ARGYLE gave debuts to on-loan players Jordan Houghton, the Chelsea midfielder, and Jamille Matt, the Fleetwood Town forward. Jordan was one of two changes to the starting line-up, alongside Oscar Threlkeld; Ben Purrington and Josh Simpson were stood down. Jamille came on as a second-half substitute for Reuben Reid. They are the 1,030th and 1,031st players to play

Jordan had previously played against Argyle this season when he lined up for League 1 Gillingham at Home Park in the first round of the Capital One Cup on August 11. Gillingham won 2-1.

for the Pilgrims.

Leading Argyle scorer Jake Jervis's goal was his 12th of the season after a 12-game scoreless streak. It was only Argyle's third goal at the Crown Ground in a fourth visit since they won 4-0 there in 2012.

The red card issued to Kelvin Mellor for the foul which led to Accrington's equalising penalty was the first

dismissal of an Argyle player for nearly a year, since Curtis Nelson was shown two yellow cards in the 2-1 away Sky Bet League 2 defeat by Portsmouth on April 6, 2015, 49 games previously.

Billy Kee became the seventh player to score a penalty against the Pilgrims in all competitions this season. The first five were all at Home Park: Matt Tubbs and Gary Roberts netted for Portsmouth in a 2-1 away win; Ellis Harrison converted in a 1-1 draw with Bristol Rovers; Lee Gregory scored for Millwall in their 5-3 Johnstone's Paint Trophy victory; and Ryan Harley scored for Exeter in a 2-1 win. Away from home, Scott Fenwick scored a consolation for Hartlepool in Argyle's 2-1 triumph. With the exception of Gregory's goal, the penalties came in Sky Bet League 2 matches.

Shav McCartan's injury-time winner was the first time in eight matches between Accrington and Argyle in which one side or the other has scored more than a single goal.



JAMES BITTNER

IT has come to our notice that your team-mates have mentioned you quite a bit in their programme interviews this season, so we are going to give you your chance to get a little bit of your own back - Bitts' Revenge, if you like. Is that okay?

Yes.

Alright, according to more than one of your teammates, you are the Pilgrim most likely to join a comedy troupe or try to make it as a stand-up comedian - are you a funny man?

you a furning main?
Only looking-wise. Not really, I was brought up in the era when there were no mobile 'phones in changing-rooms, and it was all about banter, and laughing and joking with each other. It's what I'm used to and it's what I've always done.

Are you still dining out on the story of your longawaited Football League debut - after 13 years as an understudy - at York earlier this season?

I tried to get over that as fast as possible. It was all blown out of proportion. It was nice to get the game but there was a bit too much limelight for my liking

Were you surprised by the fuss that your debut caused?

Yes. I guess I was quite shocked. If you class the Conference as non-League football, I think there are quite a lot of players who come into the Football League at an older age, via the Conference. It was nice, but it almost came across that I'd done nothing for the last 15-16 years of my life, which isn't quite true. I've been at every level, from the Premiership down to the Conference, albeit as a second or third choice, unfortunately.

How frustrating was it to concede a clean sheet only in stoppage-time?

A clean sheet would have been nice but, as I keep telling the boys, I've played one and won one, so it's a 100% record. If it's my last game, it'll be a winning one. If we go up by three points, it'll be down to those three points at York.

Tell us about your All Saints shoes.

I have some very old trainers which the boys thought were very funny and Graham Carey decided he'd wear them out for training one day, without me realising. I've turned around from hitting some balls at Luke and all the lads are giggling - as they normally are at my expense. I looked down at the floor. It was a wet, wintry, muddy days over at Harper's Park and all I could see were my pride and joy all covered in mud.

Do you enjoy mentoring Christian Walton when he was here on loan?

It was good to have the opportunity to work with Christian, who is young and very highly rated; he's the England Under-21 goalkeeper. As a young coach, I am learning on that side, too, so it was good for me to learn how they do things at Brighton and in the England set-up.

Is it important for squads to have players like James Bittner?

Players that are not going to start many matches, but are part of the fabric of the club and can bring experience to the dressing-room. People ask me why I am still playing, but it's my job – it's what I've always done. Unfortunately, as a goalkeeper, there is only one position to play. The second choice is only there for emergencies. It's part of our trade. Unless the first

choice has a horror show for four or five games in a row, or he gets an injury, you are going to be sat on the bench for a lot of the season. Then, it's important that you are upbeat and you do keep yourself involved with the boys. You aren't playing week in, week out, but you are part of the team. If I couldn't accept that, I wouldn't have lasted so long.

Tell us about your role with the Argyle Community Trust.

I coach at Marjons - both the men and Ladies firstteam goalkeepers; I do a bit with the Community Under-18 Programme where all the boys are full-time here, train a couple of times a week and play in a Wednesday league; and there is a Long Term Development Programme on a Thursday night which is basically a link between our Academy and grassroots football - I do the 'keepers for that.

Do you really eat a whole pizza every week after a game?

Yes. Very quickly, as well.

What would your advice be to any goalkeeper starting out in the game today? Have things changed since you were a youngster?

It's changed a lot. When I first started, every team had at least three or four first-team goalkeepers, even down to League 1 level. Nowadays, outside the Championship, it's one first choice and either a young kid or an older lad who is going to do some coaching. It is getting harder to stay in the game longer.

