





Dream on.






Review

Happy new year, though some of us couldn't believe how happy it would be on new years day, even as it was happening. I still expect to find I drank myself into a coma on new years eve, and dreamt the whole thing up, and then re-awake to find we got battered instead...

Much had been made of the form table, mainly by me, and the internetz topic for Nuneatin fans after we had battled to a credible 1-1 draw at De Mont on boxing day was how had a team at the bottom of the form table 'out battled' their big time play off outfit? There were some who even used it as an excuse not to go to their own home game on new years day. Seriously!

Off we trudged then on New years day, over the A5, deep into bandit country, over to the Stade de Biscuit Tin, for the return leg, fully expecting payback for daring to 'get a draw'. 45 seconds. 45 SECONDS. That's all it took before we completely ripped up the form table. From the kick off the ball's played down the right crossed to the near post, flicked on by Danny Newton and there is Richard Lavery completely unmarked in the centre of goal to head into an empty net. Celebrations of FA Cup winning proportions followed. A player who had been released by the Tin only a couple of months earlier, and who still lives in Nuneatin, scoring in front of their end. He best not go shopping for a couple of weeks. The Tin clearly shell shocked were 2-0 down before the quarter hour, Tom Byrne did excellent down the left dribbling the ball around their defence all on his own, before playing it back to Andy Gooding on the edge of the area to place it perfectly out of the reach of the keeper into the far corner of the goal. Now, we have not exactly had the best record lately in games where we go 2-0 early on, so we were more than relived when Tin capitulated only 20 minutes in and conceded another.





Sam Belcher, born in Nuneatin, a fan who had watched his local team from the terraces, a player who had played for Hinckley on loan whilst he was at Wycombe and impressed that much that his local team signed him when he was released from his professional

contract. The same player who was then dumped by his local team after 'not impressing' their manager, and returned to Hinckley and returned to his best. Sam Belcher scored the third with a 25 yard power drive through the hands of the keeper and I think he celebrated more than the fans did, clearly being very happy to prove a point.

3-0 at half time, and this match was far from over. A goal back for Tin in the first minute of the second half had us thinking "we couldn't let a 3 goal lead slip, could we?" though our pessimistic ways were calmed on the hour when we scored our fourth. FOUR! Andre Gray with his back to goal 12 yards out, turns and shoots between the legs of the defender and past the stranded keeper who didn't even see it. Belcher would come back to haunt the club that let him go by scoring the fifth. FIVE! Byrne again had the Tin defence all over the place and this time he was bundled to the ground for a clear penalty. Not normally a penalty taker, Belcher smashed the ball high and straight into the roof of the net giving the keeper no chance, sending the home fans surging towards the exits with 20 minutes of the match still to go. A bit more than sneaking out, more abandoning de Stade en mass. Their highest crowd of the season, morphed into their lowest crowd of the season in a couple of minutes. A late consolation goal for the Tin couldn't take the gloss off a great derby win, and was the first time since 1928 we had scored 5 goals against any side from Nuneatin. Their fans were right to stay away.

A great win away no doubting, but if we didn't back it up with a good result in the following game against Eastwood then it would all count for nothing. The Clint are having a dreadful season both on and off the pitch, with financial difficulties that we all know about all too well. On the pitch they are worse than us and with Blyth are beginning to get left adrift at the bottom. Obviously this was a must win game for us and would give us a great boost with back to back wins, something that's not happened often this season. To add some extra entertainment Ian Deakin was back in goal for Eastwood, last seen playing for us at Filbert Street where he joyfully let Tom Byrne whack 3 goals past him for Quorndon. Obviously Tom Byrne plays for us now and Deakin was let go after that match. Eventually we had a good 4-0 home win, our highest home league victory of the season, but it was 1-0 for a long time and Deakin was doing his best to keep it that way. I joked before the match we shouldn't try to score 30 yard screamers as he would save them, but instead try and bobble the ball along the floor from 8 yards as he would dive over them. Having taken an early lead we all thought "hello, could be a big score here", but of course we tried the 30 yard thunderbolt stuff didn't we, and as you guessed he kept pulling off save after save. Clint had nothing to offer themselves, and Denham Hinds had probably his easiest game in goal since he's been at the club. So it was just a case of how many we would score and for a long while it seemed like going to be just the one. Incredibly it was the goal scoring 'prowess' of Paul Lister that finished off Eastwood. The defender, who first signed for the club in July 2009 and has played 72 games in that time, had never scored a goal for Hinckley in that time. Never. So the look of amazement on Lister's face when he volleyed home in the 88th minute was priceless. He suddenly realised he didn't have any kind of goal celebration planned and just dived to the floor. Who knows what he was thinking two minutes later when he scored his second goal? 72 games with nothing and then two goals in two minutes! And he still didn't get man of the match...

