Your attention is brought to the fact that for the safety of yourselves and that of the players and Officials we ask that you remain behind the pitch barrier at all times.

Ground Regulation 7.2

The following acts are arrestable offences under the Football (offences)
Act 1991, as amended: Conviction may result in a banning order being made.

Ground Regulation 7

The use of threatening behaviour, foul or abusive language is strictly forbidden and will result in arrest and / or ejection from the ground. The club may impose a ban for one or more Matches.

Ground Regulation 7.1

Racial abuse, chanting or harassment is strictly forbidden and will result in arrest and / or ejection from the ground the club may impose a ban of one or more

Ground Regulation 7.2.2

The chanting of anything of an indecent or racialist nature.

Regulation 7.2.3

The entry onto the playing area or any adjacent area to which spectators are not generally admitted without lawful authority or excuse.

Please note that the Hashed Areas in front of the terracing and stands are Pedestrian Free Zones, we request that you do not stand in these areas, you will be asked to move in the interest of public safety.

We also ask that you respectfully commit to report any foul, abusive or racial language that is used to a steward who will report the incident for any relevant actions to be taken.

Once again if could please remain behind the barriers at full-time.

Smoking Policy: two areas inside the

stadium have been designated as Smoking Areas, they are in the two corners of the far side of the ground (opposite the main stand) one in each of the home and away ends.

Parking Policy: Due to the increased restrictions and enhanced safety measures that we are required to comply with we have unfortunately had to reduce the number of spaces available within the stadium car park.

On match days the car park at the Glassworld Stadium is a closed / supervised area, this means that there is NO PARKING other than for designated vehicles and authorised Disabled persons. Alternative Parking has been available in the village with the co-operation of local businesses. Your assistance in parking respectfully and safely in the village is appreciated by Histon Football Club.

DAVID LIVERMORE

For the final Manager's Column of the season, Adam Pagett caught up with David Livermore after the AFC Wimbledon match. Despite being understandably down he gave an honest and open interview giving his feelings on the current season, the situation regarding summer transfers as well as explaining his vision for the future of the club.

Having almost completed your first season in management, on a personal level, can you sum up how you felt it has gone?

It's been tough; I've learned a lot as a young manager, I've almost had to teach myself, there is no one here to learn from. It's been a massive learning curve for myself, for the players, at times we've played some good football, at times not so good football but on a whole I think as a team we've improved, I think we've grown as the season's gone on.

Do you now therefore, feel suitably prepared for another crack at it next season?

Definitely, it's no secret I'm happy to stay here. The board want me to stay so it's a matter of just getting the contract sorted. There are a lot of things going on off the pitch that we're trying to do to improve the football club. Restructuring, trying to make it a more professional club day in day out and yes in all honesty with the budget we've got it's almost got to be the case where the first team is an extension of the scholarship system. I see us having a young team again next season, it's been very young this season and it might be even younger next season. So if we stick together and we all learn together I think we'll be fine.

Putting the league position aside, what positives can you take from this season?

From a club point of view to start the season with a debt of almost one million and for it to be down as low as

eighty/eighty five thousand as it is at present, I think it is pretty remarkable and I think it's a fantastic achievement for this football club. The positives are there with the messages we're sending out. That this football club will give youngsters a chance, that it will try and get as many scholars as we can into the first team and we've been able to do that on numerous occasions this season. Some lads have probably come into the team too early, we've had scholars playing recently and I have to say that none of them have let us down.


You mentioned briefly about your situation for next year, is there anything you can add, anything concrete to announce at this stage?







LUTON TOWN

Manager

Originally brought to the club as Chief Scout at the time Richard Money was appointed manager in October 2009, Gary BRABIN was reassigned in the new role as assistant manager in the summer of 2010. Following the departure of Richard Money in March 2011, Brabin took control of the Hatters until the end of the 2010/11 season. After playing over 275 times in League football as a tough-tackling midfielder, Brabin moved into management firstly with Southport - guiding them to the Conference North Play-offs - before moving south to manage Cambridge United in 2008. In his first - and eventually only - season at the Abbey Stadium he guided the U's to the Blue Square Premier Play-off final after finishing runners-up to champions Burton Albion, but lost to Torquay United at Wembley. Despite that set-back Brabin was awarded the BSP Manager of the Year award before behind the scenes differences at the Abbey led to him leaving the club in July 2009 before arriving at Kenilworth Road

Playing Staff

Goalkeepers

Mark TYLER is a hugely experienced goal-keeper who signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in June 2009 following his release from Peterborough United. Mark made 483 appearances in 15 years at London Road and was rewarded for his loyalty with a testimonial against Liverpool in 2007. After falling down the pecking order at Posh he found first team opportunities hard to come by and in 2008/09 he was loaned out to League 2 Bury where he made 11 appearances for the Shakers.

