JOHN STILL

Good afternoon and welcome to Kenilworth Road for another important match in the Blue Square Bet Premier.

I'd also like to welcome our visitors from Tamworth, their manager Dale Belford, his players and staff and the directors and supporters of the Lambs.

This afternoon is our second home game in succession and I'm sure it will be very similar to the match with Stockport County on Tuesday night. Like all games in this league it will be tough. I just hope we can provide that little bit extra quality, determination and effort that will make the difference.

Victory

I felt we did that on Tuesday with our 1-0 win over Stockport. I felt it was a good performance but it should have been more comfortable. The pluses from the victory were of course winning but also keeping another clean sheet.

For me the only negative point was that we didn't convert as many chances as I would have liked. I felt we should have created more and subsequently we only scored the one goal which always invites pressure in the final few minutes. We need to be able kill teams off a lot earlier, but it is still early days.

However, football being football the three points were the most important thing.

After today's game we have another home game when Ebbsfleet visit Kenilworth Road on Tuesday night. We know that they are a team that will be fighting for everything as they go in search of the points required to stave off the threat of relegation. Whatever we do, though, we must not take anything for granted. All games are tough, especially against those teams who have something important to play for. The players will be made well aware of this.

Next Saturday we are away to Cambridge United, who have had a mixed season. I know the Cambridge team quite well and I have always enjoyed my trips to the Abbey Stadium as a manager, so I am very much looking forward to that particular game.

Back to today's match, though. Again you are likely to see a little tinker or two here or there with the team. It won't be massive chopping and changing but it is necessary.

The point of this exercise is to try and identify the players I feel can be a part of a squad that can help us get promotion out of this league. It's really, really important that I do that with the time and matches remaining this season.

It's also vital that I go out and watch players that I would like to bring to this football club. At the moment, because of our Saturday-Tuesday-Saturday schedule, I haven't been able to do that. This might mean that before the end of the season I sacrifice one or two games in order to go out and look at possible acquisitions for next season.

Thank you for your fine support of the team on Tuesday night.

The vocal encouragement shown since my arrival has been second to none, and it was great to get that first home win under my belt on Tuesday night.

As I said in my notes last week, getting behind the team is of huge importance to me. Your support can help players find that little extra per cent. And it's little increases in per cent that we might need. Remember it could be the difference between winning and losing.

Enjoy the game and see you on Tuesday.

FROM THE

BOARDROOM

WITH FINANCIAL DIRECTOR ROGER BANNISTER



Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road. We wish a very warm welcome to the officials, players and supporters of Tamworth at this, the last Saturday afternoon home league game of the season.

Since I last wrote my last programme notes there has been some tumultuous

happenings both on and off the pitch at Kenilworth Road.

On the pitch we experienced the excellent run to the fifth round of the FA Cup including tremendous wins against Wolves and, in particular, the win at Premier League club Norwich City, which has surely been the highlight of the season. Unfortunately we have endured a disappointing run in the Blue Square Bet Premier which makes it very hard – but not impossible – for us to qualify for the Play-Offs this season.

Meanwhile, matters off of the pitch have been equally turbulent with Paul Buckle leaving Luton Town for personal reasons. The status of the club has, however, enabled it to attract a very high calibre replacement in John Still. The board has every confidence that John will achieve success for the club, perhaps not instantly, but certainly in the medium-term. This has certainly been shown in the past six matches where the team have lost once and kept four clean sheets.

Hardest league?

The media and many footballing pundits often state the Championship is the hardest league in football to get out of and gain promotion to the Premier League.

Each season there is always at least 10 to 12 clubs vying for automatic promotion or elevation via the Play-Offs. And once you're out of the Premier League it seems to get increasingly harder to regain your status, as so many clubs have found in recent years.

Yet I would argue strongly that the press has got it wrong. Within the Blue Square Bet Premier, there are 13 former League clubs. Each of those clubs - their fans, directors and investors - believe they are in the wrong division and should be back in the Football League.

Looking at the league table it would seem that perhaps five or six teams (for reasons of their catchment area or fan base) belong at this level and that they have reached



their zenith. That leaves, potentially, 18 or 19 clubs who have high hopes at the beginning of each season.

The margin between success and failure is a very fine one, but I believe your club has a number of advantages.

It has in place an experienced, very able and committed team running the business side of the organisation, it has a number of committed investors and most importantly it has its supporter base.

Strengths and weaknesses

The new manager has won two, drawn three and lost just one of his first half dozen games and I would argue that nine points out of 18 is an excellent return while he assesses and gets to know the strengths and weaknesses of his squad. There will inevitably be changes in personnel during the close season but I sense a confidence and determination to succeed.

I offered the officials, players and supporters of Tamworth a warm welcome at the head of these notes but as soon as the whistle goes let's try and make it as hard as possible for them to leave Kenilworth Road with any points.

On a final note, it is a very special game for me today as my three year old grandson Ethan and his cousins Joe, eight, and Jake, seven, are mascots for the day. It is Ethan's first ever football match while Joe and Jake are old hands.

The last time we went to a match together was to see West Ham play Manchester United. Joe is a United fan (I blame his upbringing) and was terribly upset when the Hammers beat them 5-0. I think Jake was four years old at the time and sat under the boardroom table eating a bowl of chocolates.

Please give them and the other mascots a great theer of encouragement as, after all, they are the fans of the future.

Have an excellent afternoon, encourage the team noisily and I'm sure we will get our reward.



Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road once more. It's hard to believe that this is our final Saturday home fixture of the season.

We go into this important game with Tamworth looking to build on Tuesday night's 1-0 win over Stockport. It was a good, solid performance and won thanks to a great header from Steve McNulty. The lads were excellent, gave nothing away, and kept yet another clean sheet.

