

GARY BRABIN

Good evening and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for today's Blue Square Bet Premier fixture against Wrexham.

I would like to give a warm welcome to Dean Saunders, his management team and players plus the directors, officials and supporters of Wrexham to Kenilworth Road.

Dean has done a terrific job under difficult circumstances at the Racecourse and I must congratulate them on reaching the Play-Offs and achieving a top-four finish.

I will probably find myself writing very similar notes about Dean's side in roughly 10 days time when they visit us for the semi-final second leg of our Play-Off match.

The fixture computer always throws up little quirks and following the completion of the Play-Off picture it means we face Wrexham three times in succession over the next two weeks starting with today, the last match of our regular campaign.

Since I have taken over from Richard Money I have been hugely impressed with the players' attitude and application and as a group I believe we are heading in the right direction at the right time.

I must commend the lads for their enthusiasm, hard-work and ability in recent weeks. I said when I took over that there were a number of hurdles that we needed to overcome and as the season reaches its climax I am pleased to say we're in a position that the first few hurdles have been negotiated safely.

Like any manager I am always striving for perfection and while I am delighted with the

way the players have given me everything on and off the pitch in recent weeks I know there is improvement in them and they know that too.

Of the hurdles that they've jumped successfully it is obvious to see that the players are enjoying their football - one of things I set out to achieve when I took control. If you're not enjoying what you do then that's when problems begin and I am delighted to see so many smiling, happy faces in the dressing room and on the training pitch.

I've also said that we've changed the style of play and we also have worked on new ideas. The squad has a fantastic blend of youth and experience and is full of footballers willing to try new things, work on new tactics and work hard to achieve the ultimate goal.

I hope that this has been evident on the pitch in recent matches. The only way we can experiment with things is on the pitch is by doing exactly that in matches. Given the situation with the league position we have been able to try new ideas without causing too much disruption to performance.

I said in the lead-up to our last two matches - against Eastbourne and Histon - that my job has been juggling players wanting to play, players that need minutes on the pitch and players that I need to keep fit and injury-free.

The whole squad has played its part and I cannot stress enough how professional, dedicated and honest they have been with me over the past month and for that I thank them.

Since my last notes we have picked up two important victories - crucial to maintain the winning mentality going into the Play-Offs.

Critics may say the victories were 'only' against Eastbourne and Histon - the division's bottom two clubs - but we cannot choose who we have to play.

I was thrilled with the players' willingness in both matches and, on another day - especially against Eastbourne - I don't think anyone would disagree with me if I said we could have easily hit double figures that afternoon.

A lot of people might think the pressure is off both teams going into this evening's game but that couldn't be further from the truth.

There will be a lot of difficult decisions for me to make today and over the next two weeks but I urge you all to stay with us no matter what happens.

Your support is absolutely incredible and I would like to pay tribute to those who made the trip to Histon on Easter Monday and made up almost 90% of the crowd.

Get behind us again this afternoon.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

Good evening one and all and welcome to our 23rd league game of the season and, thankfully, not our last!

What a peculiar position we find ourselves in; meeting Wrexham in a dress-rehearsal prior to a Play-Off double-header which is arguably the most important brace of games in both clubs' histories.

Despite not having our Play-Off spot mathematically confirmed until last Monday at Histon, preparations for the forthcoming three games have been well under way for some time. Indeed, Gary Brabin's only function since taking the reins just over a month ago has been to focus on winning at Eastlands on the 21st May.

Of course, we need to recognise the significant contribution made by Richard Money during this campaign, however, at this time given our current position I believe there is no better man for us to rely on to select and motivate a winning Hatters side.

Without anxiety or apprehension, our entire squad of players are ready and raring to go.

Whilst it has been a positive and progressive few weeks for us at Kenilworth Road, by contrast, Wrexham's past few weeks have been somewhat agonising. Whilst the club looks for new owners the news of an impending HMRC winding up order put into some doubt as to whether there would indeed be four teams competing in the play-offs.

Thankfully, at the time of writing this, there remains little doubt that their dues will be satisfied in time to complete the rest of their season.

I say thankfully because we want to see a fair competition with each and every club having the same opportunity. It would have been an imbalanced final if one team, in this case AFC Wimbledon, was given a bye – possibly putting them at a disadvantage having not played for three weeks.

However, what would have been more of an injustice would have been to see a side, potentially, be permitted to compete for its membership to the Football League to be

accepted, having had the advantage of being able to spend £200,000 more on its squad than other clubs, such as ours, who keep up-to-date with our tax obligations.

We all want to see a fair competition and, for this reason, I am delighted to be able to congratulate the officials at Wrexham in being able to restore equilibrium to this season's competition and retain some respect for their club.

Wrexham are a respectable football club with many similarities to our own and one which has found adjustment to the fifth league difficult, just as we have.

We are both long serving clubs with large, sound and loyal supporter bases whose recent histories

have seen administrations brought about by mismanaged stadium issues. We both have also been relegated to the Blue Square Bet Premier having received points deductions shortly after winning the Football League Trophy.

Both clubs deserve to represent their towns and communities at a higher level; which I'm positive we both shall in due course.

Meanwhile, the rules of the Football Conference are plain and simple and are rightly becoming more stringent with regards to clubs' financial regulations. I can perhaps see a day when a licensing system is adopted throughout the leagues which only offers membership only to those clubs who are able to keep their house in order by directors who are truly fit to operate and when it does, Luton Town will, again, be prepared.

It is with pleasure that I am able to confirm that our final payment to the liquidator responsible for acting on behalf of the creditors of old Luton Town has been made meaning that we are now, essentially, debt free.

This is not only a pleasing situation for us at the club but also means that another post-administration burden has been lifted; and a sizeable one it was too!

Whilst the club still continues to lose money, it is more sustainable than it has been for decades thanks to the fantastic support we continue to get and thanks to some saintly shareholders who have continued to support the club's ongoing recovery to health.

