JOHN STILL

Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for what may well be the final time this season.

I'd like to welcome everybody associated with Stevenage to Bedfordshire today. This afternoon's match has a little added spice with it being a local derby of sorts and our last game of the season.

Well, what a year it has been. Where has the time gone? It doesn't seem that long ago that we were embarking on our first season back in the Football League at Carlisle. It barely seems two minutes ago but here we are facing our last game of the campaign.

Since my last set of notes I have been pleased with the level of performance in the two matches, the 3-0 win over Hartlepool here and the defeat at Southend last weekend. Against Hartlepool we were good value for the win but we could have scored more goals and that result meant we went to Southend in good spirits with our Play-Off bid very much alive. Last Saturday's game showed what a cruel game football is, but we have to take it on the chin.

Surprises

We entertain Stevenage today knowing we have to win and win well given the fact our fate could be decided by goal difference. All we can do this afternoon is try and score as many goals as we can and keep our fingers crossed elsewhere. I've been in the game long enough to realise that we face a tall order but by the same token I know that football can throw up surprises so you have to believe that anything is possible. At my former club we once won the first leg of a Play-Off tie 6-0 and everybody on the playing and coaching side is geared to giving it the best shot that we can.

I think it's fair to now reflect on the season. Has there been disappointments? Having been so close for so long there's no doubt there is disappointment but I can honestly say every single member of the team has given Luton Town everything. There's no doubt that we haven't scored as many as we would have liked – but

looking at the league table not many other teams have scored too many either. The one thing I am disappointed in is the amount of goals we've conceded because the amount we have let in is very unlike us. Overall, however, I have been absolutely delighted with the attitude, desire and commitment of my team and to still have an outside chance of promotion going into the final day of the season is brilliant. Obviously it is tinged with disappointment but today we will be approaching this game with our usual heart and spirit.

Every step of the way this season we have been lucky to receive the tremendous support from the terraces. Your backing of the team has been nothing short of remarkable and every staff and player says thanks for your unwavering and passionate support over the course of this season.

Progress

Regardless of today we will look forward to next season whatever league we are in. The building progress remains, as does our aim to improve year on year. This is not restricted to progress on the pitch, either, and I think it is fair to say this club has made massive strides over the past two years.

I'd like to finish by saying thank you to my fantastic staff. Every single one of them has contributed massively in the rebuilding of this football club and it's important I make that clear. I'd also like to thank our magnificent youth structure, led by Wayne Turner and Paul Driver. We are delighted to welcome aboard three new professionals for next season in Luke Trotman, Craig King and Isaac Galliford and it will be exciting to see these young lads pushing on in their careers.

BOARDROOM

WITH CHAIRMAN NICK OWEN



Good afternoon and a warm welcome to Kenilworth Road for our final league match of the season.

Before I go any further, I must say congratulations to our visitors and near neighbours Stevenage for securing a Play-

Off place after a terrific late run which has seen them lose only once in their last 16 matches.

We, of course, are very much outsiders for a Play-Off place after such a wretched run which started, I suppose, back in February and led to nine defeats in 10, culminating in the unfortunate turn of events at Southend on Saturday. It's all bitterly disappointing after we had looked so good earlier in the season when we led the table for a while and seemed likely to finish in the Play-Offs places at worst.

I know the reasons for our poor form have exercised us all, but I really can't see past our extraordinary bad luck with injuries. I know all teams inevitably lose players to injury during the season, but the number of key players we've had to manage without for week after week has been frankly diabolical

The men we've missed for a good chunk of the season include Mark Tyler, Nathan Doyle, Jonathan Smith, Alex Lawless, Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu and Paul Benson, plus the loss through suspension for a number of games of our charismatic leader and stopper Stephen McNulty. These guys are absolutely pivotal members of our squad and there comes a time when so many are missing that it is really difficult to get a settled line-up. On top of all that, Elliott Lee was looking so dangerous up front and then he was crocked against Wycombe. We lost him for three games and, although he is playing, he is still battling to get back to full fitness.

So much for the reasons, or excuses, if you like, I think we have also been extremely unfortunate with a number of decisions made against us or not made for us, but the table says we have simply not been good enough for long enough in recent months, despite the fact that we have played some excellent football at times. I firmly believe we deserved to beat Shrewsbury at home and I also think we could well have won home and away against Burton, but somehow managed to lose.

So we go again – both this afternoon and in the months ahead into next season. You'll be pleased to know that the players remain extremely positive and, until it is mathematically impossible to qualify for the Play-Offs, they will keep going in the hope that something remarkable might just happen today.

And let's just remember that we are in our first season. back in the Football League after five in the Conference and to be this close to the top end of the table is a significant achievement. We have high expectations at Kenilworth Road and rightly so, but let's just reflect on those dreadfully tough seasons we spent trying to scramble out of non-league football and up to where we are today.

Wherever we finish this time, there have been some outstanding performers this season. Congratulations first of all to our captain for being named in the League 2 side of the year by the PFA. A considerable achievement and well deserved. Also, I am delighted for Nathan Dovle and Jonathan Smith for dominating the awards at the Luton Town Supporters' Club and Trust in Luton dinner on Sunday. They have been such an important part of the team this season and we really missed them when they were both out injured.

A special mention too for striker Lee Angol, who's scored 25 goals on loan at Boreham Wood, won three awards as players' player of the year, supporters' player of the year and young player of the year. His goals have helped fire Boreham Wood into the Conference South Play-Offs. How soon before he is banging them in for the Luton first team?

As ever, our crowds have been spectacular home and away, with our travelling support the best in the division. We have already sold approaching 4,400 season tickets for next time which is remarkable. On behalf of all of us behind the scenes at Kenilworth Road, thank you very much.

And while we're talking about matters off the field, a warm welcome to Ray Williams who is becoming our new finance director. Ray is a life-long Luton fan and a man with considerable experience in the property world – a quality that will be invaluable as we move closer to relocation. As you know from Gary Sweet's previous notes, that exciting prospect is edging ever nearer. Ray takes over from Roger Bannister who is retiring. We wish Roger all the best and, of course, our thanks go with him for all he's done here. Keep in touch, Roger, and don't just follow our results from a distance!

Meanwhile, there is a vacancy for club secretary and we are currently recruiting for that important role. Why? Because Kevan Platt has been promoted. Kevan becomes senior operations manager which will enable him to take on some of Gary's duties in the daily running of the football club, while Gary will have more time to concentrate on relocation.

So back to the game today. Are we good enough to be in the Play-Offs? Of course we are, but we've been nowhere near consistent enough. Could we make it this afternoon? Well, miracles can happen and Luton Town have experienced a few in our long and colourful history.

I know it is unlikely, but let's all give it our best shot, roar the team on as we always do for better or for worse and keep the faith. After all we've been through in recent years. that is still what we do: we believe and turn out in huge numbers, with support that other clubs envy.

Whatever happens today, I am so proud to be associated with this football club, approaching 57 years now of highs and lows, always with unwavering passion. John Still will work hard during the summer to improve the squad, helped in no small measure by his experiences this season. We have so much to look forward to. We only look up.

Let's be honest about today. We're going to need a small miracle to make the Play-Offs.

Football's a funny old game, though, and we will be giving everything we possibly can to sneak ourselves into the top seven. It is going to have to take something particular special but it's not entirely out of the question. However, even if we do win today our destiny is not in our hands and we will be relying on another team to do us a favour.

The one thing we've got going for us this afternoon is that there is no pressure on us. I think there are very few people who will be expecting us to win by five or six goals today, but don't worry - we are going to give it a good go. We can, however, enjoy the game, relax and we'll see where it

takes us over the course of these 90 minutes.

