

The effort, commitment and the right attitude were all in place and you cannot fault the attitude and desire of this current group of players.


These notes are being written before our away trip to Exeter, but we have a few people now returning from injury and a few young lads will be getting starts to give them a small step on the ladder.



Other members in attendance today that have qualified for the "92-pin" are Trond Brenna (Manchester United), Odd Hanstvedt (Arsenal), Bjarte W Hjartøy (Middlesbrough), Kjell Morten Hjartøy (Arsenal), Jan Sigurd Eike (Liverpool), Inge Haug (Ipswich Town) and Henrik M Høyer (Middlesbrough). The Bees' Press Officer WILL EVANS takes a look at three Barnet legends who never won Player of the Year

Voting for the 2015-16 Player of the Year awards is well under way, as supporters try and decide who has been the most outstanding player for the Bees this season.

The club's build up to the event has focused on winners from the past; ranging from Les Eason in 1970, to more recent Barnet legends like Lee Harrison and Giuliano Grazioli.

Our annual end of season event has honoured some fantastic players over the years, but what about the Barnet greats who never won a Player of the Year award? After all, there must have been some years where there were two or more stars in Barnet's First XI. Following a little bit of research, here are some former Bees who never won the award, despite going on to greater things....



6. Mark Gower – The creative midfielder joined Barnet from neighbours Tottenham Hotspur, having previous enjoyed a spell north of the border with Motherwell. Tony Cottee

reportedly paid £32,500 to bring Mark to the club, but his arrival wasn't enough to stop the Bees getting relegated out of the Football League at the end of the season.

Despite excelling in a relatively weak Barnet side over the next two years, the playmaker was beaten to the Player of the Year award by Wayne Purser in 2001-02 and Junior Agogo the following season. However he did pick up a 'Goal of the Season' trophy, after scoring from 35 yards during a 4-0 victory over Dagenham & Redbridge.

Mark moved to Roots Hall in 2003, and ended up winning back-to-back promotions with Southend United. He then won promotion to The Premier League with Swansea City, going on to play 21 top flight matches.



5. Darren Currie - It's hard to believe that a crowd favourite like Darren Currie was never Barnet's Player of the Year. The winger was one of the stars of John Still's Bees side from 1998 through to 2001 (when he left to

join Wycombe Wanderers for around £200,000). The good form of goalkeeper Lee Harrison and right-back Sam Stockley ensured

that Darren's efforts never resulted in end-ofseason recognition, but he was nonetheless held in high esteem by the majority of Barnet fans.

'Dazza' made of total of 141 appearances in a black and amber shirt, scoring 22 goals in all competitions. He went on to play in The Championship with Brighton & Hove Albion, Ipswich Town, Derby County and Coventry City, and is now a coach at Dagenham & Redbridge.



4. Albert Adomah - Plucked from Isthmian League Harrow Borough by Paul Fairclough, Albert is arguably the best Bees player since the turn of the century - although fans of Giuliano Grazioli, Nicky Bailey and

John Akinde may well disagree! It is therefore quite remarkable that the tricky winger wasn't a Player of the Year winner during his three seasons at the club.

The Supporters' Association did honour Albert with a 'Young Player of the Year' award, but Joe Devera, John O'Flynn and Jake Cole were all selected ahead of the midfielder when it came to the top prizes in 2008, 2009 and 2010.

After playing 120 times for Barnet, the Ghanaian international moved to Championship side Bristol City for £150,000 (set by a tribunal). He played at the 2014 World Cup with the Black Stars and is now a first team regular for Middlesbrough. With 'Boro' flying high in the second tier this season, Albert could be set to join an elite group of former Bees who have played Premier League football.

This season's Player of the Year awards will take place after the Leyton Orient game on Saturday 9th April. I'll be looking at three more Barnet legends who never won the award, in the programme for that match.

Until then, enjoy this afternoon's match. Come on you Bees!

All good things come to an end, they say, so after two years with the company I'm moving on to pastures new.

This has been a bit of a weird season for me. As readers of this column and followers of the Barnet Bee Twitter feed will know, the decision was taken not to send someone - namely me - to Bees games in December.

I've done my best to give this club the coverage it deserves since but I've been offered the opportunity to join a brand-new sport-only newspaper in Watford called WD Sport. It would have been an even harder decision to make than it already was if I was still covering the Bees because nothing beats following a club up and down the country, living the highs and the lows.

It's been said in this column before but the 2014-15 promotion is something I'll never forget. It was my first full season of being assigned to a club and I couldn't have had a more enjoyable experience.

If anything it set my expectations too high! Nothing will ever match a season which started with a 5-0 away win in glorious sunshine and ended with a return to The Football League, a record-breaking third Conference title and a pitch invasion.

He has bent over backwards to help me, even after I said the Times Series wouldn't be covering the club as forensically as they had been.

Again, in a lot of ways, I've been spoiled. To be able to ring Martin or come and visit him at The Hive before training to pick his brains is a luxury and a privilege not afforded to journalists covering clubs further up the football pyramid.

It saddens me the Bees haven't got a reporter assigned to them to provide proper, in-depth beat coverage. As a Football League club they really should.

And that isn't a criticism of Newsquest - they were the last to pull the plug - just an observation about the precarious position of local print media.

On a separate note, what a good season it's been. I'm sure those more learned about all matters black and amber could say but I couldn't tell you when Barnet were last safe this early in the season.

In their first season back in The Football League that is a real achievement for the Bees, made all the more impressive by the number of injuries suffered and the number of things which have gone against Barnet this year.


For the first time in a long time there is a solid platform to build from. Who knows where the club can progress from there, especially with the young players coming through.

BARNET O OXFORD UNITED & (OTDOWNS) (IN DESIGN)






The Bees and Oxford United both had numerous opportunities to forge a lead but found both 'keepers in fine form and it was no surprise that the game was scoreless at half-time.

However once the visitors established an advantage early on in the second period, they increasingly assumed the mantle of a team that look well set to win automatic promotion.


