

Good evening and welcome back to Liberty Way for tonights eagerly awaited 2nd round FA Cup replay.

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Paul Buckle,his team and officials and hope they enjoy their short stay with us tonight.

We find ourselves playing Luton Town for the 3rd time already this season due to a dogged display at Kenilworth Road 10 days ago. The result was an improvement on our league encounter previously, but on the day we came away a little disappointed to have only drawn after holding the lead for so long, albeit under some sustained pressure. I'm sure if we can put on as committed a performance as on that day it should make for an interesting tie tonight.

Since that game our league form has continued to stutter, on the Tuesday night we earned a hard fought point against a strong Mansfield side in very testing conditions. The highlight of the evening for me being our young Walsall loanee Connor Taylor's terrific early 2nd half strike. The following fixture Saturday at Kidderminster saw us lose out to a late header that left me more than a little unhappy. Whilst we didn't start the game very well I felt our performance improved in the 2nd half and we had a couple of excellent chances to take the lead before succumbing. Throughout the course of the season so far we have tried different personnel and formations with varying degrees of success. This can be attributed to



several factors, but none probably more so than our crippling injury list to key players. I am hoping that there may be some light at the end of the tunnel for Carts and Kyle, but no date can be put on Neil Collett or Mark Noons return as yet. Even putting these longer term injuries to one side it still feels like every time we take a step forward with a signing or a loan it's 2 steps backwards due to losing them at some stage, thus making it very difficult to bring any continuity to the side and this seems to have been the case from the opening day of the season.

I fully appreciate that injuries are part and parcel of the game we play, but I do feel we have been more severely hit this season than should be reasonably expected. This situation comes at a time and in a league that is testing us to the maximum but please be assured that we all remain fully committed and focused on putting some points on the board and our season back on track.

CRITICS of football's loan market are many, and I have been one of them when a team lends a player to a club in the same division, but heavily subsidises their wages.

See Emmanuel Adebayor's spell at Tottenham last year, when Manchester City were still paying him a six-figure sum each week to beat other teams in competition with them, but sit helplessly on the sidelines when the parent and loaning club met.

It happens in Non-League, too, but two goals on FA Cup first round weekend underlined for me the importance of the loan system when used in the correct manner.

I travelled down to Dorset on Sunday to see Dorchester beat Plymouth Argyle 1-0 in a West Country derby.

The winning goal was scored soon after half-time by Jake Gosling, a 19-year-old left-footer who caused the Pilgrims problems all afternoon cutting in from the right-flank.

Gosling was released by Plymouth at 16, then studied at Gloucestershire's Hartpury College for a year before being offered a second chance in League football by Exeter City.

The Grecians have loaned both

Gosling and striker Jamie Reid to Dorchester to gain experience in Blue Square Bet South, and Sunday would have been a major lesson in both teenagers' development, even if the latter didn't get off the bench.

When they were offered professional terms at St James' Park last April, a press release on the Hartpury website describes the highlight of Gosling's career up to then as scoring the winning goal against Cambridge United that sealed the City kids an FA Youth Cup tie against Blackpool. It's safe to say that can be rewritten now!

The night before the game he would have dreamt of it turning out like it did, reminding the club that let him go exactly what a talent he is. The emotion he showed when he celebrated with his family and friends in the 3,000 crowd right next to me at the end suggested it was shared.

When he departs the Avenue Stadium to head back to Devon, the Grecians will find they've got a completely different player and person on their books, I'm sure, such is the lift success in 'real' men's football can provide.

I was also delighted to see Adam Birchall tap Gillingham's fourth goal over the line in the final minute of the League Two leaders' 4-0 hammering of Scunthorpe.

About to turn 28, the pint-sized striker is already well-versed in League football with Arsenal, Mansfield and Barnet. But having rebuilt his career once in Non-League having been released by the Bees, he needed to rebuild his fitness after injury delayed the kick-off of his Gills career by a year.

