

A full house at Roots Hall beckons and with the amazing support we received at such outposts as Exeter and Bury, we won't go far wrong in anything we attempt to do today.



PHIL NEEDS YOUR HELP

Southend United manager Phil Brown is running the London Marathon tomorrow, and needs your support!

For the boss, it will be the first time he has undertaken the 26.2-mile challenge, and is running in aid of the Amy May Trust and Sparks children's charity.

"I'll be attempting to raise money and awareness for both charities," the boss said

"I'm doing 60-70km a week and looking forward to running my first Marathon. I'll be going all guns blazing, hopefully it'll be a great day and we can raise as much money as possible for the two charities."

So, with the big day almost here, what's going through the boss' mind ahead of the gruelling challenge in the heart of London?

"I'm very apprehensive," he says.

"I've been fit all my life but I'm 55 and I've only done a half-marathon. I did the Great North Run about ten years ago which was tough.


"I've pounded along Southend seafront many a time in training for the Marathon. It gives me time to think about tactics, formations, players and games.

"More importantly, it's the two charities that I'll think about."

The Amy May Trust aims to help 27-year-old Amy, whose life was catastrophically changed one year ago this week, when, through no fault of her own a tragic situation occurred in Budapest. Severely allergic to nuts all her life Amy managed her condition with confidence, never being without her lifesaving EpiPens, an adrenaline filled syringe, and medications with her wherever she was. Amy experienced a catastrophic anaphylaxis reaction after a single bite of food. The intensity of the reaction was so severe that Amy went into a cardiac arrest. After paramedics fought earnestly to save Amy's life in the road outside of the restaurant she was taken to hospital in Budapest and immediately put into an induced coma.

She had sustained a severe brain injury due to lack of oxygen and her

life was being maintained by a life support machine.

After three weeks in ICU in Hungary, facing daily life threatening battles, including having a brain probe inserted, pneumonia, and being placed in three increasing depths of coma, Amy was taken by air ambulance to St. Thomas' Hospital in London where she has spent the majority of the past year.

She has recently been transferred to a Neurological hospital in London, where she will receive specialist rehabilitation .



LUTON TOWN FOOTBALL Club was founded in April 1885 after a merger between two exist-ing clubs, Luton Town Wanderers and Excelsior.

After twenty years away from the Football League, Luton Town returned in 1920.

The Hatters would remain in the Third Division until 1937, winning the division and earning promotion to the Second Division. During the 1936-37 season, striker Joe Payne netted 55 times in 39 games, with 10 goals in one match against Bristol Rovers - which to this day is a Football League record.

Luton Town reached the top flight of English football for the first time in 1955 after fin-ishing second to Birmingham City in the Second Division.

1959 saw the Hatters visit Wembley Stadium to take on Nottingham Forest for the FA Cup Final, with Dave Pacey scoring what proved to be only a consolation goal in a 2-1 defeat played out in front of over 100,000 spectators.

However, the club were relegated in 1960 and plummeted to the depths of the Fourth Division as soon as 1965.

Within nine years the club were back in the top flight, with comedian Eric Morecambe one notable name on the club's board of directors.

Relegation followed in the 1974-75 season, with Luton going down by just one point - joined in relegation by Carlisle United and Chelsea.

David Pleat took the managerial hotseat in 1978 and led the club back to the top tier in 1982.

Manchester City at Maine Road on the final day of the 1982-83 season, with Yugoslavian substitute Raddy Anti scoring a late winner to cause Pleat to do his famous 'jig of joy' across the pitch. The club's highest ever league finish was achieved in the 1986-87 season, when John Moore led his Hatters side to 7th in the First Division.

Ray Harford took over after Moore, managing the club to League Cup success in 1988.

Two goals from Brian Stein and one from Danny Wilson saw Luton Town defeat an Ar-senal side managed by George Graham at Wembley Stadium, in front of a crowd of 95,732.

Arsenal had been leading 2-1 with just ten minutes remaining, with Andy Dibble pulling off a penalty save to spark the Hatters into a late rally that ultimately saw them lift the cup.

The club returned to Wembley for the League Cup Final in 1989, but lost 3-1 to Not-tingham Forest.

1992 saw the Hatters relegated from the First Division, with the club sinking to the third tier within just four years. Relegation from the third tier was then confirmed in 2001.

Joe Kinnear led Luton Town back to the

third tier at the first attempt, before he was sacked by controversial owner John Gurney following his takeover in May 2003

Gurney then appointed Mike Newell, who went on to manage Luton Town to the League One title in 2005.

Newell was sacked in March 2007 after criticising the club's ownership over a lack of funds.

Kevin Blackwell and Mick Harford both attempted to emulate Newell's successes, but failed.

Luton Town were relegated twice in a row in the 2006-07 and 2007-08 seasons, before being plunged into administration.

The club was then hit with a 30-point deduction in the 2008-09 season, which saw the club relegated from League

That same season saw the club win the Football League Trophy, with a Claude Gnakpa goal in extra-time proving crucial in a 3-2 win over Scunthorpe United at Wembley.

The Hatters endured a torturous fiveyear wait for their Football League return, pro-vided by former Dagenham and Redbridge boss John Still in the 2013-14 season.




22 Michael HARRIMAN

An attacking full back who joined Luton Town early in the season on loan from Queens Park Rangers, Michael Harriman actually made his Hatters debut in the game against the Blues in October 2014. The full back made a great impression in the early part of his loan with Luton and it was announced earlier this season that Harriman would stay with John Still's side until the end of the campaign. The full back has already had loans with St Albans City, Wycombe Wanderers and Gillingham so far in his career and has so far appeared twice for parent club Rangers. The 22-year-old, who is a current Republic of Ireland under-21 international, played at Gillingham last season alongside current Blues duo Adam Barrett and Myles Weston.


A former Hull City youngster, Mark Cullen joined Luton Town in May 2013, signing a two-year deal with the club following his release from the Tigers. He originally turned pro during his time at the KC Stadium in 2010, and upon departing the club, totalled 24 appearances, scoring once, against Wigan Athletic. During his years with Hull, Cullen enjoyed time out on loan with the likes of Bradford City, two spells at Bury and then Stockport County. Last season saw Cullen score ten goals in 36 games as the Hatters earned promotion back to the Football League. He was rewarded for his fine campaign by agreeing a new three-year contract. Cullen is Luton's top scorer this season and was linked with a move away from Bedfordshire in the January transfer window, but John Still would have been delighted to see the striker remain at the club.





