



the manager JOHN STILL

Good evening and welcome to Kenilworth Road to you all for this Skrill Premier fixture with Grimsby Town

I'd like to extend a warm welcome to Paul Hurst, the Grimsby manager, plus his staff and players plus the directors and supporters of the Mariners.

Today's game is being screened live by BT Sport which brings with it a touch more attention than normal. It's great to see BT Sport broadcasting Conference football. It brings this level to a much wider audience and gives many people the chance to see the quality that exists in this division. It's good for football and good for the Skrill Premier's profile.

Our opponents this evening had a good year last season. They reached the FA Trophy final and were narrowly beaten in the Play-Offs by a Newport County side who would go on and regain their Football League status.

Contenders

This evening we have to respect our opponents. Given Grimsby's final league position and their performances throughout their last campaign suggests they are one of the strong contenders for promotion this time around.

We find ourselves playing this match at a good time. We have come through a series of difficult fixtures having acquitted ourselves very, very well, especially last Saturday away to Kidderminster Harriers. It was a strong a performance as I've seen since I have been at the club. Every player put in a solid display and it helped secure a fine 2-0 victory. It's the kind of performance that each and every player could be happy with when they walked off the pitch at the end. We scored two goals, albeit two penalties, but I still believe the result was a fair reflection of the game.

The players have responded well following a slow start. The last three games in particular have been hugely encouraging and to keep three clean sheets against three of the favourites for promotion is a massive bonus.

Today the players will have to be in the same vein of form to keep the run going. Grimsby are an excellent side but we meet them at a good time. Our last few performances have been very, very good but the most pleasing aspect for me is that I know there is a lot of improvement still left in us, both as individuals and as a team.

These are my first notes since we were able to bring striker Paul Benson to the club so I'd like to officially welcome Paul to Kenilworth Road. Obviously we know each other very well, having signed him for Dagenham & Redbridge from White Ensign. He is going to be a valuable member of the team and showed what he is capable of on his debut last weekend.

Challengers

Looking further ahead we are again on television next Friday when we make the trip to Wrexham. It is sure to be another tough encounter. Andy Morrell's side have proven to be a strong team at this level over the last couple of the seasons. But we are in that mode where were are playing teams classified as 'challengers' – and we have risen to the challenges very well, so long make that continue.

On Tuesday I witnessed our development side register another victory, beating Stevenage 3-1, which saw a number of the lads who have yet to taste first team action the chance to impress. They all did that with aplomb. Matt Robinson, Jim Stevenson, Jake Woolley and Alex Wall – who mostly notably got 75 minutes under his belt after overcoming a virus – all did well and it's great to see that we have a number of players knocking on my proverbial door with performances like this.

Turning my attention back to today, one of my biggest messages for you is 'get behind your team'. Stay with us for the whole 90 minutes because your support is – and has been in recent weeks, especially – unbelievable.

Make sure you get behind your team and let's hope for a positive result.

WITH DIRECTOR DAVID BLAKEMAN



Welcome to today's game against Grimsby

Our opponents today have made a solid start and we fully expect them to be in the shake-up for promotion come the end of the season.

We also welcome a former Luton player, Alan

Goodall, who has recently signed for this evening's visitors on a one month loan deal, to cover for injuries to various key players, as well as winger Scott Neilson who was with us for a spell last season.

The result and performance at Kidderminster last Saturday was hugely encouraging. Paul Benson made a marvellous debut and the team, as a whole, performed superbly, to my mind, to record a very important win – at the home ground of another of our promotion rivals. Wins at venues like Kidderminster are crucial if we are to achieve our ambition of securing automatic promotion this season. We will not, of course, win every such game, but Saturday's performance made it abundantly clear that this squad is capable of being in the mix come the end of the campaign.

Our away support was also vocal and hugely supportive. Many thanks to all of those supporters who

made the trip up to Kidderminster. The noise generated from our fans evidently helped lift the team – although their performance suggested that a lift was perhaps, on this occasion, not particularly necessary

We have been undertaking lots of work off the pitch, as well as on it. Recent programme notes have discussed various aspects of what we're doing behind the scenes. I hope you have noticed that the catering option has been significantly improved. We hope to press on further in this respect.

Improvements

We are undertaking various ground improvements to improve the experience of supporters attending the stadium. Again, and notwithstanding that we are, as you know, very actively pursuing stadium moves, we remain committed to further improvements in this respect.

So far as the stadium is concerned, we are undertaking a great deal of work behind the scenes. As we hope you will appreciate, however, it is in the very nature of property transactions that one cannot reveal too much information — as that can damage one's hand in terms of negotiating with third parties. As soon as we have the information that we deem it safe to make public, you have our assurance that we will do so. We trust, however, that you will understand that the sensitivity of these matters may mean that information might not be revealed as soon as we would like it to be.



Your patience is appreciated. Meanwhile, we are consulting with Trust in Luton regarding these matters and we'll ensure that supporters' opinions are taken into account as the project progresses.

On the community front, we continue to run with a wide variety of initiatives. We are closely involved with a number of local charitable organisations. We are able to make certain meeting rooms available for such organisations, if they have projects or initiatives that would benefit from use of those rooms. Ultimately, of course, we hope that, in doing so, the attendees are more likely to become Luton fans, which would help swell our already extraordinary fan base. If you represent a local charitable or voluntary organisation, we are quite happy to hear from you with any proposals for use of the meeting rooms. Of course, those rooms have to be left available for internal functions or events – but it is the nature of a football stadium that, for much of the time, the stadium is empty.

Some of you may have noticed that TOKKO has opened in George Street. TOKKO is a new, world class, youth facility. It is aimed at 13 to 19 year olds – or up to 25, if disabled. The range of facilities at TOKKO is spectacular. We are working closely with that organisation in a variety of respects. We hope, for example, to open a virtual Luton Town museum, that we hope will encourage more young supporters to attend Kenilworth Road. We will keep you abreast of developments in this respect.