A month with Dartford in the BSB Premier got him back on the scoresheet and, more importantly, a teamsheet. After four starts and two sub run-outs at Princes Park, he returned to Priestfield with a bang on Bonfire weekend.

Hopefully now he will go on to have the prolific League career his endeavours in that 45-goal 2010-11 campaign at Dover deserve.

He carried the ball up field and from 20 yards curled a brilliant shot into the far corner of the net. However eight minutes later Mansfield were on level terms when Wright turned in a Briscoe cross to 'The Stags' a share of the spoils.

The trip to Kidderminster Harriers on Saturday ended in a narrow 1-0 defeat. The first half saw little action of note, but the second period was more upbeat. Although 'Harriers' had the lion share of possession it



was Boro who had a golden chance to take the lead on 65 minutes. Connor Taylor found himself in acres of space and as he bore down on goal he fired in a powerful shot that was well saved by home custodian Lewis. The game looked like ending goalless when Kidderminster grabbed an 89th minute winner. The Boro defence switched off as a short corner to the unmarked Vaughan picked out the unmarked Gowling who headed home much to the dismay of the travelling Boro contingent. So once again this season a late strike has cost the Boro dear and one wonder for how much longer this can go on before a remedy is found.

HISTORY:

Luton Town Football Club was formed on 11 April 1885, the product of a merger of the two leading local teams. Luton Town Wanderers and Excelsior, Initially based at Excelsior's Dallow Lane ground, the club began making payments to certain individual players in 1890. The following year, Luton became the first club in southern England to be fully professional. The club was a founder member of the Southern Football League in the 1894-95 season and finished as runners-up in its first two seasons. It then left to help form the United League and came second in that league's inaugural season before joining The Football League for 1897-98. concurrently moving to a new ground at Dunstable Road. The club continued to enter a team to the United League for two more seasons, and won the title in 1897-98. Poor attendance, high wages, and the high travel and accommodation costs that resulted from Luton's distance from the northern heartlands of The Football League crippled the club financially. and made it too expensive to compete in that league. A return to the regionally organised Southern League was therefore

arranged for the 1900-01 season. Eight years after arriving at Dunstable Road, Luton moved again, settling at their current ground, Kenilworth Road in 1905.Captain and left winger Bob Hawkes became Luton's first international player when he was picked to play for England against Ireland on 16 February 1907. A poor 1911-12 season saw Luton relegated to the Southern League's Second Division, but the club managed to win promotion back two years later. When war broke out, the schedule was reduced to a series of friendlies, but Luton took part in The London Combination for 1915-16. A key player of the period was Ernie Simms, a forward, Simms was wounded while serving in Italy in the First World War, but returned to score 40 goals during the following season.

LUTON TOWN

The Luton side first played in the white and black colours which the club has retained for much of its history during the 1920-21 season, when they rejoined The Football League; until then, the players had worn sky blue shirts with white shorts and navy socks. Such was the quality of Luton's team at

this time that despite playing in the third tier, a fixture between Ireland and England at Windsor Park on 22 October 1921 saw three Luton players on the pitch -

Louis Bookman and Allan Mathieson for Ireland, and club top goalscorer Simms for England. However, after Luton finished fourth in the division, the squad was broken up as Simms, Bookman and Mathieson joined South Shields. Port Vale and Exeter City respectively. Luton staved in the Third Division South until 1936-37, when the team finished top and won promotion to the Second Division, at that time the second tier of English football. During the promotion season, striker Joe Payne scored 55 goals in 39 games; during the previous season he had scored 10 in one match against Bristol Rovers, which remains a Football League record today.

