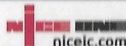

GARY BRABIN

Welcome back to all supporters to Kenilworth Road for this afternoon's Blue Square Bet Premier game against Eastbourne Borough.

I'd like to welcome Gary Wilson, his management team and players plus the directors and supporters of Eastbourne who have made the journey from the South Coast today.

Our visitors suffered relegation last week when they held in-form Kidderminster to a 1-1 draw. In any usual circumstance that would be viewed as an excellent result. After all we have twice been held by Kidderminster over the past few months.

It is a testament to Gary Wilson that he has committed his future to the club despite their relegation and I wish him and the club well next season as they hope to bounce straight back up.

It seems a while since we last played at Kenilworth Road having played three successive games away from home.

Our victory over Southport when we were last at home was a fantastic performance, crowned by six goals scored by six different players.

From a personal point of view it was great to earn my first win but I was absolutely delighted for the players who deservedly took the plaudits on a thoroughly enjoyable afternoon.

I think all the hard work and effort from the players was rewarded. It was important to get the first win, because it was becoming a bit of a monkey on my back but as I keep saying it's not about me, it's about the players.

I believe in their ability and want them to play with smiles on their faces and that certainly showed against Southport.

I knew that the game at Crawley was going to be tough given the fact they were crowned champions and were due to receive the trophy after the game but I told the players to concentrate on their own game.

Obviously it wasn't ideal to concede in the manner we did so early but after a shaky first 20 minutes we grew into the game and I genuinely thought that we would go on and win the game given our dominance.

We expected Crawley to come out all guns blazing at the start and I experimented with a 4-3-3 formation because I think we have the players in the squad that can adapt to fit into different formations.

Alex Lawless got us on level terms and from that point onwards I thought we were unlucky not to spoil their championship party.

On the road again at Mansfield last Saturday it was frustrating once more to come up against the force that is their goalkeeper David Grof who continues to be the scourge of our attacking play.

No matter how hard we tried we just could not beat him and the fact he was named man of the match once again reflected how the game went for us.

The first half we played some terrific football and we were unfortunate not to score with chances in both halves. Mansfield had one shot

at goal with about 15 minutes left so to leave Field Mill with just a point left us all frustrated.

At York on Tuesday we went down to our first defeat since I took charge and naturally I was disappointed with a number of things on the night with the final score the most galling.

I don't wish to go into detail about my removal from the dugout in the first half but I was frustrated that I was unable to watch my team during the second half. It was a night of high emotion and York were desperate to win to keep their hopes of the Play-Offs alive.

We have just three matches left to play before we embark on what we hope will be a successful campaign in the Play-Offs.

It is going to be tough but I am confident this group of players are good enough to earn promotion to the Football League.

Thank you for all of your support in recent weeks and I'd like to especially thank those of you who travelled to York on Tuesday night.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

Welcome to all supporters for today's game against Eastbourne and a warm welcome to the Eastbourne players, staff and supporters who have made the journey from the South coast.

Unfortunately Eastbourne had their fate sealed earlier this week when it was confirmed that they would drop out of the Blue Square Bet Premier next season. We wish them all the very best for a return to this level at the first attempt.

We are sure that the fact they are relegated already will make no difference to their players who will try their best today. Often when the pressure is lifted and your fate is known, teams produce some of their best performances so today is sure to be a hotly-contested game.

Today should also see us secure our Play-Off place with only a point needed. We will not know our semi-final opponents for a few days yet but as soon as that is confirmed we hope to get tickets on sale at the first opportunity.

We know that timings are very tight from the last game of the league season to the start of the Play-Offs, with Bank Holidays to negotiate too, so please bear with us as we will ensure everyone gets the tickets they need in the short timeframe that we will have. Full details of how to purchase tickets will be on the official website.

Since my last programme notes were published I have to report I have been given an official warning from the Football Association over the contents of my various notes this season. It appears that football is a game of opinions except of course certain people, like myself, are not 'allowed' opinions.

It is a huge shame that honest thoughts cannot be aired when it comes to members of the officiating bodies, especially as the 'Respect' campaign is the flagship of the FA. Only making positive noises about people is hardly showing respect.

To respect people there has to be openness, honesty and the good and the bad - that is not always just saying the things people want to hear, it's also saying the things people do not want to hear. Combined with the right actions, this earns true respect doesn't it?

The definition of respect is "to admire someone deeply as a result of their abilities, qualities or achievements." Remember that - 'admire deeply'. Now you know what the FA want in their campaign, I'm sure that like myself you will oblige.

In my opinion, until there is two-way dialogue, until the referees are no longer deemed to be infallible, until there can be some humility rather than table thumping or autocratic decisions (no, I was not asked by the FA to defend myself - I just received the final warning in the post), then we all will continue to look on in amazement at a one-sided relationship. Very rarely do one-sided relationships engender any sort of respect. Normally they just lead one side to fear and the other side to control.

How is this good for fans? How is this good for the game? How is this good for referees? The referees and their assistants around the country get so much stick every week from the paying customer simply because the referee never, ever has to justify any decisions they make, or answer to any of the impacts they cause. This means that we all just focus on the bad decisions because those are always the ones left undebated by official sources.

We are told time and time again that football remains one of the few major sports where technology of any kind does not work. Why? There is so much at stake in our billion pound industry/sport that surely lessons can be learnt from other sports who have benefited tremendously from the sensible and reliable use of technology or even extra officials. Helping officials to be more accurate is surely a good

thing - something that can help in gaining respect.

Ex-players and pundits will say that technology is not needed because it detracts from the game. It should be pointed out to them however that rarely are/were they severely disadvantaged by mistaken decisions - maybe an incorrect sending off on occasion but they still got paid. However, clubs and countries have suffered disproportionately by wrong decisions costing them serious money, effort, and heartache - just ask the England squad in the World Cup game against Germany.

And for anyone that says "decisions even themselves out over the season", I'm sorry I just do not buy that. Why on earth should we hope for decisions to be broadly right over the course of nine months when they could be far better every single Saturday, at every single ground? Which is fair? Which is 21st Century? Which builds respect for officials?

My point is that OK I have been warned, but I have been warned for having an honest opinion. I have not incited any trouble, I have not caused anyone any harm, I have not been abusive or disrespectful. I do not deny that there will be some embarrassment for some in what I have previously written but then again it is hard for anyone to defend the debacle that was the World Cup bid.

So is this where football is headed? Indisputable and total support for officials from people in the game no matter what their standard and performance level? Respect whether it is earned or not? Encouraging directors and managers of football clubs to lie to their own supporters and paying customers just to appease the governing bodies? Faking pleasure and satisfaction at officiating to appease those who hand out the punishments?

