








JOHN STILL

Good evening and welcome back to you all for this our first match at Kenilworth Road of four homes games between now and next Thursday.

I would like to welcome our visitors from Lincoln who have made the trip down from Sincil Bank this evening, including their manager Gary Simpson and his staff and players, plus the directors and supporters of the Imps.

Tonight heralds the start of an important run of four successive matches on home soil which gives us a great opportunity to put some valuable points on the board in the closing stages of the campaign. I want us to pick up as many points as possible during this time, especially after what has been a very disappointing week for us.

Disappointment

Last Monday we went down to the current league leaders Kidderminster, where I thought we were okay, before the obvious disappointment of Saturday's heavy defeat against Gateshead at Carlisle.

I was absent from Saturday's game on a scouting mission but I have watched the DVD and had a report from my assistant Terry Harris, who took control of the game. The performance was unacceptable and, regardless of the circumstances, not good enough. It doesn't matter who you are or where you are in the table, losing in the manner we did simply isn't acceptable, and for that I apologise.

This emphasises the fact that new players for this a football club need to be identified. Some have already been highlighted and scouting will continue for the rest of the season, although Terry and our chief scout will undertake these. I believe it is important to see players in the flesh to understand more about how they play as well as what kind of personality and person they are – which, for me, is just as important as ability.

Turning attention back to tonight's game, we entertain a Lincoln team who still need the points to stave off any threat of relegation and visit us fresh from a defeat to Kidderminster at the weekend.

As usual I am expecting a tough game, one in which we need to show desire, effort and quality – aspects that were greatly missed on Saturday against Gatashaad

I thought in our last match here against Kidderminster our work-rate was very good but our team-work wasn't so good. I believe that team-work is the single biggest component of our game that we have to work on. That will be something that is at the very top of our agenda when we kick-off pre-season at the start of July.

On Saturday we took two youth team players to Carlisle in goalkeeper Ben Barnes and defender Brett Longden and I believe the experience, despite the result, will serve both players really well. It is valuable experience for them and I hope both will go on to great things at Luton Town.

A point to prove

The players involved tonight will have a point to prove after Saturday's result and performance and they must go out and show me and my staff and, most importantly, you, the supporters, that they want to play and do well for this club.

Finally I must thank those 126 supporters who made the long journey to Carlisle to support the team on Saturday. Believe me we are all aware of the time and money spent on following the club around the country. For that, I thank you, whole heartedly. We appreciate your backing and it is never – never – taken for granted.

I can assure you work is already under way and it'll continue between now and the start of next season to get this club back where it belongs. Next season we will mount a proper promotion challenge and, hopefully, days like Saturday can be a distant memory.

Thank you for your support and enjoy the game tonight.

FROM THE BOARDROOM WITH DIRECTOR DAVID BLAKEMAN



Good evening and welcome to the players, directors and supporters of Lincoln City.

Thank you, massively, for attending the match tonight, particularly given Saturday's desperately disappointing result. I had the misfortune of travelling to Carlisle and seeing us set, simultaneously, three

negative records - the lowest crowd we have ever played in front of, the worst position and we have been in the table and, arguably, (without intending to disrespect Gateshead) the worst scoreline. Nevertheless, even in the midst of such a depressing result, I thought that there was a positive. There is a certain symbolism in the fact that those three negative events all occurred in the same game. I do not think (and I suspect even the most pessimistic supporter does not think) things will now get worse. I am not, and am not employed to be, a football expert. I leave that to the footballing staff and would refer you to John Still's programme notes. But even I know enough to assure everyone that, in John, we have a manager who will ensure that things improve very much indeed. He is, of course, and as is entirely obvious, being forced to experiment with the side in this latter part of the season because of injuries, and because he has decided to embark on the transition as early as possible.

I think we already have some excellent players on our books (some of whom John has brought in, in the short time he has been here) and I know he is looking at further players who will strengthen the squad yet further.

One must also say (and I appreciate I open myself up to the accusation of "he would say that, wouldn't he?") that, whenever one attempts to secure long-term progression, there are immediate difficult moments. We realise we have a good deal of work to do, given the disappointments of this league season. Thankfully, the specific job of transition has begun, meaning, however, that the ride is, inevitably, going to be a bumpy one. It is to be borne in mind, also, that John has, himself, made it clear that he could not guarantee instant success. I think that is a vital consideration. We all must give him time. To be too impatient will only recreate similar difficulties experienced over the last few seasons.

In addition, we, as a group of investors and directors, do not want to be in a position where money is being burned from no good reason. We look very carefully at all items of expenditure and are desperately determined for the Club to succeed. After all, it is the investors money that is lost in the event that the Club does not succeed. Even the recent FA Cup run has only reduced the scale of annual gross losses. It did not result in a profit. We have to ask you, therefore, to

retain patience, even if that must seem impossibly difficult at times. Things will, I am sure, get better.

I thought that it would be worthwhile mentioning some of the tasks that we have been undertaking in the last few

We continue to work on matters such as the stadium and the training ground. Matters are progressing, but we do not feel it would not be the right time, at this moment, to deliver specific positive messages. That would seem merely as if were attempting to divert attention away from the football difficulties - which we do not wish to do.

We have, however, been doing much work in respect of attempting to gain additional supporters. As will be evident to anyone attending games, our crowds are currently almost exclusively white British. Given the population of the town is heading towards a situation where 50 per cent of the population is not white British, that first fact does not make, from the point of view of the Club's long-term existence, happy reading. In any event, a more evenly mixed crowd would reflect the population of the Town better and, hopefully, add further to the mixing together of the cosmopolitan mix of peoples which is the

Just as importantly, you all know that we face massive competition - in terms of recruiting new fans - from the big clubs such as Manchester United, Liverpool and Chelsea. Having a young son, aged five, myself, I have been forced to engage in what amounts to a full-time propaganda campaign to ensure that he is a Luton Town fan and does not succumb to the temptation of supporting the same teams as lots of his school friends. He is not allowed. therefore, to drink from red or blue mugs (I have told him that they are "silly colours") and, of course, he is certainly not allowed to use a vellow mug!

