















THINGS YOU DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT LUTON TOWN

- Luton (Beds) is not the only settlement to boast that name. There are also Lutons in Iowa, USA, and Ontario, Canada, not to mention one in Cebu Province in the Philippines. There are also other Lutons in the UK: there's a village of that name near Newton Abbot in Devon, and another near Chatham in Kent.
- Possibly the best-known other use of the term Luton is for the body type of a commercial van, where the container overlaps the driver's cab. It's called



- a Luton because it was developed by Bedford, which was based in the town, and was designed specifically to carry highvolume, low-weight loads, such as the straw hats made in Luton.
- Luton is twinned with five other towns, three of which are in Germany. The German connections are Bergisch Gladbach in North Rhine-Westphalia, Wolfsburg and Berlin-Spandau. In addition it is also twinned with the French town Bourgoin-Jallieu and the Swedish town of Eskilstuna.
- The singer Lutan Fyah (born Anthony Martin in Spanish Town, Jamaica) is a reggae artist who was once a professional footballer with Constant Spring FC. The most recent of his 11 studio albums is the 2014 release Life of a King.



LIAM POTTER TELLS US EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT TODAY'S VISITORS

INTRODUCING LUTON TOWN

Luton Town are the visitors to the Kassam Stadium this afternoon. The Hatters have had a disappointing campaign this season, struggling to muster any of the promotion form that was tipped at the beginning of the season.

This poor form led to the replacement of manager John Still, with Nathan Jones taking the helm in January. But consistency has plagued The Hatters' season and after three consecutive losses, they had dropped to 15th in League Two before Tuesday's win over Dagenham lifted them a place.

Last Tuesday, Nathan Jones' side narrowly beat the league's bottom club Dagenham & Redbridge 1-0 at Kenilworth Road thanks to Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu's 37th-minute pile-driver, which lit up a dreary encounter that reflected the perception that Luton had nothing to play for.

Lifted

The win lifted the Hatters up to 14th place, just six points behind the play-off spots, although their current form would suggest that they remain just out of reach of a Luton side that won at home for the first time in four matches. Indeed, Ruddock Mpanzu's strike was the first goal that Luton had scored in the first half at home since 12th December, when Daggers' boss John Still took charge of his last Luton game.

discovering Ruddock Mpanzu's potential, saying:

"That's brilliant management from me for playing him in that position, if I'm honest. That's absolute brilliant management. He came here as a centre half, a defensive kind of player, and I played him as a number ten because I believe he has something so, I've got to be honest, I'm patting myself on the back."

Defeats

Jones was quick to accept that the play-offs are probably a step too far for a side that had previously suffered three successive defeats.

"We're trying to play a certain way and I think we are achieving it. We had a brilliant run [in February and March], which got us in the hunt, and kind of gave us a bit of expectation of extending our season. That's when the euphoria got hold but we've plateaued a little bit and found where we are at the minute."

Jones is now focusing on returning to winning ways and gaining some end-of-season momentum to further cement his ideas with the players in preparation for next term.

"Rome wasn't built in a day but I'm pleased because we always try to do the right things. We're trying to build something and once we see the players we can go forward with and once we recruit the ones that we really, really know, ready-made ones, then hopefully we'll be a force to be reckoned with."

• Elliot Justham - Goalkeeper

Giving Mark Tyler some serious competition this season. Justham made his Football League debut in the 3-2 defeat at AFC Wimbledon in February last year and kept his place for the remainder of last season.

· Stephen O'Donnell - Defender

Summer arrival from north of the border, O'Donnell signed from Partick Thistle with a real eye for goal. He started his career as a youngster at Celtic and has also played for the Scotland Under-21s.

• Dan Potts - Defender

Another new face at Kenilworth Road, Potts is a full-back but operates on the left-hand flank. The 21-year-old joined Luton from West Ham, where he made five appearances in the Premier League.

• Glen Rea - Defender

Highly rated young Brighton defender, who can also operate in midfield, Glen joined the Hatters on loan from the Championship club in March. Glen made his debut in a defensive midfield role in the 1-0 win at Plymouth.

Alan Sheehan - Defender

A cultured defender, Sheehan joined the Hatters on loan from Bradford City for the rest of the season in January. The left-footer can operate at either full-back or in central defence.