It won't be easy because Stevenage, already in the Play-Offs themselves, aren't going to roll over and let us tickle them. If anything they are going to revel in making life difficult for us this afternoon. They are not going to want the game to turn into a basketball match. We need to attack - and we will - so you can't say that today's game isn't going to be interesting.

Heart

In our guest for goals we can take heart from our last performance here at Kenilworth Road where we eased past Hartlepool. We could have been four or five goals up inside the first half, so if we can create anywhere near the same amount of chances this afternoon we must, must take them. And if we do, who knows what can happen?

When a season ends in this fashion it is always easy to look back on where we've gone wrong over the past 10 months, pin-pointing moments in games and thinking what might have been had we taken a point here or there. There's nothing we can do about that now but there's no doubt that our abysmal run of form in March was a major reason why we have fallen short this season.

Last weekend's defeat at Southend was one of the most bitterly disappointing and deflating moments of the campaign. The circumstances that led to the defeat obviously made it particularly hard to take but that's football for you. Having got the result against Hartlepool to draw level with the final Play-Off place it looked as though we had done enough to get at least a point. But it wasn't to be. It's the lowest we've felt all season but we need to pick ourselves up today and end the season on a high.

I think the campaign as a whole has been successful. Of course it's disappointing to have just missed out but I think there needs to be some

perspective. Let's not forget that this club spent the five previous seasons playing in non-league. Imagine being back there? This season, while it's frustrating to think what might have been, will make us stronger. It will make us better players and professionals and I know that it will stand us in good stead for another crack at promotion

Finally, on behalf of the dressing room, I'd like to thank each and every one of you for your support this season. I've said before in these notes that words don't give your backing justice, but it fills us all with great pride when we walk out at a packed Kenilworth Road and when we see thousands of you in the away end on our travels.

Stay behind us, stay positive, have a good summer and we'll see you next season.







REST IN PEACE CHRIS TURNER

Everyone at Kenilworth Road was saddened to learn of the death of Chris Turner at the age of 64 after a long illness.

St Neots-born Chris signed for Peterborough United as a youngster and after making his League debut in 1969 went on to make over 300 appearances for Posh as a tough and dominant centre-half.

When David Pleat, in his first close season as Luton manager, looked to revamp his side he turned to the big defender and used some of the money brought in from the sale of Paul and Ron Futcher to entice Peterborough to let him go. Chris became the lynchpin in the Luton defence but was always hankering after a return to the USA and the burgeoning NSAL where he had enjoyed two good summers with firstly Connecticut Bicentennials and then New England Tea Men.

After 34 first team appearances and five goals, Chris was reluctantly allowed to return to the USA, returning in the English football season to play for Cambridge United. Swindon and lastly Southend. Taking over as manager of Cambridge United in 1985, Chris steadied the ship before handing over the reins to John Beck before managing and then owning his first love Peterborough.

Our condolences go out to his family and friends.

TODAY'S SCENARIO

The Town's chance of making the Play-Offs took a knock last week but the Hatters still have a chance of finishing in the top seven should results go in our favour.

For the record the Hatters will firstly need to win today against Stevenage and then hope Shrewsbury beat Plymouth. That will mean the Town will sit level on points with Argyle in the table.

The only way the Hatters can qualify for the Play-Offs will be by making up an eight-goal swing in goal difference. It means, for example, that a 4-0 win for the Town and a 4-0 win for Shrewsbury would be enough. Obviously other score combinations that equal the same eight-goal swing apply, i.e we win 3-0 and Shrewsbury win 5-0 and vice-verse.

In the event that we do make the Play-Offs, the first leg will take place on Saturday 9th May (kick-off 7.45pm) with the second leg kicking-off at the same time on Thursday 14th.

IT LOOKS AS THOUGH THE TOWN WILL BE IN LEAGUE 2 NEXT SEASON – BAR SOME SIGNIFICANTLY POSITIVE RESULTS – SO HERE'S A LOOK AT WHO THE HATTERS WILL (AND COULD) BE PLAYING NEXT SEASON.

COMING DOWN

Four teams will come down from League 1 into League 2 this season yet, with only one game to play only one side, Yeovil, have definitely been relegated. The Glovers' fate was sealed a fortnight ago. Six teams are battling to avoid the remaining three demotion spots, with Coventry in 18th place just two points clear of the dropzone. Crewe, Notts County, Crawley, Leyton Orient (who lost in the League 1 Play-Off final last year) and Colchester are all fighting to stay up.

In tomorrow's final day fixtures, Crawley host Coventry in a potentially do-or-die clash, while Colchester host Preston with the visitors aiming for three points which would seal promotion to the Championship. Crewe take on Bradford at Gresty Road, Notts County travel to Gillingham while Orient go to Swindon.

Of those clubs in the mix to come down, the Town last met Coventry in January 2007 in the Championship. The last time we met Colchester was in the third round of the JPT in 2008, before we went on to win it. Crawley were promotion rivals of ours in the Conference season of 2010/11, while Crewe and Orient were last at Kenilworth Road in League 1 in 2008. Notts County were opponents of the Town's in our previous season at this level, the -30 campaign, in 2008/09, with the Hatters winning 2-0 at Meadow Lane in March 2009 thanks to goals from Tom Craddock and Chris Martin.

STAYING DOWN

Burton and Shrewsbury are two sides the Town are unlikely to face next season with both sides promoted in the last fortnight. It will be the Brewers' first season in the third tier. Shrewsbury need to better Burton's result if they are to win the title – and the Hatters will be hoping the Shrews can put a few past Plymouth today to keep our own very slim hopes of reaching the Play-Offs alive.

The race to join Burton and Shrewsbury will go down to the wire this afternoon with Southend, Bury and Wycombe challenging for the final automatic promotion spot. Southend will be promoted if they win at Morecambe, but if the Shrimpers slip-up then that could open the door for the other two should they win.

Two of those three will contest the Play-Offs together with our visitors this afternoon Stevenage. Plymouth look set to finish seventh unless they lose heavily at Shrewsbury and the Town can win comfortably today.

With Tranmere and Cheltenham suffering relegation from League 2 last weekend the make-up of the division is already taking shape with 15 sides, including ourselves, set for next season.

COMING UP

Barnet were crowned Conference champions last weekend following their 2-0 win over Gateshead at the Hive. The Town last met the Bees in the infamous New Year's Day win in the rain at Kenilworth Road last season. Bristol Rovers missed out on top spot by a single point and have to settle for a place in the Play-Offs. They take on Forest Green, while Grimsby meet Eastleigh – Conference South winners last year – for a place in the final. Should Bristol Rovers win promotion the Town will meet the Pirates for the first time since Boxing Day 2007 – a 1-1 draw in a game that saw the Hatters finish the game with eight men.

AND MAYBE...

Well we can dream of turning the tables on Plymouth, reaching the Play-Offs and winning promotion – and that opens up a new can of worms. Maybe we'll include that information in the Play-Off programme, eh?!



It gives us great pleasure to welcome everybody associated with Stevenage to Kenilworth Road for our final game of the 2014/15 campaign.

Our visitors have enjoyed an excellent season having been relegated from League 1 last term and now face the possibility of an immediate return to the third tier having successfully confirmed their place in the League 2 Play-Offs.

Boro's 1-0 win over Carlisle meant Graham Westley's side guaranteed their place in the end-of-season lottery and extended their unbeaten run to seven matches. It was their fourth win in their last five games, so of all the sides currently in the Play-offs, no team is in better form than Westley's.

