



JOHN STILL

Good afternoon and welcome back to you all for this important Sky Bet League 2 match with Hartlepool United.

A big welcome to Ronnie Moore, someone I know very well, who has gone in at Hartlepool and done a good job. That makes today's game I think a really tough one, especially with both teams needing the points. I don't think either team will be playing for just one point, which I hope makes for an entertaining game.

Our last home game here saw us lose 1-0 to Burton Albion. That was also a match in which both teams went for the win, but unfortunately it went against us. However I was delighted with our performance but the only thing that was missing were goals. We had three or four good opportunities to win the game and I think we were the better side.

I actually said to Dagenham's manager after the game that we didn't actually play with 10 we played with 11 because our support gave us that extra man. That's exactly how I felt. We've overcome so much this year, so with three games to go to still be within a shout is a great effort.

We need to keep the season going and we need to come out of today's game with that little bit of hope to take into the last two.

BOARDROOM

WITH CHIEF EXECUTIVE GARY SWEET



Good afternoon one and all to Kenilworth Road for today's fascinating encounter versus Ronnie Moore's Hartlepool United.

In practical terms, the match we're about to witness presents our last chance to make a

claim to a promotion Play-Off spot whilst our opponents are equally in need of the points to help them avoid the dreaded drop into the new National League, as it will be called from next season.

Whatever the result, let's all make the staff, officials and supporters who have made the 460-mile round trip warmly welcome and applaud their brave efforts to achieve safety since Ronnie took control.

Other than to say that we've been relatively pleased with our upturn in performances over the last couple of weeks even if the results haven't been what we'd have wished for. I hope you can forgive me for avoiding the topic of football in these notes today. Whilst some of you will, no doubt, believe this sidestep is intentional or, indeed, whether my message today is designed to divert your attentions from the topic in general, I can absolutely assure you it isn't.

The primary purpose of my notes in this edition - as my last of the season - is to provide a focus on the exciting developments relating to our new stadium.

Since my last notes published in the Exeter programme - when I very briefly hinted that progress had been made -I'm in a position today to be more specific, having passed another important project milestone in the last fortnight which allows me to further expand as to where we are in the process.

I'm sure you're all eager to learn where our new home will be, what it'll look like and when we'll be moving. What I do need to explain is that due to the complexities of football stadium developments in general that the laborious nature of the project shouldn't be underestimated.

Consequently, for reasons of commercial confidence and to protect the project's probability of success, I apologise that I'm not in a position to expose the specific details of our preferred site just yet. Indeed, we are still taking the

precaution of looking at how our objectives might work on more than one site while we plough through the more technical components of the qualification process. Your understanding on this is very much appreciated.

Over recent weeks, however, we have made some significant breakthroughs.

Firstly, we have obtained an encouraging support for our plans amongst the Labour Party group members at Luton Borough Council after a series of initial engagements. This important development has been achieved with an open-minded approach - from the leader and deputy through to other members and officers - coupled with a determination and desire that matched our own, to relocate the Club and help provide a more stable and ambitious long term future for professional football in the town.

Secondly, not only is the Council supportive of our plans to relocate - but we have also been sufficiently encouraged to push ahead with the necessary enabling development plans to ensure that the stadium's construction can be funded through building other facilities. Not only would this wide-ranging, mixed-use plan assist the Club, we believe it will also benefit the town greatly.

Accordingly, we have now formally entered the preapplication stage with the Council's planning office, but regardless of how much work has been accomplished so far, the strict formalities of the planning process means we still have significant work to do before our application can be assessed appropriately by the planning officers.

Further to these developments, thanks to the astonishing generosity of those wonderful people closer to home, we are now in a position to buy land, secure the best possible professional advice from specialist consultants (to design and build the scheme) and to see the application process through to receipt of consent.

As you may expect, there are numerous items marked on our 'to do list' before we pass the next significant milestone.

We will need to restructure the company - both to ensure that we protect the Club during this historical phase and to allow for independent partnerships with compatible companies to help us achieve our goals.

Naturally, as a shareholder of the football club, Trust in Luton will be fully involved with these proceedings as they will be in other decisions affecting the Club. We met again this week to bring them fully up to speed with the latest developments.

Similarly, we intend to hold forums with the Trust and other supporters groups prior to submitting an application to consult on certain aspects of the stadium. For example, the working capacity of the stadium is likely to be governed by the shift in behaviour towards public transport. I'm confident some very constructive and helpful debates could be held about that.

We believe it is our duty, as a major traffic generator in Luton, to not only help to protect our town's landscape and amenities but to improve them; not just on 23 matchdays but 365 days per year. With the cordial and progressive nature of the relationship between Luton Borough Council and Luton Town Football Club. I am confident we can accomplish something that has been looming for almost 60 years.

Whatever the reasons are for Luton Town remaining at Kenilworth Road for 11 decades (without paying any disrespect to her beauty and charm) the backdrop is different now. The football club is looked upon as a valuable social, community and image asset to Luton by the Council and with a new-found partnership between the parties based upon mutual respect and honesty, I genuinely believe this time, we can achieve our goal.

So, what now?

By the time we kick off the new season we should be ready to announce the location and provide details of the broader enabling development. Meanwhile, we'll continue to update and consult our supporters' Trust and work tirelessly to make sure we get this done and dusted!

My final word goes out to the 860 or so supporters who were the envy of every Luton Town representative in the directors' box on Tuesday night's game at Dagenham.

Your enthusiasm, passion, humour and sheer noise displayed throughout that game genuinely made each and every one of us wish we were among you. Not only am I convinced that your performance inspired the 10 on the pitch but it is precisely that kind of faith and loyalty that motivates us to build the permanent foundations for a more successful and ambitious football club representing this wonderful town and county.