The good away support made this the second best attendance of the season, the highest being the game against AFC Wimbledon (3,289)

WHAT'S THE BUZZZ WITH JOSH PALMER



The feature that is the ultimate guide to where ex-Bees are now playing and issues far and wide in the world of football



Former Bee **Micah Hyde** (pictured) has recently signed for Hertfordshire non-league outfit **Ware FC**. The now 41-year-old midfielder player 41 times, scoring one

goal for us, during the 2009-10 season. He also made over 100 appearances for **Cambridge United**, scoring 15 goals during the mid-90s, including a short loan spell at **Euran Pallo** in Finland. He also went on to make over 260 appearances for **Watford**, and over 100 for **Burnley**, before switching to **Peterborough United**, then going to **Woking** for a short period before joining us. He left the Bees after just one season, before going to **Billericay Town**, **Aveley** and **St Albans City**, where he retired at the end of the 2011-12 campaign. He recently came out of retirement and joined Ware after almost $3\frac{1}{12}$ years out of the game.

Having scored twice early on in the game against a newly promoted AFC
Bournemouth side last weekend,
Tottenham Hotspur striker Harry Kane
has said that he wants to break Premier
League record holder Alan Shearer's
goalscoring record. Having scored twice in
the 3-0 win at White Hart Lane, both in the
first quarter of an hour of the game, he is
now on 21 goals; having now scored 20 plus
goals in two successive seasons, becoming
just the fifth English player to do so. Beating
Shearer's record of 260 Premier League
goals is what the 22 year old is aiming for,
and he has already, in all, scored 45.

George Waring, of Stoke City, has extended his loan spell at last week's opponents Oxford United. The 21-year-old, who initially joined at the end of February on a short one month loan deal, will now stay at the Kassam Stadium until the end of the current season. During his initial spell, the forward had made seven appearances for the U's, including their game against us last week, and their high scoring match against Dagenham and Redbridge several days earlier. His new deal will see him be able to

play in his side's Johnstones Paint Trophy final next Sunday, coincidently against Barnsley, the club that he spent much of the second half of last season on loan at.

In a run of bad results in a dire campaign, bottom end of the table strugglers Notts

County have sacked their manager Jamie

Fullarton, despite the Scot being in charge for just 69 days. The former St Mirren, SC

Bastia and Crystal Palace midfielder took over the Nottinghamshire club at the start of the year, after Dutchman Ricardo Moniz, previously a skills coach at Tottenham, was sacked late on at the end of last year. The 41 year old leaves the club without a home win since early December, and they are now on an unwanted seven game streak without a victory, and in 19th place, 13 points away from the relegation zone.

Having been appointed shortly after Fullarton had been sacked, Mark Cooper is the new boss at **Notts County.** Having played for no fewer than 17 different clubs during his playing career, one of them on two occasions, Cooper makes Meadow lane his seventh stadium to call home as a manager. After Fullarton had been sacked after Saturdays disappointing 4-1 home defeat at the hands of Exeter City, Cooper has been handed a contract until the end of this season. The contract has a clause, however, that if he successfully manages to pick up a previously agreed number of points between now and the end of the season, he will automatically receive a permanent contract.

Michael Coulson of York City has agreed a deal to take him north of the boarder to Scottish Premiership side St Johnstone. Having signed from Grimsby Town in 2012, he went on to make over 100 appearances for the Minstermen, and has now joined the Perth side on a two year deal.

Ronnie Henry, the captain of Stevenage, has signed a new contract with the Hertfordshire club. Having come from a

footballing family, his grandfather being Tottenham Hotspur legend Ron Henry, he started out his career at his grandfather's former club, but could not break into their first team. After a short loan spell at Southend United, he spent time at Dublin City in Ireland, before returning to England to play for Boro, where he made 329 appearances. Having spent two seasons away at Luton Town, he rejoined Boro, playing 63 more times. He has also been involved in two promotions, two FA Trophy victories, and three play-off campaigns with the club.

Zimbabwean midfielder Bradley Pritchard has signed for **Stevenage** on loan from his current club **Leyton Orient.** Bradley has made 33 appearances so far this season for the East London side, scoring one goal in a 3-1 defeat to Hartlepool United, and having made 38 appearances last season for the O's after signing from nearby club **Charlton** Athletic, who he helped gain promotion to The Championship.

Last weekend saw several former Bees score goals for their new clubs. Izale McLeod scored a 35 minute equaliser for **Notts** County as they fell to a 4-1 home defeat to **Exeter City.** City took the lead after just eight minutes, but McLeod evened things out 27 minutes later. Three goals in ten minutes midway through the second half completed the scoring, with all five of the

goals being scored by different goal scorers. In form Ricky Holmes (pictured) scored a 95th minute winner for top of the league **Northampton** Town. The Cobblers, who are

running away with the league by an incredible 11 points, found themselves 2-0 down after half an hour to the 22nd placed team, seven points above the relegation zone. Having pulled one back just before half time, the Cobblers got their equaliser after 51 minutes. 10 minutes before the end of the game, Stevenage were reduced to ten men, after Fraser Franks received a red card for bringing down another former Bee Sam Hoskins. In the last minute of injury time, Holmes bagged his team's third goal, and all three points.

The highest attendance in Sky Bet League 2 so far this season was when 17,840

witnessed **Portsmouth** draw 0-0 with second placed Oxford United. At the other end of the scale, a mere 6% of that number attended bottom club Dagenham & Redbridge's trip to Lancashire to play Morecambe, a game which the Daggers subsequently lost 1-0. York City have the unwanted record this season of the longest losing streak of seven games, although it is Yeovil Town who hold the record for the longest winless run, having gone 16 games without winning a game. Northampton **Town** have both the record for the longest winning streak, 10 games, and the longest unbeaten run, of 15 games, which is still going. Carlisle United and Cambridge **United's** 4-4 draw is the highest scoring game of the campaign so far, whilst Portsmouth's 6-0 win over York City is the biggest home win. City are also on the wrong end of the biggest away win, as they lost 1-5 to promotion pushers Accrington Stanley.