Their success this season has been down to their solid home form. Only Burton and Shrewsbury have won more points at home than Stevenage, with Boro winning 15 of their 21 home matches, losing five times – including once to the Town back in early October. Only Shrewsbury have scored more goals on home turf that Stevenage, so no team will relish making the trip to Broadhall Way in the Play-Offs.

Boro's form on the road hasn't been as good, with Westley's side winning just five times away from Broadhall Way. However, Stevenage haven't lost in their last seven matches on their travels, winning twice (at Cheltenham and Hartlepool) and drawing five. Their last defeat on the road came at Mansfield in early February.

The Stevenage support in the Oak Road end will have fond memories of their previous visit to Kenilworth Road when Boro ran out 1-0 winners back in September 2009 when a Scott Laird goal gave Westley's side all three points. That season Boro walked away with the Conference title with the Town finishing runners-up before losing in the Play-Offs.

Their success that season was the springboard for back-to-back promotions as Stevenage finished in the League 2 Play-Offs in the following campaign. And Westley masterminded a victory in the final at Old Trafford against a Torquay side managed by former Town boss Paul Buckle.

Westley left for Preston the following season but Boro's success continued with the side finishing in sixth place in League 1 before going out in the Play-Offs to Sheffield United. Last season saw Boro relegated despite Westley's return but this campaign has seen the Hertfordshire side steadily improve as the season has progressed. After a 2-0 defeat Newport in December, Boro were down in 15th place and nine points shy of the Play-Off places.

Westley almost started from scratch in the summer and his recruitment policy has paid off with a number of young players coming to the fore. Young midfielder Tom Pett, signed from Wealdstone, and centre-half Dean Wells, plucked from Braintree, have been mainstays in the Boro side and been a major force behind their success – as has former Town skipper Ronnie Henry who will be eager to get one over his old club this afternoon on his first return to Kenilworth Road since lifting the Conference title a year ago.

GRAHAM WESTLEY. 47-year-old boss in his second spell in charge. Guided Boro to the Football League in 2010 and then League 1 a year later. Left for Preston in in 2012 but has since returned to Broadhall Way.

▶ GOALKEEPERS

CHRIS DAY. Hugely experienced keeper who has made over 300 appearances for Boro since signing in August 2008. Been on the books at Tottenham, Crystal Palace, Watford and Millwall. Also an England Under-21 international.

SAM BEASANT. Commanding 6ft 6in stopper signed in the summer from Woking. Began his career as a youngster at Chelsea and has also played for Wycombe. Is the son of Wimbledon cup winner Dave.

JEROME OKIMO. Defender who penned a deal at Broadhall Way in the summer after a successful trial period. Joined from Wealdstone who he helped win promotion last season.

RONNIE HENRY. Club captain and former Town skipper in his second spell with Boro. Made 329 appearances in his first spell before joining the Hatters, helping us to the Conference title, before rejoining this summer.

▶ MIDFIELDERS

CHRIS WHELPDALE. Summer arrival from Gillingham, where the winger made over 100 appearances in three years. Helped Peterborough to promotions having joined Posh from Billericay.

SIMON WALTON. Former England youth international who joined Boro this summer after two years at Hartlepool. Began at home-town club Leeds before spells at Charlton, QPR and Plymouth.

TOM PETT. Exciting winger who arrived at the start of the season from Wealdstone. Scored 13 times for the Stones last term as they won the Ryman Premier and has previously starred for Potters Bar.

DAVID McALLISTER. Midfielder who penned a permanent deal with Boro in January having left Shrewsbury. Started his senior career in Ireland before moving to Sheffield United.

DEAN PARRETT. Young midfielder who graduated from the Tottenham academy and made his senior Spurs debut in the Europa League away to Shaktar Donetsk aged 17. Joined Boro at the start of last season.

CHARLIE LEE. Former Tottenham and Peterborough midfielder who signed for Boro in the summer after three years at Gillingham. A versatile player who has won four promotions during his career.

TOM CONLON. Teenage midfielder who signed on loan from League 1 Peterborough in January. Started his career in the Stoke City academy.

BRUNO ANDRADE. Lightning quick winger on-loan from QPR. Spent time on-loan with Boro last term and has also enjoyed temporary spells at Aldershot and Wycombe.

JACK WEBB. Young creative midfielder signed on loan from Arsenal until the end of the season. An England youth international who was a regular for the Gunners' Under-18s last term.

DARIUS CHARLES. Equally at home anywhere along the defence, the former Ebbsfleet man has made over 130 appearances for Boro since his arrival in 2010 and a real fans' favourite at Broadhall Way.

ADAM MARRIOTT. Summer signing from Cambridge City who hit 45 goals in all competitions last season. A former Norwich trainee he also enjoyed a spell with Cambridge United.

CHRIS BEARDSLEY. Striker in his second spell at the club after rejoining this summer. Previously played for Boro between 2009 and 2012 and returned after spells with Preston and Bristol Rovers.

ROARIE DEACON. Pacey attacker and March 2013 arrival after his contract at Sunderland expired. Has previously been on the books at Arsenal as a youngster.

FROM OAK ROAD

Dreams of a grandstand finish to the season may have all but evaporated for the Town, but for Boro fan **Hilary Skinner** the excitement is only just beginning...

TALK OF THE TOWN: Stevenage have had a solid season following relegation last year – are you satisfied with the way things have turned out? What have been the highlights and low points of your campaign?

HILARY: It's turning out to be a better than solid season considering it is virtually a new team. I think the highlight was the 4-2 win against Southend United in February, when we couldn't even be stopped by hail. It was good to beat a promotion challenging team and it has been great to watch the emergence of our academy players like Ben Kennedy. The low points were conceding injury-time equalisers at Tranmere and Cambridge.

TOTT: Graham Westley has taken Stevenage to the highest place in their history – but continues to divide opinion. How would you sum up his various spells in charge? Are you happy with the team's style of play and tactics? Do you think he is the man to take Boro forward?

HILARY: Yes, I don't think Westley divides opinion amongst the Stevenage fans. He's pulled the club around and is well liked but suffers from a bad reputation in the media. Even during the recent game against Burton, the Sky Sports commentators said we were a big strong team, but we're not. The centrehalves Bira Dembélé and Dean Wells may be tall but the rest of the team are quite small and they are all skillful.

Westley does not deserve his negative reputation. There have been some great footballers who have



played under him – George Boyd, Luke Freeman, Steve Morison and currently Charlie Lee, Dean Parrett and many others. I'm glad he came back to manage Stevenage for a third time.

TOTT: How has Ronnie Henry settled back in to life at the Lamex Stadium?

HILARY: Ronnie Henry has been brilliant this season. I was sad when he left for Luton and surprised by his move to be honest. He's strong and reliable and I think he works well under Westley to help keep the defence tight and the entire team together.

TOTT: There have been some dramatic games between the clubs in in recent years – which ones stick in your memory and why? Tell us about the experience.

HILARY: My favourite was the first time we met in the Conference at Kenilworth Road and Scott Laird scored the winner with five minutes to go. I think you sacked your manager the next day because you had Stevenage celebrate their League 2 Play-Off triumph in 2011

lost to 'little Stevenage'? It felt strange going through someone's house to get into the away end too.

TOTT: If you could select your favourite moment from your time supporting Stevenage, what would it be? Why is the club special to you and what do you most enjoy about going along on matchdays?

HILARY: There's been so many great moments –
John Mousinho's League
2 Play-Off winner at Old
Trafford, Mark Roberts lifting the Conference trophy, Scott
Laird's winner against Luton - but the best was probably our FA Trophy win at the new Wembley. We were the first team to lift a trophy at the new stadium and came back from 2-0 down to win 3-2 against Kidderminster.