· Jonathan Smith - Midfielder

Part of the squad that won the Conference title, the midfielder began his career at Morecambe. Smith, who was named players' player of the year last season, signed a new three-year contract with the club this summer.

• Danny Green - Midfielder

Joined Luton last summer after MK Dons had cancelled the winger's contract. linking up with John Still, who had previously signed him for Dagenham who he helped win the League 2 Play-Offs.

• Olly Lee - Midfielder

Central midfielder Lee joined the club from Birmingham City, having previously been on loan at Plymouth last season. Played under previous boss John Still when on loan at Dagenham & Redbridge from West Ham in 2011.

• Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu - Midfielder

The direct, pacey youngster was an instant hit when signed on loan by John Still from the Hammers midway through the Conference title winning campaign. He joined Luton permanently in January 2014.

Josh McQuoid - Forward

McQuoid arrived at Kenilworth Road this summer having spent the previous three years at Premier League-bound Bournemouth. He spent last season out on loan in League 1 with Peterborough and Coventry.

After beating United over two legs in the semi-final, Luton reached the 1987/88 League Cup final, where they faced Arsenal at Wembley. Luton took the lead in the 13th minute through Brian Stein but quick-fire goals from Martin Hayes and Alan Smith midway through the second half gave the Gunners the lead. Danny Wilson equalised for Town with eight minutes remaining but in the final minute a foul on future U's winger Mark Stein enabled his brother to score the winner from the resulting free-kick.



DATES -

1885 - club formed from merger of Luton Town Wanderers and Excelsior

1897 - joined Football League 1955 - reached First Division

2014 - won the Conference Premier

Luton Town were the first club in southern England to turn professional, making payments to players as early as 1890 and turning fully professional in 1891.

PLAYER =-

Syd Owen joined Luton from Birmingham City in June 1947. He was made captain two years later and in 1954 he won three caps for England, including for a 4-4 draw against Belgium in the opening game of the 1954 World Cup finals in Switzerland. He was also twice selected for a Football League XI. In 1959 he was named the Football Writers Association Footballer of the Year. He was appointed playermanager of Luton in April 1959 and took charge of the club for the 1959 FA Cup final against Nottingham Forest. He resigned in April 1960.



MANAGER

David Pleat played 70 league games for Luton between 1964 and 1967. He later managed the club, initially in January 1978. 1985. It was largely Pleat's side that won the 1988 League Cup final. He returned to Luton in 1991 but they were relegated at the end of his first season. He took Lutor to another FA Cup semifinal in 1994.

The first of several high-scoring games between Oxford and Luton went the way of the Hatters in a strange match that saw United do most of the attacking but the home side were more clinical with the few chances they created.

Luton took the lead in the 11th minute when David Court's corner was headed home by an unmarked Matt Tees. In the 24th

minute Rodney Smithson failed to clear and Malcolm MacDonald took advantage to make it 2-0. Six minutes before the break John Rvan's cross found Tees. who ran in on the blind side of the defence to give Mick Kearns no chance. MacDonald completed the scoring in the 57th minute when he latched onto Mike Keen's pass and rounded Kearns.

1955 - Headington United achieved their best Southern League win since joining the league six years earlier as they put seven without reply past Worcester City at the Manor. Three players scored two apiece, with Johnnie Crichton converting two penalties and John Skull and Harry Yates both also scoring braces, while John Varney also weighed in with a goal. Yates ended the season as top scorer with 25, the highest number since United joined the Southern League.

Steve Foster


Steve Foster was an associate schoolbov at Southampton, but he turned professional with Portsmouth in 1973, initially as a centre-forward.

He was converted into a defender by Ian St John before joining Brighton for £150,000 in July 1979. Foster won his three England caps in that time, including in the Spain 1982 World Cup squad. He also played for Brighton in their FA Cup final defeat to Manchester United in 1983.

In March 1984 Aston Villa paid £200,000 for him, but he was at Villa Park for just eight months before he joined Luton for £150,000. His 212 appearances for the Hatters included him captaining them to the 1988 League Cup win over Arsenal after Luton beat Oxford in the semi-

Foster joined Oxford from Luton for £175,000 in the summer of 1989 and went on to make 112 appearances for United, the majority of them as captain, scoring 13 goals. He left Oxford in August 1992 and returned to Brighton on a free transfer, before retiring in May 1996 after relegation to the basement.

