Football historian Leigh Edwards looks at Luton Town's leading lights

Classic Campaign 1987-88

Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Danny Hibernian and Mike Newell moved to and Ian Allinson was signed from Stoke match against Oxford, finishing ninth in the top-flight. They defeated Wigan 5-2, Coventry 3-1, Ipswich 1-0, Bradford City finalists and Simod Cup finalists.

Managing to Succeed - David Pleat

Articulate manager David Pleat guided 1981-82. A former winger, he played for Nottingham Forest, Luton, Shrewsbury, Nuneaton's player-boss. He rejoined Luton as coach in July 1972 and became manager in January 1978, guiding the Hatters to the FA Cup semi-finals in 1984-85. Taking charge of Spurs in May 1986, he led them to the 1987 FA Cup rejoining Luton in June 1991. He took the Hatters to the FA Cup semi-finals again working in the media.

Names & Games **FAB FOUR**



Influential midfielder Bruce Rioch was capped 24 times by Scotland after leaving Luton Town. Signing professional for Luton in September 1964, he starred in the 1967-68 Fourth Division title triumph and netted 46 goals in 149 League games prior to joining Aston Villa for £100,000 in July 1969. He was a key figure in their 1971-72 Third Division

title success and moved to Derby County in February 1974, helping to win the League Championship in 1974-75. He played for Everton, Derby again and Torquay, since managing Middlesbrough, Millwall, Bolton Wanderers, Arsenal, Norwich City and Wigan Athletic.



Ricky Hill

England international midfielder Ricky Hill was 'Player of the Year' when Luton Town won the Second Division title in 1981-82. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in May 1976, he was 'Player of the Year' again in 1982-83 and starred as Luton were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85. He featured in two consecutive Littlewoods

Cup finals including the 1988 Wembley triumph and netted 54 goals in 436 League games before moving to Le Havre in July 1989. Reuniting with David Pleat at Leicester City in August 1990 and later as a coach at Sheffield Wednesday and Spurs, he briefly rejoined Luton as manager.



England international striker Brian Stein scored twice in Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Edgware Town in October 1977, he was leading marksman in Luton's 1981-82 Second Division success and also starred as they were FA Cup semifinalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88. He joined French

side Caen in July 1988 and moved via Annecy back to Luton in July 1991. Voted 'Player of the Year' for the second time in 1991-92, he netted 130 goals in 427 League games overall for the Hatters before joining Barnet in August 1992. His younger brother Mark also played for Luton.



Malcolm MacDonald

Ace marksman Malcolm Macdonald was capped 14 times by England after leaving Luton Town. Initially with Tonbridge, he joined Fulham in August 1968 and moved to Kenilworth Road in July 1969. He was Luton's top scorer in two consecutive seasons including the 1969-70 promotion success and netted 49 goals in 88 League games before being

sold to Newcastle United for £180,000 in May 1971. An FA Cup finalist in 1974, he joined Arsenal for £333,000 in August 1976 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1978 before injury ended his career. He managed Fulham and Huddersfield Town and has since worked in the media.

Gary Brabin

Gary Brabin actually began his career as an apprentice with Stockport County signing professional forms in 1989, although after only 2 appearances for the first team (SCAN 974) he was released.

Gary played for non league side Gateshead before moving to Runcorn where he played in two successive FA Trophy finals. He returned to Football League action when he joined Doncaster Rovers in 1994.

He moved to Bury for £125,000 in March 1996 but played only 5 league games before being sold to Blackpool in the summer for £200,000. He spent a loan spell at Lincoln City before joining Hull City in 1999.

Having left the 'tigers' in 2001 Brabin had spells with Boston United, Torquay United, Chester City, TNS, Halifax Town, Southport and Burscough before retiring as a player.

After spells as manager at Southport and Cambridge United Brabin was originally brought to the club as Chief Scout at the time Richard Money was appointed manager in October 2009, Brabin was reassigned in the new role as assistant manager in the summer of 2010.

Following the departure of Richard Money in March 2011. Brabin took control of the Hatters until the end of the 2010/11 season.

After playing over 275 times in League football as a tough-tackling midfielder, Brabin moved into management firstly with Southport - guiding them to the Conference North Play-offs - before moving south to manage Cambridge United in 2008.

In his first - and eventually only - season at the Abbey Stadium he guided the U's to the Blue Square Premier Play-off final after finishing runners-up to champions Burton Albion, but lost to Torquay United at Wembley. Despite that set-back Brabin was awarded the BSP Manager of the Year award before behind the scenes differences at the Abbey led to him leaving the club in July 2009 before arriving at Kenilworth Road.

Mark Tyler



London Road and was rewarded for his loyalty with a testimonial against Liverpool in 2007. After falling down the pecking order at Posh he found first team opportunities hard to come by and in 2008/09 he was loaned out to League 2 Bury where he made 11 appearances for the Shakers. A former England Youth international, Tyler was handed the number one shirt by the Hatters boss who admitted he'd failed in an attempt to sign the stopper the previous summer. After a hugely successful two years between the sticks at Kenilworth Road, Mark signed a new contract in the summer of 2011.

George Pilkington

Highly experienced defender who joined the club on a free transfer in August 2008. Having began his career as an Everton trainee, Pilkington joined Port Vale in June 2003, after a loan spell at Exeter City. Having started

223 league games for the Valiants, the highly-regarded defender has been named Player of the Year twice. Injury frustrated the centre-half in his first season at Kenilworth Road in 2008/09 but he still managed to pick-up a Johnstone's Paint Trophy winners' medal. Pilkington hit the headlines for his goal scoring exploits in the Town's first season in the Conference, twice scoring braces in early season victories over Mansfield and Crawley. His impeccable form on the pitch led to him winning a string of end-of-season awards and underlined his loyalty to the Hatters by signing a new contract at the end of the 2009/10 campaign.



