

NOTES FROM THE MANAGER

GOOD AFTERNOON AND WELCOME BACK TO KENILWORTH ROAD FOR YET ANOTHER IMPORTANT MATCH IN SKY BET LEAGUE 2.

I would like to warmly welcome everybody associated with Hartlepool United to Bedfordshire today, in particular Craig Hignett and Curtis Fleming who I know well from their Middlesbrough days. They will be aiming to bounce back after a defeat to Notts County on Tuesday, a game which had seen them battle back from two goals down.

We, on the other hand, come into today's game after two away games and two contrasting performances against Wycombe a fortnight ago and at AFC Wimbledon last weekend.

At Wycombe I was filled with pride after what I felt was an absolutely outstanding second half performance.

I said after the game that we could count ourselves lucky not to be a goal down inside the first 25 minutes but gradually we grew into the game after taking the lead.

We never looked back and always looked the more likely to score the next goal. It was obviously pleasing to keep yet another clean sheet away from Kenilworth Road and, roared on by a fabulous away support we were unfortunate not win by a greater margin.

However, after such a pleasing result and satisfying week's training we could not build on that positive against Wimbledon. The defending at times was not good enough and, although the first two Wimbledon goals had a tad amount of fortune about them, we cannot use that as an excuse.

CONSISTENCY

Consistency is key and I am challenging the players to improve this because I feel that performing on a consistent basis will lead to an improvement in results.

We are now entering an important stage of the season

which will define where teams are going to finish.

The league is very tight and all the clubs will be fighting for different things: promotion, or the Play-Offs or for safety. Our goal is simply to improve. Our performances have been generally good, our results have been inconsistent. If we can gain a level of consistency then who knows what we can achieve.

One thing that has remained constant during my time in charge so far has been the unbelievable backing of the team we have received home and away. Against Yeovil I genuinely thought your vocal support in the closing stages would have helped us over the line. Decision-making and that little bit of luck you need deserted



us in the final few minutes that night and I still believe that was a hugely encouraging display against tough opposition.

Do not forget how much of an important part you play in helping us achieve success. It is an often over-used cliché in sport, but do not think we can win today without you backing us from the terraces.

Thank you for the support so far and please keep it up.

I would like to end by mentioning the success of Paul Driver's youth team who have reached the quarter-finals of the FA Youth Cup. To have won through to the last eight, particularly having faced four successive away ties, is an absolutely phenomenal achievement and I would like to wish them all the very best of luck at Blackburn on Tuesday. We are very proud of them and everybody right the way through the club is behind you.

Enjoy the game.

Like us, they've had a tough old season and it's still infuriating to think we gave up a two-goal lead to lose at Huish Park way back in August. Little did we know then how wretchedly inconsistent we would be this season.

Nothing illustrated how frustrating this game can be than Saturday's match against Notts County. I think most people would agree we were excellent at times.

The signs are there of a significant improvement in our approach – far more positive and direct, full of purpose and intent. We could easily have been two up at half-time and there was nothing to indicate we wouldn't go on and

win in the second half.

We certainly weren't quite as good after the beak but we still had plenty of the play – the stats bear that out – yet somehow we ended up conceding two horrible goals and losing at home for the eighth time this season. Inconceivable before the campaign got under way. What's more, we haven't scored at Kenilworth Road since 12th December and we're now in February.

It's sobering to think we haven't come from behind to win a match since our last home game in the Conference!

But, as I said earlier, we are starting to look a far sharper outfit and it seems to me all of us appreciate that. Anyone who went to Mansfield will know just what I mean. We were totally in control at Field Mill, scored an early superb goal through Paddy McCourt and never looked in trouble. Pelly's power and skill for the second was breathtaking.

I can assure you that, despite Saturday's defeat, there is a new buzz about the place, the players are fully committed to the new regime and confident in the



knowledge that performances are improving significantly. Results will surely follow in the coming weeks.

And while we're talking about the future, wasn't it thrilling to see our Under-18s on the pitch at half-time on Saturday to receive the South East Youth Alliance Trophy? What a phenomenal season they have had, and who knows what lies ahead in the FA Youth Cup after their dogged victory at Oldham in midweek in vile conditions. I'd like to think that many of those lads can go on to become the backbone of Luton Town for the next generation. The signs are extremely hopeful and already Nathan has made it very clear he is keen to promote our younger players at the earliest opportunity.

For those of us with rather long memories, Yeovil is closely linked with one of our former managers. The idiosyncratic Alec Stock! He was Yeovil's renowned playermanager when they were a non-league side shortly after the war and they went on a sensational FA

Cup run in 1949 which included beating the mighty Sunderland on the way to the fifth round where they were soundly thrashed by Manchester United in front of 81,000 spectators. Incidentally, Alec had been a tank commander in the Second World War and was blown up but survived at Caen in France.