Now, with your vocal support, let's give our very best to make it a rip-roaring end to the season!

Tuesday's game at Dagenham was a frustrating one. We set out to win every match we play but in the circumstances we were happy to leave with a point.

We all thought Paul Benson's red card was harsh and I hope the Football Association are able to overturn the decision so he is available for today and our remaining matches. Benno's dismissal meant we had to hang on with 10 men and try and nick a goal on the break. We had a few half-chances but all in all it was disappointing.

Form

One of the positives from the evening was another clean sheet, our second in three matches.

I thought we were unlucky to concede against Burton, a team who are within touching distance of promotion to League 1. We've now taken four points from the last three matches and I feel as though we should have taken something from the Burton game, so while it doesn't look like it on paper. I think we are returning to the kind of form we showed earlier in the season.

Whether or not that has come too late remains to be seen, but with three games to go and three points separating us from the top seven it is all to play for still. Our form throughout March was quite frankly appalling so if we can turn the tide and win our last three matches we can give ourselves a great chance. Until somebody says we can't make it we'll be doing our utmost, but I've been saying for weeks now that it will go down to the last game of the season and I sincerely hope that is the case.

Our run of results in the past 10 games has been difficult to take but one of the bright spots has been the form of Elliot Justham. He has been terrific. He bailed me out twice on Tuesday after I had made two mistakes and during our bad run of form all of the lads have felt

sorry for him because he hadn't put a foot wrong. He really has taken his chance with both hands following Mark's injury, he's sat on our subs bench for a season-and-ahalf, waiting patiently and now he is repaying the faith shown in him by the gaffer. Well done Elliot.

Today we entertain a Hartlepool side who need the three points today as desperately as we do. They have struggled for the majority of the season at the wrong end of the table but have strung some excellent results together in the past month or so. That has given them a great opportunity of survival and credit must go to their manager Ronnie

Dangerous

Our last three matches all take place against teams who have

something to play for and I wouldn't want it any other way. I think the most dangerous teams to play are those with nothing to play for as the pressure is off and they can relax. There will be plenty of nerves and tension in the squads of all the sides who need the points, and at this stage of the season you need to have strong characters in the dressing room to cut through the anxiety.

I'd like to end once more by thanking you all for your backing in recent weeks. I know it's been tough to watch but your noise levels have never dropped. At Dagenham on Tuesday it felt like a home game such was the noise. especially in the second half. I think I'm running out of superlatives - there's not much more I can say about your fantastic support but simply: keep it up!

Luton Town Football Club were extremely disappointed that one of our supporters entered the field of play to confront a match official during last Saturday's fixture against Burton Albion.

The supporter was apprehended by stewards and subsequently arrested and charged by the police and will appear in court at a later date.

We have also written to the supporter suspending him from attending home matches until further notice having been investigated by the Football Association as to how this pitch incursion took place and to establish what systems are in place to avoid any repetition of such

As part of that process we would like to remind all supporters that entering the field of play is an arrestable offence by law - this is not optional for the Club or police - and any supporter entering the field of play - in anger or celebration runs the very real risk of being banned from the Kenilworth Stadium for a lengthy period.

SOUTHEND UNITED



WHO? Southend United, aka the Shrimpers, aka the Blues, from Southend-on-Sea in Essex, Formed 108 years ago in May 1906, they are currently managed by Phil Brown and play their matches at Roots

Hall. Their nickname the Shrimpers in reference to the area's maritime industry - as indicated in their club crest.

WHERE? A trip to Southend, 67 miles by road from turnstile to turnstile, takes about 90 minutes on a decent day. It has only been until relatively recently that the Shrimpers have played at Roots Hall. The stadium which now holds 12,392, was built in 1952 and opened three years later. The club occupied the Roots Hall site in their early years before the stadium was built and then went onto play at the Southend Stadium. Hatters fans have been given the all-seater North Stand behind the goal - the site of a former covered terrace. Good luck if you need leg room!

HOW TO GET THERE? M1 south, M25 clockwise, M127. From M25 take Junction 29 and follow the A127 to Southend. Continue towards the town centre, through the lights near to the Bell Pub. At the next roundabout turn right, continuing on the A127. The ground is on the right just past the next traffic lights. If you turn right as you reach the ground, this will put you behind the away end where there is plenty of street parking to be found. Otherwise there is a car park at the ground, behind the Main Stand which costs £5. Bear in mind that if the weather is pleasant enough the whole of East London heads down the A127 on a Saturday afternoon, so allow an extra half-hour if the temperature is on the warm side! The postcode for Roots Hall is SS2 6NQ.

HOW THEY DOING? Very well. The Shrimpers still stand a good chance of grabbing the final automatic promotion place with their game in hand particularly important as it comes against fellow-promotion chasers Bury next week. That match will have a defining bearing on who goes up to League 1 this season. Phil Brown's side have been in the top seven for almost the whole campaign. They will be aiming to go one better this season after losing in the Play-Offs at the semi-final stage to Burton last year.

HOME COMFORTS. Brown's boys have been in ruthless form on home soil, losing just three times and conceding just nine times. The Hatters will be tasked with trying to become the first team to score a goal against the Shrimpers at Roots Hall in 12 matches. Southend have kept 11 successive clean sheets at home.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE? Next weekend's meeting will be the 86th meeting between the clubs. The Hatters hold the edge in the head-to-head records, winning 38 to Southend's 28, while 19 of the 85 matches have ended all square. Although the Town hold sway at Kenilworth Road, the Essex club have won the last two meetings at Roots Hall. The Hatters' last win at Southend came in the Championship in April 2007 when goals from Calvin Andrew, Matthew Spring and Besian Idrizaj gave the Town a 3-1 win.