Callum O'Dowda, the man who scored two of **Oxford United's** three goals against us last weekend, has admitted that he is frustrated to be missing part of the U's promotion push this weekend. He is temporarily leaving the side to link up with the **Republic of Ireland U21** side. The 20 year old is available to play for the side against Italy U21 and Lithuania U21 in their international qualifiers.



Former Barnet loanee Kyle De Silva (pictured) has recently joined Notts County. Having come through the academy at Crystal Palace, De Silva spent a decade at the

south London club, having joined when he was only 12 years old. Despite being a hot prospect at the club, the now 22-year-old could only manage seven first team appearances, making a short loan spell, where he played three games, with us back in 2013. He was released by his local side last year, but was soon snapped up by the League 2 side. It is believed that he left Palace in the first place due to injury and a loss of form.



DO YOU REMEMER THE SATURDAY COS?

CHRIS DUNLAVY highlights the plight of a Spanish team that us about to go under, and gives a few other examples of giants who are no more

Bleak tidings from Spain where Recreativo de Huelva, the nation's oldest club, is on the brink of extinction.

Founded in 1889 by Scottish doctors, Alexander Mackay and Robert Ross, to give local mine workers some physical recreation, El Decano finished eighth in La Liga in 2007 and even beat Real Madrid 3-0 at the Bernabeu.

However, two relegations and debts north of €22m have brought the club to its knees. Staff and players haven't been paid all season and without fresh investment, the end is nigh. Hope remains. An offer of €1 tickets saw supporters flock to Saturday's game and the plight of Huelva has received international headlines. If a sugar daddy is listening, they may just avoid joining a list of great names who were consigned to history.

Third Lanark

Founded by a group of soldiers in 1872, the Thirds (or the Hi Hi, as they became known) were one of Scottish football's early powerhouses.

League champions in 1903-04, Lanark spent the majority of their 95-year existence in the top flight and in 1960-61 notched 100 goals to finish third behind Rangers and Celtic. The following season brought their first - and only - European appearance against French side Rouen. Alas, it would prove the summit of a slippery slope. Six years later, Scottish football was saying goodbye to the Hi Hi after a bit power struggle resulted in liquidators being called in. "I was the last player they ever sold," said George Fyfe. "They told me I was sold for £5,000 so I got £500, my ten per cent. I was actually sold for £8,000 so I was done out of £300!" Though George and other players still meet up and the club was reborn as an amateur outfit, the glory days are gone for good.

Dukla Prague

Dukla were started by the army in 1948 and within a decade had risen to become a domestic and European powerhouse.

Cups, titles, 45 games in the European Cup - it is a measure of Dukla's prowess that they provided seven of Czechoslovakia's 11 starters in the 1962 World Cup final defeat to Brazil, including that year's Ballon d'Or winner Josef Masopust.

Yet the split from Slovakia in 1993 ended Dukla's association with the military and, with it, their wealth and power. Relegated in 1994 after winning just once all season, they ran out of money and merged with second division Portal Pribram in 1996.

Four years later, the name was taken by an amateur outfit who have since won promotion to the top flight - though technically, the club's lineage still lies with Pribram.


HFC Haarlem

Haarlem's glory days came pretty early. Dutch cups in 1902 and 1912, a solitary Eredivisie title in 1946. Yet during the seventies and eighties, Haarlem were a solid top flight side and alongside Ajax - the cradle of Dutch football. Johnny Metgod, Arthur Numan and, of course, Ruud Gullit all came through the ranks with the Randstad side, who in 1982 - powered by Gullit reached the UEFA Cup second round. Later, Dick Advocaat would cut his managerial teeth with the Roodbroeken, or Red Shorts. In 2009, in a bid to alleviate financial problems, the club announced a link-up with Ajax that would see the four-time European Cup winners loan up to four players per season. Unfortunately, it came too late - the cash ran out in January 2010 and, under Eredivisie insolvency laws, Haarlem were kicked out of professional football after 121 years.

THE ALEX JONES FILE



ALEX JONES pens an essay with Luton Town uppermost in his thoughts

LUTON

Some years ago I saw Luton play at Stamford Bridge. Then a few years later at Highbury. In between time The Hatters would win the Littlewoods Cup but more of that later. The Bees could not complain too loudly at the 2-0 defeat at Kenilworth Road last November, a sad day when both sets of fans stood silently to remember the tragic events in Paris.

FOOTBALL GROUNDS FROM THE AIR

This reference book has an impressive photo of Kenilworth Road, which shows how hemmed in the stadium is by local houses, a fact which I had forgotten as I walked through the alleys to secure my ticket last November. The executive boxes, which I first observed as a neutral in 1990, are probably unique. The article also observes how they helped bring about the membership card scheme and restrictions on the away fans, in contrast to the friendly welcome I received when booking my ticket that morning.

HAIL GUS CAESER

"The Littlewoods Cup Final that year was a disaster". Not the perspective of Hatters fans certainly, but the view of Nick Hornby. He vividly remembers Gus and the events of 24th April. "Caesar leaves it late, but when the ball is knocked into the box seven minutes from time. he miskicks so violently that he falls over: at this point he looks like someone who has won a competitition to appear as a centre half in a Wembley final, and not like a professional footballer at all, and in the ensuing chaos Danny Wilson stoops to head the ball over the line for Luton's equaliser". Some years later, when Fever Pitch was dramatised and performed at such prestigious venues as Ystradgynlais Welfare Hall and the Bull in Barnet, there was even a Gus Caesar Rap. Neither 2Pac or the Notorious BIG were moved to do this for Kelly Haag, so Gus has a claim to fame that most players can only dream of.

HE PLAYED FOR BOTH

Brian Stein was a Kenilworth Road favourite. Starting his career around the corner from here at Edgware Town, he went on to enjoy two spells at Luton, the first of which gained him England recognition. A career total of 130 goals is a handsome one and he performed productive partnerships with Mick Harford,

Paul Walsh and his brother Mark. Inevitably in 1983, Brian played on the day of the great relegation escape when David Pleat danced with such abandon. The Capetown dynasty produced Mark Stein, who himself had a spell as Barnet physio. Wikipedia also speaks of another brother who played for Barnet, by the name of Ed Stein. There are countless tales behind that statement, but Brian himself played on 40 occasions for the Bees before his retirement. I was also at Claremont Road when the late Les Sealey made a one off appearance to help deal with a Hendon injury crisis.