The Hyde game apart, we have made a promising start under the new manager. In the six games we have kept four clean sheets which is an impressive record, winning twice by 1-0 scorelines. I think I speak on behalf of everyone when I say I'd take nine more 1-0 wins between now and the end of the season.

We are still a million miles away from where he wants us to be but so far, so good. We're taking positive steps in the right direction and long may it continue.

This afternoon we host Tamworth, a side who will want to extinguish any fears of relegation with a



victory. The division this season has been frighteningly unpredictable so any win, or any point is vital. It's been a season where you cannot afford to look over your shoulder because by the time you do somebody has already over taken you. Take Kidderminster for example. Bottom of the table and without a win after 10 games and now look at them: top of the league and with an outstanding chance of promotion to the Football League.

It's frustrating for me to sit here writing these words without mentioning ourselves in the title race but unfortunately we have paid the price for a run of inconsistent performances and results. As I've said, though, the season is not over and who knows...a win today and eight more and we'll have a great chance.

Last week we said our goodbyes to Carl Emberson and Stuart Cash who were both excellent coaches. On behalf of all the players I wish them well for the future.

All of our remaining matches are of vital importance and to help us we need your support so please keep up your fantastic vocal backing of the lads.

It is with deep sadness to report the death of Hatters fan Cathleen Stevens.


Cathleen had been a regular at Kenilworth Road for the last 35 years, during which period she had been a wheelchair user for the whole time.



The fixture between the two sides has been largely in favour of the Hatters when played out in Kenilworth Road with all three of the previous matches ending up with Luton securing maximum points.

Last season the Town secured a 3-0 win with Stuart Fleetwood and Janos Kovacs on the score sheet. Overall, the Hatters have netted seven times conceding just the once.

The Lambs were formed in 1933 and since their formation have only matched up against the Hatters seven times, winning just once. That solitary win came at The Lamb ground back in 2010 as they ran out 3-1 winners in an early season Blue Square Bet Premier clash under Richard Money.

The sides have already met this season when the Hatters clinched the three points away from home with a 2-1 win. Fleetwood was again on target against the Lambs on that occasion and has an exemplary record against today's opponents and will be disappointed to be watching on from the sidelines through injury.

There is one strenuous link between the two dressing rooms this afternoon as Town full-back Greg Taylor has an added influence in the Hatters squad this afternoon. Taylor spent part of this campaign on loan at The Lamb Ground so will be linking up with former team mates on the battlefield. If selected his inside knowledge could stand him in good stead for the match up.

One interesting name that will highlight the Tamworth squad list and ring home with many of the Hatters fans is Lee Hendrie.

The former England and Aston Villa midfielder will wear the number eight jersey this afternoon in central midfield and his experience and vast array of talent will be one for the Hatters to keep a watchful eye on.

Another name that those of you familiar with league proceedings will recognise is the Blue Square Bet Premier's leading marksman Adam Cunnington. The Leighton Buzzard-born striker has been in scintillating form this campaign notching up 18 league goals already, joint with Michael Gash of Kidderminster at the top of the scorers charts.

Players to have played for both sides include current Town coach Alan Neilson, former Town front man Taiwo Atieno and full back Richard Dryden.

The Hatters head into the game on a high after midweek win against Stockport, as do Tamworth, who arrive in good form after 2-1 triumph over Southport.

- Tamworth have kept as many clean sheets as Luton this season.

Since gaining promotion to the Blue Square Bet Premier in the season 2008/09. Tamworth have battled to the death of each season to ensure their non-league top-flight status.

In the 2009/10 season, the Lambs earned 49 points and finished three points above the drop zone. They finished with the exact same total the very next season and survived by the same points difference after then (and current) caretaker manager Dale Belford led them to a final day win over Forest Green which saved Tamworth at the expense of Southport.

Last season. Tamworth flirted with danger more so than ever. The Lambs went without a win in the final 14 games of the season yet still, rather incredibly, managed to stay up.

This season, however, the Staffordshire club are likely to have an easier ride and should steer clear of relegation comfortably.

Darren Byfield's late winner against Southport saw Tamworth move on to 47 points putting them seven points clear of the relegation zone which should be a big enough cushion, seeing as five teams separate them and the drop zone.

A closer look at Tamworth season so far

The Lambs' have played 38 of which they have won 13, drawn eight, lost 17, scored 47 and conceded 55.

A typical mid-table side, Tamworth have neither a standout home record nor away record: they are 14th in the home table and 15th away.

Interestingly, Tamworth are one of the lowest scoring sides at home in the division with only 21 goals scored in 20 games, however, on the road, the Lambs have tallied 26 in 18 and top-scorer Adam Cunnington has netted 12 of his 18 BSBP strikes away from The Lamb Ground. Therefore, backing the 25-year-old hitman to score today may be a wise move.

Tamworth's recent away form is similar to the Hatters', except that they have scored nine and conceded 13 whilst the Town have only scored two but conceded just four. Tamworth will be confident of gaining a result at Kenilworth Road today as they have picked up shock wins

away at Wrexham and Newport earlier in the campaign, and earned draws at Forest Green Rovers and Dartford. both of whom have an impressive home record.

How will they play? Who are their danger men?

Tamworth possess the Conference's top scorer in their ranks. Adam Cunnington has scored 18 goals this season. At 6'3", the number 7 will be a real handful for Steve McNulty and Jake Goodman today.

Another one to watch for the Lambs will be Darren Byfield who is now 36 and has been deployed in central midfield in recent games. Byfield has scored two goals in his last three games and will be looking to improve on that record here.

Another big name, perhaps even bigger, is former Aston Villa midfielder Lee Hendrie who was at Villa Park for some 14 years before gradually dropping down the

At 35 Hendrie may not have the physical attributes he once had, but his technique and experience is likely to shine in the middle of the park.

