



Welcome back to Kenilworth Road to you all for this important FA Trophy quarter-final tie against Gateshead.

A big welcome to Ian Bogie and his players, management and staff plus the directors and supporters of the Heed to Bedfordshire.

We know we face a very tough test in our quest to reach the semi-finals of this competition for the second season running. Ian has worked wonders at the International Stadium and they are enjoying their best campaign back in non-league's top flight.

On Wednesday I saw them beat York 2-1 in front of the live television cameras in what was a fantastic result and performance and further substantiates how tough a challenge we face this afternoon.

Confidence no doubt will be high in the visitors' camp after such a good result and we need to guard against their qualities as we look to bounce back following the massive disappointment in the wake of Tuesday's 1-0 defeat at Barrow.

I had said before the game how important it was to go to Barrow with the right attitude. You always know that after a long trip we are going to be faced with tough conditions; the weather, the pitch, Barrow's direct and physical approach. Therefore, having failed to get to grips with those influences – especially in the second half – to say I was frustrated was an understatement.

Our first half performance was okay and I thought we should have been out of sight by half-time having created and missed some very good opportunities to take the lead.

In the second half our passing rhythm and tempo were poor, and not up to our high standards. And that showed: not until the final few minutes did their goalkeeper have a save to make.

To concede a goal and go on to lose the game when it looked as though the match was going to drift to a goalless draw was a huge disappointment. Not many teams have returned from Holker Street with all three points – including Fleetwood and Wrexham – but after last Saturday's win over Tamworth I thought we would go there and at least extend our unbeaten run but it wasn't to be

We now have to go on another long unbeaten run if we're to chase down the top two in the Blue Square Bet Premier. Victories for those two on Tuesday were another blow. It's a big challenge but something that neither I nor the players are giving up on between now and the end of April.

Due to the cold weather a few weeks ago and our involvement in the FA Cup and FA Trophy this season it means that rearranged games will be coming thick and fast in the final two months of the campaign.

Today we take a break from league competition and set our sights on a place in the last four of the Trophy. We have given the competition the utmost respect and now face a Gateshead side who also reached the semi-finals last season before going on to lose to eventual winners Darlington.


I have fond memories of the competition as a player and, with a trip to Wembley for the finalists, the FA Trophy gives a lot of non-league clubs the chance to play at our magnificent national stadium.

Any trip to Wembley is special and should be cherished so we will be going all out to make sure we are in Monday's draw for the semi-final.

I hope you all share my enthusiasm for the competition and get behind the lads in our quest to progress this afternoon.

WITH DIRECTOR DAVID WILKINSON


Good afternoon everyone and a warm welcome to Kenilworth Road to all the officials, players and supporters from Gateshead.

As we are recovering from a 540-mile round trip to Barrow on Tuesday night we are appreciative of all those who travel long distances to follow their team, and Gateshead have a similar journey to us. Well done to all those who have made the trip and we hope you enjoy your afternoon with us.

Now that we are two wins away from a Wembley final in the FA Trophy this game takes on a greater significance and, of course, our fine early season victory over Gateshead means nothing in the overall scheme of things. We want to win every game we play in the league and cups, at every level, and it is still possible that we can make two Wembley appearances this year.

Last Tuesday night saw the end of our 13-game unbeaten run and it was our first loss in the Blue Square Bet Premier since early November last year in which time we have gained 24 points from 11 games.

It was very disappointing at Barrow, but conditions were appalling and not conducive to playing football. Not unlike Wrexham last year and Southport earlier this season.

We are proud of our fans. All of us in the directors' box used to be one of the crowd. All of us still wish we were one of the crowd and some of us still are.

We are determined that we can fulfil our dreams this year, but we will need every ounce of help we can get to pass the post to promotion to the Football League. We can do it, but we need support.

On a happier note I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate Gary Sweet and Christina on their recent marriage and wish them and their family every happiness for the future. One surprise advantage of the recent snow was that it made for a real white wedding.

It's now up to us to go on another unbeaten run. We know we are capable of doing it once more and we also know how tough it's going to be to reel in Fleetwood and Wrexham. We've still got to play both away from home so it's by no means over.



All the lads share the disappointment of a defeat and we're a strong bunch. It's all about the reaction after a loss and having seen the faces of frustration etched on the faces of the supporters who made the long trek to Barrow, we know we have to repay your loyalty with, at the very least, a victory this afternoon.

