## McGeehan bags late winner



phrase, Luton always go the distance. They won't need to in the title fight, but Aldershot's battle against the drop will go right to the bell.

OHN STILL watched his Luton side beat battling Aldershot by little more than a points-margin - then compared them to champion boxer Carl Froch.

A boxing fan who used to draw on the late Frank Black, a close friend who trained world champions including Joe Calzaghe, Frank Bruno and Jim Watt, as part of his backroom team when Dagenham & Redbridge won the Conference, Still knows the knockout blow in this year's title fight is close.

With second-placed Cambridge beating Southport 3-1 and Andy Scott's relegation-threatened Shots comfortably holding them at arm's length, it was potentially a few rounds further away going into the final five minutes at Kenilworth Road than it is this morning.

unbeaten stretch last month. "In the last four games, not including today, we'd averaged 2.25 points per game and that is unbelievable.