PAST ENCOUNTERS

The corresponding game included a nice family snap of Phil Masmuth and Jeanette Cluff. Talk of the Town has been rebranded since our first visit to Luton in December 2008. The then Hatters magazine included a page from captain Kevin Nicholls, known as Nico.The Hatters squad reminded me that Kevin Gallen played for both clubs. Also at Number 40 was listed Scott Sinclair. The future Mr Helen Flanagan was to move on to play at a much higher level. This led me to question if it was the same player or a namesake. My research has not established the facts yet. George Pilkington was returning from injury, and gave an interview assessing the season so far and revealing that his favourite song was Wonderful Tonight. He may well have given a Clapton impression at Karaoke that evening as Luton won 3-1.

NICK OWEN

There are plenty of celebrity fans, and the late Eric Morecambe was always keen to endorse Luton Town. But Nick Owen has worked tirelessly for the cause over the years. Indeed I heard the Luton Chairman give an interview which he gave for BBC Three Counties Radio during the summer. He pointed to the injuries which gave last season's campaign a disjointed look. There was further talk about relocation, but disappointingly no revelations as to what Anne Diamond was really like.





Historian LEIGH EDWARDS profile six big-name Luton players not usually associated with the club

AL. For promov

ALAN BIRCHENALL

Former England U23 forward Alan Birchenall briefly appeared for Luton Town in 1978-79. Signing professional for Sheffield United in June 1963, he joined Chelsea for £100,000 in November 1967 and moved via Crystal Palace in September 1971 when he signed for Jimmy Bloomfield's Leicester City. He featured in their 1973-74 FA Cup run, then played for Notts County, San Jose Earthquakes, Memphis Rogues and Blackburn Rovers before joining Luton in March 1979. Making ten League appearances, he

moved to Hereford United in October 1979, then had a spell as Trowbridge Town's player-boss, becoming Leicester's public relations officer.



COLIN TODD

Ex-England international central defender Colin Todd appeared for Luton Town in 1984-85. Initially with Sunderland, he moved to Derby County in February 1971, starring as they won the League Championship in 1971-72 and 1974-75, when PFA Player of the Year. He joined Everton in September 1978, then played for Birmingham City and Nottingham Forest. Reuniting with Jim Smith at Oxford United in February 1984, he helped clinch the Third Division title and moved to Luton in October 1984, playing two League

games. He later managed Middlesbrough, Bolton Wanderers, Swindon Town, Derby County and Bradford City.



STEVE WILLIAMS

Former England international midfielder Steve Williams was capped six times before joining Luton Town. Signing professional for Southampton in July 1976, he starred as they won promotion in 1977-78, were League Cup finalists in 1979 and League Championship runners-up in 1983-84. He joined Arsenal for £525,000 in December 1984 and featured in their 1987 League Cup final triumph, moving to Luton for £500,000 in July 1988. Scoring once in 40 League games, he reunited with Alan Ball at Exeter City in

August 1991. He has worked in magazine publishing and property development, settling in Ottery St Mary.



MERVYN DAY

Luton Town's former loan goalkeeper Mervyn Day starred in West Ham's 1975 FA Cup final success. The England U23 international was twice ever-present for the Hammers and played in the 1976 European Cup Winners' Cup final, he was signed by Jimmy Bloomfield's Orient in July 1979. He was ever-present three times prior to joining Aston Villa in May 1983, then joined Leeds United in February 1985 and helped win the Second Division title in 1989-90. Loaned to Luton in March 1992, he made four League

appearances. Joining Carlisle United in July 1993, he became their manager, then assisted Alan Curbishley at Charlton and West Ham. returning to Leeds as chief scout.



JOHN HARTSON

Welsh international striker John Hartson helped Luton Town reach the FA Cup semi-finals in 1993-94. Signing professional for Luton in December 1992, he netted 11 goals in 54 League games before sold to Arsenal for £2,500,000 in January 1995. He scored in the 1995 European Cup Winners' Cup final, moving to West Ham for £3,200,000 in February 1997. Leading marksman in 1997-98, he joined Wimbledon for £7,000,000 in January 1999 and had a spell with Coventry City prior to joining Celtic in

August 2001. He starred in their 2001-02 'treble' triumph and joined West Brom for \$500,000 in July 2006, gaining a total of 51 caps.



DATIT, AT.T.EN

Former England U21 midfielder Paul Allen had a loan spell at Luton Town in 1994-95. From a notable football family, he signed professional for West Ham in July 1979 and was the youngest FA Cup finalist at 17 years 256 days in their 1980 Wembley triumph. He moved to Tottenham Hotspur for £400,000 in June 1985 and was an FA Cup winner again in 1991. Joining Southampton for £500,000 in September 1993, he was loaned to Luton in December 1994 and made four League appearances. He moved to Swindon

Town in October 1995. He later played for Bristol City, Millwall and Purfleet and currently works for the PFA.

Nathan Jones: Manager

The Welshman was appointed as the successor to John Still in January. Jones was a former coach and assistant manager at Brighton, Charlton and Yeovil. He was a player at Kenilworth Road but left without making a single appearance in 1995. Following a spell in

Spain, he made over 500 appearances in total for Southend, Brighton and Yeovil. Jones achieved his UEFA Pro-Licence in 2014.

2. Stephen O'Donnell

The defender signed from Partick Thistle in the summer where he earned a reputation as a marauding right-back with a real eye for goal. He started his career as a youngster at Celtic and has played for Scotland U21s. Age 23.



3. Dan Potts

Potts joined Luton from West Ham United where he made five appearances in The Premier League. Whilst playing for The Hammers, the defender represented England at youth level whilst spending time on loan at Colchester United and Portsmouth. Age 21.