Is this what we are meant to teach the next generation? Is this how we want our children to act? Perhaps the sad day will come when we all decide that silence is the best option. Then our beautiful game of opinions will simply lose its soul.

Enjoy the game and sing up for the lads - your voice counts!

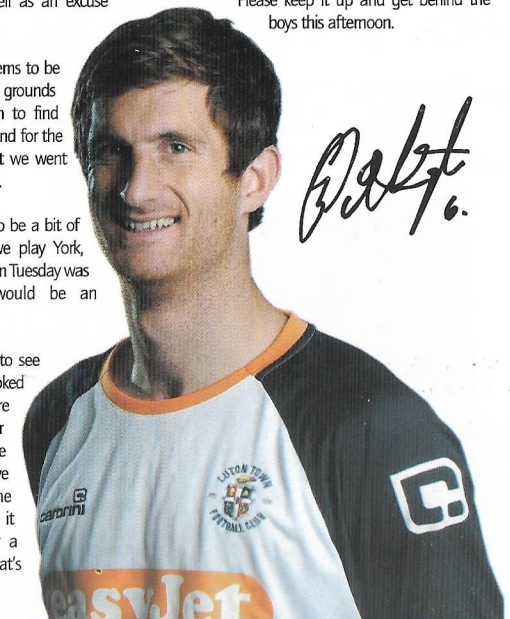
We were disappointed with ourselves having created a number of chances and we were unhappy that we could not make our numerical advantage count when York were reduced to 10 men shortly after they took the lead.

HATTERS CHATTER

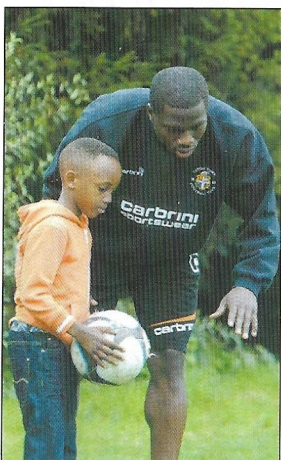
TOP DAY FOR ADOPTION SOCIETY KIDS

INTRODUCING EASTBOURNE BOROUGH

HISTORY

Last season Garry Wilson led the Sports to safety in their second season in non-league's top flight after a last-day-of-the-season victory over Oxford United.

In their first campaign he guided the Sussex club to an unprecedented 13th place in the Conference following their elevation from the Conference South in 2007/08.

Eastbourne were playing County League football as late as 2000 under the name Langley Sports before their climb up the pyramid.

After being renamed in 2001 the club won promotion from the Southern League East Division in 2002/03 before the non-league's restructuring the following season saw the Sports lineup in a newly formed Conference South in 2004/05.

Their rise to today's position among the top 24 non-league sides in the country could have come earlier had Altrincham not beaten them in a North v South Play-Off final in 2005/06.

While the Hatters were winning the Littlewoods Cup with victory over Arsenal in 1988, Eastbourne – then known as Langley Sports – were lifting the Sussex County League Division 2 title.

Today the Sports arrive at Kenilworth Road



already relegated to Blue Square Bet South after last weekend's 1-1 draw with Kidderminster dashed their survival hopes.

LAST MEETING EASTBOURNE 2-4 LUTON 16th OCTOBER 2010

The Town came out on top in a six-goal thriller at Priory Lane back in October.

After a bright start it was the Town that drew first blood when captain George Pilkington headed them ahead on 18 minutes after Keith Keane had done well to head a deep Andy Drury corner across goal.

But just when it looked as though the Hatters were going to build on that goal, Eastbourne levelled matters against the run of play on 36 minutes when Steve Cook got up ahead of the Town defence.

The Hatters began the second half well but it took them until the 63rd minute to restore the lead when Matthew Barnes-Homer delicately lobbed Nikki Banks in the home goal for his eighth goal of the season.

Again the hosts had other ideas and the Town's lead had lasted five minutes when Matt Crabb was allowed room to cross from the left to pick out the on-rushing Simon Johnson who stabbed home from close range.

But that was harsh on the Hatters and they retook the lead for the third time five minutes later when Darryl Crow scored the first of two goals in a three-minute spell to put the game beyond Eastbourne.

First the striker finished from close range after Banks had parried Barnes-Homer's shot, following Drury's rightwing cross.

Then, after Drury's attempted pass into the path of Crow was handled, the striker stepped up to slot confidently past Banks's outstretched left glove.

That knocked the stuffing out of the hosts and the Town could have had a fifth when Amari Morgan-Smith saw a shot hit the post.

MEET THE MANAGER:

GARRY WILSON

A former Scotland Under-18 international defender, Wilson took control at Priory Lane in 1999.

In his first full season he led the team to win the Sussex County League and with it promotion to the Southern League Eastern Division for the first time in the club's history. Two seasons later he led them into the Southern League Premier Division, winning a place in the newly formed Conference South.

Gaining fifth place in the first season, Wilson saw the team enter the Play-Off final of the Conference National at Stoke's Britannia Stadium where they lost to Altrincham.

There was better news in 2008 when he guided the team into the Play-Off final again this time they won 2-0 against Hampton & Richmond Borough at Stevenage.

Despite the Sports' relegation this term, Wilson has already committed his future at Priory Lane.

Eastbourne Borough's last visit to Kenilworth Road saw the Hatters record their first league win in nearly three months when they beat them 4-1 last season but that statistic was more down to the bad weather and the progress the Hatters were making in the FA Cup than anything more alarming.

The game at the end of December 2009 was only possible after volunteers had played their part in the win by clearing the pitch of snow for the game to go ahead. Today a sun drenched ground should be awaiting Eastbourne's arrival for what will be one of their final games at this level, for a year or so at least.

16 months ago, at roughly the halfway point, the defeat left the Sports in the relegation zone as the year ticked in to 2010 and it is that same situation that they arrive today, only without the games needed to get out of trouble.

Their relegation was confirmed last weekend when they drew 1-1 at home to Kidderminster Harriers, a first-half goal from Richard Pacquette had given them but hope the Harriers levelled in the second period through Tom Shaw.

Results elsewhere in the Blue Square Bet Premier confirmed the Sports demotion to the Blue Square Bet South at the final whistle but plans are well under way to bounce back, with manager Garry Wilson and his assistant Nick Greenwood agreeing a new contract that will see them oversee Eastbourne's attempts to return at the first attempt.

On agreeing the new deal, Wilson said: "I am delighted to be at Priory Lane for the 2011/12 season.

"I have been at this club for over a decade and there has always been a desire to improve and be successful. That hasn't changed, and I look forward to the challenges the new season will bring."

