"The decision changed the game and I'm not convinced that the ref got it right," said Edinburgh.

"Leading up to that, I believe he lost the game. The game was too big for him with the crowd getting on his back and I think that influenced his decision, so he's played a big part in us losing today.

"We had hit the crossbar and had a good chance, but once we went behind with 10 men it was always going to be difficult."
