



BUCKLE

Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for today's eagerly-anticipated FA Cup fifth round tie with Millwall.

Since my notes last Saturday we continued our brilliant home record with a deserved point against Forest Green Rovers.

That made it eight games and three months without a defeat at Kenilworth Road which is a fine achievement by the players.

It was a match we should have won. We missed a penalty and were the better team for the whole of the 90 minutes, including a spell in the second half in which we were down to 10 men. In the end, despite our dominance, it wasn't to be.

Effect

We followed that up with a defeat to Dartford on Tuesday night. A question I have been asked a lot recently has been, "has the FA Cup run had an effect on league performances?"

The answer is I don't honestly know. What I do know is that we have been good enough to beat Championship and Premier League clubs.

I certainly don't blame the wins over Wolves and Norwich for defeats to Barrow and Dartford, although it is interesting to see that a number of other clubs who have done well in the cup have also had mixed results.

Cup run

Our cup run so far has been one helluva journey and the players must take all of the plaudits for their performances in the cup competition this season.

We have earned the right to be on this stage with a chance to make history and reach the quarter-finals.

Of course promotion is our number one priority. I know that, and the staff and the players know that, too. However, the fact remains the FA Cup is of huge importance to us.

That's why we took 4,000 supporters to Norwich, had 10,000 here for Wolves and have sold out for today's game.

We could not have got to this stage of the competition without your backing but equally we could have not got this far without the brilliance of the squad and the staff.

We know we let ourselves down in the games against Barrow and Dartford and we'll be working hard to make sure we bounce back from those disappointments.

One thing for sure is that we haven't ridden our luck in the competition. Our results against Cambridge, Nuneaton, Dorchester, Wolves and Norwich justify that. We've beaten teams when we are the favourites and we've seen off teams when we have been the underdogs.

Beauty

That's the beauty of the FA Cup. From beating a team a league below us, to triumphing spectacularly at the home of a Premier League team, we have come this far and our achievements have helped put the club back on the map. It is also something to make us all very proud.


Once this afternoon is over it will be back to the league with a trip to Macclesfield to focus on. There will be 18 league matches to play and we will be doing everything in our power to make sure we have a season to remember.

Myself, the players and my staff are well aware of the frustrations of the recent league defeats but I want you all to know that promotion from this league is our objective.

We can't turn our back on the FA Cup – after all, we have a chance to make history this afternoon so let's embrace it.

FROM THE

BOARDROOM

WITH CHAIRMAN NICK OWEN



Good afternoon everyone and welcome to this very special occasion here at Kenilworth Road.

A particular welcome to the players, directors and supporters of Millwall, as we play host to a Championship side for the second time in six weeks.

Would you have believed

when we were attempting to qualify for the FA Cup proper back in October that some four months later we'd be standing a mere 90 minutes away from a possible place in the quarter-finals? The last eight of a competition that features some of the very top teams in Europe.

Our FA Cup campaign has been little short of sensational, culminating in that magnificent win against Premier League opposition at Norwich. I am sure you feel as proud as I do of our exploits so far and basked in the glittering profile it has given Luton Town.

I appreciate that promotion is our priority, of course, but football isn't just about whole seasons. It is also about great days, epic confrontations, heroic moments and inspirational results.

I am sure our matches against Wolves and Norwich will live long in the memory for young and old supporters alike

I know our league form has been dismal of late and we are all very conscious of that, including the players who were gutted after Dartford, but let's put all that aside today and seize the moment, as we urge the side onto greater glory in the FA Cup.

Maritime celebrations

You may have gathered I was away when we played Norwich. Dear, oh dear – what timing! I was actually in the middle of the Caribbean Sea when I was keeping up to date with the score through my three boys - Andy, Tim and Chris - who were at Carrow Road, and through intermittent bulletins via satellite on Sky Sports.

It was weird hearing Jeff Stelling and company berating me for being away at such a major moment in our season. Well, it was agony for me, I can assure you, but it was a commitment I couldn't change. Take it from me, the maritime celebrations went on long into the night!

I have very personal memories of our infamous cup tie against Millwall in March 1985. I was sitting alongside our manager of the time David Pleat when crowd trouble flared, as fans invaded the pitch and ultimately caused devastation in the ground, and later in the town itself.

David was understandably devastated, as we all were, despite the fact we had won the game and made it through to the semi-finals against Everton.

I turned up for work at TVam at 3.45am the next morning to discover that the riot had made headline news around the world.

The pictures were horrifying.

My main guest that morning? None other than David Pleat, who spoke of the highly charged atmosphere before and during the match and how he felt the game of football was the loser.

"The whole night was unreal," he said. "How players played to such a standard with all that provocation and mayhem around them, I just don't know."

Consigned to history

It's estimated an extra 2,000 people broke into the stadium that night, 31 police officers were injured and the game had to be stopped for nearly half an hour.

It led to a ban on away fans at Kenilworth Road and the introduction of a membership scheme, which was dropped some years later.