A number of supporters travelling down Hatters way have noticed that, following the busway works, the southern flank of the stadium does not look too good on the eye. We are endeavouring to deal with such matters. Works will be undertaken to remedy some of the defective brickwork. You will also notice that the old hoardings adjacent to Hatters Way are vacant. We are speaking to advertising companies in order to see whether it is possible to let the space so that we can generate more income for the club. If you are interested in advertising on the hoardings please contact me at the club.

It follows from the above that the busway will shortly open. Again, we hope this will be a useful facility, enabling more supporters to attend the ground and for existing supporters to attend the ground more easily. The busway is due to open soon so it will be interesting to see what effect it has.

Enjoy the game – and let us hope for a resounding Luton victory!

Since my last notes were written before our trip to Forest Green, it is with pleasure to write that we have kept three successive clean sheets and picked up five points during that

I have lost count how many times I have written in this column how important it is for us to keep clean sheets and lost count how many times I have spoken of my disappointment when we have failed to do so.

So, as you might expect, I am delighted with our miserly defensive record. We have conceded just twice in six games. Of those two goals, one was a massively deflected free-kick at Southport, the other a mis-hit scuff by Macclesfield striker Chris Holroyd. That was a good point all things considered, and we followed that up with another strong, if unspectacular, performance against a Cambridge United team who have started the season well and sit top of the league at the time of writing. Again, a clean sheet was one of the positives to take. Cambridge had the better of the first half but we shaded the second and I think a point was fair come the final whistle.

Slowly but surely we have been able to find our feet after a disappointing and frustrating start. That Southport game still annoys me thinking about it now. But thankfully we have recovered well and after two goalless draws we secured an excellent 2-0 win at Kidderminster last weekend. It was a convincing win



and I thought we got the ball down and played a lot of good football. We really did step up and we totally deserved the three points. Jake Howells scored twice from the spot but he could have scored two more from open play. It was a good day, and another clean sheet

A lot of the time it's goalkeepers and defenders who get the credit for keeping clean sheets. People seem to forget the tireless work the midfield and front men do to close down, chase, harry and hustle the opposition. Our work ethic all over the pitch has been first class and long may that continue.

The Kidderminster result sets us up nicely for today's game with Grimsby which is being screened live by BT Sport. Once again it is another tough match for us in a series of fixtures against well-fancied teams. However, on the run we're on, we're confident. Grimsby lost at home last weekend so they are going to be desperate to get back to winning ways. Therein lies a danger for us but if we continue to do what we have been doing we are all confident of getting another positive result.

The manager has done well to instil a winning mentality throughout the whole club and it was good to see the development squad win again during the week against Stevenage.

Finally, I must pay tribute to the 821 of you who made the trip to Kidderminster to cheer us on to victory. Your backing that afternoon was one of my highlights of the season so far. Please keep it up this afternoon and enjoy the game.

TRANSFER NEWS

The Hatters beat off competition from a host of Football League clubs to complete the signing of Swindon Town striker Paul Benson on loan until the end of the season last week.



The 33-year-old joins the Town on a deal with a view to a permanent transfer having scored 111 career goals with Dagenham & Redbridge, Charlton, Swindon, Portsmouth and Cheltenham.

Benson was originally unearthed by John Still whilst the striker was with Essex League side White Ensign, who he scored 107 goals in 65 games for in all competitions.

The frontman was not fazed by the jump to the Conference and whilst with the Daggers he notched 82 goals, and helped the club win the Conference title in 2006/07 campaign with 28 goals.

Goals

His form in front of goal alerted the attentions of a number of clubs and in August 2010 Benson signed for Charlton Athletic. He scored 10 goals in 28 league starts for the Addicks before signing for Paulo Di Canio's Swindon in January 2012.

He hit 12 goals for the Robins as Di Canio's side won the League Two title, but following their subsequent promotion, the striker found regular first team football hard to come by and Benson was loaned to Portsmouth and Cheltenham last season, scoring six goals in 22 starts.

Still told Talk of the Town: "I think I'm getting a more knowledgeable player and certainly a more experienced one. He likes to play down the middle; he's a centreforward, a number nine. Yes he can drop off, but he's a centre-forward and good at his job.

"I'm delighted to be able to bring him in - it's been a long, long drawn-out process, but fortunately it's all worked out for us.

"Paul wanted to come here and only here. Not because of me but because he wants to do well. And I think he will."

History

"I said to Terry Harris 'you know what, we might have somebody here'. We brought him down to Dagenham for a reserve game and he did okay in that. We sat down with him afterwards and he made it clear he wanted to come and the rest, as they say, is history."

There was just one piece of business for the Town on transfer deadline day this week.

Defender Lathaniel Rowe-Turner joined Skrill Premier outfit Alfreton Town on loan.

The 23-year-old former Leicester and Torquay man joins Nicky Law's Reds until 2nd January.

Rowe-Turner will not be available to play against the Hatters in the fixture between the two clubs in December.

WHERE? Wrexham. The Town's solitary journey across the Welsh border of the campaign. Although, having said that it's believed that Chester FC's Deva Stadium is half in England and half in Wales. By anyway, to be

more precise, the Racecourse (or Racecourse Ground depending on individual preference). The stadium lies on the glamorously named Mold Road.

HOW TO GET THERE. Believe it or not, it's relatively straightforward despite the amount of time you spend off the motorway once you leave it. M1 and M6 north. leaving the latter at junction 10A for the M54 towards Shrewsbury, Sneaking under Shrewsbury, take the A5 north and then A483. Look out for signs for the A541 junction and exit. The ground is well sign-posted. If in doubt, type LL11 2AH into your sat-nay - preferably before you set-off.

BOBBING ALONG. As if you needed us to tell you, the Bobbers will be doing what they do best: running a coach to a Town away game. They leave the main Maple Road car park for North Wales at 2pm sharp and the fare is £23 for adults and £20 for concessions. Give them a call on 01234 856542 to book your place. They'll look after you.