We've had some good trips around the UK supporting Stevenage, but the home games are good too. Stevenage has always been a family friendly club and I enjoy watching the matches with my family and seeing familiar faces both on and off the pitch. Brenda and Roy who sit near us have been supporting Stevenage since 1976!

TOTT: Does a Stevenage versus Luton 'rivalry' exist? How do 'Boro supporters see games between the two sides?

HILARY: In fairness the rivalry probably means more to Stevenage fans. There's always a cheer when the scores are read out at

half-time if you are losing, but I guess for you your biggest rivals will always be Watford. However, given their current form you won't need to worry about them for a few years.

TOTT: Who do think will win promotion via the Play-Offs? What's your prediction for today's game?

HILARY: I really don't know. I think Stevenage will have a good go at the Play-Offs. I'm generally optimistic but don't think it

would be a disaster if we didn't go up. I'm quite surprised we're in the Play-Offs considering we were in the lower half of the table only a few months ago, but our recent form has been tremendous. It's not mathematically over for Luton yet though is it? I think it's going to be a tough game today and am relieved it's not going to be a Play-Off decider for us.


This last encounter of the season was always going to be a tough one. I expect fur to fly.


THE HATTERS...

over 300 appearances in his first spell at Broadhall Way. In that time he also became the first winning captain at the new Wembley Stadium in Boro's 3-2 FA Trophy final win over Kidderminster.

Drury, also 31, rejoined the Town this summer four-and-a-half years since leaving for Championship club Ipswich.

The midfielder began his career with home-town club Sittingbourne before moving to Gravesend and Lewes. Drury signed for Stevenage in 2008, helping the club to the Football League in 2010 but signed for the Hatters that summer.

He netted six times in 23 Conference matches before Ipswich came calling and Drury went onto enjoy two seasons with the Portman Road outfit. A loan move to Crawley turned into a permanent before he signed for the Hatters for the second time in June. Boro also have former Town winger Dave Martin in their ranks, while Stevenage also had former Hatters midfielder Keith Keane on loan earlier this season.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

Today will be the sixth meeting between the two sides – not including pre-season friendlies – and only the second to take place at Kenilworth Road.

The Hatters have won four of the five previous meetings, including October's victory at Broadhall Way—a 2-1 win achieved thanks to goals from Luke Wilkinson and substitute Alex Wall.

A five-minute hat-trick from Ahmet Brkovic, reputedly the quickest in our history, gave the Town a 4-3 win in the first meeting between the two clubs — at Broadhall Way in November 2002 in the LDV Vans Trophy. Tony Thorpe scored the Hatters' other goal.

A year later but a round earlier the two clubs met again on Hertfordshire soil in the same competition.

That night a solitary strike from youth team forward Matthew Judge proved to be the difference.

The two sides met for the first time in a League fixture in the Conference in 2009/10. Boro walked away with all three points from their first – and currently only until today – previous visit to Kenilworth Road with Scott Laird's late winner giving Graham Westley's side victory. The Hatters parted company with manager Mick Harford the following day.

Later that season the Town won 1-0 at Broadhall Way thanks to a goal from substitute Matthew Barnes-Homer as both sides challenged for the Conference title. Despite that set-back, however, Boro went on to win their remaining games to take the title and seal promotion to the Football League.

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS TRACES WHAT HAPPENED TO TWO OF STEVENAGE'S GREATEST POST-WAR TEAMS

▶ 1995/96 CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS

DES GALLAGHER: Goalkeeper who was a key figure in Stevenage's rise, playing 124 Conference games before briefly joining Aylesbury United in July 1999, then had a spell with Leighton Town.

KENNY WEBSTER: Tough-tackling right-back who netted six goals in 69 Conference games prior to joining Harrow Borough in January 1997, then appeared for Aylesbury United and Harrow again.

ROB MUTCHELL: Reliable left-back who appeared for Barnet in the Football League. He scored once in 71 Conference games before joining Kettering Town in June 1997, then played for Tamworth.

EFE SODJE: Central defender who moved to Macclesfield Town in July 1997, then Luton, Colchester, Crewe, Huddersfield, Yeovil, Southend, Gillingham and Bury. Now Macclesfield's player-coach.

MARK SMITH: England Semi-Pro international central defender who joined Dagenham & Redbridge in July 2001. He rejoined Stevenage in November 2003, scoring 12 times in 281 Conference games.

PAUL BARROWCLIFFE: Midfielder who netted 11 goals in 82 Conference games before joining Brentford in August 1997. He later played under Graham Roberts at Chesham United and Slough Town.

STEVE BERRY: Experienced midfielder who joined
Kettering in July 1996, then played for Stevenage again,
netting three goals in 64 Conference games overall,
before spells with Bedford and Cogenhoe.

COREY BROWNE: England Semi-Pro international who joined Slough Town in March 1997, then played for Aylesbury United, St Albans City, Harrow Borough, Chesham, Harlow and Boreham Wood.

DAVE VENABLES: England Semi-Pro international striker who scored 19 times in 83 Conference games prior to joining Kettering in December 1996, then Enfield, Cambridge City, Boston and Stamford.

TONY LYNCH: Experienced winger who had played in the Football League with Brentford and Barnet. He netted 17 goals in 61 Conference games while at Broadhall Way before hanging up his boots.

BARRY HAYLES: Leading scorer who moved to Bristol Rovers in June 1997, then Fulham, Sheffield United, Millwall, Plymouth Argyle, Leicester City, Cheltenham and Truro, gaining ten Jamaica caps.

▶ 2009/10 CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS

CHRIS DAY: Former England Under-21 goalkeeper who starred as Stevenage reached the FA Cup fourth round and won promotion in 2010-11, then League One play-offs and FA Cup fifth round in 2011/12.

RONNIE HENRY: Favourite who featured prominently as Boro won promotion in 2010-11, then reached the League 1 Play-Offs and FA Cup fifth round in 2011/12. He joined the Hatters in June 2012 before returning to Boro in 2014.

SCOTT LAIRD: Attacking left-back who was ever-present as Stevenage reached the League 1 Play-Offs and FA Cup fifth round in 2011/12. He reunited with Graham Westley at Preston in May 2012.

MARK ROBERTS: Central defender who starred as Boro reached the League 1 Play-Offs and FA Cup fifth round in 2011/12. Scoring 14 goals in 132 League games, he joined Fleetwood in July 2013.

JON ASHTON: Central defender who was an influential figure as Stevenage won promotion in 2010/11, then reached the League One Play-Offs and FA Cup fifth round in 2011/12. He is still at the club.

MICHAEL BOSTWICK: Central defender who scored as Stevenage beat Newcastle United in the 2010/11 FA Cup third round, also helping win promotion. He joined Peterborough United in July 2012.

ANDY DRURY: Midfielder who moved to Luton in July 2010, then appeared for Ipswich Town and had a loan spell at Crawley Town. He returned to Crawley on a permanent basis in June 2013 and now here at Kenilworth Road.

DAVID BRIDGES: Former Cambridge United midfielder who helped Stevenage to win promotion in 2010/11 and joined Kettering Town in August 2011, then Chelmsford City and now Bury Town.

CHRIS BEARDSLEY: Striker who helped Boro to win promotion in 2010/11, then reach the League 1 Play-Offs. Following Graham Westley to Preston in August 2012, he was loaned to Bristol Rovers.