Shhhhhh, don't say it too loud, but it's FA Trophy day today. You know, the one that no body cares about but don't really like to say it out loud, in case the FA get upset. I care. I care a lot. Hinckley United tasted defeat at home for the first time since 3rd December as they were comprehensively beaten by a very well organised Altrincham side.

A spell of four goals in 17 minutes from Adrian Hawes, James Lawrie, the league's top scorer Damien Reeves and Jack Redshaw either side of half time proved to be Hinckley's undoing, Danny Newton scoring a consolation for the Knitters after 64 minutes.

Both sides started very slowly, Altrincham slowly but surely got into the game, but Hinckley never did, and the first goal came just 3 minutes before half time. A left wing corner found the unmarked Hawes, who headed in from 6 yards. And Hinckley were to concede another goal just two minutes before the hour mark. A wonderful through ball found Reeves, who could have taken the chance himself with just Denham Hinds to beat, but he unselfishly squared to the diminutive Redshaw who tapped home an easier chance than Reeves!

Hinckley then won a free kick on the edge of the box just after the hour mark through Craig Farrell's

good hold up play. Danny Newton took the free kick left footed, and it was deflected past the wrong footed Stuart Coburn.

That could have sparked a late rally from Hinckley, but their only chance came with 15 minutes remaining, when a low cross found Farrell at the back post. His shot was destined for the bottom corner when it was well saved by Coburn, confirming the result.

Altrincham also hit the post twice in the dying minutes, saving Hinckley from an embarrassing defeat, but even so this poor performance came as a shock after two good ones in their start to 2012.

History

Luton Town Football Club was formed on 11 April 1885, the product of a merger of the two leading local teams, Luton Town Wanderers and Excelsior.[6][7] Initially based at Excelsior's Dallow Lane ground,[7] the club moved to Dunstable Road in 1897.[8] In 1890, the club began making payments to certain individual players. The following year, Luton became the first club in southern England to be fully

The club was a founder member of the Southern Football League in the 1894–95 season and finished as runners-up in its first two seasons. It then left to help form the United League and came second in that league's inaugural season before joining The Football League for 1897-98.[5] The club continued to enter a team to the United League for two more seasons, and won the title in 1897-98.[5][10] Poor attendance, high wages, and the high travel and accommodation costs that resulted from Luton's distance from the northern heartlands of The Football League crippled the club financially,[10] and made it too expensive to compete in that league.[10] A return to the regionally organised Southern League was therefore arranged for the 1900-01 season.[5]

Eight years after arriving at Dunstable Road, Luton moved again, settling at their current ground, Kenilworth Road, in 1905.[9] Captain and left winger Bob Hawkes became Luton's first international player when he was picked to play for England against Ireland on 16 February 1907.[11] A poor 1911-12 season saw Luton relegated to the Southern League's Second Division, but the club managed to win promotion back two years later.[5][12] When war broke out, the schedule was reduced to a series of friendlies, but Luton took part in The London Combination for 1915-16.[13][14] A key player of the period was Ernie Simms, a forward, Simms was wounded while serving in Italy in the First World War,[12] [14] but returned to score 40 goals during the following

