THE HUNTER became the hunted. This was maybe not an upset in divisional terms, but Welling killed off last year's big headline grabbers Luton.

It left the Hatters to rue a lacklustre first half performance against Jamie Day's side whose greater desire in the opening half proved the difference.

Luton, who beat Premier League Norwich City to create history last season, won't see a repeat this time – they got a taste of their own medicine at Park View Road.

"The first half wasn't a cup performance and the second half was so I am disappointed" reflected Town manager John Still after the

Luton could have taken the lead in the 18th minute as Lee Butcher produced the first of several fine saves to deny Paul Benson.

Welling's top scorer Ross Lafayette was then denied by Luton keeper Elliot Justham in the 25th minute before setting up the opening goal two minutes later.

Lacey looked favourite to see the ball over the byeline, but Lafayette out muscled the defender to pull the ball back, and skipper Lee Clarke bundled the

ball in.

Lafayette should have made it 2-0 shortly after but fired against the post after

holding off Steve McNulty.

have done better after Butcher came for a ball he couldn't get to.

That miss proved crucial a minute before the break as Lafayette played in Joe Healy to tuck his shot under Justham and double the hosts' lead.

Welling started the second half in similar fashion

with Lafayette's shot blocked by his own team mate Alex Dyer, and Dyer then saw his shot deflected inches over.

Luton reduced the arrears in the 57th minute when Butcher somehow kept out Benson's header but was powerless to stop the striker heading in the

rebound.

Two minutes later Parry looked to have levelled but was denied by a superb save low to his left from

Butcher.

Backed by a vociferous away support, Luton dominated the rest of the second half, but didn't produce another chance until five minutes from time as Lacey headed over from Lawless' free-kick.

The Wings' keeper also denied Benson and Lawless as his side held on for the

"Butch showed why he has played so many games in the football league," Day

said.
"I thought we were excellent in the first half and deserved our lead. Credit to Luton because they came out and had a good go but I'm pleased to get through."