CLUB CONNECTIONS. Hatters midfielder Luke Guttridge twice won promotion while on the Shrimpers' books. Winger Ryan Hall is another ex-Shrimper, while other players to have played for both clubs include striker Trevor Benjamin, defender Duncan Jupp and on-loan goalkeeper Simon Royce.

It gives us great pleasure to welcome everyone associated with Hartlepool United to Kenilworth Road this afternoon.

Today's game promises to be a nervy and potentially exciting affair given what is at stake for both clubs with just three games left to play.

While the Town need the points to gatecrash the Play-Offs, Pools need the points for altogether different reasons. Tuesday night's draw keeps Ronnie Moore's side out of the relegation zone – but just by one point.

It might seem like a perilous position but Pools fans in the away end this afternoon never thought that they would get to this point of the campaign with a fighting chance of staying up after an awful first half of the campaign

Pools were knocked out of the FA Cup live on television at home to near neighbours Blyth Spartans in December but a week later the Victoria Park boardroom appointed former Tranmere boss Moore. Their turnaround in fortunes have been slow if steady, but it's worth remembering that eight games ago Pools had only won five of their 35 matches in League 2 this term and seemed destined for a drop into the Conference for the first time in their history.

Their mini revival began in March with four successive victories. A 1-0 win at Morecambe was followed by a 2-0 win at Oxford before back-to-back home wins – against Mansfield and Cambridge – lifted them nearer safety.

been anxious at their last four results which has seen Moore's side take two points from the 12 available. A 2-2 draw at Newport was followed by two successive defeats – at home to Southend and, crucially, away at York in which over 2,000 Pools fans made the trip. On Tuesday, while the Town were drawing at Dagenham, a vital equaliser from veteran striker Marlon Harewood rescued a point for Pools at home to Accrington.

With Carlisle, Mansfield and Cambridge carrying a definite points advantage above them in the table it looks as though the fight to stay up is between the Pools, Cheltenham and Tranmere – although Pools' final game of the season is away to Carlisle.

Along with Portsmouth, Pools share the worst away record in the division, and only Mansfield have scored fewer goals on their travels than Hartlepool's 14. But at this nervy time of season and with so much to play for, both clubs will be desperate for all three points.





Mike Newell took control of both the Town and Hartlepool during his managerial career, guiding the two clubs to promotions, but of the players who have represented both Steve Howard is perhaps the most significant.

The big, strong target man scored goals wherever he went but born in Durham it was with Tow Law Town that he was spotted by Hartlepool as a 19-year-old. He was thrust straight into the first team at Victoria Park and

finished joint-top goalscorer in his first season.

Bigger clubs showed interest and a £120,000 bid took him to Northampton in 1999, but despite being successful at Sixfields – including a goal against the Town at Kenilworth Road – he was surprisingly allowed

to move to Luton for £50,00 two years later.

With the Hatters he became the third highest post-war goalscorer and top scored in each of his five campaigns in Town colours before he was sold to Derby for £1m in 2006. He netted his 100th goal for the Hatters in a 1-1 draw at Leeds and in total netted 103 in 228 matches.

Howard has since gone onto play for Leicester and Sheffield United before rejoining Pools for a short spell in 2012/13.

Other players to have played for both clubs including Adam Boyd, who

the Town paid Pools £500,000 for in 2007, and Barry Hawkes who made his debut for the Hatters against Manchester United in the top flight in 1959.

▶ 1990/91 PROMOTION WINNERS

BRIAN COX: Goalkeeper who made 34 League appearances before joining Buxton in November 1992. He has since run betting shops back in his native Sheffield and now works for a tributary of the NHS.

KEITH NOBBS: Utility player who joined Gateshead in August 1993. He was an officer for English Churches Housing Group in Middlesbrough and became Hartlepool's community officer in August 1998.

ROB McKINNON: Left-back who moved to Motherwell in January 1992. The Scotland international later played for Twente Enschede, Hearts, Clydebank and Bellshill Athletic, becoming assistant-boss.

JOHN TINKLER: Versatile midfielder who moved to Preston in July 1992, then played for Walsall, Bishop Auckland, Gateshead, Fleetwood Town, Spennymoor United, Prudhoe Town and Durham City.

JOHN MACPHAIL: Central defender who became playerboss, netting four goals in 163 League games before leaving in March 1995. He ran a kitchen business and is now a car sales executive on Teesside.

IAN BENNYWORTH: Central defender who scored three times in 82 League outings, rejoining Scarborough in November 1991. Later with Gainsborough again, he works in the corporate travel industry.

JOE ALLON: Leading marksman who joined Chelsea in August 1991, then Brentford, Port Vale, Lincoln City and Hartlepool again. He has been a summariser for Radio Cleveland and coached at Leeds.

STEVE TUPLING: Midfielder who netted three goals in 89 League games before returning to Darlington in August 1992, then played for Gateshead and Prudhoe. He has become a teacher in Tynemouth.

PAUL BAKER: Striker who later played for Motherwell, Gillingham, York, Torquay, Scunthorpe, Hartlepool again and Carlisle. He managed Blyth and Newcastle Blue Star before scouting for Norwich.

BRIAN HONOUR: Midfielder who scored 25 times in 319 League games, moving to Spennymoor in October 1994, then Durham and Peterlee. He coached Hartlepool, since holding management posts.

PAUL DALTON: Ever-present winger who moved to Plymouth in June 1992, then Huddersfield, Gateshead, Dunston Federation, Billingham and Crook. Now with Middlesbrough's community scheme.

