Walker, 28, left the Hatters last summer after missing a crucial penalty in their play-off final defeat to AFC Wimbledon.

Twelve months on, he helped heap misery on the Town fans by playing his part in York's 2-1 Wembley win last Sunday.

On an open-top celebratory bus tour the following night, Walker was pictured putting his hand on the piece of cardboard held by a team-mate.

The striker-who received abusive twitter messages leading up to the final, such as one from @FerretLTFC that read 'Really hope to see someone break @jason9walker's leg next week'-immediately used the social network to apologise.

And he told The NLP: "I've got a lot of friends there, and they've been fantastic for my career have Luton.

"They are fantastic fans. They just want to be in the Football League like they deserve to be.

"I'd like to see them go up. Everyone wants to see the best teams in the Football League." Walker says he did not know what