In the build-up to last weekend's game and before Wilson had agreed the deal, Chairman Len Smith had told The Argus that he felt that Wilson wasn't the reason the club were relegated, and that he deserved the opportunity to stay in charge of the team he has taken up from the Sussex County League to where they are now.



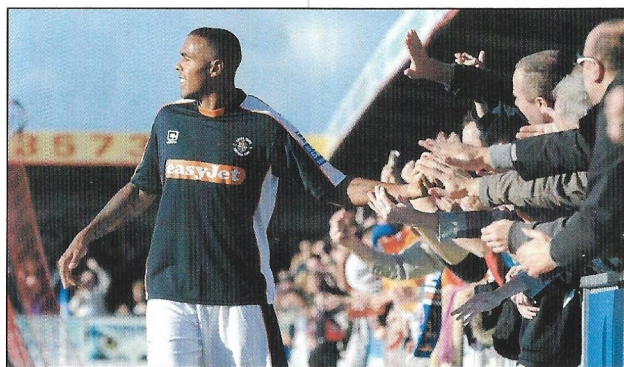

He said: "Obviously Garry has got to take some of the responsibility for where we are this season but there is no way he is to blame for all of it.

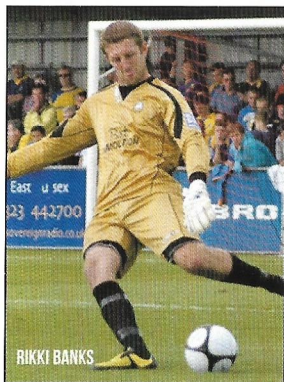
"He has worked within a tight budget and has done well to keep us in this division for three seasons.

RIKKI BANKS

The first signing of the season, Rikki joined Eastbourne from Lewes where he had played for the past two seasons and he was awarded the Manager's Player Of The Year award in May 2009. Rikki has developed strongly over recent years and attracted the attention of Football League scouts.

DANNY KNOWLES

Born in Sidcup, Danny began his career as a trainee at Gillingham in 2003. At 19 he signed as a professional with the Kent club and made more than 100 appearances for their reserve side. In July 2006 he joined Grays Athletic, making 15 appearances and going out on loan to Crawley and Fisher. In 2008 he signed a two-year contract with Weymouth and made 17 appearances but was part of the exodus in February 2009 when players gave 14-days' notice over non-payment of wages. He joined Woking for the remainder of the 2008/09 season. Danny won the battle with Michael Jordan for the gloves in the 2009/10 season but suffered a double bone fracture away at Kettering Town in the final weeks of the season.

DEFENDERS

BEN AUSTIN

Voted Supporters' Player of the Season in 2000/01 and 2001/02. Missed the Sports' Sussex Senior Cup victory in 2002 after being rushed to hospital with appendicitis after the final League game

and was forced to miss much of the 2003/04 season after being diagnosed with two vertebral fractures. Ben has been a consistent player as the club have progressed through the pyramid and few who witnessed them will forget the play-off goals at Thurrock and Cambridge City in late 2005. He was again voted supporters POS in 2009/2010.

DARREN BAKER

A true one-club player, Darren made his first-team debut in 1992. He began his career with Brighton and Hove Albion, and Littlehampton Town Youth; and was a member of the Sussex Representative side that won the South West Counties Championship in 1999/00. Darren holds the club record for the number of senior appearances, a record unlikely ever to be beaten. Rarely has a disappointing game but missed the back-end of 2004/05 after fracturing his arm, including the Play-off final at the Britannia Stadium. He put that disappointment behind him to form a strong partnership with Marc Pullan, culminating in a clean sheet in the 2007/08 Play-Offs. Darren ably made the step up to Conference Premier in 2008/09 as an almost ever present in the starting XI and recently made his 900th appearance for the club.

GARY ELPHICK

An England National Game XI international who was the Havant and Waterlooville Supporters' Player of the Year 2008/09, Gary started his career at Brighton but made just two appearances - one start and one substitute - before loan spells with Aldershot and St. Albans. At the end of the 2005/06 season he was released by Albion and signed for St. Albans City. Whilst with City he earned his England cap and he was also voted their Player of the Year in 2006/07. He made a total of 84 appearances and scored six goals for St. Albans before moving to Havant and Waterlooville in December 2007. Gary was an almost ever present for Boro in 2009/10.

MATT LANGSTON

Towering centre-half who joined the Sports from Histon at the start of the season. At 6 ft 3 in, Matt established himself as an essential part of the Stutes' defence and after his debut in 2006 he became known for his goals as well as his contribution to defensive clean sheets. Matt sprung to national attention in December 2008 as the scorer of the goal that knocked Leeds United out of the FA Cup in front of a national

viewing TV public. Matt started the 2009/10 season as the Histon captain but joined Crawley Town in March on loan and completed the journey to the Sussex coast for the 2010/11 season.

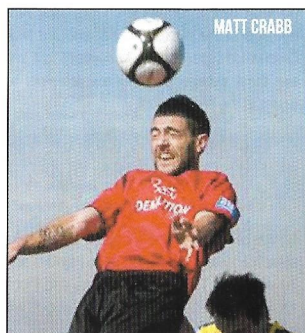
MIDFIELDERS

Daniel started his career at Leyton Orient but was sold at the age of 18 to Barnet for £40,000. He then moved to Oxford United before joining Crawley in the summer of 2005. In November 2006 Dan signed for Cambridge United, progressing to captain the side. He joined Boro on loan in November 2008 before agreeing a permanent transfer in January 2009.

MATT CRABB

Loyal to the club, skilful on the ball and quick. Fearless in the tackle, and an exciting player to watch, his dogged determination has made him a great favourite with the Priory Lane crowd. He picked up the Manager's Player of the Season award for 2008/09 and, as one of the few players at the club who has paid to watch the side in the County League, a local lad who has travelled all the way from the parks to the pinnacle of non-league football with the Sports.

MATT SMART

Began his career at Gillingham and spent two and a half seasons there, winning the Capital League for the Gills' reserves. Matt spent a season at Crawley Town, and subsequently had spells at Shoreham, Horsham and Wick before joining Boro. He has represented England as a member of the Futsal squad whilst with Eastbourne and continues to be as hard-working in the midfield in 2010 as he was in 2001.

SIMON WEATHERSTONE

Born in Reading, Simon's first club was Oxford United where he made 56 appearances and scored four goals between 1996 and 2001. The midfielder then went on to represent Boston United, Yeovil Town, Hornchurch, Stevenage Borough and Weymouth before joining Crawley in May 2008. He made 39 appearances for the Red Devils, scoring six goals. Injury limited Simon's appearances on the park in his first season at Priory Lane in 2009/2010 but he will always be remembered for his penalty against his home-town club that kept Boro in the Conference National division with the club just minutes away from relegation.