During the early 1950s, one of Luton's greatest sides emerged under manager Dally Duncan. The team included Gordon Turner, who went on to become Luton's all-time top goalscorer, Bob Morton, who holds the record for the most club appearances, and Svd Owen, an England international. During this period, Luton sides also featured two England international goalkeepers, Ron Baynham and Bernard Streten, as well as Irish internationals Seamus Dunne, Tom Aherne and George Cummins. This team reached the top flight for the first time in 1955-56, after finishing the season in

GREATEST MOMENT The

club's greatest moment was definitely the League Cup victory over Arsenal in 1988. They were big favourites and held 2-1 lead going into the last eight minutes, but first Danny Wilson and then a last-minute winner from Brian Stein (with his second of the match) secured us the trophy in front of nearly 96,000 fans. **WORST MOMENT** Our worst moment was undoubtedly the 30-point penalty given to us by the Football League and the FA in 2008. It essentially relegated us into non-league football before a ball of the 2008/09 season had even been kicked. Even now, the draconian nature of the punishment remains a bitter pill to swallow.

GREATEST RIVALS Our

greatest rivals are Watford. The games between the two sides are sometimes known as the M1 derby and although we've obviously been unable to play them in recent years, I'm pleased avoided relegation with victory to say we have the better overall record, with 53 victories to Watford's 36.

BEST EVER PLAYER This one's highest ever top-flight position really difficult to answer and I'm sure no matter who I say, there'll be some fans who disagree. But I'm going to go with Ricky Hill. He was your complete midfielder. Box to box. Goal scoring. Not afraid to tackle. Could pick a pass. And he did all this in the club's most successful period when we were rubbing shoulders with the best in the country.

BEST ERA The 1980s, when we were plying our trade in the old First Division. Lots of people will be familiar with David Pleat's iconic jig across the Maine Road pitch in 1983, when we over Manchester City. But four years later, in 1987, the great John Moore guided us to our of seventh. And. of course. one year after that we won the aforementioned League Cup. MATCH YOU'RE LOOKING

HOPES FOR SEASON

and simple. We've lost out in the playoffs three times now. including two defeats in the final. so every Town fan would much rather we do it the 'easy' way. We've got the players capable of winning the league, but with only the one automatic spot available. there's so little margin for error. **FASCINATING FACT** In April 1936. Joe Payne scored 10 goals for the Town in a 12-0 drubbing of Bristol Rovers. It remains a Football League record to this day, but what makes the feat all the more remarkable is that he was only playing due to injuries to other teammates. The following season Payne scored a whopping 55 goals to win us the Third Division South.

second place behind Birmingham City on goal average. A few years of success followed, including an FA Cup Final appearance against Nottingham Forest in 1958-59; at the end of the season, Owen was voted FWA Footballer of the Year. However, the club was relegated the following season, and, by 1964-65, was playing in the fourth tier.

In yo-yo club fashion, Luton were to return. A team including Bruce Rioch, John Moore and Graham French won the Fourth Division championship in 1967-68 under the leadership of former player Allan Brown; two years later Malcolm Macdonald's goals helped them to another promotion, while comedian Eric Morecambe became a director of the club. Luton Town won promotion back to the First Division in 1973-74. but were relegated the following season by a solitary point. Former player David Pleat was made manager in 1978, and by 1982-83 the team was back in the top flight. The team which Pleat assembled at Kenilworth Road was notable at the time for the number of black players it included; during an era when many English squads were almost entirely white. Luton often fielded a mostly black team. Talented players such as Ricky Hill Brian Stein and Emeka Nwajiobi made key contributions to the club's success during this period, causing it to accrue "a richer history of black stars than any in the country", in the words of journalist Gavin Willacv.