Football is a much safer place to be these days and those dreadful scenes are very much consigned to history.

So let's look ahead to a typically exciting FA Cuptie this afternoon against a Millwall side that's beaten Premier League Aston Villa to get here today and has scored more goals on the road this season in the Championship than at home. Be warned!

Let's make this another day to remember with pride in the history of Luten Town. Enjoy it, bye for now.



It seems a long time ago that we began our
FA Cup campaign with an excellent win in
the fourth qualifying round at Cambridge
United back in October.

Pressure

A lot of people were a little underwhelmed by our third round draw with Wolves but we certainly weren't because we knew that they would be coming to Kenilworth Road under pressure to get a result.

That win capped a great day for the club and we didn't envisage it getting any better when we went to Norwich but we achieved an incredible result and wrote our name in the history books.

Looking back on our results in the FA Cup this season it shows that we haven't had it easy. To beat Wolves and Norwich without conceding a goal are magnificent achievements and as a group of players we are very proud of our efforts.

It goes to show what we are capable of, too. Our league performances have been bitterly disappointing, yet I can't think of a reason why we can win at a Premier League team one week and lose to a team in the bottom four of the Blue Square Bet Premier the next.

Highs and lows

It really has been a season full of highs and lows. I don't think anybody gave us a chance of winning at Norwich but we did. I guess that's football for you.

After the disappointment of Dartford we host Millwall and again, like the Wolves and Norwich ties before, we are confident of creating another new chapter of history.

It would be an amazing feat if we were to get to the quarter-finals but we realise our visitors today won't want to be knocked out either.

Throughout this cup run – and indeed throughout the season so far – we have been extremely lucky to have your support with us.

It's an over-used cliché, but – especially in the Wolves and Norwich matches – your backing was like having a 12th man.

The noise inside Kenilworth Road and at Carrow Road was unreal and I am sure that without your support we quite simply wouldn't have won either game.

It's going to be an incredible atmosphere once more at Kenilworth Road today so get behind us and let's together, try and make history for the second time.

Enjoy the game.


So keep an eye for news of these boys in the years to come - you might be supporting them on the pitch just as you support getting them on the TIPS programme every time you visit Luton Subways!





Despite the lack of recent meetings it is a tie that is steeped in history and has produced some scintillating matches. The last four meetings have been split down the middle as Millwall boast one victory in comparison to the Hatters one and two draws.

Away from Kenilworth Road it is the Lions who maintain a dominant stance on proceedings with 21 wins from 40 clashes outside Bedfordshire but at Kenilworth Road the fixture is turned on its head. The Hatters have won 13 of the 38 meetings on the Town turf with the Lions leaving victorious only 10 times.

This afternoon comes as a welcome distraction for both sides faltering in their league ambitions and the Kenny Jackett's men head into the tie on the back of three defeats. Barnsley cut the Lions' FA Cup honeymoon short after they faced off just four days after their triumph over Villa.

Hull and Blackpool then also highlighted Millwall's frailties to ensue three back-to-back defeats in which the Lions have notched just the one goal.


Chris Wood and Darius Henderson were responsible for the Lions attacking roar prior to the transfer window but their departures have left a hole in the forefront of attack. Former Wolves hit man Andy Keogh has stepped up in an attempt to take hold of the mantle, as have recent acquisitions Benik Afobe and Rob Hulse dropping.

Millwall have come through two tricky ties to seal this afternoon's visit with a last gasp winner from John Marquis enough to see off Aston Villa.

The Lions though are no strangers to getting this far in the FA Cup competition and have hurdled this stage in the very recent past. In 2004 a Millwall team including Tim Cahill, Neil Harris, David Livermore and player-manager Dennis Wise made it to the FA Cup final against Manchester United after overcoming Sunderland in the semi-final.

Over 70,000 crammed into the Millennium Stadium in Wales to see the final but there was to be no fairytale ending for the Lions as Cristiano Ronaldo started off a routine United win. A brace from Ruud van Nistelrooy followed to ensure United claimed the trophy.

Millwall's achievement of reaching the final won them a place in the UEFA Cup the following season despite them being in the second tier of English football.

Now in with the Football League clubs, the Hatters





THIRD ROUND



Championship Wolves were paired with the Town at Kenilworth Road and, in front of a sell-out crowd, a goal from Lawless in the first minute of the second half was enough to secure victory and

with it a place in the fourth round. Lawless' strike was enough to earn him the Player of the Round award too. Millwall, meanwhile, progressed to the fourth round

with a 1-0 victory of their own.

A solitary strike from Liam Feeney was enough for Kenny Jackett's side to beat League One side Millwall at the New Den.

FOURTH ROUND



As you'll read no doubt throughout today's programme, the Town won the hearts of the nation with an enthralling and history-making feat in the fourth round thanks to a 1-0 win over Premier League Norwich City at Carrow Road.

Again it was that man Rendell with the winner – his fourth goal in the competition this season.