After this afternoon we have a week off before we welcome Bath City to Kenilworth Road which will give a number of players currently injured to return to fitness. Indeed a number of players will be unavailable today as they will be cup-tied. It means we have a squad of players all itching to stake a claim in the manager's team for the business end of the season.

This week we said goodbye to my name sake, Kevin, who has joined Notts County in a coaching capacity. He'll be sorely missed both on and off the pitch and all the lads wish him well.

Finally thank you to those who made the journey to Barrow. Your loyalty knows no bounds.

Enjoy the game and get behind us once more.

POPULAR GOALKEEPER KEVIN PILKINGTON LEAVES KENILWORTH ROAD

Goalkeeper Kevin Pilkington Kenilworth Road to take up a full-time goalkeeping coach role at League One side Notts County earlier last week.

The 37-year-old former Manchester United stopper joins the Magpies having played 33 times over three seasons for the Town in which he kept 14 clean sheets.

The hugely experienced goalkeeper originally joined the Hatters on loan from Notts in November 2009, making his debut in a 2-0 win at Gravs Athletic. He went on to play 11 times during 2009/10 before he was signed permanently in May 2010. He then made seven appearances last season - four of which came in the Town's run to the semi-finals of the FA Trophy.

Pilkington penned a one-year contract last summer before going on to feature 15 times between the sticks for the Hatters this season prior to agreeing to a move back to Meadow Lane where he had previously made 149 appearances as a player.

Town manager Gary Brabin said: "It's a great opportunity for Kevin and we wish him well. We're obviously sad to see him leave because he's been such an important member of the squad for the past few seasons - not only in terms of his performances on the pitch but his experience, know-how and character around the place. Kevin has always been keen on taking up coaching full-time and he feels that this offer - at a club close to his heart - is ideal for him.

"On behalf of all the coaching staff and playing squad we'd like to wish Kevin good luck in his new role at Notts County."

Pilkington joins a new backroom staff at Meadow Lane following the appointment of Keith Curle as the Magpies' new boss.

"It's been a whirlwind last 24 hours," Pilkington said. "I'm gutted to be leaving Luton and I'm gutted as I'm giving up playing, too. However, I know I'm not getting any younger, and this is a great opportunity for me to further my career. It's the next step for me and hopefully the first step on the ladder in this new chapter of my career.

"The years really have flown by and I've got a lot of great memories but it's time to move on now. I'm a coach, it's my future."

The Hitchin-born stopper had featured 15 times for the Town this term and had only been on the losing side once - in the FA Cup defeat to Cheltenham in December.

And the former Manchester United keeper reflected on the good times he enjoyed whilst at Kenilworth Road. "I've got some great memories of my time at Luton," he said. "I'm grateful that I've had the opportunity and I'd like to thank those who brought me here. I'm sad to be leaving, it's a great club with some super people and the lads have been brilliant. It's all gone so quick, from my debut at a wet and windy Grays to the last one against Mansfield, it's been great.

"It's been a good season and I think my record speaks for itself - we haven't lost a league game when I've played - but one thing for sure is I'm really going to miss playing."

The stopper - who forms part of a backroom staff brought in by new County boss Keith Curle - who Pilkington had played with at Mansfield - then heaped praise on the Town goalkeepers he leaving behind, including coach Dmitri Kharine.

"Dimi is simply a legend," Pilkington said. "I've learned so much from him and I've got no doubt that I'll be ringing him to pick his brains at some point!

"Mark Tyler is a fantastic goalkeeper and it's been great training and working with him every day - but he'll have to get used to coming to training on his own from now on! And I'm sure that young Lewis Kidd will have a bright future too - with Mark and Dimi supporting him he's certainly getting the best possible advice and coaching."

WELCOME





The original Gateshead AFC was formed in 1930 when neighbours South Shields, members of the Football League's old Third Division North, moved to Gateshead's Redheugh Park.

The club had applied for re-election only once before but were nevertheless unceremoniously cast aside in favour of the more geographically acceptable Peterborough United in 1960.

In 1968 Gateshead became founder members of the Northern Premier League but their stay in the new competition lasted only two years. Finishing as runners-up the Tynesiders then spent a season in the Midland League until in 1973, seven leagues and 43 years after its inception, Gateshead AFC ceased to exist.

