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MILLWALL ruthlessly

destroyed the Luton fairytale yesterday to cruise through to the quarter-final of the FA Cup.

Non-League Town hoped to upset the odds when the Championship side visited

Kenilworth Road. But, inspired by a brilliant display from James Henry, Millwall ran out easy win-ners to make the last eight for the first time since they

reached the final in 2004 Henry tormented the home side from the start and it came as no surprise when he opened the scoring after only 12 minutes.

The midfielder took advantage of an error by Luton defender Janos Kovacs, who appeared to be asleep as a long ball was punted into the box.

Henry nipped in behind Kovacs and then rounded the keeper Mark Tyler before coolly slotting the

ball into the net. And the former Reading star's deep cross set up the visitors' second goal – although Rob Hulse must be given huge credit for a sublime finish.

Hulse appeared to mis-time his header, but recovered to hook the ball over Tyler from a seemingly impossible

angle.

The Hatters went into the game losing streak, with their ourth-round victory over Norwich-thefirstnon-League side to defeat a Premier League team - the last time

they tasted victory. They could have got back into the match, had Millwall keeper David Forde not been in such brilliant form.

The stopper twice denied Andre Gray - first at the near post and then by rushing out of his goal to make a brave

second half. One of his fluffed chances must go down as one of the misses of the season - a free header in front of goal, which he inexplicably put wide of the goal.
It came as no surprise when

sub Dany N'Guessan added a third just before the end following up to stroke the ball home after Tyler had parried John Marquis' shot.

Millwall have been in a bad a run of form, failing to win since they progressed past Aston Villa 2-1, with losses in the league coming against Barnsley, Hull and Blackpool.

But yesterday they showed their boss they had the ability not only to get into the play-offs, but also to repeat the heroics of Denis Wise's boys eight years ago.