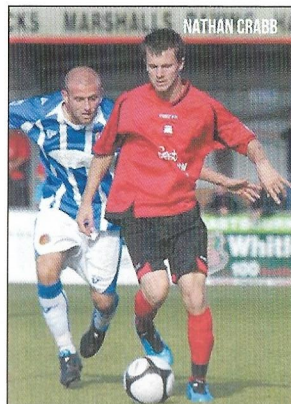
STRIKERS

He was well known to long-time Boro fans as he has made several appearances against the Sports and has represented Farnborough Town, St Albans City and Worthing amongst others. He made a big impact on the national stage when he scored for Havant & Waterlooville in their FA Cup fourth round game against Liverpool at Anfield in 2008. Richard has played internationally for the

Dominica national football team, scoring on his debut against Barbados in 2008 and has gained two caps.

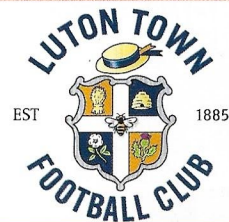
JAMIE TAYLOR

ROSS TRELEAVEN

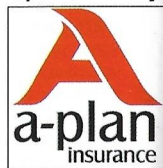

MATCH REPORT

The Hatters hit Southport for six to avenge their defeat in the north-west and register Gary Brabin's first win in charge.

A late flurry of goals from Freddie Murray, Jason Walker, Zdenek Kroca and Claude Gnakpa, added to first-half strikes from Amani Morgan-Smith and Robbie Willmott, punished some lax defending from the visitors.

The Hatters made a bright start and a confident-looking Morgan-Smith went close with a bending right-foot effort from just outside the area early on. Morgan-Smith got his name on the scoresheet though, curling a fine 20-yard freekick around the wall and into the bottom right-hand corner of Tony McMillan's goal to send the Town in front on 22 minutes.

The ball was in the net again five minutes later as Jake Howells finished expertly after more neat interplay between Walker and Morgan-Smith, but the linesman ruled that the teenage wide-man was offside.

The Town extended their lead in excellent fashion on 39 minutes. Alex Lawless broke forward and timed a through-ball perfectly for Willmott to skip clear, get his body between the last defender and the ball and finish well.

Southport began the second half on top and Mark Tyler had to be alert to tip away John-Paul Kissock's freekick from the left-hand edge of the penalty area.

Walker should have extended the Town's lead with 20 minutes to go after being put through by the unselfish Lawless, but again his shot was too high.

Murray registered his first senior goal with six minutes left on the clock to make it 3-0 when flicking the ball over his marker and hitting a left-foot shot that deflected its way home.

It was 4-0 two minutes later when Lawless again broke through the midfield and miss-hit his shot into Walker's path who poked the ball over the line at the second attempt.

Kroca then got in on the act to make it five when tapping home from close range after George Pilkington had headed Keith Keane's freekick across goal.

And, completing a remarkable final few minutes, Gnakpa made it six from the penalty spot after being brought down by the goalkeeper.

POST-MATCH REACTION

The Hatters picked up their first win in five after a thumping 6-0 win over Southport much to the joy of the 5,844 crowd at Kenilworth Road.

A dominant performance from the Town was rewarded with a flurry of goals from six different goalscorers earning new manager Gary Brabin his first victory in charge.

Town midfielder Alex Lawless, who had two assists, was delighted with the team performance and said: "You go into every game hoping for a scoreline like that.

"We have been waiting for it and it's been a long time coming. We were all showing for each other, working hard and our confidence is brimming."

Lawless feels that the season-long push for automatic promotion had at times taken its toll on confidence and affected performances of the Hatters players.

"The gaffer has been telling us to relax," he said. "We've been chasing Crawley all season which has been putting a bit of pressure on.

"But now we have that freedom in our minds as we know we can't catch them."

The Town registered a total of 17 attempts on goal and could well have piled on more humiliation to a relegation-threatened Southport.

The 27-year-old midfielder believes that the team has been performing well in recent weeks despite a four-game winless streak.



"I think the disappointment of drawing when we felt we should have won had a real effect on the game today. But I think that result has been a long time coming and its great feeling to have.

"Knowing we were that close to winning in those games, coupled with the fact we didn't do a lot wrong to draw, meant our confidence was running high."

Finishing off games has been a small area for concern for Town this season as Lawless acknowledges.

"We were really dominant today, but we've done that a few times this season and teams have come back to earn points," he added.

"There have been times in the past that we could have put teams to the sword but we didn't, which can take a bit out of you when it doesn't happen.

"But I think we've learnt from our lessons a bit. The teams we have played have scored at crucial times and we've stopped that from happening now which is really important as we go into the Play-Offs."

MATCH REPORT

The Hatters' extended their unbeaten run under new boss Gary Brabin to five games after recovering from going behind inside 33 seconds to hold champions Crawley to a point.

Steve Evans's side punished the Town when Kyle McFadzean's low ball into the sixyard box was poked home by striker Richard Brodie past an exposed Mark Tyler.

The Hatters were shellshocked by going behind in such dramatic circumstances and Crawley almost doubled their lead on seven minutes when Brodie volleyed against the crossbar following Craig McAllister's flickon.

Scott Neilson's backpost header was tipped over by Tyler on 17 minutes but the Hatters - playing a 4-3-3 formation - gradually got to grips with the threat of the hosts and began to assert pressure on the Red Devils.

The Town were seeing plenty of the ball with Jason Walker, Robbie Willmott and Claude Gnakpa in particular worrying the home defence and lo and behold on 29 minutes they deservedly equalised.

Walker placed a header into the path of Willmott who poked goalwards a shot that was saved by the legs of Scott Shearer but the ball ran loose to an unmarked and on-rushing Alex Lawless who finished first time to make it one apiece.

Halfchances continued to fall the Town's way as they upped the ante in search of a second before the break. George Pilkington saw a leftfoot shot headed off the line by Dannie Bulman and Freddie Murray headed over following a clever corner routine.

Willmott came within a whisker of putting the Hatters 2-1 up on 55 minutes when curling over a freekick from 20 yards.

The Town continued to dominate with Gnakpa, Lawless, Willmott and Walker the main tormentors-in-chief and with 18 minutes left they were given a man advantage when home defender Charlie Wassmer was sent off for a second bookable offence.

Despite that Crawley began to get on top but the Hatters came the closest to finding a late-winner when Lawless was denied his second goal when the outstretched hand of Shearer turned his shot around the post.

POST-MATCH REACTION



The Hatters' continued an unbeaten five match run after earning a deserved point away to newly crowned league champions Crawley Town.