Kevin PILKINGTON is a vastly experienced goalkeeper who joined the Hatters in May 2010 after his release from Notts County. Pilkington began his career with Manchester United playing six times in the Premier League under Sir Alex Ferguson. During his six years at Old Trafford Pilkington enjoyed loan spells at Rochdale, Rotherham and Celtic before a two-year stay at Port Vale. After 23 league appearances for the Valiants, he was on the move once more, with Aberystwyth Town and Wigan Athletic his next two ports of call. However, he found stability at his next club, Mansfield, joining the Stags in 2000 and went onto feature 167 times in league action over the next five years. In 2005 the Hitchin-born stopper made the short hop down the M1 to sign for Notts County and another five year stay resulted in him making 141 appearances at Meadow Lane. However, Notts began flashing the cash at the start of the 2009/10 campaign with goalkeeper Kasper Schmeichel one of many

high-profile arrivals. Frozen out of the County team, and with Mark Tyler injured, Pilkington joined the Hatters on-loan in November and went onto make 11 appearance between the sticks whilst at Kenilworth Road before injury curtailed his stay. But when the Magpies released him in the summer of 2010, Money was quick to snap up the veteran permanently.

Defenders

Luke GRAHAM is a versatile defender signed on-loan from Kettering in January 2011. Started his career with Northampton before moving to Rockingham Road following a successful loan spell. Spent a short time at Mansfield before signing for York City – for whom he helped to last season's Blue Square Bet Premier Promotion Final. Rejoined Kettering in the summer before moving to Kenilworth Road.

Zdenek KROCA is a centre-half who impressed in assured display alongside George Pilkington in two pre-season fixtures in 2010 to earn a one-year contract. Kroca made 169 league appearances belt in 10 years with hometown club Tescoma Zlín in his native Czech Republic. Last season the imposing 6ft 5in defender was in fine, commanding form, scoring four times in 27 league appearances with the Letná Stadium outfit as they finished in second place in the Czech second division? a position - like the Town last season - that was not enough to earn promotion.

George PILKINGTON is a highly experienced defender who joined the club on a free transfer in August 2008. Having begun his career as an Everton trainee, Pilkington joined Port Vale in June 2003, after a loan spell at Exeter City. Having started 223 league games for the Valiants, the highlyregarded defender has been named Player of the Year twice. Injury frustrated the centre-half in his first season at Kenilworth Road in 2008/09 but he still managed to pick-up a Johnstone's Paint Trophy winners' medal. His impeccable form on the pitch led to him winning a string of end-of-season awards and underlined his loyalty to the Hatters by signing a new contract at the end of the campaign.

Tall and athletic defender, primarily a right-back, Dan GLEESON signed for the Hatters in the summer of 2010 from his home town club Cambridge United. A product of the U's academy, Gleeson made his debut at 18 and soon became a regular at the Abbey Stadium making 61 league appearances before Notts County snapped up his signature in 2006. Gleeson only lasted a season at Meadow Lane, featuring 17 times before he was back at the Abbey, firstly on-loan before resigning permanently in 2007. Recognised as one of the best right-backs

outside the Football League, Gleeson's performances have seen him rewarded with seven England C caps.

Luton-born Shane BLACKETT became Mick Harford's sixth summer signing of 2009 after penning a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road. Equally adept at centre-back or at left-back, Shane began his career with Dunstable Town before a switch to Arlesey Town in 2003. His form with the United Counties side alerted the attentions of Dagenham & Redbridge who signed the 6ft 3in defender in May 2004. He made 83 appearances during his time at Victoria Road and helped the Daggers win the Conference title and earn promotion to the Football League in 2006/07. His reputation as a pacey defender alerted the attention of Peterborough who snapped him up with Dagenham team-mate Craig Mackail-Smith in January 2007. He went on to make 38 appearances during his time at London

Left-footed versatile defender Freddie MURRAY joined the Hatters on a six-month loan deal from Blue Square Premier side Grays Athletic in August 2009 and the deal was made permanent in January 2010. Murray only signed for the Essex club in August before making his debut for the Town in the 4-1 victory over Mansfield Town just hours after putting pen to paper. Previously with Northampton Town, Stevenage Borough and Cambridge United the Irishman began his career as a trainee with Blackburn Rovers.

Up-and-coming second year scholar Alex LACEY impressed Richard Money in the 2010 pre-season to earn a squad number. The centre-back made his first team debut as a 17-year-old in the FA Trophy first round tie against Welling, earning the man-of-thematch award for an excellent performance.