I say the above semi-jokingly but, if one considers it, it is very difficult, in our current league position, to attract fans as easily as was once the case. A large proportion of our fan base is now heading towards middle age and above. The football has not been what those of us who have been attending Kenilworth Road for many decades are used to. We are forced, therefore, to do everything we can to ensure that we gain future and, especially, young supporters.

That task is rendered even more difficult by virtue of the fact that other local clubs are spending huge sums of money in order to attract new fans to their grounds. Some of those clubs are attempting to infiltrate Bedfordshire, so as to attract our traditional fan base.

We are very determined, and are succeeding, in combating these various challenges. We have, therefore, made a variety of new ticket offers. Free tickets have been offered to every school in Luton for one game per season, in the hope of attracting young children into matches.

We have also been attending a wide variety of events and meeting a large number of organisations. We have been into many local schools, colleges and universities. Amongst other things that we have recently done, we have been discussing, with students from Bedfordshire University, the possibility of creating a virtual Luton Town museum. This may sound like a very minor activity to undertake. Many of you may be aware, however, that Luton will soon benefit from a new world class youth facility -TOKKO. TOKKO is going to be open to all young people aged 13 or over. It will run activities such as media production, sports, art, music, street dance and cookery. It is clearly appropriate that the football club should try to capture as many of the young people attending the centre as possible. To that end, it is conceivable that we might station a virtual museum at TOKKO. We have commenced discussions with that organisation to see what we might do. They are enthusiastic as to the possibility of future involvement with us. Activity of this sort works, we think, on a drip feed basis. The greater involvement we have in and around Luton, the greater the chance we have of capturing new fans and retaining

Similarly, and to the same end, we have run courses in conjunction with the Sixth Form College and have become involved in the Careers Academy at that institution, in an endeavour to put the name of the Club more highly on the agenda of the students at the school. We have been to lots of local schools, with precisely the same aim in mind.

I think it is very important to say that our sponsors (such as easyJet and Arriva) have been critically instrumental in enabling us to undertake a number of these tasks. We are going to be working even more closely with those organisations, going forwards. I think that the partnerships could yield very important results.

We do feel that a number of these initiatives are starting to bear fruit. It would be marvellous, of course, if they do result in a significant addition to our already incredibly impressive fan base (our database, which doesn't, inevitably, include all of our supporters - some will not have registered with us, or bought tickets for a while, numbers over 50,000 individual fans - an extraordinary number for a club in the Conference) as that would help to generate the future income necessary to enable this club to challenge at a higher level.

As an aside, but as part of the initiatives described above, we are hoping to run a photo project. That will consist of our fans being interviewed by students at the Sixth Form College. The aim is for the students to produce a brochure (which we would hope to sell in the club shop), setting out reminiscences of those supporters. I very much hope that we can achieve, tonight, the sort of result that we need in order to show that the team will win the championship next season.

First of all I would like to apologise to every Luton Town supporter for Saturday's 5-1 defeat at Gateshead – especially the 126 of you who made the long journey to Carlisle to witness our worst performance of the season.

It was simply unacceptable from a team of professional footballers. I was shocked by the scores when they came through and, having watched the DVD with the manager and the lads yesterday, it was apparent just how bad we were.

In tough times like these, though, it is important you stick together. Just like you enjoy the highs together, you need to share the disappointments together too. We know we have let you down this season and Saturday's result and performance epitomised that.

I feel for those fans who had to endure Saturday's game. I certainly did not see it coming. When the new manager arrived we were playing okay but one thing we had done was sharpen up at the back and begun to keep clean sheets. I've bored you to death in my notes throughout the season about the importance of keeping clean sheets, and up until last week it had looked as though we had cracked it – keeping five in seven matches. But in the last three games we've conceded nine goals.

By all accounts we allowed Gateshead time and space to play and they made us look like a very bad side. In my heart of hearts I know that simply isn't the case. The squad is full of quality and it is heart-breaking to see us playing the way we are. Confidence plays such a big part in football but it's apparent at the moment we are playing with very little of it.

However, we must move on. It's no use dwelling on the disappointments. You have to go out there and get on with it. We are old enough and ugly enough to deal with such setbacks. We are professional footballers who should be proud to wear a Luton shirt and give 100 per cent every time we cross that white line. I can assure you nobody wants this team to be a failure. I came here, like a lot of players, to win this league for Luton Town. That won't happen this season but I am determined that we can mount a serious challenge next season and make you, the fans, proud of our achievements. Just take a look at the Norwich result. What a day that was and remember that feeling.



As a footballer, and a Luton Town player, I want that feeling each and every week and I will do my best to make it happen next season.

Kidderminster were our last opponents here at Kenilworth Road and they showed how far teamwork and organisation can get you. Were they any great shakes? No, not in my opinion, but they worked hard for one another and knew what they were doing, and that is why they are top of the league. That doesn't just happen overnight and it's important to realise that our new manager isn't going to find that magic formula straight away. That is why he is tinkering with the side — to gauge what each player is capable of doing and how they can play a part in a successful side.

Tonight is the first of four home games in quick succession as the season draws to a close so it's imperative we end the campaign on a high note. All four teams we play need the points for one reason or another. We need to restore our own and the club's pride after Saturday's result and that needs to start this evening against Lincoln.

Finally I'd like to wish Janos Kovacs, Stuart Fleetwood and Scott Neilson all the best after they left the club last week. Their efforts are much appreciated by myself and the rest of the lads.

