WITH CHIEF EXECUTIVE GARY SWEET

GOOD AFTERNOON ONE AND ALL FOR THIS FINAL LEAGUE 2 ENCOUNTER OF THE 2015/16 SEASON. A WARM WELCOME TO THE GRECIANS, ESPECIALLY THOSE LOYAL FOLLOWERS WHO HAVE MADE THE 380-MILE ROUND TRIP. I HOPE YOU HAVE AN ENJOYABLE DAY.

It is customary, in the final league programme of the season, to take stock and acknowledge the season's trials and tribulations. Whilst some have suggested this season isn't necessarily one to 'write home about', I beg to differ. 2015/16 was a momentous season

about', I beg to differ. 2015/16 was a momentous season for football – and in future years could be recognised as a momentous season for Luton Town.

Firstly, reflecting on the football season in general, I couldn't possibly write this without congratulating Leicester City for their superlative achievement. Not only was their success wonderful for The Foxes and for the beautiful game, it also acts as a very inspirational example to clubs like our own. The sentence "If Leicester can do it then why can't we" will have been spoken by many a club manager, kit man, groundsman or supporter across the country and beyond. Maybe including us!

Their example will also send out a political message demonstrating how footballing success can benefit a town or city in terms of image, morale, culture, growth and economics.

Closer to home, whilst I'll be the first to admit that the first team's performance was under par and

well below our expectations, I'd also argue that the season was far from wasted.

We now have a core coaching staff of Nathan Jones, Paul Hart and Kevin Nugent. Who could fail to be excited by the prospect of this team leading our football aspirations? We have also found an exciting new young striker in Jack Marriott who fully deserved last week's award accolades – well done Jack (and well done Luton Town Supporters' Trust for superbly organised evening).

AMAZING

Most enjoyably, this season witnessed a most amazing feat by our fantastic Under-18s; a League and League Cup double topped up by a quarter-final appearance in the FA Youth Cup. Their achievements made us all immensely proud – not just the board and staff but supporters and the town too.

Then we come on to the most significant event of all this season. The developments at Power Court and Newlands Road. Since we launched our 3D models and further images of the schemes the feedback has been incredibly positive with negligible negativity (and what there is of that will be answered entirely when more information can be released).

I have previously stated that we intend to submit our outline planning application this summer. I can confirm that this is indeed the case. In fact, our planning application is on course to be delivered at the end of next month.

This will be preceded by a few weeks of public consultation which gives you an opportunity to discover everything about the schemes at

Power Court and Newlands Park, to ask questions of us and our expert consultants, to suggest changes (and even an opportunity to object, should you wish to do so) and to identify how they will have an impact on the regeneration of your club and town. Importantly, this consultation period will also give you an opportunity to support our planned developments and be involved in our regeneration.

We will exhibit morning, noon and night over eight days and three local venues starting in the Eric Morecambe Suite on 21st May – in a fortnight from today.

Please come along, we'd like to see you. The 3D models will be on show alongside many more images of the stadium and the other elements of both schemes, which represent a giant leap forward in the regeneration of our town. We are particularly keen to meet people who may have concerns about the scheme to understand how we may be able to improve the developments even more.

For those further afield or unable to make one of the dates, tonight we will be launching a lot more information on our development website 2020developments.co.uk where you'll be given the chance to register to receive more details as and when they are released. All of the information being exhibited at our public consultation roadshow will be made available online, and we'll be showing live images and social media feeds from the events.

As well as collaborating with a wide range of stakeholder groups in order to gain their feedback, we have also presented much of this information to Luton Town Supporters' Trust, Loyal Luton Supporters' Club and Luton Town Disabled Supporters' Association (along with a couple of other groups) - mostly dealing with the stadium design, the planning process and the viability of the build. Each group came to their meeting with a shopping list of features they'd like to see... and whilst some elements of the finer detail (such as the naming of

stands) are things we intend to manage once consent is granted, I don't believe there was a single issue that hadn't been thought of already – and everyone left with promise and a smile.

So, with our application set for submission and soon to be in the public domain, the power to influence transfers to you to make your voices heard.

We are closer now to building a new home for our Club than we have been for almost 60 years, when it was first envisaged that a relocation was needed to match the ambition and potential of the club and town. It has been an exhilarating, white knuckle rollercoaster ride which seems to have seen as many downs as ups and a way only us Mad Hatters can appreciate. There's no other club quite like ours!

Similarly, our wonderful town has been kicked in the teeth rather too many times for our liking and it's great to see that our Council







has the appetite and vision to create game-changing strategies – and not be afraid to make bold decisions to put our town back on the map. This positioning is already reaping rewards as we see progress unfolding in front of our eyes – from the announcement for a Mass Passenger Transit to the airport to Galliard successfully selling studio apartments in town like hot-cakes at prices 50 per cent above our forecasts two years ago.

PROPHECY

Even my slightly tongue-in-cheek prophecy of Luton becoming the next Shoreditch at last year's MIPIM UK may not be too far from the truth... just in the last week Luton was judged to be the 6th trendiest town to live in the UK according to Trinity Mirror Data Unit and now known as the UK's start-up capital. To quote half of a well-known slogan, 'The Future's Bright...'

Two lads who have always been a true credit to themselves, their families and Luton Town. Huge thanks also go to Ryan Hall and Mark Onyemah who depart today – but in particular to Paul Benson and Scott Griffiths, who have been loyal servants and vital components of our promotion success. Thank you all, and you go with our best wishes for the future.

