However I always felt we had a goal in us as the game reached its climax. Charlie Walker came on and saw a shot we thought was over the line, but Alex Wall then did the honours with a fine strike just minutes later to win us the game in style.

Looking ahead to Saturday, we welcome Southend United here. They are a club relatively local to me and I know they've been on a decent run of late and have been in and around the top group of clubs. I hope that we have another big crowd for that because on Saturday at Stevenage your vast backing of the team really gave us that little extra lift. It was incredible. Remember, the stronger the team the stronger the team.

Turning attentions back to tonight, will there be a few changes? Yes there will. We'll be picking a team to win the game but it's important that we are able to build up the fitness of some of the squad, whilst also giving those players who have shown well a chance to do so again, which could push themselves into the forefront our minds for Saturday.

CRAWLEY TOWN



It is with great pleasure we welcome everybody associated with Crawley Town to Kenilworth Road for this Johnstone's Paint Trophy second round match.

It has been three years since the two clubs' paths have crossed, the 2010/11 season that saw the Red Devils storm to the Conference title under Steve Evans' reign.

Since their record-breaking run towards the Football League, tonight's visitors have gone from strength to strength. It took the West Sussex club just one season to win promotion to League 1 following their third place finish in their maiden campaign in the Football League.

The Red Devils have more than held their own in their past two seasons in the third tier – not bad for club whose average attendance is 2,500 in a division which has seen some very big clubs compete in during that

At the helm for Crawley this term is former Aston Villa boss John Gregory, who took over at the Broadfield Stadium (or Checkatrade.com Stadium as it is known as these days), last December. The Red Devils suffered a big fixture pile-up due to the inclement weather last season but Gregory guided the side to finish in a hugely respectable 14th place in League 1.

Gregory's side arrive at Kenilworth Road this afternoon full of confidence having earned an excellent point from a 2-2 draw against Coventry at the Ricoh Arena on Saturday. The Red Devils had trailed 2-0 before goals

from Gwion Edwards and Izale McLeod rescued a point. The result leaves Gregory's men 14th in the League 1 table having taken 14 points from their 11 matches so far. The Red Devils have only lost once in their last five matches. On the road tonight's visitors have won just once (on the opening day of the season at Barnsley), drawn two and lost three. Gregory's men booked their place in the second round of the Johnstone's Paint Trophy with a 2-0 home win over another side promoted from the Conference last season, Cambridge.

Crawley were victorious on their last visit to Kenilworth Road in October 2010. Andy Drury – who rejoined the Town this summer from Crawley – put the Town in front from the penalty spot with 25 minutes to go but the visitors fought back to secure the points with Richard Brodie equalising 10 minutes from time before Craig McAllister – who would go on to play for the Town in 2012 - scoring the winner in the last minute. In the head-to-head record between the sides, the Hatters have won once, Crawley twice, whilst one match has ended all square (the last meeting in April 2011 at the Broadfield).

Drury is one of two former Crawley men in the Town ranks, the other being Paul Connolly who joined the Hatters this summer. However, there is one familiar face in the Crawley squad these days in the shape of Keith Keane, who is currently with the Red Devils on-loan from Preston North End. Keane, now 27, played 285 times for the Hatters across four divisions before departing for Deepdale in 2012.





► HEAD COACH

JOHN GREGORY. Former England international midfielder who played over 600 Football League games. Managed Portsmouth, Wycombe, Aston Villa, Derby and QPR before spells in Asia. Took over at Crawley in December last year.

▶ GOALKEEPERS

BRIAN JENSEN. Hugely experienced Danish stopper who signed this summer after leaving Bury. Enjoyed great success at West Brom and then Burnley, playing for the Clarets in the Premier League.

JAMIE ASHDOWN. Former Reading, Portsmouth, Bournemouth and Leeds keeper who penned a fourmonth deal in August this year having left Elland Road.

DEFENDERS

LANRE OYEBANJO. Attacking right-back who helped York beat the Hatters in the Conference Play-Off final in 2012. Signed for Crawley this summer but started his career as a youngster at West Ham.

JOE WALSH. Versatile young defender who can play left-back or at centre-half. Joined the Red Devils in 2012 after being released by Swansea City.

DEAN LEACOCK. Centre-half with a wealth of experience having played in the Premier League whilst at Derby. Began on Fulham's books before spells at Orient and Notts County. Signed for Crawley this summer.

RYAN DICKSON. Former Plymouth, Brentford, Southampton, Bradford and Colchester defender who signed joined the Red Devils this summer.

SONNY BRADLEY. Summer arrival from Portsmouth, the Hull-born defender has experience of playing in Sweden and Harrogate. Made 34 appearances for Pompey last term before joining Crawley.