1936: Joe Payne (white shirt, left) scores one of his recordbreaking 10 goals in one matchThe Luton side first played in the white and black colours which the club has retained for much of its history during the 1920-21 season, when they rejoined The Football League;[15] until then, the players had worn sky blue shirts with white shorts and navy socks.[16] Such was the quality of Luton's team at this time that despite playing in the third tier, a fixture between Ireland and England at Windsor Park on 22 October 1921 saw three Luton players on the pitch - Louis Bookman and Allan Mathieson for Ireland, and club top goalscorer Simms for England.[17][18] However, after Luton finished fourth in the division, the squad was broken up as Simms, Bookman and Mathieson joined South Shields, Port Vale and Exeter City respectively.[18][19] Luton stayed in the Third Division South until 1936–37, when the team finished top and won promotion to the Second Division. at that time the second tier of English football.[20] During the promotion season, striker Joe Payne scored 55 goals in 39 games; during the previous season he had scored 10 in one match against Bristol Rovers, which remains a Football League record today.[21]

During the early 1950s, one of Luton's greatest sides[22] emerged under manager Dally Duncan,[23] The team included Gordon Turner, who went on to become Luton's alltime top goalscorer,[24] Bob Morton, who holds the record for

the most club appearances, [25] and Syd Owen, an England international.[26] During this period, Luton sides also featured two England international goalkeepers, Ron Baynham and Bernard Streten,[27][28] as well as Irish internationals Seamus Dunne, [29] Tom Aherne and George Cummins, [30][3 team reached the top flight for the first time in 1955-56, after finishing the season in second place behind Birmingham City on goal average.[32] A few years of success followed including an FA Cup Final appearance against Nottingham Forest in 1958-59;[33] at the end of the season, Owen was voted FWA Footballer of the Year.[34] However, the club was relegated the following season, and, by 1964-65, was playing in the fourth tier [35]

In yo-yo club fashion, Luton were to return. A team including Bruce Rioch, John Moore and Graham French won the Fourth Division championship in 1967-68 under the leadership of former player Allan Brown;[5] two years later Malcolm Macdonald's goals helped them to another promotion,[36] while comedian Eric Morecambe became a director of the club.[36] Luton Town won promotion back to the First Division in 1973-74, but were relegated the following season by a solitary point.[5][37] Former player David Pleat was made manager in 1978, and by 1982-83 the team was back in the top flight.[5] On the last day of the club's first season back in the top tier, the side narrowly escaped relegation: playing Manchester City at Maine Road, Luton needed to win to stay up, while City could escape with a draw.[38] A late winner by Yugoslav Raddy Antić saved the team and prompted Pleat to dance across the pitch performing a "jig of joy",[38] an image that has become iconic.[39] The club achieved its highest ever league position, seventh, in 1986-87,[40] and won the League Cup a year later with a 3-2 win over Arsenal. With ten minutes left on the clock and Arsenal 2-1 ahead, a penalty save from stand-in goalkeeper Andy Dibble sparked a late Luton rally: Danny Wilson equalised, before Brian Stein scored the winner with the last kick of the match.[5][4] [42] The club reached the League Cup Final once more in 1988-89, but lost 3-1 to Nottingham Forest.[5]

Luton Town players and staff celebrate winning the Football League Trophy in 2009The club was relegated from the top division at the end of the 1991-92 season,[5] and sank to the third tier four years later.[5][43] Luton stayed in the third-tier Second Division until relegation at the end of the 2000-01 season.[44] Under the management of Joe Kinnear, who had arrived halfway through the previous season, [45] the team won promotion from the fourth tier at the first attempt. [5] "Controversial" [46] owner John Gurney unsettled the club in 2003,[46] terminating Kinnear's contract on his arrival in May;[46][47] Gurney replaced Kinnear with Mike Newell before leaving Luton as the club entered administration. [46][48] Newell's team finished as champions of the third-tier Football League One in 2004-05.[5][49] While Newell's place was taken by first Kevin Blackwell and later former player Mick Harford,[50][51] the team was then relegated twice in a row, starting in 2006-07, and spent the latter part of the 2007-08 season in administration, thus incurring a ten-point deduction from that season's total.[5][52] The club then had a total of 30 points docked from its 2008-09 record by The Football Association and The Football League for various financial irregularities. [53] These deductions proved to be too large an obstacle to overcome,[54] but Luton came from behind in the final of the Football League Trophy to win the competition for the first time.[55] Relegation meant that 2009-10 saw Luton playing in the Conference National, a competition which the club had never before contested, and in which, as of the 2011-12 season, they remain.

