Rovers survival battle will go to wire after latest defeat to Luton

survival fight looks like going down to the wire. On an afternoon when most of their relegation-threatened rivals were beaten, Rovers contrived to lose a game they had dominated for most of the 90 minutes.

Luton Town, coming off a run of seven consecutive defeats, secured the points with a goal on 81 minutes by Cameron McGeehan.

The Hatters spent most of the contest looking like a team who simply wanted to avoid another defeat at all costs and were clearly delighted with the bonus of a victory. They caught Tranmere on a counter-attack that resulted in a penalty for goalkeeper Peter Brezovan's trip on Mark Cullen.

Although Brezovan made a fine save from Cullen's spot-kick, McGeehan reacted quicker than the Tranmere defenders to pounce on the loose ball and poke it home.

Rovers, though rarely fluent going forward, nevertheless created enough chances to have won the game.

They were thwarted by a couple of high class saves from Eliott Justham, some bad luck and a little lack of composure, perhaps understandably, in playing the right ball into the box as the minutes ticked away.

A crowd who had been supportive through most of the afternoon became a little agitated towards the end. They went home with the consolation of knowing that little ground was lost as every team in the bottom four lost.

But now Rovers have just five games remaining. It may be a blessing that three of them are away from home. Tranmere don't look like a side who relish playing at Prenton Park, having taken one point from the last five games.

Tranmere had a clear-cut chance to take the lead in the fourth minute.

The impressive Steve Jennings, winning an interception on the halfway line, played a well weighted pass that sent Jennison Myrie Williams running clear through the inside right channel.

The winger ran into the box but in



attempting to tap a shot wide of Justham, he knocked the ball against the goalkeeper's legs and the opportunity was lost.

At the other end Brezovan, retaining the gloves ahead of Owain Fon Williams, had to make his first save when pushing out a header on the run from Paul Benson over the bar on 16 minutes.

The Rovers goalkeeper was grateful to see an intended clearance from Max Power slice over the bar a minute later.

An early goal might have settled Tranmere. As it was, their football betrayed some anxiety. They struggled to build moves through a crowded midfield or put their attacking players on the ball in dangerous positions.

Myrie Williams found more encouragement than anyone down the right flank and had some tenacious tussles with full-back Scott Griffiths.

He found some space and time beyond the far post on 32 minutes to get underneath a well delivered across from Liam Ridehalgh but could not make a clean connection with his volley.

The second half was only a couple of minutes old when Tranmere lost Max Power. Feeling unwell, the midfielder was stretchered from the pitch and taken to hospital for a check-up. Power was replaced by Marc Laird.

Tranmere, looking to build some pressure on the visitors, won a free-kick iust outside the box when wide midfielder Rob Taylor was fouled on 57 minutes. The confident George Green took on the shot and curled the ball towards the right-hand corner of the net but goalkeeper Justham was able to make a comfortable save.

Manager Micky Adams opted to make a change after 61 minutes, introducing Iain Hume into an attacking role in place of Taylor. When Tranmere won another free-kick a few yards outside the box, Myrie-Williams took on the responsibility but his shot gave the goalkeeper no more trouble than Green's have done.

Hume was quickly involved, playing a pass back from inside a crowded box to Green, whose shot was deflected wide of the right-hand post.

As Tranmere built some momentum and pressure on the visitors' defence, the crowd responded with noisy support.

Adams made another change on 74 minutes, replacing Myrie-Williams with George Donnelly.

Tranmere were dealt a body blow on 81 minutes when a rare Luton attack produced a goal against the run of play.

Rovers were caught on the back foot by Cullen's run into the box from the left. Goalkeeper Brezovan, seeing the

danger, dashed from his line to intercept but caught Cullen fractionally late, giving a referee Dean Whitestone an easy

penalty decision.

Brezovan did well to push out Cullen's well struck kick but McGeehan was first to the loose ball to knock it into the net.

Laird must have thought he had equalised three minutes later when heading a flick-on from Kayode Odejayi towards the top corner, only to see Justham make a superb reflex save to touch the ball over.

Soon afterwards Hume directed a sharp header from Green's corner to the near post narrowly over the crossbar.

Tranmere piled players forward during seven minutes of injury time but they didn't have quite enough penetration to find a way through the Luton defence.