Alec had a successful career as a manager, notably with QPR, but he was here at Kenilworth Road from 1968 to 1972 and took us to promotion into the second flight. Amongst others, he signed strikers Malcolm Macdonald and Don Givens. I see a lot of Don these days and he is always telling me stories about Alec. How he put notices up around the dressing room area with catchphrases or words of wisdom to inspire the troops!

"He was a really nice man," said Don. "Rather posh, enormously experienced, a man who knew so much about the game and commanded huge respect."

When he signed Don, he offered him a club house to rent at £1.50 a week (!), but advised him to 'do the best thing' and buy a house for himself. "Best bit of advice I ever had," said Don.

"I think my house in Luton cost me about £8,000 and the value doubled within eighteen months!"

It'll be good to welcome one of our own back tonight, Alex Lacey, who spent five years of his young career here at Kenilworth Road before moving to Somerset and became a highly popular figure with the fans. An interesting night too for Nathan Jones, who served seven years at Yeovil as player and coach.

So, could this be the night we sort out our bizarre home form and start on a run that could still see us squeeze into the Play-Offs? Football is a game that is positively marinated in hope and, as long as it is mathematically possible, I will always cling onto that hope. As ever, the sometimes deafening roar from the stands can play a major part, so do please keep up your tremendous backing for the team and perhaps we'll enjoy an exhilarating ride from now until May. Momentum's what we need - we certainly have the quality players.

Since my last notes we've picked up four points from three games and, typically of our season so far, have experienced plenty of ups and downs.

I felt we were superb all over

the pitch, especially in the second half. We controlled the game, restricted Wycombe in our own box and could have added a couple of more goals.

A result like that, in front of another brilliant away following, gave us the confidence to go to Wimbledon and pick up another result on the road. Sadly, that wasn't to be and we were undone by Wimbledon's threat from setpieces. Defending set-plays are vital in this division and if you are sloppy in those situations you are going to get punished.

It was disappointing because we controlled the game for large parts and played some nice, patient football on a real pudding of a pitch. The first two goals took some wicked deflections and sometimes they cannot be helped. The two quick goals at the start of the second half, however, cannot be excused.

The result is a set-back in what's been a positive start under the new gaffer and I hope you can see how he wants us to play. We have all embraced his style and methods and training has been very enjoyable. However, after such a poor result we are focused on putting things right today.

Turning attention away from the first team, on behalf of all the lads, I'd like to congratulate the youth team on their penalty shootout win over Preston last week. On Tuesday they travel to Blackburn knowing a win would put them in

the semi-finals of the FA Youth Cup. It is a tremendous achievement to get this far and full credit to all the boys, Paul Driver and everyone associated with the academy. Good luck lads!

RIP JOHN PERRY 3rd June 1925 - 20th January 2016

Everyone at Luton Town were saddened to hear of the death of Town fan John Perry on 20th January.

He saw his first Hatters match, an FA Cup replay with Chelsea, on 16th January 1935 so had just clocked up 81 years as a supporter.

He witnessed Joe Payne score 10 goals in 1936 and his oftenrepeated account of the 4-3 win, from 3-0 down, over Newcastle in 1946 is a family legend.

John was at Wembley for the defeats by Nottingham Forest in 1959 and 1989 and he was there too in 1988 when the League Cup was won. At the age of 62 he wept openly at the final whistle.

He held a season ticket from 1955 until 2010. His favourite

all-time player was Joe Payne, although latterly he would grudgingly admit some admiration for 'young Mick Harford'.

Declining health meant he was unable to attend matches in recent years but he would sit avidly in front of the television on a Saturday afternoon keeping abreast of the scores and then carry out face to face and telephone analysis with family members who had been there.

His legacy will live on through three children and six grandchildren who have all been imbued with his love for Luton Town.

TICKING OFF THE 92 FOR LEWIS

Also here at Kenilworth Road today are the family and friends of Lee O'Neil who are visiting all 92 Football League grounds in memory of his son Lewis, who died aged four.

THE TOWN HIT THE ROAD NEXT WEEKEND WHEN THEY MAKE THE JOURNEY NORTH TO TAKE ON YORK CITY AT BOOTHAM CRESCENT

WHO? York City, aka the Minstermen from Bootham Crescent, York, Yorkshire. First founded in 1908, City won promotion back to the Football League in 2012 at the Town's expense, winning at Wembley 2-1 in the Conference Play-Off final thanks to goals from Ashley Chambers and Matty Blair.

where? Bootham Crescent has been City's home since 1932 but the club are expected to move into a new Community Stadium with the local rugby club in the next few years. Hatters fans have the choice of standing on an open terrace behind the goal or in covered seats in the Popular Stand beside the pitch.