This evening the Hatters entertain Lincoln City at Kenilworth Road after the original fixture, scheduled for January, was postponed due to snow.

The Imps head to Bedfordshire on the back of a 3-0 drubbing at the hands of table toppers Kidderminster Harriers on Saturday putting an end to an impressive run of games that saw them pick up seven points in their last three outings.

City currently lie 19th on the Blue Square Bet Premier ladder and find themselves scrapping for survival with time running out on Gary Simpon's men.

Simpson took control in February after David Holdsworth departure and since his arrival for his second stint at Sincil Bank their form has been somewhat inconsistent.

Despite having only tasted defeat five times since his arrival, four wins have help maintain their chances of survival but missed opportunities in games against Woking, Nuneaton and Cambridge could have the Imps ruing their failings on the season's deadline day.

Their away form is something that could concern even the most die-hard Imps fan as their side have picked up just five wins in 21 trips away form Sincil Bank. Goalscoring is something that the Imps have not struggled with, however, with Jamie Taylor leading by example. The 30-year-old journeyman has netted 15 times

for Simpson's men this season and will be looking to add to his earlier strike against the Hatters in their 2-1 defeat in Lincolnshire in October.

Vadaine Olivier will also be at the forefront of the Hatters concerns after his 13 goals this campaign looks destined to continue during the run in for the Imps' survival push.

The previous meetings between the two sides are heavily in favour of the home team as the Hatters have been defeated only six times in 35 meetings between the two clubs.

Last season the points were shared, however, after the Hatters triumphed at Kenilworth Road in September before being held to a 1-1 draw away from home. The last time Lincoln City grabbed all three points at Kenilworth Road was back in April 1999 when they clinched a 1-0 win in a Diision Two (now League One) clash. This was one of only two wins the Imps have managed at Kenilworth Road with the Hatters bagging 12 wins from the 17 meetings.

The record books may be against the visitors but their squad list will provide evidence they have enough quality to compete. Games come thick and fast now at the business end of the season so points are pivotal for both managers and with Simpson's men playing for more than just pride the outcome is certainly in the balance.

24-year-old midfield general is in his third year at Sincil Bank after signing from Rushden & Diamonds in 2011.

ROBERT DUFFY

6ft 2in target man signed for the Imps in the summer after a long career spanning 10 different clubs.

JAMIE TAYLOR

Another experienced forward who signed for the Imps in 2011. Impressed during a devastating spell at Eastbourne Borough which saw interest from several sides, with Lincoln winning the battle to secure his signature.

JAKE SHERIDAN

Nottingham-born midfielder spent two years with Notts County before swapping for Conference club Tamworth in 2007. Signed for the Imps in the summer.

VADAINE OLIVER

Signed on a season-long deal in the summer after impressing during the Lincolnshire County Senior Cup final in July. Has netted 13 times this campaign.

DAN GRAY

Versatile midfield player who can also operate as a full back signed in the summer after a stop start career at Chesterfield. Loan spells at Macclesfield Town and Alfreton followed before being signed by the Imps.

NICKY NICOLAU

Spent a decade as a youngster at Premier League Arsenal but failed to break into the first team and moved onto Southend United. After spells with Swindon Town, Barnet and Boreham Wood amongst others, he clinched a deal at Sincil Bank in 2011.

JAKE JONES

Winger on loan at Sincil Bank from League One Wallsall. 19-year-old made his Football League debut in a 1-0 win over Brentford in August 2012.

TOM MILLER

Signed in the summer, the former Norwich City youth product who scooped the Young Player Of The Year award in 2008 before being snapped up by Rangers on a two-year deal.

CRAIG HOBSON

Tall target man joined the Imps on loan until the end of the season from Stockport County. The 24-year-old was formerly at Sheffield United as a youngster.

NAT BROWN

Another Macclesfield Town loanee who joined until the end of the campaign in March. Currently in his second spell at Sincil Bank where he made over 100 appearances between 2005 and 2008.

DAVID PREECE

Former Sunderland keeper who settled at Sincil Bank after departing Championship Barnsley in the summer. The 36-year-old stopper then spent four years in Sweden before returning to the UK in 2009.

PAUL TURNBULL

Currently on loan from Northampton Town after making his name at Stockport County. The former County skipper made the switch to Sincil Bank on loan in 2013.

CONNOR ROBINSON

Lincoln City scholar impressed on his début against Hayes & Yeading in 2012 where he was named man-of-the-match and subsequently penned a full-time deal.

Despite languishing down in 19th in the Blue Square Bet Premier, Lincoln City is a club with lofty ambitions. The Lincolnshire outfit have designs on a brand-new 10,000-seater multi-purpose stadium and, like the many other ex-Football League clubs in the division, are aspiring to gain promotion to League 2.

Unfortunately for Imps fans, though, there appears to be no correlation between the club's off-the-field ambitions and on-the-field performances

Last season, in their first season back in the Conference since 1987/88, Lincoln finished in a lowly 17th, and this term they haven't improved as much as they would have hoped.

In the 2011/12 season, Lincoln collected an average of just 1.07 points per game. This season, that figure has risen to just 1.16 points per game.

A closer look at Lincoln's season so far

Gary Simpson's Lincoln side are currently in 19th place with 50 points having played 43, won 13, drawn 11, and lost 19 whilst scoring 59 and conceding 68.

Prior to Christmas, the Imps were one of the most in-form teams in the league, but a poor festive period has extended into a poor 2013 so far as meant they arrive at Kenilworth Road just two points above the relegation zone, and the club now finds itself 23rd in the 6-game form table

Only Ebbsfleet, who are bottom of the league overall, are in a poorer vein of form than Lincoln. The side's woeful form meant David Holdsworth left in February.

The Imps' away record is far from convincing, but a closer look reveals they have actually had some impressive results on the road, namely, draws with Grimsby and Mansfield, and wins over Wrexham and Dartford, so they'll be confident they can add Luton to that list.

