Guttridge, who had impressed, limped off early in the second half and was replaced by Kane Ferdinand, who was making his debut having joined on loan from Peterborough 24 hours earlier, but he failed to breathe life into the match.

The visitors picked up three bookings in reasonably quick succession as Lincoln tried to create chances, which saw the lively Delano Sam-Yorke fire just over from the edge of the area, Conner Robinson go close with a lob and Mark Tyler deny Brown's close range header.

Luton too created more openings with Andre Gray being denied by Foster's block when almost through on goal, and later shooting wide.

The tireless Benson had arguably the best chance of the game, but Farman got down well to save his effort at the near post.

Lincoln manager Gary Simpson felt it would have been unjust had his team lost the game.

"I thought we were well worth a point," he said.