DON'T BE FOOLED. Okay, so Mold Road doesn't sound the most enticing of venues to watch a football match (or consume food inside), but if you haven't made a trip to the Racecourse before you'll be pleasantly surprised. Apart from one, and now unused, end of terracing behind one of the goals, the stadium is in decent nick, as you'd expect from a former Football League venue. Town fans will be housed in a corner of the main stand which affords a decent view of the playing action as well as good acoustics for those fans who want to drum up a bit of vocal encouragement.

TEMPLE OF DOOM. A trip to Racecourse has, on the whole, been a pretty miserable experience for Town fans down the years. In fact the Hatters have only ever won on four occasions in this corner of North Wales in

But that's not to say the Town haven't enjoyed their brief stays there in the past. A 2-1 win on St George's Day in 2005 sealed the Hatters the League One title. whilst an excellent 3-0 (3-0 at half-time) win in the Play-Offs two years back won't be forgotten easily.

The Town even had cause for celebration when losing 2-1 in the Play-Offs a year ago, as an aggregate victory took them to Wembley for the final in 2012. We then lost to York, but that's another story.

IT'LL BE ALRIGHT ON THE NIGHT. Hatters fans will have plenty of reason behind any sense of déjà vu next Friday. Since both clubs have been in the Conference the Town have made the pilgrimage to the Racecourse six times - with only one of those games kicking off at 3pm on a Saturday...and that was last season. Next week's match will be the fifth game in seven at the Racecourse between the two clubs that has been screened live on television.

FORM FACTOR. The Red Dragons headed to Nuneaton Town today looking to end a run of five games without a win. An opening day win over Welling United was followed by three defeats and two draws. Andy Morrell's side conceded 12 goals in their opening six games and currently sit in 17th place in the Skrill Premier with five points.

Morrell admitted his side need to "get back to basics" following a surprise 2-0 home defeat to rivals Chester last weekend.

FAMILIAR FACE. Shaun Whalley is the sole dressing room connection between the two clubs. The winger, who joined the Town in the summer from Southport, spent one season with Wrexham in 2008/09, scoring four goals in 16 league appearances.



It says a lot when a team finish fourth and reach a national cup final yet end the season with bitter disappointment.

The last campaign for this evening's visitors Grimsby Town was the best in a long time. Sadly – and don't worry, we've been there too – it would end in heartache. Up in amongst the Conference's pace-setters throughout the season, our visitors comfortably made the top five with the meanest defence in the division, conceding just 38 times in the regular 46 matches. However, the Mariners would fall at the first hurdle in the Play-Offs, losing 2-0 on aggregate to eventual winners Newport County.

Two months prior the whole of Grimsby and Cleethorpes descended on Wembley – the first time the club had played under the new arch – but a penalty shootout defeat against promotion rivals Wrexham – who themselves would lose in the Play-Off final to Newport – in the FA Trophy final meant the Mariners faced up to the first of two heart-wrenching disappointments.

Having experienced such rollercoaster emotions last term, hopes are high on Humberside that the Mariners, now in their fourth season in non-league football, can ended their Football League exile.

The Blundell Park faithful have enjoyed a decent start to the new campaign. Grimsby have collected 10 points from their first six matches, winning three, drawing one and losing twice. The Mariners arrive at Kenilworth Road for this televised Skrill Premier game off the back of a 2-1 home defeat to early season surprise package Nuneaton Town

That defeat ended a mini-run of two wins from two with victories away to Hyde and at home to Alfreton. On the road, tonight's visitors have won two and lost one of their three away fixtures so far. As well as the narrow 1-0 victory at Hyde, the Mariners lost 1-0 at newly-promoted Welling United and came from behind to win 2-1 at Gateshead. Confidence behind the Mariners' chances of promotion stems from the strength in squad depth at Blundell Park, which has bags of Football League and Skrill Premier experience and know-how.

Summer arrivals in defender Chris Doig and midfielder Scott Kerr adds nous and guile to the squad, but the main cause for optimism at Blundell Park is the return to fitness of star striker Liam Hearn. The powerful frontman was restricted to just seven appearances last term having picked up an Achilles injury. In his first season with the club he hit 27 goals and now, fully fit, the former Alfreton striker has scored twice in his first five games this season. His record in Conference competition reads 30 goals in 48 starts. The Hatters defence are sure to be tested as they aim to keep a fourth successive clean sheet tonight.

Grimsby, though, will be looking to win on Bedfordshire soil for the first time since in 10 years. The Mariners beat the Hatters, then managed by Mike Newell, who would also go on and manage Grimsby, 2-1 at Kenilworth Road in August 2003.

Since then the Hatters have remained unbeaten in the last four meetings between the two clubs at Kenilworth Road. The last two games, however, have both ended 1-1.

CHRIS DOIG. Experienced Scotland-born centre-half who signing this summer having impressed on trial. Began with Queen of the South before a switch to Nottingham Forest in 1997. Also enjoyed spells with Northampton and York.

CLAYTON McDONALD. 6ft 6in centre-back who penned a one-year deal this summer following his release from Port Vale. Began his career with Manchester City.

WITH MATT AQUINO

Grimsby Town begin their fourth season in the Skrill Premier among the favourites to at least achieve another Play-Off spot.

The Mariners suffered Play-Off heartache last season losing 2-0 on aggregate to Newport County, after a mounting a formidable challenge for the title for much of the season.

Managers Paul Hurst has added nine players to an already strong and experienced squad over the summer. York trio Scott Kerr, Patrick McLaughlin and Chris Doig have been the most high profile, but many have talked about Liam Hearn as being a 'new signing' after the prolific hitman missed the majority of last season with an Achilles injury.

How did they perform last season?

Grimsby finished fourth in last season's Blue Square Bet Premier and lost just nine games – the least in the division. The Mariners also had the best defence, conceding just 38 goals in 46 games.