THIS match was played on a Friday evening to suit the programme schedules of Sky Sports 3. who showed the match live. Argyle manager Neil Warnock started with a team unchanged from the 11 that won away at Watford in midweek to top Nationwide League Division 2.

Argyle were fortunate enough to get an early goal when a throw-in by Chris Billy went to Mark Saunders, who saw Michael Evans in the penalty area. As Billy's cross came into the box. Evans ran toward the goal, turned to receive the ball, and, from five vards, had the easiest of chances to shoot past the 'keeper for Argyle's first goal. There were only three minutes on the clock.

The goal took Preston by surprise and they stepped up their game with some quick, freeflowing, football which Arayle found difficult to contain. It is fair to say that, for most of the first half. Preston were the better team, but Argyle contained them - up

Barlow, whose introduction gave the Pilgrims better balance.

Indeed, as the second half began, Argyle looked a much brighter attacking team, but Preston were well organised and settled quickly and pushed forward to cause the Argyle defence some problems.

Richard Logan was involved with breaking up several attacks, but he was policeman-turnedpoacher when he scored Argyle's second goal on 66 minutes, firing home a right-foot shot after Preston's Finnish goalkeeper Teuvo Moilanen flapped at the ball.

Preston tried again to equalise, without success, and there was still time for Evans to go close with a dipping deflected shot before the final whistle was blown and Argyle staved top.

FOOTBALL ON TELEVISION IN the last programme. we highlighted concerns would mean a drop in attendances at grounds where the match was being shown, so a compromise was initiated by the BBC, who agreed not to reveal the match being shown until after the game.

BBC'S Match of the Day went out on Saturday evenings, with ITV's Sunday afternoons. In 1978, ITV won exclusive rights to all league football coverage (the so-called "Snatch of the Day"), but the Office of Fair Trading would the 1980-81 season, the BBC and ITV shared the Saturday evening slot on alternate seasons.

ITV did win exclusive rights in 1988, when they renamed The Big Match, simply to The Match

...The Business

FROM the 1860s, Babylon, a suburb of New York on the southern shore of Long Island, developed as a resort for New Yorkers following the opening of the Long Island Rail Road.

Hotels were built in their dozens as business boomed: one of the last in the boom period to be built, in 1882, was the Argyle Hotel. The Argyle, which had 350 rooms, was funded by the president of the railroad company and it was built in 70 acres of parkland which became known as Argyle Park, next to a pond which became known as Argyle Lake. The name is acknowledged to have come from Argyle, Scotland.

By 1885, the hotel was a success and employed a large number of staff to look after its white middle class clientele. In May that year, the headwaiter, Frank P Thompson recruited, on behalf of the hotel management, an all-black baseball team from the staff, to entertain the guests.

His team became the first professional black American baseball outfit and were named the 'Cuban Giants' even though they were neither Cuban nor Giants. It was felt a Latino name would draw larger crowds and deflect the virulent discrimination against American negroes. It was reported that the players. on the field of play, spoke to each other in gibberish to make white spectators think they were speaking in Spanish.

The black players' weekly wage was much higher than they would have been paid for their other Argyle Hotel work as waiters, porters and bellhops. Pitchers were paid \$18; infielders \$15; and outfielders \$12.

Immediately in 1885, they heavily defeated toprated clubs who fielded the best of white players playing in leagues not open to black players. In 1887, the Cuban Giants won the 'world colored championship', and remained a top attraction into the 20th



century. They toured, playing sell-out baseball exhibition matches, very much like the later Harlem Globetrotters did in basketball.

In 1887, the Cuban Giants moved away from playing on the Argyle Hotel's ground and made a new home in Trenton, New Jersey.

In Babylon, not long after, the resort's boom period ended. The Argyle Hotels bookings rarely reached a third of capacity and it closed in 1897. The timber building was dismantled in 1904 and the wood used to build 20 homes in Argyle Park.

The Cuban Giants remain a legend on Long Island and a commemorating stone was laid on the site of the Argyle Hotel in 2010 (babylonvillage.patch. com; also 'Out of the Shadows' by Bill Kirwin, 2005).

ONE the site of the 1904 demolished Argyle Hotel, in Argyle Park, Babylon, 20 houses were constructed using materials from the hotel.

In 1921, the private land of Argyle Park was donated for passive recreation to


the Village of Babylon. The park is still popular, drawing substantial numbers of visitors from outside the community for fishing, strolling, playing on the children's playground, and winter ice skating (theclio.com). Argyle Lake, Babylon is

formed by a dam across the Carlls River. It covers an area of 25 acres and has a maximum depth of four feet. Popular with fishermen, it is stocked with Brown and rainbow trout and other species include carp, yellow perch

Argyle Park also gave its name to a rock group of the same name who were featured in an 'Argyle Is...' episode during the 2014-15 season.

ACADEMY COACHES STUDY VISIT

OUR Head of Coaching Kevin Nancekivell travelled to Tottenham on a study visit for his Pro License and incorporated some CPD for our full time staff with Lead Phase Development Coach Phil Stokes; Lead Phase Foundation Coach Dan Thompson; and Dan Greenough, our Lead Sports Scientist & Academy Coach.

Our staff were able to watch the Under-21s and Under-18s training in the morning and, after some football discussions with the Spurs staff over lunch, they then observed the Under-12s, who were on school day-release, training in the afternoon. During the evening, they witnessed Tottenham Academy Under-9s-16s age groups training.