YEMI ODUBADE: Nigerian striker who was leading marksman in 2009/10 and helped win promotion again in 2010-11. He has since played for Newport County on loan, Gateshead and now Eastleigh.

JOEL BYROM: Midfielder who featured in Stevenage's 2010/11 promotion campaign, then helped them reach the League 1 Play-Offs in 2011/12. He followed Graham Westley to Preston in July 2012.



WHAT'S THE STORY?

The Hatters ended a run of four successive home defeats by easing past struggling Hartlepool to breathe new life in to their Play-Off hopes.

Cameron McGeehan's header and Jake Howells' penalty had the Town two goals up inside 15 minutes and, although the visitors rallied in the second half, the Hatters secured three important points when Scott Griffiths poked home with 20 minutes to go.


The Hatters started well and led inside five minutes when Howells' right-wing corner was swung high to McGeehan and his header eluded a crowd of players in the box to cross the line in slow-motion.

With the Town boosted by an early goal, 10 minutes later the lead was doubled. Shaun Whalley ran directly at the visitors defence and as he broke into the box to weave between two defenders, he went down and referee Sutton pointed to the spot. Howells, on his 24th birthday, stepped up to roll home the Town's first successful penalty of the season in League 2.

The chances kept on coming for the Town; Whalley had a shot cleared off the line and Mark Cullen and Elliot Lee were both denied by the Pools goalkeeper.

Hartlepool, in desperate need of the points at the other end to stave off the threat of relegation, never seriously tested Justham with their few half-chances, with the Hatters keeper alert in the first half to prevent Michael Harriman's deflection of Marlon Harewood's free-kick from finding the target.

After the break, Hartlepool were enjoying more of the ball but their inability to make their dominance count was punished by the Hatters with 19 minutes left on the clock. The visitors failed to clear Howells' right-wing corner and Griffiths pounced on the loose ball by nipping in to slide home his second goal of the season – and that completed the scoring as the Town ran out comfortable winners.



GRIFFITHS BATTLING ON



Scott Griffiths is still determined to defy the odds and help the Town into the Play-Offs as he battles through the pain barrier.

The 29-year-old helped the Hatters record a comfortable win over Hartlepool last time out here at Kenilworth Road with the defender netting his second goal of the campaign to make it 3-0.

At the time the result lifted the Town level on points with the final Play-Off place with Plymouth, until last weekend's defeat at Southend meant the Hatters now face a difficult task this afternoon to overhaul the Pilgrims. But after revealing last month that he would delay an operation on a hernia. Griffiths is hoping that the Hatters can end the season by sneaking into the top seven.

"The manager said he wanted warriors and I hope that's what I'm providing," said the left-back.

"I don't want to let the team down but if this is the best way, by putting in performances and not feeling any discomfort, then the sacrifice will be worth it if we get to where we want to be.

"We're knocking on the team above us and it's down to us now, isn't it? If we can win it can certainly give us a chance but you don't get given anything in this life so we will have to work hard to get it.

"You get your rewards if you work hard enough." His goal against Hartlepool, which wrapped up the Town's win over Pools a fortnight ago, was his third in Town colours since arriving at Kenilworth Road two years

And the former Dagenham man was happy that his performance helped the Hatters to an important three points.

"I said recently that I'd score before the end of the season and I was close against Burton," joked Griffiths, who came close to putting the Town ahead against the Brewers on 11th April. "This week's effort was a fantastic strike - the keeper never stood a chance!

"In all seriousness, it was good to score and we knew that a third goal would finish the game off. I'm happy that my goal helped but overall I thought it was a fantastic team performance. We showed great work rate and I was really pleased for the rest of the team.

"Another clean sheet is a bonus, if we're doing our jobs at the back that takes the pressure of the forwards."

Scott was an ever-present for the Town last season – playing every single minute in the Conference. He scored during that campaign, against Kidderminster – but has doubled his tally this term with goals against Exeter and Hartlepool. His header against Kiddy last season was his first goal since August 2009.





LENGTH AND BREATH OF THE COUNTRY WATCHING THE TOWN THIS SEASON, DOCUMENTING HIS EXPERIENCES ON THE ROAD IN TALK OF THE TOWN. IN HIS FINAL FEATURE OF THE SEASON HE DESCRIBES LAST WEEKEND'S TRIP TO SOUTHEND

THE IOURNEY

Our last away game of the season was the sort of game that being a football fan is all about. After a great win over Hartlepool the Town went to promotion chasing Southend backed by an army of well over 2,200 fans knowing we had to match or better Plymouth's result to keep our Play-Off dream alive.

Two Bobbers coaches left Luton station just after 11.30am on what was a sunny day full of anticipation and excitement for the day ahead. On the way down to Southend it was announced that my loyalty this season had earned me £15 off another journey which left me hoping the Town would get a result even more so that I could cash that in during the Play-Off semi-final!



After a pretty smooth journey we made it to Roots Hall just after 1.20pm which left plenty of time to find the away fans pub for a drink or two before the big game.

THE GROUND

It had been a good while since I had been to Roots Hall and I must admit I couldn't remember much about the place but the away end itself hasn't changed much. Away fans are packed into an old stand behind the goal, not too dissimilar to the Oak Road end at Kenilworth Road where pylons get in the way if you sit in the wrong place but all in all the view wasn't too bad. The atmosphere in the away end was bouncing and with a low roof the Town fans were certainly making sure they were heard all day.

If there is a criticism of the place it would be with the facilities. The toilets were pretty tight and not the cleanest we've been 'treated' to all season and the ground itself is a little run down in all honesty.

THE FOOD

One positive for Roots Hall was the burger bar in the away end. It was so good that the PA chap felt obliged to announce to the world that it was open midway through the first half, even though I dare say most people had already visited it before the game!

Inside the burger bar all sorts of food and drink were on offer. Burgers, pies, hot dogs, pasties as well as the usual array of confectionary, as well as the typical hot drinks and soft drinks. It all looked fairly well-priced and went down well after a pint in the pub on our way to the ground earlier.

The programme for this match was a 68-page offering which had five pages dedicated to the Town's history and current squad where Michael Harriman, Mark Cullen and Andy Drury were portrayed as the three to watch. There was also a Q&A with the Luton News reporter who declared his prediction to be a 2-1 Southend win! Whether said reporter can show his face in KR again remains to be seen!!



THE MATCH

With Southend having not conceded in seven matches and the Town finding their best defensive form again this was always going to be a tight game and the first goal was likely to be crucial. The Town nearly grabbed it inside five minutes when Elliot Lee was played through but he could only curl into the stanchion behind the goal.

That gave us all belief that this was an assignment that we could complete successfully although our plans had to change when Cameron McGeehan picked up an arm injury midway through the first half and to be fair to Southend they controlled the rest of the half although Elliot Justham was only called into one decent save.

With the game still goalless, but news coming through that Stevenage and Plymouth were both winning, it became more important that we got something from the game. Southend heard that Bury were winning so they needed to match that result which gave the second half a bit of a cup-tie feel. Southend came out hard but other than a couple of crosses which flashed through our box we were comfortable.

A potential turning point came with 25 minutes to go when Shaun Whalley ran at the Southend back line. The backtracking left-back tripped him just as he was about to race towards the box and potentially get a shot away. There was a covering defender but despite that the referee sent the Southend player off. From there on the Town laid siege on Southend's goal with a couple of periods of pinball in their box not resulting in anything.

Then came the horror moment which stopped us in our tracks. Michael Timlin was given too much room to get a shot away 10 minutes from time. It looked innocuous but it managed to squirm through Justham's grasp and agonisingly over the line. It was harsh on Justham who had done so well in the matches he had played but hopefully he'll learn from that. We tried to get an equaliser but it never really looked like coming and bar a final day miracle the Town's season is over.