Dean Beckwith

Centre-back Beckwith became the Hatters' second signing of the summer of 2011 following his release from League 2 side Northampton Town. The 27-year-old, who signed a twoyear deal at Kenilworth Road, was a key member of the Cobblers' squad

in 2010/11 which reached the fourth round of the League Cup following wins over Brighton, Reading and Liverpool. The commanding 6ft 3in defender has experienced promotion from the Blue Square Bet Premier before having been part of the Hereford United side that won the Play-Off final against Halifax Town in 2008. With almost 250 senior appearances to his name after starting his career as a junior at Gillingham the centre-half enjoyed his best goal scoring season last season scoring three goals. The defender turned down offers from a number of Football League clubs but was delighted to agree terms to bolster the Hatters' defensive options.



Will Antwi

Ashford-born centre-half who signed a six-month contract in July 2011 following his release from Dagenham & Redbridge. Capped once by Ghana, Antwi began moving to Aldershot in 2004. After one

season at the Rec, Antwi joined Wycombe Wanderers where he made 42 league appearances between 2005 and 2009. With first team opportunities limited at Adams Park Antwi joined Dagenham on loan before making the switch permanent in July 2009 until he release following the Daggers' relegation.



Danny Crow

A nippy poacher of a striker, Crow joined the Hatters from Cambridge United in May 2010 following the expiry of his contract at the Abbey Stadium. The front man started his career as a trainee with Norwich City and made his senior bow in the Premier League for the Canaries

in December 2004. A loan spell at Northampton followed towards the end of the 2004/05 season before he was released by Norwich and signed for Peterborough in the summer of 2005, notching 17 goals in his debut season at London Road. Following a short loan spell at Notts County, Crow was released by Posh and was snapped up by Cambridge in September 2008. The energetic forward's strike-rate of 22 goals in 43 league starts won him many admirers and his 19 goals during 2009/10 saw him scoop the U's online Player of the Year award.



Amari Morgan-Smith

Striker or wide man who arrived at Kenilworth Road as a free agent following a two-year spell at Ilkeston Town. He put pen to paper on a twoyear deal after two years with the Blue Square Bet North side in which he scored 34 goals in 77 starts. The fast

earned him a call-up to the England C squad at the end of last season, earning his first cap against the Republic of Ireland in May. Wolverhampton-born Morgan-Smith started his career as a trainee with Wolves. He then signed for Crewe and then Stockport where he made one Football League appearance before moving to Ilkeston. Before the 2009/10 season began the striker impressed in a trial for Championship side Derby County and has since gone on to score three goals in seven appearances for Ilkeston. Earlier this season his former boss Kevin Wilson hailed the striker, who scored 23 goals last season, as the "hottest property in non-league football". With huge interest in the forward, Town boss Richard Money was delighted to beat off competition from a number of Championship and League One sides for Morgan-Smith's signature. And, hours after completing the paperwork, Morgan-Smith was thrust into action for his debut against Mansfield and scored in the 2-0 victory.

road! Beginning with an opening day fixture away at Barrow, the Hatters came away with a splendid 1-1 draw.

This was followed by a five match winning run! Beating York City at home on the Friday 3-1, next up was Lincoln away the following Friday and a Keith Allen header gave us the points! Monday night a home 2-1 win against Barnsley saw County go top of the league! Saturdays papers carried the story: '10,000 chanting fans roar County to the top!' Chesterfield were next to be beaten at home 3-1. County then travelled down to Luton and the Cheadle Enders went mental as the Hatters beat the 'pretenders' 0-3!

On November 4th County beat Exeter City at home 1-0. This was the start of another five game winning run! In fact the Hatters were unbeaten in ten games. Then the 11th was away at Chesterfield as the County fans packed the covered end were sent into raptures after only four minutes when Keith East fired home! In the end though after a somewhat disputed penalty we went down 2-1. Police had to move in as the angry County fans invaded the pitch! (Despicable behaviour!)

The next home game though we made amends by completing the double over Luton winning 1-0 at EP. On February 11th 5,000 County fans travelled to Southport but our bogey team did us 4-0! In the last 15 games of the campaign though it was quite obvious that we would come away with the title. We won nine of those games drawing four and losing only two matches, the last was the 4-5 farce at home to Lincoln on the last day! In this run we drew 1-1 at Gresty Road. 8,000 County fans boosted the crowd to 11,385

a League attendance record that will never be beaten at Crewe.

A 1-1 draw at Notts County on Wednesday 26th April saw a late Bill Atkins header earn us the point needed to guarantee promotion! Three days later at the Racecourse ground over 3,000 ecstatic County supporters did their own lap of honour around the pitch as the 2-2 draw ensured that we were the Champions of the Fourth!

opposition. Man City came first and even though we had seven Reserves on we still beat them 1-0 (Nothing changes!) Blackburn Rovers came next and we beat them as well 1-0! City fans had the cheek to come in the Famous Cheadle End an hour before the game-but when the County fans arrived out of the pubs they legged it over the pitch and all the way round to the Railway End.

Being in the famous 14 wooden steps and under the tin roof of the Cheadle End really was an experience you found hard to describe-you just had to be in there! 3,000 fans packed sardine fashion bouncing on the wooden steps, swaying forward in to the barrier-it really was just like the: 'Swaying Mass of Humanity!'

A great season with some great players!

Matt Woods and Eddie Stuart at the back, Allchurch and Price on the wings, Lister scoring the



goals after Frank Lord had left mid season. Mulhearn in the nets! It really was the season of all season's for us! GO! GO! GO! COUNTY!



He Played at the Park Anthony Pilkington

"It's a great feeling to score at Wembley, one which I'm struggling to describe really" – Anthony Pilkington after the 2008 League 2 Play-off final

Anthony Pilkington's football path is real Roy of the Rovers stuff.

After his career began moving through the youth systems of Preston, Manchester United and Blackburn; it was at Atherton Collieries where he started to make his mark.

Four appearances which included an excellent hat-trick against FC United, encouraged County boss Jim Gannon to snap up the 18 year old on a short term contract in December 2006.

Under Gannon's guidance 'Pilks' impact was instantaneous with an impressive 3 goals in his first 4 appearances.

Pilks was also part of the County team that secured a football league record nine game winning streak without conceding a goal.

During the 2007-2008 season Pilks was a key player of Gannon's 4-2-3-1 formation, his pace and technique were crucial to keeping the fluid system.

As the season continued, Pilkington's influence grew and if any game epitomised his class it was the 2008 Play off final against Rochdale.