The welcome and hospitality shown to our members of staff was outstanding, matching the fantastic facilities. It was a wonderful opportunity for our coaches to fact-find and share experiences that we can then implement into our own Academy. Kevin said: "The Premier League as we all know is a multi-million pound industry; the overriding point we all took away costs nothing. The attitude, work-ethic, and overall desire to improve and learn, both as players and coaches, were exceptional."



DOUBLES from two of our promising young forwards named Alex propelled us to our first Merit League victory of the season - made more satisfying that it came against our local rivals. Alex Fletcher scored twice, either side of a Jason Vincent goal, to give the Young Greens a three-goal lead at half-time; after a brief Grecians flurry, Alex Battle scored twice to put us way beyond Exeter.

FOOTBALL clubs often employ a chaplain who is involved at all levels of their club, offering pastoral and spiritual support to people of any faith and of no faith. This could mean supporting a player with a longterm injury; aiding a voungster through the disappointment of being released; or helping with hereavement. The spiritual aspect of the chaplain's role is sometimes embraced, with coaches seeing that this dimension is important for players, whatever their faith. ARTHUR GOODE is the Argyle chaplain.

WHAT we love (and hate, and then love again) about a football season is the constant twists in the plot, and the uncertainty of the outcome. It makes it unlike most other things. A story, for instance, is a bit more predictable. In fact, it is the familiarity that we are drawn to - there is a sense of comfort in the fact that we are fairly sure the hero is going to win out, and a safety in the thrill we feel during the dangerous bit. A bit like going on the dragon rollercoaster at Legoland, terrifying in a safe way: it is on runners and follows a pre-set course that we

Into those plots, you can insert themes such as redemption, love and eternal destiny.

know will end well.

In his book 'The Seven

It's interesting that the best football matches play out like stories. Or maybe we place our story templates over what we are watching and create the stories ourselves? Maybe that is why two people can watch the same game and have

a completely different interpretation.

Obviously, we have our heroes. Usually wearing green and white. We then create villains - often the ref or an opposing player. There is nothing better to bring a game alive for the spectator than an unfair decision or a bit of bad sportsmanship. Perhaps, collectively the opposition become the monster that the heroes have to defeat? And that is the quest, or the vovage throughout the 90 minutes - perhaps there is rebirth at the end of it all, or maybe it just boils down to comedy or tragedy...

Each of the 90 minutes plays fit into a wider tale of ups and downs. The intellectuals would call this the metanarrative. Over the course of a season, there are many twists and turns that lend drama to the individual games, and the key difference to football and fiction is that no-one can predict, much less control, what will happen. Nor is it fair, consistent or certain of a good outcome.

My regular readers will both be anticipating the link with life, God or Christianity to come at this point – and there is a very obvious one. However, I would prefer to ask this question: in life do you have the view that we have a destiny that is being played out (Star Wars)? Do you feel that God determines our steps (Bruce Almighty)? Is life a quest wherein we can find redemption (The Hobbit)? Or do you think our existence is random, with no higher power exerting an influence (strangely I couldn't find a story theme to fit this scenario).

I think that stories connect with us when we find truth in them, or they become a means for us to understand the truth of our own lives and we can relate to them at some deep level Scientific research has also demonstrated that we respond well to stories - more areas of our brain become engaged and chemicals are released that create a good response from within (apologies to any scientist for my appalling summary of complex neuroscience papers).

As I wrote this piece, and got to the end, I realised that my opening would have been much more interesting if I had told a story, rather than presented opinion out of storycontext. As I sat there, my eve drawn to the deadline and with a full diary for the day, I had to accept the fact that I had no time left to redraft the column. It was what it was. But at least the final paragraph could redeem things, and there is always the next programme, so I hit save and was done with it.





YEARS AGO - 1995-96

PLAYER PROFILE Steve McCall

FORMER England Under-21 midfielder Steve McCall was twice voted Argyle's Player of the Year. After signing professional for Ipswich Town in October 1978, he made a club-record 175 consecutive firstteam appearances and was sold to Sheffield Wednesday for £300,000 in June 1987. He joined Argyle in March 1992 and helped to qualify for the Second Division play-offs in 1993-94. Briefly Argyle's playerboss, he followed Kevin Hodges back to Home Park in August 1998 after two years at Torquay United and netted six goals in 133 League games overall for Argyle. He later rejoined Ipswich as a scout and coach.

LUTON TOWN IN 1995-96

LUTON Town finished bottom of the First Division in 1995-96. The Hatters won only three of their opening 19 games and crashed to a 5-0 defeat at Stoke City. Lennie Lawrence replaced Terry Westley as manager in December and quickly plotted an eight-match unbeaten run but Luton won just two of their final 16 games.



ARGYLE were held to a disappointing draw by local rivals Exeter City at St James' Park. Neil Warnock's side dominated for long periods and took the lead with Gary Clayton's swerving 20-vard drive after nine minutes. Exeter drew level from a rare attack in the 18th minute when Mark Cooper's shot deflected off Richard Logan's outstretched leg and looped over Steve Cherry. Argyle had 21 shots on goal, Exeter just four, but player-manager Peter Fox made a string of excellent saves. Mark Came and Noel Blake were inspirational figures in the heart of Exeter's defence as the heavy surface disrupted play.

It ended Argyle's tenmatch unbeaten run and Neil Warnock branded the display "a disgrace".