MAN-OF-THE-MATCH

I thought Luke Wilkinson had a good game here. He dealt with an aerial bombardment in the first half and covered a couple of breaks when we were caught a little exposed down the flanks.

It was a dominant performance that we've come to expect from the central defender. It was just a shame that we weren't able to keep the clean sheet his performance deserved.

SUMMARY

It was a day that promised so much but ultimately delivered so little. It was a horrible way for our season to end but we've taken worse blows and bounced back and I'm sure we will again.

The journey home didn't last long but it wasn't one of the most enjoyable experiences with everyone so down and glum. We were back in Luton before 7.30pm but that was merely a consolation on a disappointing day.

MACCA HAS ONE EYE ON NEXT SEASON



The Town could still mathematically leapfrog into the final Play-Off place should results go their way this afternoon but given the probability of the Hatters overturning an eight-goal swing in goal difference, skipper Stephen McNulty is looking forward to next season.

The Hatters have struggled with injuries and suspensions throughout a campaign that promised so much, but McNulty believes the team spirit in the dressing room can lead to a successful campaign next year.

"As a group, we're mad as Hatters. We've got a bunch of great lads," the captain said after last weekend's oh-so hard to take defeat at Southend.

"When we have to work hard, we work hard, but it's important that we have a good camaraderie and a good team spirit and we've got that. I think that rubs off and I think that's why, if you speak to the loan lads that want to make it permanent, they'll tell you, they do want to.

"It's a massive club, it's a great club to be at and it's run properly. We've got good staff and a good bunch of lads so I don't see a reason why the likes of Cameron [McGeehan] and Michael [Harriman] won't want to stay.

"When you speak to players that come in, every loan signing that comes to Luton Town loves it here, with the crowd and the fans.

"If we don't make the Play-Offs we've got to dust ourselves down, become stronger as a group, better as players and as a club and start preparing for next season and hopefully have another crack at it next season.'

The experienced centre-half, who was named in the League 2 PFA team of the year last Sunday, has been in the game long enough to know that there will be changes at Kenilworth Road in the summer.

And McNulty acknowledges the fact that boss John Still will be bringing in some new faces over the course of the close season.

"It's football. It's the game we're in. The gaffer's always going to look to strengthen the squad," he said. "You'd have to ask him what areas he'd like to strengthen in but he is always going to bring fresh faces in. Clubs and teams always need freshening up and you need fresh faces and fresh characters in to give you another lift. I think they will do that.

"It's disappointing that some lads won't be here next season but that's the industry we're in and the game we're in. It's happened to me and it'll happen to us all, so that's just the game we're in. There will be signings and I think the signings he does bring in will strengthen us."

The Hatters' chances of sneaking into the top seven are slim at best following last weekend's 1-0 defeat at Southend. The Town looked set to collect at least a point after the Shrimpers were reduced to 10 men, but Elliot Justham's mistake handed the home side all three points to all but end the Hatters hopes of reaching the Play-Offs.

And the skipper was quick to defend the young goalkeeper who has impressed in the past two months in the absence of Mark Tyler.

"It's the position he plays in. He makes a rick and it goes in and it's going to be highlighted, but it's not just him," admitted McNulty.

"As a back four we should have been pushed up more and been tighter to the man shooting. Before he'd even had the shot it should have been stopped at source.

"Elliot's made a mistake, he'll hold his hands up, but he's come on leaps and bounds over the last 18 months.

"He's kept us in the game, made a few good saves, and he's kept us in games over the last few weeks, so he won't need much picking up.

"He's a big character and we'll all get around him, put our arms around him and he'll be fine."













YESTERDAY'S PAGES

Club historian **ROGER WASH** looks back to a famous victory over Wolves in 1955 in front of a record League crowd at Kenilworth Road.

Luton Town 5-1 Wolverhampton Wanderers. 5th November 1955.

When he felt that the Town's forward line was not firing on all cylinders during the promotion season to Division One (now the Premier League) in 1954/55, manager Dally Duncan had moved wing-half Bob Morton to centre-forward where he proved a major success.

The trouble was that Morton was also needed in the half-back line and it was a constant source of discussion as to which was his best position.

Although the Town had performed rather better than he had expected on their baptism in the top flight, Duncan was slightly concerned after a couple of limp forward displays in October 1955.

His remedy was to move Morton back to the forward line to shake things up and his re-introduction coincided with the visit of Wolves to Kenilworth Road on Fireworks Dav.

Amongst the record League crowd of 27,911, which has never been beaten since, were England manager Walter Winterbottom and the Moscow Dynamo team who were due to play at Molineux the following week in the latest in a line of famous floodlight friendlies that made Wolves famous the world over in the 1950's.

Wolves thoroughly deserved this worldwide fame as they had finished as League Champions in 1954, were runners-up the following season and were making another bold bid for the title when they came to Kenilworth Road.

On top of this they boasted the England captain in Billy Wright and every other member of their team was a household name, apart from Bobby Mason who was making his Wolves debut.

Morton's move to the forward line was an instant success when he finished off a slick movement involving the whole of the forward line in only the fourth minute to open the scoring.



Wolves equalised in the 18th minute when tiny winger Johnny Hancocks crashed in a tremendous shot which Luton goalkeeper Ron Baynham had no chance of stopping.

Gordon Turner put the Town back into the lead just before half-time when he turned in a George Cummins free-kick, but the real fireworks came in the second period when the Hatters scored three times without reply in 11 minutes!

The first came when Morton anticipated a back pass from Bill Shorthouse and had the ball in the net in an instant, quickly followed by another strike from Turner who ran through to beat England goalkeeper Bert Williams, despite the Wolves' defenders shouts for offside. Right winger Mike Cullen completed the rout with a header, while Jim Adam on the left, who had the beating of Wolves full-back George Showell all afternoon, hit the woodwork.

The players went off to a standing ovation after what had been, given the quality of the opposition, one of the best displays ever seen by a Town team at Kenilworth Road. The newspapers were full of the Town's achievements for weeks afterwards and were especially glowing in praise of Bob Morton who had given Billy Wright the complete runaround.

The Daily Mail's comments were typical: "Black-haired Bob Morton, with the build of a Dreadnought and the speed and manoeuvrability of a Corvette, was on the fringes of the England squad as a wing-half. He should now be a contender to lead the attack!"





In those far off days before t'internet and Sky it was confirmed that Bill Hicks would be broadcasting a report of the game at 5.30pm on the Light Programme.

KEEPER PENS TWO-YEAR CONTRACT

"A bit of a whirlwind" is how Elliot lustham describes the last two years of his life.

From working on the London Underground and playing for East Thurrock to playing in front of 10,000 people at Kenilworth Road, it's fair to say he's experienced plenty already his short professional career with the Hatters.

Last weekend's unfortunate error at Southend aside. Justham has been one of the bright lights during a gloomy spell of form for the Hatters since February. In for the injured Mark Tyler, Justham has performed heroics between the sticks in his short time as the Town number one and manager John Still was quick to recognise his displays with a new two-year contract.

"The gaffer's been really good to me," Justham tells Hatters Player. "For him to come out and praise me even we've lost is good to hear. If I wasn't doing well I'm fair certain we would have told me!"

As was so cruelly highlighted at Roots Hall last weekend, the buck often stops with the goalkeeper but forgiving the mistake, Justham has been thrilled to be given the opportunity having joined the Town as an unknown in the close season of 2013.