A new club called Gateshead Town played the following season in the local Northern Combination League but, astonishingly, history was soon to repeat itself. Renamed Gateshead United, the club soon became a force in the Northern Premier League while accounting for Football League clubs Grimsby Town and Crewe Alexandra in the FA Cup.

However, in 1977, after only three years of operation, came the shock announcement that United were to disband - the third body blow to hit Gateshead supporters in less than 20 years. Replacing Gateshead United in the Northern Premier League for the 1977/78 season and after two years in the Conference, the Tynesiders returned to the Northern Premier League and lifted the title for the second time in 1986.

Their second spell in the Conference lasted just one season, though they were quick to bounce back, and reclaimed their place at the top table of non-league football in 1990. It was Gateshead's most successful period as a non-league club but in 1998 the club was relegated back to the Northern Premier League after eight consecutive seasons of Conference football.

Relegation to the Northern Premier League first division followed but, after one season, Gateshead were back in the NPL top tier following the introduction of a geographically split first division.

Gateshead finished third in the UniBond Premier division, NPL, in 2007/08, hitting 93 league goals before beating Buxton 2-0 in the Play-Off final.

In the 2008/09 season the Tynesiders claimed runnersup spot in the Blue Square North and a second promotion was clinched after beating Southport in the two-legged semi-final and then AFC Telford United 1-0 in the Play-Off final. The first campaign back in the Conference Premier, however, proved to be a difficult one with top flight status only retained on the final day of last season on goal difference.

Last season the Tynesiders improved, finished a more than respectable 14th place, taking four points off the Town in the process.

☐ MEET THE MANAGER

Ian Bogie

Ian had a tremendous start to his managerial career when he guided Gateshead to back-to-back promotions from the UniBond Premier Division to the Blue Square Premier.

He joined Gateshead in the summer of 2006 as assistant manager and took over as caretaker boss before he was given the manager's job on a permanent basis for the start of the 2007/08 season.

Promotion through the Play-Offs was achieved in his first season, followed by a second promotion via the Play-Offs to the Blue Square Premier.

Now in his fourth season at the helm he became Gateshead's first full-time manager for half a century when he penned a two-year deal in the summer.

As a player Bogie was a talented midfielder who made over 450 appearances taking in spells at Newcastle United, Preston North End, Millwall, Leyton Orient, Port Vale and Kidderminster Harriers.

□ GOALKEEPERS

Paul Farman

Made the number one shirt his own during the 2009/10 campaign playing 41 games. Farman joined Gateshead during the summer of 2009 from local rivals Blyth Spartans where he had made 17 appearances for the Blue Square North club the previous season. The talented glove man previously played three games for Newcastle United Under-18s in 2007.

Tim Deasy

A 26-year-old stopper who joined Gateshead from Barrow before the start of the 2010/11 season. Deasy starred in Barrow's FA Cup third round tie against Sunderland in January 2010 but was on the bench for the Bluebirds' FA Trophy final win over Stevenage at Wembley four months later. He made 51 appearances for Barrow having previously played a handful of games for Macclesfield Town and Stockport County and played 48 games for Gateshead last season.


□ DEFENDERS

Eddie Odhiambo

A summer signing from Newport County, Odhiambo's career started as a trainee at Southampton. He then moved to Oxford United in 2006 and played 79 games during two seasons at the Kassam Stadium. Odhiambo then joined Stevenage where he made 40 appearances in a two-year stay, including the 2009/10 Conference Premier championship campaign. A versatile player Odhiambo played at Wembley in the FA Trophy final while at Broadhall Way before joining Newport and then Gateshead.

Sam Rents

Signed for Gateshead in 2011 from Conference Premier champions Crawley Town where he had spent the last three years. He was the Red Devils' regular left-back until he suffered a fractured cheekbone and he made 87 appearances for the West Sussex club. A defender who can also play in midfield Rents was originally with home town club Brighton & Hove Albion where he made 35 appearances.



Chris Carruthers

Experienced left-sided player Carruthers joined Gateshead in 2011. Capped by England at Under-20 level he played 201 games for Bristol Rovers and local club Northampton. He won the 2007 League 2 Play-Off final with Bristol Rovers in front of a 60,000 Wembley crowd. Carruthers later joined Oxford and had loan spells at Crawley Town and York before he joined the Minstermen on a permanent basis.