An experienced midfielder who is in

his second spell with Luton Town, stylish playmaker Andy Drury returned to Luton in the summer after joining from Crawley Town for an undisclosed fee believed to be £100,000. Born in Kent, Drury began his career in non-league football with hometown club Sittingbourne in 2001, spending two years with the side, scoring an impressive 26 goals in 98 games before moving to Gravesend & Northfleet (Ebbsfleet United). He was a regular for the Fleet and made over 100 appearances prior to making the switch to Lewes in 2006. He enhanced his reputation as a goalscoring midfield man, bagging an impressive 16 goals in 72 games at the Dripping Pan before heading to the Conference to sign for Stevenage in 2008, spending two years with the Hertfordshire side and winning the FA Trophy and promotion to the Football League for the first time in the club's history in his two-year stint at Broadhall Way, However, Drury decided to drop back down to the Conference by signing for Luton on a free transfer in the summer of 2010. He only spent half a season with the Hatters before joining Championship side Ipswich Town in January 2011 for a fee of £150,000. In September that year he joined Crawley on loan but the two sides couldn't agree on a fee to make the move permanent. On his release from Ipswich in the summer of 2013. Drury joined Crawley on a permanent deal, playing 41 times for the Reds last season in Sky Bet League One.



John STILL

An experienced manager who led Luton Town back to the Football League last season, John Still joined the Hatters in 2013 – dropping down a level by leaving Dagenham & Redbridge.

Still had been with the Daggers since 2004 and had overseen their promotion to the Football League for the first time in their history, before a League Two play-off Final win over Rotherham United at Wembley Stadium in 2010.

However, the Daggers only spent a season in League One before suffering relegation back to League Two.

The 64-year-old boss cut his teeth in management in nonleague football, winning trophies and honours with a host of clubs, including Leytonstone & Ilford (twice), Dartford, Maidstone United and Redbridge Forest before joining Dagenham for his first spell as boss in 1992.

He spent two years with the club before joining Peterborough United in 1994, spending a season with the Posh before departing the club.

1997 saw Still join Barnet, and over two separate spells managed the Bees and was Director of Football, when Tony Cottee became player/manager with the north London side.

After a stint as assistant manager at Bristol Rovers, Still returned to his native London by joining Dagenham for a second time

During his time with the Daggers, Still developed a reputation for signing non-league gems such as Craig Mackail-Smith, Dwight Gayle and Danny Green, who are all now playing in the Championship, Premier League and League One,

As a player, West Ham-born Still started out at Leyton Orient but only made a solitary appearance for the O's before dropping into non-league with Bishop's Stortford, Leytonstone and then Dagenham.



















7 Mark TYLER

Hugely experienced goalkeeper who was the Hatters' first signings in their first season in the Conference in the summer of 2009. Prior to his move to Kenilworth Road Mark had made almost 400 appearances whilst with Peterborough United. The 2013/14 season was Tyler's fifth at Kenilworth Road and he crowned it by playing every match in the 46-game titlle-winning campaign. He kept clean sheets in exactly half of those games and has now made 232 appearances in total for the Hatters.

2 Fraser FRANKS

Talented centre-half who signed for an undisclosed fee in January 2014 from Welling United. Began his career as a youngster at Chelsea and then Brentford before moving to AFC Wimbledon, winning promotion in 2011. Left Kingsmeadow for Welling and helped the Wings secure the Conference South title in 2012/13. Made 17 appearances at the heart of the Hatters defence in the title-winning season of 2013/14.

3 Danny FITZSIMONS

Former Millwall and QPR defender who followed team-mate Jim Stevenson to Kenilworth Road from Histon on a two-year contract in the summer of 2013. Swept the board at the Stutes' end-of-season awards in 2013 and has over 100 games experience despite only being 22-years-old. Capable of playing at left-back or in central defence, an injury kept him out of the Town side for the entire 2013/14 campaign but he's back to full fitness and aiming to stake a claim in the Town sauad.

4 Jonathan **SMITH**

Combative central midfielder signed from York in January 2013 for £50,000 following a successful loan spell. Originally with York he moved to Swindon where he helped the Robins win the League 2 title in 2011/12 before switched back to Bootham Crescent. Smith enjoyed a terrific first half of 201314 with a number of influential performances but his season looked to have been over following a leg-breaking injury sustained on Boxing Day. However, his progress and rehabilitation was tremendous and, four months to the day after the incident, he made

an emotional comeback as a substitute in the final match of the title-winning campaign.

5 Stephen MCNULTY

Experienced centre-half who signed for the Town in February 2013. The Liverpool-born defender led Fleetwood Town to Conference title in 2011/12, lifting the title as the Cod Army captain. The Liverpudlian has also played for Barrow, Vauxhall Motors and Bursough. McNulty enjoyed a fantastic season at the heart of the Hafters defence and was an ever-present as the Hafters lifted the Conference title.

6 Alex LACEY

Highly-rated centre-half who made his first team debut as a 17-year-old in the FA Trophy first round tie against Welling in 2009, earning the man-of-the-match award for an excellent performance. Signed a professional contract to remain at Kenilworth Road until the end of the 2011/12 season which was extended to a three-year deal in the summer of 2012. He spent the 2012/13 season on loan at Conference South side Eastleigh but began the 2013/14 season as captain during pre-season and broke into the side in August. Lacey scored his first goal for the club in the 4-0 win at Woking in September 2013 and went onto make 22 appearance as the Town lifted the title.

7 Alex LAWLESS

Influential and creative midfielder penned a new two-year contract in May 2013, turning down contracts at two clubs in League 1.


Lawless enjoyed a fine 2012/13 campaign which cumulated in him winning both the Player of the Year and Players' Player of the Year awards. The 29-year-old has made 156 appearances for the Hatters since signing from York City in November 2010 and has scored 18 goals. Began his career as a youngster at Fulham and has also played for Forest Green. Scored six goals in 32 matches as he helped the Town lift the Conference title in 2013/14. The third-longest serving member of the squad.