Midfielders

Harlow-born winger Robbie WILLMOTT penned an 18-month contract with the Hatters in January 2011 after hitting 10 goals for Cambridge United. Capable of playing on either wing or behind the front two, Willmott came through the ranks at the Abbey Stadium and wowed the home faithful with his pace, dribbling, close control and eve for goal. His performances for the U's' youth team saw him break into the senior squad, making his debut as a 17-yearold in September 2007. After signing his first professional contract two months later, the midfielder was mainly used as an impact substitute during 2007/08 but continued to impress: eight goals in his first season as a pro followed in 2008/09 while his level of performance and his assist tally soared last season as the U's finished in mid-table. But the youngster's talents during this campaign

have really come to fore. Weighing in with 10 goals and eight assists from just 29 starts for Martin Ling's side, Willmott's turn of foot and delivery from set-pieces has also become a highly sought-after commodity. Experienced central midfielder Paul CAR-

Experienced central midfielder Paul CAR-DEN signed on-loan from Cambridge United in February 2011 until the end of the season.

Young winger Jake HOWELLS, who can also play at left-back, came through the ranks at Kenilworth Road and made his first team debut as a second half substitute in May 2008. He made his full debut in the Hatters colours away at Bradford City in October 2008. After making 36 appearances for the Hatters in the 2008/09 the England C international was rewarded for his efforts with a professional contract in May. In his first season as a pro, Howells made huge strides with impressive performances on the leftside of midfield, ending the 2009/10 campaign with six goals, including his first senior goal in the incredible 4-3 win over Cambridge in September.

Tenacious defensive midfielder Godfrey POKU signed together with JJ O'Donnell from Blue Square South outfit St Albans City in January 2010 on an 18-month contract. A tough-tackling and no-nonsense midfielder, the Town beat off competition from several Football League clubs for his signature. He featured and impressed in the Hatters' reserves in 2009/10 and was an unused substitutes in the Blue Square Premier but made his debut as a substitute in the 1-0 win at Barrow in October 2010.

Tricky winger JJ O'DONNELL joined the Town with St Albans team-mate Godfrey Poku in January 2010. Also capable of playing in attack the youngster featured for the Hatters' reserve and youth teams during 2009/10. He made his first team debut as a substitute in the 4-2 FA Cup first round replay win over Corby Town.

A defender capable of playing centre back or full back, Claude GNAKPA joined on a free transfer in August 2008. Having plied his trade across Europe with Montpellier HSC, Racing de Santander, Deportivo Alayes and FC Vaduz of Liechtenstein, Claude moved to Swindon Town for a brief spell. He was then off again in July 2007 to Peterborough United and was a regular in the League 2 promotion winning side, starting 25 league games. A favourite with the Kenilworth Road crowd the Frenchman scored the Hatters' winning goal in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final against Scunthorpe United in April 2009. He continued in fine style down the right-hand side of midfield in 2009/10 finishing with nine goals including a remarkable second-half hat-trick in a 6-1 win at Ebbsfleet in March

2010

Having made his debut as a 16-year-old in November 2003, Keith KEANE went on to enjoy an extended run in the side from February onwards whilst Kevin Foley was out injured. Such was the contribution he made that the return of Foley didn't signal the end of his involvement at first-team level and he finished the season with 14 appearances under his belt, all this whilst still in the first year of his scholarship. Another product of the youth system who regularly appeared for the Republic of Ireland at schoolboy level. He joined the Hatters at the age of nine having been scouted in local football, and made a rapid progression through the club's centre of excellence and youth teams, demonstrating enough potential to convince Mike Newell to give him his first taste of senior action. Keith has featured most prominently on the right of midfield, bursting forward to great effect to provide many goals for himself and his team-mates. Over the course of his career at Kenilworth Road Keane has proved to be one of the, if not the most, versatile players to pull on a Luton shirt. Capable of playing right the way across the back four or in midfield the only positions he's not featured for the Town (yet) are in goal and up-front.

Ascot-born Adam NEWTON became Mick Harford's second summer signing of 2009 after agreeing a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road following his release from Brentford. Predominantly used as a right winger, the pacey wide man is equally as comfortable at right-back. Adam started his career at West Ham United, coming through the Hammers' respected Academy only made three substitute appearances during his time at Upton Park before signing for Peterborough United in May 2002. The former England Under 21 international went onto make a name for himself with the Posh making 249 appearances in six years at London Road going onto win promotion at the end of the 2007/08 campaign. After leaving Peterborough at the end of the 2007/08 season, Adam was snapped by Andy Scott and Brentford where he helped the Bees to the League 2 title. A St Kitts and Nevis international, he has spent time on-loan at Portsmouth, Notts County and

Young midfielder, capable of playing in attack, Adam WATKINS signed professional forms at Kenilworth Road in June 2010. A self-confessed Hatters fan, he made his first team bow in a 1-0 defeat at Southampton in the FA Cup third round in January 2010.