Regardless of the outcome of the next three weeks things are rosier than they have been for quite some time and whilst we maintain the levels of support you have constantly given us, we will continue to grow stronger and continue to be fully committed to putting all of our efforts into getting us back where we belong.

I'd like to thank all of you who have renewed your season tickets to date, and those of you who have decided to commit for the first time. Sales have been very encouraging so far and I'd like to

remind you that you still have a few days left to take advantage of the Earlybird discount.

So, with Play-Off preparations well underway and as our excitement mounts as we look forward to a magnificent return to the Football League, let's make sure we take part with class, honour and pride safe in the knowledge that we shall return.

CAPTAIN SPEAKING

Welcome to our final game of the regular season against Wrexham. We will have to get used to meeting our visitors over the course of the next two weeks having been paired with Dean Saunders' side in the Play-Offs.

It seems a long time since we were on the receiving end of defeat at the Racecourse back in early November on a wet and windswept night.

That victory gave Wrexham the impetus to go on a long winning run and they have cemented their place in the top five ever since with some impressive performances.

It was a mistake that led to their winning goal on that night in North Wales. Looking back on that game it was always going to take a mistake to win it because the conditions were atrocious.

Hopefully the wind and rain of winter is behind us and one aspect of the improvement in weather that has been noticeable is the state of our pitch.

After bearing the brunt of eight matches in succession during January the transformation has been fantastic and all credit to the groundsmen for their hard work to enable us to have a green, flat pitch ready for what is going to be a massive football game for this club on 10th May when we host Wrexham again in the second leg of our Play-Off semi-final.

We played some fantastic football that day and scored three terrific goals that would have graced a level far higher than we are at the minute.

But that's our aim: to play at a higher level and the only way we're going to do that is by recreating this kind of form in our Play-Off matches.

Sounds simple I know and, I will touch on this further in my notes for the Play-Off programme, but we need to learn from our mistakes from last season's disappointment and come through stronger.

Our squad strength is one that should frighten a lot of teams in this division and that was once again evident at Histon on Easter Monday.

The manager made seven changes and decided that I needed a rest. Everyone has played a lot of games this season and given the quality we have throughout the


group, it was pleasing to see us record another comfortable win.

HATTERS CHATTER

ALLAN BROWN 1926-2011

Everyone at Kenilworth Road was saddened to learn of the death on Tuesday 19th April of Allan Brown at the age of 84.

Allan became a record Scottish export when leaving East Fife for Blackpool in exchange for £25,000 in 1950 due to his front line abilities combining pace, power and subtlety.


Scottish caps soon followed but on the domestic scene he became known as one of the unluckiest players around, with injuries meaning him missing both the 1951 and 1953 FA Cup finals with the latter particularly unfortunate as he broke his leg scoring the winner in the quarter-finals.

It was seen as a major signing for the Town when he was persuaded to come to Kenilworth Road in 1957 and he immediately formed a good understanding with record Luton goalscorer, Gordon Turner, becoming his perfect foil.

Two years later the Town embarked on an epic FA Cup run and in the quarter-final replay against, coincidentally, Blackpool, there were 30,069 supporters with their hearts in their mouths as Brown ran through to smack home the winner. For a split second it appeared that Brown had injured himself in scoring but he was cheered to the rafters when he untangled himself from the goalkeeper and got on with the game.

Brown did make it third time lucky that season when he appeared in the FA Cup final, but it was not a happy ending as the Town went down 2-1 to Nottingham Forest.

After relegation in 1960, Brown left for Portsmouth following the general shakeup at Kenilworth Road but we had not heard



the last of him as he re-appeared as manager in November 1966 with the Hatters at their lowest ebb.

Typically, Brown brought self belief back to the club and the players and steered the side to a glorious Division Four championship win in 1968. Brown was dismissed by the club in unfortunate circumstances in December 1968 but still enjoyed several more seasons in management after leaving Kenilworth Road.

For Chairman Nick Owen the news of Allan's death was significantly poignant. Brown was the scorer of the first goal Nick had witnessed as a Hatter back in 1958.

He told Talk of the Town: "I was terribly saddened to hear that our old centre forward Allan Brown had died.

"I think I've mentioned it before in the programme that he scored the first goal I ever saw in professional football, way back in September 1958, when we drew with Leeds United at Kenilworth Road.

"My first football match, my first goal and the start of a lifelong passion (obsession?) for Luton Town Football Club.

"I can still remember the awe and wonder I felt as I took my place alongside my father at the ground that day.

"It was a magical shared experience that most football fans will be able to identify with, either as a parent or a youngster.

"My father passed away more than two years ago, but he and Allan Brown are integral parts of that first searingly vivid memory of my introduction to this wonderful game. Later that season, of course, in front of our record crowd of over 30,000, Allan Brown scored the winner against his old club Blackpool in the FA Cup sixth round, which took us a step nearer Wembley.

"Then a few years later, as manager, he became a pivotal figure in our resurrection after we'd sunk from the top flight down to Division Four. Our title winning season in 1968 was truly thrilling and started a surge back to the big time. So many terrific memories - thank you, Allan Brown. RIP"



INTRODUCING WREXHAM

CLUB HISTORY

Wrexham Football Club was formed in September 1872 when members of the local cricket club met at the Turf Hotel with 'the purpose of starting a football club for the ensuing season'.

Apart from two seasons in the Welsh League, have always played their league football over the border in England and they were elected into the newly formed Football League Third Division (North) in 1921.

In 1966 Wrexham hit rock bottom finishing 92nd and so having to apply for re-election. This was to prove a turning point. Promotion from the Fourth Division followed in 1970, with the club then constantly near the top of the Third in the race for another step up.

Promotion to Division Two was missed on the last day of 1976/77, but the following season Wrexham bounced back in style. Following four seasons in the Second Division relegation in 1983 heralded a low period for the club, as they then slipped into Division Four 12 months later and struggled for another five years.

Promotion under Dixie McNeil was snatched from their grasp just seven minutes from the end of the Play-Off Final with Orient in 1989. McNeil left six months later and Brian Flynn took over, starting a 12-year reign at the Racecourse, which made him the longest serving of any manager in the club's history.