Away from home, Grimsby lost just four of their 23 games and again had the division's tightest defence conceding just 19 all term away from Blundell Park.

How have they started their 2013/14 campaign?

Hurst's team currently reside in eighth place in the Skrill Premier with 10 points having played six, won three, drawn one and lost two. The Mariners have won two of their three away games, triumphing over Gateshead and Hyde, and only lost to Welling after conceding in the 85th minute.

Despite it being early days in the season, an early trend has developed in the visitors' campaign – they have gone behind in four of their six games which has put them under undue pressure too many times for their fans. At Blundell Park last weekend, Grimsby were booed off the pitch as they went in at the break 2-0 down against Nuneaton. They managed to pull a goal back but it was not enough to avoid defeat.

How will they play? Who are their danger men?

Grimsby set up in 4-4-2 formation for much of last season, but with some changes in the middle of the park, the Mariners have been using a 4-3-3 formation this term. 24-year-old James McKeown, who played 45 league games for Grimsby last season and was a key part of Town's watertight defence, will start in between the sticks. The versatile Paul Bignot will play on the

right of the visitors' defence alongside Shaun Pearson, 32-year-old player-coach Chris Doig and new loan signing and ex-Hatter Alan Goodall.

Andi Thanoj will be the one to watch in Grimsby's midfield. The Albanian under-21 international is often described as the team's quarterback, and will try to dictate the play for his side here at Kenilworth Road. Craig Disley will protect Thanoj while attacking midfielder Patrick McLaughlin, who tasted promotion with York City, will

look to get forward and grab himself a goal. In the wide areas, pacey winger Joe Colbeck should start on the right with Alex Rodman on the opposite

flank. The danger-man for Grimsby will be Liam Hearn who scored 27 goals in 46 league games for the Mariners in the 2011/12 season.

1979/80 THIRD DIVISION CHAMPIONS

NIGEL BATCH: Goalkeeper who made 348 League appearances before joining Lincoln City in July 1987, then Darlington. He was a publican, since becoming a painter and decorator based in Holton-le-Clay.

DAVE MOORE: Right-back who joined Carlisle United in August 1983, then Blackpool, Grimsby again and Darlington. He managed Scunthorpe and has been physio at various clubs, now back at Grimsby.

KEVIN MOORE: Left-back who moved to Oldham Athletic in February 1987, then reunited with Chris Nicholl at Southampton. Later at Fulham, he became their stadium manager and died in April 2013.

JOE WATERS: Eire international midfielder who netted 65 goals in 357 League games before joining Tacoma Stars in May 1984. He has held various coaching posts in the United States, settling in Seattle.

CLIVE WIGGINTON: Central defender who had two spells with Grimsby, moving to Torquay United in July 1982, then Doncaster Rovers and Skegness. Now working for an asbestos removal company.

DEAN CROMBIE: Central defender who netted three goals in 320 League games, joining Bolton Wanderers in August 1987. Later with Lincoln City, he held various posts at Bolton, becoming an agent.

MIKE BROLLY: Winger who joined Derby County in August 1982, then Scunthorpe, Scarborough, Goole and Boston United. He became a chemistry teacher, notably at St Mary's RC School in Grimsby.

KEVIN KILMORE: Ex-England Youth striker who reunited with George Kerr at Rotherham United in August 1983, then again at Lincoln City. He has since been a licensee in Grimsby and Scunthorpe.

KEVIN DRINKELL: Striker who moved to Norwich City in June 1985, then Glasgow Rangers, Coventry City and Falkirk before managing Stirling Albion and Montrose. He now works in the media.

BOBBY MITCHELL: Midfielder who joined Carlisle United in August 1982, then George Kerr's Rotherham and Lincoln. He assisted Grimsby's community scheme and coached in the United States.

TONY FORD: England B international who had two spells at Grimsby before moving to Scunthorpe United in August 1994. Later with Mansfield Town, he assisted Steve Parkin at Rochdale and Barnsley.

1997/98 PLAY-OFF WINNERS

AIDAN DAVISON: Northern Ireland international goalkeeper who joined Sheffield United in August 1999, then Bradford City, Grimsby again and Colchester United. He now coaches Jax Destroyers.

JOHN MCDERMOTT: Long-serving right-back who was Player of the Year three times and scored 11 goals in a record 647 League games. He has coached at Grimsby Institute and Harrogate Town.

TONY GALLIMORE: Left-back who netted four goals in 273 League games, moving to Barnsley in August 2003, then Rochdale and Northwich Victoria. He runs a scaffolding business in Grimsby.

PETER HANDYSIDE: Scottish central defender who scored four times in 190 League games before joining Stoke City in July 2001, then had spells with Barnsley, Northwich Victoria and Hucknall.

MARK LEVER: Central defender who scored eight goals in 261 League games before joining Bristol City in July 2000. He later played for Mansfield Town and likeston Town, settling in Nottingham.

WAYNE BURNETT: Ex-England Youth midfielder who moved to Grays Athletic in September 2002. He has since managed Fisher Athletic, Dulwich Hamlet, Grays and now Dagenham & Redbridge.


KEVIN DONOVAN: Winger who scored 24 times in 156 League games before joining Barnsley in July 2001, then played for Rochdale, York City and Alfreton. He coached at Huddersfield's Academy.

Grimsby arrive at Kenilworth Road with two former Hatters in their ranks in left-back Alan Goodall and winger Scott Neilson, the latter re-joining the Mariners this summer having originally impressed on a loan spell at Blundell Park last season.

Kingsley Black, Marc North, Mick Cullen, Alan Neilson and Graham Rodger are some more names familiar with both sets of supporters, but the one player who served both clubs well, especially the Mariners, is forward Matt Tees.

Tees did not look like a so-called goal machine, as he was called on the terraces. He may have been slight and not particularly tall but he was tremendously brave, very strong and phenomenal in the air.