Winger Charlie HENRY signed from Blue Square Bet Premier rivals Newport County in November 2010, signing initially on-loan

until January when the England C international will complete a permanent switch. Henry is no stranger to Kenilworth Road as he came through the youth ranks at the Club but was told he was too small to continue his scholarship and left when he was 15. Now 24. Henry came back to Bedfordshire with a bang back in August when hitting a superb goal in front of the Hatters faithful when Newport were the visitors earlier in the campaign. That strike was one of two the Stevenage-born flyer has hit this term as the Exiles have adjusted to life in non-league's top flight with ease following their emphatic Championship winning season in the Blue Square South. Pivotal in that success. Henry netted nine times as Dean Holdsworth's side plundered over 93 goals last season to romp to the title. From South Wales via after spells with a host of non-league sides since leaving Kenilworth Road he's back when it all began and ready to help the Town back into the Football

Former Wales Under-21 midfielder Alex LAWLESS signed in November 2010 initially on-loan from York City before a permanent deal goes through in January 2011. Alex agreed a contract which keeps him at Kenilworth Road at least until the end of the 2011/12 season. A star of the Minstermen's campaign last season which saw them lose in the Promotion Final to Oxford United, Lawless featured prominently in all four of the meetings with the Hatters last term at the heart of midfield. He only joined York at the start of last season, impressing then boss Martin Foyle enough to prise the 25year-old away from Forest Green Rovers where performances in a variety of positions - in defence and across midfield - had also caught the eye of Football League scouts. It's not just the 150 games experience in the Conference that Lawless has with Forest Green and York that he has on his CV. A former Cardiff City scholar he took-up nonleague football in Wales before he was snapped up to earn his first professional contract with Premier League Fulham in 2003. Without featuring for the Cottagers it was off to South West to Torquay United for the young Lawless but after just a year and 16 appearances at Plainmoor he was on the move again, to Forest Green in 2006 and in his three seasons he helped the Gloucestershire consolidate in the Conference. Arriving at Bootham Crescent in the summer of 2009, local media announced him merely as a "utility player" but that was far from the case, and alongside Neil Barrett he forged a formidable partnership in the centre of City's midfield, changing the Yorkshire club's relegation worries from one season to making them just one game away from promotion the

next. The Minstermen's slow start to this season saw Foyle lose his job but even despite their inauspicious beginnings to 2010/11, Lawless had been on-song for City, scoring three times in 16 appearances already this term.

Forwards

Prolific striker Matthew BARNES-HOMER joined the Hatters initially on a month's Ioan from Kidderminster Harriers before agreeing a two-and-a-half year contract to move permanently when the transfer window re-opened on 1st January 2010. The powerful forward followed up his 21 goals in all competitions during 2008/09 with nine goals in 20 league appearances last term. Barnes-Homer also enjoyed a dream start to his international career when he netted the winner on his debut for England C in their 2-1 win over Poland in November. An energetic talent, the front man began his career as a trainee at Wolves before going on to lead something of a nomadic life prior to finding his feet at Kidderminster. After leaving Molineux he tried his luck in the United States before returning to England and, following success with a clutch of non-league sides, he was snapped by Wycombe Wanderers. He struggled to make an impression at Adam Park but, after being released at the end of the 2006/07 season, Harriers Manager Mark Yates beat off competition from a host of sides to capture his signature. His form in front of goal at Kidderminster had alerted the attentions of a number of Football League teams but Barnes-Homer was suitably impressed by the Hatters' vision and became Richard Money's first signing for the club.


A nippy poacher of a striker, Danny CROW joined the Hatters from Cambridge United in May 2010 following the expiry of his contract at the Abbey Stadium. The front man started his career as a trainee with Norwich City and made his senior bow in the Premier League for the Canaries in December 2004. A loan spell at Northampton followed towards the end of the 2004/05 season before he was released by Norwich and signed for Peterborough in the summer of 2005, notching 17 goals in his debut season at London Road. Following a short loan spell at Notts County, Crow was released by Posh and was snapped up by Cambridge in September 2008. The energetic forward's strike-rate of 22 goals in 43 league starts won him many admirers and his 19 goals during 2009/10 saw him scoop the U's online Player of the Year award.

Quick young forward capable of playing down the flanks Dan WALKER signed a one-year deal in July 2010 after impressing in pre-season in games for and against the Hatters. Previously with Bedford Town, Walker has also played for Stony Stratford Town and Leighton Town. He made his first team debut for the Hatters as substitute in a 3-0 win over AFC Wimbledon in September 2010 before scoring his first senior goal against Forest Green a month later.