Finally, Hatters fans may remember Tommy Wright who played four league games for Luton last season and scored the winning goal at Grimsby.

If he doesn't start today, Wright is likely to make a substitute appearance.

HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN SUPPORTING YOUR CLUB?

We've never beaten you at Kenilworth Road and lost at The Lamb earlier in the season, so it's not a fixture we look forward to too much to be honest!



WHAT'S THE BEST TAMWORTH MATCH YOU'VE WITNESSED SINCE YOU'VE BEEN SUPPORTING THEM?

The FA Vase replay at Peterborough was amazing. I travelled with loads of family and friends and will never forget the afternoon, which a lot of kids wagged off school (including me!).

WHAT'S YOUR CLUB'S FAVOURITE SONG?

A local rock band called Wolfsbane made a song called 'Paint The Town Red' in the 1980s which we have adopted, and there was a fans' song 'Tamworth Boys' brought out for the FA Vase. Both get played regularly at The Lamb.

IF YOU COULD CHANGE ONE ASPECT OF MODERN FOOTBALL, WHAT WOULD IT BE?

CAMPAIGNS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS SELECTS 10 POST-WAR TAMWORTH CLASSIC CAMPAIGNS

1963/64

John Bayliss was top scorer as Tamworth won the West Midlands League title for the first time in 1963/64. The Lambs won their first three games and a 3-2 victory over Hednesford in late December heralded a remarkable run of 21 straight wins, including a 6-1 demolition of Redditch, before they were held to a 1-1 draw at home to Dudley Town in their final match. They won 29 of their 36 West Midlands League games, finishing nine points ahead of runners-up Kidderminster Harriers

The Lambs also won the Staffordshire Senior Cup final, beating Brierley Hill Alliance 6-2 on aggregate, and were Birmingham Senior Cup finalists but lost 3-2 against Kidderminster.

1965/66

John Bayliss was again leading marksman as Tamworth won the West Midlands League and Cup, Birmingham Senior Cup and Staffordshire Senior Cup in 1965/66. They kicked off with a 4-1 defeat at Wolves 'A', but soared to the top of the table with a 22-match unbeaten run before a shock 5-0 defeat at Dudley.

The Lambs bounced back to hammer Lye Town, Port Vale Reserves and Halesowen in quick succession, scoring 123 goals and finishing nine points clear of runners-up Walsall Reserves. They beat Bilston 4-2 on aggregate in the League Cup final, Kidderminster 3-1 in the Birmingham Senior Cup final and Walsall Reserves 3-1 in the Staffordshire Senior Cup final.

1969/70

Tamworth reached the FA Cup second round for the first time in 1969/70. The Lambs battled their way through from the first qualifying round, beating Lower Gornal Athletic, Stafford Rangers, Dudley Town and Nuneaton Borough, before goals from Ray Holmes and Graham Jessop secured a 2-1 first round victory over Torquay United in front of a capacity crowd at The Lamb. It was the first time that Tamworth beat Football League opposition in the FA Cup. They lost 6-0 at Gillingham in the second round.

1971/72

The Lambs won the West Midlands League and Cup double in 1971/72.

They won six of their opening seven games and maintained their title challenge after the departure of manager Hughie Morrow in September.

Ray Holmes and new player-boss Tony Foster netted a total of 93 goals in all competitions. Tamworth lost 1-0 at title rivals Atherstone in late March, one of only four defeats, but a six-match unbeaten run culminated in a thrilling 5-0 victory at home to Atherstone on the final day. The Lambs finished two points ahead of their local rivals, winning 25 of their 36 games. They beat Bromsgrove Rovers 2-1 on aggregate in the League Cup final.

1987/88

Tamworth won the West Midlands League and Cup double in 1987/88. The Lambs began with a 1-0 defeat at Oldbury United but then went 12 matches unbeaten before losing 4-2 in the return game.

Mark Stanton was top scorer as they finished with five straight wins, pipping Oldbury to the title after Terry Blewitt's goal clinched a 1-0 victory at Gresley Rovers in their final match of the season.

Graham Smith's side scored 98 goals and won 27 of their 34 games, losing just four, as they regained Southern League status. They also hammered Malvern Towr 5-0 in the League Cup final to achieve the West Midlands League double for the first time in 16 years.

1988/89

The Lambs became the first Southern League club to win the FA Vase in 1988/89. Graham Smith's side beat Bridgnorth, Gresley Rovers, Ilkeston, Eastwood Hanley, Wisbech and North Ferriby before drawing 1-1 with Sudbury Town in the Wembley final watched by 26,487. Two goals by Mark Stanton plus another from lan Moores gave Tamworth a 3-0 win in the replay at London Road. Tamworth were pipped to promotion by Atherstone on goal difference.



1996/97

Tamworth swept to the Southern League Midland Division title with a club record 97 points in 1996/97, losing just three matches in the process.

The Lambs made an impressive 20-match unbeaten start that included a 6-0 hammering of RC Warwick and ended with a 2-0 defeat at Solihull Borough in late January. Solihull achieved the double over Tamworth by winning 4-2 at The Lamb in the last match of the season.

Tamworth's only other Southern League defeat was 1-0 at Ilkeston in late March. They won 30 of their 40 games and finished 26 points ahead of runners-up Rothwell Town. Ian Bennett, Paul Hunter and Gary Smith scored 57 goals between them.

2002/03

The Lambs stormed to the Southern League title and were FA Trophy finalists in 2002/03. They defeated Accrington Stanley, Nuneaton Borough, Stevenage, Margate, Farnborough and Havant & Waterlooville before losing 2-1 to Burscough in the FA Trophy final watched by 14,265 at Villa Park.

Top scorer Mark Cooper and Scott Rickards netted 25 goals between them as Tamworth won the Southern League Premier Division title by 13 points.