It was a goal that earned the Town the plaudits of the national and international media and was enough to win Paul Buckle the Performance of the Week award and Rendell the Player of the Round award – the third Hatters man to win the prize this season.

There were plenty of shocks in the fourth round, and Millwall were at it as well.

Jackett's side disposed of Premier League strugglers Aston Villa at the New Den.

The Lions inflicted more woe on a Villa side still reeling from their League Cup semi-final exit to League Two Bradford, and a last-minute winner from John Marquis earned a 2-1 win.

Darren Bent had put the Villans ahead before defender Danny Shittu equalised.

WHAT WOULD YOU PREFER - FA CUP PROGRESSION OR A LATE PLAY-OFF CHARGE?


Play-Offs. I'd like our season to go to the wire. We are in February and chasing both - it could be a long season after this game if we get to the quarter-finals.

CAMPAIGNS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS SELECTS 10 POST-WAR MILLWALL CLASSIC CAMPAIGNS

1961/62

Peter Burridge and Dave Jones scored 45 goals between them as Millwall won the Fourth Division title in 1961/62. Ron Gray's side lost their first two games but soared up the table with five wins in six matches including a 5-0 demolition of Workington. John Gilchrist displaced former England right-back Tommy Garrett and new signings included Terry McQuade from Enfield and Pat Terry from Northampton as the Lions maintained their challenge. Joe Broadfoot scored twice as Millwall beat title rivals Colchester 2-0 and they clinched promotion with a 5-1 win at Darlington, then won the title with a 2-2 draw at Barrow.

1964/65

Millwall regained Third Division status at the first attempt under Billy Gray in 1964/65. The Lions were unbeaten in their opening six games and left-back Harry Cripps replaced the injured Bryan Snowdon as captain. Millwall went top of the table after a 3-0 win over Bradford City in October and Len Julians grabbed a hattrick in 5-1 victory over Halifax. The Lions also slammed five goals past Barrow and Aldershot as well as beating Fulham in an FA Cup third round replay. Goalkeeper Alex Stepney was ever-present and Hugh Curran leading marksman as Millwall were undefeated in their last 15 matches and finished runners-up.

1965/66

Len Julians netted 22 goals as Millwall won promotion for the second consecutive season in 1965/66. New signing George Jacks became the club's first-ever substitute in the 2-0 win over Workington on the opening day and the Lions raced to the top of the Third Division with just one defeat in their first 12 games. They lost 1-0 at title rivals Hull City watched by 40,231 shortly before Hugh Curran joined Norwich and Eamon Dunphy arrived from York. John Gilchrist was ever-present as Millwall were unbeaten at The Den for the second consecutive season and finished runners-up before Benny Fenton replaced Billy Gray as manager.

1971/72


Millwall narrowly failed to win promotion to the top flight under Benny Fenton in 1971/72. The Lions were unbeaten in their first 12 Second Division games and Derek Smethurst arrived from Chelsea. They overcame a 1-0 defeat at Middlesbrough to beat promotion rivals Norwich 2-1 and Birmingham 3-0, going top with a 2-2 draw at home to Swindon. Millwall were undefeated at home that season but just one win in their last six away games enabled Birmingham to pip them to the runners-up slot. Gordon Bolland, Barry Bridges, Bryan Brown, Dennis Burnett, Alan Dorney, Bryan King and Barry Kitchener were ever-present.

1975/76

New manager Gordon Jago guided Millwall back to the Second Division at the first attempt in 1975/76. Bryan King and Brian Clark moved to Coventry and Cardiff respectively and Trevor Lee and Phil Walker were signed from Epsom & Ewell in September. Winger Gordon Hill was sold to Manchester United and Millwall's sole win in 12 games was a 2-1 victory over rivals Crystal Palace. New signings Chris McGrath from Spurs and John Seasman from Luton starred as the Lions remained unbeaten in their last 15 matches. They finished third after a nail-biting climax when Crystal Palace failed to win any of their games in hand.

1984/85

Steve Lovell scored 20 times as Millwall won promotion in their 1984/85 centenary season. The Lions raced to the top of the Third Division with just two defeats in their first 15 matches and Steve Lovell netted in 11 successive games. John Fashanu and Paul Hinshelwood were signed from Lincoln and Oxford United respectively, helping Millwall to reach the FA Cup sixth round before losing 1-0 at Luton in a match overshadowed by crowd trouble. They gained six straight victories without conceding a goal and were unbeaten in their last eight games, clinching promotion as runners-up with a 2-0 win at home to Plymouth.



1987/88

Teddy Sheringham and Tony Cascarino netted 42 goals between them as Millwall won the Second Division title in 1987/88. Cascarino and George Lawrence scored on their home debuts as they beat Barnsley 3-1, then Kevin O'Callaghan marked his return with the winner against Ipswich. Jimmy Carter secured a regular first-team slot and the 2-1 triumph at Aston Villa heralded five straight wins, with Cascarino grabbing a hat-trick in a 3-1 victory over Leeds. Teddy Sheringham scored three goals in a 4-1 win at West Brom and Millwall clinched promotion to the top flight for the first time with a 1-0 victory at Hull City.