An even first half between the two young sides left the second half keenly poised at 1 -1, until Pilks took control.

Pilks popped up to head in a bouncing cross to

give the Hatter's the lead and then provided the pass for Liam Dickinson to score the decisive third goal.

The next season in league one again had Pilkington playing a key role as the scouts flocked to County.

Unfortunately Pilkington proved to be a catalyst in County's return to unsettled times. The financial problems forced the club's hand and he signed for Huddersfield in January 2009.

He continued his successful career with the Terriers and soon caught the attention of Paul Lambert. The Norwich boss signed up Pilks for their Premier League campaign.

County fans no doubt will watch the 23 year olds future with great pride at the lad from the Collieries who took his chance at Edgeley Park and never looked back.





HERE have been many players over the years who have undergone an on-pitch makeover. I used to love watching Leicester City's Steve Walsh play at the back one week, before playing up front the next. Paul Warhurst, too, at Sheffield Wednesday and Blackburn.

Just recently, Wrexham boss Dean Saunders has made an astute move in moving Nat Knight-Percival the other way, with the leggy leftwinger starring at centre-half in the Welsh club's blistering start to the Blue Square Bet Premier season.



At over six feet tall, the 24-year-old looks a natural at the heart of defence because he heads the ball well, he's quick and he's left footed.

It's a combination top level managers are crying out for, and the reason Knight-Percival has adapted so easily to life at the back is because he has the intelligence to take the differing aspects of playing football on board.

As a semi-pro, I've had to change from playing centre-half my normal position - one week to a holding midfield role or right-back the next.



You're only moving a matter of inches in where you line-up, but it does make a difference and although I'd perform adequately to start with, after a couple of games I'd have to be switched back to stop me becoming a hindrance to the team.

It sounds ridiculous but having players behind you, when in midfield, can unbalance you. You don't have to make that last-ditch tackle, win the header from a goal-kick and clearances don't have to be hit with such force.

At full-back, you take throw-ins, go on the overlap and are often isolated one-on-one with a winger – things that don't normally happen in your comfort zone. The four different Alfreton lads who tried filling in for Josh Law at right-back in the first-half against Wrexham last Saturday will tell you what I mean!

That is why I have so much respect for those who can make a go of it.

Liam Hatch turned in some sterling performances for Darlington in his usual striking role last season, but regularly played centre-half, including at Wembley in the FA Trophy final win over Mansfield.

An Conference viewers will recall seeing Darius Charles play for Ebbsfleet at centrehalf or left-back, but he is carving out a reputation as a forward to be



feared in the Football League with Stevenage.

The best example, however, is also in League One.

Matt Taylor was a commanding goalkeeper who I watched in Burscough's FA Trophy win over Tamworth in 2003. The next time I saw him (or didn't see him, more to the point) he was ghosting in behind me at the far post to head in a goal while playing centre-half for Team Bath at Hitchin.

Little more than four years later, he's won promotion from that league with the now-defunct Students. from the Conference and League Two as Exeter City's inspirational captain, and is now playing in front of 15,000 every week at The Valley.



As well as all those football achievements, Taylor's CV also includes two degrees from Sheffield Hallam and Bath universities. Now, what was I saying about intelligence?

View from the Board Room

ell Monday's game certainly demonstrated that being a Stockport County supporter can be a frustrating business to say the least. A game that had all the makings of a 0 -0 draw ended in our first defeat of the season.

We all know, including Didi, we weren't sharp enough on the field and we all know that a repeat performance tonight against Luton will lead to a similar result with perhaps an even worse scoreline. After that terrific first half at Kidderminster, it was difficult to believe that it was almost the same team.

Whilst these notes are being written before the transfer deadline I hope that the efforts that are taking place today (Tuesday) to strengthen the team are successful, and that at least one addition to the playing staff will be in our line up tonight. What we need as one long time Edgeley Park devotee told me on Monday is a 'strong, pacy, 20 goal a season striker'. You bet we do. So does every other pro football club. It's finding 'em that's the problem. But we're looking!

Which leads me to the behind the scenes saga here at the club. The internet age means that rumours whether malicious or not, about 'bickering behind the scenes, shareholders holding out for extra pennies and new plastic stadiums making millions for some' are just that....rumours. Often spread by those who profess to have the club's interest at heart they are damaging and distracting.

These are the facts about the current negotiations about this club's future. Talks between the shareholders' representatives and Tony Evans and his colleagues are amicable and on going. A proposal will be

put to the shareholders in the next couple of weeks on which they



will vote. Any change involving ownership or partnership in the football club needs a 75% majority to be implemented.

So far the existing shareholders have invested £564,000 in Stockport County over the last year. Under the proposals from SIML they will further invest a sum of £240,000 over the next two years making a total investment of over £800k by the 2015 group. Over the same period SIML will invest around the same amount. In addition we will receive a sponsorship package of around £100k from GT Law. There are no provisions in these proposals for the existing shareholders to receive payment for their loans and shareholdings.

Those are the facts. They should not distract us from the most important reason why we are all here tonight. We are all supporters of Stockport County and our club's success on the field means more to me than any future Board Room position. I will be voting for any proposal that guarantees that my grandson will have as many opportunities to cheer on 'the County' as I have had over the past 60 years.

Turkish Delight

ost folk go on holiday to wind down and spend countless hours by the pool drinking the local beer or heading to the beach for a dip in the sea, that much I could say was true as Team Turkey enjoyed themselves to the full in Oludeniz.

I met many people there fans of all clubs, the local sides and some British sides too, Rangers, Celtic, Hearts, Millwall, Spurs, Everton, Arsenal, Man Utd, Chelsea all with a great deal of passion for their clubs but the passion the Turkish people had for their clubs, Galatasaaray, Fenerbache and Besitkas, had to be seen and heard to be believed.

In fact it was hard not to offend some of the people we met when talking about football but I tried to keep the peace by buying both Fenerbache and Galatasaaray magazines even though I could not speak the language!

The main topic of conversation was the match fixing which had happened in Turkey this season, everyone had their ideas, Reggie who is a Galatasaaray fan, thought that Fenerbache would be deducted so many points that the club could face relegation!

We did not know what would happen.....until now.