2005/06

Tamworth reached the FA Cup third round for the first time in 2005/06. Mark Cooper's side beat Altrincham in the fourth qualifying round, then won 2-1 at League 1 clubs AFC Bournemouth and Hartlepool United before holding Stoke City to a 0-0 draw in front of 9.366 at Britannia Stadium.

Tamworth went close to beating Stoke in the replay watched by 3,812 at The Lamb, leading in a 1-1 draw with their Championship opponents before losing 5-4 on penalties.

2008/09

The Lambs won the Blue Square North title with 85 points in 2008/09. They lost their opening home game 3-0 to Stalybridge Celtic but bounced back to hammer Burscough 6-2 and went top with a 15-match unbeaten run. They were trounced 5-1 at title rivals Gateshead in mid-January and the Tynesiders displaced them in pole position for a couple of months before Tamworth returned to the top with a 12-match unbeaten run.Gary Mills' side clinched the title with a 1-0 victory at home to Hinckley United in their penultimate game and they finished five points ahead of runners-up Gateshead. Gareth Sheldon was leading marksman with 23 Blue Square goals.



OFF THE MARK AT HOME

Steve McNulty's first-half header gave John
Still his first home win in charge and the Hatters'
first league win at Kenilworth Road in over two
months.

Showing three changes to the side that drew at Wrexham on Saturday, Still handed a full debut to midfielder Solomon Taiwo, whilst Andre Gray and Jon Shaw started in attack.

Shaw, making his first appearance since the 1-1 draw at Macclesfield, had the first effort of the night on six minutes when drilling a low shot half a yard past the post following fine wing play from Dave Martin.

Stockport, beaten by the Hatters in Still's first game in charge at the beginning of the month, came close to going in front themselves a minute later when Simon Hackney burst into the box but couldn't test Mark Tyler.

Jonathan Smith volleyed over for the Town on the 15-minute mark before shooting over three minutes later after more skilful play down the left flank by Martin.

Clear-cut chances were at a real premium but, just as half time approached, the Hatters took the lead. Winning the first corner of the game, Martin drilled in the flag-kick from the left and McNulty was unmarked to rise and nod home his first goal for the club.

Gray almost made it 2-0 three minutes after the break when he raced down the left and sent a stinging low drive goalwards that Richard O'Donnell, the Stockport goalkeeper, did well to turn away from danger, diving at full stretch. Taiwo, impressive all evening on his home bow with his range of passing,

warmed O'Donnell's hands a minute later when curling a free-kick towards goal.

It was all the Town as County offered little going forward, and Martin came inches away from scoring a fine goal shortly before the hour mark when sending a first-time volley just wide of the target following Simon Ainge's high right-wing cross.

That near-miss sparked the visitors into life and on 61 minutes Mark Cullen's low shot needed to be stopped by Tyler, who saved well down to his right to prevent an equaliser.

All of a sudden it was end-to-end stuff. Gray almost teed up Shaw and Martin after snaking into the penalty area, before Tyler did well to cling onto a volley from Jon Macken.

The Hatters of the Bedfordshire variety were almost made to pay for their profligacy in front of goal when County left-back Sean Newton hit an effort a yard wide of the post with 11 minutes left.

That would be the visitors' last meaningful effort on goal as the Town lay siege in their opponents' half in search of a second goal in the final minutes.


Shaw had a shot on the turn blocked with 10 minutes left before substitute Dan Walker raced clear of the visiting defence with 90 seconds remaining but was unable to find an unmarked Jake Howells.

Happy with a win but disappointed the margin wasn't bigger was manager John Still's verdict after he saw his side recorded a 1-0 win over Stockport County.

Steve McNulty's header a minute before half time was enough to see off struggling County but, despite dominating the game for long spells, the Hatters couldn't find another goal, much to Still's frustration.

"I'm satisfied with the performance but we should have scored more goals," the boss told Hatters Player afterwards.

"However, I'm always happy with a clean sheet. Most of our work has been on the defensive side of things. We haven't done a lot of work attacking-wise but we do need to.


"That said, the biggest positive of the night was the victory – a win always is."

The victory was the Town's first at Kenilworth Road in the Blue Square Bet Premier since a 6-1 win over Barrow in early January and lifts Still's side to eighth in the table and 10 points off the Play-Offs.

And for Still, building momentum is key.

"It was important to get the first home win," he said. "We go again on Saturday, it's our second of three games on the bounce at home so let's try and win them shall we?

"I want us to be bold, brave and positive. I don't mind losing when you're trying to win a game.



Keep winning

"Losing and winning are habits and you can get into either. We've got the habit of not conceding at the minute, which is pleasing – now we just need to keep winning."

The boss also revealed that the Hatters' busy schedule and the recent bad weather hasn't helped preparation for matches.

"I would have like to have worked on a lot more things but we've been playing games Saturday-Tuesday-Saturday," said Still.

"We haven't had an awful lot of time on the training pitch, the pitches we have been training on have been covered in water."



THE RECORD

It's fair to say the Town haven't enjoyed this day in history, if you were to look at the results. However, there have been a few notable results to cherish and more of that later. But, back to the results, the Hatters have won just four of the 14 matches played on this day in the past, drawing two and losing eight times. The Town have scored just 18 times (just 1.28 goals per game) and have conceded 24 (1.7 goals per game). That doesn't make for pretty reading.

LAST TIME OUT

Those above figures would make for even worse reading if the Town hadn't had beaten Halifax Town 5-0 in their last action on this day back in 2002. The Hatters were in the midst of a record-breaking run of 12 successive wins on their march to promotion from League 2 when the Shaymen were seen off in style thanks to five goals from five different goalscorers. Strikes from Matthew Spring, Chris Coyne, Steve Howard, Dean Crowe and Jean-Louis Valois made it nine victories on the spin for Joe Kinnear's side, Halifa were relegated at the end of the campaign.