9 Paul BENSON

Experienced striker who signed permanently this summer after a hugely successive season-long loan last term. Benson started out with Essex Intermediate League side White Ensign but shot to prominence with Dagenham & Redbridge under John Still, helping the Daggers to win two promotions, scoring over 75 goals. He signed for Charlton Athletic in August 2010 but after a season-and-a-half - in which he scored 10 league goals - the striker moved to Swindon Town in January 2012 and helped the Robins win the League 2 title that season. Having fallen down the pecking order at the County Ground, he was loaned to Portsmouth and Cheltenham last season before he was reunited with Still at Kenilworth Road. In his debut season at Kenilworth Road Benson was at his magnificent best, scoring 18 times as he helped the Town to lift the Conference title.

10 Alex WALL

Powerful striker who signed in the summer of 2013 having impressed whilst on-loan to the



Hatters from Maidenhead United until at the end of the 2012/13 season. Alex joined Maidenhead from Thatcham Town but burst onto the scene last season with a dozen goals for the Magpies. He won the Blue Square Bet South player of the month award for February following a purple patch in front of goal and, following his arrival at Kenilworth Road, scored two goals. In 2013/14 he scored a fine winning goal in the 4-3 win over FC Halifax before going out on loan to Dartford where his form in front of goal continued.

11 Jake HOWELLS


The young winger, who can also play at left-back or in central midfield, came through the ranks at Kenilworth Road and made his first team debut as a second half substitute in May 2008. He made his full debut in the Hatters colours away at Bradford City in October 2008. After making 36 appearances for the Hatters in the 2008/09 the England C international was rewarded for his efforts with a professional contract in May. In his first season as a pro, Howells made huge strides with impressive performances on the left-side of midfield, ending the 2009/10 campaign with six goals, including his first senior goal in the incredible 4-3 win over Cambridge in September 2009. Capped at Under-21 level by Wales.

12 Scott GRIFFITHS

Left-back who signed at the end of the 2012/13 season after impressing following his arrival on an original short-term deal. The former Dagenham & Redbridge man, the experienced defender joined the Hatters in March 2012 following his release from former club Peterborough. He won the Conference under Still in 2007 and lifted the League 2 title with Chesterfield in 2011. Scott was an ever-present for the Town in the title winning campaign of 2013/14.

14 Andv PARRY

Versatile central defender or midfielder signed from Southport on a two-year contract in the summer of 2013. Also able to play at right back, Parry had two season's worth of Conference football under his belt. Began his career as a youngster at Blackburn. Appeared 26 times for the Town in his debut season of 2013/14 and scored four goals.



16 Eliot JUSTHAM

Up-and-coming goalkeeper signed from East Thurrock on a two-year deal in May 2013. The 6ft 3in stopper kept 14 clean sheets in 31 matches for the Rocks in the 2012/13 season. The stopper has previously enjoyed trials at West Ham and Reading. He made his Town debut in an FA Cup tie at Woking, keeping a clean sheet in the process, and went onto feature in all of the Hatters' cup ties in 2013/14. Was an ever-present as substitute keeper for Mark Tyler during 2013/14.

17 Pelly RUDDOCK MPANZU

Highly-rated midfielder who the Town signed on a permanent deal from West Ham in January 2014 from West Ham United. Only made his debut for the Hammers in August 2013 in the Capital One Cup but was loaned to the Hatters in December — making his debut at centre-half against Staines in the FA Trophy. He scored his first goal for the Town in the 7-0 win over Hereford and picked up a championship winners' medal after string of impressive performances in central midfield.

18 Ross **LAFAYETTE**

Summer signing from Welling United, the strong and pacey frontman scored 39 goals in 90 matches with the Wings, who he helped win the Conference South in 2012/13. A regular scorer further down the pyramid he also has experience of coaching in the United States, Joined the Town on a two-year deal.

19 Ricky MILLER

The 2013/14 Conference North player of the year and top goalscorer who ended the campaign with a haul of 28 goals for Boston. Previously on the books of Rothwell and Stamford, the striker began his career on the books at Charlton as a youngster. He signed for the Town on a two-year deal this summer and was likened by boss John Still to a cross between Kevin Phillips and Craig Mackail-Smith.

20 Shaun WHALLEY

Attack-minded midfielder or winger who followed Andy Parry to Kenilworth Road on a two-year deal from Southport in the summer

of 2013. Whalley was in inspired form for the Sandgrounders throughout 2012/13, scoring 10 goals and creating many more and ended the campaign with a string of end-of-season awards. After beginning last season with the Town, Whalley was loaned to AFC Telford who he helped win the Conference North title.

21 Luke GUTTRIDGE

Influential and experienced central midfielder with over 450 senior appearances to his name who signed for the Hatters in August 2013 on a two-year contract. He has twice won promotion whilst with Southend, and also helped Northampton reach the League 2 play-off final last season. Luke enjoyed a fine debut season with Hatters, scoring an impressive 13 goals in 33 matches before a foot injury curtailed his season in March. Returned to full fitness this summer, scoring in the friendly draw with Colchester.

23 Matt ROBINSON

Young central midfielder who impressed the Town enough in pre-season of 2012 to earn himself a contract. He made his Town debut in a 2-0 win at Kidderminster Harriers in August and scored his first goal for the club in the 3-1 win at Southport on the final game of the 2013/13 season. Matt had clearly made a big impression and the midfielder was delighted to pen a new two-year contract in June 2013. Matt made 31 appearances for the Town in the title-winning campaign and scored twice — both vital goals against Chester and Grimsby.

24 Curtley **WILLIAMS**

A former Ipswich scholar whose primary position is right-back who joined the Hatters this summer. Curtley spent time in Spain at the Glenn Hoddle Academy before spells in non-league. He helped Lowestoff to the Play-Offs in his first season before enjoying another successful campaign in Suffolk last term, with the club winning promotion through the Play-Offs.

26 Nathan **DOYLE**

Defensive central midfielder who penned a one-year contract with the Hatters in September 2014 after leaving Bradford City in the summer. Derby-born, he came through the Rams' youth ranks before signing for Hull and then Barnsley. Joined Bradford in 2012 and helped the Bantams win the League 2 Play-Offs in his first season — a campaign that also saw the Yorkshire outfit reach the final of the League Cup.