It goes without saying that we look forward to welcoming you all back to Kenilworth Road or maybe even Power Court.

Finally, I need to thank you personally for your support on and off the pitch and my staff for their hard work (and for putting up with my mild occasional cantankerousness!).

Enjoy and savour the game today – you know we'll all be missing it by the end of the month!

From the BOARDROOM

WITH CHAIRMAN NICK OWEN

GOOD AFTERNOON AND WELCOME TO KENILWORTH ROAD FOR OUR FINAL MATCH OF THE 2015-2016 SEASON IN SKY BET LEAGUE 2 – AGAINST EXETER CITY WHO ARE JUST ONE POINT ABOVE US IN THE TABLE.

A warm welcome to all who've made the journey here from Devon; players, staff, directors and, of course, supporters.

A win for either side could make a significant difference to the final positions so there's no way in which it should be a meaningless end-of-season encounter. There's pride at stake too!

Our first game of the season, way back in August up at Accrington Stanley, seems an age away now because so much has happened since then. Our form has been variable, to put it kindly, and, bearing in mind we had stated that we wanted to finish in the Play-Off positions at worst, our disappointing showing by mid-December led to the departure of John Still.

It's interesting to reflect that only three people who lined up at Accrington on that summer's day actually started at Northampton last Saturday. That can only indicate an unsettling season of unfulfilled ambition, a campaign of transition and transformation.

Northampton last weekend was a sickener for all of us at the ground

when Danny Green went down with a broken leg. It goes without saying that we wish him all the best on his road to recovery. It's horrible to witness something like that and I have no doubt it had an effect on his team mates.

Certainly, Northampton looked every inch the champions they are. They were robust, quick, positive, confident and convincing in everything they did and, as Nathan has observed, gave us a gauge to judge how much we need to do to challenge at the top next season. It was extremely sobering. Nathan is nothing if not decisive when it comes to planning for the future and he is unwaveringly clear about what he wants for next season. He absolutely knows what is required and he doesn't do mediocre.

I think we have seen enough on the pitch since he joined to know we can display some electrifying football. It's the consistency that we need and the ability to make Kenilworth Road a fortress again.

My highlights of the season are largely focused around away matches. That terrific run in September into October when we won five out of six, including two wins in a week at far away Morecambe and Hartlepool. But it petered out.



Then, more recently, those stunning away wins in the space of four days against two sides above us in the table, Oxford and Carlisle. In fact, our away form under Nathan has been outrageously good. Think of Wycombe, Plymouth, Leyton Orient, York and Mansfield where we witnessed the welcome re-birth of the enigmatic Pelly!

So why have results been so poor at home? After all, home matches over the years (and I am now finishing my 58th season as a supporter) have often been spectacularly exciting, with plenty of goals amid a thumping, vibrant atmosphere, and ultimately a Luton victory.

Is the size of the crowd (very good by lower league standards) intimidating? Do the players sense the fans' anxiety when we fail to take the lead early on and the other side starts to get into the game? Are players weighed down by the feeling of expectation at a club that's used to life in the top two divisions?

Is it the way the opposition lines up against us and frustrates us before seizing on a chink in the defence and nicking an infuriating one-nil? Hopefully, time will tell, but it is baffling.

There've been some outstanding performances this season and I would like to congratulate the lads who won awards last weekend, particularly Jack Marriott who almost swept the board! Well done, Jack. His goalscoring displays, so full of energy and determination, have been a real highlight for me.

Also some of the exhilarating performances from our Under-18s who were honoured en bloc at the awards night. Congratulations to them and let's hope their talents and successes are the shape of things to come. It's really exciting to see more and more of them come on board as full-time professionals and start to appear in and around the first team.

I'd like to welcome Paul Hart to Kenilworth Road. I have known him for some time as we've actually played some dodgy cricket together for the renowned Bunburys charity! He comes with a wealth of footballing experience, of course, as a player, coach and manager and we are all thrilled to have him here. His reputation for bringing youngsters through is outstanding.

Paul's joining at an exciting time. So much is happening off the field, as you know, and as you have heard from Gary, with the thrilling prospect of our re-location at the hub of a major revamp of Luton town centre, and Paul and Nathan can work together in the summer break to shape our future on the pitch.

I have to mention Leicester City. What a sensational story it is! The headlines both here and round the world show how much people love a tale of success-against-the-odds and it's also a shining example of how a winning and popular football club can do wonders for a community's image and profile. National and international interest in the city of Leicester must have been ramped up a thousandfold and it's likely to boost tourism no end. It's really put the place on the map. With a following wind, I am sure we can do the same for the town of Luton!

So the season draws to a close. I hope you have an excellent summer and thank you as ever for the marvellous support the players have received over the last eight months or so. It is always appreciated and never taken for granted. We have already sold more than 4,000 season tickets for 2016/17 which is enormously encouraging. Many thanks.

Make the most of the final game and let's head for the hills with a warm glow inside plus plenty of hope for things to come.



Ellisha has spent a lot of time in hospital having to undergo many surgeries, she has all her treatment done at Addenbrookes in Cambridge. Ellisha now has metal spinal growth rods in her spine to maintain her scoliosis and she now has to undergo surgery every six months for the rods to be lengthened to allow her

to grow. Despite having to go through so much Ellisha is always a happy little girl who is always smiling and doesn't let her disability get in the way of her enjoying life and achieving her goals.