MAT SADLER. Full-back in his second spell at the Broadfield Stadium who rejoined the club on a one-month loan from Rotherham. Played in the Premier League with Birmingham and has played for Watford and Walsall.

► MIDFIELDERS

JOSH SIMPSON. The longest-serving member of the Crawley squad. The central midfielder helped the Red Devils clinch back-to-back promotions having joined from Peterborough in January 2011.

GWION EDWARDS. Welsh Under-21 international who penned a permanent deal with Crawley this summer after a successful loan spell from Swansea last term.

JIMMY SMITH. Summer arrival from Stevenage who came through the youth ranks at Chelsea. Worked under Gregory at OPR, he spent four years with Leyton Orient.

CONOR HENDERSON. Former Arsenal academy graduate who joined the Red Devils this summer. Joined Hull after his release from the Gunners and spent last season on-loan at Stevenage.

MARVIN ELLIOTT. Experienced midfielder who penned a short-term deal this summer. The Londoner has racked up over 400 appearances with spells at Millwall and Bristol City.



KEITH KEANE. No stranger to Kenilworth Road, Keane spent nine years with the Hatters making 285 appearances. Left the Town for Preston in 2012 and is currently on-loan from the Deepdale club.

JOSH WRIGHT. Midfielder currently in the middle of a

three-month loan deal from Millwall. Began his career at Charlton before joining Scunthorpe and then Millwall.

MITCHELL ROSE. Midfielder currently on loan from Rotherham. The brother of Tottenham's Danny, he spent last season on loan at Stamford in the Northern Premier League.

▶ STRIKERS

IZALE McLEOD. Prolific goalscorer who signed for Crawley this summer. Began his career at Derby before joining MK Dons. Then moved to Charlton, Barnet and Portsmouth and penned a one-year deal with the Red Devils this summer.

MATT HARROLD. Experienced frontman who signed from Bristol Rovers last month. Has started over 250 senior games during spells at Dagenham, Grimsby, Yeovil, Southend and Wycombe.

GAVIN TOMLIN. Striker who started his career with Staines, but got his break in League football in 2006 with Yeovil. Has also played for Dagenham, Port Vale, Gillingham and Southend.

CHARLES BANYA. Young forward who joined Crawley on a short-term deal this summer after being released from Fulham last term.

Luton Town 3-2 Scunthorpe United.

Johnstone's Paint Trophy final. 5th April 2009.

There was no great outpourings of relief in the streets of Luton when the Town received a first round bye in the 2008/09 Johnstone's Paint Trophy as we had more important things to think about, namely the preservation of our Football League status.

A 30-point deduction at the start of that campaign has been well-documented and by the time of the visit of Brentford, for a second round tie in the competition, the Town were still on minus 18.

It is, therefore, not surprising that the tie was not greeted with much enthusiasm but the 'stay aways' missed an entertaining contest with the Bees going into a two-goal lead against the run of play before the Town pulled the game back level.

At 90 minutes the score remained the same with onloan goalkeeper Conrad Logan then saving twice in the penalty shootout leaving Rossi Jarvis to net the decisive winner. Jarvis was also on target in the next round when his fierce shot in the 88th minute brought about a narrow 1-0 victory at League 1 Walsall to set up a southern area semi-final home tie with Colchester.

Scares

In truth, Colchester should have been out of sight by half-time but a series of amazing misses and the woodwork kept the score level until Claude Gnakpa deflected a Wayne Andrews shot into the net for a fortuitous Town lead. Despite many more scares the Hatters managed to hang on with the reward a two legged southern area final against Brighton.

In front of a 6,127 Withdean crowd, the Town battled to a 0-0 draw and it was back to Kenilworth Road where, with only one step left to a Wembley final, the competition had finally caught the minds and imagination of the Luton fans.

A crowd of 8,711 gathered under the Kenilworth Road lights to see Tom Craddock take advantage of a Brighton defensive error to stroke the ball into an empty net in the second minute before Nicky Forster levelled for the Seagulls 18 minutes later. Although Albion's Dave Livermore was dismissed for a late challenge on Michael

Spillane before the interval the Town could turn their subsequent possession and dominance into goals leaving the crowd to endure another penalty shoot-out.

Challenging

This time it was another loanee goalkeeper, Lewis Price, who became a hero saving twice to send the Town through to the new Wembley where their opponents would be Scunthorpe who were challenging for an eventually successful promotion to the Championship.

The Hatters were as good as relegated by this time, so the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final was seen as a welcome relief from the problems in the League and was seen as a final hurran for at feast a season. An amazing 42,000 tickets were sold which could have been more had an ill thought out segregation policy not been in place at Wembley.

Scunthorpe were obvious favourites and bossed the opening 20 minutes, taking the lead during that period when the clever front duo of Paul Hayes and Gary Hooper combined to good effect leaving the latter to slot the ball home.