POINTS

DURING half-time of last week's Europa League game between Liverpool and Manchester United, something very strange happened. Rio Ferdinand, one of BT Sport's trifecta of studio pundits for the game, referred to United as "we" when analysing the first half, accidentally referencing his support for the club. Usually, moments like that are seen as honest mistakes, made fun of on air, and quickly forgotten. This time, though, nobody batted an eyelid.

Jake Humphrey, Paul Scholes and Steve McMannaman all just looked and nodded at Rio, as if flaunting your biased opinion in that position is just par for the course. At that point, I realised we were not watching professionals. It is just an example of how the face of football punditry has changed dramatically over the last five years. By and large, unbiased and concise punditry has been usurped by big names, rash opinions and 'great banter'.

Why don't we just go back to the mid 2000s and bring back that 'FanZone' feature, where Sky brought in regular punters for an alternative commentary of big games? That feature was purposely silly and was never meant to be taken seriously, yet the sort of punditry we are offered nowadays is often as crass and ill-informed

as that which FanZone brought to the table.

Rolling out ex-players for punditry and co-commentary does make sense because of their first-hand experiences, and I totally understand that the potential draw of big names plays a big part in all of this. But what is the point if many of them do not say anything of any more worth than what you or I could chat about in the terraces?

Passion is great; passion is entertaining; but entertainment is not the sole reason for the existence of pundits. I always thought the main reason was to offer concise, knowledgeable opinions – to say something that the

viewer could not possibly know themselves, or to approach the issue from a refreshing, different angle.

Maybe all that does not actually matter to TV companies any more. Maybe a successful former player with more than a million Twitter followers is what matters most nowadays, and I can accept that.

What I cannot accept is how choosing those people takes away opportunities from explayers and journalists who do take their job seriously, do their research, and are capable of unbiased, interesting assessments of the match.

Is that too much to ask? I guess it is.

"MEMORY is a way of holding on to the things you love; the things you are; the things you never want to lose..." This season, we are recalling some of the most memorable matches of the Pilgrims' long and varied history.

ON Tuesday, March 26, 2002, Argyle travelled to Spotland to face Rochdale, who had been beaten only once at home all season.

However, Paul Sturrock's side made sure that they maintained their 21-week lead of the 2001-02 Nationwide Third Division with a come-from-behind 3-1 victory.

It was the first time a Pilarims promotionwinning side had featured substitutes, with one of the three replacements, Marino Keith, scoring. Graham Coughlan and Lee Hodges ensured Second Division football with six matches of the season to spare, the earliest in the year that the Pilgrims have been promoted.





THE Shrimps, who have played in the Football League only since their promotion from the Conference in 2007 (after beating Exeter at Wembley in the play-off final) and have been at their current ground, the Globe Arena, only since 2010.

A modern purpose-built stadium, the ground boasts an impressive cantilever main stand which can seat 2,173 and has two rows of executive boxes. The capacity of the ground is 6,476, which is made up of standing terraces behind each goal and a small terrace opposite the main stand.

The record attendance at the ground is 5,003, who came to see the local derby with Lancashire rivals Burnley in a League Cup second round tie in 2010. The record attendance at the club's previous ground, Christie Park, was 9,234 against Weymouth in a 1962 FA Cup tie.

Away end THE away end where the Green Army will be housed is a small covered terrace behind the goal at east end of the ground, cleverly called the East Terrace. This holds a capacity of 1,400 and offers an uninterrupted view for all fans because of the small, but effective, cantilever roof. Those wishing to sit are offered up to 300 seats in the east wing of the main stand.

Car-parking

PARKING at the stadium itself is reserved for permit-holders only. This being so, there is only street parking on offer which can mainly be found on the opposite side of the railway bridge from the stadium.

Local pubs

ADJACENT to the ground is a new Marston's pub called the Hurley Flyer. This also offers a car-park at £10 per car which can be refunded off food purchases. The only alternative within ten minutes walk is at the Regent Leisure Holiday Park, which is along the Westgate. If you want to catch a glimpse of the sea, there are numerous bars and pubs along the seafront which is about a 15 minute walk.

















Argyle @ Barnet Sky Bet League 2 March 1, 2016

8pm: Jordan Forster has

just gone flying into the advertising hoardings at the side of the pitch and is lying very still on the pitch. It is a horrible injury to witness and Barnet fans join in the applause as he is taken off on a stretcher. Surely those boards are too close to the pitch?

8.20pm: Now Ryan Brunt is being taken off on a stretcher in what is becoming a very costly half for Arayle. An incredible 14 minutes are added

on at the end.

9.20pm: Argyle fans are literally bouncing in the terrace - although made of steel, it feels like a trampoline at times with everyone jumping up and down on it!

9.30pm: Barnet take the lead and their fans start to make some noise for the first time this evening. Sigh.

9.50pm: Full time and Argyle lose 1-0. The Green Army applaud the team off the pitch after a harsh result and a very tough game following the early injuries that we are arguably more concerned about than the result.

2am: We are finally back in Plymouth. Tuesday night away matches are not treating us well this season!

THE top of the Premier League has become exciting again - and isn't football better for it? But are proclamations that the "Top Four Era" is over a bit premature?