She has had a love for Luton Town from a very young age after latching on to her dad's fondness for the club. It gives us great pleasure to welcome everyone associated with Exeter City to Bedfordshire this evening for their final away trip of the season.

Indeed it's the final game of a long season for both sides, with unfortunately nothing to play for in terms of pushing for the Play-Off places for either side.

Exeter come to Kenilworth Road still seeking eighth place in the League 2 table, and while they'd need a barrage of results to go their way, a repeat of last season's 10th spot would reflect a good season for Paul Tisdale and his side.

It was a mixed start for Tisdale and co. this year, losing two of their opening five clashes, but a 4-0 thumping over Leyton Orient and victory over Hartlepool kept them in touch with the leading pack.

But sixth was the best they would end up in the campaign, slipping up to Accrington and Wycombe to slide back down to mid-table – a position they occupied for the majority of the season.

The Grecians lost just two of their subsequent 11 games, but any chance of a revival was truly over after a devastating Christmas period, losing four games in a row, including three at home.

The first of those was arguably the most exciting game of the season when the Hatters went to Town and

stole all three points in a last-gasp 100th minute, courtesy of Paul Benson.

While the New Year may not have had the required league optimism, there was certainly much to anticipate in the cup competitions for Exeter.

Having succumbed 6-3 to Sunderland in the Capital One Cup back in August, Tisdale's (arguably) best-dressed man in football attire was to reach the TV screens as Liverpool came to Town for FA Cup duty.

And the Grecians made sure it was a long trip back north for the Merseysiders, drawing 2-2 at St James Park before Liverpool eventually cruised the replay 3-0. Lee Holmes was among the scorers in the first leg, one of three men to come from higher league football in the summer, while free agent and experienced forward Clinton Morrison also joined, while Reading man Jake Taylor arrived in January.

Holmes was announced as Exeter player of the season this year, with top-scorer Tom Nichols also netting against the Anfield club. Unfortunately for Grecians fans, Nichols was to go on to depart St James Park on Deadline Day, making the step up to League 1 Peterborough.

But without their star striker, Exeter kept ploughing forward, going unbeaten for 10 matches across

February and March to hit as high as ninth. But, similarly to the Hatters, home form let down Tisdale – who's been in charge more than nine years now, bettered in English football only by Arsene Wenger – and his side, who have won just six at home compared to 11 on their travels ahead of their trip to Kenilworth Road this afternoon.

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN **LEIGH EDWARDS** SELECTS FIVE KEY MATCHES AND EVENTS THAT HAVE SHAPED EXETER CITY'S POST-WAR ERA

1964 FIRST PROMOTION SUCCESS

Alan Banks was leading marksman with 18 goals as Exeter City won promotion for the first time in 1963/64. Jack Edwards' team kicked off with a 2-1 victory at Bradford City but won just three of their next 13 matches. They hammered Tranmere 5-0 shortly before Alan Banks was signed from Cambridge City in October. The Grecians soared up the table with a 10-match unbeaten run and maintained their challenge with just one defeat in their last 15 games, including a 6-1 win over Chesterfield. They clinched fourth place with a 0-0 draw with fellow promotion winners Workington at Borough Park on 25th April 1964.

1977 PROMOTION WINNERS

City clinched promotion with a 3-0 Fourth Division victory over Doncaster Rovers at Belle Vue on 7th May 1977. Alan Beer gave Bobby Saxton's side the lead after 14 minutes and had an effort disallowed seven minutes later. Exeter were well on top and Dennis Peacock saved well from Graham Weeks and Beer before Tony Kellow doubled their advantage on 34 minutes with a shot into the bottom corner. Beer made it three a minute later and promotion to the Third Division after an 11-year absence was confirmed with defeats for rivals Swansea City and Colchester United. The Grecians finished Fourth Division runners-up.

1990 RECORD BREAKING CHAMPIONS

Exeter stormed to the Fourth Division title with a club record 89 points in 1989/90. Terry Cooper's side won their opening two matches and beat Swansea City 4-1, Blackburn Rovers 4-2 and Blackpool 3-0 in the League Cup before taking Sunderland to a fourth

round replay. They went top of the Fourth Division with five straight wins and took Norwich City to an FA Cup third round replay. The Grecians regained pole position with a 3-1 victory over York City in early March and remained top for the rest of the season despite losing leading marksman Darran Rowbotham with injury. They won the title by a ten-point margin.

2008 FOOTBALL LEAGUE RETURN

Paul Tisdale plotted City's 2007/08 Conference
Play-Off final triumph. The Grecians raced to the top
with three wins in their first four games. They won just
one of their next nine, including six draws, but then lost
only two of their following 21 games. Richard Logan
was leading scorer as they finished fourth. Exeter
netted four second-half goals in a stunning fight-back
to defeat Torquay United 5-3 on aggregate in the
Play-Off semi-finals. Rob Edwards' first-half goal beat
Cambridge United 1-0 in the Play-Off final at Wembley
Stadium on 18th May 2008 as Exeter regained
Football League status after five years' absence.