4. Jonathan Smith

The midfielder joined Luton from York in 2011 and has become a fans' favourite at Kenilworth Road. Smith began his career at Morecambe before joining Swindon, where he won The League Two title. He made over 100 appearances before joining the Hatters. Smith was named players' player of the year by his team-mates last season before signing a new three-year contract with the club in the summer. Age 29.

5. Glen Rea

The highly-rated defender who can also play in midfield signed for Luton this month from Championship Brighton. Glen made his Seagulls debut at the start of the season before joining Southend on loan until January. Age 21.

6. Scott Cuthbert

The defender arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer from Levton Orient having spent two years with the Londoners. He helped the O's reach the League One Play Off final the season before last and did the same with Swindon. Cuthbert began his career with Celtic and has been capped for Scotland B team. Age 28.

7. Alex Lawless

The midfielder joined from York in 2010, making 175 appearances for Town. Lawless played for Forest Green before signing for York. He had the disappointment of losing in three successive Play-Off finals (twice with Luton), before he helped the Hatters to The Conference title in 2015/14. Age 31.



8. Cameron McGeehan

The Hatters lured the young midfielder from Norwich City following two successful loan spells at the club. He played a key role in The Conference title campaign before re-joining last season. McGeehan began his career with Chelsea and has also spent time on loan with

Cambridge. Age 20

The hugely experienced striker signed for Luton from Swindon Town originally on loan during the 2013/14 season. His 18 goals helped the Hatters to the Conference title. A broken leg hampered his first permanent season with the club last term. Furthermore, Paul has also helped former clubs Dagenham & Redbridge and Swindon to promotion in the past. Age 36.

10. Ryan Hall

Hall joined Luton at the end of the January transfer window. The attacking midfielder has had his short spell at the club disrupted by illness and injury. Having already excelled in League Two with Southend scoring 19 goals across two seasons, Hall spent time at Rotherham before his release from the Millers. Age 28.

11. Danny Green

The attacking midfielder arrived at Luton in the summer following spells at Bishops Stortford and Dagenham. Whilst at the Daggers, Green helped them win The League Two Play-Offs, chipping in with 27 goals. He joined Charlton where he won promotion to The Championship with them. Age 27.

12. Scott Griffiths

The popular defender has spent two seasons with the club, closing in on 100 appearances. He began his professional career with Aveley before signing for Dagenham. After winning The Conference title with the Daggers, Scott joined Peterborough before winning The League Two title with Chesterfield, Age 30.



14. Jack Marriott

The talented young striker joined Luton in the summer from Ipswich Town having spent six years at Portman Road after coming through the ranks with the Tractor Boys. He only made two appearances for Ipswich in The Football League but gained valuable experience on loan at

Woking and Gillingham where he impressed. Age 21.

15. Paddy McCourt

The Northern Irish midfielder came through the ranks at Rochdale before impressing at Celtic, chipping in with some impressive goals. After winning the SPL twice, he left Scotland to join Barnsley in 2013 before joining Brighton and ending last term on loan with Notts County, Age 32,

16. Elliot Justham

Justham joined Luton from East Thurrock. The goalkeeper made a name for himself with impressive performances at the back end of last season, grasping the opportunity given to him. He made his Football League debut in a 3-2 defeat to AFC Wimbledon last February, Age 25.

17. Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu

The former West Ham United academy graduate originally joined on loan, helping Luton to The Conference title. Injury has hampered the midfielder's progress with the Hatters but he is slowly getting back to full fitness ready for the last few months of the season. Age 22.

18. Magnus Okuonghae

The commanding defender was previously on the books at Dagenham. The Nigerian began his career at Fulham before having spells at Rushden, Aldershot, St Albans and Crawley before Dagenham came calling in 2007. Following two years with the Daggers, the defender

signed for Colchester where he went onto become a fans favourite making almost 200 appearances before arriving at Kenilworth Road in the summer. Age 30.

19. Olly Lee

The midfielder was Town's 12th summer signing having spent time on loan at Plymouth last season. Lee began his career at West Ham before moving to Birmingham City. He played under former manager John Still who brought him to Luton whilst on loan at Dagenham. Age 24.

21. Jonathan Mitchell

Talented goalkeeper who signed on loan earlier this month until the end of the season from Championship side Derby. The former Newcastle United youth player signed for Derby last season and made his Rams debut against Hartlepool in The FA Cup at Hartlepool in January. Age 21.



22. Craig Mackail-Smith

Craig signed for Luton a week before the start of the new season, having trained with the Hatters during pre-season. The striker came to prominence at Dagenham before moving to Peterborough. He scored 99 goals in 212 appearances for Posh helping them win promotion

on two occasions. A move to Brighton in 2011 where he scored 10 goals in his debut season before two injury hit seasons that hampered his progress. Age 32.

23. Josh McQuoid

The striker arrived at Kenilworth Road this summer following three years at Premier League Bournemouth. That was his second stint with the Cherries in between a spell with Millwall. Whilst at Millwall, Josh was capped by Northern Ireland. He spent last season on loan at Peterborough and Coventry. Age 26.

24. Curtley Williams

The defender is in his second season at the club having joined the Hatters from Lowestoft last summer. Injury has restricted Williams to just three appearances, whilst helping the development squad win the development league title. Age 26.

25. Mark O'Brien

Irish defender Mark signed for the Hatters in pre-season making him the club's 10th signing. O'Brien came through the ranks at Derby, however injury and illness halted his progress at Pride Park. Following a return to fitness, he went out on loan to Motherwell to gain experience. Age 23.

26. Nathan Dovle

The midfielder was named supporters' player of the season last season. He signed for the Hatters in September following his release from Bradford. Nathan began his career at Derby and went onto enjoy success at Barnsley, Hull and Bradford winning promotion while at the latter two clubs. Age 29.

31. Craig King

The teenage goalkeeper signed his first professional contract in the summer having impressed last season. To enable his development. the young 'keeper was sent on loan to Ryman League side Met Police for the rest of last season. Age 18.

Luke came through the ranks at Luton and signed professional terms last season. The defender made his senior debut at the age of 16 during an FA Trophy tie. Age 19.