After a close shave with demotion to the Conference in 1990, famously they struck back to beat league champions Arsenal in the FA Cup in January 1992. This was the spark that pointed the club towards promotion in 1993.

Flynn's departure in 2001 paved the way for Denis Smith to take the helm and relegation in 2002 was followed by promotion just 12 months later.

The club became the first Football League side to collect what is now a mandatory 10-point deduction for entering administration but won



the LDV Vans Trophy in 2005.

A poor start to last season saw Carey step aside to allow the experienced Brian Little to take charge but he was unable to halt the team's slide and Wrexham finished bottom of the table.

In October 2008, Little parted company with the Dragons with assistant manager Dean Saunders stepping into the hot seat but Wrexham's first campaign in non-league football for 87 years end in a disappointing 10th place before another mid-table finish last term.

PREVIOUS MEETING

The Hatters' three-match winning streak in the Blue Square Bet Premier came to an end in front of the live television cameras at a wet and windy Racecourse.

Playing with the wind in the first half the Hatters started well until Freddie Murray's mistake, he misjudged a long ball with Mark Tyler out of his goal and that enabled Andy Mangan to put the hosts ahead.

Half chances fell for Claude Gnaka and Andy Drury before a smart move on 27 minutes almost saw the Hatters level when a Drury cross kept in by George Pilkington and helped on by Alex Lawless found Gnaka but home goalkeeper Ryan Maxwell was there to quell the danger.

The visitors should have made it all square six minutes later when good wing play from Drury saw him cross for Barnes-Homer but his header from six yards went straight down the throat of Maxwell.

Wrexham were looking nervous as the Town continued to make use of the wind at their backs but Barnes-Homer missed another decent chance on the stroke of halftime.

The hosts had the wind in their favour in the second 45 minutes but the Hatters started the better of the two sides after the interval and Jake Howells came within a whisker of

equalising after the youngster showed strength and skill to burst into the box and drive a shot inches wide.

Tyler had to be alert to twice save well in the space of 60 seconds on 64 minutes when firstly keeping out Andy Morrell's shot on the turn and then scuttling away to thwart a long-distance drive from Jay Harris.

The Town hunted what would have been a deserved leveller which they almost got on 67 minutes when a sweetly-hit 25-yard piledriver from Keith Keane was kept out by a sprawling save by Maxwell.

Lawless saw a shot blocked on 75 minutes after good work from Drury but it was almost curtains for the Hatters two minutes later when Jamie Tolley saw a free-kick graze the crossbar.

MEET THE MANAGER:

DEAN SAUNDERS

Former Swansea, Oxford, Derby, Liverpool and Aston Villa star ended his playing career at Bradford City after a glittering career which included 75 Wales caps.

Having been a keen student of the game throughout his career, Saunders initially joined the coaching staff at Valley Parade before linking up with former team-mate Graham Souness at Blackburn.

The pair then moved to Newcastle United in 2004, with Saunders by then occupying the assistant manager's role until the former's dismissal in February 2006.

The fourth highest goalscorer for Wales with 22 senior goals, Saunders was appointed assistant to national team manager John Toshack. In opting to take his first managerial position at Wrexham in October 2008, the 46-year-old agreed that he would also maintain his role within the Welsh set-up.

It's been a good year for Welsh football so far, with Cardiff City and Swansea City assured of places in the npower Championship Play-Offs and now Wrexham are just three games away from a place back in the Football League."

It's a great satisfaction after all the hard work and the slogging through the winter when we dropped points, and after all the hard work we've put in on the training ground," Dean Saunders told the Daily Post.

"We have got in there but it's only half the job done. Now we have to go and win three games to get into League 2."

On the pitch things have been going well for Dean Saunders' side with six wins from their last 11 matches securing their place in the Play-Offs despite the on-going wranglings with the Inland Revenue.

The club was served with a winding-up order by HM Revenue & Customs two weeks ago and face a High Court date on May 11 over a £200,000 unpaid tax bill but Saunders is hopeful everything will be resolved and only the football will matter.

"It's a great club and I would not have come here if I didn't think I could get some success.

"We have just had a habit of shooting ourselves in the foot on a regular basis. Let's hope we get the tax bill sorted, which I think will happen, and then the players can just concentrate on being more determined than whoever we play to get to the final and then if we get there be more determined than the other team to get into the league."

The 4-2 win over Tamworth last weekend, which sealed their place in the Play-Offs where they will face the Hatters, could have come at a cost for the Red Dragons, who are already without striker Andy Morrell through injury."

There were a few struggling out there and I was nervous for Curtis Obeng who is on 14 bookings, so he was trying not to make challenges because he was frightened of fouling anyone," continued Saunders.

"I can make some changes for next week and we'll go to Luton and enjoy the day."

After such great support throughout the

season, even when things haven't always gone well, the Wrexham faithful have remained firmly behind the players and Saunders is quick to praise the fans for what they have helped the club achieve so far.

"The crowds are getting bigger and bigger and if we can just win this semi-final now and get


into the final I'm sure we'll collect a few more," he said.

CHRIS MAXWELL

The current Welsh Under-21 international keeper, Chris is a product of the club's highly successful youth policy. Born in St Asaph, the 20-year-old spent part of the 2008/09 season on loan with Welsh Premiership side Connah's Quay Nomads gaining valuable first-team experience in the process. He returned to the Racecourse to sign a new 18-month contract and he made his Dragons' senior debut in a 1-0 home defeat against Altrincham at Easter 2009. An injury to then first choice goalkeeper saw Maxwell handed a regular place in the side and he responded with a series of fine displays, which included a string of clean sheets.

JOSLAIN MAYEBI

Joined the Dragons in late December after a trial period and the departure of Scott Shearer to Crawley Town. Born in the Cameroon, he has also played for the likes of FC Metz, AEK Lamaca, Hakoah Ramat Gan and Maccabi Ahi Nazareth, while owning a French passport. Joslain has been selected for the Cameroon national team at the 2008 Summer Olympics and was also called into their squad for a 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifier against Togo in March 2009.