Ben Clark

Former England Youth international Clark was a major signing for Gateshead in 2010 from Hartlepool United where he made 181 appearances in six years. Originally with Sunderland, the central defender played 14 games for the Black Cats before he joined Hartlepool in 2004. Club captain.

James Curtis


The longest serving player at the club, Curtis joined Gateshead in 2003 from Northern League side Washington. The towering central defender is a firm fans' favourite and impressive performances have brought several awards including Player of the Year on three occasions. The Wearsider has racked up over 380 appearances during eight years at the club.

☐ MIDFIELDERS

Kris Gate

Joining in 2007 from home town club Newcastle United, Gate played a major role in two promotion campaigns and subsequent two Conference campaigns. The former captain of Newcastle reserves went on to make the substitutes' bench in the Premier League having made senior appearances in friendlies against Rangers and Malaga. Gate has captained Gateshead for three years and is now vice-captain.

Phil Turnbull

Turnbull joined Gateshead for a second spell in 2008 on- oan from York City and the deal was made permanent in March that year. He had previously made five appearances on loan for Gateshead during the 2005/06 season from Hartlepool United. After leaving Victoria Park the playmaker moved on to York where injury hampered his progress. A skilful central midfield player, he has been a regular in the Gateshead engine room for the past three seasons.

Micky Cummins

Former Republic of Ireland Under-21 midfielder, Cummins signed for Gateshead from Grimsby Town. He racked up 287 games for Port Vale during a sixyear stay having began his career at Middlesbrough. After leaving Port Vale, where he played in the 2001 LDV Vans final win over Brentford at the Millennium Stadium, Cummins had two year spells at both Darlington and Rotherham United before he linked up with Grimsby and then Gateshead.

Jamie Chandler

Signed in the January transfer window from Darlington for a four figure fee. Chandler, who scored on his Gateshead debut against Braintree Town, was capped by England at various youth levels. He joined Darlington at the start of the 2010/11 campaign after a spell on loan from Sunderland the previous season. He played over 70 games for the Quakers and was named man of the match in the 2011 FA Trophy final win over Mansfield Town at Wembley.

Martin Brittain

Ruled out for the majority of his first season at Gateshead after suffering a double leg break in 2009, Brittain scored nine goals in 47 games last

season. Signed from Kidderminster he made one full appearance for Newcastle United and six off the bench before he spent a short period at Ipswich Town. A loan spell at Yeovil Town was followed by brief stays at Carlisle United and Walsall, before moving into non-league football with Kidderminster, and subsequently Gateshead.

Jon Shaw

An experienced striker who linked up with Gateshead in 2010 and was top scorer last season with 21 goals. Previously with Mansfield Town his career began at hometown club Sheffield Wednesday where he made 21 appearances. Moving into nonleague football, Shaw played over a century of games for Burton Albion. The England C international then scored 20 goals in 37 games for Halifax Town during 2007/08 which secured a £50,000 move to Rochdale. Shaw had loan spells at Barrow and Gateshead before joining Mansfield and then Gateshead permanently.

Yemi Odubade

A summer signing from Stevenage, pacey front runner Odubade ended last season on loan at Newport County. Starting out at local club Eastbourne Town as a teenager, he scored an impressive 64 goals in 85 games. A short spell at Yeovil Town was followed by two productive seasons at Eastbourne Borough. At Oxford United he scored 31 goals in 143 games and was top scorer at Stevenage when the club won promotion to the Football League in 2010. He featured in the FA Trophy final at Wembley that year and last season played 20 league and cup games for Stevenage before joining Newport on loan.

Liam Hatch

Experienced front man who joined Gateshead from Darlington during the January transfer window for a four figure fee. His career began in non-league football with Ramsgate, Herne Bay, and Gravesend & Northfleet. Hatch joined Barnet for £23,000 in 2003 and after 158 games and 28 goals for the Bees joined Peterborough United for £150,000. Two loan spells at Darlington were followed by a loan spell at Luton Town. He then joined Darlington on a permanent basis and in total scored 21 goals in 90 games for the Quakers before joining Gateshead in mid-season.

☐ CLASSIC CAMPAIGN

1952/53

Gateshead made national headlines by reaching the FA Cup sixth round in 1952/53 and were the North-East's last representatives in the competition. Bill Tulip's side beat Crewe Alexandra 2-0, Bradford Park Avenue 2-1, Liverpool 1-0, Hull City 2-1 and Plymouth Argyle 1-0 in the FA Cup before losing 1-0 to Bolton Wanderers in front of 17,692 at Redheugh Park. Notable players included the Callender brothers, Tom and Jack, Bobby Cairns, Johnny Ingham, Ken Smith, Ian Winters and goalkeeper Bobby Gray. Gateshead hammered Crewe, Darlington, and Accrington as they finished in ninth position in the Third Division (North).