We all know the situation. Leicester and Spurs are vying for top spot; it is fresh; it is exciting. In Leicester's case, especially, it means the amount of money spent on players is no longer a virtual guarantee of success. If both remain in the Champions' League spots, the "new boys" will receive extra income and, just as importantly, deny the rich usual suspects of their perennial share of the bloated Champions' League benevolent fund.

Without wishing to denigrate the efforts of either Spurs or Leicester, the enjoyment of seeing Chelsea and Manchester United spend their way to mediocrity has resulted in as much enjoyment for me as the rise of the underdog. The Germans call it schadenfreude.

I have really enjoyed watching Manchester United's failure. A club that for so long has been ruled

so ruthlessly by one iron fist has become disjointed and without strategy. Like most countries where dictatorships have been removed from power. United appear to have hit a mini civil war, with bullets flying from various snipers at Old Trafford (including from said deposed dictator) and a lack of leadership from all areas at the club. Once the rulers of the world, United cannot even rule their own city (or should that be 'City'). I genuinely do not think they will be a proper power again for a long, long time.

I am confident that Chelsea on the other hand, will be restored to the top end of the table, although even that is no guarantee. Clearly there was a blip at the start of this season and the arrival of the less volatile leadership of Guus Hiddink has led to an improved form more in tune with a top-four club. You can see Chelsea doing well from here on and a few tweaks would see them there or thereabouts next season, providing there is no mass exodus of players in May following their impending relatively lowly finish.

Here is the main point. The

Stamford Bridge club is clearly not going to qualify for the Champions' League, so will their star names alert Comrade Abramovich of their intention to do the offski? I would auestion the character of players such as Eden Hazard, Diego Costa and Cesc Fabregas, who seem to leave their clubs when the going gets tough. This is fine, but how easy will it be to replace these players with those of equal or better ability. I will add John Terry to the list of outgoing players. I would suggest this will be more difficult.

I would hope that the new manager is given the time needed to rebuild the team. History would suggest not, though. I would think that their churn of managers may not be the best policy if the team is to need its biggest overhaul in a generation.

So where does that leave Leicester and Spurs? Well, Spurs have a fantastic defence and a well-balanced midfield full of flair and tenacity; in attack, they are wholly reliant on Harry Kane and one hopes for their

sake (and England's) that he can stay in form and injury-free.

Ditto Jamie Vardy for Leicester, whose pace and ability to win free-kicks and penalties remains a threat to everyone, whilst Kante, Mahrez and Drinkwater have been brilliant in midfield and the defence have been solid all season. Who would have thought that Danny Simpson, Robert Huth, Wes Morgan and Christian Fuchs would be a titlechasing back four?

Whatever the season holds, one hopes that the usual "fat cats" do not break up either team.



Despite having a largely up and down season, the Hatters find themselves in 13th place in the division. having won four of their last five matches.

up once again to nearly spoil the party, but former Pilgrim Olly Lee had the last say, scoring in the 92nd minute to steal a 3-2 win and claim all three points.

Confidence was oozing through the side, and Marriott demonstrated what confidence can do as he scored the only goal in Luton's subsequent home game against Morecambe - his 11th of the season to make it three wins from three.


Three became four in a relatively local derby, as Luton travelled the short distance into London to play Leyton Orient. Kevin Nolan's side have struggled at home, and that proved the same again as Marriott scored a beautiful lob to leave with Luton with the bragging rights for another year.



Another loanee, ALAN SHEEHAN from Bradford City, has been filling in at centre-back alongside Cuthbert as well as midfield, as has JONATHAN SMITH, who is usually a holding midfielder, Full-back DANIEL POTTS has come back into the side this month after not playing since October, whilst STEPHEN O'DONNELL and JAKE HOWELLS are used more often defensively. PELLY RUDDOCK MPANZU played in today's reverse fixture but has struggled with injuries all season, whilst former Celtic midfielder PADDY McCOURT is a dangerous option. ALEX LAWLESS has been at Luton since 2010; DANIEL GREEN has contributed five goals to Town's cause this season; and winger RYAN HALL has played ten times; whilst NATHAN DOYLE is a more defensive-minded midfielder. Thirty-six yearold PAUL BENSON has not played since mid February, whilst Charlton Athletic loanee JOE PIGOTT played against Argyle last season for Southend United.

Scott Cuthbert



Born: June 15, 1987 Alexandria

PART of the Celtic set-up since 1998. Cuthbert was a stand-out talent in the youth ranks of the Scottish giants, captaining both their Under-19 and reserve sides. Despite this, the commanding centre-back was unable to break into Celtic's first team, making his professional for Hibernian instead during a short loan spell in 2006. Then came a season-long loan at St Mirren that ran until the end of his initial contract and, when Celtic chose not to extend his deal, Scott headed south to sign for Swindon Town. His first season with the Robins saw him play 48 times, with one of the games coming at Wembley Stadium as they reached the League 1 play-off final. Town lost that match, however, and were relegated to League 2 the following season, leading to a move to Levton Orient in 2011. Winning the club's Player of the Year award in his first season at Brisbane Road, the defender made 160 appearances for Orient before experiencing another relegation to League 2 and heading to Luton last year.