The Squad

GOALKEEPERS

Mark Tyler

Hugely experienced goalkeeper who signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in June 2009 to become Mick Harford's fifth signing of the summer following his release from Peterborough United.

Mark made 483 appearances in 15 years at London Road and was rewarded for his loyalty with a testimonial against Liverpool in 2007.

After falling down the pecking order at Posh he found first team opportunities hard to come by and in 2008/09 he was loaned out to League 2 Bury where he made 11 appearances for the Shakers.

A former England Youth international, Tyler was handed the number one shirt by the Hatters boss who admitted he'd failed in an attempt to sign the stopper the previous summer.

After a hugely successful two years between the sticks at Kenilworth Road, Mark signed a new contract in the summer

Kevin Pilkington

Vastly experienced goalkeeper who joined the Hatters in May 2010 after his release from Notts County.

Pilkington began his career with Manchester United playing six times in the Premier League under Sir Alex Ferguson.

During his six years at Old Trafford Pilkington enjoyed loan spells at Rochdale, Rotherham and Celtic before a two-year stay at Port Vale.

After 23 league appearances for the Valiants, he was on the move once more, with Aberystwyth Town and Wigan Athletic his next two ports of call.

However, he found stability at his next club, Mansfield, joining the Stags in 2000 and went onto feature 167 times in league action over the next five years.

In 2005 the Hitchin-born stopper made the short hop down the M1 to sign for Notts County and another five year stay resulted in him making 141 appearances at Meadow Lane.

However, Notts began flashing the cash at the start of the 2009/10 campaign with goalkeeper Kasper Schmeichel one of many high-profile arrivals.

Frozen out of the County team, and with Mark Tyler injured, Pilkington joined the Hatters on-loan in November and went onto make 11 appearance between the sticks whilst at Kenilworth Road before injury curtailed his stay.

But when the Magpies released him in the summer of 2010, Money was quick to snap up the veteran permanently, giving the Town the choice of two excellent goalkeepers.

DEFENDERS

George Pilkington

Highly experienced defender who joined the club on a free transfer in August 2008. Having began his career as an Everton trainee, Pilkington joined Port Vale in June 2003, after a loan spell at Exeter City. Having started 223 league games for the Valiants, the highly-regarded defender has been named Player of the Year twice.

Injury frustrated the centre-half in his first season at Kenilworth Road in 2008/09 but he still managed to pick-up a Johnstone's Paint Trophy winners' medal.

Pilkington hit the headlines for his goalscoring exploits in the Town's first season in the Conference, twice scoring braces in early season victories over Mansfield and Crawley.

His impeccable form on the pitch led to him winning a string of end-of-season awards and underlined his loyalty to the Hatters by signing a new contract at the end of the 2009/10

Dan Gleeson

Tall and athletic defender, primarily a right-back, Gleeson signed for the Hatters in the summer of 2010 from his home town club Cambridge United.

A product of the U's academy, Gleeson made his debut at 18 and soon became a regular at the Abbey Stadium making 61 league appearances before Notts County snapped up his signature in 2006.

Gleeson only lasted a season at Meadow Lane, featuring 17 times before he was back at the Abbey, firstly on-loan before resigning permanently in 2007.

Recognised as one of the best right-backs outside the Football League, Gleeson's performances have seen him rewarded with seven England C caps.

Greg Taylor

Left-back signed from Darlington in November 2011 who made his Town debut in the 1-1 draw at Cambridge United. Started his career as a junior with Northampton before he signed for Kettering Town.

He then joined Darlo, linking up with boss Mark Cooper at the Darlington Arena.

Ed Asafu-Adjaye

Capable of playing in any position across defence, Asafu-Adjaye has made significant progress through the Club's

After a loan spell with non-league side Walton & Hersham, he made the breakthrough into the first team under former boss Mike Newell, when the Club was stretched to the limits through injury and suspension.