33. Mark Onvemah

The defender joined the Hatters from Thurrock last summer. Yet to make his debut for Luton, Mark joined Dartford on a month loan to gain experience. Age 19.

34. Isaac Gilliford

Isaac is a young attacking midfielder who reached double figures for the youth team last season, which led to him being rewarded with his first professional contract with his hometown club. Age 19.

35. Zane Banton

Zane came through the ranks at Luton and was snapped up on a professional contract after impressing in their Conference title winning season. The striker spent time on loan at Biggleswade Town and Hemel Hempstead to gain experience. Age 19.

36. James Justin

The defender signed a professional contract with the club this season. Justin first joined his hometown club in 2005. Age 18.

37. Frankie Musonda

Frankie joined the club in 2006 and signed professional terms this season. Age 18.

40. Jake Howells

The experienced midfielder came through the ranks at Luton. Jake surpassed the 300-appearance mark for the club last season aged just 23, scoring eight times in the club's promotion winning season.

44. Alan Sheehan


HOPES FOR THIS SEASON

Lifelong Barnet FC follower ALAN HALL curates this feature that looks back at an event on this very day in the history of the Bees

28th March 1992 Final Score: Barnet 3, Rochdale 0 BEES STRIVE FOR PLAY-OFF PLACE

The Bees faced a stern test on 28th March 1992 as they came up against fellow Play-Off contenders Rochdale in a Barclays League Division 4 (now league 2) game at Underhill. Rochdale were going well in the league lying in 6th position on 61 points with a team that was an interesting blend of youth and experience comprising the likes of 19 year old Paul Butler, who would go on to play in The Premiership with Wolves, and Steve Doyle who had over 500 league appearances under his belt. The Bees were boosted by the return of Duncan Horton and Mark Carter both of whom missed the previous league game against Burnley due to injury. Before Christmas, the Bees had been top of the league but six defeats since the New Year had modified expectations so a play-off place was now a more realistic target with the Bees sliding to 5th position on 62 points. This game was a genuine six pointer.

The Bees, playing up the slope in the first half, got the crowd of 3,099 jumping with joy with a magical goal after just ten minutes. It started on the edge of the Bees' penalty area with Harry Willis feeding the ball wide to Paul Showler who passed it up the left touchline, beyond half way, to Geoff Cooper. Cooper took a touch before curling the ball with the outside of his right foot to Willis who had sprinted 60 yards to get to the edge of the Rochdale box. Willis squared the ball first time, with his left foot, to find Gary Bull in the 'D'. Bull, racing up the pitch at full throttle, volleyed the ball into the top right corner of the net without breaking his stride. Kevin Rose in the 'Dale goal barely flinched. It was an unstoppable shot from breath-taking build up play.

The Bees second goal, on 21 minutes, came after more good work on the left wing by Showler. He totally bemused 'Dale's right back, with his trickery at the corner flag, before crossing to the far post where Carter out jumped the defence to head home from six yards.

Rochdale were having difficulty making any impact on the game and so they resorted to breaking up play with spoiling tactics. A number of very physical challenges went unpunished as they tried to contain the score, and that worked, although Rochdale were to gift the Bees a third goal in the second half when a cross from Showler was only half cleared. The ball fell kindly to Bees' substitute Derek Payne, who had recently returned from a loan spell at Enfield, and he headed it back into the box where Butler used his forearm to clear the danger. Referee Alan Gunn, who would be appointed to the inaugural Premier League referees list the next season, had no hesitation in pointing to the spot and Bull had no hesitation in driving the penalty into the top left-hand corner of the net.



After the game Bees' manager Barry Fry (pictured) could barely contain his delight, 'a superb performance, the score-line could have been more' to which he added 'our first goal was as good as anything you are likely to see'. He was spot on; the goal was a stunner. This was a vital three points that eventually got the Bees into a play-off place finishing with 69 points at the expense of Rochdale who missed out with 67.

The Bees lined up: Pape, Wilson, Cooper, Bodley, Howell, Horton, Willis (Hunt), Hoddle (Payne), Showler, Carter, Bull. Manager: Barry Fry

Postscript: Rochdale hold the record of playing 36 consecutive seasons in the same division without being promoted or relegated. Between 1974 and 2010 Rochdale played exclusively in the basement division of The Football League and, in addition, they hold the record of being the longest serving members of The Football League who have not risen higher than League 1; a record of 88 years that they share with Hartlepool United. However, since 2010 life at Spotland has got a lot more exciting with Rochdale getting promoted to League 1 in 2010, relegated back to League 2 in 2012 and then promoted again in 2014.

FOOTBALL PROGRAMMES & MEMORABILIA

PAUL MATZ writes about the value and history of football memorabilia, including items of interest to Barnet and Luton Town fans



FINCHLEY v BARNET 1946-47

First up is a 70-year old programme from the game played for the Mather Cup on 31st August 1946, and was the opening of the new playing pitch. All proceeds went to the Finchley Memorial Hospital. The auctioneers estimate was \$60-\$80 but the

programme remained unsold.

COLLECTION OF 240+ PROGRAMMES

12 Barnet programmes were included in this lot, which covered the period 1953-2013. The description also revealed that there were 40+ Arsenal, 16 from Aldershot, 6 of Cambridge (didn't say whether they were United or City), 30 from Cardiff City and approximately 140 Everton homes, 30 x Cardiff. We were also advised that some of the programmes were from the early/mid/late 1950s, there were some from the 1960s but the majority were more recent. Condition was described as "Generally good". The estimate was \$20-\$25 and the lot was sold for \$30, only 12 pence per programme.



LUTON TOWN v LEICESTER CITY 1940

The last lot may have been a bargain but this item had a somewhat different result. A single sheet Luton home programme from the Football League South match played on 12 October 1940. It was described as having a, slight fold, and in "Good" condition. The programme sold for £200.

after an initial estimate of £70-£75.



FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION XI v CIVIL DEFENCE XI 1943-44

Another fascinating wartime programme was from this match played at Luton on 27 November 1943. Amongst the stars listed to play that day for the FA XI were Charlie Mitten from Manchester

United, Eddie Hapgood (Arsenal & RAF), and Hugh Billington (Luton Town & The Army). Billington was very much a rising star before war broke out. He made his league début for Luton at Tranmere Rovers on 5 November 1938, scoring twice as Luton won 3–2. He finished that season with 28 league goals from just 27 Division Two matches, which made him the division's top scorer. He scored regularly for Luton when he was able to resume his career, before being transferred to Chelsea for £8,000 in 1948. After three years with Chelsea, he spent a season with Worcester City before retiring. The programme sold for £60, probably the reserve, as it was estimated at £70-£90.

44 LUTON HOME PROGRAMMES

In contrast to the prices paid for the two previous items, a buyer could not be found for a batch of approximately 44 Luton home programmes from 1955 to 2009. Described as being, "generally good" condition and mainly from the 1970s and 1980s, the lot also included issues against West Bromwich Albion from 1955-56 and Aston Villa in 1956-57. With a reserve of just £12-£15, a ten pound note could have secured this lot.



HEADINGTON UNITED RESERVES v LUTON TOWN 'A'

The last programme for this article is from the Metropolitan League Cup semi-final played on 22nd March 1952. Described as "Generally good", a single bid of \$38 won this programme, which had an estimate of \$50-\$60.

THE RECKLESS CUIDE TO MORECAMBE



The call of the sea-side is heard once more

Brief Directions by Road: A bit of a trek this one! We take the M1 onto the M6. Exit the M6 at its junction 34(A683) and head towards and into Lancaster. Stay on the one way system in Lancaster and look out for the A589 from Lancaster into Morecambe. Cross over the river and then look out for the splendid sight that is Lancaster Castle on your left on top of a hill. These guides offer so much more than dodgy directions or bogus bus routes - consider the culture and the beauty of England and indeed its very history, its heritage.

Go straight over two large roundabouts on the second of which you will find one of those appalling drive through Chavburger joints. At the third roundabout, called the Shrimp Roundabout, take the first exit into Westgate Road (signposted West Promenade). Go past the Fire Station on your right and after about a mile you will see the Globe Stadium also on your right.

Car Parking: Parking is still at a premium at the club especially for visiting fans so your best bet is to continue past the stadium on Westgate and carry on under the railway bridge where you will find unrestricted and plentiful street parking available.

Directions by Train: An early start is required for this one as the journey time is a good 4 hours with changes at Preston and Lancaster possible depending on which train you take. Morecambe station is near the seafront and approximately a 30 minute walk from the ground. From the promenade turn left and left into Regent Street (superb Indian Restaurant on the corner if you are staying over serves Chicken Tikka with Goats Cheese, very unusual on my Tandoori Travels). Through into Westgate and you will see the ground on your left just over the railway bridge. The bus 9 or 9a from the bus stop outside Frankie and Benny's will drop you outside the stadium. A Taxi I believe is always the best option, then you can spend more time by the seaside! On away trips with my "band of brothers" sharing cabs to the ground is the norm because....... a) it's cheap as chips when sharing b) drops you at the turnstiles c) leaves the maximum time possible in a bar and d) if you get out quick leaving the hapless one to pick up the fare, he more often than not forgets to ask his pals for reimbursement!

Eating and Drinking Locally: I can personally vouch for Upstairs Downstairs, the best pub on the Seafront. The journey by road to the Globe takes you through Lancaster and it is certainly a City well worth considering as a lunch stop and sampling the local 'Hot Pot'. Morecambe as you might have already realised is a seaside town so Fish and

Chips are really well represented. Atkinsons by far the best in the district can be found at 16-18 Albert Road, LA4 4HB just off the sea front. It never disappoints as in two previous visits while I was tucking into my Cod and Chips, in walked a whole bunch of Bees fans - somebody reads these guides anyway!

Reckless Recommendations: Seek out the Artisan Café if you walk along the seafront, it is near the clock tower and serves up some very tasty healthy type food. Or more befitting the weekend away crowd, The Café (formally Jack's) in Queen Street for a brilliant MASSIVE all on fry up! I have attempted their "special" twice over the years and not completed it. The Globe Arena has recently picked up a top award for its homemade pies. Morecambe FC won the Supreme Champion and the Best Football Pie award at the prestigious British Pie Awards at Melton Mowbray. The Chicken, Ham and Leek Pie reigns supreme.

Ground Description: After 89 years at Christie Park, the Club moved to a new stadium for the start of the 2010-11 season. At a cost of around £12m, the Globe Arena is typical of modern football stadia. The focal point is the Peter McGuigan Stand. The larger West Terrace for home supporters and the smaller East Terrace, with room for around 1,400 for visitors. Seating is available for visiting supporters too.

Our Last Meeting & Memories: Our last visit was in November 2012 when a Jon Nurse goal was the only cheer in a 4-1 defeat. After a Ricky Holmes screamer the previous season, it dawned on me rather quickly I am "past it" after tumbling down the steep steps to try and get to the celebrating Barnet players – I use to manage a Terrace Run with ease but alas no longer! We were Morecambe s first ever Football League opponents in August 2007 - the teams celebrated with a 0-0 draw.

Overnight Stay Factor: A BIG 10/10, as everybody loves the seaside don't they? The aforementioned York Hotel has been offering inexpensive, basic yet comfortable bed and breakfast accommodation to away supporters for years – no doubt it will be full. Mrs Reckless and I stayed at a very pleasant B&B called the Ashley last time and I have no problems recommending it for the weekend. Morecambe Bay is reputedly one of the best for wildlife in Europe, however the bay tide is one of the most dangerous as the tragic drowning of 19 Chinese refugee cockle pickers in February 2004 illustrates.

Celebrity Watch: Comedienne Victoria Wood was born in Morecambe as was Eric Bartholomew who with his partner Ernie Wiseman became possibly Britain's best loved comedy duo. Guarantee that someone will drape a Bees scarf around the bronze statue of Eric on the Promenade for a photo opportunity – I know I have!