How will they play? Who are their danger men?

Lincoln's list of injuries seems to be growing each week, so predicting who lines up for the Imps today is no easy task, hence the omission of a line-ups diagram. It is likely Simpson will stick with his usual 4-4-1-1 or 4-4-2 formation, but even that is uncertain.

Paul Farman will retain the goalkeeper's jersey for this game having recently been dropped for making a string of errors. However, Farman is considered to have been one of Lincoln's best performers this season despite the errors he has made - one of which Hatters fans who travelled up to Sincil Bank stadium in October will remember.

At the back, injuries to centre-backs Scott Garner and Andrew Boyce mean it is difficult to know who will partner 22-year-old Tom Miller at the heart of the defence.

Recent signing Chris Bush, who has already played at Kenilworth Road this season for Gateshead on the opening day, will play at left-back and although the 20-year-old is built more like a centre-back he is very effective at getting forward to offer support.

His long throw will be a weapon Lincoln look to use whenever they can.

In midfield, Lincoln are missing captain Gary Mills, defensive midfielder Mamadou Fofana, and playmaker Alan Power, so it unknown who will partner the versatile Dan Gray - who could actually end up playing at centre-

Jake Sheridan will operate on the right-hand side of Lincoln's midfield four, whilst Colin Larkin, whose intelligence and craft will be key to the Imps splitting open the Hatters defence, is likely to start on the left.

Larkin has seven league goals this season and is primarily a striker, but has moved out wide in recent

Jamie Taylor will be Lincoln's main threat upfront. The Imps' number 10 has scored 13 goals this season (10 in the league).

His pace, positioning and precise finishing will make him Lincoln's most dangerous outlet.

18-year-old Conner Robinson may partner Taylor up top and the youngster has proved already that he is more than ready for this level scoring four goals in 14 appearances.

THOUGHTS FROM THE **OAK ROAD**

TALK OF THE TOWN GETS THE INSIDE WORD FROM THE VISITORS' CAMP

WHAT'S YOUR NAME? Andy Townsend

AGE? 44

HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN SUPPORTING LINCOLN? 39 years

HOW'S YOUR SEASON GONE SO FAR?

It's been very much an up and down season. Our early games saw us dominate for long periods but we didn't get the results we deserved. Injuries were also a problem and when they cleared, we went on a run, going undefeated for 10 games. Christmas was a poor period with only two points gained, and the injuries mounted up again. Since the turn of the year. we never seemed to rediscover our unbeaten form and relegation began to look a real possibility.

DAVID HOLDSWORTH LEFT THE CLUB IN FEBRUARY, WITH GARY SIMPSON COMING IN AS MANAGER. WAS IT THE RIGHT DECISION TO CHANGE YOUR MANAGER AT SUCH AN ADVANCED STAGE OF THE SEASON?

Holdsworth's sacking was the right decision to make. Many supporters probably questioned the timing of it, but there were no signs as to where the next point was coming from. We dominated games for the first half and then didn't turn out for the second half, making people wonder what he was saying at half-time and if he had lost the dressing room.

Gary came in at a difficult time with the transfer window a week away from closing. He has a great passion for Lincoln from his time here before with Keith Alexander and we are starting to see some of that transmit through the team with some solid performances. These have brought about some much needed wins and a renewed spirit within the club.

IS THE COMPETITION IN THE CONFERENCE **TOUGHER THAN YOU EXPECTED FOLLOWING RELEGATION IN 2011?**

Last season at this level it was difficult to compete. While some clubs had a wealthy chairman bank rolling them, Lincoln had lost the money from the Football League, which made it extra difficult adjusting to life in the Conference. This season the league is more equally matched financially. Most teams in this League now are full time, apart from a handful of clubs. However, even those teams that are still part time aren't being left behind, despite not having the financial clout. Hopefully, this will continue to be the case next season.

WHO'S YOUR PLAYER TO WATCH?

We have several players who will cause the opposition problems. Alan Power, Jamie Taylor, Vadaine Oliver and Mo Fofana would always be my first selections on the team sheet.

WHAT ARE YOUR MEMORIES FROM FACING **LUTON IN THE PAST?**

The two FA Cup matches which were televised in 1999. Especially the replay, a game which kept producing excitement.

WHAT'S YOUR CLUB'S FAVOURITE CHANT/ SONG? The Dambusters march.

WHAT'S THE BEST GAME INVOLVING LINCOLN THAT YOU'VE EVER SEEN?

Winning the Conference back in 1988; playing Everton, Tottenham and West Ham; and the Play-Off finals. However, the one that sticks in the memory is the night we played Man City at home in the League Cup in 1996. We were 1-0 down within a minute and came back to win 4-1. To top it all we went to Maine Road in the second leg and won 1-0.

IF YOU COULD PICK ONE THING TO GET RID OF IN MODERN FOOTBALL, WHAT WOULD IT BE?

The Premier League. With the amounts of money being pumped into the Premier League and spent by clubs on ridiculous wages, it's contributed so much to the mess the game is in today.

HOW INTENSE IS THE LINCOLN VERSUS **GRIMSBY RIVALRY?**

The rivalry isn't that intense from Lincoln's point of view - Grimsby are just another local derby. Grimsby fans travel in numbers but for various reasons Lincoln fans do not enjoy travelling to Grimsby. We used to enjoy games more against Scunthorpe and Hull.

WHAT'S THE BEST THING ABOUT BEING AN

It's like having an extended family. I've made friends through watching Lincoln who I would happily call


WILL LINCOLN BEAT THE DROP THIS SEASON?