27 Ryan HALL

A former Blues winger, who signed an 18-month contract with Luton in January 2015. Started his career as a youngster at Crystal Palace but resurrected his career in non-league circles at Bromley. Southend took a punt on the pacey wideman and he went onto enjoy an excellent two seasons at Roots Hall in League 2. A move to Leeds followed before he dropped out of favour, but after a spell with Rotherham at the start this season he moved to Kenilworth Road.

30 Luke WILKINSON

Centre-half who has previously played under John Still whilst with Dagenham. The former



Bristol City and Portsmouth defender enjoyed a successful spell on-loan at Dartford before nailing down a place with the Daggers and was voted their player of the year two seasons ago. Signed a one-year deal with the Town in July 2014.

31 Nathan ODUWA

Highly-rated 18-year-old winger or striker on-loan from Tottenham Hotspur until the end of the season. Risen through Spurs' academy and has been capped at Under-17 and 18 level for England. Made his Luton debut in the 1-1 draw at Oxford in February.

32 Brett LONGDEN

Young second-year professional whose primary position is right-back. Brett made his debut for the Town in the FA Trophy and spent last season onloan at Maidenhead — a deal that was struck once gagin for the first three months of this season.

33 Mark ONYEMAH

Teenage left-back who arrived at Kenilworth Road this summer having also impressed on trial. Rose through the youth ranks with Thurrock and made his debut as a 16-year-old.

35 Charlie WALKER

Prolific striker who joined the Hatters after scoring 43 goals last season as the club won promotion. Joined the Town on trial this summer and scored twice in the friendly against AFC Dunstable before being snapped up on a permanent deal.

38 Elliot LEE

Young striker loan from Premier League West Ham United. Came through the Hammers' academy and has already featured in their squads in the Premier League. Spent time on-loan at Colchester and briefly this season at Blues before he joined the Hatters in February.

39 Ian REES

Teenage central midfielder who penned his first professional contract midway through the 2013/14 season having impressed the coaching staff. Made four appearances, including a full debut in the 2-0 FA Trophy win over Wrexham in which he hit the post with a first half header.

Their last victory on this day came in a Division Four clash at Torquay United in 1981, as Blues ran out 3-0 worthy winners.

In recent years, Southend have shared the spoils with their opposition, including the year 2009, where they drew 1-1 away at Oldham Athletic in League One.

Latics' Kevin Maher struck the post before Deane Smalley was brought down inside the penaltyarea by Southend defender Peter Clarke. Neil Eardley then stepped up to fire his spot-kick beyond goalkeeper Steve Mildenhall, but Oldham's lead lasted less than 10 minutes as Lee Barnard grabbed a vital equaliser from close-range.

However, blues couldn't find the winner, as their slim mathematical chances of making the League One play-offs were ended.

Two years later in 2011, Blues played out a goalless draw at Macclesfield Town in League Two.

It was a vital point for the Silkmen, as it left them a point closer to safety, although they may have felt they could have won the game in the 81st minute when striker Tyrone Barnett clipped the top of the crossbar with a powerful drive from outside the box.

In other news, April 25 1983 saw the German magazine, Stern, publish the first instalment of the controversial "Hitler Diaries" - an account of World War II allegedly written by the Führer himself.

OUR MAN CONNOR ARMSTRONG DISCUSSES LUTON TOWN'S SEASON WITH **MIKE SIMMONDS** – SPORTS EDITOR OF LUTON TODAY

How would you assess the 2014-15 season for Luton Town?

The 2014-15 campaign has most definitely been a mixed bag for the Hatters. After a difficult start, Luton then went on a superb winning run which propelled them to top spot.

Even though that sequence was eventually broke, it looked like they were nailed on for the play-offs at the very least until a seven-game losing streak saw them plummet down the table.

Injuries have played a part massively for Luton though with some big players missing at various times, so if they can regain a top seven berth, then they can reflect on a decent effort in their first year back.

This is The Hatters' first season back at League Two level, has it met expectations and what are the aims of the club moving forward?


I would say that most Luton fans would have hoped for a top 10 finish at the very least, with quite a few believing a play-off place was possible too, so with that in mind it has met with expectations. However, the aim of the club moving forward is most definitely to make progress, so if still in the division next term, they will be looking for automatic promotion.

John Still took over at Luton after leaving Dagenham, and led the club back to the Football League - what do you make of him?

The Town manager has been one of the major reasons behind Hatters' success over the last 18 months, as he finally ended five years of misery in the Conference by romping to the title last season.

He managed to bring the club together, getting fans onboard which proved a real boost to their fortunes last year.

The last few months have been tougher for Still with Town's losing run, but almost all fans remain fully behind the manager, wherever Luton finish this term.



Luton are 8th and outside the play-off places only on goal difference - do you think the Hatters will be successful in their pursuit of the play-offs?

It's so tough to call this one as I didn't think they would make it in recent weeks, but Saturday's results has given them a real opportunity.

The ball still remains in Plymouth's court though as they have a far better goal difference and with today's game, plus Stevenage at home next week, I fear Luton may fall just short.

Key man?

The key man for the Hatters, if fit, is midfielder Nathan Doyle, who has been Luton's best signing this season.

He missed Saturday's 3-0 win over Hartlepool with a calf injury but it is hoped he will recover in time for today's meeting as he provides such an effective screen in front of the back four and is excellent when in possession.

Unsung hero?

Town's unsung hero this year for me would be full back Scott Griffiths who often doesn't get the credit he deserves. It was noticable how Luton's defence



suffered without him in recent weeks and he is now playing through injury to give Hatters the best chance of making the play-offs.

What have you made of Southend's season so far?

Looking on from afar, it looked like Southend were making heavy weather of the season before Christmas as they appeared to struggle for consistency. However, since the turn of the year, they have been hugely impressive, especially putting together such a great run of results when most needed.

Where do you expect Southend to finish this season?

Looking at the remaining fixtures this season, I would expect Southend to finish in fourth place as third definitely remains in Wycombe's hands and as long as they hold their nerve, they should go up automatically.

Who are you tipping for promotion?

I would tip the top three to stay as they are and then Bury to go up through the play-offs.

10. Score prediction for today's game?

I'll go for a narrow home win, 2-1.