Joining Grimsby from Airdrie in 1963, Matt soon formed a prolific partnership with another future Hatter Rodney Green, which led to the pair moving to Charlton for a joint fee of £23,000 in 1967.

Luton manager at the time Alec Stock, looking for a partner for his young striker Malcolm Macdonald, managed to prise Matt from the Addicks for £25,000 in 1969. He proved a wonderful tutor to the future England international – and weighed in with his fair share of goals as the Town won promotion from Division Three (now League One) in 1970.

Job done and promotion secured, Matt moved back to Blundell Park where he earned legendary status to finish his playing career.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

The Town and Grimsby are no strangers to each other with today's fixture the 49th between the two clubs.

It's the Mariners that hold the head-to-head advantage, winning 18 to the Hatters' 15 in all competitions.

The record in league (including non-league)

competition is closer. Grimsby have won 15, the Town 14
Whilst 13 have ended all square.

Since both clubs have been in the Football Conference, the Town have been unbeaten in four fixtures at Kenilworth Road, winning two of these fixtures. The Mariners' last two visits to Bedfordshire, however, have ended in 1-1 draws. Last season an Alex Lawless goal have John Still's side a point whilst the season before last Andre Gray scored a goal on his Town debut.

Goals aren't hard to find looking through the record books. Only four of the 48 matches have ended goalless, while 29 goals were scored in the first six meetings between the two clubs. The Hatters beat the Mariners 6-0 in December 1897 but the Mariners got their revenge in the following campaign with a 5-0 win in April 1899.

There have been plenty more high-scoring fixtures between the two clubs down the years. Four goals from striker Steve White helped the Town to a 6-0 win in October 1981 in the Second Division (now Championship) title-winning season.

However, Grimsby beat the Hatters 5-0 at Blundell Park in a Division One (now Championship) game in February 1995 and 11 months later the Mariners stuck seven past the Town in a FA Cup third round tie at Blundell Park.

Last season the Mariners inflicted 4-1 and 3-0 defeats on the Hatters in league and FA Trophy encounters at Blundell Park prior to the 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road

However, today's visitors will be aiming for their first win at Kenilworth Road since a 2-1 victory in August 2003. Goals from Iain Anderson and Michael Boulding put the Mariners in charge that afternoon and despite a late Kevin Nicholls penalty for the Hatters, the visitors held on for all three points.

TALK OF THE TOWN: You're one of a number of ex-league clubs desperate to get back amongst the 92 - make the case for why it should be Grimsby's turn to achieve Football League salvation this season

CHRIS PARKER:

As fans of ex-Football League clubs, we all want to be back in the league but, as Luton have found, the fans' expectations can weigh heavy and the ability of the so-called 'smaller' clubs ensures it is a very competitive league.

Grimsby's challenge faded in the latter stages last season but, on paper at least, the squad looks stronger this time around.

If we can add more goals to a largely resolute defence then we will certainly be in the mix. Add a slice of luck and Grimsby Town will be back in the Football League.

TOTT: How has your season gone so far? From the early matches, what appear to be the Mariners' strengths and weaknesses?

CP: It's been a reasonable, if not spectacular, start. A disappointing loss at Welling has been balanced (slightly) by maximum points at both Hyde and Gateshead - two fixtures where we failed to take maximum points last season.

Our strengths so far have been the dominance and hold up play of Lenell John-Lewis, the pace of Joe Colbeck and the aerial power of Shaun Pearson.

Our weakness has been inconsistency - not just from game to game but also within games.

We haven't settled just yet into the managers' changed 4-3-3 formation. Our full backs have been a way short of their capabilities too.

TOTT: Luton were soundly beaten on both visits to Blundell Park last season in the Conference and FA Trophy. Do you feel the teams will be more closely matched this

> CP: The thing with football at this level is there seems to be a high turnover of players and staff on an almost yearly basis, irrespective of the previous season's performance. Coupled with this being only the seventh game of the league campaign, it's quite difficult to say how the two sides will match up in comparison to other years.

Although we comprehensively beat Luton at home on the two occasions mentioned, as

yet, our trips to Kenilworth Road since dropping into the Conference have yet to yield three points. I would add that the line-ups selected by Paul Buckle certainly helped us to those two victories.

TOTT: Scott Neilson was flying at Grimsby last season, but then seemed to lose form when he came to Luton. Why do you think this was? Will he play an important role for you this season?

CP: Scott can be something of an enigma. However, there is no doubting that on occasion he has the ability to change the course of a game through his

own individual talents. I think there is also a misperception about him not being conducive to a harmonious team unit indeed, during his loan spell with the club last season he formed an excellent relationship

full-back Aswad Thomas and striker Ross Hannah. resulting in arguably theirs and the team's most fruitful period of the campaign. I don't think that was purely coincidental.

With regards to his short spell at Luton, all I know is that injury curtailed his season - something which has unfortunately hampered his chances of staking a claim for a starting spot in the early stages of this campaign. Once he returns to full fitness, I think everyone at the club is hopeful he can make a big contribution to a successful year.

TOTT: Which of your players should we be looking out for today?

CP: I could reel off a number of players names who have had bright starts thus far - Shaun Pearson in defence, Joe Colbeck on the wing, Lenell John-Lewis as the attacking spearhead, and of course Liam Hearn, returning from a long-term injury. But in what will probably be a tightly contested affair today, I think the game will be crying out for someone from either side's midfield to step up and dictate. Therefore, if he starts, I'll say Andi Thanoj. This lad has real ability with the ball at his feet, he's among the most expansive passers in the league, and, contrary to popular belief, he's not afraid to

tackle.

TOTT: What do you make of the starts of your fellow teams in this nascent Skrill Premier season? Has any team surprised you so far?

CP: It's very early days. One thing that I have learnt after three seasons in the Conference is to expect the unexpected - and already, it appears all teams will drop points to the supposed 'lesser' or part-time clubs at some stage. If I had to stick my neck out and pick a team to surprise, I'd say Nuneaton. For a squad not riding off the back of the euphoria of a promotion season, their consistency so far has been notable for what looked like a relatively tough start, on paper at least.