"Before I got the call from the gaffer I was trying to sort out a deal playing part-time that season," explains the 24-year-old. "The next thing I knew I was signing a deal here. During my time here I've learned how to become a professional on and off the pitch. Mark Tyler's been brilliant in teaching me how to behave and Kevin Dearden's been excellent.

"Of course you're never too old to get picked up, and yes, perhaps at 23 I maybe thought my time had gone. but people say I'm young for a goalkeeper and luckily the gaffer's taken a chance on me and I'm delighted to be here for another two years. Hopefully I can repay the faith they've shown in me, especially the manager."

His appearance last weekend was just Justham's 22nd appearance for the Hatters. Compare that to the 266 of Mark Tyler and you can imagine how apprehensive Justham was when making his league bow.

But Tyler - and goalkeeper Kevin Dearden, who arrived at Kenilworth Road in December - have made Justham's transition from development squad regular to first team number one look easy.

"Mark's record speaks for itself," says Elliot, "He's played hundreds and hundreds of games in his career



and for Luton Town - but I can't stress how much he has helped me. He's been unbelievable.

"Kevin has a wealth of experience, he's had a great career and I'm taking on board all his advice. But Mark has been brilliant for this club and it was a tough job filling his boots as the fans expect the replacement to be no different. I'd like to think I've been consistent and I hope I've shown that since I've stepped in.

"Now I've been given a chance I can finish playing this season and next season I can challenge Mark for the number one spot."

As already alluded to, Justham's spell in the first team has not been the easiest but the keeper believes he has been mentally strong enough to deal with the recent disappointment.

"It was enjoyable having plenty of shots to save as it shows at least what you can do," he explains. "The defeats were tough, though, and you think to yourself 'is it me?'. I've had so many people saving to me 'since you've gone in, you've been losing, what's going on?'. All I say is that we lose as a team it's not just the keeper! Kevin Dearden's helped me keep my head up, and slowly myself and the back four have built up the relationship which is improving every week. There's a bit more trust there and that's showing with the recent number of clean sheets."

JOHN STILL'S VERDICT:

"Elliot has come in and proven how good he is both on and off the pitch. He's showed us all why we brought him to this football club in the first place.

"Mark Tyler might have been out injured but Elliot has grabbed his opportunity with both hands and hasn't looked back."

WITH HEAD OF COMMUNITY TRUST KEVIN THOBURN

What an incredible season the Trust have experienced since we returned to the Football League last year.

Our membership of the Football League Trust has seen significant growth in the number of individuals we regularly come into contact with and this has, in turn, meant a significant growth in staff numbers.

We now number over 30 fully-qualified male and female coaches, half of them full-time, and we now regularly coach over 3,700 individuals every week. This figure is larger than the average gate attendance for half the clubs in our division and illustrates just what the 'badge' means to our local community.

Not only does membership of the Football League Trust mean we receive central funding via the Professional Footballers Association and Premier League, but it has also meant we are eligible to access many national initiatives and programmes previously denied to us and we have now successfully incorporated some of these into our already comprehensive community offering.

Our core community programme is our Free Schools Coaching and School Sport project which sees the Trust deliver over 70 hours of free PE lessons into local schools each week reaching almost 2,000 pupils. We have received fantastic support from easyJet over the last five years for this project and this year were able to extend the programme with the support of the Premier League Charitable Trust.

We were also successful in joining the FA's national Female Football Development (FFD) Programme and through this funding now run over 12 weekly centres for over 140 school year 9-11 girls. On the back of this we were able to recruit four female coaches for the first time and the girls have now become a vital part of the team and coach on many of the other Trust projects as well.

Both the School Sport and FFD programme meant we were able to enter over 30 teams in the national Kinder +Sport Girls and Kids Cup which offers under-13 girls and under-11 boys the chance to play at Wembley. Both of our local finals took place on the pitch in front of a packed Kenilworth Road end and was an experience the girls and boys will never forget - our boys from Ramsey Manor eventually finished fourth overall in the southern section just one game away from Wembley!

Our integration late night projects have also grown over the season with the Luton KiTS Active Luton project for Marsh Farm, Lewsey Farm and Farley Hill going strong and in a couple of weeks we bring all the boys together for a tournament at the Stadium. We've also teamed up with StreetGames and now have four doorstep clubs in Dunstable and Houghton Regis and we have a further late night session in Bedford with the Borough Councils Just Turn-Up project. Overall over 200 boys play every week to these sessions.

We've also teamed up with both the Prince's Trust and Luton Adult Learning to deliver community coaching programmes and have qualified over 45 adults as Level 1 coaches this season. One of our most satisfying achievement, however, has been the establishment of our Men's Disability Team in conjunction with Luton Borough Council's New Horizons group. The day the guys visited the first team training ground and met John Still, Terry Harris and Hakan Hayrettin and the first team players will live in the memory for a long time, and we continue to enjoy our weekly coaching sessions and matches with all of the boys.

All in all it has been a great season – but if it sounds like we are shutting up shop for the summer then as you can read opposite how the Trust is now entering its busiest period. We will be flat out all through the close season engaging with our local community and putting Luton out there. Here's to an even better season ahead!













TALENT IDENTIFICATION PROGRAMME 2014/15 TERM 4



Last Saturday we held our end of term 3 assessment games for all of the budding young footballers attending our weekly talent identification programme (TIPS) in Luton. Over 120 boys turned up for the games as our academy coaches put the boys through their paces to see who might be ready to begin the journey within our youth

development system. Two separate groups of under-7s and under-8s and under-9s to under-11s played mini games for over an hour in an attempt to catch the coaches' eye as they all look to make the first step from TIPS into our centre of excellence, the level at which they will train with us once a week. Progression from that level leads to our pre-academy squads which train twice a week and directly feeds the Hatters' main youth academy.

Next week we start Term 4 which is our last of this season in our search for young talent through our TIPs coaching centres. We have 14 regional football development centres throughout Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire, with two in Luton. They are open to all youngsters in school year 2 up to year 11. The TIPs coaching centres offer a nine-week programme ending with a trial match for everyone and a technical report. Successful boys can then progress onto our centre of excellence and pre-academy development centres with eventual pathways into our youth academy.

In all that time I've had some unbelievable moments and memories that will keep me warm in my football

At the end of May I will be leaving my role of Academy Manager feeling very proud of what the staff and I have achieved in the last three years.

In that time, one of the biggest accolades that we can bestow on ourselves is that no player walked out of the club on a free! While we weren't a Football League club and without their protection that could have happened. We fought every corner and if a player left he went on our terms and with our blessing - and for the right valuation!

Of course we don't look to sell our best players, we want them to come all the way through to the first team. However, sometimes they outgrow the club, third parties and others get involved and they move on. With the first team now back as an established Football League team and building for next year that gap will close and the manager will still have the best players to choose from.

Having said that, I am very excited with the three lads who have just signed professional, and our under-17s, under-16s and under-15s groups have some real quality and potential. So not long now to see how they do!

Alongside that we have successfully gained our EPPP 3 status within the Premier League youth programme. Other clubs had 18 months to complete the process... we had five! Our license will last for three years and hopefully with the club's ambitions to grow at training ground and stadium status level, we can become a category 2 from 3 in the near future. (We have the players, we have the staff to compete at cat 2!) Those five months were very intense and that made me realise. that I would not be able to commit 24/7 going forward into next season.

The outstanding staff I will leave behind will cope fine. they are bright, well balanced and all have a great work ethic! None more so that than Joe Deeney who is our under-16s and lead phase coach.