On the last day of the 1982-83 season, the club's first back in the top tier, it narrowly escaped relegation: playing Manchester City at Maine Road, Luton needed to win to stay up, while City could escape with a draw. A late winner by Yugoslavian substitute Raddy Antić saved the team and prompted Pleat to dance across the pitch performing a "jig of joy", an image that has become iconic. The club achieved its highest ever league position, seventh, in 1986-87, and won the Football League Cup a year later with a 3-2 winover Arsenal. With ten minutes left on the clock and Arsenal 2-1 ahead. a penalty save from stand-in goalkeeper Andy Dibble sparked a late Luton rally: Danny Wilson equalised, before Brian Stein scored the winner with the last kick of the match. The club reached the League Cup Final once more in 1988-89. but lost 3-1 to Nottingham Forest

on which denied Boro a point on that occasion. Another player approaching the peak years of his career, Alex is 27 years old and was born in Wales. His previous clubs include Fulham, Torquay, Forest Green Rovers- for whom he made more than 100 appearances- and York City. He originally joined Luton on loan in 2010, before signing permanently in 2011. Since signing for Luton Alex has made 70 appearances and scored on 6 occasions. As a side note. Alex has expressed an interest in pursuing a career in art once his footballing exploits end.

We've had a few connections with The Hatters over the years...below we take a look at two players who've featured for both...

LEE MANSELL



Born in Gloucester in 1982, Lee's career began with today's visitors Luton as a trainee and he turned professional in the year 2000. He made his first start for the Hatters 2-1 defeat at QPR in the FA Cup in January 2001 and made his league debut six days later in a 2-0 defeat at Oldham.

In March 2003 he joined the Boro' on loan as we battled to avoid relegation from the Conference. He was a very good shirt term signing, netting twice in five games, once in a defeat at Morecambe and once in a victory at Telford which gave us hope of staying up. Unfortunately Lee's efforts weren't enough and he returned to Luton having seen Boro' relegated.

He was released from Luton at the end of the 2004/05 season, having made 47 appearances for The Hatters in his time at Kenilworth Road, scoring eight times. In June 2005, he joined Oxford United but again he suffered relegation, this time from League Two and in his time at The Kassam he played 44 times with a solitary goal to his name.

He moved to Torquay United for an undisclosed fee in summer 2006, and has remained at Plainmoor ever since, but once more, suffering relegation as in his first season with Torquay, they were relegated to The Conference on the last day of the 06/07 season.

He was instrumental in The Gulls regaining their League status a couple of years later, and has since been made club captain. He continues to net an impressive ratio of goals from midfield and to date has scored 21 times in 278 games for Torquay with his last being

against Accrington Stanley on 13th October at Plainmoor...All the best Lee.

DAVID PLEAT

David has the honour of managing and playing for both of today's sides as well as featuring for numerous other sides over his substantial footballing life. He started off at Nottingham Forest in 1962. the city of his birth, and then moved to Luton Town in 1964

and spent three years at Kenilworth Road, scoring nine times in 70 appearances. After this, he spent time at Shrewsbury. Exeter and Peterborough before joining the Boro' as a player manager in 1971, aged only 26, with a record of 26 goals in 185 football league appearances.

During his time at Manor Park, Pleat oversaw the famous FA Cup tie away at Torquay where a controversial goal led to a 1-0 Boro' defeat.

The following year Pleat re-joined Luton as part of the coaching staff, and in 1978 was appointed manager of The Hatters after Harry Haslam joined Sheffield United. Luton struggled against relegation to the Third Division in his first full season but after that they challenged for promotion and won the Second Division championship in 1981-82, in convincing style, with 88 points, eight clear of runners-up Watford. Pleat established the Hatters as a First Division club, although there were seasons when they struggled against relegation. One such occasion was when Luton avoided the drop in 1982-83 following a last day win at Manchester City with a goal from Raddi Antic. This result relegated City instead and the images of Pleat galloping across

the pitch to hug his players are well remembered.

Luton were desperately unlucky to lose 2-1 to Everton in the 1985 FA Cup semi-finals and in the following season they reached the guarter-finals of the League Cup, again losing to Everton. It was at the end of that season Pleat was offered the manager's job at Tottenham Hotspur which he accepted in May

During his time at White Hart Lane. Spurs achieved a third place finish in the First Division (now Premier League). reached the FA Cup final, and the semifinal of the Football League Cup in the 1986-87 season. During this season. he was the fore-runner of playing with just one striker, in this instance Clive Allen, who went on to score 49 goals in all competitions. Unfortunately Pleat's employment as manager of Tottenham came to an end in October 1987 when he was dismissed due to "disclosures about his private life".