HOW TO GET THERE.

From the Maple Road car park to the Bootham Crescent main entrance it's a good three-and-a-half hour drive and the best part of 185 miles. You can go via the M1 or A1 north, but coming off the A1, take the A64 to Scarborough and York. When you near York, join the A1237 Ring Road and continue on it until you reach the junction with the A19. Turn right at the junction and take the A19 towards York City

Centre and keep going until you get to a pub on your left called the Burton Stone Inn, at which point you turn left into Burton Stone Lane. Then take the first right into Grosvenor Road for the ground. The satnav for the ground YO30 AQ. The Bobbers are also running a coach to York. Their fare is £29 adults, £26 concessions. Call 01234 856542 to book your seat.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE? The Town hold an overall advantage in head-to-head record between the two sides, winning 11 to York's nine. However. the Hatters have won just once in the last 14 meetings – a 5-0 win at Kenilworth Road when York played a midfielder in goal! The Hatters last won at Bootham Crescent in September 2001 but in the six games since the Town have failed to win and failed to score. It's been 556 minutes since Ian Hillier scored the winner for the Hatters in that 2-1 victory.

THIS TIME ROUND. The Minstermen have struggled this season and find themselves deep in relegation trouble at the foot of the table. City axed manager Russ Wilcox in October after nine

games without a win and hired former Scotland international Jackie McNamara as boss. The Hatters were held to a 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road in October with Cameron McGeehan's penalty earning the Town a point.

KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU. The Town

have two former City players on their books in the shape of midfielders Alex Lawless and Jonathan Smith. Smith played and was sent-off for York in the Town's last win against City – that 5-0 win at Kenilworth Road in January 2011. Lawless was part of the York side that beat the Town in the 2009/10 Play-Offs, before his move to Kenilworth Road the following season.



Last season had seen Moore pull off the a great escape for a Hartlepool side who somehow avoided relegation, and the team kept their good form going in winning their first three league games of the campaign, while also progressing past League 1 outfit Fleetwood in the Capital One Cup.

A victory at York sandwiched comfortable home wins over York and Newport County, but their next win was not to come until September 26 when Brad Walker's late goal secured a vital win at fellow relegation-threatened club Yeovil.

But it was the home form which most concerned the Pools fans, losing 3-0 and 4-1 to Bristol Rovers and the Hatters in the space of five days, going almost three months without victory at Victoria Park until overcoming Leyton Orient in mid-November.

As well as the 4-1 victory at Victoria Park earlier this season, the Hatters enjoyed doing the double over Pools last year, when Cameron McGeehan, Jake Howells and Scott Griffiths netted in the 3-0 victory at Kenilworth Road, while Jim Stevenson netted just moments after coming on in the 2-1 win away from home.

Former Crewe, Middlesbroigh and Barnsley midfielder Craig was given his first managerial job by the Hartlepool board last week. An hugely experienced player, he played briefly for Pools before embarking on a coaching career that saw him join the staff at Middlesbrough.

BETWEEN THE STICKS

TREVOR CARSON

Northern Ireland international Trevor joined Pools from Cheltenham. Was the Robins' Player of the Year last season but returned to the North East having spent six years at Sunderland.

IN DEFENCE

CARL MAGNAY

Versatile defender Carl arrived at Victoria Park from Grimsby. Able to play at either full-back or centrehalf, he scooped six end-of-season awards for the Mariners last term. Previously on the books at Leeds, Chelsea and Gateshead.

Irishman Jake signed for Pools this summer having been released by Huddersfield. Also able to play in midfield, he made his name with St Patrick's before joining the Terriers.

SCOTT HARRISON

Whole-hearted and aggressive centre-half Scott penned a permanent deal at Victoria Park in January last year. Initially joined Pools on-loan and was crowned the supporters' and players' player of the year.

DAN JONES

Young left-back Dan has risen through the youth ranks at Victoria Park and made his debut last season. Made 20 appearances last term and is a danger from setpieces.

ADAM JACKSON

Up-and-coming centre-half Adam joined Pools on loan from Middlesbrough at the start of October. A former England Under-18 international, he has captained Boro's reserve team in the past.

ACROSS THE MIDDLE

NATHAN THOMAS

Left-winger Nathan arrived at the Vic in January this year from Mansfield. Began his career as a trainee at Newcastle and Sunderland before moving to Plymouth and then Motherwell.

NICKY FEATHERSTONE

Experienced midfielder Nicky joined Pools in October 2014 having dropped out of the pro game to sign for Harrogate. Started at Hull before signing for Hereford and then Walsall.