The Town recovered well after conceding within the first minute as midfielder Alex Lawless grabbed his third goal of the season midway through the first half.

On-loan midfielder Paul Carden was happy with the final result at the Broadfield Stadium.

"We started poorly conceding early as we didn't stick to the jobs we were told to do and got punished for it," he said.

"I think we were a bit jittery for the first 15 minutes but then we controlled the game and deservedly got back into it with a great goal.

"When it got to halftime I think that Crawley were happy to see the interval and we wanted

to stay out there. We did well to get back into it and showed real character."

Lining up against the Blue Square Premier champions was made even harder by the fact Crawley were due to lift the trophy after the game, something that Carden believes can be positive for the Town.

"The manager said we should use it as a benchmark of where we want to be and we should be spurred on by the celebrations.

"We need to use the experience of seeing their achievements to help us to win promotion through the Play-Offs."

Gary Brabin opted for a different set up for the trip against the Red Devils, utilising a 4-3-3 formation which tried to match Crawley's normal lineup.

"During the first 15 minutes it worked quite well

as we got to grips with it. We got the ball wide like we were told to do and I thought we hurt them a number of times," Carden continued.

"Maybe we could have been crisper in the second half but we made their keeper work hard and we had a good few chances at the end."

And Carden was delighted to be back in the starting line-up, making his ninth appearance of the campaign, but understands the importance of having an in form squad.

"You have to get used to it. We have some excellent players in our squad and if you're not on form then you could spend some time on the sidelines.

"I'm old enough and ugly enough to understand that and hopefully I can give the manager a bit of a headache for the next game. Hopefully I can become part of his plans for the final push of the season."

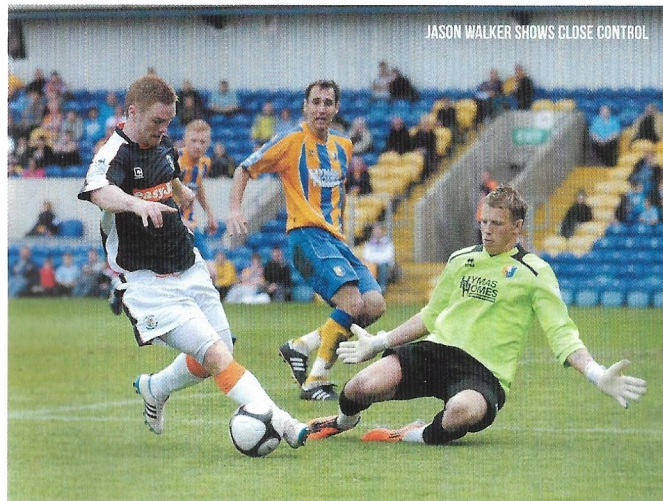

MATCH REPORT

The Hatters were thwarted by another heroic goalkeeping display from Mansfield goalkeeper David Grof as they had to settle for a point in a goalless draw.

The stopper - who frustrated the Town in the first leg of their FA Trophy tie last month - pulled off a string of stops to keep the Town out.

Mansfield rarely threatened Mark Tyler's goal and it took the hosts until the 77th minute to register a shot at goal but it ended goalless.

The Town dominated the first half and should have led at the break. Amari Morgan-Smith almost profited from a mix-up in the Mansfield defence on 11 minutes and another mistake at the back from the Stags nearly allowed the same player to score four minutes later.

Claude Gnakpa was the main source of promising attacks from the Town and the Frenchman orchestrated a fine move on 23 minutes when he launched a ball out to the left to Jake Howells who crossed for Alex Lawless but the midfielder could only side-foot straight at Grof.

Jason Walker forced Grof into a save four minutes later when in an offside position after another fine flowing move from the visitors involving Dan Gleeson and Gnakpa.

Gnakpa and Lawless saw shots blocked and saved respectively in a 30-second spell on 36 minutes as the Town continued to press before Walker headed wide from close range at the back post following a cross from Lawless.

Gary Brabin introduced Matthew Barnes-Horner for Morgan-Smith at halftime and the Town's top scorer almost put them ahead three minutes after the restart when his powerful shot from outside the box was beaten away by Grof.

Grof then saved a low shot from Gnakpa two minutes later but the Town winger was injured in the lead-up to that effort and had to be replaced by Robbie Willmott.

The Mansfield goalkeeper then saved another shot from Barnes-Horner on 72 minutes from 12-yards before doing the same to keep out a long-range daisy-cutter from Willmott four minutes later.

Conor Higginson registered the Stags' first shot that Mark Tyler dealt with comfortably after Lawless was again denied by Grof with a low shot with just four minutes left on the clock, the hosts held out and the Hatters had to settle for a point.

POST-MATCH REACTION



The Hatters were once again thwarted by another outstanding display by Mansfield Town goalkeeper David Grof who earned his side a valuable point at Field Mill at the weekend.

The Town were frustrated by the big Hungarian who pulled off a string of fine saves from Alex Lawless and Matthew Barnes-Horner as the visitors dominated proceedings.

After the game midfielder Keith Keane reflected on the Hatters frustrations of recent matches with Mansfield.

"We have a couple of bogey grounds in this league and unfortunately this is one of them but we haven't managed to break it yet," he said.

On paper it appeared to be a great time to play the Stags as they were playing their fourth game in just eight days.

"I think they were excellent today after playing so many games in a week. To be honest if that

was us and we had played that many times then we would have been delighted with a draw," continued Keane.

"But we're disappointed as we should have had more energy, especially in the second half, where we could have imposed ourselves more."

Keane is aware of the importance of trying out new formations, just as they did in the previous match against Crawley where the Town tested a different 4-3-3 formation.

"You always need a 'Plan B' and I think for a couple of years now we haven't really had one.

"The gaffer is trying to teach us and I think it is working. It's also giving people the chance to play who haven't played in a while to get a bit of form."

The versatile 24-year-old has found that even his role within the team has changed under the new manager.

"I've always been expected to hang around in front of the back four and stop the other team playing.

"The gaffer said he wants me to get further up the pitch and I'm trying to adapt so hopefully it will work."