TOM DAVIDSON is a 13-year-old Barnet fan. Today he discusses the importance of the games over the Easter period

Easter can be a tricky time for teams. Fighting to avoid relegation, to get into the playoffs, to qualify for Europe, the Champions League or to hang on and win the title e.g. Leicester.

The last three Easter campaigns for The Bees have been very eventful. Two of the last three have been spent in The Conference. But finally we made it back to The Football League.

The 2013-14 season was our first time in The Conference in recent years and it proved to be very difficult. In early 2014, Edgar Davids resigned as manager of the Bees. Several days later Barnet appointed Martin Allen. Up until January, it had been a very tough season and the Bees struggled against some of the teams. After the appointment of Martin, through the Easter period, the Bees won five games on the trot which proved to be a vital 15 points in the league. At the end of the season the Bees finished 8th, just outside the playoff places.

The 2014-15 season was much better because that gave Martin Allen time to bring in young players. He also brought back John Akinde from a successful spell at Alfreton, scoring 18 goals during the season before. By January, Barnet were leading the table. By Easter, John Akinde was scoring goals for fun and Luisma Villa was not far behind him. Barnet won the league title on the final day of the season with a comfortable 2-0 victory at home to Gateshead.

Our return to The Football League proved to be tricky but Martin knows the League well and had managed previous sides in the same division. January 2016 was a tough time but leading up to the Easter period, the Bees have put together some notable results, beating Plymouth and Portsmouth at home and drawing with Accrington away. All of these teams were promotion contenders and to pick up seven points from a possible nine was very impressive.

Easter can be the turning point sometimes and it can only take a few wins and you're back in form. The past three Easters have been crucial times in the season and the performances in these periods have defined our league finish.







There were more than the usual numbers of Bees fans on the away terrace. Along with the regulars were many for whom this was one of the few grounds they could get to and support Barnet.

It was a decent game but not the result all of us wanted but I think winning would have been an unfair result. In some ways, a draw and the single point was a bit of a smash and grab when I looked back at the chances etc. But that is just my opinion. I walked most of the way back to the station with a young couple from York, both Bees fans, both happy with the result. I then caught the Harrogate train and was back at Harrogate by a few minutes after six. A lift from the station by my wife to home completed a fine day. It will be back to normal next week with a 15 hour day travelling to the home match versus Oxford United.

NON-LEAGUE ROUND-UP

Recently, the Devon club have enjoyed a remarkable run; most recently moving out of the relegation zone following victory over Southport. In contrast, the nomadic Hayes & Yeading are awaiting approval of Beaconsfield Road so could move in next season.





ON THIS DAY IN HISTORY

ALAN HALL is still in historical mode when he looks at the things that happened on this day, 28th March, some many moons ago

1964



A converted Danish ferry renamed MV Caroline, which was moored off Felixstowe, started broadcasting as the commercial radio station Radio Caroline on 28th March 1964. Simon Dee (pictured) opened proceedings on air and he was complemented by a group of unknown disc jockeys who were destined to become house-hold names. Tony Blackburn, Dave Lee Travis, Tony Prince and Keith Skues, amongst others, all worked on Caroline which became incredibly popular gaining over 10 million listeners. The success of the

station provoked change from the authorities. Firstly, the BBC reacted in 1967 by starting Radio 1 and recruiting the leading Caroline disc jockeys. Secondly, the Government made supporting offshore broadcasting illegal so the ship had to get its provisions from The Netherlands. Unable to compete Caroline stopped broadcasting in 1968.

1969

Dwight D Eisenhower died on 28th March 1969. The Supreme Allied Commander in Europe during WW2, Eisenhower had a glittering military career. Although he graduated from West Point in 1915, he didn't see front-line service in WW1 but rose through the ranks to become a 1 star brigadier-general at the time the USA entered WW2. During that war he was rapidly promoted to a 5 star general after which he became Supreme Commander of NATO forces. In 1952 he stood for the White House and won a landslide victory for the Republicans to become the 34th President of the USA to succeed Harry Truman. Serving two terms Eisenhower faced daunting times, with the Cold War dominating foreign policy and with racial tensions at home, but he also oversaw a period of sustained economic growth and prosperity within the USA. Eisenhower left office in 1961 to be followed by John F Kennedy.

1979

The 28th March 1979 has been described as one of the most dramatic days in Parliamentary history. The Conservative opposition led by Margaret Thatcher had put forward a motion of no confidence in the Labour Government led by Prime Minister James Callaghan. The background was that Labour's majority had been whittled away by by-election defeats, the country had just endured the 'winter of discontent' in which a number of public services had been disrupted by industrial disputes and the Scottish Nationalists had just failed to win devolution in the Scottish referendum of 1979. Consequently, the motion brought together a combination of unlikely opposition parties who defeated the Government by just one vote. Callaghan was forced to call an election which he lost to the Conservatives and Thatcher became Prime Minister.

1979

The 28th March 1979 was also a dramatic day at Three Mile Island in Pennsylvania where the nuclear power station's number 2 reactor suffered a serious accident that released radioactive gas into the environment. The accident was caused by a stuck valve but the impact was compounded because the engineers on duty didn't have the knowledge to deal with the complex implications of such an incident. Events got out of control leading to the gas escape which resulted in the imposition of a 20 mile exclusion area around the power station. Within 3 weeks that was lifted, however contamination within the site was so high the number 2 reactor was permanently closed down, albeit the number 1 reactor continues to operate to this day.

1991

The jury of the first inquest into the 96 victims of the Hillsborough disaster, in April 1989, delivered their verdict 25 years ago today on the 28th March 1991. Their determination of 'accidental death' was met with condemnation and protests from the victim's relatives who immediately stated they would continue to press for the verdict to be overturned because they believed that the correct decision was 'death by unlawful killing'. Subsequently, much of the evidence provided by the authorities at the inquest has become discredited and in 2009 a panel was set up to review all the documentation. On the basis of their report, the Attorney General quashed the verdict of the original inquest and set in motion a new one which started hearings on 31st March 2014. The first inquest was the longest in legal history but that record has been broken by the second which is still in progress.