1990/9

Bruce Rioch guided Millwall to the Second Division play-offs in 1990/91. The Lions remained unbeaten in their first nine games, with Teddy Sheringham netting a hat-trick in a 4-1 victory at home to West Brom. Promotion hopes were hit by a run of eight matches without a win and Jimmy Carter moved to Liverpool in January. Teddy Sheringham scored four goals in a 4-1 victory over Plymouth, then grabbed hat-tricks against Charlton and Bristol City as Millwall finished fifth and qualified for the play-offs for the first time. Ace marksman Sheringham netted 33 goals that season and joined Nottingham Forest during the summer.

2000/01

Neil Harris scored 27 goals as Millwall won the Second Division title in 2000/01. The Lions were early leaders after winning their first two matches, then Neil Harris netted a hat-trick in a 5-0 demolition of Oxford United. Paul Ifill secured a regular first-team slot, while Sean Dyche and Richard Sadlier returned from injury. Millwall went top after Tim Cahill's goal clinched a 1-0 win at Oldham in November and remained in pole position with Neil Harris scoring hat-tricks against Colchester and Reading. Loan striker Steve Claridge helped Millwall to five straight wins, clinching the title with a 5-0 victory over Oldham.

2003/04

Millwall were FA Cup finalists for the first time in 2003/04. The Lions were unbeaten in their opening five First Division games and Peter Sweeney and Marvin Elliott secured regular first-team slots before Dennis Wise replaced Mark McGhee as playermanager in December. Danny Dichio and Andy Marshall arrived from West Brom and Ipswich respectively and Darren Ward was ever-present as Millwall challenged strongly for the Play-Offs until distracted by the epic FA Cup run. The Lions defeated Walsall 2-1, Telford 2-0, Burnley 1-0, Tranmere 2-1 and Sunderland 1-0 before losing 3-0 to Manchester United in the final.

MEMORABLE MATCHES

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH LOOKS BACK ON A GAME TO REMEMBER BETWEEN THE TOWN AND THE LIONS

HATTERS ROCK DOCKLAND

Having seen off Peterborough in a seven-goal thriller in a first round League Cup tie in August 1969 the Town soon learnt that their next opponents would be Millwall from Division Two (now the Championship).


The Hatters, still smarting from their narrow failure to win promotion from Division Three (now League One) the previous season, had started the new campaign as if they meant business and had unearthed a new diamond in teenage full-back, converted to striker, Malcolm Macdonald.

By the time of the clash with the Lions, the Town were clear leaders of Division Three and the opportunity was there to see how they would fare should they win promotion, with Millwall sure to prove a tough test for the resurgent Hatters. Millwall had not started the season well and had only two draws to show from six starts but boasted a side that was far better than its league position suggested.

A crowd of 17,372 turned up at Kenilworth Road to see Millwall take the lead from their first proper attack in the fifth minute. A bewildering short passing move involving Derek Possee, Keith Weller and Billy Neil ended with Possee clipping the ball past Tony Read in the Luton goal.

The Hatters fought back almost immediately with Macdonald latching on to a through pass from skipper Mike Keen before speeding past two defenders and

smacking the ball past Bryan King in the Millwall goal. From then on the Town took the game by the scruff of the neck and, roared on by the crowd, had the Lions defence reeling.

With the obvious instruction to play the ball to Macdonald at every opportunity, passes rained in from the educated feet of Keen, the clever wing play of French and the intelligent lay-offs from Laurie Sheffield.

The second goal was not long in coming and, after French was fouled out on the right, a perfect free-kick from John Collins was floated beyond the far post to Sheffield who headed in off the underside of the crossbar from a narrow angle.

Exciting

Millwall, concerned by their plight, brought on ex-West ham forward Brian Dear in place of Eamonn Dunphy and decided to go all out for an equaliser which made an already breathless game even more exciting.

The goal that Millwall gambled on came just after the hour mark when Terry Branston hit a poor clearance straight to Weller. The ex-Tottenham forward cut between two Luton defenders before shooting into the top corner from 25 yards. After this, the game could have gone either way but the eventual draw was a fair result. The Lions were obviously confident that a draw was to be the outcome as they had arrived at Kenilworth Road with tickets for the replay!

"The first half display was the best I have seen from the players since I became manager here," said Town boss Alec Stock afterwards. This was to be my first visit to the Den and I was immediately struck by the atmosphere generated by the crowd of 14,125.

The Town players were, however, made of sterner stuff than I, and refused to be intimidated by the noise and took the game to the Lions in another enthralling contest.

Chances came at both ends with Keen bending the crossbar with a 25-yard shot and Dear seeing a rocket shot saved by Sandy Davie who was called up at short notice to replace the injured Tony Read.

Final whistle

The game finished scoreless after 90 minutes and as extra-time was drawing to a close Millwall were awarded an indirect free-kick just outside the area for Jack Bannister's obstruction of Brian Brown. Weller took the kick and arrowed a shot through at least a dozen players into the net but his celebrations were short-lived as the ball, amazingly, had not touched anyone on the way through.