TOTT: Our final question is always on a hot topic

- this week I'd like you to think about Cardiff City's red shirts and the renamed Hull City Tigers. Would you be happy for Grimsby to change part of their identity if it coincided with huge

success on the field? CP: Unless you are in the top five or six clubs in the Premier League I think success is only temporary. Your history. identity, and heritage are what remain and endure. I certainly wouldn't like the idea of changing from our black and white stripes, or being renamed. However, for example.

how many people know that the Brazilian national team only started playing in the iconic yellow shirts after losing the 1950 World Cup final? Prior to this, they played in white. I think it's the fact that in the instances of the two clubs you mention, the changes have been effected for commercial gains, and that shouldn't sit well with any genuine football fan.

Cullen was proving to be a right pest to the hosts' defence and the striker tested Russell with a low shot that the Rovers goalkeeper could only palm away. The loose ball fell to Jon Shaw sliding in, but despite having every right to challenge for the ball, the centre-forward was shown a yellow card.

The Hatters were playing some attractive football going forward and were looking solid at the back but Rovers engineered a rare chance on 25 minutes when Norwood sent a header high and wide at the back-post from a left-wing cross.

Chances were few and far between after a good start, with John Still ordering Gray and Shaun Whalley to swap flanks in an attempt to break the deadlock before the break.

Mark Tyler made his first save of the game 35 seconds after half-time when easily dealing with Marcus Kelly's low 25-varder after the midfielder had been gifted the ball by Whalley.

The Town made their first chance 11 minutes into the second half when Jake Howells replaced Shaw, and the substitute almost made an immediate impact on 63 minutes when he slalomed into the penalty area and laid off a pass for Alex Lacey but the defender's neat finish was ruled out for offside.

Clear-cut chances were at a real premium in the final 15 minutes and in the end, John Still was happy to take a point.

"That was our best performance so far." said Still afterwards. "I thought our organisation was first class. To be the away team and for Mark to make only one save shows how much we restricted them.



"I thought we were strong, solid and determined and there were a lot of good individual performances.

"All we needed was a bit more quality in the final third, but I think our game is coming together.

"The application and work-rate was good and there were passages of play in both halves where we played some good touch-pass football which delighted me. That's something we'll keep working on.

"The last time Forest Green played at home they scored eight so that put this result into context. It was a good level of performance which is drastically improved from the first three games.



Comfortable


"Defensively we're comfortable now," Still told Hatters Player afterwards. "I thought our attacking play started well but it's in that final that it's not as good as I'd like.

"They're all tough games but what we've learned so far is that we can now take the game to the other team with pace and power and keep it solid at the back. It's just that play in the final third we've got to work on now."





"We've had two hard games in a short space of time," said the product of the Town's academy. "We went to Forest Green and kept a clean sheet and won a point and we've done the same again.


"Unfortunately we couldn't get the goal but we worked hard and I think the results will come. If we continue to keep clean sheets we will win games. there's no doubt about that."










KIDDERMINSTER 0-2 TOWN



The Hatters made it six wins in seven games at Aggborough as two second half penalties from Jake Howells sealed the Town's first away win of the campaign.

The midfielder, making his first start since the opening day of the season, put the Town in front on 70 minutes when debutante Paul Benson was fouled in the box. And the product of the Hatters' academy doubled his and the Town's tally 10 minutes later after Andre Gray was brought down.

In truth it was no more than the Town deserved following an accomplished away performance that saw the defence keep their third successive clean sheet and make it five games unbeaten.

Whilst delighted with the result and level performance, manager John Still refused to get carried away. "We played really well. The last three games we've played really, really well," he said afterwards.

"When we drew at home in the last minute to Macclesfield, we weren't the worst team in the league. We've now played three really, really tough games, and we aren't the best team in the league. All we're doing is making steps and it's really important I work hard to get the foundation right, and when I get the foundation right we can start adding. Sometimes people come in and it takes a while to settle. We're still searching for certain things. I'm sure there'll be other setbacks, but I'm not bothered about that. All I know is I have to build or rebuild a football club that when I came here.

someone told me just seems to be going nowhere. I'll do it in my way and I'm very, very pleased.

"Not showing any disrespect to Kidderminster, but I thought we were in charge of the game. For an away team, Mark Tyler has had one save to make in the first half. I can't remember another save."

Two-goal hero Howells, meanwhile was quick to praise the effort and determination of his team-mates for yet another win against the Harriers.

"I'm over the moon to start and to score both the goals. I hope by doing that I've repaid the faith shown in me by the manager. I should have scored with a couple of chances in the first half but we kept going and won two penalties and luckily I've put them both away. We worked ever-so hard and it's that hard work which gets you rewards. That's the most important thing "

Benson, who enjoyed a fine display as the focal point of the Hatters' attack, believed the victory was deserved. I always fancied us to score in open play regardless of the penalties," the striker said. "I think we were putting enough pressure on them to score eventually but we'll take two well-taken penalties to win it. The first penalty was clear for me. I don't want to comment too much on the defender's defending perhaps he could have passed it back to the goalkeeper better – but the keeper's come out and fouled me.

the big interview

ON A WET SUMMER EVENING EIGHT YEARS AGO JOHN STILL UNEARTHED PAUL BENSON, LAST WEEK THE PAIR WERE TOGETHER AGAIN AFTER THE STRIKER SIGNED A SEASON-LONG LOAN AT KENILWORTH ROAD. TOTT GETS THE INSIDE WORD FROM THE HATTERS' NEWEST RECRUIT

He's reunited with the manager that gave him his most treasured memories in football - and now he wants to do it all over again with the Hatters.

New signing Paul Benson, who joined the Town on a season-long loan deal last week, was plucked from the obscurity of the Essex Olympian League by John Still and Terry Harris in 2005.