DEFENDERS

MARVIN ANDREWS

Former Trinidad & Tobago stalwart has over 100 caps for his country, not to mention domestic league and cup successes with

both Rangers and Livingston in Scotland. The centre-half has also been Raith Rovers, Hamilton Academicals and Queen of the South, but it was at Ibrox that he is best remembered for his towering performances that even earned him their Player of the Trophy in 2005. Now in his mid-30s, he arrived at Wrexham after recommendations.

NEIL ASHTON

A left-back who has totted up some 200 senior appearances while with Tranmere, Shrewsbury, Macclesfield and Chester City. The 25-year-old began training with Wrexham in January 2010, as Chester's demise left him without a club. He played in several reserve team games and signed a one-year contract in the summer of 2010.

CHRIS BLACKBURN

Based in Northwich, Chris headed north from Aldershot Town in the summer of 2010, despite being offered a new contract by the Shots, following a two-year stint at the Recreation Ground. He started his career at hometown club Chester City as a youth product. Initially a midfielder he signed full pro forms at the Deva Stadium in 2000, he made 87 appearances for the Cheshire side between 1999 and 2003 before leaving in the summer of 2003. He went to America where he played briefly, as a striker, for Nevada Wonders in the USL Pro Select League. On his return to England, he signed for Northwich Victoria and then assisted Morecambe into the Football League in 2007, before signing for Swindon Town and then moving onto Aldershot a year later.

MARK CREIGHTON

Towering centre-half who started his career as a youngster with Kiddeminster Harriers before playing with a number of local sides in the Birmingham area. It was from Redditch United that the Harriers picked him up again and he became a regular in their line-up for several seasons. A move to Oxford United followed in 2009 and he was part of the U's team that returned to the Football League in the summer of 2010. Mark played a number of times for United in 2010/11, but joined Wrexham on loan in November. That deal was turned permanent in early January 2011, as he signed an 18-month contract after performing so impressively at the heart of the Dragons' defence.

CURTIS OBENG

A product of Manchester City's youth system,

Obeng is a highly-rated rightsided defender who joined Wrexham on a two-year contract in August 2009. Still only 20, he had a brief trial spell with Celtic before spending part of the 2009 pre-season with Wigan Athletic. Born in Stretford, the England Under-19 and 'C' international joined City as a 10-year old, despite being a confirmed United fan.

FRANK SINCLAIR

Vastly experienced player whose defensive expertise has proved invaluable since joining the club in late August 2009. Both an FA Cup and League Cup winner during his days with Chelsea and Leicester, the 38-year-old has also played for West Brom (loan), Burnley, Huddersfield, Lincoln and Wycombe (loan). Having helped the Chairboys to promotion from League 2 in 2009 with a string of commanding performances in central defence.


MIDFIELDERS

DAVID BROWN

Joined from Forest Green Rovers, the former Manchester United trainee has been at a number of Conference clubs during his career and even helped Accrington Stanley to gain promotion to the Football League. Was also briefly manager at the New Lawn in 2009, before returning to his playing duties.

ADRIAN CIESLEWICZ

A Polish Under-19 international, Adrian spent nearly three years at Manchester City before his release in 2009. Primarily a rightsided midfielder with lightning pace, he can also operate as a second striker and has a good goalscoring record

with the Blues' reserve side. Although Polish by birth, Adrian grew up in the Faroe Islands, where his father was a professional footballer. He made his first start for the Dragons in the 2009/10 season opener with Eastbourne, winning a vital penalty to help secure the points.

KEVIN GALL

A former Wales Under-21 international who started his career as a youngster with Cardiff City and Newcastle United, Kevin established himself as a senior player with Bristol Rovers in 2001 and then Yeovil Town two years later. Born in Merthyr Tydfil, he scored the goal that ended the Welsh Under-21 side's 26-game winless run as they beat Azerbaijan 1-0 in 2002. Now 28, Kevin has amassed some 336 appearances and scored 48 goals before joining Wrexham from York City in 2010.

JAY HARRIS

The former Accrington Stanley and Chester City midfielder joined the Dragons in the summer of 2010 following a year out of the game. He was originally an apprentice with Everton before moving onto Accrington in 2006 and playing some over 70 games over the next two seasons, a move to the Deva followed in 2008. Still only 23, he has over 100 appearances to his credit.

DEAN KEATES

Vastly experienced midfielder, who has won promotion six times with three different clubs. Beginning his career with his hometown club Walsall, Keates made his professional debut as a substitute in October 1996, playing 150 times before later settling in with Hull City, Kiddeminster, Lincoln City, Walsall (again), Peterborough and finally Wycombe. His career to date has seen him make over 500 senior appearances and score over 50 goals. Leaving the Chairboys in the summer of 2010, he accepted an offer from Wrexham to switch to the Racecourse.

NATHANIEL KNIGHT-PERCIVAL

Picked up from Conference rivals Histon, after his contract expired in May 2010. Nathaniel was a key member of the Stutes squad, having made his way through the youth ranks at the club and played as a virtual ever present since they joined the Conference in 2007, but was though a first-team regular with them since 2005. His performances were also recognised by Paul Fairclough, the England non-league

team manager, who awarded Nat with his first England C call up.

JAMIE TOLLEY

Tolley began his career as a trainee with Shrewsbury Town, and made his debut for the club in November 1999. Aged just 16 years and 193 days, he became the youngest player in Shrews' history. He eventually joined Macclesfield, a week into the 2006/07 season. After his releases from Moss Rose, Jamie signed a year's contract at Second Division Hereford United, however, a disappointing spell saw him make only 10 appearances and ended with his contract termination by mutual consent in March 2010. In July 2010, Jamie joined Wrexham on trial, featuring in several pre-season friendlies before signing a short-term deal with the club, in an attempt to prove his match fitness to manager Dean Saunders.