SEMI-FINAL BOUND

The Hatters booked their place in the semi-final of the FA Cup back on this day in 1994 following a dramatic 3-2 victory in a quarter-final replay over West Ham at Kenilworth Road. A dubious opener from Martin Allen had the Hammers ahead on the half-hour, before Scott Oakes levelled five minutes later. Oakes notched his second two minutes after the restart

before the visitors equalised through Steve Bishop. However, on a topsy-turvy night before a crowd of 13,166, Oakes had the last word when robbing Steve Potts of the ball on the half-way line before unleashing an unstoppable shot to seal his hat-trick and earn the Town a place in the last four.

ONE MICKY HARFORD

Two trademark headers from striker Mick Harford secured the Town a 2-0 victory over Queens Park Rangers in the top flight at Kenilworth Road in 1985. His first came following a cross from Emeka Nwajiobi, whilst his second was a bullet header from a perfect David

Preece cross. The Hatters spurned the chance of a third goal when Brian Stein had a penalty saved

WE'RE ON OUR WAY


The Spring of 1968 saw the Hatters tighten their grip at the top of the Fourth Division (now League 2) with a hard-earned 2-1 win at Darlington. Bruce Rioch blasted the Town ahead direct from a free-kick before the Quakers equalised. But the Hatters had other ideas and Rodney Green secured the win with a goal just after the hour mark.

BAD DAYS...

So the above takes care of the four games worth shouting about, but the only other worthwhile result of note was a 2-2 draw earned against local rivals Watfor at Vicarage Road in a Division 3 South fixture in 1935. The Town's only other draw on this day came in 1999 when Reading were the visitors to Kenilworth Road in Division 2 (now League 1). Graham Alexander missed an early penalty before Matthew Spring put the Town in front. The Hatters missed a host of chances before conceding an equaliser six minutes from the end.

THE NOT-SO-GREAT EIGHT

Of the Town's eight defeats on this day, only one has been at home – a 1-0 reverse against Clapton Orient in 1931. The Hatters' biggest margin of defeat is by three goals. A 4-1 defeat against Manchester United at Old Trafford in 1991, a 1951 5-2 loss at Doncaster and a 3-0 defeat at the hands of Crystal Palace in 1929.



CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH PICKS OUT THE BEST TOWN MATCHES DOWN THE YEARS

LUTON TOWN 7-0 SOUTHAMPTON

19TH OCTOBER 1985

On 19th October 1985, the Hatters were due to take part in a run of the mill Division One game against Southampton at Kenilworth Road but, by the time of the final whistle, the word 'ordinary' was the last one that could be used to describe an amazing match.


The 1985/86 season had started off to a fanfare of trumpets as the club unveiled its new artificial surface at Kenilworth Road but, after the London press had travelled up the M1 to take a look and offer their grudging approval, the football started off in a gentle fashion.


After an opening day draw at home to Nottingham Forest, the Town drew at Newcastle before winning 1-0 at West Ham with Mick Harford netting the only goal from the spot.

The next three away games were all lost and although points were still being picked up at home, the season was rapidly turning into a disappointment given the high expectations of the club following the massive investment on the playing side during the previous campaign. At great cost, by normal Luton standards, Mick Harford, David Preece, Peter Nicholas and Steve Foster had been brought to Kenilworth Road and a position in the bottom half of the table was seen as unacceptable.

The season then actually turned with, of all things, a home draw. Manchester United came to Kenilworth Road in early October on the back of 10 straight wins and were hoping to equal the record winning start to a campaign set by Tottenham in 1960. In a tremendous game, watched by a crowd of 17,454, the Town were more than a match for United and but for a glaring late miss by central defender Paul Elliott, all three points would have been won.

Manager David Pleat felt that he still needed more firepower and was on the lookout for another forward, after narrowly losing out in the chase for Frank McAvennie, who had decided to opt for West Ham rather than the Town in the summer. In the lead up to the Southampton game Pleat was quoted as saying that he was frustrated by the lack of goals which the general build up play deserved.





Equally frustrated were the Luton supporters, as only 8,876 bothered to turn up for the visit of the Saints - half the attendance that had witnessed the game with United only a fortnight previously. The fans who stayed away missed a treat as the Hatters went goal crazy making a complete mockery of Pleat's misgivings.

Seven goals were slammed past England goalkeeper Peter Shilton without reply, making it the most miserable day of his career. He was offered no protection by his defenders when Harford and Brian Stein interchanged passes to set up Emeka Nwajiobi to open the scoring after only five minutes.

Ricky Hill and Harford combined to put in Stein to double the score on the half hour and, when Hill side-footed home the third before the interval, the game was as good as over.

Harford was dragging another England international, Mark Wright, around in circles as the Town continued in the second period as they finished the first.

With gaps appearing all over the place, Foster found time to join the attack and when his shot was blocked Stein followed up to make it 4-0. Preece was on hand to touch in a far-post cross for the fifth with substitute Ray Daniel knocking in number six just before the end. Stein's hat-trick was completed in the final minute when he converted a penalty after Harford was pushed by Wright in the area.

Pleat was as dumbfounded as the crowd and could only say at the post-match press conference, "Just write about the football, it spoke for itself," he said.

Saints manager, and ex-Luton centre-half, Chris Nicholl bravely attended the conference even though he was shell-shocked. "It was just rank bad defending," fumed Nicholl, "my defenders badly let me down. I was always an honest player but there are a few in the dressing room who can't look me in the face right now."