MICKY BARRON: Inspirational right-back who was captain and helped Hartlepool to win promotion again in 2006-07. He netted three goals in 325 League games before becoming their youth coach.

GRAEME LEE: Central defender who joined Sheffield Wednesday in July 2003, then Doncaster, Hartlepool on loan, Bradford City, Notts County and Darlington. He now runs a soccer school in Stockton.

CHRIS WESTWOOD: Ever-present central defender who scored seven times in 250 League games prior to joining Walsall in July 2005, then Peterborough, Wycombe, Wrexham and now Alfreton.

MARK TINKLER: Ex-England Youth midfielder who netted 34 goals in 211 League games before moving to Livingston in June 2007, then Whitby. He is now coaching at Middlesbrough's Academy.

DARRELL CLARKE: Winger who reunited with Tommy Widdrington at Salisbury City in June 2007 and became their player-manager in August 2010. He is currently Bristol Rovers' manager.

TOMMY WIDDRINGTON: Midfielder who moved to Macclesfield Town in August 2003. He then had a spell with Port Vale and became Salisbury's player-boss. Now managing Eastbourne Borough.

EIFION WILLIAMS: Welsh Under-21 striker who was leading marksman and netted 50 times in 208 League games before joining Wrexham in June 2007. He has since had a spell with Jarrow Roofing.

MARCUS RICHARDSON: Has since played for Lincoln City, Yeovil, Chester City, Weymouth, Cambridge United, Crawley, Bury, Farnborough, Henley, Windsor & Eton, Reading Town and Marlow.

RICHIE HUMPHREYS: Former England Under-21 midfielder who was ever-present in his first five seasons. He netted 34 goals in a club record 481 League games before joining Chesterfield in July 2013.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

The Town's 2-1 win at Victoria Park earlier in the campaign was the Town's fifth win in their last seven meetings with Pools and their fourth on Hartlepool so



Three minutes later the Town came mighty close to breaking the deadlock when Michael Harriman hammered a first-time shot from the edge of the area that flew off the outside of the post.


Burton were offering little in the way of attack, with the Hatters restricting the leaders to shots from distance which were either off target or comfortable for goalkeeper Elliot Justham.

On 19 minutes the Town came close once more. Cameron McGeehan bulldozered his way through on the edge of the penalty area and Alex Lawless sent a curling first-time, left-foot shot wide of the post.

As half-time approached the Town upped the ante, and Elliot Lee came close to breaking the deadlock on 39 minutes only for his back-post header to drop wide after being found by Jake Howells' free-kick.

Town came close again after the break when Lee and Howells combined excellently on the edge of the area to play Scott Griffiths through, but the defender's left-foot shot zoomed inches over the crossbar.

But just as the Town were hunting a winner they fell behind. HARRIMAN WANTS TO BE A HATTER

The Town's season might be coming to a close but on-loan defender Michael Harriman is hoping this campaign isn't his last in Luton colours.

The 22-year-old has been a regular for the Hatters this season having joined from Premier League side Queens Park Rangers in October.

And despite being on the end of another home defeat – their fourth on the spin – against Burton Albion in our last match here at Kenilworth Road, Harriman is eyeing a permanent move come the end of the season.

"My thoughts are firmly here and if, at the end of the season, I can stay here, I'll be happy," said the former Republic of Ireland Under-21 full-back.

"That's my aim. I'm going to work on trying to stay here because I've enjoyed being here at this club. I've enjoyed every minute of it and this is where I want to be. I don't know what has happened at the moment, but there were talks in January so we'll see where we go. I'll try to push it as hard as I can so we'll just see where we go."

"I haven't heard from QPR recently, but we'll see when it comes to the end of the season."

Having lost their previous three home games, all by a 3-2 scoreline, the Town looked set to pick up at least a point against high-flying Burton – only for Jimmy Floyd Hasselbaink's side to steal all three points thanks to Matty Palmer's winner 11 minutes from time.


"It was very tough to take because I think we showed that we can mix it up with the big boys up there," said Harriman. "We put in a solid performance but we were just unlucky with the goal that they got.

"A couple of decisions didn't go our way and then the deflection which took it away from Elliot Justham. It was unlucky but there were plenty of positives.

"it's a kick in the teeth that we didn't get any goals but we've just got to keep working hard and go again in the final four games of the season."

The Hatters face a fight to end the season in the top seven to get in the Play-Offs with the last two games, at Southend and Stevenage potentially taking on particular significance as the campaign comes to a climax.

"Now we are coming into the crunch time in the season," said Harriman. "We need to get in there so every game is going to be a big game from now on.



DID YOU KNOW?

Michael Harriman has been an ever-present in the Hatters side since making his debut in the 2-0 win over Southend in October. No player has enjoyed more minutes on the pitch for the Hatters during that time.

"You've got to believe, we won't stop believing until the final whistle of the final day has gone. We know what we need to do, we've just got to go out there and do it.

"We all want to get in the Play-Offs, we want those extra games and want to get to Wembley. We've had a great season and it would be a shame if we didn't make it"

Harriman has yet to find the net in Town colours in League 2 since making the temporary move from West London but was close to getting off the mark against Burton when his shot from just outside the box struck the post.

"It was some great play on the edge of the box to fashion the chance it was just unlucky that the ball veered away and hit the post," said Harriman, who scored his only goal in the FA Cup tie at Cambridge in January.

"Defensively we were strong and I was given the licence to get forward and attack. I thought it would at least test the keeper but perhaps it just summed our luck up at the moment."






Striker Paul Benson, on his return to Victoria Road, was shown a straight red card seven minutes before half-time for a high challenge on lan Gayle. Benson had earlier seen a header cleared off the line while Ryan Hall poked a shot wide of the target inside the opening seconds.

