENT. 23RD AUGUST 1969.

Luton Town supporters felt cheated. Having finished in third position in the old Division Three in 1969 with 61 points (equivalent to 86 today), the Hatters failed to win promotion as only the top two went up in those pre-Play-Off days.

It was even more galling to note that the fourth placed club, Bournemouth, sat 10 points behind.

The summer of 1969 was therefore seen as a huge anti-climax which was made worse when it was announced that golden boy, Bruce Rioch, was to be sold for a Division Three record fee of £100,000 to Aston Villa.

Although manager Alec Stock was handed back the money to spend on strengthening the side, the new summer signings, John Ryan, John Collins and a young full-back from Fulham, Malcolm Macdonald, hardly sent the pulses racing.

As such it was a quiet and sombre crowd that gathered on the opening day to see a poor Barrow side turned over 3-0.

Because of pre-season injuries, Macdonald had been moved from full-back to the wing and then to inside forward where his enthusiastic play, speed and strength caught the eye, but would he adequately replace Rioch? No, was the general opinion.

Those opinions changed slightly when Macdonald scored the only goal of the game at Bournemouth the following week. In what was to become a trademark strike, Macdonald surged through a slow defence before rounding the goalkeeper and netting with ease.

Next up were Orient, as they were then called, at Kenilworth Road in an early season top-of-the-table clash between two unbeaten sides that had yet to concede a goal.

The Town were protecting a 30-game

unbeaten home record and started brightly against a team that had only avoided relegation the previous season by winning their final game.

Macdonald twice went close in the early

stages but it was Orient who opened the scoring in the 14th minute with a goal out of the blue.

With just about their first attack of the game the O's won a free-kick on the edge of the Luton area and as the Town players were organising a wall, full back Mick Jones hammered the ball home.

Stung by the goal the Town players swarmed all over the Orient defence, where everyone had been pulled back, with Macdonald in particular leading them a merry dance but was unable to put the ball in the net.

The visitors were relying on the occasional breakaway and completely against the run of play doubled their lead on the hour mark when Micky Bullock headed home from point blank range after a swift raid through a depleted Luton defence.

The Town's long unbeaten home record was now in grave danger and even the introduction of the previous season's top scorer, Brian Lewis, in place of the largely ineffective Laurie Sheffield, failed to galvanise the forward line.

With 15 minutes left, and the crowd accepting the inevitable, a lifeline was thrown out when Keith Allen squared the ball for Collins, who had moved in from the wing, to slam home.

Most Luton supporters felt that this was merely a consolation but five minutes later they went wild when Graham French scored a brilliant goal that has thankfully been preserved by London Weekend Television who were recording the game.

A long clearance from goalkeeper Tony Read was headed on by Macdonald to Allen who tangled with the Orient keeper Ray Goddard. The ball rebounded out to French, some way out of the area, who quickly sized up the

situation and lobbed it back over the stranded Goddard and the rest of his defenders.

It was all Luton now and, as the seconds ticked away, a free-kick, swung in by skipper Mike Keen, was headed home by the effervescent Macdonald who had fought his way through a crowd of defenders.

No wonder the crowd of 13,761, which included new supporter Eric Morecambe who had sponsored the ball, went away happy and singing the praises of Macdonald.

"We told them if they upped the tempo up and workrate they would fare much better and so it proved.

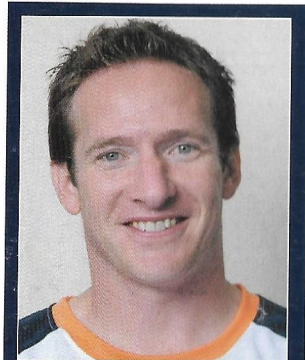
"Overall we were delighted with the effort of a young team which was highlighted by the fact we finished the match with two Under-16 players on the field."

The Hatters domination of possession continued after the break but it was not until just after the hour mark that skipper Byrne again beat her marker down the right and crossed to the far post where Kane met the ball on the volley from 15-yards and smashed the ball into the bottom corner of the net - a goal good enough to win any cup final.

The one way traffic continued and Davies created a scoring opportunity for herself but just as she shaped to shoot the ball took an unfortunate bobble and her shot sailed over the bar.

Arlesey did strike the top of the crossbar with a

30yard up and under but goalkeeper Sian Hall had the ball well covered had it dipped sooner.

Luton squandered a number of late chances to finish the tie as Arlesey threw players forward in search of an equaliser but Luton held on for a hard fought victory.

Winning captain Michelle Byrne said afterwards: "I am delighted with the application of the team tonight when it was a case of patching injured players up and putting them out there.

"We had a game plan and came to win a final tie without the frills if necessary.