On Thursday the Turkish side were due to join 32 elite European clubs in the draw for the Champions League group stage being held in Monaco. UEFA has announced league runners-up Trabzonspor (who had already been eliminated in the qualifying rounds) will take their place.

Fenerbahce were crowned league champions last term, piping Trabzonspor to the Super Lig title with a dramatic 4-3 win at Sivasspor on the final day.

The club have even asked to be relegated rather than be withdrawn from the Champions

League but that appeal has been thrown out leaving the Turkish champions with no Champions League money and an investigation which will rumble on leaving more than 30 players and officials in jail pending a trail, including Fenerbache chairman Aziz Yildirum.

It is a shame that innocent Fenerbache players, officials and fans will miss out on a year of European football because of a few greedy and corrupt men (allegedly)!

One of the most famous match fixing allegations that I can remember, following allegations by the Sun in 1994, saw Bruce Grobbelaar, John Fashanu and Hans Segers go on trial for match fixing. Grobbelaar was accused of

taking £40,000 to make sure Liverpool lost to Newcastle in 1993 but also accused of blowing his chance of adding £125,000 by making an 'accidental' save against Manchester United. The allegations against Segers and Fashanu

concerned a Wimbledon loss to Manchester United in the same year.

The jury was unable to reach a verdict at both trial and retrial and all three were acquitted. Grobbelaar won £85,000 libel damages against the Sun in 1999, but this was overturned two years later.

Fingers crossed that we have seen the last of it....it is hard enough trying to get a fixed odds coupon up at the best of times!

If its not match fixing then it is playing players that you shouldn't be playing, as the Sion v Celtic row rumbles on....

As with the rest of the Scottish clubs, Celtic ended up being knocked out of Europe by Sion on Thursday but could be given a reprieve if the Swiss club are kicked out because they signed players while they were under a transfer embargo, so their 3-1 win against the Glasgow side could count for nothing if FIFA or UEFA decide to throw them out.

It takes you back to the good old days of the eighties, 1985 when Celtic played Rapid Vienna and after losing the away leg 3-1, they came back to Celtic Park and beat the Austrian's fair and square 3-0....but then all hell broke loose as some mad man from the "Jungle" (the part of the stadium where the hardcore Celtic fans stood) decided to throw a half bottle on the pitch as Rapid complained about Tommy Burns' challenge on the goalkeeper.

The bottle came on, which was a stupid thing to do in the first place, and landed nowhere near the Rapid player but there he was rolling around the ground as if it had actually hit him! Celtic had to replay the match in Manchester....which they lost 1-0 and two Rapid players where attacked by so called Celtic fans as the Austrians headed for the final against Everton, which thankfully the Toffees won 3-1! A Quick Guide to Luton Town

The Hatters

Mixed Fortunes

The 2008/09 season was one never to be forgotten by anybody connected with Luton Town Football Club. Due to the problems created by a previous regime they were deducted 30 points and as a result were relegated from the Football League into the Blue Square Premier, interestingly had the deduction not taken place Luton would have finished 15th in the League Two table. The disappointment which must have been felt was lessened somewhat by winning the Johnstone's Paint Trophy, beating Scunthorpe United 3-2 after extra time in the final at Wembley in front of a crowd of 55,378. Having accounted for Brentford, Walsall, Colchester United and in the southern final, as they booked their place on the big day, goals from Chris Martin (on loan from Norwich City) and Tom Craddock helped take the game into extra time. Then Claude Gnakpa scored what was, with due apologies to the Iron and their fans, probably the most popular winning goal ever scored at the Stadium. The winning Luton team was: Brill, Asafu-Adjaye, Emanuel, Keane, Pilkington, Spillane, Nicholls, Hall, Martin, Craddock (Gnakpa), Jarvis (Parkin),

So Near Yet So Far

In the two season since, Luton have reached the promotion play-offs on each occasion but they have so far been unsuccessful. In 2010 they lost out to York City in the semi-final and last season, after beating Wrexham in the semis – first 3-0 away and then 2-1 at Kenilworth Road. They were victims at Manchester City's Eastlands (before it was renamed Etihad Stadium) as A.F.C Wimbledon completed a memorable nine-year rise to the Football League. The game ended goalless before the Dons won 4-3 on penalties. Going back two seasons, Tom Craddock scored 22 (1) goals and former Q.P.R. star Kevin Gallen 16 (2) as Luton finished runners-up to the promoted Stevenage and last season, when they finished third, Matthew Barnes-Homer was top marksman with 16 goals, Robbie Willmott scored 15 and Jason Walker 14.

Joe Payne's Supper 10

First formed in 1885, Luton were fonder members of the Southern League and then joined the Football League's Division Two in its sixth season in 1897. Three years later they failed to be re-elected after finishing next to bottom, it was in 1929/21 season, with the formation of Division Three (South), that Luton were re-admitted into the league. One of the most amazing feats during the Thirties was Joe



Payne's 10 goals in a 12-0 win over Bristol Rovers in April, 1936, Runners-up to Coventry City that season, Luton went one better 12 months later, Payne netting 55 of their 103 goals. Payne won one "Cap" for England in May, 1937, and scored twice in an 8-0 win over Finland in Helsinki. Other league

honors have been won as follows:-

League One Champions 2004/05 - Steve Howard led the way with 18 (4) goals and Ahmet Brkovic 15 (2); Division Two Champions 1981/82 – Runners-up to Birmingham City 1954/55 (Gordon Turner scored 32 goals) and to Middlesbrough in 73/74.

Division Three Runners-up to Leyton Orient 1969/70 and to Plymouth Argyle 2001/02;

Division Four Champions 1967/68 - Bruce Rioch - 24

Turner, who later appeared in the charts with 30 goals in 1956/57 and 33, 12 months later, holds the club record of 243 League goals overall.

F.A. XI Bonanza

In May-July, 1951, Luton's stalwart centre-half Syd Owen, who made 388 appearances for the club in league matches alone, was selected along with the likes of goalkeeper Sam Bartham, Reg Flewin, Jackie Sewell and Jimmy Hagan to go on an F.A XI tour of Australia. It proved something of a success, with 20 matches all won and 153 goals scored against 13. Owen scored twice himself in a 13-0 win against Central Queensland, which was one goal less than he managed for Luton in all those games. He was voted Footballer of the Year in 1958/59 season, right at the end of his career.