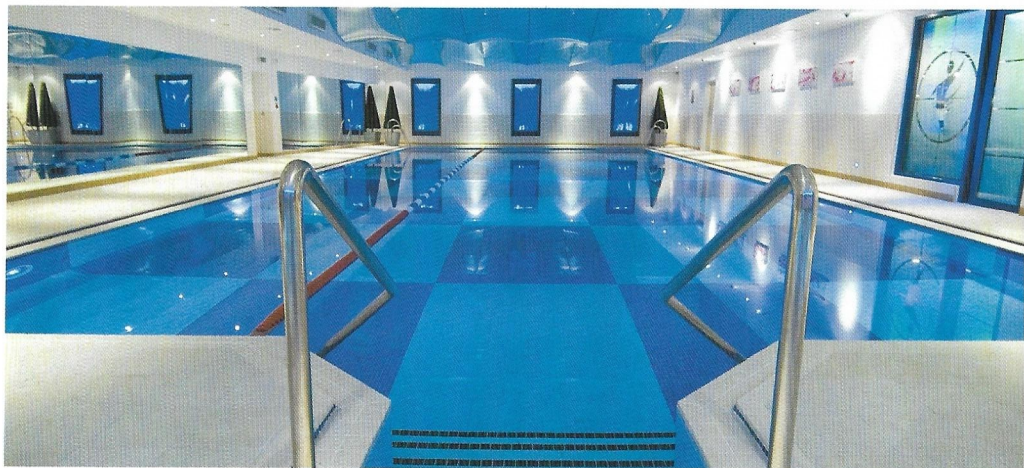
With the Play-Offs looming in only a few weeks time, if all goes to plan, Keane is quick to point out that the team must concentrate on the task in hand.

"Obviously it's in the back of our minds but we're more concentrated on trying to play how the gaffer wants us to play so we're ready for it.

"I think that is what these games are all about, trying to get into a bit of form and hitting the Play-Offs in good stead.

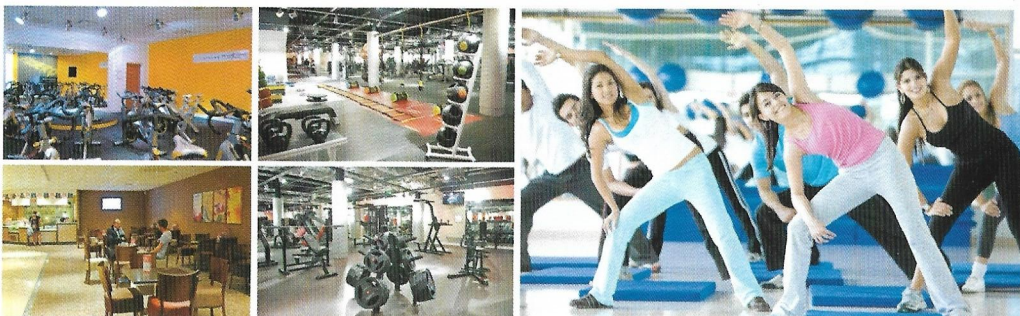
"There's a good unity here within the squad. All the lads get along and we're confident we can do well in our next game."

11 The number of matches previously played on this date at Kenilworth Road. Luton have won six, drawn three and lost just twice, scoring 30 goals and conceding 15.

9 Incredibly, in these 11 matches nine players have scored two or more goals. This started with the first game played back in 1921 when Newport County were the visitors. George Butcher netted twice for the Hatters in a 2-2 draw.

2 It was a case of all the twos 14 years later when Northampton Town were the visitors to Kenilworth Road and again the match finished 2-2, this time with Jack Ball scoring a brace.

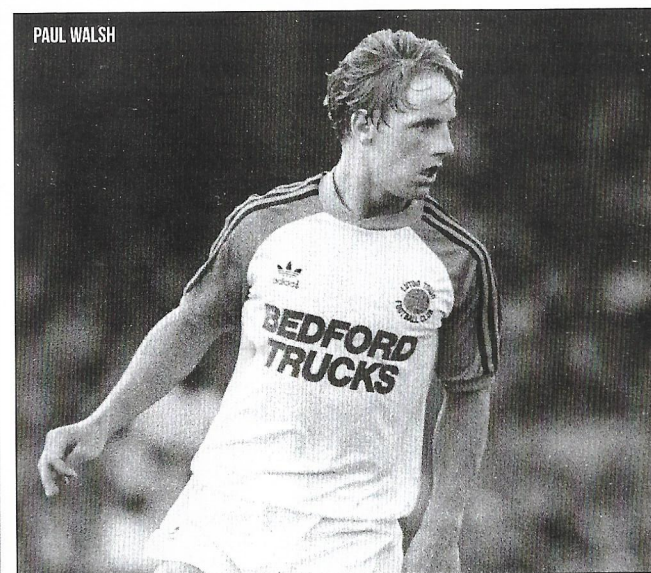
5 The Hatters netted five goals against Swansea Town in a Division Two fixture in 1938. Eddie Connolly and Charlie Ferguson both scored twice, with George Stephenson also scoring in a 5-1 win.

6 The biggest margin of victory, and the first clean sheet on this day came in 1949 with a 6-0 victory over Lincoln City. Once again two players netted a brace, Jimmy Mulvaney and Bobby Brennan, with Mulvaney netting his only goals for Luton. Charlie Burtenshaw and Jack Taylor were also on the scoresheet.

4 The high scoring on this date continued with a 4-2 win in 1955 against Port Vale, in front of the highest attendance on this day, 16,704. Gordon Turner netted twice with Roy Davies and Peter MacEwan also scoring.

1 The first fixture in the top flight on this day came in 1960 when West Ham United were the visitors. Luton won 3-1 with Joe McBride, George Cummins and an own goal settling the tie.

7 The first defeat came in the seventh

fixture when Leyton Orient won 3-1 in 1962, with Bob Morton scoring for the Hatters.

0 The only goalless game on this date came in 1966 against Lincoln City in a Fourth Division match. This was the first time the Hatters had failed to score on this day and strangely, it also meant that in the seven consecutive matches played at Kenilworth Road on this date Luton had scored from none to six goals inclusive!

2 The second time the Hatters failed to score came in the second defeat on this date - a 1-0 loss to Middlesbrough in 1973.

4 The number of years after the Middlesbrough loss, and also the number of goals scored against Notts County in 1977. The Division Two fixture saw Ron Futcher

net twice in the first half either side of a goal for the visitors. Ricky Hill made it 3-1 before the break and David Geddis, on loan from Ipswich, wrapped up the win in the second half before a late consolation for County.

3 Paul Walsh netted all three goals in the 3-1 win against Swansea City in 1983. Amazingly, the last time that a match was played on this date at Kenilworth Road - 28 years ago.

6 The number of years since Luton last played on this date, and it was time for celebration at the Racecourse Ground as the Hatters won 2-1 against Wrexham. Curtis Davies and Chris Coyne scored the second-half goals to earn the win, and confirm that Luton Town were League One Champions for 2004/05.