CONNOR ARMSTRONG LOOKS AT OUR BATTLES WITH LUTON TOWN OVER THE YEARS

Luton Town 2 Southend United 0 October 11th 2014

First-half goals from Alex Lawless and Mark Cullen saw Luton overcome Blues when the two sides met at Kenilworth Road earlier this season. Lawless fired the hosts into the lead after 17 minutes when he darted into the penalty area, cutting inside before curling a placed effort past Dan Bentley. After a defensive error from Bentley and Cian Bolger, midfielder Andy Drury pounced for Luton, enabling Cullen to double the hosts' advantage. Blues were unable to reduce the deficit, meaning that the Hatters leapfroaged Southend and rose to 4th in the table as Phil Brown's men slipped down to 5th.

Southend United 3 Luton Town 1 November 29th 2008

Blues progressed to the Third Round of the FA Cup with victory of a Luton Town side managed by Mick Harford. The Hatters visited Roots Hall in the 2008/09 season, which would later see the side relegated from the Football League. Junior Stanislas scored after 34 minutes to send Southend in front at the interval, before Michael Spillane, who would later represent Blues, levelled the scores in the 80th minute. Luton were on level terms for just four minutes, with West Ham United loanee Stanislas striking again. James Walker



rounded off the scoring for Blues in the 90th minute, after replacing Alex Revell as a 77th minute substitute. Southend went on to play Chelsea in the FA Cup Fourth Round.

Southend United 2 Luton Town 0 March 8th 2008

Blues beat Luton Town in the last league meeting between the two sides, as Steve Tilson's side kept up their push for the League One play-offs. Nicky Bailey opened the scoring just eight minutes before the interval, netting in front of a crowd of 8,241. Luton, whose side featured Chris Perry, Paul McVeigh and Matthew Spring, were unable to peg Blues back and had defeat confirmed in the 90th minute. James Walker wrapped up the three points for Southend United in the final minute of regulation time, firing an effort past Dean Brill in goal for the Hatters.

Luton Town I Southend United O November 24th 2007

Calvin Andrew scored the only goal of the game when Blues visited Kenilworth Road in November 2007. With Blues in 8th place in the League One table, the defeat at 22nd placed Luton Town was unexpected. Southend lined up with Peter Clarke, Adam Barrett and Gary Hooper in the starting eleven, but were unable to score against the League One strugglers. Luton Town, managed by Kevin Blackwell, went in front when Luton youth product Andrew beat Steve Collis in the Southend goal, to earn a valuable win to move the club away from the foot of the table.

Southend United I Luton Town 3 April 28th 2007

Goals from Calvin Andrew, Matthew Spring and Besian Idrizaj condemned Southend to relegation from the Championship in front of a crowd of

10,276 at Roots Hall. Lee Bradbury's 66th minute goal proved to a did little worth by the final whistle, after first half goals from Andrew and Spring saw the visitors head in two goals in front at half-time. As Blues pushed for a late equaliser with Steve Tilson's substitution of Charles Ademeno in place of Richie Foran, the knock-out blow to Southend's survival hopes was landed when Idrizaj, on loan from Liverpool, netted in the 87th min-ute.

Luton Town 0 Southend United 0 December 15th 2006

Mike Newell's Luton Town side rose one place from 19th to 18th in the Championship table, as Blues were unable to escape their position at the bottom of the table. The Hatters side that Friday night featured Dean Kiely, Carlos Edwards and Rowan Vine. Southend went in search of a late winner when Blues boss Steve Tilson brought on both Matt Harrold and Gary Hooper with just ten minutes remaining, but the additional striking options were unable to assist Freddy Eastwood in breaking the deadlock at Kenilworth Road. The goalless draw left Tilson's men seven points adrift of Barnsley, who occupied 21st position, despite Blues having played a game more than the Tykes.




AV.GOALS CONCEDED PER GAME







They will know what it's like to go to the likes of Accrington and be one of about 800 or 900 people! The book will appeal to the clubs I played for and I hope they will all enjoy it. It'll be perfect for when the fans are lazing around the pool in the summer on their holidays, hopefully after a Southend promotion to League One!

On this particular occasion, the likes of Elvis Bwomono, Tom Clifford and Damani Dias, as well as substitutes Alfie Ripsher, Cameron John and Sewa Marah, were unable to help the team to a victory, but the manner in which all the youngsters conducted themselves and the performance that they put in augers well for next term.

"I'm disappointed we lost the game," said Huzzey afterwards. "I think the first half performance was really good; we completely controlled the game when we were in possession and, even out of possession, we forced Portsmouth into areas of the field where we wanted them to play.

"I thought their centre-forward took his goal really well and they only really had

one chance and they scored from it and, as the boys came off at half-time, I was really positive. In the second half, I think we let the game go past us a little bit too quickly, we panicked a little bit because we didn't want to lose the game and we threw the ball forward a little bit too early.

"In the first half we had let the play build up, and we were better and had longer spells in possession. Overall, I'm happy with the first half and some of the bits in the second half because it was a really young team we took down," he added.

Blues had probed the Pompey back-line with patient build-up play during the opening half-an-hour, but the hosts took the lead as Sayers created an opportunity. The attacker tracked across the edge of the penalty area before arrowing his shot across Josh Bexon and inside the bottom left-hand corner.

Southend's reaction to going behind was superb, and Batlokwa almost equalised immediately when he beat Bass to a long ball from the kick-off, but his effort was blocked by the custodian and Wabo's follow-up was grabbed by the recovering shotstopper. Phillips then saw a curling strike deflected wide and, when Abdul Salami was brought down in the 34th minute, Clifford's 30-yard free-kick was held by Alex Bass.

Batlokwa half-volleyed into Bass'



gloves late in the first half, but perhaps Southend's best opportunity to equalise arrived just after the hour mark. Wabo did well to win the ball on the right-hand side after persistently pressurising a defender. He then squared for the onrushing Bedford, who had the time to control the ball some twelve yards from goal, but instead swiped a shot over the crossbar when well-placed to make it 1-1.

Wabo saw an effort deflected wide late on, but Southend failed to exert the necessary pressure to force a clear-cut opening. Despite that, Huzzey was happy with the performance: "I think the problem we had was that Norman Wabo coming feet and linking up really well with the midfield players and doing all the pretty stuff in and around the box, but we had no-one that was prepared to stop that and have a go and get a shot away themselves."