2009 PROMOTION WINNERS

Exeter clinched promotion for the second consecutive season as Richard Logan's goal gave them a 1-0 League 2 win at Rotherham United on 2nd May 2009. They began life back in the Football League with a 1-1 draw at Darlington and secured their first victory, 1-0 at AFC Bournemouth, rising to third place by the end of October with five wins in a seven match unbeaten run. Paul Tisdale's side bounced back from a 6-1 defeat by Chesterfield and remained in the promotion race. They finished League Two runners-up after losing just two of their last 19 matches. Paul Jones was ever-present and Adam Stansfield leading scorer.

LUTON TOWN 3 EXETER CITY 0

12th March 2002

With the Town finding themselves back in the football basement in 2001 for the first time in 33 years, it could be understood if everyone around Kenilworth Road would be allowed to feel a little sorry for themselves.


There was no chance of this though, as manager Joe Kinnear and his number two Mick Harford wheeled and dealed over the summer with players coming and going at alarming speed, leading to five new players making their debuts in the opening day win at Carlisle and two more the following week when Cheltenham were overturned at Kenilworth Road.

Despite these two victories the Hatters did not go steaming away at the top of the table and after a string of draws plus a defeat at Bristol Rovers it was only the introduction of Jean-Louis Valois in late September that ignited the season.

The mercurial Frenchman put "bums on seats" in the words of Kinnear and on his day was unplayable with his ball control, close skills, vision and a terrific eye for goal, especially from long range.

Despite all this the Hatters were still on a rollercoaster ride with some outstanding victories interspersed with unexplained and totally unforeseen defeats. As such, they were always playing catch up with leaders Plymouth who had become remarkably consistent.

The Town enjoyed an eight game unbeaten run over Christmas and into the New Year to prove their doubters



wrong, before another one of those unforced defeats, this time at Darlington, took the wind out of everybody's sails once more.

The defeat came at the worst possible time as next up were Plymouth at Kenilworth Road in an eagerly awaited top versus second clash which everyone thought would be a solid pointer for the rest of the season and a potential title decider.

As it turned out the Hatters were worthy winners against Plymouth in a bone-jarring thriller but they then spoilt all the good work with a defeat at Rochdale and a home reversal against Scunthorpe.

The supporters could now see the season unravelling, but the players were urged to make a big push in the final third of the campaign and they responded in style



starting with a home game against Bristol Rovers on a cold, wet February night.

The Pirates were swept aside 3-0 with no-one realising that this was the start of a remarkable run of victories which took in York at home, Lincoln and Torquay away and Leyton Orient at Kenilworth Road before fellow promotion chasers Rushden and Diamonds were beaten 2-1 at a windy Nene Park

In the days leading up to the clash with mid-table Exeter, the talk around Kenilworth Road was of Premier League clubs sniffing around, with most casting envious eyes on attacking left full-back Matthew Taylor. The 20-year-old had been at Luton for six years and his partnership down the left with

Valois was one of the main reasons why the Town were flying high.

A crowd of 6,327 turned up at Kenilworth Road to see if the Hatters could extend their run to seven straight wins but it was Exeter who were first to show when Christian Roberts sent in a volley which Luton goalkeeper Carl Emberson saved comfortably.

Hatters top scorer Steve Howard then blazed over on the turn at the other end before Adrian Forbes headed narrowly wide from a Kevin Nicholls free-kick.

The goal the expectant crowd demanded eventually came on 27 minutes when Howard netted his 15th of the season from another pin-point Nicholls free-kick.

At the interval Valois was brought off leaving Taylor to move into left

mid-field where his energy, speed and crossing ability would hopefully provoke more urgency in the Luton forward line.

The change worked as it became one-way traffic in the second period with Matthew Spring hitting a post and Forbes denied by Grecians goalkeeper Arjan Van Heusden before Howard doubled the Hatters lead after 65 minutes when he stabbed the ball home following a corner from Nicholls.

The Town made it three with 10 minutes to go when the overlapping Taylor looped a header from a floated free-kick from Nicholls over the head of Van Heusden. Howard was then desperately unlucky not to register his first hat-trick for the Hatters when his 20 yard strike narrowly cleared the crossbar.

HITTE PROGRAMME







The Town produced a 56-page programme for the visit of Exeter priced at £2.

It was reported that 19-year-old reserve striker Daryl Murphy had been loaned to Harrow Borough to give him a chance of regular football. Murphy is still banging in goals for Ipswich 14 years later!

New Stevenage manager Wayne Turner had taken the Town's Jude Stirling on a free transfer. Stirling would be joining up with ex-Hatters Jamie Campbell and Scott Houghton who had also recently moved to Broadhall Way

Manager Joe Kinnear was praising the playing efforts of Matt Taylor who looked likely to be leaving the club at the end of the season having turned down a contract renewal. Taylor was to move to Harry Redknapp's Portsmouth before enjoying a good career at the top level.

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THIS SEASON...

After a 10th place finish in League 2 last season after what was a decent season, what were expectations for this campaign back in August?

Minimum expectation was reaching the Play-Offs. We had a horrendous start last season so this was a realistic expectation given the better pre-season

This season has been pretty similar with another above mid-table finish on the cards. How has your campaign been, are you happy with it – what could have the side done differently to reach the Play-Offs?

Not much really. There have been too many draws, especially at home. Our away record is excellent. If we win today that's our most ever away wins in a season. To me we lack a bit of tempo at times and enable teams to sit in and maintain their shape too easily.