But Benson's dismissal hindered the Town's chances of going for all three points after that and after the break the Town were indebted to a series of excellent saves from goalkeeper Elliot Justham to deny home forward Jamie Cureton.

Justham came to his side's rescue twice in the second half after Cureton – who had hit the side-netting in the first period for the Daggers – raced one-on-one with the keeper but on both occasions Justham was equal to the home forward's efforts.

The Hatters came close to snatching victory with Elliot Lee twice going close in the second period, including a goal-bound free-kick that had to be kept out by home goalkeeper Mark Cousins.

However as time ticked down and the chances ran dry, the Town and John Still had to settle for a point on his first return to his old club which leaves the Hatters three points off the Play-Offs with just three games to go.

THE IOURNEY

On a warm sunny day a packed Bobbers coach made the journey to Essex for the latest away game of the season at Dagenham. With matches running out the necessity to win was lost on nobody. Whether it was the sunshine or the encouraging last two performances I'm not sure but there was much more positivity around as we set off from Luton station just after 4.15pm.

That was 15 minutes late due to a crash on Hatters Way which by the time we had got to it saw cars turning back and changing routes. We were so far down that a coach couldn't turn around so the driver got into the opposite lane and reversed all the way back to the roundabout - very skilfully it has to be said!



After hitting the usual M25 and London traffic we eventually made it down to Dagenham around 6.15 on what was still a really nice, warm evening, perfect for football. I'm not superstitious in any way but after hitting a pub before the Tranmere win it felt appropriate to do that again with some time to spare before kick-off so once the coach parked up off we went in search of cider!

THE GROUND

It had been a while since I'd been to the Victoria Ground or the 'London Borough of Barking and Dagenham Stadium' to give it its full moniker! The first change is that the 'Traditional Builders Stand' behind the goal that the Town fans were in had been transformed into an all seated stand from a terrace.

Underneath the stand there was a bar which was doing a roaring trade as you would expect on a warm evening. There was a refreshment kiosk as you go in through the turnstiles and that didn't look short of custom either.


In the stand itself the view was one of the best we've had all season. The seats were built a bit above the pitch so wherever you sat you were looking down on the action which is always good. The lowish roof meant we could create a good atmosphere and I that's exactly what the 875 of us who travelled did!

THE FOOD

The refreshment kiosk was serving burgers, hot dogs, bacon rolls, pies and pasties along with the usual confectionary. It was all reasonably priced and as a 1/2lb burger was lucky at Tranmere I decided to try its luck again. Sadly it didn't have the same effect this time! Once that was devoured it was down to the bar for a quick pint before finding our seats. Beer was £3.50 a pint in the bar so a pint of cider went down well and from there it was up into the stand for the game.

THE PROGRAMME

As you would expect given it was his first return. John Still got plenty of mentions in the programme. Wayne Burnett was very complimentary towards him as were some others.



There were six pages in total on the current Town side and two more highlighting the best players from our past. There was also a fans interview as well so there was plenty more for Town fans in this programme than recent ones at away games.

THE MATCH

Looking to build on a win in our last away match the Town were nearly ahead after about 15 seconds when Paul Benson flicked a ball on to Ryan Hall who poked it past the keeper but the ball just trickled wide.

The positive start continued and we nearly led when a Benson header from a corner was hacked off the line but the match changed just after the half hour mark when Benson was sent-off for a high boot. All bias aside it looked a poor decision not least because if Benson wasn't getting held and pulled back he would have headed the ball rather than raise his foot to kick it. Even then he didn't seem to take his eves off the ball and the Dagenham player just charged into him. Really poor decision but sadly we're getting used to them!

That changed the path of the match slightly and Dagenham came on strong either side of half-time although I thought we defended well. Elliot Lee nearly put us in front when he twice linked up with Mark Cullen who had come off the bench but now but he fired just over both times. He also had a low free-kick well saved.

At the other end Elliot Justham was called into play to deny Jamie Cureton a couple of times when he went clean through and he made another save from a long distance shot. Just before full-time Michael Harriman cleared one off the line as well and after a real backs to the wall rear guard we got the draw which was the least we deserved.

MAN-OF-THF-MATCH

Another fairly obvious choice. Elliot Justham kept us in the game with a string of saves in the second half when even with 10 men we were trying to commit men forward to win the game.

The big stopper did nothing wrong in this match and I'm sure performances like this one and the one at Tranmere are giving John Still a real headache as and when Mark Tyler is fit again.

SUMMARY

Although it wasn't the result we were looking for I have to say this was one of the better away nights I've had in a while.

Everyone at Dagenham was friendly and welcoming and the atmosphere was fantastic in our end. It was probably helped by the injustice of many officials' wrong decisions but even so it was really good to get behind the boys when they needed it.

Unfortunately the journey home wasn't as nice with lane closures and M25 traffic so after taking the scenic route we were back to Luton just before midnight which was later than expected but all in all not too bad.

SMITH AIMING TO END SEASON ON A HIGH



Jonathan Smith is hoping the Town can squeeze into the Play-Offs and help himself earn a new contract with the club once the season is over.

The 28-year-old midfielder's deal at Kenilworth Road comes to an end in the summer but former Swindon man wants the Hatters to finish the campaign on a high by defying the odds and earning a second successive promotion.

Smith arrived at Kenilworth Road in 2012 and made his debut in a goalless draw on a Tuesday night away to Hereford.

The midfielder has come a long way since and is closing in on the 100 appearance mark.