Four weeks ago Joe came into the office feeling under the weather. He didn't want to go out training, so I knew

there was something seriously wrong. He had several checks leading to him being hospitalised and two weeks ago he was diagnosed with lymphoma cancer, and he is currently undertaking treatment in Milton Keynes. I'm sure you will join the club and me in wishing Joe a full and speedy recovery so that he can get back to what he does best. Coaching, teaching and guiding our young players through, he is excellent at it, we miss him and we need him back! Doesn't that put everything in to perspective? Enjoy the game today and reflect on what a good season it has been. If someone would have said to me two years ago this week, we would be where we are today with one game to go, I would have bitten their

A word on our visitors. Ironically they were the last team I managed, leaving them over 13 years ago. How well they have done since then! An established League club themselves with a real chance in the coming Play-Offs. Well done to Phil Wallace and all his staff, there is some real nice people over there and along with the crowd they were always really good to me. Good luck to

Back to us, where my loyalties truly lie. Now that I am leaving I can become a fan again, watching the first team down through the levels to the under-8s and enjoy it at leisure not as a necessity. It will be nice to pick up the monthly planner, choose a game that takes my fancy and pop along to add my support if needed.

Lastly talking of support there are three sets of people I must really thank before I go. Firstly Gary Sweet, the board and the Luton Town staff for their continued back up and commitment over the past three years.

Secondly, all the parents of the boys (all 104 of them!) who continually taxi the lads three to four times a week, to for fill their commitments to us, and maintain an excellent on-going communication with the academy staff. Without you there would be no youth set-up.

And lastly to all my staff, part-time and full who have been unbelievable in their dedication and desire to deliver the best for this Club. They have succeeded - well

With the Town now in control and bossing possession, the clear-cut chances dried up for a 20-minute period, but after Galliford and Tuton both blazed over the former did make it 3-0 with another fine strike with three minutes left when crashing home from 20 yards.

The Hatters sensed blood in the final moments but Trotman was twice unable to convert having been found by Tuton and Robinson – and that was that.

THE RECORD

An FA Cup final appearance in front of 100,000 at Wembley, an away game at Lazio, a home win over Watford and relegation from the top flight. Only Luton Town could list such a history on this day, eh?

Well those three games make up the 13 times the Hatters have played on 2nd May down the years which has seen the Town win more than they have lost. In total it's six wins, three draws and four defeats across those 13 matches. The Hatters have scored 22 and conceded 17.

On home soil the Town have never lost which is a good omen for today's game. At Kenilworth Road the Hatters have only played five times but have won four and drawn once, scoring 14 and conceding just five.

CUP FINALISTS

As Roger Wash has featured with two photographs elsewhere in this programme, today is 56 years since the Hatters lost in the FA Cup final to Nottingham Forest at Wembley. Despite playing against 10 men and taking the lead through Dave Pacey, Forest came back to triumph 2-1 in front of 100,000 at the national stadium.

ITALIAN IOB

On this very day in 1973 the Town were in Italy, taking part in the preliminary round of the Anglo Italian Cup. They came home with a point from 2-2 draw with Peter Anderson and John Ryan on target in front of just 4.000. It was the Hatters' final game in the competition that 2-1 away to Verona and beating Fiorentina 1-0.

► HORNETS STUNG

The Hatters beat local rivals Watford in the top flight 2-1 on this day in 1988. The Hornets were on the verge of relegation to Division 2 and the Town all but put the final nail in the coffin thanks to this win at Kenilworth Road. 10,409 witnessed a Marvin Johnson own goal put the visitors ahead but a 19-year-old David Oldfield equalised shortly afterwards. Then, a minute before the break, a Danny Wilson penalty had the Hatters in front and that's the way it stayed.



The Town played in their one - and so far only - FA Cup final on this day in 1959 when they went down 2-1 to Nottingham Forest

DOWN AND OUT

On this day in 1992 the Town played their last game in the top flight after going down 2-1 at Notts County. The Hatters needed the points to stay up and compete in at half-time as Julian James' 25-yarder had the Town in front. But two second half strikes from Rob Matthews - who would later go on to play for the Hatters - gave already relegated Notts victory and condemn the Town to relegation after 10 years in the First Division.

▶ BEST OF THE REST

Kenilworth Road with two goals from Danny Wilson and one each from Mick Harford, Kingsley Black and Roy Wegerle gave the Hatters a convincing 5-2 win... The Town biggest win on this day came in their first on 2nd May, back in 1921, with a 4-0 home victory over Southend... In 1981 the Town triumphed 3-0 away at Burnden Park against Bolton with goals from Brian Stein. Steve White and Kirk Stephens... A solitary goal from Mick Harford gave the Town a 1-0 win at Charlton on this day in 1987 in the top flight... And finally, the Town's last game in the Football League before relegation to the Conference took place on this day in 2009 - a 2-0 defeat at Brentford.

Because for every stonewall certainty like Matt Ritchie. or Troy Deeney, there's are unsung heroes like Almen Abdi or Charlie Daniels who've played out of their skin only to be overlooked. So, those two aside, here are the players we think can feel mightily aggrieved not to have won the votes of their fellow pros:

DANIEL AYALA - MIDDLESBROUGH

Boro may not have troubled the goals for column much this term, but the back door has been chained, bolted and fortified with Spanish steel.

The men from Teesside have conceded just 37 goals in 45 games - or 0.8 per match - making them the toughest nut to crack in the division. Surely, then, they deserve more than one representative in the back four?

Step forward, then, Daniel Ayala, a centre-half so assured and positionally astute he often looks like he's gliding around in slow motion. Always in the right place, always at the right time, the 24-year-old is the kind of defender every keeper dreams of playing with.

CHRISTOPHE BERRA - IPSWICH

Ipswich remarkable run to the Play-Offs has been achieved on a budget dwarfed by that of their rivals. But when you drill a defence like Big Mick, money is no object.


And at the heart of that indomitable back-line is Berra. an indomitable wall of Scottish stone who has made more clearances and blocks than any other player in the Championship - not to mention scoring six times at the other end.

DAVID COTTERILL - BIRMINGHAM

Okay, so the Blues were wretched before Gary Rowett turned up. But with the former Burton boss in situ, Cotterill caught fire.

The Wales midfielder - signed from Doncaster in the summer - has scored nine times (including a string of thunderbolt free-kicks) and made eight more, meaning he has been directly involved in a third of all Birmingham's goals.

With a Championship-best 2.8 key passes per game to his name as well, nobody has contributed more to the St Andrews revival.

PATRICK BAMFORD - MIDDLESBROUGH

If the on-loan Chelsea striker was lucky to edge out Troy Deeney for the Player of the Year award, he can consider himself unfortunate to miss a berth in the All Star XI.

The 21-year-old has netted 17 goals this season, no mean feat in a side that creates fewer chances than anyone else in the top six. Indeed, Bamford's tally accounts for exactly a quarter of Boro's 68 goals so far. with a couple of assists into the bargain.

RUDY GESTEDE - BLACKBURN

Frenchman Gestede emerged from the shadow of £8m-man Jordan Rhodes to become Rovers' first-choice striker this term - thanks in no small part to his complete invincibility in the air. Of his 34 goals for Blackburn, 19 have come from headers, and final tally of 20 this season has prompted interest from Crystal Palace. A centreback's nightmare.

With a campaign that had promised so much, but, unless there are some crazy scores this afternoon, will see the Hatters line up in League 2 next term, it's time to once again take a look at the season's awards.

PLAYER OF THE SEASON: Unlike season's of past there isn't a stand-out candidate this term, but it's hard to knock the effort and determination from Jonathan Smith every time he has crossed the white line for Luton this campaign.