You took Liverpool to a replay in the FA Cup and almost knocked them out. What were your favourite memories of that tie and was there that little part of you that was disappointed you didn't beat them?

The mayhem of going a goal up – twice! Conceding a fairly scrappy equaliser was disappointing but gave us a day out on Merseyside. The most disappointing was the performance in the replay. We never really got going and Liverpool were comfortable winners.



Paul Tisdale. He's got the best fashion sense of any manager, hasn't he? But what's he like? He's been with you for ages – do you love him, and if so why? Are you surprised he hasn't been looked at for so-called 'bigger jobs'?

He has, reputedly, turned down Swansea and Southampton before. He appears a bit aloof as he has a very pragmatic approach. Rarely will you see him too animated on the touchline. But speak to him and he's articulate, intelligent and passionate about what he wants to achieve. As he says, if you think the aim of getting Exeter into the Championship is not ambitious then you should look at our average league position in our history. But I wouldn't say I love him — I think he's a really decent manager but has to deliver something next season.



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Who has been your stand-out performer this season and why should Luton be wary of him today?

Don't think we've really had any one stand out performer. Tom Nichols was in double figures before going to Peterborough in January. Bobby Olejnik has been our best, most consistent keeper in a few years. Jordan Moore-Taylor and Ollie Watkins have both made great progress. Noble has been classy but not played the minutes we probably needed and Jayden Stockley has given the attack a different potency in the last half of the season. Maybe that's why we've ended mid-table as we haven't had that one player that's made a significant difference.

SEASONS PAST...

Tell us about you. Why do you support Exeter? When did it all start? What was your first game? What do you remember about it?



What is it like supporting Exeter? Like Luton you faced time out of the Football League before coming back – what was that like?

Supporting Exeter seems perfectly rational and normal. I live in London now so every game is an away game. The days out are much more than about the football. You need a certain gallows humour to get up at 6am to go to Hartlepool in late January, or to Bury anytime (our record there is appalling). In the Conference we got back to winning games! We were a basket case when we got relegated. Despite being there for five years it gave us some of our most memorable games - the two second leg Play-Off semi-finals, drawing with Manchester United at Old Trafford and two trips to Wembley.

What's been your best memory as a Grecians fan?

You want just one? I think it has to be Rio. Our pre-season trip in July 2014 to celebrate the centenary of Exeter being the first opponents of a full Brazil national side was surreal, extraordinary and utterly superb.

LUTON AND EXETER

What are your best and worst memories of City and Luton clashes? Do any games in particular stick out?

Last Easter where we came from 2-0 down and at Kenilworth Road in 2008/09 where Adam Stansfield scored a towering

header right in front of the away end stick in the mind. Funnily enough I can't remember anytime Luton won...;-)

What do you expect from today's game? What's your prediction? Are you looking forward to sitting in the away end?!

Do we have to sit down? It should be a good atmosphere, under cover and close to the pitch. I expect nothing but a City win. History tells me I should usually be disappointed but we've got a chance to make a bit of club history so we should be up for it. Let's go for a goal fest – 4-3 to Exeter!

WHAT'S THE STORY?

Jack Marriott's 14th goal of the season was not enough to give the Hatters three points after a frustrating home performance against Newport County.

Marriott came off the bench to net with less than 10 minutes remaining, nodding home Olly Lee's cross after a quiet first half at Kenilworth Road.

But just as the Town thought they had nicked three points, substitute Souleymane Coulibaly headed beyond Elliot Justham to keep Newport in the Football League, ending the Hatters' slim Play-Off hopes.







JONES SAID:

I'm a bit baffled by the points haul we've had here, because we've had more possession, more chances, more crosses, more shots than we have away from home. We win games away from home on a regular basis. We're probably one of the league's best, I'd imagine.

"We need to give the fans something to get behind. In the first half I was disappointed. I couldn't wait to get them off because I just felt that we were nowhere near. Then when we up the tempo, when we press and when we do what we do very well, then the fans get behind that."

In the second half we did, but theoretically we gave ourselves 45 minutes to win a football match because we didn't turn up in the first half.

"It shouldn't take me to get into them at half-time, they should want to do that. I know, sometimes, that's what I'm here for, that's my job, but at home we haven't started.

"I know, sometimes, sides sit-in and frustrate us, but I've said that is going to happen and we need to handle that. But I just felt we were lacklustre, we didn't have any energy about us."

TOP SCORER SAYS TOWN NEED TO MAKE THE KENNY A FORTRESS NEXT TERM

Hatters striker Jack Marriott insists Nathan Jones' side will have a resurgence in form at Kenilworth Road next season.

The Town dropped points with a 1-1 draw against Newport County a fortnight ago, ending any slim chances of reaching the League 2 Play-Off places.

But Marriott is adamant the Hatters can make Bedfordshire a fortress once more next term ahead of their final match with Exeter this afternoon.

"We all know it's not been a great record, we know that's something that needs to improve and it will improve." said Marriott.

"We've got the right people in the right places, but things have got to change when it comes to playing here. We just need to go out with a bang in our last game and then take that forward into next season.

"Everyone has their different ways of getting up for games, whether that's different home or away I don't really know, it's an issue that's been quite confusing across the year."

Marriott was the first to admit it wasn't the best performance from his side, who have won just six home league games.