F.A. Cup Finalists


Luton reached the 1959 F.A Cup Final against Nottingham Forrest at Wembley, but were beaten 2-1 by a side which included Roy Dwight, Elton John's uncle. Dave Pacey scored the Luton goal and their side was: Baynham, McNally, Hawkes, Groves, Owen, Pacey, Bingham, Brown, Morton, Cummins, Gregory.



The Previous season, Luton had visited Edgeley Park to face County in a third round tie and our 3-0 victory must rank as one of our best-ever F.A Cup results. Bill Holden scored two of the goals and Arnold Jackson the other. The County team on that famous occasion was: Grieves, Betts, Webb, Murray, Franklin, Clempson, Finney, Moir, Holden, Jackson, and Davock.

Fairytale

The 1988 Littlewood's Cup final at Wembley had something of a fairytale finish. With 10 minutes remaining, and mighty Arsenal leading Luton by 2-1 the Gunners were awarded a penalty, but future County keeper Andy Dibble crowned a fantastic



performance by saving Nigel Winterburn's spot kick, Three minutes later Danny Wilson bundled in the equalizer and, with just 90 seconds left, Ashley Grimes left foot cross from the right was met by Brian Stein and the despairing dive of

John Lukic could not prevent the trophy heading to Bedfordshire. Brian Stein had actually scored first to give Luton a 1-0 lead at half time, only for Arsenal's Martin Hayes and Alan Smith to put their side ahead with two quick goals in the 71st and 74th minutes. The winning Luton side was; Dibble, Breacker, Johnson, Hill, Foster, Donaghy, Wilson, B.Stein, Harford, Preece, Black. Subs; Grimes, M.Stein. Arsenal must "Love" playing Luton in cup football, for in 1986 in an F.A Cup fifth round second replay Luton turned in a sparkling performance to deservedly win 3-0 with Mark Stein on fire, scoring one goal himself and forcing on OG.

First v Second

Following a narrow failure to win promotion in 1968/69 season, the Following campaign for Luton got away to a marvelous start with nine wins and four draws in their opening 13 games,

Unfortunately, this form was not maintained and Rochdale were among a chasing pack which was catching up fast. When the two sides met "Match of the Day" cameras along with a crowd of 15,876 were present to witness what was a first v second clash. Although Rochdale had much the better of the game, Luton scored twice in the final quarter-hour to take the points through John Collins and former County man Keith Allen. Luton later completed the "Double" and this time a promotion party followed as the Hatters finished Third Division runners-up to Orient.

Wonder Goals

Matthew Spring and Jean-Louis Valois struck wonder

goals from 25 and yards respectively as Luton thumped Darlington 5-2 on their way to again securing promotion at the end of the 2001/02 season.

Dean Crowe and a Kevin Nicholls penalty made up the nap hand which enabled Luton to go crazy for the second successive home match.



2-0 Massacre

Manager Joe Kinnear was right in his description of the game played at Kenilworth Road in February, 2002, when Luton met Plymouth in front of a full house of 9,585. Somehow Plymouth, with a mixture of good luck and inspired goalkeeping by Frenchman Romain Larrieu, denied the rampant Hatters until the 79th minute when Kevin Nicholls converted a penalty. Steve Howard healed the clinching second goal three minutes from time following Jean-Louis Valois corner.


Famous Ex Hatter

Of course, the list of famous ex Luton players is endless, topped obviously by Malcolm Macdonald, who progressed to Newcastle United and Arsenal, won 14 England "Caps" and at Wembley in April, 1975, scored all five goals in a 5-0 win against Cyprus. Two Luton goalkeepers, Ron Baynham and Bernard Streten, were also "Capped" by England, while Matthew Upson, Kerry Dixon, Mick Harford. Steve Forster, Ricky Hill, Colin Todd, Danny Clapton, Derek Kevan, who later joined County, and Jesse Pye all spent time at Luton.

Good Old Days

In the good old days, 1985 to be exact, when Luton were in the old First Division, they almost pulled off a plum signing. Frank McAvennie came down from Scotland originally to sign for Luton, but due to a problem with the contract he went to West Ham United instead and became a great favourite there.

next time how both events went in the next programme, anyway that's all for now, keep the faith, keep supporting Didi and the boys!



ast week I discovered one of the things I really miss about not being in the Football League any more - the Carling Cup.

The opportunity to take a break from the League and pit our wits against a Championship or Premiership side was always a welcome distraction.

But I was amazed to read OPR boss Neil Warnock's comments after his team was knocked out by Rochdale last week.

Warnock said he was pleased to be eliminated and added:

"I don't think people care about the competition. They should revamp the cup.

"I'm not disappointed to be out; the competition is not a priority for us. If I can't get motivated for the competition I can't blame the players if they can't."

Elsewhere Norwich boss Paul Lambert fielded a much-weakened side, making eleven changes, and they were duly dispatched 4-0 by MK Dons.

But maybe Lambert and Warnock have a point -QPR could only attract a 'crowd' of 4,775 to Loftus Road, whilst the average gate in the competition was less than 8,000.

So, if the Premiership no longer cares about the competition, how can it be revamped? Well, one solution would be to take all of the top teams out of it and put the Blue Square Premier sides in instead.

Just imagine if County were to draw Middlesbrough at home in a repeat of that famous 1997 semi final – I would envisage a gate of up to 6000 or even 7000 for a tie of that nature.



It would certainly reinvigorate the competition - the Championship clubs would take it very seriously, as they would have a genuine chance of some silverware at the end of it, whilst the BSP clubs would help to breathe new life into a competition that is currently dying on its backside.

Surely I am not the only one who is sad to watch this once great competition being treated with disdain by the so-called big clubs, who are clearly more worried about a testing Saturday afternoon at Wigan than a midweek trip to Walsall.



Something needs to be done, otherwise the Carling Cup risks becoming a competition populated by Premier League reserve sides, and deemed unworthy by the majority of their supporters, who can't be bothered to go and watch it.