Exonerated from blame was Glenn Cockerill who was making his debut for the Saints after turning down the overtures of David Pleat and probably regretting the decision. Also blameless was Shilton who had not let in seven goals since he was a 19-year-old at Leicester and who kept the score down with a string of fine saves.

"No-one likes letting in seven but I don't think I made a bad mistake for any of them. There is no self pity. I don't want to talk about how I felt after the match, but I can tell you that the dog was in its basket when I got home!"

MATCH-WINNER ON COUNTY VICTORY

Tuesday's match-winner Steve McNulty believes the Town have responded in the best possible way to the disappointing home defeat to Hyde with four points and two clean sheets in their last two matches.

The 29-year-old centre-half popped up with the only goal of the game against struggling Stockport on Tuesday night as the Hatters picked up their first victory at Kenilworth Road under new manager John Still.

"We're just as disappointed as the supporters, though. We don't go out and perform the way we did that night deliberately. Losing hurts us, too – no footballer wants to lose.


Work

"We've done a lot of work on the training ground on defending and it's slowly starting to pay off. We've kept four clean sheets under John now and we're improving all the time. Now we've got to keep it going and build some momentum."

Still has admitted most of the work on the training ground has been on defending and four clean sheets in six matches is testament to that hard graft.

"There have been games where we have been conceding three goals at home and you can't expect your strikers to go and score four," added McNulty. "We've tightened up considerably at the back and we've put that right.

"John's told us what he expects of us. He wants us to push up quicker and work harder and I think we are becoming much more organised as a team."

STRIKER LOOKS AHEAD

Jon Shaw is anticipating good times ahead for the Hatters as he looks end a frustrating season with a flourish.

The Sheffield-born striker has scored nine goals in all competitions during a stop-start first campaign at Kenilworth Road and was back in the starting XI on Tuesday night having fully recovered from a hamstring injury.

And the forward, who scored 35 times for Gateshead last season, believes the Town still have a squeak at the Play-Offs if they continue to improve under new manager John Still.

"If you take away the cup run - which was an amazing once-in-a-life-time achievement for a club of our size - it's been a frustrating season all round," Shaw told Hatters Player after the 1-0 win over Stockport on Tuesday - his first appearance since the 1-1 draw with Macclesfield in February.

"I came here in the summer with the intention of helping this club win the league, play 40-50 games and score 20-30 goals. A lack of form, being played out of position and injury has meant that hasn't materialised which is disappointing. As a team our form slipped too, and we only have ourselves to blame.

"However, we have nine games left. I'm sure there are people out there who say we can't get in the Play-Offs but the pressure is off of us now. Let's see where we are in the next four or five games. It's interesting now.

Bad run

"We all knew that we had been on a bad run and whilst we weren't winning the teams above us were, and the gap opened. It's bad timing on our part and we only have ourselves to blame. We have nine games left though, and if we can pick up some more 1-0 wins, stay undefeated and continue to keep clean sheets then we have a chance.

"We have a new manager with his own ideas. Let's hope it's the winning formula."

That formula could play into Shaw's hands - or head. rather. The new boss has already gone on record to explain the importance of playing the striker with two wingers on either flanks.

And it was a comment that did not go unnoticed by the 29-year-old.

"It's nice to hear the new gaffer saying that," said Shaw. "I've preached before saying that I score the majority of my goals from balls into the box.

"I really worked well under Paul Buckle and always understood how and why he wanted us to play the way we did. Wherever I've played, or whoever I've played under, I've always done a job for the team.

"I made no secret of my frustration that I wasn't always in the box playing with wingers because, as I've said, that's how my game works."

Find the target


The striker naturally wanted to find the target against Stockport but it wasn't to be on his comeback.

"It was frustrating but as a forward you have to keep going, keeping make those runs and believe that the ball is going to find you," added Shaw.

"But it was good to get back in the team, I've been fit for about 10 days but the manager wanted to give me a proper week's training to get back to full fitness first.

"It was good to get 90 minutes under my belt. I was half-expecting to have 60 or 70 minutes and I had a little glance to the bench around the 70 and 80 minute mark to see if I'm number would come up but I'm happy to be back playing and pleased we've won as well."







MIDFIELDER PLEASED WITH FULL DEBUT

There were a number of positives from the Town's 1-0 win over Stockport on Tuesday and one of those was the display of midfielder Solomon Taiwo.

After making his debut as a substitute in the 0-0 draw with Wrexham last Saturday, the 27-year-old was given his first start by manager John Still against County and impressed in the heart of midfield alongside Jonathan Smith.

His boss had hinted before the game that he would only be given an hour, but Taiwo was given the full 90 minutes and was understandably pleased.

"I think the boys did well and I was relatively pleased with my own performance too, as I haven't played in a while," the Town's number 31 told Hatters Player.

"I'm still getting to know the players and the system and, all things considered, I'm happy."

Training

Fixture congestion and inclement weather have hampered the Town's training routine, which has frustrated the midfielder in his attempt to return to full fitness.

"It's not been ideal since I arrived here to be honest," said Taiwo. "The weather hasn't been great but that's no excuse, I've had to knuckle down and try and prove my fitness and get sharp.

"As it was my first game I was taking it all in my stride

— I was running on adrenaline for much of it. I wanted
to do well on my debut. But you need to do well in the
next game, and the next, and so on.

"I was playing at around 80-85 per cent fitness. I did have to conserve my energy because it is difficult when you haven't played much recently.

"There were certain times when I could have made runs forward and I'm positive I'll get back to that stage very soon. Now I'm older and wiser now I can now play the simpler pass, I can play smart and stay disciplined.


"I've played 90 minutes, but do I want to play another 90 minutes on Saturday? Of course I do, without a doubt. I want to play in every game."

At Dagenham, under Still, Taiwo was renowned for his eye-catching, all-action displays, and that's something the midfielder wants to bring to Kenilworth Road

"The manager has said in our half we have to play the percentages – get out of there, but in the opponents' half we've got the license to go and play," said Taiwo.