MICHAEL WOODS

Talented midfielder Michael signed for United at the beginning of last season following a successful trial. A former England youth international who has had spells with Leeds, Chelsea, Yeovil and Doncaster.

JAKE GRAY

Highly-rated attacking midfielder Jake signed on loan from Crystal Palace in October. The teenager hit two goals in a televised win over Orient and recently penned an extension until the end of the season.

LEWIS HAWKINS

Hard-working academy graduate Lewis penned a pro deal in the summer of 2014. Made his debut last season and is capable of playing anywhere across the middle, including in wide areas.

UP FRONT

RAKISH BINGHAM

Striker who was United's first signing of the summer, Rakish joined Pools from Mansfield after impressing onloan last season. Began his career at Wigan and is blessed with plenty of pace.

BILLY PAYNTER

THE SEASON AHEAD...

After narrowly avoiding relegation last year, what were the expectations at Victoria Park heading into this year?

Pools fans expected a little more than we have got, especially with the way we ended last season. I think most fans would have settled for a nice 'middle-of-the-road' type of campaign after the excitement and shredded nerves of last time.

It seems Hartlepool have struggled to find the net this term, would that be a fair reflection having scored just 23 goals?

Yes. We've suffered badly because our main striker Billy Paynter has been missing for such a long spell with injury. There have been matches where we have created plenty of opportunities but haven't been able to stick the ball in the net there have also been games when we've created very little. Hopefully getting Luke James back in on-loan will be the answer.

You started the season really well with three wins, but it's not been great since then.
Any reason in particular for that?

Again, Billy Paynter was flying and we've missed not just his goals, but his leadership on the pitch too. We really did look good in those opening weeks and as well as the League results we won away at Fleetwood in the League Cup too.

Although it's been a disappointing season so far for Pools, who has impressed you in the squad?

Listen, this Pools squad is full of talent and in my opinion is FAR better than recent campaigns. Trevor Carson in goal is a superb signing, and Carl Magnay, Scott Harrison, Jake Gray and Michael Woods have all impressed me so far.

How has boss Ronnie
Moore fared during his time
managing the club, and what
are the expectations for the rest
of the season?

Nobody should ever forget what Ronnie Moore did for this club last season. We were dead and buried and I'd written us off at Christmas. He's 'Old School' is Ronnie, and I'm certain he will come good for the rest of this campaign too. The owners have said they will back him so I'm still dreaming of a mid-table finish once we've caught up our five games in hand!




SEASONS PAST...

LUTON TOWN 1 HARTLEPOOLS UTD 0


9th September 1967

The summer of 1967 saw, for the first time for many years, a groundswell of optimism at Kenilworth Road with supporters finally feeling it was going to be our year after several seasons of gloom that had seen the Town sink from the top flight to the basement.

The 1966/67 season had finished with the Hatters only four points off the re-election zone but the astute signings made by manager Allan Brown, who had been appointed in November 1966, encouraged me to start a scrapbook for the first time so that I could record the commencement of the resurgence in fortune.

The Town had picked up only six points on the road in 1966/67 but started the new campaign with a hard earned draw at Wrexham in a bad tempered clash which saw two dismissals and a late leveller from new striker Rodney Green.

A healthy crowd of 7,887 (which eventually turned out to be the lowest of the season) filed into Kenilworth Road the following week to see Barnsley put to the sword with goals from Bruce Rioch and Keith Allen. In the next game, at Swansea, a late error from new skipper Terry Branston gifted the home side a point in a 2-2 draw but we were all happy as we maintained our unbeaten record and picked up our second away point – something that had taken us until just before Christmas the previous season.



We were not so happy when we lost 3-0 at Southend in the next game though. In mitigation the Town needed to make seven changes through injury, gave a debut to 17 year old winger Ken Beaven, and lost Green with what turned out to be a long term knee injury after 20 minutes.

Despite this, Chairman Tom Hodgson summed up the spirit and morale at Kenilworth Road by saying: "It feels like a new club. Spirit is bubbling over throughout the ranks. You can feel it in the boardroom, in the dressing room and on the terraces. You can even feel it in the town. Everyone is happy, everyone is confident. This is



something that has not happened for a long time. It's all due to the new blood in the club and the wonderful way Allan Brown is leading them on."

Next up were Hartlepools United (as they were then known) who visited Kenilworth Road unbeaten and fresh from doing the 'double' over the Town the previous Easter. The Town welcomed back three of the previously injured players with Keith Allen taking up the striker role vacated by Green.