Finally, I am delighted to say that my old commentary partner Phil Staley is back in town this evening - the former Macclesfield and Accrington boss has spent the last few years living out in Australia, but he is back in the UK for a few weeks and it will be wonderful to have him back behind the microphone once again. We often don't realise how important our friends are until they're no longer around.

hey say that many footballers prefer playing for their clubs rather than their countries these days. And I suppose, as a journalist, the most memorable games I have ever seen were in club competition.

The Champions League finals between Manchester United and Bayern Munich and Liverpool and AC Milan were the most dramatic football stories I've ever covered.

But the strangest, most unpleasant, build-up to matches have definitely involved England.



I'm in Sofia tonight for the Euro 2012 qualifier against Bulgaria and any trip to eastern Europe brings back memories of the game against Slovakia in Bratislava in October 2002.

The night before the game, we became aware of reports that there had been trouble in the city centre and it soon became apparent that an England fan had been shot in the main square.

He had been carried to the England team hotel and laid out in the lobby where his wounds were treated. I remember Rio Ferdinand saying the kerfuffle had woken a lot of the players from their sleep.

There were reports of more trouble and a group of us were told to try to find out what had happened. I felt like a proper ambulance-chaser that evening, travelling round from hospital to hospital, hearing England fans' tales of heavy-handed police treatment.

It was an unpleasant reminder of my time working on the Liverpool Daily Post and Echo, occasionally being asked to go round to the houses of bereaved families who had lost a loved one in an accident. I hated that part of the job, as most reporters do, and I can still see the haunted face of one mother, who opened the door to me the day after her son had died in a culvert under the M53 on the Wirral.

Anyway, I digress. Thankfully, no one died in Bratislava. There was more trouble at the match but England crowd problems gradually began to improve after that.

My other memory of a bizarre build-up to an international involved England's opening game of the 1998 World Cup against Tunisia in Marseilles.

England fans fought running battles with local youths for much of the night and the port looked like scene from the apocalypse with fires burning everywhere.

A group of us found ourselves at the Sofitel Hotel which had views of the port and there, in the lounge, was Graham Kelly, then the FA's chief executive,



staring out at Marseilles ablaze and puffing on a giant cigar.

It was a surreal image and of course hooliganism problems dogged England throughout that tournament and again at Euro 2000 in Belgium and Holland.

Fortunately, the general absence of hooliganism makes covering England is an altogether far more pleasant experience these days.

It would be nice if we could actually win a tournament some time soon. Still, one step at a time.

he World knows that Stockport is the Hatting Capital of the World. Luton came along some fifty years later and made straw toppers! Now let's get on to the football side of things!

County have had some good wins over their opponents-some by three goal margins, notably the 3-0 win in the 3rd round of the FA Cup in 57/58 season. Luton at the time were top of the old 1st Division! They finished a very creditable eighth that season. The Hatters finishing 9tin in the 3rd Division North. 1959/60 season Luton finished bottom and began a slow decline with relegations seeing them drop into the 4th division at the end of the 1964/65 season. So my first visit to Kenilworth Road was on May 7th 1965 when the 'Pretenders' beat us 2-0. The game at Edgeley Park though was a different story with Keith Allen netting a hat trick in

our 4-1 victory. The following season was of course our glorious Championship winning campaign. After an opening day draw at Barrow: 1-1 County then won five on the trot. The fifth victory being yet another three goal win over Luton. This time at Kenilworth Road 0-3. January 20th County got the double over them when Norman Sykes scored the winner. 1-0.



However, it wasn't long before Luton came to join us in the 3rd division. They won the 4th at the end of the 67/68 season. November 29th 1968 Luton came to Edgeley Park. This was when the Golden Vision Alex Young made his debut for County. Freddie Goodwin and Bill Atkins scored in our 2-0 victory. The return



game though

on April 25th saw us lose 4-1. Myself, Dav, and Dek Foden thumbed it there on the night! Got back home at four the next morning!

1969/70 was of course our dreadful relegation season. Luton went up! Then at the end of the 73/74 season Luton won promotion back to the 1st Division. However, they were out of their depth as they came back down again the following season. 81/82 once again saw them promoted back into Division 1.

I've enjoyed going to Kenilworth Road in the past as I am sure many Hatters fans have. Who can forget our great promotion season going there already up and seeing Kevin Cooper smash



.....Er, apart from one thing of course... the division we now find both ourselves in!









Who would voluntarily choose to be a Sunday League referee? Meet Mo Awill

hildhood is seemingly the defining factor in what position someone ends up spending the majority of their life playing the beautiful game in. The sprinter on the wing, the disciplinarian in the middle and the big lad will play at the back.

These are formulaic standards that characterize most people's earliest associations with football. For some people though there is a hole in this and it's referee shaped.

Apparently not fussed by the glory of participating in the match, those who choose to be referees selflessly blend into the background so that law and order can be maintained in sometimes physically passionate circumstances.

The role of referee is in general a thankless one, just ask Mark Clattenburg. One mistake puts your position in the spotlight and the countless correct and acutely well observed ones are immediately forgotten about. After all if a referee has a good game, it isn't back page news.

If a player makes a mistake though they're are able to hide behind the potential successes of their teammates, but a referee has no such safety, as if he makes a mistake he's alone, often in a sea of disagreeing fans and players.

Thankfully some people are seemingly gluttons for punishment and are willing to accept these pitfalls and voluntarily choose to oversee games of all levels, but why? Mo Awill is one such person.

He isn't though a Premier League referee, or even a referee in a professional division, he has the most thankless task in football. He's a referee in London's Southern Sunday Football League.

To make matters worse, when I go to see him it's a bleak and cold winter's day, pouring down with rain and it's prematurely dark considering it's only a little after midday.

Awill, like the players revels in these conditions and his position on the pitch, but when after the game I ask why, it causes him to pause for a moment.

He forces a smile and stares back at the pitch on which he's just officiated, which is only a glass of water short of a marsh and pauses, mulling over the question in his head and seemingly questioning why in actual fact he has dragged himself out on such a cold and wet winters Sunday.

Eventually he forces a stunted chuckle of realisation and says "well ... I mean it is my job these guys they need a referee, someone who has to be impartial. For me personally I obviously want to go a long way in this, so, I mean it is a hobby as well as a job".