CAMPAIGNS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS SELECTS FIVE POST-WAR LINCOLN CITY CLASSIC CAMPAIGNS

1951/52

Lincoln City scored a club record 121 League goals as they won the Third Division (North) title in 1951/52. Key players Andy Graver and Fred Emery remained at Sincil Bank and there were several notable early wins, with Lincoln trouncing Darlington 7-2 and Graver netting six times in the record 11-1 win over Crewe. Doug Graham arrived from Preston to replace the injured Frank Varney but although the Imps were top for nearly five months, promotion was not assured until the penultimate game as they won 2-1 at home to Stockport. Andy Graver netted 36 goals despite missing the last six games as Lincoln gained 69 points.

1975/76

Lincoln City stormed to the Fourth Division title with an all-time record 74 points in 1975/76. The only summer signing was John Fleming from Oxford United and Lincoln dropped just two points from nine games to go second in the table, also beating Stoke City in the League Cup second round. The Imps bounced back from a 1-0 defeat at rivals Northampton to win 11 consecutive matches, leading the Fourth Division and reaching the FA Cup fourth round. Promotion was secured against Darlington with seven games left and Lincoln clinched the title with a 5-0 win over Doncaster, scoring 111 League goals overall.

1987/88


Colin Murphy returned to manage Lincoln City to the Conference title in 1987/88. The Imps had been the first club to be relegated from the Football League the previous season and a new-look team lost only twice in 16 matches to be among the early pace-setters. Record signing Paul Smith from Port Vale helped to launch a 15 match unbeaten run that left Lincoln challenging rivals Barnet for the championship. Three consecutive away defeats dented title hopes, but Lincoln triumphed 2-1 at home to Stafford Rangers in their penultimate match and clinched a return to the Football League with a 2-0 win over Wycombe Wanderers.

1997/98

Lee Thorpe and Colin Alcide scored 26 goals between them as Lincoln City won promotion in 1997/98. Gareth Ainsworth grabbed a hat-trick as Lincoln drew 3-3 with Scarborough, moving to Port Vale in September. Dean Walling arrived from Carlisle and Barry Richardson returned in goal as Lincoln stormed to the top with a 16 match unbeaten run. The Imps conceded five goals against Peterborough and Notts County but bounced back into the promotion race with just two defeats in 11 games and finished third with a 2-1 victory at home to Brighton in their final match. Kevin Austin and Steve Holmes were ever-present.

1980/81

Colin Murphy guided Lincoln City to promotion in 1980/81. The Imps made a six-match unbeaten start, winning four successive games, with David Felgate replacing the injured Colin Boulton in goal. Leading marksman Gordon Hobson scored four goals in an 8-0 thrashing of Northampton and fellow striker Mick Harford joined Newcastle United for a record fee in December, Lincoln contested the title with Southend United and the defence, inspired by Trevor Peake, set a new record for the fewest goals conceded in the Fourth Division. The Imps lost only two of their last 24 games and finished runners-up with 65 points.



SPOILS SHARED

The Town twice came from behind to earn a point in an entertaining draw at Cambridge.

It was the hosts that began on the front foot with Mark Tyler alert to keep out Josh Coulson's fourthminute header.

The hosts were well on top inside the opening exchanges and Tyler needed to make another easy catch when grasping hold of left-wing corner after a surging run from Harrison Dunk on 13 minutes.

Tyler made a routine catch from an ambitious, dipping half-volley from Tom Shaw on the edge of the area a minute later as the hosts continued to press.

However the hosts' pressure paid off on 20 minutes when they took the lead. A right-wing cross from Liam Hughes was headed clear by Simon Ainge but the ball fell kindly to Shaw on the edge of the box who sent a low effort past the legs of several Town defenders that unsighted Tyler and nestled in the bottom corner.

Hurt by going behind, the Town were almost level on 24 minutes when a 22-yard piledriver was kept out spectacularly by United goalkeeper Nicholas Pope.

By now the Hatters were enjoying their best spell of the half and Pope came to the hosts' rescue four minutes later with an even better save. Andre Gray was unable to connect with the ball in the penalty area but it broke perfectly for Dave Martin whose shot seemed destined for the top corner until the goalkeeper stuck out one arm to turn the ball around the post.

The Hatters started the second half well, Jake Howells drove a shot just wide of the target five

minutes after the restart, but on 53 minutes they were level. A fine dinked pass over the top of the home defence by Gray allowed Martin to bear down on goal. Unable to get a shot out and then forced wide, Martin was able to send in a perfect right-wing cross for Jon Shaw to nod home.

Cambridge had failed to call Tyler into any worthwhile action since their goal but the Town stopper could only stand and watch as the hosts re-took the lead on 62 minutes. A right-wing free-kick was met by substitute Nthan Blissett, who headed home with his first touch.

That goal came against the run of the play but the Town were only behind for three minutes when they were awarded a penalty when Gray was bundled over by Pope inside the box. Solomon Taiwo stepped up to calmly send the home stopper the wrong way to make it two apiece.

Having been pegged back Cambridge came close to going back in front, a brave block from Steve McNulty prevented a rocket of a shot from centre-back Charlie Wassmer troubling Tyler on 68 minutes.

The Hatters almost had the lead for the first time on 70 minutes when Ainge sent a scorching low shot goalwards from 18 yards that Pope did well to get his hands to.

From the resultant corner, Goodman saw a poked effort hacked away as the Town pressed.

Both sides pushed for a winner in the closing stages with half-chances but in the end they had to settle for a share of the spoils.










TOWN 1-2 KIDDERMINSTER



LETHAL LEADERS EARN VICTORY

John Still thought his side could have earned a point after the Town went down to a home defeat at the hands of league leaders Kidderminster Harriers at Kenilworth Road.

Harriers were 2-0 up at half-time courtesy of Josh Gowling's 13th-minute opener and Anthony Malbon's close range finish 10 minutes before the break.

The Town twice hit the woodwork – Scott Rendell arched a shot onto the crossbar in the first half before a combination of Jon Shaw and a visiting defender rattled the bar in the second period.