Striker or wide man Amari MORGAN-SMITH arrived at Kenilworth Road as a free agent following a two-year spell at Ilkeston Town. He put pen to paper on a two-year deal after two years with the Blue Square Bet North side in which he scored 34 goals in 77 starts. The fast and skilful frontman's impressive form for the Robins earned him a call-up to the England C squad at the end of last season, earning his first cap against the Republic of Ireland in May. Wolverhampton-born Morgan-Smith started his career as a trainee with Wolves. He then signed for Crewe and then Stockport where he made one Football League appearance before moving to Ilkeston. Before the 2009/10 season began the striker impressed in a trial for Championship side Derby County and has since gone on to score three goals in seven appearances for Ilkeston. Earlier this season his former boss Kevin Wilson hailed the striker, who scored 23 goals last season, as the "hottest property in non-league football". With huge interest in the forward, Town boss Richard Money was delighted to beat off competition from a number of Championship and League One sides for Morgan-Smith's signature. And, hours after completing the paperwork, Morgan-Smith was thrust into action for his debut against Mansfield and scored in the 2-0 victory.

England C international striker Jason WALKER signed in November 2010 initially on-loan from Barrow before a permanent deal goes through in January 2011. Barrow-born Walker signed a deal to keep him at Kenilworth Road until the end of the 2011/12 season after the Town beat off a number of clubs to secure his signature. The frontman hit 11 goals in just 18 appearances for the Bluebirds at the start of the 2010/11 campaign before making the switch south. The striker began his career in Scotland with Dundee, coming through the ranks at Dens Park but, after four seasons without featuring, the youngster was snapped by Greenock Morton in 2004. Three years with the Ton followed before he was on the move again, crossing the border to sign for Morecambe. But it was with his home town club that the forward began to make his name, firing 50 goals in two-and-a-half seasons at Holker Street, helping them to promotion and Blue Square North Play-Off glory in 2008 in his first season with Darren Sheridan and David Bayliss' side. The goals and eye-catching displays continued to flow for Walker and co. in the Conference culminating last season when they lifted the FA Trophy at Wembley after beating Stevenage in the final with Walker scoring a stunning and ultimately trophy-winning goal in extratime. His all-round game and ability to strike from distance gives the Hatters further firepower and variety in attack to boost and compliment the fine set of strikers already in the Kenilworth Road dressing room.

Experienced and prolific striker Lloyd OWUSU joined the Hatters in January and scored on his debut in the 5-0 win over York City. The Ghanaian international arrived at Kenilworth Road after a spell in Australia with Adelaide United and signed a deal with the Town until the end of the season. The front-man enjoyed a prolific career in England prior to his move Down Under having netted 144 times in 350 starts for a number of Football League clubs. It was his goalscoring exploits with then Conference side Slough Town that alerted League clubs of his talents with Brentford stumping up £25,000 for his services in 1998. It proved to be money well spent as the striker went onto hit 64 goals in 148 starts for the Bees, firing 25 goals in his debut season as the Griffin Park outfit lifted the Third Division title in 1998/99. The goals continued to flow for the forward and a move to the Championship followed when Sheffield Wednesday snapped him up after his contract expired with Brentford in the summer of 2004. After scoring nine times for the Owls, despite being restricted to appearances from the substitutes' bench, a loan move to Reading followed as he fell out of favour at Hillsbrough before the switch to the Royals was made permanent. However, after scoring six goals in the Championship at the Madieski Stadium during 2004/0, he was back at Griffin Park in the summer of 2005. The goals kept coming in West London for the striker but after missing most of the 2006/07 season through injury he left Brentford once more and signed for Yeovil Town in July 2007. After nine goals for the Glovers in his first season at Huish Park, the Slough-born hitman was again on the move, going onto strike 15 goals for three clubs during 2008/09: one for Yeovil and seven at both Cheltenham and Brighton in Leagues One and Two respectively. The strong, pacey striker accepted a move to Adelaide in June 2009 and arrived back in the UK in December and after a trialing at a number of League clubs on his return he agreed terms with the Town to add further competition for places in attack.

ACADEMY UPDATE

The Histon Academy was formed in 2006 and during the following years quickly developed a fine reputation both in England and Europe for developing talented players. The Academy's success is a great credit to Histon FC with numerous boys moving onto Scholarships at Premiership, Championship and Football League Clubs where some are now on professional contracts.

However it is NOT the main function of the Histon Academy to provide players for these Clubs. The primary aim is to develop young Players who can graduate into the Histon First Team where they will be even more in the shop window thus having the opportunity as established players to further progress up the tiers of Football.