Although the youngster was an unused sub for three matches, Youth Coach Marvin Johnson gave Ed a glowing reference to incoming boss Kevin Blackwell, who gave him a one-year contract.

However with first team opportunities limited, Ed went onloan to Salisbury City where he earned rave reviews and when Mick Harford arrived as Manager at Kenilworth Road one of the first things he did was recall the young defender. Making his full debut in March 2008 at Kenilworth Road against Crewe Alexandra he has gone from strength to strength and was part of the Town team that won the Johnstone's Paint Trophy at Wembley in 2009.

Shane Blackett

Luton-born Shane became Mick Harford's sixth summer signing of 2009 after penning a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road.

Equally adept at centre-back or at left-back, Shane began his career with Dunstable Town before a switch to Arlesey Town in 2003

His form with the United Counties side alerted the attentions of Dagenham & Redbridge who signed the 6ft 3in defender in May 2004.

He made 83 appearances during his time at Victoria Road and helped the Daggers win the Conference title and earn promotion to the Football League in 2006/07.

His reputation as a pacey defender alerted the attention of Peterborough who snapped him up with Dagenham teammate Craig Mackail-Smith in January 2007. He went on to make 38 appearances during his time at London Road.

Alex Lacev

Up-and-coming centre-half who made his first team debut as a 17-year-old in the FA Trophy first round tie against Welling, earning the man-of-the-match award for an excellent performance.

Signed a professional contract to remain at Kenilworth Road until the end of the 2011/12 season.

Dean Beckwith

Centre-back Beckwith became the Hatters' second signing of the summer of 2011 following his release from League 2 side Northampton Town.

The 27-year-old, who signed a two-year deal at Kenilworth Road, was a key member of the Cobblers' squad in 2010/11 which reached the fourth round of the League Cup following wins over Brighton, Reading and Liverpool.

The commanding 6ft 3in defender has experienced promotion from the Blue Square Bet Premier before having been part of the Hereford United side that won the Play-Off final against Halifax Town in 2008.

With almost 250 senior appearances to his name after starting his career as a junior at Gillingham, the centre-half enjoyed his best goalscoring season last season scoring

The defender turned down offers from a number of Football League clubs but was delighted to agree terms to bolster the Hatters' defensive options.

Curtis Osano

Lightening quick attacking defender who signed a six-month contract at Kenilworth Road following his departure from Rushden & Diamonds in July 2011.

Able to play anywhere along the backline, the strong Kenyan-born defender began his career at Reading as a voungster.

He failed to make an appearance with the Royals but enjoyed loan spells at Aldershot, Woking and Rushden before making the move to Nene Park permanent in 2008, going onto make over 150 appearances for the Northamptonshire club.

Janos Kovacs

Hungarian defender who signed on-loan for his second spell at the club in September 2011. Formerly with Chesterfield and Lincoln, Kovacs first signed in January 2010 before signing for Hereford United in the summer of that year.

Signed a 18-month contract in January 2012.

MIDFIELDERS

Robbie Willmott

Harlow-born winger who penned an 18-month contract with the Hatters in January 2011 after hitting 10 goals for Cambridge United.

Capable of playing on either wing or behind the front two, Willmott came through the ranks at the Abbey Stadium and wowed the home faithful with his pace, dribbling, close control and eye for goal.

His performances for the U's' youth team saw him break into the senior squad, making his debut as a 17-year-old in

After signing his first professional contract two months later, the midfielder was mainly used as an impact substitute during 2007/08 but continued to impress: eight goals in his first season as a pro followed in 2008/09 while his level of performance and his assist tally soared last season as the U's finished in mid-table

But the youngster's talents during this campaign have really come to fore. Weighing in with 10 goals and eight assists from just 29 starts for Martin Ling's side, Willmott's turn of foot and delivery from set-pieces has also become a highly sought-after commodity.

Jake Howells

The young winger, who can also play at left-back or in central midfield, came through the ranks at Kenilworth Road and made his first team debut as a second half substitute in May 2008. He made his full debut in the Hatters colours away at Bradford City in October 2008.

After making 36 appearances for the Hatters in the 2008/09 the England C international was rewarded for his efforts with a professional contract in May.