"That's what I try and do. If I see where I can play a defence-splitting pass then I will try and execute them if it's for the good of the team."

On my final Kenny pilgrimage of the season, I hope this afternoon to meet the man I consider the best signing Luton Town have ever made.

Now there's a subject to spark a debate. My early memories throw up several contenders, headed by Bob Morton, Gordon Turner and Syd Owen, stars of our first-ever team in the old First Division. That was in the 50s, but the early 60s were awful.

We slumped from top to bottom, although there were a few inspired signings even in those grim days, such as Terry Branston, John Moore, John O'Rourke and Bruce Rioch. You might include young winger David Pleat, not for his playing contribution but for his later brilliance as manager.

Our top player in the 70s was Malcolm Macdonald, a £17,500 snip from Fulham in the summer of 1969, while Jim Ryan was another who was a double delight as a player and manager. The other contender from Harry Haslam's reign is Brian Stein, second behind Turner in our all-time marksmen's list, and hero of Maine Road '83 and Wembley '88. Ray Harford later called Stein, "the best finisher I have ever seen," and that after knew what he had managed Alan Shearer at Blackburn.

Harford won the plaudits for taking us to the 3-2 Littlewoods Cup victory, but his team owned much to the work of the two managers before him, David Pleat and John Moore.

Inspired signings

Pleat's first foray into management surpassed all our hopes, and he was our best manager at recruiting contenders for the 'best-ever signing' debate. He inherited a few from Haslam, notably Steve Buckley, Ricky Hill, Paul and Paul Futcher. But to build the squad that gave us a decade of First Division football, Pleat's inspired signings included Kirk Stephens, Mal Donaghy, David Moss, Mick Harford, Brian Horton, Steve Foster, Paul Walsh, and David Preece.


Our slump of the 1990s saw the club follow painful selling policies. A chairman from that era would perhaps offer as 'best-ever signings' players who cost nothing but were sold for seven-figure fees: Kingsley Black £1.5m, John Hartson £2.5m, Mark Pembridge £1.25m, Paul Telfer £1.5m and Matthew Upson £2m.



To go back to where I began this column, my choice of our best-ever signing is John Moore. Born in Scotland, he came to Luton in 1965 as a 22-year-old after only three first-team opportunities in two years at Motherwell. A solid defender and natural leader, he played a major part in lifting the Town from the old Fourth Division up to the Second, and made 274 appearances in 10 years. He played briefly for Northampton before Pleat brought Moore back to join the coaching staff. When Pleat went to Tottenham in 1986 Moore took over and led the Town to seventh in what is now the Premier League, still our highest-ever finish.

But being a high profile manager was not for Moore. After one season he walked away from football so as not to queer the pitch as his assistant, Harford, took charge. Four years later new boss Ryan brought Moore back to coach the youth team. He retired 10 years ago, at 60, but is still a dedicated Town fan, with the John Moore lounge a well-deserved tribute to a great clubman.

We've all been at a game and heard a tannoy man get a little too excited, going that bit too far with the authority of a mic conveying his views to a couple of thousand pairs of open ears.

Like the Cambridge United man who, at the end of the disappointing recent home defeat to Blue Square Bet Premier strugglers Nuneaton Town, thanked "everyone for turning up in this freezing weather...and putting up with this!"

Admittedly, that one was quite mild compared to the temperature that January night, and also by comparison to one of his Abbey Stadium predecessors who taunted under-pressure Cambridge City manager Jack White at the end of a 1960s derby win by playing 'Hit The Road Jack', Ouch!

Last season, the Hibernian PA man Willie Docherty lost his job for playing Beatles track 'Taxman' during an Edinburgh derby with Hearts, mocking their rivals' impending winding-up order over an unpaid tax bill of $$\Sigma 450.000$.

And the local wind-ups go on and on, like when the Kidderminster PA played the Casualty theme tune as a Burton Albion player received treatment following a theatrical fall in pre-season 2009.

I was at Aggborough towards the end of the following season when Stevenage turned up to seal their Conference title win. Before kick-off, the expectant travelling fans sang 'this time we're going up', as Harriers tried to make their own end-of-season presentations. "You've not gone up yet, so shut up while we make our presentation," ordered the PA man, who was soon warning that two cars were in danger of being blocked in by local residents. "If you can afford a Mercedes and a Lexus, you can both afford to pay for the car park," he announced.

Then, when Boro's players made their way over to manager Graham Westley's technical area for their regular 'time-out' session as a team-mate received treatment midway through each half, the PA man came back on to say: "If I can just remind you during the Stevenage tea-break..."

On the subject of cars, what is it about Mansfield fans and their inability to close windows?

Twice this season when I've been there, the One Call Stadium tannoy man has informed fans that one of their number needs to return to their vehicle because "you've left your window open". The first time was a freezing December midweek night when he simply read the registration number out.





UPDATE

WITH SCOTT SMITH

Good afternoon and welcome to Kenilworth Road. I am pleased to be able to update you all with what has so far proven to been an extremely positive season for the foundation phase at Luton Town's Academy, which encompasses the age groups between under 6 and under 10.

As you read this I will be in the North West of the country with our Under-8s who will just be finishing their weekend of games against Liverpool and Manchester United. The boys will now be recovering and looking forward to the stadium tour of Old Trafford tomorrow. The weekend away will be a great experience for the boys both on and off the pitch. Not only will the boys be pitting their wits against two of the biggest clubs in the country – if not the world – but for many it will also mark their first overnight trip away from home. It is opportunities like these that we as a football club are proud to offer our boys, and illustrates how serious we are in continuing to provide the best level of development for our players.