The strength of the system has even seen staff move onto the highest tier of the English game with Adam Clements recently moving to Blackpool to head up the Premier League Club's Centre of Excellence.

So where is Histon's Academy now? Five years on from its formation and at a time when Histon Football Club is itself moving into a new chapter in its history, the Academy is also moving into a new phase with new leadership, new challenges on a new journey.

With such great success achieved in the previous five years it is important to understand what factors have created so many talented football players and in essence it is important to continue to develop the outstanding youngsters who go on to become excellent players. Football, when we break it down, is not about large amounts of money being spent on the best facilities and equipment. The quality of any youth programme is the relationship between the Club, the Coaches and, most importantly of all, the Players.

In a small Club like ours at Histon, the Academy is an integral part of the Club and has a major role to play. The pathway to the First Team is not some far off dream only a few can strive for. The First Team Manager is not someone only ever seen on TV. The integration and learning about becoming a First Team Player at

Histon is tangible from the moment a boy joins the Academy or one of its Development Centres at eight years of age.

The modern game has changed dramatically in the last ten years. Coaches within Academies have to work to become excellent students of the game themselves thus enabling them to be able to assist players to reach the highest possible levels. They have to constantly reinforce the need for players to focus on honing their skills through relentless practice during all their years of being an Academy Player. The modern player is a 90% Player - a player who can complete 90% of his passes, a player who can run further and quicker for longer. Players need to be athletes of the highest calibre in the modern game and, if the Histon Academy is to continue to produce players for English Football's Elite Clubs and our own First Team, then we must all respond positively to all the many challenges the modern game presents us with.

So how can Histon continue to be this breeding ground for young Professionals?

When a boy joins the Histon Academy he embarks on a journey aiming to become a young Professional Player. This journey needs to be a fact-finding mission towards developing the many skills that are required to become a top Football Player. The richer the experiences the journey provides the more knowledgeable the player becomes. With this in mind the Histon Academy must provide diversity. A challenging Training and Match programme is essential. Developing expertise in any field requires a dedication to practice and provision of a supportive structure for players to work on at home is also essential for those wishing to push forward with their football ambitions.

The most important part of the Histon Academy in the past has been the Tours. Next Season will see Histon's Academy once again touring in Europe. A Football Tour is not designed to be a holiday for Players nor for Coaches but gives them all opportunities to stretch their knowl-

edge both in a football sense and, more importantly, on a personal level where the knowledge gained can be a fantastic foundation for developing confidence both on and off the pitch.

Next season will see the formation of greater structures to support the Academy. More Development Centres will be set up to help younger players start to learn about ball mastery. This will be a key feature of the Histon Academy Programme. This part of the Academy structure will also be of help to some of the Club's Scholars. Even if they do not reach the level required to play for the First Team, they may have aspirations to stay in the game by pursuing a career in coaching. Where better for them to start than as a future coach with Histon Academy?

The current season for the Academy will finish at the end of May. This month will be the start of this new journey. In the middle part of the month an Under 12's Squad will travel to Italy to play in Fiorentina's International Youth Tournament thus following in the footsteps of other Histon Academy Squads before them. This will provide a great experience for the Histon players as the list of past winners reads like a list of former Winners of the European Champions League.

The journey towards becoming a Professional Player is a long one. Whether a player reaches this end goal or falls short at some point, we hope that he will always look upon the Histon Academy as somewhere which was welcoming, somewhere in which he was treated as an important part of the Club and somewhere which provided him with many happy, memorable and valuable experiences he can take with him into his future life.

REVIEW

Histon's season was summed up in a nutshell, after they conceded three goals in three minutes against deal with a lot of early pressure in and high flying AFC Wimbledon having kept in touch with the promotion chasers for over an hour.

Luke Moore scored two in a minute for the Dons with Danny Kedwell getting his second and their fourth two minutes later having already opened the scoring in the first half.

The first goal came after 13 minutes from a wonderful piece of skill in the Stutes penalty area. It was Kedwell who reacted first to get on the end of midfielder Lee Minshull's flick on, the Striker controlled the ball well before flicking it over the defenders head and smashing a volley in to the top corner; past the helpless Wes Foderingham. The goal really got the travelling supporters in the mood and left the home fans fearing the worst.

David Livermore brought himself on in the second half to add a bit of grit and determination to the midfield. However it was his mistake which let in Kaid Mohamed, the striker saw his original effort blocked before the ball eventually fell to Luke Moore who fired a low drive which flew past the Stutes keeper from 12 yards.