"I love this club to bits. It's easy to say that but I really enjoy playing for Luton and I'd be very sad if I didn't get to play anymore because I've really enjoyed my time here," Smith told Hatters Player after the 0-0 draw at Dagenham on Tuesday night.

"My aim was to get promotion and I'll do everything I can to get that and hopefully that shows in my performances."

Smith missed last weekend's 1-0 home defeat to Burton as his partner gave birth to baby daughter Alice.

But the midfielder revealed he wanted to line up against the Brewers.

"I was desperate to play and do my bit for the team," Smith said.

"I said to the gaffer that I would be back in time for the game.

"I'm also playing for my future with my contract up at the end of the season, so I've got to prove to the club that they want to keep me."

At Victoria Road the Town battled to earn a point to keep their Play-Off hopes alive for another week despite playing the whole second half with 10 men after Paul Benson's red card.

And although the Hatters were desperate for three points, Smith felt a point was a decent return given the circumstances.

"Going down to 10 men changed the game but we've all put a shift in and

we have to be happy with a point," said the midfielder.

"All of the lads worked really hard. Dagenham aren't a

bad side but we came here looking for the three points. "I'd have to see it [Benson's challenge] again, but in League 2 you're going to get challenges like that and I

think the ref was a bit quick to get the red card out.

"After that we were really determined to get at least a draw which we got and now we have to go again on Saturday. I know it's a cliché but we have to take every

game as it comes, it's all we can do. We've still got a

"The fans' backing was amazing. I was saying to a couple of the lads how tough the last 10 minutes were but the noise of our fans really pushed us on, it really made a difference. Honestly, it makes a massive difference and we're going to need their support in the last three games."

The Hatters also lost Nathan Doyle through injury in the first half against the Daggers and together with Benson's red card, the Town may have to make changes once more this afternoon – and Smith believes that has held the Hatters back this term.

"We're a hard-working team but I think the injuries and suspensions this season have meant we've had an everchanging team," he said. "If we can keep a settled side in the last three games I think we can still get something out of this season."



Due to the Town's good record in the FA Cup in 1933 when, as a Division Three (South) club, they reached the quarter finals before bowing out to mighty Everton they were exempted until the third round the following season.

This time they went down narrowly 1-0 at home to Arsenal but the impressed FA Committee obviously felt that the Hatters should not be roughing it in the early rounds and allowed another exemption for season 1934/35.

The Town did not disappoint those who had shown faith in their abilities and beat top flight Chelsea after a replay before going out at Burnley in round four.

It was no surprise, therefore, that for the third year running the Hatters were granted exemption until the third round and the pairing with West Ham from Division Two (now the Championship) at Upton Park created a great deal of interest given that both sides were on good runs of form at the time. Over 9,000 Luton supporters made the trip, paying a return train fare of 3/- (15p). and swelling the crowd to 42,000 which was close to the ground record.

The Hammers took an early lead through big centre forward Dave Mangnall but with everyone expecting the floodgates to open, Luton's own number nine Jack Ball levelled. In the second period the Town surprised their opponents by taking the game to them and it was no more than they deserved when Fred Roberts fired in goal number two with 20 minutes to go. The game was not yet over, though, with Jimmy Ruffell earning the Hammers a replay with a late, fortunate equaliser.

The replay was scheduled for the following Wednesday afternoon and a crowd of 17,527, paying receipts of £2,099, turned up to see if the Town could finish the job and extend their unbeaten run which stretched back to 28th September.



The game was equally as close as the first tie, with the scoreline goalless at the interval but once Ball bagged the opener after 51 minutes there was only going to be one winner. On a frosty pitch, the Luton players adapted much better and with mercurial winger George Stephenson running riot, further goals arrived at regular

First Wilf Crompton and then Roberts took full advantage of the trickery of Stephenson to increase the Town's lead before the winger capped a marvellous performance by scoring the final goal to make it 4-0 and send the supporters into raptures and the West Ham team back to London (along with the disappointed Fleet Street corps) with their tails between their legs.

Unfortunately, the newspapers the next day glossed over the Luton performance to concentrate on the shortcomings of the West Ham forward line as well as the state of the pitch. But the Luton fans did not mind, next stop Manchester and a clash with the City.

Sadly, Wembley dreams ended abruptly as the Town lost 2-1 at Maine Road, but some consolation was gained by the gate receipts generated by a massive crowd of 65,978, the largest to watch the Hatters in this country outside Wembley.



JUSTHAM AIMING FOR A PLACE FOR KEEPS



Town goalkeeper Elliot Justham has, just like the Hatters, come a long way in the past 18 months.

The 24-year-old stopper arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2013 with the Town in the Conference and Justham fresh from playing part-time with East Thurrock and working on the London Underground.

After a knee injury sidelined regular number one Mark Tyler in February, Justham has stepped up to the plate to deliver a number of fine performances despite the Town's poor form.

Battle

And with Tyler returning to fitness, Justham is hoping he can keep hold of his place between the sticks.

"I want to battle with Mark. Hopefully, when he's fit, we can have a right good battle for the number one jersey, and hopefully I've given the gaffer a bit of thinking to do," Justham told Hatters Player after Tuesday night's goalless draw at Dagenham, in which he kept his third clean sheet in Town colours.

"Mark's one of my best mates at the club, so he's been very supportive. He's always wanted me to do well and he backs me 100 per cent as well, as does the goalkeeper coach [Kevin Dearden], who has come in and been excellent."

Tyler's woe has been Justham's gain and after sitting on the bench for the whole of last season as the Town romped to the Conference title a year ago, the stopper is happy to have finally got his chance – even if it has come at his friend and team-mate's expense.

Delighted

"I've been delighted," said Justham. "I'd never wish injury upon anyone, but it has been nice to get my chance.

