Backed by Pools' boss Ronnie Moore to win the title this season, the Hatters showed their clinical nature as they took their chances.

At the other end, Pools had 17 shots at goal – and converted only one as they lost heavily at home for the second time in a week.

Substitute Jack Marriott netted twice to turn the game on its head, and victory was capped off by a fine strike in injury time by midfielder Ollie Lee.

"We are delighted with the result after a few miles this week. To score seven away in two games is fantastic.

"We've got 15 on the road this season already and only got 23 all last season – but it was a bit too open for me.