Referee Gordon Hill quite rightly awarded a goal-kick which Davie played out to Keith Allen on the right.

Allen looked up to see both Sheffield and Macdonald advancing on the Millwall goal and slung over a long cross from 40 yards out.

The cross skewed off the outside of his boot and sailed over the head of King for a rather fortunate goal. Three minutes later the final whistle sounded and the triumphant players trooped off to hear Allen swear that he meant it to be a shot!



HISTORY MAKERS

The Hatters created history and earned a place in the fifth round of the FA Cup after a sensational 1-0 win over Premier League Norwich City thanks to a late Scott Rendell strike – the first time a non-league side had ever beaten a Premier League club.

A tireless, hard-fought performance from the Hatters brought about its rewards as Rendell slammed home with 10 minutes remaining to send the 4,000 travelling Hatters fans into unencumbered ecstasy.

It was no more than the Town deserved, swept along by the hordes in the away end. There were heroes all over the pitch, and on the bench – indeed three of the second-half substitutes made by Paul Buckle combined for the winner.

Norwich, 85 places above the Hatters in the league ladder, showed nine changes from their previous Premier League fixture, and the gap between to the two clubs was barely evident in a first half in which the Town more than matched the Canaries.

That's not to say the hosts hadn't threatened, however, but it took until the midway point in the first half for Chris Hughton's side to go close when Andrew Surman's shot was cleared by Greg Taylor after Harry Kane's first effort had been parried by Mark Tyler.

Tyler also thwarted a Simeon Jackson shot before the goalkeeper had a team-mate to thank for preventing Norwich taking the lead shortly before the break. Third round hero Alex Lawless was in the right place at the right time to hack a header from ex-Hatter Leon Barnett off the line.

Frustrated that his side had failed to make the Town sweat, Hughton sent club captain Grant Holt on at half-time but the substitution did not immediately lift the Canaries.

The top-flight outfit were playing with a distinct lack of urgency which began to eat away at the home faithful in the sell-out crowd, whilst giving the Hatters cause for optimism.

But Holt's introduction almost paid dividends on 54 minutes when Surman's lofted ball to the back post was met by the head of the centre-forward but Tyler stood up the effort magnificently to paw the ball away to safety.

It was a fantastic stop and all of a sudden the Hatters and their followers could sense the tide turning as Norwich's frustration heightened.

Jon Shaw fired a shot over the top on his left foot then Buckle brought on JJ O'Donnell for Arnaud Mendy on 67 minutes before Shaw and Andre Gray made way for Stuart Fleetwood and Rendell.

By now the confidence was with the Town and Alex Lawless went mighty close when volleying wide on the stretch following Rendell's pass.

Many would have thought that was the best chance the Town could hope for but, with 10 minutes left, the unthinkable happened.

Fleetwood played a terrific searching ball down the left for O'Donnell to hunt down. Rendell did the same, darting into the six-yard box, telling O'Donnell where to play the perfect pass.

As quick as a flash O'Donnell's low cross was met by the boot of Rendell and the ball flew into the back of net. Cue delirium in the away end.


Ahead, the Town needed to settle down to protect their lead. The minutes agonisingly ticked by, but Norwich couldn't raise themselves to force Tyler into another save and after seeing out injury time it was the Hatters left celebrating a famous win.

NEWS OF THE HATTERS' SENSATIONAL VICTORY OVER PREMIER LEAGUE NORWICH SOON **BECAME INTERNATIONAL NEWS.**

The story of the first non-league side to beat a club from the Premier League went global with pages in the New York Times, Spain's top-selling sports paper Marca, and Gazetta dello Sport in Italy all mentioning the Hatters' unbelievable feat at Carrow Road.

International news agencies were quick to pick up the news from Norwich and soon websites in all corners of the globe - from Australia, the middle east and Africa - were explaining to their readers just how a team from England's fifth division upset the odds to record a famous victory against a top-flight side in their own back yard.

Closer to home, the national newspapers have heralded the Hatters' achievement, with several pages of column inches and photographs of the jubilant players plastered across the Sunday and Monday papers.

The attention wasn't confined to the written media, either, with the Hatters' feat the leading story on Sky Sports News all of Saturday evening, whilst on the radio, boss Paul Buckle, goalkeeper Mark Tyler and goal hero Scott Rendell were live on BBC Radio 5 Live within minutes of the final whistle.

BUCKLE

BOSS ON EPIC CUP VICTORY

Town boss Paul Buckle hailed a magnificent day in the club's history after his side became the first non-league club to knock a Premier League team out of the FA Cup.

Scott Rendell's goal 10 minutes from time allied with a superb rearguard action wrote the Hatters into the history books in front of 4,000 delirious supporters in the away end.

"It's an amazing day - magnificent," said Buckle, beaming to the masses of media afterwards. "After the Lincoln game was postponed we got straight down to work in preparing for Norwich.