The 21-year-old came off the bench to score just nine minutes from time, but a late Newport leveller robbed the Hatters of the points, keeping the side 13th.

He continued: "We weren't at it at certain points of the game, it's a difficult one to really be able to put your finger on, but we're disappointed.

"We've had a couple of long trips [to Oxford and Carlisle], so it could be down to fatigue, but it's really difficult to say.

"I've been on the bench, so I can't really say from the point of view from someone who's played 180 minutes across the week, but that's a possible cause with all the travelling."

From a personal perspective, Marriott has enjoyed a good season, despite the disappointments he and the team have suffered.

In his first full season with a Football League club, the talented youngster has notched 14 goals in spite of injury, targeting plenty more already next year. But following his recovery from injury, the striker has been forced to take his place on the bench following Joe Pigott's three goals in two games.

PLEASING

"I'm delighted to have 14. If someone had said I'd have that tally with two games to go then I'd have been very happy, it's very pleasing, but a disappointing result to go with it," Marriott added.

"I've been fine with being on the bench, biding my time. It was a frustrating injury, I didn't want to be missing the games that I did, but that's football, and now I just want to keep playing.

"I didn't have a target with this being my first full season, you have a slight incline of what you hope to get, but I'm wanting to push towards 20 next season.

"Joe's had a difficult time, and I couldn't be happier for him. He's a great lad, and a good player, so I'm pleased he's been getting among the goals.

"It's good for the team to play well away, but we want to do that at home too. We want to show the fans here what we can do, because when they're good they're the best, they give you that extra adrenaline on the pitch and that really helps."

It was one of those days, wasn't meant to be, we fancy ourselves to come back against anyone, but it was their day and we weren't able to ruin that for them. "We're disappointed for Danny, he's a great lad and it's a setback for him, but hopefully now he can come back stronger.

"We thought it could have been a red, you could see he's in agony, and it's not nice to see him down for five or six minutes writhing in pain, but we hope for him he comes back stronger."

While Saturday ended on a disappointing note, the week off the pitch was a positive one for Lee, signing an extension on his contract to keep him at

Kenilworth Road until 2018.

The 24-year-old former Birmingham man, who also had loan spells at Plymouth, has featured 39 times for the Town this term, netting on three occasions, including a stunner at Hartlepool and a last-gasp winner at York

It marks the second extension of the season for the Hatters midfielder, who admits there are still parts of his game that could be strengthened over the


"I'm really pleased to be here, hopefully we can kick on next season under the gaffer," he continued.



Summary



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

We are pleased to report another positive season for the Trust thanks to our second successive season back in the Football League.

Our continued membership of the League has allowed the Trust to again see significant growth in the number of individuals we regularly come into contact with and this has, in turn, meant a significant growth in staff numbers. We now number over 40 fully qualified male and female coaches, half of them full-time, and we now regularly coach over 3,500 individuals every week more than the Kenny End holds!

Not only does membership of the Football League Trust mean we receive central funding via the Professional Footballers' Association and the Football League, but it also means we are eligible to access Premier League national initiatives and programmes previously denied to us, and we have now successfully incorporated some of these into our already comprehensive community programme. Of course, three year funding cycles means we still have to wait to join some programmes – but we will get there eventually!

Our core community programme is our Free Schools Coaching and School Sport project which sees the Trust deliver over 40 hours of free PE lessons into local schools each week reaching almost 2,000 pupils. We have received fantastic support from easyJet over the last six years for this project and again this season were able to extend the programme with the support of the Premier League Charitable Trust.

We were also into our second year of the FA's national Female Football Development (FFD) Programme and through this funding now run over 12 weekly centres for over 140 school year 9-11 girls. On the back of this we were able to recruit four female coaches for the first time and the girls have now become a vital part of the team and coach on many of the other Trust projects as well. Our relationship with Luton Town Ladies FC continues to grow and we have exciting plans for girl's football in Luton for next season which we will be announcing in the next couple of weeks.

Both the School Sport and FFD programme meant we were able to enter over 30 teams in the national Kinder +Sport Girls and Kids Cup which offers under-13 girls and under-11 boys the chance to play at Wembley. Both of our local finals took place on the pitch in front of a packed Kenny End and was an experience the girls and boys will never forget – the boys from Ramsey Manor in Barton again qualified along with the girls from Challney High – neither made the final but had a great time at the regionals.

Our integration late night projects have also grown over the season with the Luton KITS Active Luton project for Marsh Farm, Lewsey Farm and Farley Hill going strong and in a couple of weeks we bring all the boys together for a tournament at the Stadium. We've also teamed up with Streetgames and now have four doorstep clubs in Dunstable and Houghton Regis and we have a further late night session in Bedford with the Borough Council's Just Turn Up project. Overall over 200 boys turn up every week to these sessions which over the last year have been supported by the Police Commissioners Office. We hope to join the Premier League's national Kickz programme for next season if we are successful in bidding for extra funds. Our educational programmes have also grown this season with both literacy and mentoring programmes being delivered to local schools with really great outcomes.

Partnerships are very important to the Trust and once again, we've also teamed up with both the Prince's Trust and Luton Adult Learning to deliver community coaching programmes and have qualified over 35 adults as Level 1 coaches this season. Our most satisfying achievement continues to see the growth of our Men's Disability Team in conjunction with Luton Borough Councils New Horizons group and our increased coaching to school disability groups. We've had some great successes on the pitch as well with our Men's team winning the regional FA People's Cup and the schoolboys from the Grange Academy in Bedford winning the national FA People's Cup – watch out for them on the tv as they will be presented with the cup at this year's FA Cup Final – all proudly sporting Luton Town ties!

