## Luton's party people put bank for Histon building

'ARE you Watford in disguise?' was the cry from the Luton fans behind Wes Foderingham's goal when he picked the ball out of the net for the

third time yesterday.

How Histon would love to have the resources of the Hatters' Championship-based arch rivals.

But the Stutes did receive one final big pay-day thanks to the travelling hordes from Bedfordshire, who brought a carnival atmosphere to the last Blue Square Bet Premier fixture to be staged at the Glass World Stadium for the foreseeable future.

In his programme notes, Histon manager David Livermore spoke of his admiration for the club's board following the reduction of the near-£1million debts to around the £85,000 mark

But he reiterated to Stutes supporters the lack of funds available to him in the summer for strengthening his squad in the league below.

So the likes of Daniel Sparkes, Zak Mills and Jim Stevenson, as well as other youngsters Lewis Taaffe and Jay Dowie - all of whom were in the 16-man squad - will be given another chance to prove they are the future of the club next term.

While the future was being thought of in the red and black half of the pitch, the orange and white half of the Glass World Stadium yesterday was a throwback to days gone by at the Abbey Stadium.

Luton boss Gary Brabin, Paul Carden, Dan Gleeson and Robbie Willmott were all in attendance, meaning a distinctly amberand-black flavour flowed through the visitors' line-up. There was another familiar face in the Luton team, Ed Asafu-Adiave, the defender lining up against the side he turned out for on loan earlier this month.

It was Asafu-Adjaye's former colleagues who started the game brightly, largely thanks to Antonio Murray's clever positioning. The captain constantly found himself with time to get his head up and bring team-mates into play, with Omer Riza's cross-shot striking a post and Sparkes testing Kevin Pilkington

The Stutes oozed confidence, but they were brought down to earth in the 12th minute when Lee Smith's mistake resulted in Amari Morgan-Smith rounding off some clever build-up play.

The breakthrough sparked a conga in the away end, but Smith would have silenced them if he had made amends with a stinging drive which Pilkington did well to