Fully focused

"We came here fully focused, with the plan of playing with two banks of four and one striker dropping in. We needed to stop a Premier League team from scoring and we've done that.

"Sometimes in the dugout you can't see the whole game but I thought it was a great game to watch and we played our part.

"We weren't going to come here and sit back, there's no point. We denied them space and let their centrehalves have the ball.

"But we couldn't have done it without the supporters. When we came out for the warm-up they were singing and getting behind us.

"Then, mid-way through the second half, I think they could sense that we could do something - and we have, It's a wonderful day for this football club."

Goal hero

Buckle introduced goal hero Rendell with 15 minutes left with fellow striker Stuart Fleetwood and the manager paid tribute to the squad for earning their fifth round place.

"Andre and Jon Shaw were a bit leggy and both Stuart and Scott were desperate to get on. They are experienced players and on a good surface I fancied them to do something.

"I brought JJ on too as Arnaud Mendy had run himself into the ground, and he set the goal up and, as far as changes go, we got it right.



"The fact the three substitutes combined for the winner shows what unity we have in the squad; and it epitomised our team spirit."

After a result of such magnitude, Buckle was keen to emphasise the bigger picture.

"We need to use today," he said. "There's been so much disappointment for such a long time but we shouldn't dwell on the recent past.

Promotion

"We've got to keep believing and use this success to push us on. Getting promoted is the aim, that is massive for us.

"We know we can get Luton Town back to the Football League. It will happen, and it won't be long before we're back playing at more places like Carrow Road.

"It's been a great day but we deserve it.

"The players deserve all the plaudits because it was an unbelievable performance that will go down in history."

RENDELL

EVERYONE DESERVES CREDIT

Goal hero Scott Rendell believes the Town's 1-0 victory at Premier League Norwich was reward for the hard work by everyone at the club.

The 26-year-old striker ensured he and the Hatters were the talk of the national media after his goal 10 minutes from time sealed a historic victory at Carrow Road.

"This is what the FA Cup is all about," said Rendell, who had only been on the pitch for five minutes following his introduction as a substitute.

This win is for the fans

"Everyone at the club deserves the credit. We came with the right game plan and this win is for the fans, the staff, everybody behind the scenes at the club and the players. We all work our socks off – it's a great feeling."

Rendell's 75th-minute arrival along with strike partner

Stuart Fleetwood, who set fellow substitute JJ O'Donnell racing away down the left in the lead up to the goal, was the turning point.

"The manager picked the right team and made the right subs and right time," said the forward.

"Obviously you want to be out there but when you're called to come on you need to be fit and ready.

"You don't want to let anybody down when you come on as a sub. You need to have the right attitude and you need to be switched on. I haven't score too many goals in my career when I've come, but there's none more important than this one

"I remember Fleets slid in JJ and I looked up and thought I could get between the two Norwich defenders. I knew I had to get in front of one of them and knew if I did I'd have a chance. We've been working on that in training and luckily enough I did and it ended up in the back of the net.


"The final few minutes were agony. I looked up at the clock and it read 88 minutes. A couple of phases of play later and it was only 89!"

Match-winner

A place in the fifth round tie with Millwall awaits and the match-winner was bullish about the Town's chances of reaching the guarter-finals.

He said: "I'm sure a lot of teams will look at this result and take us seriously.

"Not many sides will want to come to Kenilworth Road, but the same goes for playing away because we've come to a Premier League club won, and kept a clean sheet."

TYLER

Emotional goalkeeper Mark Tyler hailed an "unbelievable" day as he helped the Town earn one of the greatest shocks in the FA Cup against the club he supported as a boy.

The 35-year-old stopper made two excellent saves either side of half-time and, for a player who was released by the Canaries as a teenager, it was a day to savour.

Unbelievable

"It's an unbelievable day," said the Hatters' number one. "This is where it all started for me. It's where I wanted to be as a little boy playing football so to come back here and keep a clean sheet means the world to me and my family who were all here.

"The boys in front of me were brilliant to limit Norwich to two chances. We had a game plan, they had a lot of possession but we were solid and they couldn't break us down. We countered in the second half and the substitutes made an impact.

Wuietly confident

"We were quietly confident, we knew Norwich weren't on the best of runs and I think we're hard to play against and playing with confidence."

Tyler was modest, however, when recalling his heroics to repel efforts from City strikers Simeon



And, yes. I may have posted some 'archive' on Facebook, just to make sure my friends were aware of the context of the last couple of seasons.



SPOILS SHARED

His team might not have won all three points but manager Paul Buckle was a lot happier than he was after the defeat at Barrow.

The Hatters had to settle for a point against promotion rivals Forest Green but it could have been all three had Andre Gray not missed a first-half penalty.

Gray had earlier put the Town ahead with a fifthminute header before Rovers replied with a header of their own through Matt Taylor.

However, having been reduced to 10 men following the second-half dismissal of Alex Lawless, the Hatters had the better of the chances and the manager was pleased with his team's overall display.

