LUTON manager Gary Brabin pleaded with angry fans to judge him at the end of the season after a late Grimsby equaliser made it six games without a win.

After describing himself in his programme notes as "ashamed" at the 3-0 midweek defeat at Forest Green, Brabin was satisfied with the response of his team, who led through Andre Gray's debut goal until Kiernan Hughes-Mason struck three minutes from time to keep the Mariners' play-off hopes

It was the first league goal the Hatters had conceded at home since November, but seven clean sheets counted for nothing with irate fans booing the former Cambridge boss down the tunnel.

Calls for a change to be made a week shy of a year since Brabin replaced Richard Money in Non-League's hottest of seats were aimed at the directors' box.

But the manager remained defiant, saying: "Obviously I'm disappointed with the response (of the crowd), but I can under-