It's a moment in time both player and manager remember well. Benson admits he didn't have a particularly good game the night he was watched.



Still doesn't quite recall the level of the striker's performance. But then again the then 23-year-old had been scoring literally hundreds of goals for White Ensign at the time.

A deal was done and Benson was given his full-time chance at Dagenham & Redbridge. "It's something I'm ever grateful of," he told Hatters Player, in his first interview as a Town man.

Despite one league goal in his first season. Still refused to panic. The following campaign, 2006/07, the frontman scored 28 goals. The Daggers won the Conference title. In 2009/10 he scored 22 goals and one of them came at Wembley. Still's boys were Play-Off winners and, against all the odds, in League 1.

Triumphs

Since those delirious days with the Daggers the now 33-year-old went onto experience transfers to Charlton Athletic and Swindon Town where the goals continued. So did success: a League 2 championship winners' medal obtained only the season before last under Paolo Di Canio is still fresh in the striker's mind.

But, it's the triumphs with Dagenham & Redbridge that pulls on Benson's heart strings. As does working with Still. "The gaffer knows me better than any other manager I've ever worked under," he says. "I know what he needs, he knows what I want. We trust each other. Let's hope it works as well as it did with

The Hatters can thank the Robins' reluctance to give him a run in the side for his arrival in Bedfordshire. "Last season was the toughest I've had in the game." explains Benson. He actually started last season well under Di Canio, scoring three goals - but the Italian then had other ideas. Out of the team, a short loan spell at financially troubled Portsmouth came and went after two goals in seven games. That stint on the south coast was followed by another temporary move, this time to Cheltenham for the final five months of a

"It wasn't just tough physically, but mentally, too," continues Benson. "I started the season in good form at Swindon and then, for whatever reason, Paolo switched it around, brought in new players and I was in and out

"In October I went to Portsmouth. I enjoyed it but it was tough there with the problems they had, and then I went to Cheltenham and we lost in the Play-Off semifinals to Northampton."

Benson now hopes that one season living a nomadic. footballer existence is a thing of the past. "I don't like moving around: I've got a young family who I like to hase myself around. Now I've got a great chance to settle and be settled."

He'll have that opportunity to get his feet firmly fixed on Bedfordshire soil now with the Hatters, but if his manager is expecting the same kind of player that left Victoria Road in 2010 then perhaps he should think again.

Maturity

"I think I'm a better player now than I was when I left Dagenham," says the striker who scored 74 league goals in just shy of 160 games for the Essex outfit. "I've matured a lot. I feel as athletic as I ever have done and my game has come on a bit more since I last played under John.

"He's getting a different player that left him. I've worked on different parts of my game. Aspects that I felt I needed to improve to make the step-up to the higher level I was playing at. I think I've improved at certain things and I'm a better all-round player now."

That'll be music to the ears of the manager and Town fans alike, but perhaps not to those Skrill Premier defenders who will be all too aware of his predatory instincts in front of goal. 0.38 goals per league game ratio, 114 goals in senior football - or well over 200 if you throw in those goals for White Ensign. Benson's good with numbers – it was football over a career in accountancy that the goal-getter chose when Still and Harris came calling with a contract that wet night at

While Benson acknowledges how tough the division he now finds himself in is - as well as how dramatically it has changed since he last tasted Conference action - the striker admits his decision to drop down two divisions was a difficult one to make.

However, especially with Still at the helm, he wants to be a part of something special at Kenilworth Road.

"I'm not go to lie, having the gaffer here is a massive pull. He's given me some of the best memories in the game. Funnily enough I thought about coming to Luton about two-and-a-half years ago before I went to Swindon, but at the time I thought that move was best for me. Fortunately I went onto enjoy success there. But when the chance came up to come to Luton again, and with the gaffer here, there was only one place where I wanted to go.

"Dropping down two divisions definitely crossed my mind, though. I thought to myself I could have a couple



ability to do that but sometimes you've got to think about the longer term and what you want for the benefit of your career.

"Maybe I could play in League 1 or 2 but I knew that once John gets things going at Luton it could really take off, and I didn't want to miss out on something like that. I didn't want to be the player that looks at Luton in League 1 or 2 in a few years' time and think to myself 'I could have been there'. I wanted to think longer term, and Luton can get to League 1 in that time - but obviously it's going to take a lot of hard work before that materialises.

Delighted

"Luckily I know first-hand at what John can do. He's got the ability to do it. I've experienced the way he does things, and it's been successful. I was delighted to be a part of that at Dagenham and I'm delighted to be part of a team of his again.

"Coming back to work with John isn't about thanking him for giving me that first chance in the game. It's about looking forward to being involved, getting up and running and helping, of course, that the season ends





CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH LOOKS THROUGH PAST PROGRAMMES

LUTON TOWN 6-1 CARLISLE UNITED

1st SEPTEMBER 1973

It was back to the drawing board for Luton manager Harry Haslam. An opening day 4-0 thrashing at Nottingham Forest meant that all his plans for the season were shot in 90 minutes.

Due to the poor start only 7,231 bothered to turn up the following Saturday for the visit of Carlisle, a team the Town had never beaten in League football. The only change from the previous week's battering was the dropping of Peter Cruse to the bench and the promotion of new £13,000 signing from Crusaders. Tom Finney.

Treat

The stay-at-homes certainly missed a treat as Finney, who had been working as a pipe-fitter in his native

Northern Ireland only a couple of months before, had the game of his life.

In a first half purple patch, the Hatters netted six goals in 23 minutes with Finney scoring two and playing a part three others. He opened the scoring after 12 minutes, heading in a John Aston free-kick which he had won, watched Peter Anderson crack in another two minutes later then added a third, taking a Don Shanks pass in his stride, on 20 minutes.

John Aston fired in an unstoppable volley from the edge of the box almost straight from the re-start, Anderson netted again from Barry Butlins pass before the big

striker added himself to the scoresheet after reacting quickest to a Finney shot that had been blocked.