"I'm a lot happier than I was last week – at Barrow I was disappointed and hurt," the boss told Hatters Player afterwards. "There was no fight and we didn't create anything last week, but we did and had it in abundance.

"It's a big disappointment we haven't won the game but I can't stand here and say we didn't lack effort or didn't create chances today because we did.

"There were some big moments that didn't go our way but we've drawn and now we've got to kick on and win our games in hand."

The Town had the lead inside five minutes thanks to Gray's header from a left-wing cross by home debutant Dave Martin.

"It was the perfect start," said Buckle. "That was the gameplan as we knew they were susceptible in wide areas. "It was a good cross and we got our rewards but we then get tugged back by their equaliser from

a set-piece. But to the players' credit they didn't drop their heads and we created a lot of good chances."

Gray admitted he was successfully practising penalties on Friday after training and the manager refused to point the blame on his young striker for the miss. "I can't criticise Andre because he was putting the effort in training," he said." He scored earlier in the game so he's high on confidence. However, he's got right underneath it, he's leaning back and I couldn't believe my eyes how far back in the stand it went."

The Town's afternoon looked to have taken a turn for the worse when Lawless was sent-off for a second bookable offence having been yellow carded less than a minute before

And the manager thought the decision to show a second yellow card was harsh. "I don't think it was a sending off," Buckle said. "If it was a bad tackle then I would stand here and say so but he's shoulder to shoulder with their player, he's nudged him and he's gone down. Nobody expected a red card but even with 10 men I thought we were going to score a winner.


"I thought there was only one winner in the last 25 minutes and I genuinely thought we would score. In the two games we've played against Forest Green I don't think they've hurt us so it's frustrating we couldn't get the win because we've been playing so well at home.



FRUSTRATION ALL ROUND

There was a lot of disappointment in the home dressing room after the Town's 1-1 draw against Forest Green but still a confidence that success in the Blue Square Bet Premier can be achieved.

Conceding the equaliser from a set-piece was hard to swallow for Steve McNulty who admitted he had some rare pre-match nerves prior to his home debut in front of the Kenilworth Road faithful.

"I don't usually get nervous but there were a few in the hotel beforehand," the 29-year-old told Hatters Player afterwards.

"I've never got nervous before a football match but perhaps it was just nervous excitement, to make my home debut in front of 6,500 Luton supporters.

"They were great and one of the reasons why I came here. The appeal of the club is massive and I've come here to be a success, it's just frustrating we couldn't

"I don't think Mark Tyler's had a have to make and obviously it's hugely disappointing to concede from a not-piece. We need to be dealing with that and stop conceding from these positions.

"We're happy that we restricted Forest Green but not happy with the goal. We looked comfortable for long spells and we're always confident we can score goals with the front players we have here."

Striker Andre Gray had put the Town ahead with a fifth-minute header but his joy turned to despair after he passed up the opportunity to add a second when hallooning a penalty high over the bar 10 minutes before the break.

"It could have won us the game," and the former Hinckley front man, "It's the first time I've taken a penalty in my nareer and probably the last now.

"It's frustrating to know I could have won it, especially as I don't think Forest Green really had a shot.

"We dominated possession and plenty of chances and it was good that we took the lead.


"Our game plan was to get the ball in wide areas and expose them and to score so early was great. The crosses were something we were working on in and after training and it was good to see the hard work


The result kept the Town behind Forest Green in the league table but Gray believes that can be turned around between now and the end of the season.


"We have three games in hand and we have to play a lot of top teams here at Kenilworth Road," said the 21-year-old. "It's not over.

"We need to find that winning mentality and kick on. We have the squad here capable of doing it but we need to get points on the board.


"We're going to be playing a lot of games between now and the end of the season and I still think winning the league is in our reach."

Town boss Paul Buckle admitted his side lacked quality on the night as they slipped to their second defeat in three league games at Dartford.

On the Hatters' first visit to Princes Park it looked an though both sides would share the spoils but the hosts, who had beaten the Town at Kenilworth Road outlier in the season, collected all three points when Ryan Hayes curled a fine effort into the top corner past Mark Tyler with 18 minutes left.

"We've lost to a really exceptional goal," said Buckle alterwards. "The game had 0-0 written all over it but overall our quality wasn't quite there.

"We came into the game positive, playing two strikers and two out-and-out wingers, and Scott Neilson and Dave Martin both saw a lot of the ball. Unfortunately the final ball let us down.

"It's never good losing in a Luton shirt – we know that. Where ever we go in the country we know the opposition are going to be up for it and Dartford really were.

"The Conference is about being dogged and staying in games and in the end we've been beaten by a good goal. We talked about their wingers coming off the touchline and cutting inside and that's what's

happened, which is disappointing. Jake Howells had shown their lad inside and he's put it away well.

"We came here to be positive, however, we're not going to go to Dartford and play pretty football – we cannot expect to wipe the floor with teams.

"However, if we're to get out of this division we need to come to a place like Dartford and get at least a point

"It was a slog on a difficult surface. They scored a good goal whilst we never found the right routes to goal."