"The gaffer could have easily got someone in on loan but he's stuck with me and hopefully I've repaid him well."

Justham had been a virtual ever-present for the Town's development squad prior to his promotion to the number one spot.

And while a number of the Hatters' development group have gone out on-loan, Justham was happy to be kept around – and he's now pleased to be repaying the faith the manager has shown in him.

"There was a little bit of talk about going out on loan, but I believe in myself and hopefully the gaffer believes in me, so I'm glad I've played the last 12 games, it's been nice," said Justham.

"I'd been waiting a long time. You can play in all the development games you want but this is a different level.

"It's much quicker, the strikers are much sharper and I think it's hopefully growing me as a goalkeeper."

Excellent

Justham helped the Hatters to a goalless draw on Tuesday with a series of excellent saves – twice from Dagenham's Jamie Cureton – which keeps the Town's hopes of reaching the Play-Offs alive going into today's game with relegation-threatened Hartlepool.

"Our point could be a very big point," said the keeper. "We'll go again on Saturday and hopefully get three points against Hartlepool.

"They're battling against relegation so it will be another tight game."

WITH HEAD OF COMMUNITY TRUST KEVIN THOBURN

LONDON LUTON AIRPORT YOUTH FUND

Our Community Trust received some really good news this week, that its bid for funding from London Luton Airport Ltd Youth Fund through the Bedfordshire and Luton Community Foundation to establish a sustainable youth football structure for boys and girls on Marsh Farm and Farley Hill has been successful.

Neither the Marsh Farm nor Farley Hill parts of town have

any organised youth football teams, and this has been the situation for many years. Our community project will aim to set up five teams on each estate to compete in local leagues next season at under-11 to under-15 age groups as well as establish a volunteer community Youth Club structure to administer the teams.

Luton Borough Council and London Luton Airport Ltd (LLAL) are working in partnership to improve the quality of life of the people of Luton through their youth fund and in particular the principles agreed by the partners of the Luton Forum in the Sustainable Community Strategy (2012-26) for residents of Luton to:

- Provide positive activities for children and young people and reduce anti-social behaviour.
- Support our children and young people to achieve skills and experience to enhance their prospects for the future.
- Strengthen community cohesion.
- · Improve health and promote health equality.

Now we have received the green light from the Airport that funds are available to get the project off the ground, we can begin to implement our plan straightaway. Phase 1 will be to establish community weekly coaching centres in Marsh Farm and Farley Hill where all young players can come and be trained and selected by our qualified coaches. The centres will be based at Lea Manor Recreation Centre on a Thursday evening and Barnfield South Academy on a Friday evening beginning in May.



Phase 2 will see the establishment of a volunteer club structure. Both centres will need a club committee with a chairman to oversee the smooth running of the club a club secretary to oversee administration of players and facilities, a treasurer to oversee finances and a welfare officer to oversee

safeguarding and equality issues. Team managers and coaches will be the responsibility, initially, of Luton Town Football Club and will involve the appointment of volunteer team managers and coaches to work alongside our coaching staff at the weekly coaching centres.

Phase 3 will be the beginning of organised fixtures in September for the 2015/16 football season all the way through to next April.

It's an ambitious project targeted at two socially disadvantaged areas of Luton and while we acknowledge there are other parts of the town equally disadvantaged, we needed to make a start somewhere. If we can make this project work in Marsh Farm and Farley Hill and show successful outcomes we can take this template and use it elsewhere.

Youth work in Luton is grounded on the principle and understanding that all young people benefit from additional opportunities and support but some, particularly the most disadvantaged and vulnerable, need specific additional and targeted help to address their challenges and reach their potential thereby narrowing the gap in outcomes between the most disadvantaged young people and their peers.

We believe that to have two such large areas of Luton without youth teams competing in our national game is unacceptable in 2015. We aim to try and address this with the help of the local community.



Conditions were windy with the Town choosing to go with the wind. Hatters were on the ascendency playing direct football and pining Ipswich in their own half. The first real chance came from a Zara Carroll free-kick which curled just over the crossbar striking the top of the goal

Michelle Byrne's shot was well saved by the keeper's legs but after 20 minutes Luton took the lead when Nicky Livingstone played in Rebecca Kane and her powerful shot found the bottom corner of the net. Lydia Radley smashed a volley that looked to be on its way into the net but was charged down by a defender.

Ipswich equalised after half-an-hour with their first serious attempt on goal. What seemed a harmless through ball was misjudged by goalkeeper Hollie Staples when she missed her clearance leaving the striker with the simple task of rolling the ball into the empty net.

Town almost fell behind right on half-time when a header appeared to be going in only for Erica Byron to clear off the line.

In spite of the heavy wind the second half was completely dominated by the Hatters, Shannon Pratt. making her first team full debut, played in Radley who only had the keeper to beat but she managed to divert the shot out for a corner. A free-kick from Kane was inches away from being met by Rachel Carter's head and Kane again fired high and wide at the far post. Pratt then played in Byrne who was brought crashing to the ground and the referee awarded a penalty. THE RECORD

The Town's record on this day is a mixed one with the successes just outweighing the disappointments from the 25 matches over the years on 18th April. The Hatters have won 10, drawn eight and lost seven, scoring 40 goals and conceding 32. On home soil the Town have won eight, drawn five and lost three, scoring 29 and conceding 17. Only three times have the Hatters failed to score on this day, but you have to go back to 1933 to find the last time the Town scored more than two goals in a match on 18th April – that came in a 3-1 win over Queens Park Rangers at Kenilworth Road in Division 3 (South).