"If we'd've had more of that, we'd've

scored more because we created chances, but I don't know how many goalscoring opportunities we created. We created half-chances here and there, and Joe Bedford should've scored, and Norman Wabo should've scored when he fronted the man up and shot past the post but, for the amount of possession we had in the first half, we should've had more attempts on goal."

The result followed a 1-1 draw against Stevenage in the final Boots & Laces encounter of the campaign, with Southend's point gained in the final minute when Dan Walker smashed the ball through a crowded penalty area to score his first goal of the season.

Huzzey concluded by summing up his thoughts on the season as a whole and looking forward to 2015/16: "The first part of the season was really good. We finished fifth, which was good because we played some really good sides in that division. We then struggled a little bit when we came into this Merit Division because we've been playing all the winners, but the sides that we've taken in have been young. We're not hiding behind their ages, but they've grown in experience as the games have gone on.

"From Peterborough onwards there has only been one goal in the last four games, so they have been really tight and in those games the managers of the opposition have said that we've been unlucky and deserved to get a bit more from them, so that's a massive positive to take out of the last bit of the season.

"I'm really looking forward to next season because this game was a bit of a test about what we've got, and I'm really positive about what we've got because the football we played was the best we've played all season. We had long spells where we controlled possession, which we haven't done, so hopefully the future's quite bright.

"We could quite easily have brought in the U16s to play against U17s teams or sides that went into the lower Merit Division, but we've tested them against the best, like Portsmouth, and the experience that they've got in the last six or seven games will be important and will stand them in really good stead when next season starts," he declared.

YOUTH INTERVIEW

DUNGAN

n the second part of an exclusive interview for the official matchday programme, Academy **Manager Ricky Duncan** continues to look back on his decade with the club's youth department and consider the future of the Shrimpers.

"Youth football has progressed with the introduction of the Elite Player Performance Plan and that's made us more accountable and more transparent, and I think that's only good for the game," he begins. "I think everyone should be more accountable and more transparent, with more structure, and I'm pleased with that. There's more feedback to the players, more feedback to the coaches; everything about it is about developing people and that can only be the best for everyone."

The EPPP has seen the set-up at Boots & Laces evolve over the





past ten years with more staff taken on and the acquisition of a new Soccerdome previously based in Greenwich. Duncan is grateful to the club's chairman, Ron Martin, and the Board for their support: "We've got better facilities than some clubs, and we've got a Board that's been very supportive, which has helped. The managers over the years have supported it in their own way, but we've got a manager now that's very, very supportive of what we do. I'm pleased that we've got an Academy that produces now, and kids can come in knowing that they're going to get a game."


"Against Plymouth recently, for instance, we had U16s playing in the U18s and U14s playing in the U16s. Some clubs wouldn't do that. but we can because of the calibre of the kids that are stepping in. Yes, we want to win games - I want to win games - but what was pleasing was that, although we've lost 2-1 to Plymouth, who are top of the league, we had two 15-year-olds playing on the right-hand side and Elvis Bwomono, at full-back, was fantastic. That's what it is about."

There have been many success stories, with the likes of Daniel Bentley, Jack Payne and Ted Smith all featuring in the first-team this

season and current scholars Daniel Matsuzaka and Emmanuel Adeveye both being involved around the matchday squad. Duncan is quick to point out that there may have been others over the seasons, but they have moved on to progress their careers at other clubs, and that has also played a part in the Academy gaining the reputation

"We can talk about Dan Bentley playing in the first team, and Johnny Herd before him and Franck Moussa before him, and then other players have missed out on that opportunity because other clubs have come in and bought them, which is still a success story for the football club, but once a club comes in then the kids and their parents have got to make their own decisions."

Duncan would prefer it if the talents that have been produced could be retained, and that is why he believes that instigating an U21 team is important: "That's a grey area for us at the moment. A lot of boys have gone through and we've got to look at that differently, which we've highlighted and that's what we're doing. A full-time recruitment officer will be nice for the Academy because it will take the pressure off



"I'm excited about where we're going and about the prospect of having more staff and a bigger department, and having that opportunity, with investment, to keep bringing good quality players to this football club. The next level will be to get 50% in the first team, but that will come when they're good enough."

"The manager wants to put players in, but they've got to be good enough and we've got to make sure we're giving him a rough diamond that he can polish off and put in the first team. We aive him the diamond and he shows them the extra work that first team football is, about getting three points and winning games on a Saturday; that's the next part of their development, which will help with the U21 squad coming


So, what does Duncan hope for in the next ten years? "I hope, in ten years' time, the Academy is a lot stronger. I hope it's in Category Two, and if the football club is in the Championship then maybe thinking about going Cat One, which would be a fantastic thing

have a youth policy here, because it's been ten years' worth of work from everyone at the club; people that are here now, people that have left, the Board of Directors and the chairman."

"I have to say that the chairman has always been there and, when it's right, he supports it. If you knock on his door and say that we need to push it a little bit more. he has supported it. That only works when you've got a manager behind it as well, which we have, so in ten years' time, whether I'm coming back to visit or still sat in this year, I'll be just as pleased and proud as I am now."

"If there are still kids coming through and the club has got the reputation it's currently got, then I'll've left a good legacy. Hopefully I'll still be sitting here in ten years' time and we'll be talking about retirement and where I'm going to enjoy the rest of my life! At the moment it's just about pushing for Cat Two and keeping the standards high to take the club forward and make sure it's recognised as a place to develop young players."

The full cost of the Southend refurbishment is more than £9 million; a level of investment that clearly demonstrates our commitment to keep a local policing base in the town and ensure our facilities are fit for operational use in the future.

Mike Lapper was born in California in 1970 and was a member of UCLA's 1990 NCAA Division One championship-winning team, before being selected for the All-America first team in 1991.

He made his international debut for the United States in April 1991, against South Korea in Pohang, and was an ever-present in the national side that participated in the 1992 Olympic Games in Spain.

From January 1993, many US internationals were contracted exclusively to the United States Soccer Federation in preparation for their host-Soccer Federation in preparation for their hosting of the 1994 World Cup finals.

Instead of being sidetracked by club matches, they solely played international fixtures and Lapper soon clocked up 44

Lapper was selected for the 1994 World Cup squad, but lost his place in the starting XI at the last minute to the emerging

After the World Cup, Lapper moved to German Second Division outfit VfL Wolfsburg, for whom he scored on his

At the end of the 1994-95 season, he briefly returned to the US before joining Southend United in July 1995.