Straight from kick off and Histon had given the ball away cheaply, it was Mohamed again causing problems as he got down the right hand side and crossed low for Moore, the forward didn't need a second invitation to shoot as he caught the ball first time and looped it over Foderingham to make it 3-0 on 63 minutes.

By this time the away team were brimming with confidence and had the Stutes on the ropes. The fourth goal was added after 67 minutes when Kedwell bulldozed his way through the Histon defence from the right hand side and fired it in from close range.

The Stutes had started the match

nervously as they looked to halt a run of 10 straight defeats. They had to around their penalty area with Kedwell, Mohamed and Minshull combining well for the visitors.

It was the home team though who had the first opening of the match after 9 minutes. Daniel Sparkes raced down the right touchline and sent a ball into the box which was deflected into the path of Jim Stevenson; the midfielder hit it first time but volleyed just wide from 18 yards.

The visitors nearly opened the scoring shortly before the first goal when Ricky Wellard's ball was inadvertently flicked into the path of Minshull from Lanre Oyebanjo's header, but Foderingham and Mills combined well to halt the danger.

There were further half chances created by the away side with Brett Johnson and Steven Gregory going close on 28 and 29 minutes. A minute later and it was another chance for the home side this time as Elliot Cox dribbled the ball down the right and delivered a wonderful cross into the area, the headed clearance fell straight to Antonio Murray but the Stutes captain saw his fierce volley go just wide.

Shortly after the restart and it was the visitors who had a glorious chance to make it 2-0. It came from a long throw into the box, none of the Histon defenders attacked the ball as it eventually fell for Wellard who despite being unmarked and only six yards out, blasted over the bar.

Even though the away side were 4-0 up just after the hour they weren't ready to take their foot of the gas and it was the pace and trickery of substitute Christian Jolley who was testing the Histon defence late on. He received the ball inside the box on the right hand side before bamboozling the defence with some Ronaldo

style step-overs, got to the by-line, cut back and struck the post with his left foot on 83 minutes. With three minutes to go the home side were still under the cosh and Foderingham had to be at his best to keep out a Mohamed shot from just outside the penalty area.

There were still a couple of moments for Histon to flirt with the idea of a consolation goal. Sparkes it was who played a lovely one-two with Omar Riza on the left hand side before delivering a delicious cross into the box but it was just too high for Murray. Oyebanjo had a crack from 30 yards in stoppage time but saw his effort go high and wide.

Once again the Stutes kept pace with a very strong side for long periods before capitulating in the second half. They will be desperate though to get the monkey - or more to the point giant ape - off their back to stop the rot and reach at least 28 points before the end of the season.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

2009/10 season was the first time these sides have met. The first meeting should have taken place on the 26th December, but FST the snow leading up the game caused the game to be called off. The return fixture was due to take on the 3rd

The return fixture finally took place on the 13th April, first half goals from Howells and Craddock gave the Hatters a 2-0 lead, the lead was doubled early on the second half, when Craddock added his second on the evening before Howells added his second inside the hour mark, the Stutes, pulled two goals back, when Daniel Sparkes scored on 69 minutes, before Nat Knight-Percival added a second on 74 minutes, but the comeback was to be shortlived when Craddock sealed a hat trick from a spot kick, on 84 minutes Gallen made it 6-2, on 87 minutes Glen Southam scored for Histon to make it 6-3, in

front of a crowd of just over

2010/11 season saw the sides meet at Luton on the 20th November, where a crowd of 5963 watched on as the home side went ahead on 7 minutes when Claude Gnakpa scored. The lead was doubled on 19 minutes went Jack Howells added the

second, on 39 minutes the home side added a third when Jason Walker scored, there was still time for a further goal before half time as Histon, Antonio Murray scored in the 43rd minute, second half goals from Andy Drury on 69 minutes and Taiwo Atieno on 78 minutes saw the game finish in a 5-1 win.

at Luton Town as a schoolboy, before joining Ipswich Town for a short spell, then joined Cambridge United as a apprentice, where he spent 3 years, 1991/92 season saw spells at St Albans City, Baldock Town and Stevenage Borough, before joining Histon during the Summer of 1992.

25th April

1996/97 season saw the side at home to Swaffham in the Eastern Counties League, the game ended in a 1-1. 1997/98 season saw the side travel to Tiptree United in the Eastern Counties League, the Stutes went down to a 6-1 defeat.