In his first season as a pro, Howells made huge strides with impressive performances on the left-side of midfield, ending the 2009/10 campaign with six goals, including his first senior goal in the incredible 4-3 win over Cambridge in September

Godfrey Poku

Tenacious defensive midfielder who signed together with JJ O'Donnell from Blue Square South outfit St Albans City in January 2010 on an 18-month contract.

A tough-tackling and no-nonsense midfielder, the Town beat off competition from several Football League clubs for his

He featured and impressed in the Hatters' reserves in 2009/10 and was an unused substitutes in the Blue Square Premier but made his debut as a substitute in the 1-0 win at Barrow in October 2010.

JJ O'Donnell

Tricky winger who joined the Town with St Albans team-mate Godfrey Poku in January 2010.

Also capable of playing at left back the youngster featured for the Hatters' reserve and youth teams during 2009/10.

He made his first team debut as a substitute in the 4-2 FA Cup first round replay win over Corby Town and was handed a one-year contract extension in June 2011.

Keith Keane

Having made his debut as a 16-year-old in November 2003,

Luton Town

Keith Keane went on to enjoy an extended run in the side from February onwards whilst Kevin Foley was out injured.

Such was the contribution he made that the return of Foley didn't signal the end of his involvement at first-team level and to fail shed the season with 14 appearances under his belt, all this whilst still in the first year of his scholarship.

Another product of the youth system who regularly appeared for the Republic of Ireland at schoolboy level. He joined the Hatters at the age of nine having been scouted in local football, and made a rapid progression through the club's centre of excellence and youth teams, demonstrating enough potential to convince Mike Newell to give him his first taste of senior action.

Over the course of his career at Kenilworth Road Keane has proved to be one of the, if not the most, versatile players to pull on a Luton shirt.

Capable of playing right the way across the back four or in midfield the only positions he's not featured for the Town (yet) are in goal and up-front.

Out of contract at the end of the 2009/10 campaign the winner of the Hatters' Goal of the Season award delighted everyone at Kenilworth Road by penning a two-year deal to keep him at the club until 2012.

Adam Watkins

Young midfielder, capable of playing in attack, who signed professional forms at Kenliworth Road in June 2010.

A self-confessed Hatters fan, he made his first team bow in a 1-0 defeat at Southampton in the FA Cup third round in January 2010. He broke into the first team squad during 2010/11 campaign scoring twice on his full debut in the 4-0 FA Trophy win over Uxbridge. Watkins then scored his first league goal on his first league start in the 3-1 win over Brainfree in August 2011.

Charlie Henry

Winger Henry signed from Blue Square Bet Premier rivals Newport County in November 2010, signing initially on-loan until January when the England C international will complete a permanent switch. Henry is no stranger to Kenilworth Road as he came through the youth ranks at the Club but was told he was too small to continue his scholarship and left when he was 15. Now 24, Henry came back to Bedfordshire with a bang back in August when hitting a superb goal in front of the Hatters faithful when Newport were the visitors earlier in the campaign. That strike was one of two the Stevenageborn flyer has hit this term as the Exiles have adjusted to life in non-league's top flight with ease following their emphatic Championship winning season in the Blue Square South. Pivotal in that success, Henry netted nine times as Dean Holdsworth's side plundered over 93 goals last season to romp to the title. From South Wales via after spells with a host of non-league sides since leaving Kenilworth Road he's back when it all began and ready to help the Town back into the Football League

Alex Lawless

Former Wales Under-21 midfielder who signed in November 2010 initially on-loan from York City before a permanent deal went through in January 2011. A star of the Minster-

men's campaign last season which saw them lose in the Promotion Final to Oxford United, Lawless featured prominently in all four of the meetings with the Hatters last term at the heart of midfield.

He only joined York at the start of last season, impressing then boss Martin Foyle enough to prise the 25-year-old away from Forest Green Rovers where performances in a variety of positions - in defence and across midfield - had also caught the eye of Football League scouts. It's not just the 150 games experience in the Conference that Lawless has with Forest Green and York that he has on his CV. A former Cardiff City scholar he took-up non-league football in Wales before he was snapped up to earn his first professional contract with Premier League Fulham in 2003.