The same as any player, Awill is clearly inspirational in his hobby and dreams of progressing through the ranks, but even at this level of football he is subject to criticism.

Despite overseeing the game in a clear, fair and authoritative manner, he was seemingly the punching





bag for player's frustrations, even when there was little to complain about.

The standard phrase that would echo around the vast playing field of Clapham Common was "******" hell ref" but this is seemingly a

part of the game that Awill has accepted and blanked from his hearing for the overall benefit of the two teams and for the personal enjoyment of his hobby, as he refused to let the abuse get to him.

"Well as long as it's not directed directly at me then I don't mind. It is a game of football and emotions are running high, so we [referees] just get on with it and be adults about it."

This 'as seen on TV' abuse of the ref is such a part of the game now that he even gauges a successful game by the lack of abuse he is subject to and not the quality of his officiating.

So when I ask him if making a good decision gives him a buzz, I'm surprised by the answer. "No as long as it's a quiet game really. As long as I'm not getting any personal abuse then I guess I'm doing a really good job".

This isn't to say that all referees don't revel in the adrenaline of refereeing, as Martin Hansson, now infamous for missing Thierry Henry's handball in Ireland's decisive second-leg qualifying game for the 2010 World Cup, said quite the opposite.

When asked how he feels after a match in Mattias Löw's fascinating documentary Rättskiparen (The Referee) he exclaimed "I feel more joy than when I played myself and won".

Hansson is equally aware of the abuse that referees are subject to from fans and the media, but he's seemingly a wall of professionalism and simply says in response to how it affects him "I get energized and want to improve my game".

When I ask Awill about whether he enjoys his hobby, even in the face of such adversity and unflinching criticism from players, I'm slightly taken aback by his unquestioning assertiveness.

"Absolutely" he said without hesitation "I think that's what makes a better referee really" and thankfully so, as without him and many more similar gluttons for punishment, football as we know it simply wouldn't exist.

Described as "a player with plenty of bustle" he helped County back into Division Two and missed a handful of games over the next 3 and a half seasons. 254

Joe Reid - VOTE HOF1940b

Joe is another man born in the North East but joined County from Manchester City in the summer of 1920. He made the left back slot his own until December 1924 when Richardson switched sides due to the arrival of Billy Bocking. In addition to his 140 plus games Joe managed to notch one goal, at Rochdale in 1921. 242

Billy Newton - VOTE HOF1940c

A club stalwart whose name can be mentioned alongside Trevor Porteous and Jimmy Stevenson. Billy's playing career might not have been the longest – chalking up some 150 league appearances between 1927 and 1931 – but he returned to the club in September 1932 as a coach and stayed until the start of 1970s. 333

Albert Waterall - VOTE HOF1940d

Albert tops the appearance charts for the 20s with 217 games, although having played for the club since 1913 his overall total is much higher. He came to Edgeley Park from Notts County and went on to play for a club record 13 years. A major contribution to this longevity was his versatility, playing in a number of positions both forward and defence. He left in the summer of 1926 as the club's then highest appearance maker to date. 206

Jack Wilson - VOTE HOF1940e

Hailing from Leadgate in County Durham Jack had played locally until May 1922 when County brought him to the North West. Jack was to put in a four season stint with County whilst they stayed in Division Two. He contributed 12 goals from inside left but played more games at left half, his 20s Team of the Decade position. 263

Ben Boardman - VOTE HOF1940f

In a 7 year spell at Edgeley Park Benny fell just short of 200 appearances as County challenged continuously for promotion from the Northern section. Boardman was regarded as a tricky but versatile winger as he also featured inside. In one spell of 5 games around the New Year of 1927 he scored 7 goals from inside-right. County sold him to Manchester City in the summer of 1931, 290

Harry Burgess - VOTE HOF1940g

Joining from Sandbach Ramblers in 1925, this youngster immediately impressed and the scouts were watching him virtually from day one. With 71 goals he was top scorer for the club in the 20s. After joining top flight Sheffield Wednesday in 1929 Harry went on to play at the top level with the Owls and Chelsea until the war. Sixteen months after leaving County he made the first of 4 England appearances, scoring 4 goals in the process. 314

Frank Newton

Having scored 93 goals in 101 games Frank ranks alongside Kevin Francis as one of the most consistent scorers for the club over a prolonged period. He started as understudy to Joe Smith, so ONLY scored 18 goals in his first full season. His chance to be first choice came from 1929 and he responded with a goal tally of 38 and 37. He continued his scoring at Fulham and Reading before an injury in a Friendly game ended his career. 341

Joe Smith - VOTE HOF1940h

Probably the biggest attraction ever signed by County – Joe drew 22,500 to Edgeley for his debut game; around 18,000 more than the previous home game two weeks earlier. County were to be deducted points for playing him despite instructions not to as his registration was not in order. The former England international and twice FA Cup winner certainly repaid the cost of his signing. He was the first to score 5 in a League match and in his first full season scored a record 38 League goals. 328

Horace Fielding - VOTE HOF1940i

With 74 appearances in the 20s Fielding claims the outside left slot. He had joined from Mossley early in the 1926-27 season but was a bit part player for the next two seasons, when he had injury problems. Eleven goals in his first season as a regular saw him make his mark and after another impressive season helping County to a second consecutive runner-up spot it was top flight Grimsby who acted to sign him for a substantial fee. 326

Selected from the men who played the most games and scored the most goals in competitive matches between 1 January 1920 and 31 December 1929. Includes at least the top 7 appearance makers and top 3 goal scorers. Players qualify for only one Team of the Decade.

A trip to South Wales recently gave Des Hinks the chance to make the SCAN presentation to one of the favourite players of the club's 1960's supporters.

Winger Len Allchurch may have been nearly 32 when he joined County in 1965 but he went on to play his part in the Go Go Go revival of the club. Len had been playing League football since October 1951 and had even played 4 first division games in the 1965-66 season before moving to County in October for a club record fee. The Welshman made an immediate impact by scoring after 16 minutes of his debut.