STRIKERS

ANDY MANGAN


Top scorer in the Blue Square Premier during 2008/09, Mangan was a welcome addition to the Dragons' forward line having completed a reported £30,000 move from Forest Green Rovers in the January transfer window last season. The 23-year-old Liverpool-bom striker netted three times against Wrexham in 2008/09 on his way to a 26-goal haul. After he was handed a five-month ban by the FA in August 2009 for breaching betting rules, the former Blackpool, Hyde, Accrington and Bury goalscorer returned to action with an all-action display in The Dragons' 1-0 home win over AFC Wimbledon.

ANDY MORRELL

Was the Football League's top goalscorer in 2003, when previously at the Racecourse, and as a result moved onto play for Championship club Coventry City. He has also enjoyed spells with both Blackpool and Bury, before returning to Wrexham in the summer of 2010. Andy scored goals for fun with Newcastle Blue Star while at University in the city, and then impressed during a trial period at Wrexham to be offered his first professional contract in 1998 at the age of 24.

MATHIAS POGBA

Striker who joined the club from a lower league side in France, after serving his time with Celta



ANDY MANGAN

Vigo in Spain. A 20-year-old bustling centre forward who has made his mark in the reserves and now looking to do the same in the first-team. Scored his first senior goal when wrapping up a 2-0 win over Bath City over the New Year.

GARETH TAYLOR

A vastly experienced Welsh international, Gareth has enjoyed a 20-year career encompassing spells with Bristol Rovers, Crystal Palace, Sheffield United, Manchester City, Port Vale (loan), QPR (loan), Burnley, Nottingham Forest, Crewe Alexandra (loan), Tranmere Rovers, Doncaster Rovers and Carlisle United (loan). With 122 goals in 505 league appearances, his ability to lead the line and was our top scorer in 2009/10 with 10 goals.

MARC WILLIAMS

The Bangor-born Welsh Under-21 international was Wrexham's talisman in 2008/09, netting 17 goals in just 29 appearances. Sadly a broken metatarsal sustained against Salisbury in February prematurely ended both his campaign and ultimately the Dragons' promotion hopes. The injury re-occurred early in 2009/10, finishing his season before it had really even started. He and Mike Williams became the first brothers to score in the same game for Wrexham since the 1890s, when they both netted in a 2-1 win at Mansfield in October 2008.

MATCH REPORT

Town boss Gary Brabin lost his first game in charge and was sent to the stands in a fiery encounter at Bootham Crescent.

York, chasing a Play-Off place, almost took the lead inside two minutes but Mark Tyler produced a stunning reaction save to keep out Jamie Reed's close range header following Ashley Chambers' cross.

The Hatters goalkeeper then saved his side from falling behind on 10 minutes - this time beating away Jonathan Smith's shot from 10 yards.

Under pressure in the early stages the Town almost took the lead against the run of play when Adam Newton's pass found Jason Walker through on goal but the striker could only shoot wide.

As the Hatters got on top it was the turn of home goalkeeper Michael Ingham to produce the theatrics to prevent Amari Morgan-Smith's curling shot from putting the visitors ahead.

The first-half ended in controversy as the Hatters manager was sent to the stands after exchanging words with York assistant Darron Gee after Scott Kerr's nasty tackle on Keith Keane.

After eight minutes of stoppage time at the end of the first half the Hatters again found themselves under the cosh in the opening moments of the second period with Neil Barrett poking a shot wide from 15 yards after being played in by Smith.

Back came the Town, however, and substitute Claude Gnakpa - on for the injured Freddie Murray - headed over when well-placed six yards from goal.

More end-to-end football ensued as both sides went for the jugular and the Hatters found themselves a goal down on 65 minutes when Smith threaded a pass through to Reed who finished well past Tyler.

York's joy was tarnished a minute after they'd taken the lead when they were reduced to 10 men when Kerr was sent-off for a second booking to give the Town the last 25 minutes with a man advantage.

Try as they might the Hatters could not find an equaliser as time ticked down with Robbie Willmott and Gnakpa both went close in the closing stages but York held on to secure all three points.

POST-MATCH REACTION

A fiery exchange at Bootham Crescent ended in a disappointing first defeat to York City for new Hatters' boss Gary Brabin, who was sent to the stands just before the interval.

The 1-0 defeat was the Hatters first in seven matches and left everyone disappointed as Adam Newton revealed afterwards.

"No-one likes to lose a game considering where we are and what we want to achieve. It was a lively game and we unfortunately didn't come out on top of it," said the former Brentford man.

"York didn't create too many opportunities other than set pieces but they took their chance and it was one of those games. Fair play to the York crowd, they get behind their team and make it a fiery atmosphere.

"We do have a history here so I think there is always going to be an underlying rivalry where we feel we owe them one for knocking us out last season, but unfortunately we couldn't do that tonight."

Newton almost had the chance to put the Hatters ahead early in the first half but couldn't quite latch onto the through ball by Amari Morgan-Smith.

"I lost my footing in the penalty area and the best I could do was trying set up someone else but the ball sat up and fell

to the defender who cleared it," explained the St Kitts and Nevis international.

"We had a lot of possession and free kicks. There were a lot of individual chances and maybe we should have used the ball better in the final third keeping the pressure on them.


"I think we were a bit unlucky but we have another game coming which gives us the chance to put this behind us."

Newly appointed Gary Brabin is Newton's third boss in less than two seasons but the 30-year-old believes the off-field developments haven't affected the team.

"The expectation hasn't changed as we all know our capabilities and what we can achieve. Whatever goes on upstairs or off the pitch is nothing to do with us.

"We're strong enough and good enough to come to places like this and get a result.

"We're more than capable of coming to away games and putting in a solid performance which is something we will all need to do as we get to the Play-Offs," he added.







MATCH REPORT

It was fun in sun for the Town as they eased to a comfortable win over Eastbourne Borough to seal their place in the Play-Offs.