The first half of the game bore the unmistakable hallmark of a draw with Hartlepools packing their defence in a grim bid to preserve their unbeaten status. Allen battled manfully up front on his own but the Town were missing the punch

of Green to take advantage of the wingplay of Graham French and Ray Whittaker.

Chances were few and far between in the first half with the Hartlepools defence content to soak up pressure and hope to catch the Town on the break. Terry Branston and John Moore in the Luton defence were wise to this and closely shackled Pools dangermen Ernie Phythian and Jim Mulvaney.

The game was developing into a bore draw until in the 56th minute came a goal that was completely out of keeping with all that had gone on before.

Golden boy Bruce Rioch picked up a clearance header from Bill McDerment just inside the

Hartlepools half, accelerated towards goal, beat a defender and then rocketed a shot past visiting goalkeeper George Smith.

"Rioch for England" chanted the Oak Road choir, not realising that their man would go on to captain Scotland in later years!

The game sparked into life after the goal and it became one-way traffic as the Town sought to increase their lead.

Hartlepools had difficulty in breaking out of defence and their goal led a charmed life as shots and crosses rained in.

Try as they might the Hatters could not increase their lead but a final score of 1-0 was good enough as the team moved closer to a return to former glories.

The Town produced a 12page programme for the visit of Hartlepools.

The programme was, quite frankly, an embarrassment and came hidden inside the national magazine Football League Review. All other clubs subscribing to the Football League Review used it as a filler!

The Town were due to play at mighty Leeds in the League Cup the following Wednesday and it was announced that arrangements had been made with British Railways to stop a Leeds bound train at Luton so supporters could travel to the match. The return train would stop at Luton at 4.12am.

A strong appeal was made to supporters, and children in particular, not to run on the pitch at the end of the game pointing out that police dogs would be available to stop this nuisance.

A large advertisement had been inserted announcing the arrival of a new local newspaper, The Evening Post, which was to start on 11th September. The Hartlepools game was therefore the first to be reported on by the paper and its sports editor Roger Duckworth.

HARTLEPOOL AND THE HATTERS IN NUMBERS

MARVIN

The closest Pools have come to winning again at Kenilworth Road came in December 2001 when the Hatters needed a late equaliser from Marvin Johnson to earn a point at Kenilworth Road. Pools led 2-1 with six minutes to go until Marv popped up to level to make it 2-2.

No Luton player has scored more goals against Hartlepool than an ex-Poolie...Steve Howard!
The striker, who joined the Town from Northampton, started his career at Victoria Park. He scored the five goals in four successive appearances against Pools between 2001 and 2004. He scored a brace in the 3-2 home win against Pools in August 2003.

1-0 at Hartlepool in December 1968 the two sides would go 33 years before meeting each other again in the Football League. The Town won 2-1 at Victoria Park in December 2001 thanks to goals from Dean Crowe and Matt Taylor – it was the Hatters' first ever win at Hartlepool.

Pools' biggest win over the
Hatters came at Victoria Park
in February 2008 – a 4-0
victory that kept the Town in the
League 1 relegation zone.

Hartlepool have only ever won once at Kenilworth Road – and that came 49 years ago in 1967. Since that victory, Pools have lost six and drawn one of the following seven meetings on Bedfordshire soil.

Pools won their first four home meetings against the Town between 1966 and 1968. Three wins came in Division Four (now League 2), while one came in Division Three (League 1).



The defender volleyed home a stunning leftfoot shot with seven minutes to go to cancel out the Liam Walsh's opener for the Glovers.

Yeovil, Nathan Jones's former club, led thanks to Everton loanee Walsh's strike on 70 minutes – the visitors' only real clear-cut chance of the game.

But Sheehan rescued a point for the Town on 83 minutes when he volleyed home Olly Lee's left-wing corner in the top corner for his first goal since joining on-loan from Bradford.

Back on level terms the Hatters lay siege on the Glovers' goal in the closing stages and the Town came close to finding a late, later winner when Cameron McGeehan saw an effort come back of the post in the 97th minute.


We had enough chances to win the game but it's taken an absolute worldie to earn us a point.

Jack Marriott reduced arrears with his ninth goal of the season on the hour, thumping a well-struck effort on the turn beyond Roos.

McGeehan saw an effort ruled out for offside – which would have made it 4-2 with 14 minutes to go – but after that the hosts were able to hold on to their three-goal lead and consign the Hatters to defeat.

Cameron Midfielder Hails New Boss' IMPACT

Hatters midfielder Cameron McGeehan has described Nathan Jones' impact as "unbelievable" for his and the team's development since joining the club.

Jones arrived at Kenilworth Road on 6th January and McGeehan, who scored against Wycombe a fortnight ago, feels the new manager's style is as important as the result, and that the new mentality suits his type of play as an attacking central midfielder.