Without featuring for the Cottagers it was off to South West to Torquay United for the young Lawless but after just a year and 16 appearances at Plainmoor he was on the move again, to Forest Green in 2006 and in his three seasons he helped the Gloucestershire consolidate in the Conference, Arriving at Bootham Crescent in the summer of 2009, local media announced him merely as a "utility player" but that was far from the case, and alongside Neil Barrett he forged a formidable partnership in the centre of City's midfield, changing the Yorkshire club's relegation worries from one season to making them just one game away from promotion the next.

James Dance

Energetic, tricky winger who joined the Hatters from Crawley Town in July 2011. Able to play on either flank or as a central striker, Dance began his career as a trainee at Birmingham City but, after being released, he made his name in non-league circles in the West Midlands before catching the eye of Kettering Town in 2009. After a string of fine performances on the wing for the Popples - including a man-of-fihe-match performance against the Town in August 2009 – he signed for Crawley in January 2011. However, after picking up a Blue Square Bet Premier winners' medal last term, Dance found himself out of the Red Devils' starting XI and, ofter the Hatters' bld was accepted by the League 2 club, the Coleshill-born man was quick to agree a two-year deal.

John Paul Kissock

Creative attacking midfielder John Paul signed a two-year contract for an undisclosed fee joining from Southport in August 2011. The former England Under-16 and Under-18 international began his career as a trainee at Premier League Everton. He was a regular in the Toffees' youth and reserve teams where he surpassed Wayne Rooney's record as the youngest ever player to feature for their second-string. In January 2008, he signed on loan for then Scottish Premier League Gretna, earning rave reviews before he returned to Goodison Park. With first team opportunities limited - despite being named as an unused substitute nine times in the Premier League - he was released at the end of the 2008/09 campaign before for he signed Hamilton Academical. A short spell with Accies followed and, after attempting to find a new club, he dropped down to Cheshire county league level in a bid to resurrect his career. His performances for firstly Newton, and then Formby, alerted the attention of Southport manager Liam Watson who signed the Liverpudlian in December 2010, where he had an immediate effect for the Yellows.

He scored his first goal for the club in a 5-1 win over Gateshead in January and his dynamic performances continued to catch the eye, none more so than in two appearances against the Hatters, especially in Port's 2-1 win at Haig Avenue in March. He started the 2011/12 campaign where he left off last season, scoring a fantastic free-kick in the Sandgrounders' 2-2 draw with Lincoln City on the opening day, then having a hand in the Southport goal at Kenilworth Road and set-up Tony Gray's goal in the Yellows' 3-1 defeat to Gateshead before his move to LU4 three days later.

FORWARDS

Tommy Wright

Centre forward who signed a three-month deal in October 2011. Wright began his career as a youngster with Leicester City, earning call-ups to the England Under-19s and 20s sides.

He scored twice in League action for the Foxes but made his name as a goalscorer while on-loan at Brentford and Blackpool between 2003 and 2005, scoring eight goals in 13 appearances for the Seasiders. He signed for Barnsley in 2006 before joining Darlington a year later where he scored 17 goals in 54 games for the Quakers in League 2. That form saw Scotlish Premier League side Aberdeen pay £75,000 for his services in August 2008 but after two years at Pittodrie he moved south of the border signing for Grimsby. Last season saw the Kirby Muxtoe-born forward sign for Darlington for a second time where he scored four goals in 22 games, helping the Quakers lift the FA Trophy before signing a short-term deal at Kidderminster this season prior to arriving at Kenilworth Road.

Ryan Brunt

Highly-rated teenage striker who joined on work experience from Stoke City in November 2011.

Started his career as a junior with Bristol City before moving to the Potteries.

Made his debut in Town colours as a substitute against Cambridge United before hitting a hat-trick in his first match for the reserves.