2000/01 season saw the Stutes move into the Southern League, or as it was known, Dr Martens League, Eastern Division, today saw a crowd of 178 watch on as Stamford visited Bridge Road, the game ended in a draw as the game ended 2-2 with Shaun Harrington and Jamie Barker scoring for Histon, with Ndekwe and Keeble scoring for Stamford. 2008/09 season saw Histon travel to Crawley for the last day of the season, a crowd of 901 watched on in bright sunshine as Histon went into the break leading 3-0, with goals from Jack Midson on 11 and 39 minutes and Jamie Barker on 35 minutes, but on 52 minutes saw the game swing back towards the home side, when a foul by goalkeeper Danny Naisbitt saw him recive a red card, with Jamie Cook scoring from the resulting penalty kick, further goals from Michael Malcolm on 66 minutes and Joh Shaw on 82 minutes saw the game finish in a 3-3 draw.

SEASON REVIEW

SEASON REVIEW 2010-11 (PART TWO)

HISTON 1 YORK CITY 2 (Saturday 15th January 2011)

versation we've had so far, so that's all positive. There are a lot of changes going on off the pitch, so if they do want me to be here next season I don't think they'll allow me to make those changes. It's just a case of sitting down and getting it sorted, getting the contract drawn up and signed.

It is yet to be decided which league you will compete in next season, either the Conference North or Conference South; do you have a preference at all?

Obviously the south in terms of the travelling point of view and therefore financial point of view, being in the south will be highly beneficial. It would be a lot more than trying to do it in the north division which again would be more expensive for the club and also you have those long journeys. We don't have the luxury of being able to go the night before or to go up early, stop somewhere and have a bite to eat. We have to get on the bus, travel to the game, get off the bus and play, so if we can have a lot more shorter journeys than long ones it will be beneficial over the course of the season.

If you do end up in the Conference South next season there is a good chance that you could be joined by Cambridge City, do you relish the chance of playing more local derbies like you have this season against United?

Yes of course, the games against United have been fantastic this season, it's two-fold, it's good for the players to experience these derbies: they're great games and also from a financial perspective it brings a decent amount of money from those weekends. Yes I think it's important, it would be great if we're in the same division as City. But at the same time it could be City who forces us into the Conference

You mentioned that you have looked into a few possible new signings, will there be money to spend in the summer or will you be looking for bargains and loan signings for next season?

Yes, look there is certainly no transfer budget, there is no money there to go and buy anyone. We're going to have to be clever, going to have to try and talk to a few contacts and see what we can do, we've had one or two lads train with us recently who look promising. We've got a good bunch of scholars coming through that you've seen obviously play a bit in recent weeks. So they'll be needed to make the numbers up, were going to sort the 20-22 man squad; which I'm happy to deal with. We've got to be careful because we've got to bring them on slowly; if you throw them in there too soon it could be detrimental to their development, so we're trying to get the timing right. We felt we've done that with Jim Stevenson and Lewis Taaffe as well as Jay Dowie recently. But we have to quard against trying to push too early and too soon, the timing has to be right but we haven't really had the luxury to do that in recent

Given the age of some of the players and how well they have played at times this season against seasoned professionals, do you feel that you can hold onto these players and fend off any interest from elsewhere?

Yes of course, talking about Zak Mills, Lewis Taaffe and Jim Stevenson, they have a contract for the next two years anyway so they certainly won't be going anywhere. Barring that, we have an option on a few players, so the ones with options; it would be my decision whether we keep them or not. It wouldn't be fair or right for me to say who I want here next season and who I don't because until my future is clarified I don't think it's fair on the lads to make those sort of decisions.


You are up against one of your old teams in the shape of Luton Town for the final home game of the season; do you think you can finish the season on a high against quality

opposition?

We'll certainly try, we've not tried to lose eleven games we've tried to win every single one of them, and we've tried to win today (against AFC Wimbledon). Again you have to be realistic, the gulf between budgets and what type of player or what players you bring to the club is hugely different. Luton are second for a reason, we're bottom for a reason, so we've got to improve. As I've said already I think the first team next season will have to be an extension of the scholarship system, so I'm expecting to have another team probably even younger next

Finally, the fans have continued to turn up week in, week out which is admirable considering the recent run of results, is there a message you would like to give them at all?

Just obviously thank you, it's like you say, I think it could have been easier for fans to turn their back on this football club at the moment. I'm sure they're not happy with the way things have turned out because it was only a couple of seasons back that they were in the playoffs and beating Leeds United. I understand the frustration but all I asked of them is to be realistic and look at the facts and look at the fact that we are a young team and we are trying to improve. We are a football club that the most important thing is not to allow ourselves ever to get back into the situation where we have a million pounds of debt and the actual existence of the football club's at threat. So that's something that obviously myself and the board never want to allow to happen again. So with that in mind we have to be realistic, we don't have a big budget. We'll try to win football matches, sometimes we'll lose, sometimes we'll win and I just ask that they stay with us and hopefully one day maybe a season or two down the line once we have developed some good players, we might be able to challenge again.