Substitute Andre Gray's goal seven minutes before the end made it 2-1, but it was the two first half goals from the visitors that did the damage.

"It was a strange game," Still told Hatters Player afterwards. "They were a bit better than us in the first half. We had two good chances to score through Scott Rendell and they had three and scored from two of them.

"Fair play to Kidderminster. I thought they edged the first half without really dominating and we were disappointed to come in at half-time 2-0 down.

"The second half took a while to get going but we cranked up the pressure, we hit the bar again and then scored. We just need to be better in both boxes, because I was disappointed with the way we defended ours. Recently that has been an area which we've done well in.

"I thought we done okay overall. We weren't great, but we were okay. Were we good enough to win? Definitely not. Were we good enough to get something? Maybe."

Leaders Harriers have missed out on the Play-Offs by one place in the last two seasons but Burr's side booked their spot in the top five with this victory.

Manager Steve Burr has been at the helm for three years and Still believes that was evident in Harriers' confidence and organisation.

"When you look at the bigger picture they are on a fine run, Steve's able to pick a settled team whilst we are changing things; both in terms of styles of play and personnel," said Still. Steve's been building this team for three years and that's where they are today. We're at the very start of our building process.

"As for our Play-Off chances I don't think it can ever be over until it's mathematically impossible, but it is looking very difficult."

Still confirmed defender Steve McNulty was withdrawn in the first half due to ankle injury shortly after Kidderminster's second goal.

"I thought the lead up to that goal was a foul and Steve Burr said the same - but that's gone now," said Still. "We took a bit of risk playing Macca and we've had to take him off but I thought Scott Griffiths did well on his debut even though he's not fully fit himself yet."



ON THIS DAY

THE RECORD

A busy day in the Hatters' history books. The Town have played 24 times on 9th April, winning nine, losing 11 and drawing four. The Hatters have scored 39 and conceded 30. That's 69 goals all told, which works out at 2.875 goals per game.

BIG GAMES

There have been a number of high profile matches involving the Hatters on this day in history. We'll start in the chronological order. In 1988 the Town went down 2-1 to Wimbledon in an FA Cup semi final at White Hart Lane. Leading through Mick Harford's powerful shot the Town were then hit by a Dons double. A John Fashanu benalty made it 1-1 before Dennis Wise hit he winner. Wimbledon would go on and beat Liverpool in the final.

It was more heartbreak for the Town a year later on 9th April when Nottingham Forest recovered from a goodown to beat the Hatters in the Littlewoods Cup final of 1989. Again it was Harford who had the Town in front but two goals from Nigel Clough and a one from Steve Webb gave Forest a 3-1 victory.

The Town, by now in what is now the Championship, reached the FA Cup semi-final again in 1994 after a terrific cup run that saw them beat Premier League Newcastle and West Ham. However, two Darren Peacock goals gave Chelsea a 2-0 win at Wembley. Current Hatters goalkeeper coach Dmitri Kharine played for the Blues that day.

TEN-TWO

In more recent times, the Town have tasted success on this day in history, winning their last two matches in the Blue Square Bet Premier by an aggregate scoreline of 10-2. Last year the Hatters saw off Hayes & Yeading United at Kenilworth Road thanks to two Stuart Fleetwood goals and one each from Keith Keane and Andre Gray.

In 2011, the Hatters put six past Southport at Kenilworth Road with six different players finding the net. Amari Morgan-Smith, Robbie Willmott, Freddie Murray, Jason Walker, Zdenek Kroca and Claude Gnakpa scored the Town's goals, with the final four scored in the final six minutes.

ENOCH'S ARMY

The Town were on course for promotion from League One in 2005 and a goal six minutes from time from substitute Enoch Shownumni earned Mike Newell's side a vital 1-0 win at AFC Bournemouth. The result, against a Cherries side defending a fine home record, was

made even sweeter given the fact the Hatters played three-quarters of the game with 10 men following the first-half dismissal of defender Russ Perrett

HATTERS V HORNETS

The Town still hold sway in the meetings with rivals Watford (32-25 in league victories) and on this day in 2006, on the last time the two sides met, an equaliser from Ahmet Brkovic prevented the Hornets from doing the double over the Town in that Championship campaign. It was the 22nd draw in all competitions between the two clubs.

TOP FLIGHT TOWN

Of the 24 matches played on this day four have come in the top flight of English football. What's more the Hatters have won three of these four games. Prior to their FA Cup final meeting in 1959, the Town beat Nottingham Forest 5-1 at Kenilworth Road with Allan Brown scoring four and Billy Bingham hitting the othe

Then, a year later, the Town lost 3-2 at home to Manchester United in front of 21,242 at Kenilworth Road. Billy Bingham scored both of the Hatters' goals. It wasn't until 1975 that the Hatters were next in action on this day in the top flight when two goals from Jimmy Anderson sealed a 2-1 win over championship-chasing Everton in front of 13,437 at Kenilworth Road.

David Moss was the Town's hero on the fourth and final time the Town last played on this day in the top flight 30 years ago. The winger netted an 89th-minute winner to secure a 2-1 victory over Aston Villa at Kenilworth Road. The Hatters' season would end with the last-day escape act at Manchester City.








LUTON TOWN 5-0 BRIGHTON

18TH SEPTEMBER 1982

The Hatters got off to a mixed start to the new campaign following their promotion to the top flight in 1982 with goals flying in at both ends of the field to keep the neutral supporter as well as the television companies in seventh heaven.

On the opening day, an entertaining 2-2 draw was played out at Tottenham before West Ham showed the Town how Division One strikers took their chances when winning 2-0 at Kenilworth Road. The players learnt quickly and a hat-trick from new boy Paul Walsh saw off Notts County in a 5-3 thriller before it was back to square one following a 4-1 hammering at Aston Villa.