He made his debut in the opening game of the 1995-96 season, a 2-4 defeat at Portsmouth

A tall and commanding centre back, Mike soon became a favourite at Roots Hall with his brash, no nonsense approach to defending. His Southend career was put on hold after breaking his leg during a 1-0 Boxing Day victory over Norwich City. It was to cost him the remainder of that campaign.

He had a less spectacular season during the 1996-97 season, and, after a dispute over alleged unpaid transfer fees with the USSF, Lapper returned to the States in the summer of

The newly instigated Major League Soccer was recruiting players, and Lapper joined Columbus Crew, whom he led to the play-offs whilst making 20 appearances and scoring one

Unfortunately the 1998 season was another curtailed by njury, with a torn Achilles tendon restricting Mike to only



The 1999 campaign proved to be much better, with Lapper making 31 appearances having fully recovered from surgery to repair his troublesome Achilles.

Mike was a popular and active member of the church community whilst in the Southend area, always giving to those he felt were less fortunate than himself.

On his return to America, he gave his car to the church so they could sell it to raise funds.

As a Blues player, he will probably be best remembered for his quirky off-the-wall column, 'Lapper's Patter' in the local

He also left his mark at Roots Hall, being the first player to wear flip-flops during leisure time to reduce wear and tear on the feet – a practice that has been adopted by many Blues players since.

CATCHING UP WITH...



SIMON FRANCIS

The defender was sent off as Bournemouth's promotion charge from the Championship was halted by Sheffield Wednesday at the Goldsands Stadium. 'Franno' played over 150 times for Southend United between 2006 and 2010 after arriving from Sheffield United. He began in the youth teams with Nottingham Forest and Notts County before agreeing a professional deal with Bradford City in 2002, playing 55 times for the Bantams in two years before moving to Sheffield United in 2004. After loans with Grimsby Town and Tranmere Royers, Francis moved to Roots Hall. He enjoyed a couple of promotions with Southend during his time with us before moving to Charlton Athletic in July 2010. He was in and out of the side, and after a loan with Bournemouth, made it a permanent stay on the south coast, and has played over 130 times for the Cherries so far. Another ex-Blue, in Caolan Lavery also played in the game, for Sheffield Wednesday.

DANNY MAYOR

Winger Danny was voted as the Sky Bet Leggue Two Player of the Year last week. The current Bury man has been in fine form for the Shakers this season and played against Southend on Tuesday evening at Giaa Lane. Originally on the books of Preston North End, Mayor broke through from the youth ranks with the Lilywhites and made an impressive start to his career. His form with Preston alerted other clubs and the winger moved to Sheffield Wednesday in 2012. He was contracted to Wednesday for



two years, but things never really worked out for Mayer, who played just eight games for the Owls during his time with the club. He played five games during a loan spell with Southend back in 2013 but failed to score. Last season was much better for Mayer, with the forward playing 29 times, scoring five times. The 23-year-old has been a regular again for the Shakers and has eight goals so far this term.



ADAM FEDERICI

The former Southend loanee was in the news recently, as his costly error saw Reading cruelly miss out on a potential place in the FA Cup Final. The big Australian allowed Alexis Sanchez's strike to squirm underneath him and over the line, as the Royals lost 2-1 to Arsenal in the semi-final at Wembley Stadium. However, the 30-year-old Federici produced a series of smart stops to deny the Gunners prior to his error. The goalkeeper played ten times for Southend United in 2008 after joining from Reading. He since returned to the Medejski Stadium and has appeared over 200 times for the club since arriving in Berkshire in 2005. Before making the switch to Roots Hall, Federici spent time on loan with the likes of Maidenhead United, Northwood, Carshalton Athletic and Bristol

JOSH SIMPSON

The midfielder marked a winning return to the Crawley Town lineup after spending the last six months on the sidelines at the Checkatrade Stadium, Simpson last played for the Reds in an FA Cup clash at Yeovil Town in November 2014. Simpson spent half a season on loan at Southend in the 2010-11 season, and totalled 17 appearances on a temporary deal from Peterborough United before moving to Crawley on a permanent deal in January 2011 for an undisclosed fee.



The Harlow-born midfielder began his career with Cambridge City, and after 19 appearances for Cambridge United, returned to his first club. A move to Histon followed in 2008, where he impressed - scoring 12 goals in 49 games - before joining Peterborough on loan and then permanently. The 28-year-old has played over 150 times for Crawley since his arrival at the club.





ANTHONY GRANT

Anthony Grant (right) was a regular during his time at Southend United, playing over 150 times for the Blues after joining in 2008 and departing Essex in 2012. The former Chelsea youngster initially joined Southend on loan, but before then, played four times for Luton during the 2007-08 season in a similar deal. After loans with Oldham Athletic and then Wycombe Wanderers, Grant made the move to Luton before Blues, Leaving Southend in 2012, Grant moved to Stevenage on a free transfer, and played 41 times for Boro before heading north to sign for Crewe Alexandra. He been playing for the Alex ever since, and the former England under-16, under-17 and under-19 international has appeared 65 times for the Chechire outfit so far.



Winger Dave Martin spent the 2012-13 campaign with Southend, playing over 30 times and scoring four times. Born in Erith, Martin started out at Brighton & Hove Albion before dropping into nonleague with Slade Green and Dartford. He joined Crystal Palace in 2007, but after a season moved on to Millwall. He impressed at the Den during two years with the club and was a regular in the team, scoring nine goals. Derby took him on loan with a view to a permanent deal, which was signed in 2010. He struggled to break into the Rams team and spent time away from Pride Park at Notts County and Walsall on loan before moving to Southend in 2012. Leaving the Blues on a free transfer in 2013, Marin moved to Luton, spending two years with the Hatters, and during his spell, took in loans at Dartford and Bristol Rovers on loan before joining Stevenage on a free

A real Southend United cult hero, Benjamin played almost 150 times for Southend in two years after arriving from Exeter City in 1990. However, three years prior to his arrival in Essex, the big striker

spent a season with Cambridge, scoring twice in 25 games for the U's. Born in Nottingham, Ian came through the youth team at Sheffield United, and ended up playing five times for the Blades, scoring three times before joining West Bromwich Albion in 1979. He struggled to break into the team and in 1982 arrived at Notts County, but didn't stay long with the Magpies and signed for Peterborough United later that year, A much travelled striker, Benjamin also took in spells at Northampton Town and Chester City prior to arriving at Southend, and afterwards played for Luton Town and Brentford, before hanging up his boots at Wigan Athletic in 1996. Ian currently works as a commentator for BBC Northampton, and returned to Southend when the Cobblers came to Roots Hall earlier this season.