Dartford shaded the first half with Mark Tyler making two excellent saves, firstly keeping out Paul Green's shot before stopping Nathan Collier's goal-bound attempt 10 minutes before the break.


Andre Gray hit the post as the first half drew to a close and despite dominating the second period it was the hosts that won it through Hayes' strike.



POST-MATCH DISAPPOINTMENT

Scott Neilson and Ronnie Henry were honest in their assessment of the defeat at Princes Park that left the Town six points off the Play-Off places.

Both spoke of the Hatters' need to learn quickly and that getting results if promotion was to be realised come the end of the season.

A frustrated Henry said: "It's not good enough, we know we have to be going to places like Dartford and uninding out results.

"They are a part-time team so for us to perform like we did is nowhere near good enough. We know we can't always play good football but we need to learn quick because if we don't we going to fall by the wayside.

"We're still conceding sloppy goals and now we're altruggling to score them which is very disappointing.

"We just have to be honest with ourselves, we can't just walk away from problems. We've got a lot experienced players in the squad that can help the younger lads but we need to improve to get out of this league.

"The league is our priority and always has been.

Beating Norwich should have given us confidence."

Neilson, who having played for Grimsby in the FA Cup already this term is cup-tied this afternoon, believes hard work will help the Hatters improve.

"We need to do something and quickly," said the winger, who impressed at Princes Park on the right flank. "We need to knuckle down and work hard because coming to Dartford and not even getting a point isn't good enough.

Priority

"I can't put my finger on what the problem is. It's certainly not because of players looking ahead to the Millwall game. I'm certainly not because I won't be involved. The league is our main priority so to come here and lose is hugely disappointing. For whatever reason, it isn't happening for us at the moment.

"The travelling fans want us to win three points but at the moment it seems getting a win is such hard work. We should be coming to Dartford and grinding out a result, go home and move onto the next game.

"We have a lot of games left, playing twice a week now. We need to be aiming for four points a week.


"You would think we would need a miracle to win the league now but we'll keep going."







THE RECORD

It's a mixed bag of results for the Town on this day in the history books. There have been just 11 games, four of which have been won, four that have ended all square and three that the Hatters have lost. The Towr have scored 19 and conceded 16. That's 35 goals all told, working out at an average of 3.18 goals per game.

LAST TIME OUT

Leicester City were the visitors to Kenilworth Road in a fifth round tie in 1974 and it was the top-flight Foxes that strolled into the quarter-finals after a fine 4-0 win before a crowd of 25,712. Come the end of the season, the Town were all smiles anyway: they had won promotion to Division One (now Premier League), finishing as runners-up to Middlesbrough.

LAST VICTORY

You have to go back 33 years since the Town last tasted success on this day. On that day the Hatters had an inspirational performance from winger David Moss to thank for a 4-0 thumping of Fulham at Kenilworth Road. Moss netted a first-half hat-trick to put the Town in control against the lowly Cottagers. Brian Stein added a fourth in the second half and the victory was enough to lift the Town to the top of the Second Division (now Championship). Unfortunately that was as good as it got as the Town failed to win their next seven games and ended the



FOUR OF THE BEST










And finally England C manager Paul Fairclough could do with a nice people carrier for all his England C graduates going on into the Football League.



PRE-ACADEMY DEVELOPMENT SQUAD UPDATE

Our main youth Academy has recently received recognition from the International Centre for Sports Studies.

A large part of our Academy's success lies in the fully integrated development structure at the club which starts with players as young as four years old, who simply 'pay and play' each week through to our Talent Identification Coaching Programme, or TIPS for short, for boys up to 16 years of age who train on our 10-week coaching programme. In total, over 20 of these centres run all year around through our development programme run by the club's Community Trust.

All of these boys, together with recruited boys, end their journey for an Academy place at our pre-Academy centre in Luton which currently has around 120 boys signed from Under-9 to Under-16.

Top tier

These squads – which have short term aims for boys development – is the top tier in the club's development structure below the Academy.

Tier 2 are our Centre of Excellence Centres in Luton and Dunstable with another 200 boys. These centres are all parent-funded, and the aim is to progress players to the Academy by replicating the coaching

syllabus and methods used by our academy coaches.

The pre-Academy boys train with the club twice a week and remain with their local club sides at the same time also playing around 10 games a season for the club against other professional clubs. The boys have already held fixtures with Charlton, Cambridge United, MK Dons and Spurs this season with Southend visiting next month.

These centres are the lifeblood of the club's Academy, and approximately eight out of every 10 boys signed full-time come through this system. This season already almost 50 boys from our development centres have played for the Academy.

EASYJET FREE SCHOOLS VISIT PROJECT





Thanks to continued support from our main club sponsor easyJet and the Conference Community Trust, our free schools visit project, which provides free curriculum time football coaching and PE lessons to all schools within Luton and Bedfordshire, goes from strength to strength. United City travelled to Stockport County knowing