At the club we encourage bright, creative, freeflowing attacking football especially at the younger age groups, with the aim of empowering the players with the freedom to go and express themselves on the pitch. With this in mind I was recently asked to write a report on the progress of our academy teams at the foundation phase and began reviewing our under-9 and under-10 teams' progress this season.

Despite winning or losing holding little importance at youth football, the scores are still logged (away from the players) for administrative purposes. On inspection of these I think it is fair to say we are definitely moving towards the aforementioned target of attacking football with our under-9s and under-10s notching up a remarkable combined goal difference of plus 384! These age groups have played some scintillating football this season and a goal difference of such significance is a pleasing by-product of some exceptional performances. It is pleasing to see that the high quality of player Luton Town's famous academy is renown for is only getting stronger with the current crop of players at the academy's youngest age groups.

I would also like to congratulate Leighton Gibbs on signing for our under-10 academy side this season. Leighton's path into academy football advocates the youth structure in place at the club which provides a large number of boys the opportunity to be coached by Luton's top coaches in our development centres, whilst staying with their club sides.

Each age group has a pre-academy side and two centre of excellence teams which allows for a more longitudinal development approach. Leighton started with Luton via our Talent Identification Programme. He missed out on being signed as an academy player during his under-8 season, but stayed with the club and spent last season in our centre of excellence and started this season in our pre-academy.

This allowed us to monitor Leighton's progress and during this season we felt he had made sufficient improvements to his game to be signed for our academy. Leighton's success story is just one of many, with 12 players having progressed from within the club's tiered youth system into academy football with Luton Town. We look forward to this number to continue to grow.





The Ladies' season so far has very much been one of inconsistency punctuated with glimpses of just how good the squad could be going forward.

A mid-table finish looks likely which is disappointing considering the players we have available without the issues of injury and work commitments. "The season did not begin too well with us gifting goals to the opposition and not being able to get back into the game," manager Nikki Baker told Talk of the Town. "Without doubt the best performance of the season so far was the 4-2 away win at Norwich in the FA Cup (now there's a coincidence!) where we carried out the game plan to perfection and looked like the team we are capable of being." Due to the number of injuries that the club has had to endure this season it has been very difficult for our reserve squad to have anything like a consistent line up and that has reflected their results when they have suffered a heavy defeat one week but bounced back the following week to win well. Being the only reserve squad in a very competitive league the anticipated midtable finish will be some achievement.

The senior youth squad at under-18 have had an excellent season where they are chasing the treble of the league title, league cup and county cup. They have a 100 per cent record in all competitions this season and it is encouraging to see eligible players moving into the reserve squad and performing admirably.

Ladies general manager Dave Baker is hoping the team's success can attract more players for next

He said: "We are now actively looking for players for next season aged 16 and over who feel that they are capable of performing at up to National standard or working towards.


"We remain ambitious to regain Premier League status and experience shows that this will only happen if we keep refreshing the squad on a regular basis as competition for places is very important."

JOE FLEMONS ROUNDS UP THE LATEST IN THE BSBP

After a season of high-tempo, extravagant, unpredictable football the Blue Square Bet Premier russled up another epic round of fixtures this past week with yet another different side topping the table at the death.

You won't have to wait long for you next football fix as the Town are back in action on Tuesday when they host Ebbsfleet United at Kenilworth Road.

Who? Ebbsfleet United. Or, in old money, Gravesend and Northfleet. The club changed their name in 2007 to coincide with the opening of the new Ebbsfleet International

Eurostar station and are in the midst of their second successive season at this level following promotion in 2010/11.

Take two. The Town and the Fleet try again this evening after the original game, scheduled for 29th December, was called off 20 minutes before kick-off due to a waterlogged pitch. Merry Christmas.

Hello Mr Chairman. You can become a member of the Ebbsfleet board if it's something that tickles your fancy. Since February 2008 the club has been owned by MyFootballClub.com, whose members vote on player transfers, budgets and ticket prices, among other things, instead of those decisions being made exclusively by the club's management and staff, like at most other clubs. Unfortunately the option to pick the team is no longer available, so you can put the phone down if you're in the middle of asking to them to select their striker in goal.


Haven't we met before? Oh yes. The Town have the upper hand when it comes to meetings with the Fleet, winning three of the five clashes – including the 3-1 victory at Stonebridge Road back in August. Ebbsfleet have won at Kenilworth Road before, however, recording a shock 3-2 victory back in January 2010 that left then

manager Richard Money speechless. That was soon forgotten when the Town triumphed 6-1 at Stonebridge Road in the return match two months later. The Hatters were also victorious when Ebbsfleet last stepped foot inside Kenilworth Road back in April when two goals from Stuart Fleetwood and one from Craig McAllister sealed a 3-0 win.

Town trialists. At a first glance it would seem there are no players in the Ebbsfleet squad with a connection to Kenilworth Road – until the press officer delves deep into his memory bank of previous pre-seasons. Three current Fleet players have trialled with the Hatters. Goalkeeper Preston Edwards even won a winners medal in the South West Challenge Cup in 2009. Midfielder Neil Barrett and striker Nathan Elder, meanwhile, featured for the Hatters in pre-season last season with Elder notching in the home friendly against Azerbaijani outfit Gabala.

Trophy Tales. Among the silverware at Stonebridge Road is their pride and joy; the FA Trophy. The Fleet triumphed 1-0 at Wembley in 2008 over Torquay United. But it's the Kent Senior Cup that dominates their trophy cabinet. The Fleet have won the competition seven times.

How they doing? In a nutshell: not too well. The Fleet sit in the bottom four and are staring relegation to the Blue Square Bet South firmly in the face. However, they have games in hand over a number of their rivals above them in the table with Tuesday's game one of those. That adds extra importance to Tuesday's meeting.