Newspaper revelations claimed that

Pleat had been cautioned by police three

times for kerb-crawling which created

publicity that forced him to leave Spurs and to be replaced by Terry Venables. A couple of months later, Pleat became manager of Leicester City, but was unable to create the same winning formula that he had at both Spurs and Luton, and struggled in his time at Filbert Street. He was sacked by the Foxes in 1991, and soon returned to Luton.

Circumstances were different this time and despite four years in charge, and Luton were relegated to the second division for the first time in 10 years. His next job was as manager of Sheffield Wednesday in 1995, and he had a largely indifferent start at Hillsborough as the Owls finished 15th in his first season in charge. The following season was much better however, as Wednesday won all of their first four games and topped the Premier League table for a short while before going on to finish seventh, a magnificent achievement.

In 1997/98, with Wednesday battling relegation. Pleat was sacked by The Owls, and shortly afterwards took

on the job as Director of Football at Tottenham. In his time in this role, he was caretaker manager after the sacking of Glenn Hoddle.

After this time, he focussed mainly on his role as a co-commentator on both TV and on Radio 5 live, but in 2006 was appointed as a football advisor to Colin Calderwood at Nottingham Forest, returning after 44 years to his first club. This was a short lived role, following criticism from several quarters, and in 2008 he took on another advisory role with Spanish side Marbella.

He continues to commentate on Radio 5 and in 2011 was appointed as ESPN chief co-commentator. David has a fantastic footballing history and all at The Boro' wish him well

Luton Town first entered the FA Cup in 1885, the same year as their formation. On 31 October they traveled to Marlow and were defeated 3-0.

Their first FA Cup victory came three years later when they beat Reading 4-0. Luton briefly played in the Football League between 1897 and 1900 and during this time they lost twice to non-League clubs, Tottenham Hotspur and Queens Park Rangers. Back in the Southern League they had two victories against league clubs. Gainsborough Trinity in 1907 and Coventry City in 1920 following which Luton Town became founder members of the Football

A record FA NOTTINGHAM FOREST Cup 9-0 victory against Clapton in 1927 was quickly followed by a record 7-0 defeat by Crystal Palace in 1929. Luton's finest hour in the FA Cup came in 1959 when, after victories against Leeds United, Leicester City. Ipswich Town, Blackpool and Norwich City, they faced Nottingham Forest in their only FA Cup final appearance with both clubs making their Wembley debut. Luton conceded twice to Forest in the first 15 minutes. Roy Dwight, Elton John's cousin, scoring the first before breaking his leg. With Forest down to 10 men Luton

with a nod of the head as I couldn't speak at the time.








half-time lead.



Nuneaton Borough were just seconds away from a famous giant-killing at a soaked Vetch Field when they were stunned by a desperate last-gasp equaliser.

Referee John Holbrook made several pitch inspections before giving the match the go-ahead. But continued rain throughout the game left areas of the pitch under water and he must have been moments when the official wondered if he had made the right decision.

The home side settled first and cut out most of the early play but were reduced to trying long-range shoots as a disciplined Boro' got men behind the ball at the first hint of danger, though Shaun Chapple clipped the top of the visitors crossbar midway through the half. It was the non-league side who began to adapt to the treacherous conditions during the second-half, finding gaps in the home defense with both Tony Simpson and Darren Bullock threatening to break the deadlock.

Simpson was especially unlucky when he saw a goal-bound shot cannon off the heels of keeper Roger Freestone as he dived the wrong way.

But just sixty seconds later the diminutive midfielder was celebrating a 79th minute opener.