The second half could never live up to the thrills of the first, but it was not for lack of trying. Several efforts fizzed wide and a couple of shots were cleared off the line but it was Carlisle who scored the only goal of the second period although the damage had of course already been done.

Carlisle manager Alan Ashman said afterwards: "I'm startled. I'm stunned. In all my career I have never before gone in six down at half-time. It's not nice. I don't want it to happen again."

Bizarrely, Carlisle joined the Hatters in promotion to the top flight at the end of the season!



THE PROGRAMME

Haslam admitted that the previous week's defeat at Forest was not entirely the players' fault, which presumably meant he was putting some of the blame on himself. Certainly my memories of that game are that Forest appeared like world beaters, but they could not manage the pace and eventually finished in seventh place in the table.

The birth of the Luton Town Century Sporting Club was announced in the programme. For the £100 a year membership you got a colour television in your own club lounge. Joe Bugner and Acker Bilk (ask your parents) had already signed up.

For the princely sum of £1.50 a charter train was being run to Bristol City the following week, although by now the novelty of this mode of transport (started in 1969) was beginning to wear off as only 200 supporters had travelled to Nottingham Forest.

Work hard


"We have had injuries and players missing, but we aren't using this as an excuse. We will continue to work hard and learn and we will hopefully bounce bac tomorrow away to Denham.

MY NAME:

David Newman

MY AGE: 50 today!

MY LOCATION: Milton Ernest, Bedfordshire

MY TIME SUPPORTING **LUTON TOWN:**

This is my 41st season as a fan of the mighty Hatters during

which time I have attended almost 1.100 Luton games. I have seen our great club in the top five tiers, including 11 seasons in the top flight.

MY FIRST LUTON GAME:

My dad took me to the home of football for the first time on Saturday 15th September 1973 when Luton played Portsmouth. We were 1-0 down, then 2-1 up at half-time, then 3-2 down, before squaring the game at 3-3. From that moment I should have guessed that following Luton was never going to be straight forward!

MY FAVOURITE LUTON GAME:

I went to every match of the 1989/90 season. A terrible campaign was saved by the final performance, on 5th May 1990, when Luton beat Derby 3-2 at the Baseball Ground, thanks a 30-yard free-kick from Tim Breacker and two goals from Kingsley Black. This one victory made the whole season worthwhile as Sheffield Wednesday lost 3-0 and were relegated instead.

MY FAVOURITE LUTON GOAL:

It has to be Brian Stein's winner in the Littlewoods Cup final against Arsenal in 1988. Brian Moore's commentary describes the moment: "A little chip in there by Danny Wilson. Now Grimes. Picked the outside there. STEIN! And Luton are ahead in the very last minute!"

MY FAVOURITE LUTON PLAYER:

Mick Harford. Hard as nails and goalscorer = Luton legend.

I've been a child in a fake replica shirt with the badge sewn on; an adult with things to do on a Saturday afternoon.

But once I climb the stairs that lead to the back of the stand - appearing between the wooden PA box and a disinterested steward - I take a breath and always feel exactly the same.

The main stand creaks and groans as seats are filled or flipped up to make way for soon to be bruised shins and calves.

The pitch is obscured by pillars from almost every seat in the ground. The leg room encourages standing and the proximity of the away fans can pull your eyes from the pitch.

In the daylight the years have been unkind. The wrinkles and the bags beneath her eyes squeal through the taps in the toilets and the turnstiles.

But at night she glows like a battered beacon in the Bedfordshire night, switching off all around her.

The old ground is the warm embrace of the house you grew up in.

A childhood sweetheart.

Your worst hangover.

A monument to our disappointment, and our best spent time.

There's a chance this is your first time reading a Non-League programme; the first time vou're watching grass-roots football.

The fourth annual Non-League Day is finally upon us and the event has become a key part of the football calendar.

As much as some would have you believe, Non-League isn't actually all played in cow fields with potholes in the goalmouths and more sand than grass.

We still play with a football - it's round and everything - still play for 90 minutes with two goals and a referee. In fact, Non-League is often much more exciting than its top level equivalent.



I suppose it's quite apt that Non-League Day has fallen just a few days after the much hyped transfer of Gareth Bale to Real Madrid for a world record £85m.

That is a ridiculous sum of money, especially for one man kicking a ball about. As fans of top level clubs are treated more and more like customers rather than fans. Non-League football stands relatively firm.

Firm in its stance of being about the community; about the supporters and most importantly, about the football.

A large amount of clubs are run by volunteers, people giving up their time to make sure their local side is ticking along.

Indeed, Newport County manager Justin Edinburgh, a former Tottenham defender who led the Exiles to the Football League last season, said his time spent as a gaffer in Non-League helped him get "back into touch

with the people the game is about - the fans - after vears in a bubble at the top".

There are plenty of myths surrounding Non-League football, mainly contributed to by some of the patronising national coverage it receives - especially when the world's most famous competition clicks into

Decent FA Cup runs often lead to a Non-League side being covered on TV and rather than focus on the quality of the team or its journey through the rounds,

commentators choose to focus on what job they do. The stereotypical team of butchers,

> plumbers and policemen has grown tired. For it doesn't matter what jobs players do.

Love

When they step out on the pitch they do so because they love the game. And after the match, you can often go and chat to them in the bar.

Non-League is all about close interaction between fans, players, management and the board; all about the whole club's family pulling in the right direction. A far call from the mega rich foreign owners who see football club's as their personal

If all this still hasn't sold you, sit (or probably stand!) and relax and enjoy the game. The quality will be better than you expect and the passion on show will be refreshing.

Non-League football may not have the flashy presentation or the ridiculous hype surrounding the top level game.

But it's where the heart and soul of the game remains. And that's the biggest selling point of all.

> > experience to the team, and also a change in tactics to hopefully make The Luton Town Show even more enjoyable to be supporting for 90 minutes on match day.