By now the Luton supporters did not know what to expect, but spurred on by the thrill of the unknown over 2,000 travelled to Anfield the following week to witness an amazing 3-3 draw with Liverpool managing to score against three different Luton goalkeepers.

Despite this wonderful performance the Town only gained a point for their efforts leaving them hovering just above the drop zone.

Perhaps a couple of gritty performances and mean 1-0 victories were needed to push the Hatters up the table starting with the visit of Brighton to Kenilworth Road on 18th September.

Brighton set out with a defensive formation, which was completely the wrong thing to do against the cavalier 4-3-3 of the Town. Once Brian Stein had opened the scoring after 20 minutes there was only going to be one winner and it was a surprise that it took until the second half for the floodgates to open.

The Brighton defence was pulled all over the place

by David Moss switching wings at will while Stein and Walsh where too quick and clever for the flat-footed defenders, latching on to through balls from Ricky Hill, Wayne Turner and Horton.

Turner netted with a spectacular overhead kick, Stein crossed for Moss to head home with the winger returning the compliment shortly afterwards.

Stein's hat-trick goal and the Town's fifth came in the closing seconds after he outpaced a dispirited defence to get on the end of a clever through ball from Mal Donaghy.

Bolomon Taiwo netted the Hatters' second from the apot after Andre Gray was hauled down by U's stopper Nick Pope, but despite Shaw's penalty-taking credentials he stood aside for Taiwo to dispatch.

"Under the previous manager we had decided when Scott Rendell wasn't in the team I was going to take them but I'm not one to stand on the pitch and argue," said Shaw.

"I assumed I would be taking it then out of my eye line Dave Martin sprinted down and across came Solomon and I thought, 'you know what, you two can fight it out for it'.


"It was a fantastic penalty but as a forward you want to score whenever you can and penalties do help at the end of the season."

When John Still told me I could see my hand twitching a little bit, but as you go through the warm up and you get a feel of the ball it kind of goes away a bit but I tried to get past it as quick as possible as soon as the game kicked off."

Robinson capped off an impressive afternoon in the heart of the Hatters midfielder by threading through the pass for Andre Gray's late consolation.

"Andre has been doing that a lot this season, he's top scorer and with his pace he's dangerous if you can put a ball in front of him and the rest does itself," said Robinson. "If he'd have missed it wouldn't have been as nice for me but because he scored I can say I got an assist."


Robinson penned a deal in the summer from the Foxes and has been forced to wait for his first team outing. But speaking about his frustration he spoke with maturity about his position within the squad.

"I am enjoying it," he said. "I am learning my way around the training ground and the area so


it's all good. The lads all seem friendly enough, trying their hardest to find little things to fine you for but other than that everybody is making me feel welcome."

After a stop-start career at London Road where he found himself loaned out numerous times, Griffiths is hoping to nail down a regular place in the squad.


"It would be nice to stay in one place for more than a month," he said.

Having seen the Hatters claim the Littlewoods
Cup at Wembley in 1988, witnessed their
phenomenal 3-2 victory at Derby County on
the last day of the season in 1990 to stay in
the top flight, and reported on Town's 3-2
extra-time victory over Scunthorpe United to
lift the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in 2009 – but
on Saturday that all seemed a million miles
away in Carlisle.

The Town's humiliating 5-1 defeat against Gateshead, the biggest in their Conference history, was also played out in front of the smallest-ever attendance to witness a competitive first team game.

Shambolic

Luton's 126-strong travelling army of fans made up a good proportion of the 382 gate at Brunton Park, but few will have believed the shambolic performance on display as the Hatters reached the lowest ebb in their history.

This season's rudderless Play-Off challenge certainly lost it's direction several weeks ago and, like it or not, we have been planning for next season for some time.

Having surely reached rock bottom, the only way from here can only be up. Regardless of where we finish it will be our lowest position in living memory and a painful experience for everyone at the club.

Major changes

Undoubtedly there will be major changes in the summer. And we can only hope that this humiliating result has the same galvanising effect as our 8-1 defeat at Lincoln City in December 1966.

Bruce Rioch netted for the Town as the Imps triumphed in the battle of bottom two clubs in the old Division Four, but Luton turned things around to stay up before claiming the title and promotion two seasons later.

Now is the time for us to finally start building for the future. The want for instant success has been



the driving force for supporters and the club alike since falling into the Conference. Every season promotion has been the burning aim, and it will remain so, although perhaps tempered by the chastising effect of this season.

New resolve

We will remain the stellar name in the Conference and the scalp that every team wants to take. But, perhaps with our pride wounded by this season and scarred by the memory of the Gateshead defeat, we can find a new resolve, discover a little more patience and perhaps hope for, rather than expect success.

Manager John Still's 'project' may take some time to come to fruition, but surely all we want to see at the moment is progression, growth and a glimpse of our longed-for future.

Attention football clubs: our game – not to mention your supporters' sanity – desperately needs you!

We're now in April, the final month of league football, in which we here at The NLP undoubtedly see as the worst season of weather since we've been on the shalves

There have been so many postponements in fact, that our results team are considering invoicing for a new 'P' button for their keyboards!

The clocks have gone back but the last few weeks will see a large number of clubs trying to cram-in a double figure amount of games just to make it through to the final day.

Unhealthy, to an extent unprofessional and sadly for a few a season spoiler.

The back-log of games caused by Mother Nature's lack of mercy will contribute directly to some teams falling short of the title, a promotion position or achieving survival.

Agreed, nobody would have predicted the snow of last week, freezing temperatures when we baked in the 20s on this week 12 months ago.

But the usual response of "well what can we do about the weather?" simply doesn't wash.

There is something we can do – but only if the clubs themselves want to make that change and get their leagues going on the first Saturday in August, and play on until the first week of May.