Chris Williams talks to Scottish winger Chris Maguire

ast Saturday's 5-1 win at Crawley saw a return to the side and a return to the scoresheet for Chris Maguire. The Scotland international smashed home an equaliser in the first half then buried a penalty in the second to cap an excellent all-round performance and set up today's big game perfectly.

Chris has had to be a little patient for his chance in recent weeks but grabbed it with both hands. As we settled down for a chat at the training ground, my first question is whether he's naturally a patient person?

"Not really," he says in that broad Lanarkshire accent. "But it's never been a problem. I've worked with the manager before and got on well with him. We've got a good relationship and we had a chat. It's his decision to leave me out for a couple of games; obviously I'm not happy to be left out but you just keep working hard, don't let it affect you and look to prove him wrong when you get back in the team. He's been in the game and knows how it works and I think that's why he gets respect everywhere he goes.

Straight

"There are different types of manager out there who treat players differently. Send them to train with the kids, don't be near the first team, stuff like that. But the gaffer is straight with players,

says it like he sees it, and that's what players like and I think that's why he gets the best out of players. That's not always been the case with other managers! Some talk a good game then pass the buck on!"

It's easy to forget that at just 27, Chris has been playing senior football for the best part of 11 years:

"I was in the first team at 16 at Aberdeen so I broke into the team early and the manager at the time looked after me and didn't throw me into the deep end every week," he says. "I was getting that experience training with the first team and that's what you want as a young player: to play with the better players and see if you are up to that level, see how well you cope with it. I'm always confident in my own ability when I get an opportunity."

Confident and fully focussed, Chris is enjoying

his football with the U's and his experience is going to be invaluable over the next few weeks.

Older

"I think I'm third or fourth oldest," he says when I mention this. "I don't go out there feeling like an older player! Maybe not everyone out there knows how much experience I've had but I do know where I want to be and what I want to do. so I just have to go out there and try and get to where I want.

"I'll always try and help if people need a bit of encouragement or a telling off. There are right and wrong ways of doing it if you want people to respect your opinion. Right up until you stop playing, you can never afford to stop taking advice from anybody."

Decisions

Chris is currently in his second spell with the U's, having been on loan before Christmas and then joining on a permanent deal. It's a long way from home, but he feels he has definitely

made the right decision.


"People may have doubted why I came to Oxford from the Championship, but it goes in one ear and out the other," he smiles. "I don't take notice of that. I know what I can do, and people around me know what I can do. It's tough being so far away. I have two kids back in Scotland who I don't see much of right now. Things like that are in your mind sometimes. You can't just jump in a car and go and see your mates and your family. You have to be strong and block that out to concentrate on what you want to do, and the main thing for me has always been to play football. I've spent a lot of my life sitting in hotels, but that's part and parcel of the game! You just miss a few home comforts and I'm a home bird who likes to be in my own surroundings and able to cook, play the Playstation or whatever, just relax."

Pressure

There's not much room for relaxation right now as the pressure builds on

the teams at the top.

"As a footballer you always want a bit of pressure," Chris says. "If you can't deal with it then there's no point being a footballer. There are five games left and promotion is the main thing. I think it's fair to say that Northampton have won the league now, they are too far ahead even if it's possible in numbers. But we feel confident in ourselves for second spot. People keep looking at and talking about other results but it's in our own hands. If we keep doing what we have to do in the next three games then it's ours to lose really."

Experience

Oxford against Luton is a unique fixture that has been played in each of the top five divisions in England but that much talked about experience shines through when I ask Chris about today's match.

"Obviously now I'm looking at the division and Luton are in mid-table so it can go either way," he says. "I have been in exactly that position myself when I was at Sheffield Wednesday and we played at Bournemouth when we were safe and had nothing really to play for, but we won and spoiled their promotion party.

"That's how it can go and that's what I'd be saying to the players if I was their manager: let's ruin Oxford's chances. They will come with a game plan and it's up to us to play our own game and overcome it. But we are confident in our own abilities and hopefully we can get the win and another important three points."

At present he is responding well to initial treatment and doing well with his rehab alongside Ryan Taylor. Both injuries are actually very similar and both are very close in their time frames for recovery. This has helped massively as they have been able to complete some of the more mundane exercises with some company.