Danny Crow

A nippy poacher of a striker, Crow joined the Hatters from Cambridge United in May 2010 following the expiry of his contract at the Abbey Stadium. The front man started his career as a trainee with Norwich City and made his senior bow in the Premier League for the Canaries in December 2004. A loan spell at Northampton followed towards the end of the 2004/05 season before he was released by Norwich and signed for Peterborough in the summer of 2005, notching 17 goals in his debut season at London Road. Following a short loan spell at Notts County, Crow was

Following a short loan spell at Notts County, Crow was released by Posh and was snapped up by Cambridge in September 2008. The energetic forward's strike-rate of 22 goals in 43 league starts won him many admirers and his 19 goals during 2009/10 saw him scoop the U's online Player of the Year award.

Dan Walker

Quick young forward capable of playing down the flanks who signed a one-year deal in July 2010 after impressing in pre-season in games for and against the Hatters. Previously with Bedford Town, Walker has also played for Stony Stratford Town and Leighton Town. He made his first team debut for the Hatters as substitute in a 3-0 win over AFC Wimbledon in September 2010 before scoring his first senior goal against Forest Green a month

Amari Morgan-Smith

Striker or wide man who arrived at Kenliworth Road as a free agent following a two-year spell at likeston Town. He put pen to paper on a two-year deal after two years with the Blue Square Bet North side in which he scored 34 goals in 77 starts. The fast and skilful frontman's impressive form for the Robins earned him a call-up to the England C squad at the end of last season, earning his first cap against the Republic of Ireland in May. Wolverhampton-born Morgan-Smith started his career as a trainee with Wolves. He then signed

for Crewe and then Stockport where he made one Football League appearance before moving to likeston. Before the 2009/10 season began the striker impressed in a trial for Championship side Derby County and has since

a trial for Championship side Derby County and has since gone on to score three goals in seven appearances for likeston.

Earlier this season his former boss Kevin Wilson hailed the striker, who scored 23 goals last season, as the "hottest property in non-league football".

With huge interest in the forward, Town boss Richard Money was delighted to beat off competition from a number of Championship and League One sides for Morgan-Smith's signature.

And, hours after completing the paperwork, Morgan-Smith was thrust into action for his debut against Mansfield and scored in the 2-0 victory.

Agron O'Connoi

Striker, who picked up a plethora of end-of-season awards at Nene Park, arrived at Kenilworth Road after signing a two-year contact following the expiry of his deal with Rushden & Diamonds. He scored 27 times in two seasons at Nene Park after arriving from Mansfield Town and went onto be a huge favourite at the Northamptonshire club.

Aaron started his career on YTS forms with Derby County before moving to likeston Town. He then had spells at Scunthorpe United and Nuneaton Borough before returning to likeston.

He then joined Gresley Rovers where between 2004 and 2007 he scored 80 goals in 127 games which saw him pick up the Player's Player of the Year, Manager's Player of the Year and Supporter's Player of the Year awards two seasons in succession. O'Connor nearly signed for Rushden in 2006 when Paul Hart was in charge, however, after playing in pre-season friendlies, he returned to Gresley, later moving to Grays Athletic, where he played under Justin Edinburgh. Aaron went from Grays to Mansfield in 2008 where he scored eight times in 39 games at Field Mill prior to his switch to Rushden in the summer of 2009.

Known for his strength and turn of pace the Nottingham-born

Stuart Fleetwood

front man can also play wide.

Prolific striker who signed for an undisclosed fee from Hereford United on deadline day in August 2011. The Gloucester-born frontman, who scored 28 goals the last time he played at Conference level whilst with Forest Green Rovers, signed a two-year deal at Kenilworth Road. He began his career as a trainee at Cardiff City, making the grade to feature eight times for the Bluebirds between 2003 and 2006. In January 2006, Fleetwood signed for Hereford for the first time scoring eight times before he signed for Forest Green in June 2007. And it was his spell with Rovers that saw people sit up and take notice after plundering 32 league and cup goals in a season that saw the Gloucestershire side earn their highest league placing. The Wales Under-21 international turned down a new contract at FGR to sign for then Championship Charlton in June 2008 but was loaned out Cheltenham, Exeter and Brighton, Fleetwood returned to Edgar Street last summer and scored 18 goals as he helped the Bulls avoid the drop in League 2. After hitting the post on his debut against Stockport, Fleetwood scored on his full debut in the win over Darlington.