MANAGING TO SUCCEED

Bill Tulip

Bill Tulip was honorary secretary-manager of Gateshead for 23 years. A wealthy businessman, he became a director in 1930 and became secretarymanager in May 1933. He left trainer Bob Keen in charge of the team but carried out many of the administrative duties. Just before the war he signed Hughie Gallacher and Gateshead were Third Division (North) runners-up in 1949/50, also twice reaching the FA Cup fourth round and the sixth round in 1952/53. In 1956 at age 77 he stepped down as Gateshead's manager, remaining as chairman and president until his death in September 1961.

☐ FAB FOUR

Billy Askew

One-time Gateshead midfielder Billy Askew featured in two promotion campaigns with Hull City. He turned professional with Middlesbrough in 1977 and appeared in the top-flight before joining Hull City in 1982. He moved to Newcastle United for £150,000 in 1990 and joined Gateshead in 1992. He netted three goals in 44 Conference games prior to joining Whitley Bay in 1994, then played for Spennymoor United and Workington. Following a spell in the licensed trade, he has scouted for several clubs including Darlington and lives in Pittington, Co Durham.

Shaun Elliott

Former England B international central defender Shaun Elliott played for Gateshead during the 1992/93 campaign. Signing professional for Sunderland in 1975, he featured prominently as they won promotion in 1979/80 and were Milk Cup finalists in 1985. He joined Norwich City for £140,000 in 1986 and moved to Blackpool in 1988. Featuring in their 1989/90 FA Cup run, he was reunited with Ian Atkins at Colchester United in 1990. He joined Gateshead in 1992 and made 32 Conference appearances, then played for Bishop Auckland and Whitley Bay. Now living and working back in Norwich.

Gerry Forrest

Right-back Gerry Forrest gained considerable topflight experience before playing for Gateshead. Initially with Billingham Town and South Bank, he joined Rotherham United in 1977 and starred in their 1980/81 Third Division title triumph. He moved to Southampton for £100,000 in 1985, replacing Mick Mills in their defence and featuring prominently as they were League Cup semi-finalists in 1986/87. Returning to Rotherham in 1990, he moved to Gateshead in 1991 and scored once in 33 Conference games. He later played for Billingham again, Norton & Stockton Ancients, Peterlee, Newtown and Brandon United.

Terry Hibbitt

Experienced midfielder Terry Hibbitt starred in Gateshead's 1982/83 Northern Premier League title triumph. Signing professional for Leeds United in 1964, he helped them win the Fairs Cup in 1968 and League Championship in 1968/69, moving to Newcastle United in 1971. He was an FA Cup finalist in 1974 and joined Birmingham City for £100,000 in 1975. Returning to Newcastle in exchange for Stewart Barrowclough in 1978, he joined Gateshead in 1981 and had a spell as player-coach before becoming their manager in 1986. He later ran a pub in Ponteland but tragically died in August 1994.




"We knew it wasn't going to be an easy game. Tamworth had won at Cambridge, drawn at Fleetwood and put

The number of matches previously played on this date at Kenilworth Road. Luton have won five, drawn once and lost once. The Hatters have scored 16 goals and conceded seven.

The first match here came in 1911 when Norwich City were the visitors in a Southern League fixture. Luton won 3-1 courtesy of goals from John Smith, Herbert Moody and Harold Stansfield.

The number of goals also scored against Brentford in 1922 when the visitors failed to score in a Division Three (South) match. Luton netted through Harry Higginbotham and Ernie Simms, with Brentford scoring an own goal.

The number of points obtained in 1928 as Exeter City were beaten 2-1, also in Division Three (South). Andy Rennie and Alf Nunn scored the goals to give the Town victory and maximum points.

The number of goals scored by Hugh Billington when Swansea Town were the opponents for a Division Two match in 1939. The Hatters won 6-3 with Charlie Clark and George Stephenson also on the scoresheet.

The number of games in the top flight on this day at Kenilworth Road, and unfortunately it was also the only defeat. Huddersfield Town won 2-1 in 1956 with Gordon Turner scoring for Luton in front of the highest crowd for these fixtures, 15,431.