Olly Lee



Born: July 11, 1991 Hornchurch

OLLY'S time with Argyle may have been fairly short, but it included its fair share of eye-catching moments. The central midfielder joined the Pilgrims on loan from Birmingham City towards the end of last season and played 15 times. After a headed goal against Hartlepool United in a 3-1 defeat, Lee was sent off during a 3-1 victory of Argyle's own, against Exeter City. Despite a three-match suspension. Lee's loan was extended until the end of the season, during which time he scored a superb goal in an Easter Monday defeat to Portsmouth at Fratton Park. A cultured player with an eye for goal, Olly began his career with West Ham United, and played for Dagenham & Redbridge, Barnet and Gillingham before joining Birmingham in 2013. Whilst he missed today's reverse fixture earlier this season. Lee has been a regular in the Luton's midfield since signing for the Hatters last August, with his goals against both Hartlepool and York coming in the form of brilliant long-range strikes.

Cameron McGeehan




Born: April 6, 1995 Kingston-upon-Thames

ONE of the most naturally gifted players in Sky Bet League 2, McGeehan's ability may be hard to channel consistently, but he remains a key threat for Luton. After spending time in the youth academies of both Fulham and Chelsea as a teenager, Cameron joined Norwich in 2011 and scored a pair of penalties in the two-legged FA Youth Cup final, captaining the Canaries to victory. A Northern Ireland international at three youth levels and with half a chance of boarding the plane to France with his country this summer, McGeehan scored nine goals in League 2 last season in three different loan spells, including a stint with Cambridge United that consisted of four league games, a goalless draw against Manchester United in the FA Cup, three goals, and a red card. The other two loans were with Luton, where he showed enough promise to be signed by the Hatters for a six-figure fee last summer. With ten goals to his this name campaign, the attacking midfielder is well on his way to paying back that transfer fee.



Jack Marriott



Born: September 9, 1994 Beverley

MARRIOTT currently shares top goal-scorer honours this season with McGeehan, having also taken his goals tally into double figures, including the only goals in wins over Leyton Orient and Morecambe this month. After beginning the season as an impact substitute, Marriott forced his way into Luton's starting line-up in October and has rarely been out of it since, scoring in wins over AFC Wimbledon, York City and Hartlepool United. The 21-year old joined the Bedfordshire side at the beginning of this season, ending a six-year affiliation with Ipswich Town that consisted of three times as many loan moves as it did firstteam league games. A spell with Conference side Woking in 2013 saw Marriott net eight times in seven games, including a hat-trick in an FA Trophy tie, leading to spells with Football League clubs Colchester United, Gillingham and Carlisle United. He still went back to Woking on two occasions in 2014 and 2015, though, and 18 of the 19 goals Jack scored in his loan spells were for the Cardinals.



Craig Mackail-Smith



Born: February 25, 1984 Watford

A FOOTBALL League veteran with a goalscoring history, the Scotland international has made more than 100 appearances for three different clubs. Alongside the likes of Aaron McLean, Mackail-Smith was an integral part of Peterborough United's rise from League 2 to the Championship between 2008-2011. In the 2010-11 campaign. Craig scored 35 goals in all competitions, making him the leading goalscorer in England that season, the final strike coming in a 3-0 win over Huddersfield Town that clinched promotion to the second tier. Ninety-nine goals in 212 games for the Posh have made him a Peterborough icon, but before that, Craig showed his talent at Dagenham & Redbridge, scoring 38 goals in 108 league appearances, all in the Conference Premier. Brighton & Hove Albion are the other club that Londoner reached the century mark of appearances for between 2011-2015, reaching double figures for goals in his first two seasons at the Amex Stadium before signing a two-year deal with Luton, reuniting with former manager John Still

TODAY'S Luton Town club crest is a variation of the Luton coat of arms, most notably with a straw boater above the shield instead of an extended arm. The first badge to appear on the shint came in 1892 and consisted of a rather curious and simple eight-pointed star.

IN 1985, Luton replaced their grass pitch with an all-weather artificial surface at a cost of £410,000. Games often resulted in the ball bouncing much more than usual and players receiving painful friction burns when attempting sliding tackles. The club returned to playing on real grass in 1992.



LUTON were initially based at Dallow Lane until 1897; it was so close to the Luton-to-Dunstable railway line that players often complained they could not see across the pitch because of the smoke coming from the trains.



AS part of a rebranding of the club in 1973, a new crest was designed which featured an orange football with the letters "Lt" on it and the words "Luton Town Football Club" in a circular fashion around the edge.



On Easter Monday, April 13, 1936, Joe Payne was drafted in to play as centreforward in a home match against Bristol Rovers. He had never played that position before but managed to put the ball in the net ten times in a 12-0 win for the Hatters, an individual Football League record which still stands today. Needless to say, Payne played centre-forward for the rest of his career and a lounge at Kenilworth Road is named in his honour.

IN 1891, Luton were the first club in southern England to turn fully professional; three years later, they were founder members of the Southern League and finished runnersup in each of their first two seasons.

LUTON moved to their current home of Kenilworth Road, which currently has an all-seater capacity of 10,356, in 1905.

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO THE LIKELY LADS?

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS profiles ten big-name Luton Town players not usually associated with the club



RON DAVIES (above) NOTED for his aerial ability, Welsh international striker Ron Davies was capped 29 times after leaving Luton Town. After signing professional for Chester in July 1959, he was twice leading marksman before moving to Luton in October 1962. He was top scorer in 1962-63. netting 21 goals in 32 League games before ioining Norwich City in September 1963. After moving to Southampton in August 1966, he topped their goalscoring charts three times before joining Portsmouth in April 1973. Later with Manchester United, Arcadia Shepherds, LA Aztecs, Tulsa Roughnecks and Seattle Sounders, he coached in the United States and died in May 2013.