All in all it's been a great season – but if it sounds



like we are shutting up shop for the summer then as you can read opposite, the Trust is now entering its busiest period of the year and will be flat out all through the close season engaging with our local community and putting the Town out there. Here's to a promotion winning season next year!

Talent Identification Programme 2015/16 Term 4



Last Saturday we held our end of term 3 assessment games for all of the budding young footballers attending our weekly talent identification programme (TIPs) in Luton.

Over 120 boys turned up for the games as our academy coaches put the boys through their paces to see who might be ready to

begin the journey within our youth development system. Three separate groups of under-7s and under-8s and under-9s to under-11s and under-12s to under-16s played lots of games in an attempt to catch the coaches eye as they all look to make the first step from TIPs into our centre of excellence that train with us once a week with progression to our pre-academy squads which train twice a week and directly feeds the Club's main youth academy.

Next week we start Term 4 which is our last of this season in our search for young talent through our TIPs coaching centres. We have 14 regional football development centres throughout Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire with three in Luton, open to all youngsters aged from school year 2 up to year 11. The TIPs coaching centres offer a nine-week programme ending with a trial match for everyone and a technical report. Successful boys can then progress onto our centre of excellence and pre-Academy development centres with eventual pathways into our Academy.

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
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UNDER-18s


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In the blink of an eye, another season has passed us by. It's been an up and down season in Bedfordshire, with plenty of new faces both on and off the pitch, but the Hatters once again ultimately just fell short of the Play-Off places in their second season back in the Football League.

It took some time for the Hatters' 12 new signings, including Craig Mackail-Smith, Cameron McGeehan and now-captain Scott Cuthbert, to gel as the side didn't win in League 2 in August, stuttering down in 22nd place.

But a turn in fortune, including Luke Guttridge's stunning goal of the season strike against Cambridge, saw the Town win five in six to propel back to 10th. The signs of a recovery had been evident from weeks past, as John Still's side knocked out Bristol City and took Stoke to penalties in an exciting Capital One Cup campaign.

The downs continued as well as the ups, however, as the Hatters took just five wins from 20 approaching Christmas, four of which were away from Kenilworth Road, although one particular highlight came against today's opponents. Paul Benson's 100th minute winner gave the Hatters a 3-2 win at Exeter, a fortnight after the Town slipped out of the FA Cup to a strong Peterborough unit.

Peterborough were to feature later in the season as Kenilworth Road bid farewell to one of its longest servants. Mark Tyler, 297 Luton games to his name, rejoined the Posh for whom he played almost 500 times, ending a sixand-a-half year relationship with the Town that covered the entire Conference endurance.

We also said goodbye to John Still at the turn of the year. With results and form not in the Town's favour, the man who brought the Town back from non-league football departed after more than two years in charge, leaving just before Christmas after four successive defeats.

POSITIVE

But a couple of weeks later, we welcomed a fresh face to Bedfordshire in the form of Nathan Jones. Luton marked a maiden managerial position for the Welshman and former player, who brought positive performances even though results weren't always in the Town's favour.

That was none more so than the 4-1 disappointment at AFC Wimbledon, but Jones and his side recovered to win four in a row and reaffirm the Play-Off push. Consistent inconsistency was to blight the Hatters though, winning

three more in a row later on, but that came after three successive defeats, including two at Kenilworth Road, where the side have profited just six times this season before today.

Indeed it's been on the road where most impressive displays have come, earning fine wins at Plymouth, Oxford and Carlisle – the latter two in the space of five days – to name just a few. But a draw at home to Newport County and a loss at champions Northampton crushed any slim Play-Off hopes, and the Town will have to play in League 2 once again next term.

But it's not been all doom and gloom. The emergence of Jack Marriott – in his first full league season – has been a particular highlight with 14 goals thus far, while Jones will look to use summer training to develop encouraging youngsters including Cameron McGeehan, Pelly Ruddock and Zane Banton to their full potential next term.

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
WITH SUPPORTERS OF YOUTH DEVELOPMENT CHAIRMAN PAUL KING

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A WORD FRO

The Football League Paper



The greatest upset in sporting history? Leicester's remarkable, bookie-busting title triumph can't be far off.

Championship winners in 2014, the Foxes have become the first side since Leeds in 1991 to clinch a top flight title within two years of sealing promotion.

In fact, Claudio Ranieri's men are only the seventh team in post-war history to achieve that feat, and in an era where the mountainous finances of the biggest clubs were thought to have crushed all romance like a bug underfoot.

So in tribute to Leicester's miraculous triumph, let's look back on the illustrious names who also rose from the lower echelons to shake the established order.

Tottenham - 1950/51

Spurs had languished in the second tier for 14 years (albeit with six of them spent at war) when former centre-half Arthur Rowe took charge in 1949.

Following retirement, Rowe had taken a coaching post in Budapest and there helped to develop the famous 'push and run' tactics that would find ultimate expression in the Magic Magyars.