The only without came in 1967 when Southport were the visitors in Division Four.




The number of years since the last match was played here on this date when Plymouth Argyle were beaten 1-0 courtesy of a goal from Tony Thorpe. This game saw a debut in goal for Lars Hirschfeld, who had joined on loan from Tottenham Hotspur.

The number of FA Trophy matches that the Hatters have previously played. Luton have won seven, drawn three and lost twice. The Hatters have scored 17 goals and conceded seven.

The biggest win in this competition is by four goals, and that came last year when Uxbridge were beaten 4-0 at Kenilworth Road in the second round. Taiwo Atieno scored twice, as did Adam Watkins, including one from the penalty spot.

The number of rounds this season that Stuart Fleetwood has scored in. Fleetwood netted the opening goal in the first round 2-0 win against Swindon Supermarine, and the third goal in the second round replay against Hinckley in the 3-0 win. Firstly, Boro forward, and future Hatter, Paul Wilkinson headed a Ceri Hughes cross into his own net before the speedy Dwight Marshall shot home from John Hartson's lay-off and then Preece smacked home a volley to give the Town a 3-0 interval lead.

Middlesbrough player-manager Bryan Robson, unable to turn out because of a calf strain, no doubt read the Riot Act at half-time but his words had no Although Boro scored a late consolation, Robson admitted afterwards: "Luton out ran us, out fought us and out passed us. We have no excuses, we just didn't perform."

Luton boss David Pleat purred: "Middlesbrough came at us which gave us the chance to counter attack and the goals went in."

There used to be a fear factor for those clubs whose life was ebbing away. Once it's gone it's gone for good, no looking back – and no second coming.

That was before the Phoenix club came into fashion. Instead of damning indictments, usually the first question asked when a club goes to the wall is which league will they return in at the start of next season.

Nobody can blame supporters for thinking selfishly. After having your heart ripped out, you won't find many begrudging them a little optimism.

Why should they concern themselves with Bob's Builders, who their spendthrift chairman hasn't paid for stadium repair work undertaken when he knew the proverbial was about to hit the fan?

Certainly for the traditionalists there's a level of discomfort that those in financial peril can 'go again' a couple of rungs down the ladder debt free by rearranging a few letters in their name.

Two clubs that went out of business are battling for a place in Non-League's top flight via the Blue Square Bet North. FC Halifax, in second, and Nuneaton had put their fans through the ringer in years gone by but both are certainly back with a bang, even if it's likely they'll have to settle for the play-offs. In fact they meet today after going head-to-head on Tuesday night.

The key to a successful Phoenix club seems to be retaining the stadium. That's certainly the case with Chester FC, whose former guide Chester City caused the Conference untold havoc back in 2010.

And there-in lies the problem for some. The Northern Premier League leaders, if they maintain their form, will be playing at Step 2 next year. Another great season under their impressive manager Neil Young next term and they could feasibly be back to where they came from within three short years.

What an achievement that would be for the supporters, but for those businesses owed thousands – not to mention the taxman – it must still be rather raw.

It's not just the clubs with big support enjoying a great season. The new Farsley, formed from the ashes of Farsley Celtic in 2010, boast a play-off place in Evo-Stik North.

The same can be said of Ilkeston, formerly Town who folded as a Blue Square North club early last season. Under Kevin Wilson, who stayed in charge of the club's academy team last year to get them prepared for this term, the Robins are thriving. In with a chance of the Evo-Stik South title, they are watched by crowds of over 500 most weeks.

What about AFC Hornchuch, second in the Ryman Premier. They are looking to return to the Conference South – the league they were enjoying when the bottom fell out of their promotion plan after backers Carthium were declared bankruptcy with debts of over £7m some seven years ago.

You can't deny the long suffering supporters a way back. But wouldn't it be nice if some of the money earned from a Phoenix club's rise back could go towards helping out all those that are still left counting the cost?



A hugely disappointed Gary Brabin believed his side didn't do enough to warrant a result as they went down 1-0 at Barrow at Holker Street.

"It now makes it harder for us to win the league but we've got to keep going and we got to learn from tonight because it certainly wasn't good enough.

"We've got to be better than that if we've got aspirations of getting promoted."









"I was happy with how I played but was disappointed not to score and that is what I'm working on in training.