Stung by this goal, the Town fought back, and the game developed into an end to end thriller with several close shaves in both goalmouths. We did, however, level the tie on 32 minutes when Craddock cleverly set up Chris Martin to roll the ball into the net.

Onslaught

Craddock then put the Hatters into the lead mid-way through the second half which left us needing to endure a Scunthorpe onslaught which we thought had been seen off until two minutes from time when Grant McCann hit home an unstoppable shot from 25 yards.

Rather than going straight to a penalty shoot-out again the final catered for extra-time and when Gnakpa failed to score two minutes in after being put through by skipper Kevin Nicholls we all thought that the miss could come back and bite us. Three minutes later though Gnakpa was put through again but this time he made no mistake cleverly lobbing the onrushing goalkeeper.

The Town managed to hold on to the lead until the end this time though to cue mass celebrations in the midst of a season of gloom.



SINCE WE'VE BEEN GONE...

THE JOHNSTONE'S PAINT TROPHY

It's unusual for clubs to wait five years to defend a trophy they've won. Liverpool got the chance to defend the Champions League the season after the Reds triumphed in their epic comeback in Istanbul against AC Milan in 2005 despite finishing out of the European places in the Premier League.

The Town, though, were denied their opportunity to defend the Johnstone's Paint Trophy despite lifting it at Wembley in April 2009 following the 3-2 victory over

Scunthorpe and the relegation to the Conference which followed almost a week later.

Back in the Football League after last season's title, the Town are back in the JPT. With last season's winners Peterborough knocked out in the previous round last month, the Hatters can claim to be the sole holders left in the competition...even if tonight's fixture is the first in the JPT since that day at Wembley five years ago.

The competition has continued to flourish during the Town's time in the Conference. Here's what's happened in each of those final seasons since the Hatters last tasted success in the JPT...

2009/10

The Town were, of course, holders but could not defend their title in 2009/10. The competition, however, was tough with the southern section of the draw including League 1 Southampton and Norwich, and the northern section containing Leeds. The Saints and Canaries would meet in the area semi-finals at St Marys which saw the hosts progress. Southampton beat MK Dons in the area final whilst Carlisle overcame Leeds in the northern section. 73,476 watched the final at Wembley that saw Southampton thump Carlisle 4-1.

Competing clubs in 2010/11 felt they stood a greater chance of success with Leeds and Norwich promoted the previous campaign from League 1 to the Championship. Southampton would go onto be promoted come the end of 2010/11 but exited the competition in the very first round. Carlisle, though, enjoyed their run once more, winning through to the final where they saw off Brentford at Wembley. It was the Cumbrians' second title.

2011/12

Holders Carlisle fell at the first hurdle, losing to Accrington in the opening round of the competition. Swindon saw off struggling League 2 side Barnet in the southern area final, whilst Chesterfield overcame Oldham. The Spireites would go on and the lift the trophy in front of 49,602 at Wembley.

2012/13

Chesterfield bowed out in the second round as their defence of the trophy came to an end with defeat to Doncaster, but it was Coventry City that took the early rounds by storm, go onto reach the northern area final with Crewe which saw a record attendance for a nonfinal match with over 31,000 witnessing their first leg to Crewe. Unfortunately for the Sky Blues, the Alex won 3-2 on aggregate. Southend saw off Leyton Orient in the southern final but the northern section would have a third successive winner as Crewe triumphed 2-0 at Wembley against the Shrimpers.

2013/14

Last season's competition was the 30th season of the Football League Trophy. Holders Crewe were dumped out in the second round, losing 4-0 at Fleetwood. Northern winners of 2012, Chesterfield, would go on and reach the final once more, this time beating Fleetwood in the area final. In the southern half, Peterborough progressed by beating Swindon. 35,663 watched the final at Wembley which saw Posh lift the trophy thanks to a 3-1 win – their first ever success in the competition.

I love a guiz, me. Online, offline, in the pub – show me a pointless trivia question and I'll show you a noble way to waste an hour.

This week, I was tackling the 100 most populated towns and cities in the (still) United Kingdom. I got 71. which given an abundance of cheaty answers (Salford is technically in Manchester, right?) isn't too bad.

Anyway, stat glutton that I am, this got me thinking about football clubs and how they are performing relative to the size of their location.

Now, before anyone pipes up, I know many factors influence a club's fortunes. Big-money backers, a crack academy system, financial disaster, supporter-drain to nearby giants or an alchemistic manager - success has more layers than a Bake Off showstopper.

What's more, some cities have more than two clubs. Though crude, the only way to allow for this – without a statistician and a complicated algorithm - is to divide population by the number of clubs.