Yet while Ferenc Puskas and his pals would take until the early 50s to perfect their style. Rowe's high tempo Spurs side were playing sides off the park long before that, romping to the Second Division title in 1949/50 before clinching their first top flight honours the very next

Ipswich - 1961/62

In 1957, Alf Ramsey was managing Ipswich in the Third Division South. By 1966, he'd led England to their only World Cup.

In between, he fashioned a side Matt Busby called the "most attractive in England". Led by the free-scoring Ray Crawford, the Tractor Boys won the Second Division in



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1961 and the top flight in 1962, scoring over 100 goals in the process.

Incredibly, Ramsey himself was in the Tottenham side that won back-to-back title in 1951.

Liverpool - 1963/64

When Bill Shankly arrived at Anfield in 1959, one of England's most famous names had degenerated into a bang-average second tier outfit. But, aided by the emergence of Roger Hunt and the inspired signing of lan St John, Liverpool's star was soon on the rise. Promoted as champions in 1961/62, an eighth place finish served notice of their intentions before the top flight was blitzed in 1963/64. A legend - and an era of dominance - was

Man City - 1967/68

Promoted in 1966, a lowly 15th-place finish in their debut campaign convinced managers Joe Mercer and Malcolm Allison that something had to improve. So they hired Joe Lancaster, a former athlete whose fitness regime was so punishing that City's players spent pre-season vomiting and close to collapse. It paid off though - the Citizens, skippered by Tony Book, beat rivals Manchester United to the title by two points.


Nottingham Forest - 1977/78

The only side who can hold a candle to Leicester's achievements are Forest. Brian Clough had taken just three years to turn Derby County from Second Division winners to First Division champions. At Forest he went even better, sealing promotion by the skin of his teeth in 1977 before upsetting all the odds to win a sensational double of League Cup and title in his first season up. But for a guarter-final defeat to West Brom, they would have added the FA Cup too.

Leeds 1991/92

After the abject misery of the eighties, the unexpected glory of the nineties. Rejuvenated and drilled to military perfection under 'Sergeant' Howard Wilkinson, Leeds led by the likes of Gary McAllister and Gordon Strachan - won the final edition of the First Division in 1992, just two seasons after winning promotion. Leicester, though, will hope to avoid the aftermath - burdened by European football and the loss of Eric Cantona, Leeds finished 17th the following year.





LEAGUE LOOK

Rovers are just a point behind Oxford and two behind Accrington. The Memorial Stadium outfit have a better goal difference than Accrington but it's not as good as Oxford's. So, Accrington cannot rely on a point against Stevenage because if Rovers win they're up. Accrington would then need to better Oxford's result to be promoted. Got

it? No, we're sure we lost you two paragraphs back!

Four teams will be promoted (eventually) and we know Northampton, Dagenham and York are three sides the Town won't face

Coming down from League 1 are definitely Crewe and Colchester while Doncaster are all but down and will need a miracle to beat the drop. Either Fleetwood or Blackpool will be in League 1 next season with Fleetwood two points better off going into their games tomorrow.

In the Conference, Cheltenham bounced straight back up as champions, winning 101 points on the way. Either Forest Green, Dover, Braintree or Grimsby will join them.

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THE FINAL WORD.

It was a Friday in November 2008. I was in a pub in Northampton. It was lunch time. My phone rang. "Can you go to Shrewsbury tomorrow and be our press officer?" asked the voice at the other end.

I would say there was no hesitation, but I'd be lying. Eventually I summoned in my own inarticulate way "yeah, okay, cool, great." Perhaps I was aware of what I had just let myself in for.

I hastily arranged transport. 24 hours later I was inside the New Meadow, and there I sat, witnessed and wrote about Luton Town losing 3-0. Two months later, the voice I bumbled that overawed response to, Gary Sweet, was my boss.

It was always my dream to write about this Club of ours. My Dad first took me to watch the Town in October 1990, and I started writing about the Hatters when I was 13. I still have the hand-written reports.

These final words of this programme, however, will be my last for Luton Town. After seven seasons as editor and as press officer, this is it. I've decided to swap football for beach volleyball, in Vienna, 953 miles from Kenilworth Road. No, I'm not pulling your leg.

It barely seems two minutes since I celebrated the news that I'd be calling the Kenny my workplace but, just like it started, my swansong ended with defeat – at home to

Stevenage. I joked afterwards that I wouldn't have wanted it any other way. Defeat in the job always tested your resolve, your patience, your loyalty. Putting a brave face on an away defeat at Forest Green or Braintree, fishing the boss out of a down and disappointed dressing room on a Tuesday night miles from home. It was part and parcel of it all.

So what will I miss? Well, apart from my colleagues around the place – you know who you are – it will be always be the buzz of a matchday. I don't think that adrenaline rush of game day can be matched. I thrived on it and I loved it.

Memories? Well, they will all be there until my brain decides to tell me otherwise. And there are plenty. A barely believable and devastating opening 17-minute period at Alfreton when the Town raced into a 4-0 lead is up there. The palpable relief when Alex Lawless scored an injury-time winner at Welling on a Tuesday night in the FA Trophy is another.

Then there's Wembley – twice – one good, one bad. The JPT triumph came just three months



into the job. I was trembling in the tunnel afterwards, interviewing goal hero Tom Craddock. Both of us were realising childhood dreams. He'd scored at Wembley; I was talking to a footballer inside the tunnel. Well I was never any good at football but this was good enough for me.

And I'll casually throw in a titlewinning season, too. That was just champion.