"I felt that we were in control from the first until the last minute and thoroughly deserved our win although we should have made it easier for ourselves by taking our chances."

LEAGUE ROUND-UP

DIAMONDS CLOSE TO STRIKE ACTION

Rushden & Diamonds players threatened to go on strike ahead of their defeat at Mansfield last weekend, according to the Non-League Paper. The Professional Footballers' Association stepped in to stop the boycott, but with wages reportedly not paid on time for the second month in succession, there is said to be widespread discontent within the Nene Park dressing room. The club - who last month attracted an all-time low attendance of just 759 to their home match with Forest Green - have already been hit with a transfer embargo after failing to pay a tax bill on time.

RUSHDEN 'KEEPER GOES POSH

One player leaving Nene Park is 20-year-old goalkeeper Joe Day who has joined Peterborough United for an undisclosed fee. The England C international will not be able to play for the Posh until the transfer window opens in the summer, but he will immediately begin training with the London Road club.

STAGS TO STAY AT FIELD MILL

Mansfield Town have successfully negotiated a one-year lease to remain at Field Mill. There had been genuine fears that the club would have to resign from the Conference after a dispute with former Stags owner Keith Haslam, who wanted to repossess the stadium. An agreement has been reached - "just in time," according to Conference chairman Brian Lee - meaning that the club's short-term future is secure.

QUESTIONS MARKS AT CHURCH ROAD

Meanwhile, the situation is not so clear at Hayes & Yeading, who have announced their intention to leave their Church Road home. Their long-term plan is to move into Yeading's old ground, The Warren, but with that stadium not set to be ready

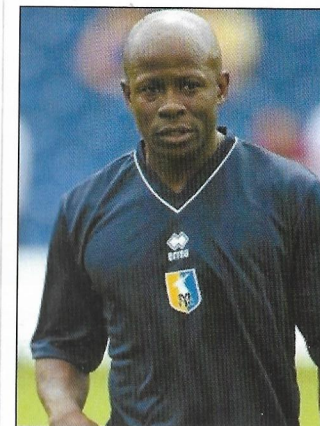
for some time, a temporary groundshare is likely to be needed.

DARLINGTON ARENA UP FOR SALE

Darlington's receivers have put the club's 25,000-seater stadium up for sale. The club has a lease on the arena until 2024, but with the club's debts totalling a reported £2 million, there is a risk that the Quakers may have to cash in on the giant ground.

HALL OUT OF RETIREMENT

Mansfield assistant manager Paul Hall has re-registered as a player to help ease the club's injury crisis. The 38-year-old former Coventry and Portsmouth forward, who represented Jamaica at the 1998 World Cup, come on as a late substitute in the Stags' draw with Southport on Tuesday. Cash-strapped Mansfield could only name three substitutes in their defeat to Crawley last week, leading manager Darren Russell to ask his understudy Hall to come out of retirement and prolong his 15-club, 600-game career.

STUDY CENTRE



The Hatters Study Centre has recently been working with Luton Churches Education Trust's (LCET) new project called Compass.

The Compass project is for year 9 students who are at the risk of not fulfilling their potential at school either because of lack of motivation, bad behaviour, or just making bad choices, which has led them to the brink of exclusion from school.

Throughout the year Compass has worked with the young people to think about their future aspirations, delayed gratification and how to deal with conflict in order for them to start their GCSE years knowing what they want to achieve, the different ways they can deal with conflict and also for them to see the importance of working hard now for future rewards.

The Compass staff asked the Hatters Study Centre to provide support for these topics giving the boys a creative way of exploring

these ideas based within a football context.

The Study Centre has worked with the group on three occasions now across the year.

They gave the group an opportunity to see behind the scenes at the football club, a chance to see that a club needs more than just footballers to survive and to allow the young people to see what sort of job opportunities are available within a football club.

The young people attended a session on delayed gratification, where a Hatters community coach spoke to them about his career and his hopes of being a footballer when he was their age, and the struggles he had when that dream fell apart.

The boys also take part in coaching activities, including taking part in a yo-yo stamina test. We have spent time coaching them for around an hour of each day, giving them a chance to improve their football skills.

Most recently the centre has worked with the group on the topic of 'dealing with conflict'.

The young people took part in several sessions on this day, one session involved them picking a World Cup dream team and then having to negotiate with other teams over the buying of players. Another session involved looking at various players being sent off, looking at what they did, how they reacted and how they could of resolved the conflict differently.

The highlight of the day was the chance to hear Adam Newton and Robbie Wilmott talk about their experiences at school and how they manage conflict on the pitch.

The players gave great advice to the boys about how important school is, and also provided them with some valuable advice on how to keep your cool in situations of conflict. Adam and Robbie were very inspirational and a real role models for the young people.