At a sun-drenched Kenilworth Road the Town came close to going ahead as early as the second minute when Lloyd Owusu headed over Jake Howells' cross.

The Hatters were bossing possession and a fantastic run and shot from Robbie Willmott almost broke the deadlock on 15 minutes only for Rikki Banks to pull off a fine save.

However the Town, and Willmott, were not to be denied three minutes later. Banks looked favourite to pick up Dan Gleeson's ball down the right flank but Willmott sped in, robbed the ball and rolled home from an acute angle to make it 1-0.

The Hatters were playing some terrific football and it should have been 2-0 on 27 minutes when Owusu slid an opportunity over the crossbar from sixyards following Jason Walker's square pass.

Claude Gnakpa hit the side-netting on 32 minutes and Howells saw a shot blocked two minutes later before Walker spumed a great chance on 37 minutes after dashing onto Alex Lawless' excellent raking pass.

Zdenek Kroca saw a close range header superbly kept out by Banks on 52 minutes before Gnakpa was denied by the crossbar a minute later as chance after chance rained down on the visitors' goal.

The Frenchman saw a header tipped over the crossbar on 58 minutes and from the resultant corner the crossbar was rattled for a second time when Owusu's header bounced off the woodwork.

After Banks had kept out another effort from Gnakpa the goalkeeper was finally beaten for a second time when Walker floated a superb ball into the path of the Frenchman to head home on 65 minutes.

Banks continued to repel the Town attack but could do nothing to prevent Willmott from making it 3-0 when the winger ran at the Eastbourne defence and drove a shot from the edge of the area beyond the goalkeeper.

The 27-year-old feels that the Hatters current form is vital as the club edges towards the all-important Play-Offs:


"It's what we need. Confidence and quality is really important. Whatever team we play is going to be good but if we're solid and carry on like we have done, we can do it."





MATCH REPORT

The Hatters strolled to their second successive win by recording a comfortable victory over bottom-of-the-table Histon.

The Town almost found themselves a goal down within three minutes as a right-wing break from the Stutes saw Omer Riza hit the post before Kevin Pilkington had to be alert to keep out Antonio Murray's expert drive from the edge of the area.

But the visitors had the lead on 12 minutes with a move of real quality when Amari Morgan-Smith finished a fine move involving Matthew Barnes-Homer and Alex Lawless.

Pilkington had to be at his best to keep out Lee Smith's daisy-cutter from the edge of the area before Barnes-Homer doubled the Town's lead when he punished lazy defending from the hosts following Morgan-Smith's cross.

Morgan-Smith almost got a second goal in first half injury time as his turn and rasping low shot was kept out well by home stopper Wes Foderingham diving away to his left.

The Town made one change at the interval with Claude Gnackpa replacing Robbie Willmott and the Frenchman took just 66 seconds after the restart to make an impact as he headed home a Lawless corner to make it 3-0.

Riza should have reduced arrears a minute later when he raced clear of the Hatters defence but after stepping on the ball he eventually saw a shot blocked by Luke Graham.

Gnackpa almost made it four on 68 minutes when he saw a shot hit a Histon defender after terrific cheeky wing play down the right, before Pilkington kept out Remy Clerima's close range header at the other end two minutes later.

Pilkington did have work to do on 71 minutes when he had to prevent Clerima's close range header from squirming underneath his body after a right-wing corner.

As Histon pressed for a consolation Ed Asafu-Adjaye hacked the ball off the line to save a certain goal before Barnes-Homer completed the rout in injury time with a stunning finish from the edge of the area.


"We have so many good players in-form in this squad which means everyone is trying to impress when they get a chance to play.

8 The number of previous matches played on this date at Kenilworth Road. Luton have won six, drawn one and lost one, scoring 21 goals and conceding 10.


0 The only time that Luton have failed to take a point from these fixtures came in the very first match, a 1-0 defeat to Portsmouth in a Southern League match in 1910.

4 The biggest margin of victory came in 1927 when Bournemouth were the visitors for a Division Three (South) encounter. Andy Rennie, Syd Reid, Jimmy Thompson and George Dennis were all on the scoresheet in a 4-0 win. This was the first of three times that Luton would net four goals and the only time that the Hatters have kept a clean sheet on this date at Kenilworth Road.

5 Five years later and there were five goals in 1932 as Luton won 3-2 against Brighton & Hove Albion, again in a Division Three (South) fixture. Rennie was once again on the scoresheet, with George McNestry and Tommy Tait also on target.

2 The number of goals and number of points won in 1969 when local rivals Watford came to Kenilworth Road. Ian Buxton opened the scoring in the first half with a goal on his last appearance for the Hatters before Keith Allen made it 2-0 in the second half. The visitors scored a late consolation, in a match that saw three players sent-off, two for Watford and Alan Slough of Luton. The attendance of 25,253 was the biggest for eight years at Kenilworth Road and the highest on this date.

29 The number of years ago that Luton clinched promotion to the First Division after beating Shrewsbury 4-1 in 1982. Brian Stein scored the only goal of the first half, before the visitors equalised on the hour through Ian Atkins. With 12 minutes remaining Ricky Hill hit a superb volley to restore the lead



before Steve White and David Moss wrapped up the victory in the final ten minutes.

1 The number of goals scored by each side in 1994, when the Hatters hosted Southend United. It was the only draw on this date at Kenilworth Road. Ricky Otto had scored for the visitors but 10 minutes from time a John Hartson header was deemed to have crossed the line to give Luton a share of the points.

3 The Hatters scored three goals in 1996 to beat Port Vale in the final home game of the season, however the Town had already been relegated following defeat against Barnsley three days previous. Ben Chenery and Sean Evers made their league debuts as Tony

Thorpe netted twice and Bulgarian International Bontcho Guentchev also scored in a 3-2 win.

6 The number of years since the last fixture on this date at Kenilworth Road and it was a day for celebration as the Hatters were presented with the League 1 trophy after beating Brentford 4-2. Ahmet Brkovic had opened the scoring in the fifth minute but Brentford hit back with goals from Sam Sodje and Deon Burton to lead at halftime. With just six minutes remaining Kevin Nicholls netted from the penalty spot to level the scores before late goals from Enoch Showunmi and Steve Robinson gave the Town a dramatic late win.