I edge along and Harry, KJ and Luke, three lads I coached for Thame under 18s, are there, swigging from cans and ready for a big day out. I taught them well. My seat is in the away side of the ground but all I can hear is the yellow wall of noise from my left. A few hours later and everyone - players, management, staff and families - is in the Hilton Hotel having a quiet beer. There is no drowning of sorrows because there is nothing to feel sad about. A proper game of football. a fantastic cup run and a Wembley appearance. It may be a final, but it feels like the start. Six games left, six more cup finals. IF (big IF) we need a second Wemblev appearance this season then this has been an invaluable experience. Me? I don't reckon we will need a return visit.

It's late when I catch the train home. It has been hard work but it has been such a memorable day to be involved with. Plus I have never had so many hugs, ever. Upwards, onwards. Move forward. Together.


Despite being reduced to ten men early in the game, it was United who took the lead in the second half before being pegged back by Stevenage on Good Friday.

Referee Paul Tierney awarded a penalty to the U's, but Jones was equal to Liam Sercombe's spot kick to ensure the half ended goalless.



It was good to get back on the radio last weekend. The Crawley match seemed a world away from Wembley and not in an entirely bad way. It was just us again.

On a normal Saturday we all seem to know what we're doing. There's an unwritten script that somehow everyone works from and sticks to. Having more people about is obviously a good thing but it complicates life, doesn't it? I am talking about a radio broadcast, but I am sure it is true of the team and it's definitely true of supporters.

Unlike at Wembley, with 34,000 Oxford fans making up more than half the crowd. at Crawley with 1,500 making up half the attendance, we could hear the words to all the chants and songs clearly. All the songs were all where they're supposed to be, so we could speak up over the rude bits. My timing was off when the goalkeeper took a goal kick in front of the travelling contingent though, so unfortunately everyone back in Oxfordshire was aware that United fans didn't rate him. apparently.

It was Nathan and Selfy and me in the ground for Radio Oxford, it was the producer of the programme, Ross Heaton, back at base. It may not always sound like it, but we know what we're doing. At Wembley we needed more staff. There was more to see and to cover, just more people and angles to report on. We have great staff at BBC Radio Oxford and many

of them who you listen to on a weekday morning were there to reflect what was happening on the roads and rails on the march to the arch; what was happening on Wembley Way as well as inside the stadium. If you heard the build-up shows on your way to Wembley, you'll know it was a great listen.

But for the sports department it was a stress. It was like being a parent. We were getting asked loads of questions all the time and we had to come up with an answer, often when we weren't sure ourselves. We couldn't really admit that while we were at Wembley in 2010, the whole day we were so filled with terror about what would happen if United lost that none of us can remember anything that happened before Alfie scored.

When the match started at Wembley this year it was fun. A great game, and ok not the perfect end, but fun nonetheless. I will remember it fondly.

I can't say whether the Crawley game will stand out in my memory in decades to come, but I can say that I enjoyed it every bit as much, if not more than the match in north-west London six days earlier.



Oxford almost levelled when Liam Sercombe's deflected shot brought out an excellent one-handed save by Davies but Barnsley's win was sealed with a superb individual goal from Hammill, whose curling shot from outside the area was beyond the reach of Büchel.

United pulled a goal back just two minutes later when Kemar Roofe dug out a right-wing cross that Hylton headed powerfully home from 12 yards, but despite plenty of endeavour from Oxford, the trophy headed to Yorkshire.

United had performed admirably on the big stage with a performance that will give them heart going into the remaining few games of the season.







So there I am, minding my own business, and in comes Dan Bond. I am aware that Bondy is (in)famous around the club but less well known to fans.

"And they all said no, and then the Chairman asked me, right after an away win, and I was emotionally vulnerable," he almost cries...

So I comfort him and tell him everything will be OK. It's for a great cause. It's for Vale House, a specialist dementia care home in Sandford, just around the corner from the ground. Just stop worrying about it. But most of all, practice. Lots

Determination

And, bless him, he does. Every Sunday. every day off, he is at it with his dance partner Katy. There is a determination in Daniel that you usually only see when he's avoiding his round. The players help me out with a couple of videos where they mock his dancing - Chev. Sercs. Mulls, Macca: all of them express their doubts over his suitability for this competition. But all of the players sponsor him or support him in some way. Unbelievably, he really IS representing the whole club when he takes to the stage tomorrow.