DEREK KEVAN INSIDE-LEFT Derek Kevan was capped 14 times by England before joining Luton Town Initially with Ripon YMCA, he joined Bradford Park Avenue in October 1952 and followed Vic Buckingham to West Brom in July 1953. 'The Tank' was twice ever-present and top scorer on five occasions before moving to Chelsea in March 1963. Later with Manchester City, Crystal Palace and Peterborough, he joined Luton in December 1966 and netted four goals in 11

League games. He moved to Stockport in March 1967, then Macclesfield. Boston United and Stourbridge, Later a driver for Signs Specialists in Hockley, he died in January 2013.

ALAN BIRCHENALL

FORMER England Under-23 midfielder Alan Birchenall briefly appeared for Luton Town in 1978-79. After signing professional for Sheffield United in June 1963, he joined Chelsea for £100,000 in November 1967 and moved, via Crystal Palace, to Leicester City in September 1971. He featured in their 1973-74 FA Cup run, then played for Notts County, San Jose Earthquakes, Memphis Rogues and Blackburn Rovers before joining Luton in March 1979. After making ten League appearances, he moved to Hereford United in October 1979, then had a spell as Trowbridge Town's player-boss. becoming Leicester's public relations officer.

COLIN TODD

EX-ENGLAND international central defender Colin Todd appeared for Luton Town in 1984-85. Initially with Sunderland, he moved to Derby County in February 1971, starring as they won the League Championship in 1971-72 and 1974-75, when he was PFA Player of the Year. He joined Everton in September 1978, then played for Birmingham City and Nottingham Forest. After reuniting with Jim Smith at Oxford United in February 1984, he helped them clinch the Third Division title and moved to Luton in October 1984, playing two League games. He later



managed Middlesbrough, Bolton Wanderers. Swindon Town, Derby County and Bradford City.



STEVE WILLIAMS (above) **FORMER England** international midfielder Steve Williams was capped six times before joining Luton Town. After signing professional for Southampton in July 1976, he starred as they won promotion in 1977-78. were League Cup finalists in 1979, and League Championship runnersup in 1983-84. He joined Arsenal for £525,000 in December 1984 and featured in their 1987 League Cup final triumph before moving to Luton for £300,000 in July 1988. After scoring once in 40 League games, he reunited with Alan Ball at Exeter City in August 1991. He has worked in magazine publishing and property development after settling in Ottery St Mary.

JOHN HARTSON (opposite) WELSH international striker John Hartson helped Luton Town reach the FA Cup semi-final in 1993-94. After signing professional for Luton in December 1992, he netted 11 goals in 54 League games before sold to Arsenal for £2.5m in January 1995. He scored in the 1995 European Cup-Winners' Cup final before moving to West Ham for £3.2m in February 1997. After being Hammers' leading marksman in 1997-98, he joined Wimbledon for £7m in January 1999 and had a spell with Coventry City prior to Joining Celtic in August 2001. He starred in their 2001-02 Treble triumph and joined West Brom for

£500,000 in July 2006 after gaining a total of 51 caps.

MERVYN DAY

LUTON Town's former loan goalkeeper Mervyn Day starred in West Ham's 1975 FA Cup final success. The England Under-23 international was twice ever-present for the Hammers and played in the 1976 European Cup-Winners' Cup final before moving to Orient in July 1979. He was ever-present three times prior to joining Aston Villa in May 1983. then joined Leeds United in February 1985 and helped them win the Second Division title in 1989-90 Loaned to Luton in March 1992, he made four League appearances. After joining Carlisle United in July 1993, he became their manager. then assisted Alan Curbishley at Charlton and West Ham before returning to Leeds as chief scout.

PAUL DICKOV (below) LUTON Town's former Ioan striker Paul Dickov was capped by Scotland. After signing professional for Arsenal in December 1990, he was loaned to Luton in October 1993 and scored once in 15 League games. A member of the Gunners' triumphant 1994 European Cup-Winners' Cup squad, he moved to Manchester City for £1m in August 1996. After starring in three promotion campaigns, he joined Leicester City in February 2002 and was leading scorer in their 2002-03 promotion



success. He then appeared for Blackburn Rovers, Manchester City again. Leicester again and Leeds United, and has since managed Oldham Athletic and Doncaster Rovers.

PAUL ALLEN

FORMER England Under-21 midfielder Paul Allen had a loan spell at Luton Town in 1994-95. From a notable football family, he signed professional for West Ham in July 1979 and was the youngest FA Cup finalist at 17 years 256 days in their 1980 Wembley triumph. He moved to Tottenham Hotspur for £400,000 in June 1985 and was an FA Cup winner again in 1991. After joining Southampton for £500,000 in September 1993, he was loaned to Luton in December 1994 and made four League appearances. He moved to Swindon Town in October

1995. He later played for Bristol City, Millwall and Purfleet and currently

works for the PFA.

MATTHEW UPSON (above) FORMER Luton Town central defender Matthew Upson gained 21 England caps. After signing professional for Luton Town in April 1996, he made his only League appearance for the Hatters as a substitute in their 1-0 win over Rotherham four months later and joined Arsenal for £1m in May 1997. He featured in their 1997-98 Premier League title campaign and was a member of the 2001-02 Double-winning squad. Aftre being loaned to several clubs, he moved to Birmingham City for £2m in January 2003, then joined West Ham for £6m in January 2007. He has since played for Stoke City, Brighton, Leicester City and MK Dons.