What a head start all divisions could have if they played four Saturday league matches and three midweek games under the lights in the season's first month.

Or alternatively, play some less-costly young and hungry players for the first two weeks if money needs to be saved!

Pre-season can be fun, but it does not need to last for seven weeks.

Get the real games going on the first Saturday in August and let's play some football when the weather is good and gates will be higher.

It's now down to the clubs to start getting their voices heard.



WITH YOUTH TEAM PHYSIOTHERAPIST JONATHAN CHATFIELD

The development of the elite player performance plan (EPPP) has brought about a significant restructure of the football club's academy and vouth team set-up.

The EPPP requires all clubs to have an academy sports science and medicine department to ensure all players health and fitness are well catered for.

Since the start of the season the club has invested an appreciated amount of money into the development of the sports science and medical department. We now have all the necessary medical supplies that are required pitchside for all matches and training sessions including defibrillators, spinal boards, stretchers, medical gases and fracture management equipment. The purchase of this equipment shows the immediate quality of care that all players receive when needed.

Alongside the equipment, all necessary staff have been trained on using the

defibrillators and first aid. New for this season we also provided full time internship opportunities for three graduate sports therapists: George Goodwin, Nicholas Cole and Ryan Bradley. Not only were the therapists available during the day to help with the first team and youth team, but they also looked after the academy age groups between under-9 to under-16 at all training sessions and on matchdays. As well as the full-time therapist interns we also have developed a close relationship with Bedfordshire University and their Sports Therapy department, in

particular Mark Cousins, who has provided us with 12 matchday interns so overy academy match has nomeone pitchside whose clinical knowledge excels just a standard first aider.

We have also had the fortune to have had our sports science intern, Jack O'Connor and part-time sports scientist, Chris White, monitor and develop the youth team on their physical attributes. This has been an essential part of the scholars' physical development, and the performances and physicality in the youth matches has shown the importance of their work.

Alongside the sports scientists we also have three match analyst interns - Alastair Inwood, Dom Williams and Sam Cole - who film and clip selected academy matches and all youth team matches to provide the players and coaching staff with DVDs for them to analyse performances and tactics.

A big thank you must go to all the personnel mentioned in this article, without you the season wouldn't have run as smoothly or as professionally.

Next season the youth sports science and medicine department will further increase the opportunity for internships and the personnel recruited. We are in the process of applications and developing more protocols and structure that will bring us into line with teams above our category rating. This development will not only benefit the players' involved but the club's profile in having an extremely efficient and professional sports science and medicine department.

Lastly I wish to congratulate Brett Longden and Jerome Jibodu, who have been offered their first professional contracts at the club.

Town fans won't have long to wait for their next feast of football under the Kenilworth Road floodlights when they welcome promotion-chasing Grimsby on Friday night.



GRIMSBY TOWN

Who? Grimsby Town. You know, the team from Cleethorpes? Known as the Mariners, the club were formed in 1878 as Grimsby Pelham and have been playing at their Blundell Park home since 1898.

Geography lesson It's a long way from Cleethorpes to Luton on a Tuesday night, as the 75 die-hard Town fans will tell you following January's FA Trophy tie. It's a 186-mile trip one way and it won't be until the small hours before the Mariners tuck themselves up for the night.

Top to bottom The Mariners were relegated to the Blue Square Bet Premier in 2010 and became the fourth side in English football to play in the fifth tier and the top flight. The Hatters, Oxford United and Carlisle United are the three other clubs.

Joined at the hip There once was a time when jointmanagers was an in-thing. That's not so much the case any more, but Tuesday's visitors will have two bosses shouting from the sidelines. Joint-manager Paul Hurst and Rob Scott took over at Blundell Park in 2011.

Trophy cabinet The Mariners were a penalty shootout success away from adding to their list of silverware when they were defeated on penalties by Wrexham in the FA Trophy final at Wembley last month. However, the club have twice won today's equivalent of the Championship (in 1901 and 1934). In 1980 they won the old Third Division (now League One) and they've twice picked up the title in Division 3 (North). To cap it all the Mariners have also won the old Division Four (now League Two) and the Football League Trophy, in 1998.

Is that it? Definitely not. The Mariners are also the holders of the Lincolnshire Senior Cup...a trophy the club have won


a staggering 38 times. That's just one more than tonight's visitors Lincoln. Sorry to bring that up Imps fans.

How they doing? Put it like this: a win over the Hatters could seal the Mariners' place in the Play-Offs. Prior to their game at Dartford tonight, Friday's visitors are eight points clear of sixth placed Forest Green so their fate could already be decided by then. Having been in contention for the title the Mariners' form nosedived in February and March but a five-match unbeaten run has helped steady the ship.

On the road If they manage to avoid defeat against the Darts this evening the Mariners will arrive at Kenilworth Road as the team who have lost the least amount of games away from home in the Blue Square Bet Premier. They have only lost four matches on their travels, winning eight and drawing eight of the other 16 fixtures.

Knowing me, knowing you The Hatters will be hoping to equal Grimsby's record of 15 league victories over the Town on Friday. The Mariners have won 15, the Town 14, whilst there have been 12 draws in league competition. Overall the Mariners have the edge 18-15 in term of victories in all competitions. The Hatters' last win over the North Lincolnshire club came in October 2011 at Blundell Park when a goal from Tommy Wright earned a 1-0 win.

Telly addicts Friday's game was originally scheduled to be the Hatters' final home game of the season. However, the subsequent postponements and rearrangement of the matches with Newport and Ebbsfleet have meant this won't be the case. The word "Friday" has already, and purposefully, cropped up almost a dozen times in this piece...so remember the game isn't this Saturday. Official Blue Square Bet Premier broadcasters Premier Sports TV will be screening the game live and it'll kick-off at 7.45pm.