The competition has raised over £100,000 since it launched in 2012 and it's not too late to help Dan. "I might not win the dancing. No, correct that. I won't win the dancing," he told me on Monday, "but people have been really kind and I'm well over the £1,000 mark for sponsorship. It should be a good night and although I'm dreading it I am also kind of looking forward to it. It has been a great experience, whatever happens on the night."


Neither side prevailed in the Easter Monday battle of the U's in a hard-fought game which saw defences come out on top.

One of our own

Callum O'Dowda speaks to Martin Brodetsky

The following weekend Callum was on the scoresheet again, giving United the lead as they came from a goal down at Crawley. I suggested that this was the more important goal.

"Obviously, for me as well, the JPT final was a good day out but you've got to focus on the league. That's what we said at the start of the season. The Wembley trip was nice and



it would have been nice to win there but if we'd won at Wembley and lost at Crawley, what would people have taken? You'd have taken the points at Crawley. Going into the Crawley game, that was the mindset.

"Jonjoe's ball into Hylts was good and Hylts was on the same wavelength as me. It's always good when you've got someone up front doing the same stuff so you know what you're doing. And obviously it was a different position for me. The last time I played there

was against Southend last year when we lost 3-2, so it was nice to play up top again. It's a position I'm familiar with from when I played for the youth team behind James Roberts. I've not played there that much since then but it's nice that the manager thinks he can trust me in those positions as well.

Drift

"There were times in the game when I would naturally drift out wide but then again you've got Chris Maguire who's on



the left as well so if I did go out too much we all had the understanding of where to be and what to do."

It's not only for club that Callum has been hitting the target; he also scored for the Republic of Ireland under-21 side against Slovenia during the international break over Easter weekend.

"First of all the game that we played against Italy we managed to go 1-0 up through an own goal. I had chances in the game where I nearly scored; I had a one on one where I came in at an angle but that was a really tough game and Italy are a really good opposition.

"The Slovenia game was different in that we had

the ball more but they just caught us on the counter too many times and we conceded too many goals from set pieces. To score a goal against Slovenia was another good feeling, although the scoreline wasn't that great."

Huge

Finally, what are Callum's thoughts on today's huge game?

"We're still on track, still second in the league so we've just got to take each game at a time. Luton will be a tough game; they'll bring a few as well but I think if we approach it the same way as usual we'll be ok." ●



> the penalty area and was upended, allowing Carroll to convert his second penalty of the afternoon. With the game in stoppage time, MK Dons had their


first second-half shot on target after Hawtin felled an MK Dons striker and they scored from the resultant penalty.

There are few people who deserve the title unsung hero at Oxford United more than Maurice Edmunds.



A friend to everyone behind the scenes at the club, Maurice has rarely courted the limelight despite spending close to 50 years with us on matchdays. Today marks Maurice's official retirement and he will be a guest in the boardroom, where he has been the perfect host for over 40 years.

We asked him to tell us his story.
"I started in 1968 when one of
my neighbours talked me into
it. Arthur Turner was
manager and my role
was on the turnstile.
We used to have to
swap round though
because John Mills,

the head steward.

liked us to move

round each game

so nobody

could tell their mates which turnstile they were on so they could hop over!

"We used to miss the first half while we cashed up but that was just one of those things. I did that for two or three seasons then was put in charge of the programme sellers who were outside the ground on the streets and I would have to go round and keep an eye on them

Interesting

"Then I was put in charge of car parking, which was always interesting at the Manor! Part of my job was to help the visiting team park their bus in the corner behind Beech Road, which was such a tight space but we managed it without any great mishap. My wife Sheila had started helping with the catering in the boardroom at that time and when she was asked to do it I moved up from the car park and used to steward the directors box. That was

1974/5 so I did that role for about 40 years."

Maurice's role extended beyond his boardroom duties and also included housing some of the stars of the past:

"We all liked to help and they signed a player called Keith Cassells from Watford who used to commute every day. The manager got fed up with that and told him he had to stop in Oxford, so he ended up being my lodger. He was a lovely guy and we got on really well. Then he was sold to Southampton and George Lawrence came the other way and he stayed with us instead. George is a cracking lad and we have stayed in touch ever since."