NEWS IN 2

ARGYLE'S promotion rivals Accrington Stanley and Wycombe Wanderers fought out a 1-1 draw at the Wham Stadium on Wednesday.

Stanley's Shay McCartan followed his late winner over the Pilgrims last week by putting the home side ahead in first-half stoppage time, However, Chairboy Garry Thompson levelled just after the hour to lift the visitors into seventh place in Sky Bet League 2. Accrington remain in fifth, two places and four points behind Argyle.

On Tuesday, Kemar Roofe netted a first hat-trick of his 25-goal season as second-placed Oxford United made light work of struggling Dagenham & Redbridge. The midfielder broke the deadlock with a right-footed finish, after combining with former Pilgrim Alex MacDonald, and doubled the lead after the break by running on to George Waring's pass. MacDonald headed in number three and Roofe completed his treble late on for the second-placed U's. Dagenham are nine points adrift of safety at the bottom of the table With nine games remaining.

Hartlepool United extended their unbeaten run to three games and

moved eight points clear of the relegation zone after a goalless draw at Newport, who moved up to 17th in the table and are 14 points clear of the drop zone.

Last Saturday, Jimmy Spencer's last-gasp strike denied leaders Northampton Town maximum points against Cambridge United. Northampton broke the deadlock after 71 minutes at Sixfields when John Marquis converted a corner from Joel Byrom, but Spencer lashed in a halfvolley in time added on to earn the visitors a point.

At the Kassam Stadium, Leyton Orient took a deserved 74th-minute lead over Oxford when the ball fell kindly for Jobi McAnuff to slot home. The O's were reduced to 10 men in stoppage time when Mathieu Baudry was sent off but Kevin Nolan's men held on and are a spot outside the play-off places.



Portsmouth slipped to sixth after a surprise 3-0 defeat at home to Newport. Darren Jones pounced on a mistake from Pompey goalkeeper Ryan Fulton to open the scoring and, after Gary Roberts was shown a second vellow card for simulation, Scott Boden and Dean Morgan wrapped up a shock victory.

That defeat allowed Bristol Rovers to move above Paul Cook's men into fourth place. Matt Taylor's 20th goal of the season enough for Rovers to see off Mansfield 1-0 at the Memorial Stadium.

Dagenham & Redbridge were beaten 3-1 at Hartlepool, Billy Paynter opened the scoring for Pools from the penalty spot in the fourth minute and Jake Carroll's free-kick doubled their advantage after 12 minutes. Dagenham pulled a goal back through Matt Cash's 30-yard half-volley but Hartlepool extended their lead through Jake Gray's angled finish.

York are seven points adrift after a 1-1 draw at home to Barnet. Ex-Pilgrim Lewis Alessandra, signed on loan from Rochdale, tapped in for York but the Bees equalised through John Akinde.



Yeovil Town's resurgence continued as they edged past Notts County with a 1-0 victory, Francois Zoko's header proving the difference against his former club.

TANNER POSTS HALF-CENTURY AS HONOURS ARE SHARED

ARGYLE made three changes from the side defeated 1-0 at Barnet during the previous week: Kelvin Mellor and Gregg Wylde instead of Jordon Forster and Rvan Brunt. who were injured at the Hive, while Ben Purrington was given his first league start of the campaign as a replacement for Oscar Threlkeld. who suffered a post-game hamstring strain.

Purrington became the 19th player to start a league match for the Pilgrims this season, following seven previous appearances from the substitutes' bench; his only previous start had come in the home Johnstone's Paint Trophy victory over his native Exeter in October.

Sixteen-year-old apprentice Jordan

Bentley was named as one of the Pilgrims six substitutes, becoming the 29th player to feature in a Pilgrims' match-day squad this season - one of those was his older brother Aaron, who has since been released by the club.

Argyle's opening goal was Curtis Nelson's second of the campaign, following his late equaliser at home to Leyton Orient in November. Jake Jervis provided the assist, meaning he has either scored or assisted in 29% of all Argyle goals this season.

The Pilgrims' second goal was Craig Tanner's sixth strike of the season in all competitions and the 50th scored by an Argyle player in Sky Bet League 2 this season - 13 players have shared the half-century.

WE were hugely disappointed in the manner we lost the game at Accrington last weekend. It was a sickening blow for everyone.

It gives him the benefit of coming here and trying to get some first-team football. He will probably have looked at the likes of Boateng, Threlkeld and Tanner, who are younger players, like himself, and have all come in and benefited from that.

We need a wee bit of presence up front and

Jamille gives us that, a wee bit of height and work-ethic; he gives us something different in the forward area. He is a target man and sometimes we will have to play that way.

Vincent goes in to compete with James Bittner because obviously, Luke McCormick is our number one, and is the best goalkeeper in the league, and James has found it difficult to get in front of him.

We welcome them to Home Park, and the same applies to Luton Town this afternoon, their manager Nathan Jones, his staff and players, and the officials and supporters of the club

Two players were everpresent throughout the Pilgrims' 45 matches across three competitions: Bryce Fulton and Johnny Williams. Wilf Carter was leading scorer, with 20 goals.