● ALLAN BROWN NETS THE TOWN'S WINNER AGAINST BLACKPOOL IN THE FA CUP QUARTER-FINAL IN 1959



When the Hatters were drawn to play Leeds at home in round three of the FA Cup in the 1958/59 season most Luton supporters did not give the game much thought, and certainly cup euphoria was not evident on the streets of the town.

Six weeks later, though, things were a little different as between times the Town had fought their way through to the quarter-finals for only the third time in their history.

The draw, however, was unkind, pitting the Hatters against arguably the strongest side left in the competition, Blackpool, who still boasted the mercurial Stanley Matthews and a good many of the side that had lifted the trophy six years before.

It was a dream come true for Allan Brown who had missed out on a winners' medal with the Seaside after breaking his leg scoring the winning goal in the quarter-final of 1953. Here was the chance to make up for that disappointment and against his old side to boot! A crowd of 30,634 gathered at Bloomfield

Road to see two rugged defences in action with very little in the way of goalmouth action.

The game seemed to be petering out to a scoreless draw when quicksilver Billy Bingham, anticipating a long cross from Bob Morton, ran between two defenders and crouched low to head the Town into the lead.

Only seconds remained, and with the referee looking at his watch, disaster struck when the normally reliable Luton full-back Ken Hawkes played an underhit back pass to goalkeeper Ron Baynham which allowed Blackpool's Ray Chamley to nip in for an undeserved equaliser and a replay at Kenilworth Road the following Wednesday.

Due to the fact that Blackpool (and more particularly Matthews so it was rumoured) objected to the Luton floodlights, the replay was scheduled to take place in the afternoon which the Town officials felt would affect the attendance.

As it turned out, when the turnstiles had stopped clicking, the crowd was recorded at

30,069 - a ground record. Truancy was rife that afternoon and the major employers in the town turned a blind eye to absenteeism (or so they said afterwards).

This time the play was more open with Blackpool trying to bring Matthews further into the game, but the Luton defence held firm. It was felt that the team scoring first would be the winner, but as the game wore on in the second period it looked increasingly likely that we were in for a stalemate.

In true storybook fashion it was Brown who broke the deadlock with 15 minutes to go. George Cummins split the defence for Brown to run on and sweep the ball past George Farn in the Blackpool goal. The two players collided, but this time unlike in 1953, Brown rose to his feet as the crowd went wild.

Despite frantic efforts by Blackpool the Town defence held on and when the referee called an end to the game the crowd surged on to the pitch to celebrate the club's first appearance in an FA Cup semi-final.

AGAINST THE ODDS

● DERBY COUNTY 2-3 LUTON TOWN. 5TH MAY 1990.

With only three games to go at the end of the 1989/90 campaign the Town looked certain to lose the top flight place that they had clung on to since winning promotion in glorious style in 1982. With only nine points to play for and six points from the safety spot of fourth from bottom it looked a hopeless task.

Of the three remaining games two were at home. First up were the previous season's champions Arsenal. Manager Jim Ryan had a simple message for the players telling them that they must win at all costs and hope that somehow fourth from bottom Sheffield Wednesday would slip up along the way.

Supporters would have expected the players to be jittery but they came out full of self belief and tore into the Gunners from the start and

it was no surprise when Dowie fired the Town into the lead after Arsenal full-back, Nigel Winterburn, failed to control a ball in the area.

The Town's second goal came just before the hour and was set up by some brilliant play from Tim Breacker. Surging down the wing, Breacker cleverly beat Arsenal's Tony Adams before playing a one two with Danny Wilson and then putting in a low cross that was converted by Kingsley Black.

After the players trooped off they learnt that Sheffield Wednesday had lost 1-0 at QPR and the gap at the bottom had therefore narrowed to three points.

Wednesday were due to be playing already relegated Charlton at Selhurst Park on the

following Saturday while the Town were down to meet FA Cup finalists Crystal Palace at Kenilworth Road.

Palace had recently confirmed a safe spot just above Wednesday and with one eye turned towards their forthcoming trip to Wembley decided to close the game down against the Town.

To be honest, it was tedious stuff but the Town players, to their credit, refused to panic and kept on trying to football their way through the packed Palace rearguard.

The fans all thought that it was not going to be the Town's day when Danny Wilson hit a post with a rocket drive with the rebound falling to Jason Rees whose shot was brilliantly

saved by Nigel Martyn.

News started to filter through that Wednesday were leading at Selhurst Park and as the final seconds ticked away relegation stared the Hatters in the face.

The breakthrough goal was timed at 89 minutes six seconds and came in true 'Roy of the Rovers' fashion off the shin of Iain Dowie. Wilson had started the move with an excellent crossfield pass to Rees who hammered over a low cross that was met at the far post by Dowie who was instantly submerged by his teammates.

The situation was now set for a final day show down. The Town were to play at Derby while Sheffield Wednesday were at home to Nottingham Forest. The Town had to win and Wednesday had to lose, it was as simple as that!

Throughout the week leading up to the game many thoughts went through the minds of the average Luton supporter. Would the Town be able to win at Derby having won only once away all season?

The Rams were safe but they still boasted Peter Shilton, Mark Wright, Dean Saunders and a

certain Mick Harford in their side who certainly did not know how to take things easy.

Sheffield Wednesday had a good home record but would Forest manager Brian Clough allow any of his players to roll over and die?

Despite the agonising, over 5,000 sleepless Luton supporters converged on the Baseball Ground on a glorious sunny day to see the Town take the lead in sensational fashion after only 66 seconds.

Ignoring all the set piece routines drummed into him, full-back Tim Breacker cracked the ball into the net from a freekick taken fully 30 yards out.

This was followed by a cool Kingsley Black finish to a Wilson cross after 18 minutes and with news filtering through that Forest were winning at Hillsborough the Baseball Ground became the place to be.