Each summer there were doubts about Len resigning but he stayed long enough to chalk up his 500th League game whilst at the club and was voted player of the year in 1968-69. Len's memory is not what it was but he was delighted to receive the memento of his time at County from the Supporters of the Club.


The pride of a club that has, quite frankly, been tarnished by recent seasons.

ho the sponsors pick for Man of the Match (and then who Rob Clare actually ends up giving the champagne to) is always an eagarly awaited moment for me in the game. I always find it interesting to hear whether or not others have seen the same things as myself and Jon Keighren in the press box.

On Monday it went to Danniel O'Donnell, but you sense the accolade could have easily gone to his central defensive partner Carl Piergianni.

He put a stunning performance in, together with O'Donnell, limiting Mansfield to pot shots around the County penalty box. The young defender was also honest enough after the game to admit his part in the Stags goal. "Little things went wrong for us in the end, I didn't track the runner for the goal. We had cancelled them out and they didn't have many chances, again we could have scored but we've just got to get over it now and look forward to Friday night against Luton."

Piergianni's partnership with O'Donnell at the back has come unexpectedly, with the senior player seizeing his chance after coming on for the injuried Nabil Bounab against Kettering, but it's certainly one bearing fruit for the Hatters. Carl says he's enjoying playing next to Danny. "He's a really good player and I'm learning a lot quickly from him. We're getting better and better together by the game."

The nineteen year old came to Edgeley Park as a result of Peterborough United's success last season. Carl knew it would be difficult to make an impact on the team after the club's promotion. "After they went up to the Championship I wasn't going to be involved getting games there. I wanted to go somewhere that I could play and have more of a chance. Didi Hamann said that he was interested and so I came down from a trial and things went from there".

Even with the Manager's willingless to use his entire squad and keep players fresh during the tough start to the season, Piergianni has been an ever present in the side. But Carl says he's taking nothing for granted, "I've still got to earn my place and keep playing well, but it's good for me to get games, more experience and getting better".

After playing twenty one times for Altrincham last season while out on loan, County's Number 22 has valuable experience of life in the Blue Square Premier. But it's clear that Carl feels he has taken a big step up joining the Hatters. "I'm with a much bigger, better club this year and hopefully we'll do better than what Altrincham managed last year. I didn't play against Luton, but it'll be nice to face them. It's a local place to where I lived and it'll be a big game, but we'll be up for it though and come back even stronger. I think we've got a great chance to win it".




The vaccine is free to anyone regarded as "at risk" which includes people aged 65 and over as well as all pregnant women.

It's also free to people who have

- · diabetes
- a chest problem or breathing difficulties (such as asthma, bronchitis or emphysema)
- · a heart problem,
- · kidney disease or liver disease







- a low immune system due to disease (such as cystic fibrosis or Crohn's disease) or treatment (such as cancer treatment)
- had a stroke
- a problem with the spleen (such as sickle cell disease) or if the spleen has been removed

You should also get your free the vaccine if you live in a residential or nursing home, or if you are the main carer of an older or disabled person.

The vaccine is available from your GP from October. The quicker you get your jab the sooner you'll be protected. Don't be complacent or wait until there is a flu outbreak this winter - book an appointment as soon as possible.

If you're not at risk but you know someone who is, please encourage them to get the flu jab – it may just save their life.

The Ground

Newport Stadium, known locally as Spytty Park, is an athletics stadium that has served as Newport County's home since the mid-'90s. This means that a running track encircles the pitch. However, thankfully for those who remember the views at Brighton's Withdean and Rotherham's Don Valley temporary homes, at Newport the stands at either end of the ground are placed directly behind the goals & are taken down for the athletics season, then put back up when football comes back around. Away fans were previously housed in the 1,197 capacity Spytty Road End, but are now allocated the smaller, 949-seater Cricket Club End at the other end of the ground. There's food and toilets in the corner of the ground where away fans enter. To the left-hand side of the away end is The Shed, a covered terrace where the home fans gather & plenty of banter can be had.

Food & Drink

Unfortunately, the club house at the ground isn't open to away supporters when bigger clubs are in town. Visitors can use the cricket clubhouse located on the other side of the cricket field behind the away end. Otherwise, with the ground being located by an industrial estate, there's little else to choose from nearby. There's plenty of places in the city centre, but it's a good 45-minute walk away and a taxi will set you back £7 or so.

Parking

The great news for those travelling by car is that there is plenty of parking at the ground, and what's more, it's free to park. There's the main car park, located behind The Shed terrace, which is the first car park on your left as you approach from Langland Way; and a little further on is a smaller car park just next to the Velodrome. However, as access is only via one road, please bear in mind that it can get very busy after the games.

The Ground

Construction on Telford's New Bucks Head stadium began in 2000 and finished three years later. Originally having a capacity of 6,300, this has been reduced to around 5,600. It's an impressive little ground, with a modern main stand on one side and a thin, uncovered terrace on the other, and identical covered terraces behind each goal. One of these terraces, the Frank Nagington Stand at the southern end of the ground, houses up to 1,480 away supporters. Bitter, lager & cider are available from the concourse, as well as plenty of hot food. Entry is via turnstiles I and J. Please note that a very limited amount of seating is available, but is restricted to those with limited mobility or very young children. Please consult a steward as soon as you enter through the turnstiles. Disabled supporters should go the assisted entry gate in the north west corner of the ground and meet the ground safety team.

Food & Drink

As mentioned, alcohol & hot food are sold in the away stand. A range of pies, sausage rolls and more is on offer. There's a club bar at the ground, behind the home terrace, but it's fairly small and although away fans are normally welcome, access is restricted if there's a decent-sized crowd. There is a bar called the Dugout Bar at the Whitehouse Hotel right next to the ground, although understandably this can also get very busy. Otherwise there's the Cock Hotel and The Swan, both around five minutes walk down the main road going away from Telford/toward Shrewsbury, and a large number of pubs in central Wellington, near the train station.

Parking

There's a car park at the ground, which has 85 spaces available for fans at a first-come, first-served basis - priced at £2. Parking is also at the Telford College of Arts & Technology (TCAT), which is located on the opposite side of Heybridge Road next to the ground, for £3. Although there is a car park behind the Sir Stephen Roberts (Main) Stand, this is for the Whitehouse Hotel.