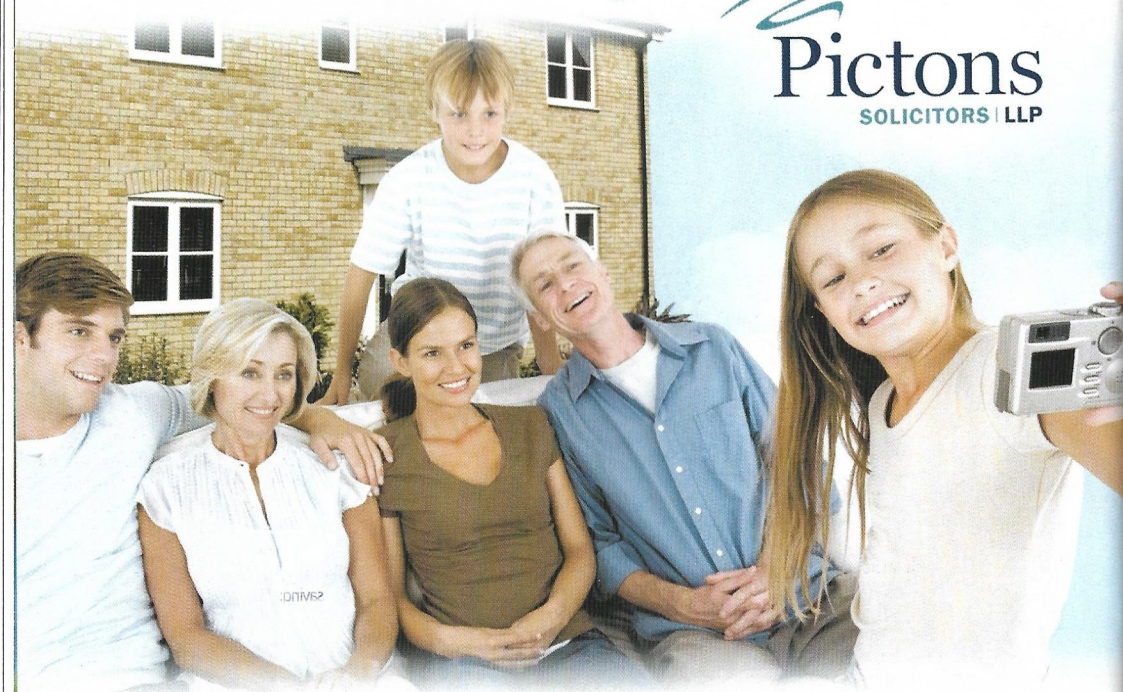

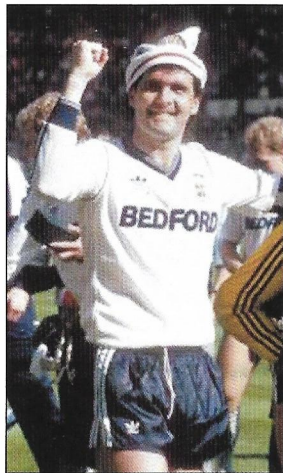
This away kit sure saw some memorable Town fixtures over the years, most notably the great escape at Derby County on the final day of the 1988/89 campaign.

Stephen (Steve) Brian FOSTER

An inspirational skipper and leader, Steve was the Luton Town captain during arguably their finest hour, lifting the Littlewoods Cup in 1988.

Portsmouth-born Steve started with his home town club as a forward but reverted to centre-half and was then sold on to top-flight Brighton for £150,000 in 1979.

Steve won England caps whilst at the Goldstone and was virtually ever-present during the Seagulls' four-year stay at the top but a change in manager saw him move to Aston Villa in March 1984,

where he was unhappy, and then to Luton in November of that year.

At Luton, Steve formed a tremendous central defensive pairing with Mal Donaghy and with it came the most successful period in the Hatters' history.

A move to Oxford followed in 1989 before he headed back to Brighton three years later.

● RON FUTCHER MANAGES TO GET HIS SHOT AWAY DURING THE 1-0 HOME WIN OVER NEWCASTLE IN FEBRUARY 1975



No sooner had promotion back to the old Division One been achieved in 1974 than Luton Town manager Harry Haslam announced that the club's transfer fee record was about to be broken, with the signing of 17-year-old Paul Futcher from Chester City.

Soon after the signing it was announced that Paul's twin brother Ron would be joining the Town for £25,000 in order to "keep him company" although we all knew that Harry Haslam was not daft, and that he had other reasons for the signing which were shown with the almost telepathic understanding between the two brothers on the pitch.

By early December the Town were rooted firmly at the bottom of the table after nine games without a win. Haslam decided, for the trip to Chelsea, to blood his secret weapon and Paul was handed his debut playing in a back

four for three months, during which time the team slipped down the table.

Paul was joined by his brother for the Christmas games and the fun then really started, as all balls played out of defence seemed to home in on Ron who became an instant hero when scoring a hat-trick against Wolves on his home debut.

The Town almost escaped the drop that season and although wise with hindsight you cannot help wondering what would have happened had the Futcher twins been given their chances earlier.

The transfer speculation then started but the Town were in no hurry to sell, with promotion back to Division One the main priority.

The Hatters missed out narrowly for two successive seasons and were in a strong position once again in November 1977 when disaster struck, with Paul being badly injured in a road accident which kept him out of the side

for three months, during which time the team slipped down the table.

Some supporters may disagree, but when Paul returned to the side he did not seem to be the same player and it was regarded as a sound piece of business when new manager David Pleat sold him to Manchester City, who had finally got their man, for £350,000.

Paul lasted two years at Maine Road before starting on a tour of five league clubs before finally quitting at 38 having amassed 698 league appearances.

Ron, meanwhile, joined his brother at Manchester City and finished his career having made a grand total of 397 league appearances for eight clubs.

AGAINST THE ODDS

● LUTON TOWN 2-0 CHELSEA. FA CUP THIRD ROUND REPLAY. 16TH JANUARY 1935.

Due to their FA Cup exploits of 1932/33 the Town won exemption to the third round of the competition the following season, when they went down narrowly at home to mighty Arsenal, and in 1934/35 they drew another plum tie in the shape of Division One side Chelsea at Stamford Bridge.

The Town were going through one of their wonderfully inconsistent periods where they would win by four goals one week then lose by the same scoreline the next. Chelsea were in a comfortable mid-table position in the top flight.

A crowd of 46,492 gathered to see the Town put in one of their better performances against strangely lacklustre opponents and it was no real surprise when Sam Bell forced the ball home, following a corner, five minutes before the interval.

The goal was hotly disputed, as many in the ground felt that the ball had not crossed the line and the London press had a field day trying to prove the impossible by hanging a ball from the crossbar to show how photographs can be deceiving, especially when taken from anywhere apart from along the goal line.

