PAUL BUCKLE has told his players to picture themselves as Luton Town history men ahead of their trip to Wembley.

The former Torquay manager will take a team to a final at the national stadium for the third time in five years after beating Wrexham 3-2 on aggregate.

Now he wants them to copy the likes of Mick Harford, Brian Stein and Danny Wilson - heroes of David Pleat's team's 1988 League Cup final win over Arsenal - whose images he has forced them to embrace since taking over five weeks ago.

Buckle, who also took Torquay to last year's League Two final at Old Trafford, told The NLP: "I've told the players they must not be afraid of the club's heritage and history. It's got to inspire you.

"I got all the old photos out and put them back up. They are up on the walls in my office and around the place. Why should they be boxed up in a cupboard?

"Either throw them in the

bin or get them on the wall.

"They were lying in a cupboard and that's where we were as a club, in my opinion. We were caught in between and I want these players to make some new history for Luton Town.

"That's what I've been trying to drive forward. I feel immensely proud to be manager of Luton because of the managers, the players and the league positions that have gone before, as well as the massive fanbase."