THE LAST TIME

You don't have to go back far for the last time a Town team took part on 18th April – just two years in fact. The Hatters hosted Ebbsfleet United in the Conference in 2013 and ran out comfortable winners against the already-relegated visitors thanks to two goals from Alex Wall – his first two goals in Luton colours. Only 5,934 witnessed the game which took place on a Thursday night It was the Hatters' final home match of the 2012/13 campaign.

TOP FLIGHT TOWN

On four occasions have the Town played in the top flight of English football on 18th April. The record reads one win, one defeat and two draws in matches played in what was Division One. A goal from Mick Harford earned the Hatters a point in a 1-1 draw with Manchester United at Kenilworth Road on this day in 1992. The Red Devils had taken a first half lead through Lee Sharpe before Harford's leveller.

Five years earlier the Town beat Coventry City 2-0 at Kenilworth Road in the top flight thanks to goals from Brian Stein and Mike Newell in front of a crowd of 9,380. That was the Hatters' first top flight fixture on 18th April since a 1-1 draw in 1960 against Blackburn Rovers in which Billy Bingham netted the Town goal before a crowd of 14,167 at Kenilworth Road.

The Town were hammered in their first match in the First Division on this day when going down 5-0 at Wolves in front of 41,000 at Molineux. The home side were crowned champions of England over a few weeks later.

▶THE BIGGEST WINS

The Hatters' largest margin of victory on 18th April is by four goals, which has happened only twice, once in 1903 the second time in 1927. In their first ever match on this particular day the Hatters romped to a 4-0 win over West Ham in the Southern League, watched by approximately 2,000 people. Then, 23 years later, the Town beat Brighton & Hove Albion in Division 3 (South) by the same scoreline.

ON THE ROAD

Away from home the Town have struggled for results on 18th April, winning just twice, drawing three times and losing on four occasions – and only scoring 11 times in the process. The Town won 2-0 at Newport County in 1936 with a certain Joe Payne on target the same week in which he netted 10 goals against Bristol Rovers (on 13th). The Town's only other win away from home on this day came in 1969 when goals from John Moore and Bruce Rioch gave the Hatters a 2-0 win at Tranmere Rovers in Division 3 (now League 1).

AND THE REST

A David Moss penalty gave the Town a 1-0 win over Bristol Rovers at Kenilworth Road in 1981, while the Hatters' last Football League match on this day came in 2009 when a goal from Rossi Jarvis gave the Town a point in a 1-1 draw at Underhill against Barnet.



Poor old Rotherham. Just when they were clinging to the gravelly edge of Championship survival, someone comes and stamps on their fingers.

The Millers have been charged with fielding an ineligible player and look almost certain to lose three precious points in their battle against relegation.

Farrend Rawson played in Rotherham's victory 1-0 over Brighton on Easter Monday, with manager Steve Evans apparently under the assumption his 28-day loan from Brighton had been extended.

It hadn't - and now the Football League are set to take action. It is a bitter blow, and not the first time someone has been on the pitch when they shouldn't have.

IAMES ROBINSON

These days, deductions are limited to a maximum of 12 points - no matter how many times the offender played.

A decade ago that wasn't the case, meaning Conference side Altrincham found themselves smashed with an eye-watering 18-point hit for fielding an ineligible player in April 2006.

When striker James Robinson arrived from Accrington, nobody dreamed he would need international clearance. He was, after all, a scouser from a club 35 miles up the

What the Robins didn't realise was that Accrington had signed him from Icelandic side IBV (or Íþróttabandalag Vestmannaeyja if you'd prefer) and hadn't registered him properly in the first place.

As a result, Robinson was still registered in Iceland. By the time the error came to light, Robinson - who scored four goals in 14 games - had moved to Australia, the season was almost over and the deduction doomed them

Incredibly, however, lady luck rode to the rescue as Canvey Island resigned from the league, Scarborough went bust and Alty - despite finishing bottom - stayed up.

DARRELL GRIFFITH

Fair enough, a wrongly-registered player shouldn't be on the pitch. But rugby league side Salford took things to a Whole new level when they sneaked on an extra man in a Super League victory over Castleford in 2009.

A count-up subsequently revealed that Salford had indeed spent the last three minutes a man up, no doubt aiding their desperate last-ditch defence.

Unwisely, the Manchester outfit appealed the £10,000 fine handed down by the RFL, who responded by throwing a two-point deduction into the mix as well.

NAZIM AND ZABID MOHAMMED

During a match in the Merseyside cricket league in 2009, identical twins Nazim and Zabid came up with a seemingly ingenious ruse - at the end of the innings Nazim, a bowler, would swap with his batsman brother, injecting an unexpected bit of class into the tail. Unfortunately, their eagle-eyed opponents realised that only one of them was left handed. Both of them were banned for life.

The Town face a battle to extend their season in the League 2 Play-Offs with three games to go.

The Hatters need to overhaul either Stevenage, in sixth, or Plymouth, in seventh, to gatecrash the Play-Offs.

Stevenage's visit to Kenilworth Road on the final day of the season could be particularly significant, but the Hertfordshire will need to drop points before then for the Hatters to stand a chance of catching them. Boro lie five points ahead of the Town and face a trip to Accrington today before taking on Carlisle at home next Saturday.

The team closest to the Town in the table are Plymouth who sit three points above the Hatters with a superior goal difference. Argyle, who drew 1-1 at home to Wimbledon on Tuesday face a long trip to Carlisle this afternoon before hosting Tranmere at Home Park next Saturday. The Pilgrims end the season, however, with a trip to Shrewsbury, who could still be challenging for the title.

Still in the hunt for the Play-Offs are Newport and Exeter, who lie in ninth and 10th respectively.