Despite all the protests the goal stood and it was not until the last 10 minutes that Chelsea decided to make a game of it and push everyone forward in an effort to score an undeserved equaliser. This they did when James Argue shot through a crowd of players to take the tie back to Luton.

In the days before floodlights cup tie replays had to be fought out on midweek afternoons which in turn would normally affect the attendance. To say that there was unprecedented interest in the game is an understatement as realised by the town's big employers who faced a major display of

downing tools on the afternoon of the match.

Skefko, George Kent, Vauxhall, Electrolux, Davis Gas Stove Co. and all the hat factories saw sense and decided to close from mid-day, with only the first two asking employees to go back after the match to make up for lost time.

The gates were closed 30 minutes from kickoff but such was the weight of numbers outside the ground that the Kenilworth Road end gates were forced open and many hundreds gained admission without paying, which added to the crush inside.

A group of police officers had to force a way through the throng to allow the Chelsea players and directors in, while hundreds of spectators lined the roof of the Bobbers Stand.

This time the police were unable or unwilling to remove them nor the hardy individual who had climbed to the top of a telegraph pole.

The official attendance was 23,041 which

smashed the previous record by over 4,000 but this figure did not account for the non-payers. The ground was dangerously overcrowded and it is a minor miracle that no-one was badly injured or even killed.

The game kicked off with a double line of spectators on the running track and rather more on the Bobbers Stand/Kenilworth Road corner where there had to be a major reshuffle every time there was a flag kick.

The Town were forced into a couple of changes from the first game with Tom Mackey suspended and Billy Thayne injured. Harry Reece and Hugh McGinnigle took their places.

Again Chelsea did not seem to have much stomach for a fight and their attempts to play 'first division football' were doomed to failure against a fired up Luton side that fought for every ball as if their lives depended on it.

The game remained scoreless until 25 minutes

from the end when a throw-in from Charlie Fraser to Fred Roberts saw the latter hook the ball into the goalmouth where Chelsea goalkeeper Jackson could only parry the ball to Jack Ball who shot into an empty net.

The second goal came soon after when Bob MacAuley was dispossessed by Ball who played the ball inside to Roberts who smashed it home.

With 20 minutes left, the injured Reece became a passenger on the wing but even then Chelsea could not raise themselves from their torpor and at the final whistle Luton supporters raced on to the pitch to chair off their heroes.

Sadly, the story does not have a happy end as the Town went out at Burnley in the next round, but the cup run had put a few more pennies into the pot which was added to when several honest supporters sent in postal orders to pay for their illegal entry to the Chelsea tie.

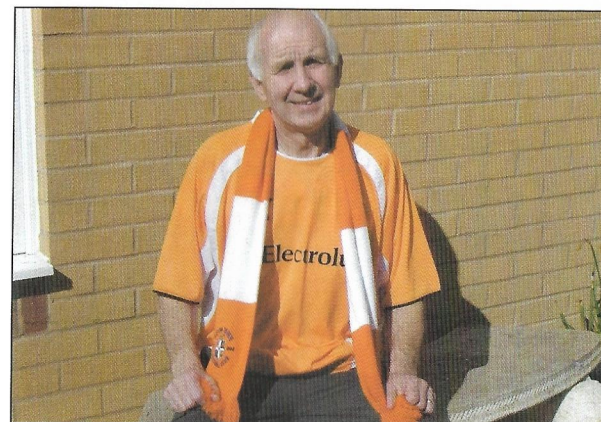

I now listen to Hatters Player at home and receive text messages from my friends Linda and Peter. I do return to Luton from time to time and watch in the Main Stand. However, during my time supporting the Hatters I have watched in all areas of the stadium. In the early sixties in Keny terrace, in the 60s as part of the "Oak Road choir" and in 70s I was in the Enclosure. I then watched games from the Kenilworth Road end when it turned allseater before sitting in the David Preece Stand and then the Main Stand.

First game: 18th April 1960 Luton 1 (Bingham) Blackburn Rovers 1 - I stood on the Kenilworth Road terrace with my dad and his mate. I'm not really sure if I enjoyed it. At that time I was not much interested in football - how times change!

First Memory: 1959 FA Cup Final day. I went shopping with Mum and Dad in town and as you could imagine George Street was a tad quiet that day. However, the street was a sea of black and white and my mum bought me a little black and white man made of wool as a keepsake. Sadly I was not yet into football and did not watch the match on TV as I was out playing with my mates. I found out the score when I returned home.

Best goal seen: There were so many over the years but it has to be that winner in the Littlewoods Cup Final in 1988 - it just went in!

Best Match Witnessed: Without a doubt the Littlewoods Cup final 1988. The euphoria of the penalty save, the equaliser and then the winning goal as the dock was ticking down leaving Arsenal with no time to hit back! BRILLIANT.

Worst Match: Losing at Notts County on the last day of the season in 1992 to be relegated from the top flight. The Luton fans were singing "always look on the bright side

of life" as we left which made it feel like worse things couldn't happen. But then in 2009 the worst did happen and we were relegated out of the Football League.

Best Individual Performance by a

player: I know we were in League 2 at the time but John-Louis Valois's debut in September 2001 against Torquay at Kenilworth Road must be the best I have seen. Show-boating at its best!

Favorite Kit: Classic 60s white shirts and black shorts - clean and smart.

Favorite All Time Player: (Super) Malcolm Macdonald - I was lucky to see his transformation from left-back to centre forward to great effect. He was brilliant!

Favorite All Time Manager: David Pleat. I saw him play for the Hatters and as manager he was class in both his stints in the top job. From winning the Division 2 championship to running on the pitch in "those shoes" and beige suit makes him a legend.

All-Time Luton 11: Les Sealey, Kirk Stephens, Paul Fitcher, Steve Foster, Matt Taylor, Graham French, Bruce Rioch, David Moss, Ricky Hill, Paul Walsh, Malcolm Macdonald.

I Love Luton Because... They are a family club. Generations of my family have watched the Hatters - my grandmother, mother, father, my two sons, wife, and grandson. When I took my eldest son to his first game at six years old, he looked up at me at the end and said "Dad, can we come again?" He has never looked back and his brother was always bending my ear to go to a match and when he reached six it all started again. And the same happened to my grandson too!

Premier League Fulham have again raided the Blue Square Bet Premier for teenage talent.

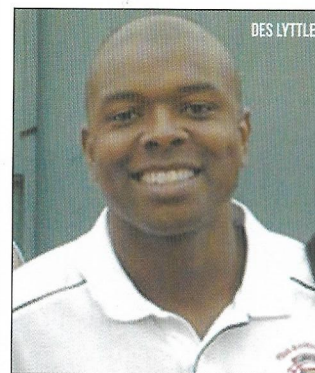