DEAN MORGAN

A former Southend United loanee during the 2007-08 campaign, Dean actually moved to Roots Hall on loan from Luton Town. Dean came through the Colchester United youth system, before turning professional in 2000, spending three years at the club before joining Reading

and then Luton Town in 2005. After leaving Southend, where he failed to score in eight loan appearances, Morgan went on to play for the likes of Crewe Alexandra, Leyton Orient, MK Dons. Chesterfield, Oxford United and 62 times for Wycombe Wanderers, amongst others. Dean joined Sky Bet League One side Crawley Town from Woking in January 2015. Dean made 88 appearances for Luton during four years with the Bedfordshire side, scoring 11 times for the Hatters.

IFF NOGAN

A striker with an eye for goal, Lee Nogan had two loan spells with Southend United. The Cardiff-born frontman began his career at Oxford United, and after a loan spell with Brentford, Nogan joined Southend on a temporary deal, playing six times and scoring once for the Blues in 1987. Joining Watford in 1991, he bagged over 20 goals in just over 100 games for the Hornets, and during his time with the Hertfordshire outfit, played five times on loan at Southend again. Moves to Reading, Notts County, Grimsby Town, Darlington and Luton Town where he played seven times - before joining York in 2001. He spent five years at the Minstermen, playing close to 200 games for the club before joining Whitby Town and then FC Halifax Town as a player. The 45-year-old is now assistant manager at Halifax.

CAULEY WOODROW

Beginning his career at Luton Town, Woodrow didn't make an appearance for the Hatters as a professional, as Fulham signed him for a six-figure fee. He struggled to get into the side at the start. but a loan move to Southend during a part of last season helped the youngster get game time under his belt. He totalled 19 appearances for Southend and upon returning to Fulham, played games in the Premier League. However, Fulham were relegated from the top division and he has played regularly in the Championship this season for the Whites.



Ten years on: 2004-05

TEN YEARS ON FROM SOUTHEND UNITED'S LEAGUE 2 PLAY-OFF TRIUMPH AT THE MILLENNIUM STADIUM, SOUTHEND ECHO REPORTER CHRIS PHILLIPS RECALLS THAT MEMORABLE SEASON AT ROOTS HALL THAT WILL LIVE LONG IN THE MEMORY OF ALL BLUES SUPPORTERS...

SOUTHEND United were unable to bounce back from their LDV Vans Trophy final defeat to Wrexham as they sunk to a 1-0 reverse against Leyton Orient at Roots Hall.

The game saw Blues surrender their 2005 unbeaten home record as the O's bagged the only goal of the game after 22 minutes when a Matt Lockwood corner was headed home at the far post by John Mackie for his fourth goal of the season.

Southend pressed for an equaliser but were unable to find a way through as the visitors put men behind the ball and were happy to go only go forward on the break.

Adam Barrett had a good chance to put the Blues in front early on when he raced onto a Kevin Maher free kick but could not get his shot on target. Orient keeper Lee Harrison also made two vital interceptions to deny Wayne Gray and Mark Bentley in the second half.

And there was fury from Blues fans when Mackie ended a fine run from Gray with a foul that went unpunished by referee Phil Dowd.

However, Southend were able to secure a vital victory in their next outing, winning 2-1 at Macclesfield Town. On loan midfielder Alan McCormack bagged both of Blues' goals with the first strikes of his career. And he was delighted to have helped Steve Tilson's side pick up all three points against the Silkmen.

"They are the first goals I've got in the senior game so I'm obviously really pleased, especially as they came in such a massive match for us," said the Irishman,

"Both times I went through I just got my head down and concentrated

on hitting the target, so it was great to see them go in because I've been working hard on my shooting in training."

Former Blues defender David Morley put the hosts in front after 28 minutes, but McCormack got the Shrimpers back on terms three minutes later.

And he struck again in the 90th minute as a draw looked on the cards to send the 599 travelling fans into wild celebrations.

But Southend were unable to build on the victory as they sunk to second in the table with a 2-1 defeat at Oxford United. Yeovil's 1-1 draw at home to Wycombe saw them return to the top on goal difference after Blues failed to impress at the Kassam Stadium. Craig Davies put Oxford in front in the 20th minute when he hit home Chris Hackett's cross from close range.


The U's doubled their advantage five minutes before half-time when former Southend striker Tommy Mooney found the back of the net from the right hand side of the six-yard box.

Southend's top scorer Freddy
Eastwood gave Blues some hope on
the hour when he pulled a goal back
but Steve Tilson's men were unable
to level. Things then go even worse
for Southend as they slipped to a 1-0
defeat at home to promotion rivals
Yeovil Town as Phil Jevons bagged a
late goal for the Glovers.

The striker scored his 28th goal of the season on 83 minutes when Aaron Davies' deflected shot fell to him and he stroked the ball into the empty net.

A cagey opening half had earlier seen neither side able to make the breakthrough. Yeovil keeper Steve Collis was generally the busier of the two custodians, but Southend failed to convert their chances.

They were eventually made to pay as Jevons' goal put the Glovers three points clear of the Blues, who are now only ahead of Swansea in the automatic promotion berths on goal difference. That left victory away to Grimsby Town on the final day of the season imperative if Steve Tilson's men were to be assured of avoiding the play-off lottery.













The Lowdown...




The Manager...

He gareed a new two-year deal with the Shrimps in 2013 to remain as manager.

Key Man... JACK REDSHAW

A diminutive striker with pace, Jack Redshaw is a former Manchester City youth team player after joining the club in 1999 as a nine-year-old. He turned professional with the club in 2008 but failed to make an appearance during his two years as a pro. He spent the 2010-11 season at Rochdale but only played three times for Dale. He then joined hometown club Salford City before moving on to Altrincham, scoring eight times in 15 games, alerting the attentions



of Morecambe. He joined the Shrimps in 2012 and has scored almost 50 goals in just over 115 games.