"Jones has come in and been unbelievable for me," said the 20-year-old. "Training has been geared right up, the meetings we have are very in-depth and it's a very different approach.

"He plays very tactically, looking to get the ball down and play. As a young player that's what I want to learn, and he knows how to play in a lot of the way I want to.

"It's not too late to get the playoffs and it's what we're all still hoping for. A bit late, maybe, but we're going to keep pushing for that and fighting for it because it's what the fans want and deserve," McGeehan added.

"It's been a bit of a transition lately and hopefully we can push on. We need to concentrate on winning games because we haven't done that enough this season and then we can go from there.

"We could go under the radar. We believe as a team we can do that. We haven't been good enough in the first half of the season which is why we're in the position we are now."

McGeehan has

with his wonderful effort
at Wycombe the tenth
this campaign, and he
backs himself to get
more before the term is out.

But a run of six games without finding the net left a few jittery moments before eventually reaching double-figures in his 30th game in all competitions

"The way the gaffer plays we're going to get a lot more chances in and around the box so it's perfect for me, and we work on shooting every day.

"Psychologically it can be difficult because you want to get to a certain target, and you get close and then start snatching at a few chances so I've put it out of my mind a bit."

Now the young midfielder is looking to push on and use Jones' tactical nous to help push his game from strength to strength.

"I'm young, enjoying every experience and I learnt a lot playing



out wide where I could develop other parts of my game, but I feel I'm better deployed in the middle," McGeehan continued.

"We're more of a passing team now so there's a chance to get creative.

"The gaffer's philosophy is all about that. Even though the results haven't been what they might have been, the performances have been there. Wycombe wasn't a great example of that but it was a tough game."

JONES ARRIVAL GIVEN SKIPPER CONFIDENCE

Town captain Scott Cuthbert has revealed that the arrival of Nathan Jones has given the centre-half a new lease of confidence at the back.

One of Jones' first acts as Hatters manager was to give Cuthbert the captain's armband, and his faith was rewarded with three clean sheets from the first five games.

The defender now hopes the excellent defensive record can continue alongside the new style of football Jones has brought to Kenilworth Road.

"He made me captain which was great, and he's also given me the confidence to play," said Cuthbert.

"Every week you're playing for your place regardless of your squad size, you're only one bad performance away from missing out on the team. It keeps everyone on their toes, and hopefully we can keep on going and pushing up."

Cuthbert was also quick to praise Cameron McGeehan, who notched his tenth of the season with a fantastic half-volley for the game's only goal at Adams Park.

"We've been missing that bit of spark in front of goal the last couple of games. Cam pops up in the right place and he can score unbelievable goals. He's a great lad to have in your team, and he's a



young lad who's only going to get better.

"Jack [Marriott] is another excellent prospect. At that age they're still learning, and we've got a lot of experience in the squad they can learn from too, the likes of Paul Benson, Craig Mackail-Smith and Paddy McCourt.

The Town were given a double sucker-punch, conceding two goals in two bursts to all but end the game at 4-0 just after half-time.


Wimbledon marked a third start for Marriott under Nathan Jones. but the 21-year-old has found himself playing







IN THE NEXT IN OUR FIRST SERIES OF TALKING TO TOWN FANS OF THEIR EXPERIENCES OF WATCHING THE HATTERS DOWN THE YEARS, DANNY JAMES EXPLAINS HOW MUCH OF A ROLE THE CLUB PLAYS IN HIS LIFE.

The allure of Kenilworth Road is something that can catch on from a young age, and it's no different for Danny James, who went to his first Hatters game with his dad at the age of six.

Now the father of two is taking his children to watch new heroes take to the park on a Saturday afternoon.

Danny's story is one shared by thousands of Hatters fans up and down the country, whose stories we are celebrating for the 130th anniversary season. His memories, however, of his first trip to Kenilworth Road, watching Luton beating Stoke City 2-0 on a summer's day in 1984 are limited to stuff that happened off the

"I can't really remember anything about the game," said Danny. "I remember getting out of the car seeing loads of lads being lads just running down Dunstable Road having a good time on a nice sunny day at the start of the season.

CELEBRATE

"We were sitting in an uncovered part of the Main Stand, and I was watching that great scoreboard we had flashing every time we scored a goal and men taking their hats off to celebrate."

It was a no-brainer decision for Luton Town to be the club for Danny, who has witnessed the good times, watching the Hatters lift the Littlewoods Cup in 1988. He was also a season-ticket holder for the two years the Hatters were in the Championship in the 2000s.

"I was born and went to school in Luton, so when I was at that age, it was easy for me to support Luton and for my mates to as well.