London, for instance, has 8.2m people, eight times more than second-placed Birmingham. This gives the capital's 13 professional sides 630,769 potential fans each, whilst the second city's three clubs get to share just 361,700. Leyton Orient, living in the vast shadow of West Ham and Spurs, would quite rightly challenge such an assertion but. well, I've got limited time and mathematical ability.

So who are the overachievers and underachievers? Here are the results of a distinctly unscientific study.

OVERACHIEVERS

BURNLEY

Population: 75,057 (110th)

The Clarets aren't even in the top 100 - below the likes of Crawley, Nuneaton and Bedford – yet ply their trade in the Premier League.

FLEETWOOD

Population: 25,359 (341st)

OK, so it wouldn't be possible without the cash of chairman Andy Pilley. But Fleetwood lie 341st in the population rankings (beneath Melton Mowbray) and are, by a distance, the smallest town represented in the Football League.

YEOVIL

Population: 40,270 (228th)

Imagine Swadlincote or Cleethorpes fielding a team in the Championship? That's the scale of Yeovil's achievement reaching the second tier last season.





MORE TO COME SAYS DOYLE



Nathan Doyle believes there is more to come from him and the Hatters this season. after the midfielder enjoyed a winning debut against Oxford in the Town's last home game at Kenilworth Road.

The 27-year-old, who signed a one-year deal at Kenilworth Road earlier this month, played over an hour as the Town ran out 2-0 winners to make it four games unbeaten in Sky Bet League 2.

And the former Bradford and Barnsley man was pleased with the display on his first appearance for the Hatters.

"I'm happy we got the winner and I'm happy to get through 65 minutes," Doyle told Hatters Player after the win over the U's.

"My fitness is okay. I played in the development squad for 70 minutes against Portsmouth and I've been training with the lads for three weeks.

"It's been intense, I've being doing extra work with the fitness coach [Dave Richardson], and all I'm lacking is game-time, but it won't be long before I'm full ahead of

Doyle was part of the Bradford side that won the League 2 Play-Offs two seasons ago, and the midfielder thinks the Town have got what it takes to mount a promotion challenge this season.

"The team are doing well, we're 10 games in and we know what we've got to do to get where we want to be." continued Doyle.

"We just need to focus on one game at a time. It was a great result against Oxford, and to keep another clean sheet was excellent.

"Clean sheets are important, especially in this league. It stands you in good stead and gives you something to build on.

"We'll keep listening to the gaffer and if we give him what he wants we can't go far wrong."

How good it was to see the Kenny full to bursting for the last home game with Oxford United?

Promotion certainly has fulfilled expectations of a more vibrant atmosphere here this term and I for one loved the banter between opposing fans that was largely absent, or at least one-sided, during our wilderness years in the Conference.

A decent number of visiting fans not only adds to the atmosphere, but of course adds income to the club, which is much appreciated.

Instead of low double digit attendances in the Oak Road,

Oxford brought 868 to follow them, despite struggling on the pitch this season up to then. Perhaps the old niggle between the clubs contributed to the occasion. It was caused of course by Joe Kinnear abandoning a proposed position at the Kassam to take up the manager's role here around the turn of the millennium and subsequently running down United.

Support

In our Conference days, Gateshead were one of the visitors to bring a paucity of support. A couple of years back their match at Kenilworth Road was an evening fixture which made things even more difficult for their potential followers. In conversation with their press officer, he remarked on how well the seats were being taken up quite a while before kick-off. When I explained that we had 4,000 season ticket holders at that time, he responded with the fact that they had 90.

It's a long journey to and from the North East, but that did not put a whole lot of determined Hatters fans off

for the reverse fixture. The same man told me then that Gateshead were hoping that Luton's away army would

swell their gate into four figures, which happened, just.

The numbers of that fantastic travelling support seem to be raising quite a few eyebrows in the footballing world this season. I saw a statistic somewhere that rated the Hatters' seventh or eighth in that regard - including the Premier League clubs. Quite remarkable!

I noticed that unbeaten
Bristol City, top of League 1, at
lowly Walsall on Saturday where
they expected to get another
good result, took around
a thousand with them and

Sheffield Wednesday, for a massive Yorkshire derby at Leeds in the Championship, boasted an away support of 1,300. Both pale into insignificance when compared to the 1,900 Hatters' fans at Stevenage, and it could have been many more if they had found themselves able to organise an increased away presence.

Boro Manager Graham Westley, thought to be a deep thinker about the game by those very close to him, remarked in his pre-match interview last week that Luton's vociferous support influenced referees to the extent that Town have been awarded more than their fair share of penalty kicks.

Perhaps, if Saturday's referee had seen those comments, it may have explained why that clear foul on Andy Drury in the box was turned down. And, not wishing to be swayed, the officials saw fit to deny Charlie Walker a debut goal when his effort clearly crossed the line late on.

Perhaps...but Town won anyway and the run continues...