Collecting a throw-in in the far corner, Simmo turned past two defenders and jinked his way

into the penalty area, evading the desperate lunges of two more defenders before firing across a low ball which Mick



Shearer, on the pitch for just 12 minutes, bundled the ball home to send the 1,500 travelling fans into delirium.

It looked enough to settle the contest but with the game already two minutes into stoppage time, Chappell fired in cross for Steve Torpey to head

past a despairing Richard Attwood.

interest of First Division clubs.

Old Boys Do Well - Mr. David Pleat became manager of Luton in the Spring of 1978, seven years after his managerial baptism with Boro'. Mr. Pleat left Nuneaton in September 1973, and in 1975 joined Luton for a second time in ten years, this time as coach, and then staying at Luton as manager in preference to leaving with Harry Haslam to Sheffield United. On October 16th, 1972 for a Southern League game at Chelmsford, David introduced a 17-year-old full-back to our first team. In his programme notes for the following home game he wrote, "Last week I signed young Kirk Stephens as a professional after seeing him perform consistently well in our Youth side. Provided Kirk can adapt to the professional game there is no reason why he should not make the grade." In the Spring of 1978 David Pleat signed Kirk for a second time in what Luton describe as one of the best deals they have ever done.

It looks like Bill either turned down 'Alf's' offer, or was unable to do so, as he is not listed amongst the Boro' line-up in a match that saw Wolves 'A' win 1-0.

HEROES EGENDS

CHRIS MACKENZIE



Goalkeeper Chris was born in Northampton on 17 May 1972 and began his career in 1983 with Corby Town making 47 appearances before, in 1994, moving on to Hereford United. Whilst at Hereford, Chris made 60 appearances and even got his name on the scoresheet on the opening day of the 1995-96 season against Barnet.

Further moves took him to Rushden and Diamonds on loan and, in 1998. Leyton Orient for whom he made 26 appearances. His next move, in 1999, was to Manor Park where he would distinguish himself for 153 appearances - earning himself a 'saveof-the-round' award for his fantastic tip over the bar seconds after

Boro' had taken a First Round Replay lead against Stoke City live on Sky in 2000.

MacKenzie moved to Telford United in 2003 where he was loaned out a year later back to his old stomping ground of Hereford. A move to Chester City followed in 2004 were he made 54 appearances before a move to Shrewsbury Town where he appeared at Wembley in the League Two play-off final against Bristol Rovers.

Kidderminster were next to benefit from his services before, in 2008, Chris signed for Hinckley United where he would rack up 97 appearances before a successful season at Alfreton where he helped them gain promotion to the Blue Square Premier. He returned to his first club, Corby Town, in 2011for one last hurrah before retirement

FOREST GREEN ROVERS

Forest Green play at the 2006 built New Lawn Stadium, in the Cotswold village of Nailsworth, with a capacity of 5140, including 2500 seats. This location is at the top of one of the steepest hills in English football, so good luck to anyone who goes for food or a pint at the bottom and attempts to walk to the ground afterwards. Give yourself plenty of time!

For segregated games, which it is expected ours will be, away fans are housed in the EESI stand at one end of the ground. This is a covered, all seated stand which can hold up to 500 Nuneaton fans. If a larger following is expected, part of the uncovered terrace at one side of the ground can also be opened to visiting fans.

The cost of entrance for away fans is £16 for adults, £12 for over 65's. £8 for students, and £5 for Under 16's. A matchday programme will cost £2.50.

PUBS

The suggested pub for away fans on the football ground guide is the clubs own bar, The Green Man. which is built into the back of the main stand.

For those looking to explore a



little further, Nailsworth Village is approximately 15 minutes walk away at the bottom of the earlier mentioned large hill. The Village Inn is recommended, and is listed in the Camra Good Beer Guide.



This pub is also home to The Nailsworth Brewery.

FOOD

If you are looking for a Meat Pie, Beef Burger or Hot Dog to buy inside the ground, then you will be disappointed. as the Club has decided not to sell any meat products.
