RICHARD Money has warned Luton will be dangerous opposition for Cambridge United tomorrow despite under-achieving this season.

The Hatters look likely to miss out on the Blue Square Bet Premier play-offs and new boss John Still has already named some of those players he plans to release this summer.

But head coach Money knows from his experience in charge at Kenilworth Road the weight of expectation on their shoulders.

He said: "It's very difficult for me to explain to people just the intensity of every game they play in.

"I know people at Mansfield, Wrexham or whoever else may well think it's the same for them, but it isn't.

"That's the reality, however I do think at the moment they're in a situation where the manager has decided he's going to look at his squad for next season and maybe some of the pressure has gone away a little bit.

"But let's be clear about one thing - on their day, they're still the best team in this league.

"They've spent the money and you wouldn't argue they've got some of the best players in the league, so it makes them dangerous opponents for the weekend."

Money added he would take no personal satisfaction if United beat Luton.

He said: "I think people from the outside would probably think that's the case, but I really couldn't care less, it's three points, it doesn't matter any more than that to me.'

Nick Pope will continue in goal after extending his loan deal from Charlton until the end of the season while Jonathan Hedge has moved to Southport on a temporary basis until the summer.

Nathan Blissett is also set to return to Kiddermin-ster following the end of his loan spell after Easter.

Meanwhile, Money offered his backing to director of football Jez George's bid to walk the 100 miles from the R Costings Abbey to Sincil Bank, where United play Lincoln City on Monday, in

just 43 hours to raise funds for United. Around £17,000 has so far been made with fans, groups and businesses pledging £100 in return for a special centenary share certificate.

Money said: "People have to understand Jez is in a situation where he has to make difficult decisions and he has made a lot of sound, sensible decisions