Supervise

The move to the Kassam Stadium in 2001 gave Maurice a new boardroom to supervise:

"When we moved I didn't give it a second thought. My role was to welcome the guests into the boardroom and make sure everyone was shown the correct seat. Over the years I've met everyone from Elton John and Andrew Lloyd Weber to managers like Matt Busby, Ron Atkinson and Lawrie McMenemy, who would always be in the kitchen stealing cake!

"We never went on holiday in the season; our holidays were arranged around the fixture list. I have loved every minute and met so many great people at the club and on matchdays. I know I'm going to miss it but hopefully we can end the season with promotion and celebrations."

Everyone at the club thanks Maurice for his friendship and help over the years. He is our special guest today and we wish him the very best in his retirement.



Angel of the north

We catch up with United winger Mark Angel

Martin Brodetsky speaks to today's guest of honour, flying winger Mark Angel. Over three seasons Mark played 91 games for United after joining in the summer of 1995, scoring five goals.



When I spoke to Mark earlier this week. Lasked him about his first season with the U's.

"I was at Sunderland but moving to Oxford gave me a big chance to start in the first team," he told me. "We struggled a bit at the start of the season but then managed to turn things round. It was a fantastic squad there and a real good bunch of players.

"Coming to Oxford was a bit of a culture shock: when I was at Sunderland I used to live at home with my parents so it was a bit different. The guy who took me in is dead now, bless him; Ken Ridley used to work at the club and he took me in for a couple of years. It was hard but it was brilliant.

Experience

"Obviously I knew David Rush as well because he was at Sunderland at the same time that I was there, so he took me under his wing a little bit; not ideally at times because he took me out two or three times during the week when I should have been in bed! But like any 19-year-old moving away from home for the first time it was difficult but a good experience."

I asked Mark if he could describe the feeling of playing in a side that won automatic promotion:

"It was amazing," he said. "I think what we had was a very good team spirit and all the players got on; everyone from Phil Whitehead the goalkeeper up to Matt Elliott and all the others. It was great for the town as well because obviously evervone wanted us to do well. It was a

fantastic club and a great bunch of players. When I came back for Joey Beauchamp's testimonial and met all the lads again it was literally as though it had only been a couple of weeks since we'd seen each other."

Incredible

What was the secret to that season's incredible run in, which saw the U's lose just one of their last 17 games?


"I think it just clicked; we had so many good players, the likes of Chrissy Allen, who's at the club now, and Joey, Matty Elliott, Fordy, you could pick anyone. For me, Bobby Ford was probably the best player I ever played with. Obviously Paul Moody got all the goals but things just clicked for everyone and I can't put my finger on it. Everything just went to plan."

The following season in what is now the Championship, was also a good one for United.

"When we went up we went to Man City and beat them 3-2 at their place: we were sixth at the time and for us to go up there and beat them, given their wages, it was incredible. I think Denis over-achieved at times given the size of the squad and the budget but a lot of that was down to the team spirit. There were some fantastic players there who had played at a higher level and all bonded together and it was a good time for the club.

Smashing

"With Matty going,



we all knew at the time that he was better than the level we were at and fair play to him, he was a smashing bloke. He deserved what he got because he was a fantastic player."

After three seasons at the Manor it was time for Mark to move on.

"Denis took me to West Brom. I was involved in the first team but it was difficult at times - I looked at the two players who were playing in front of me and you had Kevin Kilbane, who'd won a hundred or so caps for the Republic of Ireland and James Quinn on the other wing who I think played 50-odd times for Northern Ireland, so it was a massive club. I think Denis was treated unfairly at times but it was a great experience and I'm pleased they're doing well.

Coaching

"Later I had a good couple of years at Boston and played semi-pro for England a couple times while I was there and got them into the Football League. I later decided I wanted to do something else so I did some coaching, got my Uefa A licence and I'm working for Arsenal now in the Peterborough area and I've been doing it for seven years. It's a lot of hours and seven days a week sometimes but I eniov doing it."

I asked Mark for his thoughts on today's game.

"I'm looking forward to seeing Oxford play," he said. "It was the best time of my career and not just because we won promotion but the whole place, the players and Denis and Crozza. I still keep in touch and I don't do that for any of my other former clubs.

"I was in Oxford recently and it's totally changed, I used to go out on a Wednesday with Joey, who was my best mate when I was in Oxford. I'll be pleased if Oxford do go up; you've got the stadium and you've got the fanbase, so it would be great if they can get up to the Championship and who knows... if Bournemouth can do it..."