Unfortunately this feeling of euphoria was not allowed to last as by halftime Derby had pulled back the two goal deficit through goals from Wright and Paul Williams and only brilliant goalkeeping from Alec Chamberlain prevented the Rams from moving into the lead.

The supporters all feared that the Town would cave in but to their surprise the players completely dominated the second half with a brand of attacking football that had Derby on the back foot throughout.

Despite all the attacking, the winning goal would not come and with the minutes ticking away those on the terraces were chewing their fingernails down to the knuckle.

The winner finally came from local boy Kingsley Black with 16 minutes remaining after his shot rebounded off a wall of defenders back to him when he gratefully thumped the ball home with his 'wrong' foot.

The players then sensibly shut up shop and the abiding memory is of hard man midfielder, Mick Kennedy, setting off on a tremendous jinking run to nowhere in particular and eventually ending up at the corner flag where his bulk shielded the ball for a few more valuable seconds.

By the time of the final whistle everyone knew that Wednesday had lost 3-0 to Forest and after the most improbable and impossible of escapes the celebrations went on long into the night.



Julian Colin JAMES

Luton coach John Moore first spotted Triingborn Julian playing in a county schools match at Hemel Hempstead and he eventually signed professional forms in June 1988.

Julian was sent-off for a supposed professional foul when making his full Hatters debut in a Littlewoods Cup tie at Leeds the following season, but his evening was not completely ruined as the Town did go onto win the tie.

First and foremost a defender, James could

play anywhere along the back and his versatility became a godsend to succession of Luton Town managers.

Capped twice by England at Under-21 level, he became a regular in the Hatters side in 1991/92 and apart from injuries was a feature in the team until a badly broken leg suffered at Bristol Rovers in April 1998 effectively ended his career.

Coach's comments:





Lying deep in the Buckinghamshire countryside there is an education institute responsible for producing some of the individuals that have made Britain great.

Stowe School has provided this nation with entrepreneurs such as Sir Richard Branson, Sir Jack Hayward, owner of Wolverhampton Wanderers, Martin Edwards, the former chairman of Manchester United, and John Sainsbury to name but a few.

In sporting terms Simon Clegg, the former CEO of the British Olympic Association, and Graeme White, the Northamptonshire cricketer are the most famous members of the Old Stoic Society.

Although there may be more names to be added to that list after the recent successful Luton Town performance centre residential course at the school.

During the first week of the Easter holidays over 200 boys ranging from Under-7s to Under-16s spent three days at the school, involved in a variety of activities which helped towards their development as players and maybe the

opportunity for a place in the Centre of Excellence.

My role in the week was to work with the Under 15 and Under 16 groups to help the players see what they need to do to progress in the game, to try to gain a scholarship at the club or to be invited in for preseason next year.

The group were great to work with, we had three days of good sessions in lovely weather and I saw some genuine improvement in many of the players' game understanding.

In the younger age groups it was a real opportunity to look at players and compare them directly to their Centre of Excellence counterparts.

The games between the Performance Centre and Centre of Excellence teams were closely competed and there were a number of players from the Performance Centre that caught the eye.

Off the back of these games six players have been invited into the Centre of Excellence to train and to see whether they are of the standard that will take the club forward.

For one Under-12 player, Joe Hankins, this has been realised. Standout performances at Stowe have been rewarded with a contract to join the Centre of Excellence for the next two years.

I would like to thank all the hard work of Kevin Thoburn and all of the Centre of Excellence and Performance Centre staff that made Stowe such a success as well as the great attitudes, willingness to learn and enjoyment of all the players throughout the week.

Perhaps some of these players who are now trailing with the club may get added to the Stowe hall of fame?



The Town were definitely second best in the first half and had goalkeeper Sian Hall to thank for two excellent stops but there was nothing she could do to stop Tottenham taking the lead after 37 minutes, when the Spurs striker slid the ball under her having been put through on goal.

The second half was a far more even affair and the Hatters were rewarded with an equaliser when Nicola Henman chipped a through ball into the path of Rebecca Kane. She ran on to score, netting a rebound from her own shot after the keeper got a hand to her first effort.

Luton kept pressing as the game moved into extra time, in scorching conditions, with Jody Lapish having Town's best chance in the 115th minute but her shot from sixyards out struck the goalkeeper.

With penalties looming the game burst into life when a speculative Tottenham header dropped onto the top of the crossbar and bounced back kindly to the Spurs striker to volley home.

All seemed lost but in the final minute Kane somehow got the ball past the goalkeeper and, in a cloud of dust, Candice Davies smashed the ball in to equalise.

The penalty shoot out was a real nerve wracking affair with Luton taking the second kicks of the

series and having to score to stay in the cup but Jade McEntaggart, Henman, Michelle Byrne, Jess McKay, Leyah Maddix all netted their kicks.

The eighth Spurs kick was fired wide by their goalkeeper and it was left to Kane to fire home the winning penalty to complete a real gutsy comeback and a 6-5 victory on penalties.

In the penultimate league match a visit to MK Dons began in similar fashion with Luton falling a goal behind on the half hour, via a cruel deflection from a blocked shot which looped into the air and dropped high into the far corner of the net.

The Town responded well and equalised just before half time when Candice Davies adjusted her body in a tight spot to chip the ball over the Dons keeper from 12-yards. Just a minute later Lapish put the Hatters in front with a powerful header from a corner to make it 2-1 at the break.

A superb second half showing wrapped up the points as the Town threatened to run riot scoring twice within 10 minutes if the restart.

Firstly, Kane went past three defenders and lifted her shot over the diving goalkeeper and that was quickly followed by Davies who added her second with a 25-yard lob over the advancing goalkeeper to complete a fine 4-1 away win.

Town's league season was completed with a 1-1 draw against Cambridge with Kane again the Luton scorer finishing off a quality passing move.

The League Cup final against Cambridge takes place tomorrow at Newport Pagnell with a 2pm kickoff.