"We were in the First Division, one of the top 10 or 12 teams in the country. I wouldn't have dreamed of supporting anyone else, and except for the odd Arsenal fan, I don't really remember anyone at school supporting any other team.

"Now, for anyone knew looking for a team to support, it's not so easy. I applaud the supporters who cheer on



the team week in, week out, because we've certainly had our ups and downs recently, so I admire the younger fans who go down there for the first time.

"I had an apprentice working for me two years ago who was about 17. He told me he'd never seen Luton play in the Football League, just the Conference, and he started going when he was 12.

"He and his mates still went every week and that blew my minds! I'm not sure I could have done that when I

But despite the rollercoaster that has been the recent years of Luton Town Football Club, Danny still holds fond memories of a decade ago, when the side were flying high in the second tier of English football.

"The season when we finished 10th in the Championship was great, but there are three games in

particular that stand out to me during that campaign: Beating Norwich 4-2 at Kenilworth Road when we were 4-0 up at half-time. Winning 3-2 against Reading at home, the only defeat they had all season after the opening game, was also fantastic.

"And of course the Liverpool game in the FA Cup. I've never seen a Luton team play that well for 60 minutes at Kenilworth Road.

"The football was unbelievable and they were the European champions at the time. I remember thinking: 'This is like the high water mark'. We're not going to get any better than this.

"What was great is that so many of those players had come through the divisions with us, the likes of Steve Howard, Kevin Nicholls and Chris Coyne helping us play good football."

Danny was also among the 95,000 at Wembley in 1988 for arguably the Hatters' greatest moment, the Littlewoods Cup victory over Arsenal, tasting the experiences of Wembley Way and the crowd's reaction to the Town's 90th-minute winner.

Now the father of two, who gets to about seven or eight games a season with Louis, nine, and Archie, five, hopes his new generation of Town fans can be inspired by the likes of David Preece, as he was growing up.

"David was a brilliant midfielder," said Danny. "He was tiny, but he could run all day and I loved that about him.

"We went on a cup run in 1994, the year we played Chelsea at Wembley in the semi-finals, and he was amazing in that run, especially against Cardiff and West Ham. I was lucky, being born at the right time for success.

"Louis loves it every time he comes, and Archie's first game was the 4-3 defeat to Northampton just before Christmas.

CHANGES

"It was brilliant for him to see so many goals, just not enough of them from a Hatters perspective!"

Like many fans, Danny has been there through the Hatters' five-year stint in non-league, and he has observed some noticeable changes since the Town's return, which he hopes the new Kenilworth Road manager can take advantage of.

Danny said: "It's been a bit up and down since Nathan Jones came in, but I think it will take half a season for everything to come together.



"I reckon it will be a bit like when John Still came in for that half a season [in February 2013]. He brought in a couple of players, had a look at what we had and then the next year we could take off. There is a chance we could get the Play-Offs, but it will need a good run.

"I think Nathan could bring Luton what Bournemouth had with Eddie Howe: A young manager with new ideas and a new perspective of how football should be played. John Still was brilliant for what he did, but didn't have that style of football.

"The Football League we got relegated out of is a lot different to the way it is now. The likes of Oxford, Northampton and Wycombe all play football.

"Back then, the way of playing was to have a big man at the front, a big man at the back, and that was also the style we had to play to get out of the Conference.

"Now the standard of player is a lot better, and you need to play football and be a bit more tactically astute."

Asked how he thinks the new manager will bring the success required, just a few words were needed to emphasise Danny's emotion: "I hope so. I'll be there with him."

"It's a testament to the strength of squad that you can bring three subs on that all change the game positively. Kavan [Cotter] and [James] Verney added that energy,

while Ciaren Jones as a 16 year-old came in there against a good centre forward and did well.

"Blackburn here we come! We like the North West!"

Driver was also thankful to Supporters of Luton Youth Development (SoLYD) for their part in getting the Hatters to Preston a day early for extra preparation.

He said: "The preparation helps, especially with the fact that we could come up here the day before and the SoLYD Bobbers Travel helped with the funding of the hotel and the coaches. You can't measure that.

"That's massive for the boys but it's what the group's about. Preston had 10 second year players, and we had three and a 16-year-old. I don't know where the youngsters get it from, but I can't say anything more than if we'd got beat I'd have still been so, so proud,"

A WORD FROM The Football League Paper

Once upon a time Marseille could attract Chris Waddle. Now, the best they can manage is a misfiring Sunderland striker.

The transfer of Steven Fletcher to the French giants was one of the deadline day's more bizarre transfers but the Scot is in good company.

Because while we all know about superstars like Gazza and David Beckham earning megabucks moves to the continent, history is full of lesser lights who pitched up across Europe to leave foreign fans thinking 'Who is this bloke?'

