IT MAY be too early to talk about who will lift the Blue square Bet Premier title in May, but Gary Brabin's Luton certainly produced a champions' performance to grind out victory over a resolute Lincoln.

The Hatters played for over an hour with ten men and weathered a second-half storm to grab an 84th minute winner as Stuart Fleetwood gave the Imps the elbow once again.

The £40,000 deadline day signing from Hereford scored three times against Lincoln last season, knocking them out of the FA Cup in the process.

And the 25-year-old sunk the sorry Imps once more to continue Luton's unbeaten start to the season and pile more pressure on underfire Lincoln manager Steve Tilson, who have won only once in thier last 24 matches either side of relegation from the Football League.

In contrast, this third successive clean sheet sees unbeaten Luton climb ahead of Wrexham and up to second in the table, and Hatters boss Brabin was delighted with the spirit of his players.

"It's a really fantastic win," Brabin said. "Lincoln are no mugs and we knew they were a wounded animal, we didn't start well.

"When we went down to 10 men, we knew it was going to be a long day but we didn't want to hide behind the sending off because we weren't good enough.

"We did things right in the second half and I knew we always had a goal in us."

Fleetwood was causing the Lincoln defence all sorts of problems, but then Dean Beckwith made Luton's day much harder after 23