Franz Carr Reggiana (1996/97)

Famously described as "the best corner-flag hitter in the business" by Brian Clough, Carr came from that long, distinguished line of lightning-quick but technically hopeless wingers. Though a regular with Forest, by 1996 the 30-yearold's pace was diminishing and the excitement that greeted his arrival in Italy soon dissipated. His Romanian coach complained that Carr's crosses "ended up in the parking lot" and he eventually played just six times (the last in a 6-1 hiding at Lazio) as newly-promoted Reggiana made an instant return to Serie B.

Micky Quinn PAOK (1995/96)

Hardly your archetypal 'foreignstyle' striker, Quinn unsurprisingly took to life in Greece like a duck to quicksand. "The football was so slow and laborious," he said. "There were 70 passes before you even crossed the halfway line. You'd get one chance and if you missed it you'd be slaughtered in the papers." Then there were the unpaid wages. the concrete thrown from the terraces. the three managers in two months and the chairman who carried guns for self-protection. After one goal in ten games, Quinn bailed out and

promptly retired.

Vinny Samways Las Palmas (1996-2002)

Derided as 'Skinny Sideways' during his days with Spurs and Everton, Samways' measured holding play was out of place in the hurly-burly of early nineties English football. So in 1996, out of the blue, he switched to Las Palmas, a Spanish Second Division side based in the Canary Islands. There, he became club captain, folk hero and even developed a reputation as a hard-

His crowning glory came in 2000 when he skippered the side to the title, earning himself the chance to play against Zinedine Zidane and the rest of Madrid's galacticos.




Danny Dichio Sampdoria (1997/98)

What the mighty Sampdoria wanted with a bang-average, 6ft 4ins QPR striker, only Sven Goran Eriksson the man who signed him - can sav. Maybe it was the Italian name. Either way, he was onto a loser. Dichio already had Jurgen Klinsmann and Beppe Signori to displace, then Eriksson left for Lazio. In his place came hardline Marxist Cesar Luis Menotti, who spent four hours of Dichio's first training session expounding on the evils of imperialism and telling the young Brit why he must always refer to the Falklands as 'Malvinas'. Baffled and browbeaten, Dichio never recovered and, after two games, joined Lecce on loan. He spent just half a season there before fleeing to Sunderland.

We're just over a month on from Nathan Jones being appointed as Luton manager and it's fair to say we've already seen a great deal of change under the new boss.

On the pitch, we've seen a new style of play emerge with players who, for one reason or another, were not first-team regulars in the first half of the season, like Jake Howells, Stephen O'Donnell and Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu, making the most of a fresh start.

Off it, last month saw the return of a legend and a new head of recruitment in Mick Harford, someone who knows this club like few others.

The opening six games of Jones' reign have been encouraging, on the whole, and the fact that he's been able to exert as much influence in a relatively short space of time belies his managerial experience.

The word 'novice' was bandied about after news the former Brighton and Yeovil defender had got the job broke, but this wasn't fair as he's been coaching since 2009 – while he was still playing.

That is plenty of time for someone to come up with their own ideas about how they want their team to be set up and to absorb the best qualities of the managers they work under.

When you think that he won Gary Sweet over out of 135 applicants for the job, that takes some of the risk element out of his appointment.

But back to his impact on the pitch, and the clearest thing to emerge so far is that the Hatters' tendency to self-destruct defensively has become far less of a problem.

It was their previous instability at the back that ultimately cost John Still his job in December. Throwing matches away became too much of a habit under Jones' predecessor.

CONSISTENT

Building from the back was a necessity if Luton are to fight their way back into the top half at least and hopefully a more consistent cutting edge in attack will develop as a result.

The next task is to sort out the home form. Visiting Kenilworth Road hasn't exactly been an ordeal for Town's opponents this season.

The players won't need telling that three home wins in the league by mid-February isn't enough and hopefully today is the start of this statistic being rectified.

Less of an issue has been getting results on the road, with Town picking up impressive victories at a couple of promotion-chasers in Mansfield and Wycombe in recent



In fact, the Hatters' away record as a whole this season stands up to scrutiny with only the top six being able boast more wins on their travels than the their seven.

If this can be maintained, with this ground becoming more of a fortress on top of that, then there may be still be more excitement for the supporters than they would have expected in the remaining months of the season.

Jones' arrival has brought change from a journalistic standpoint as well.

It's fair to say he played with his cards close to his chest in his press conferences at first, but the fact that his answers are to the point again demonstrates the clear ideas he has for this club.

It means the half-hour pressers we had under Still are a thing of the past, although this does make listening to them back a bit easier!
