THE MANAGER



NATHAN JONES

Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for the second home game in five days as we entertain Shrewsbury Town in Sky Bet League One.

I'd like to extend the welcome to Bedfordshire to all supporters who have followed their team down from Shropshire today, as well as Shrewsbury directors, officials, manager John Askey, his staff and their squad, and wish them a safe journey back north this evening.

Shrewsbury have experienced a lot of changes on and off the pitch this summer, but we know that they will present another tough League One test for us this afternoon.

While we continue to adapt to the new level, Shrewsbury have been established in this division since our own James Collins' goals helped them win promotion for a second time three years ago, and last season they came as close as you can to winning promotion to the Championship.

Rocking

It's the kind of fixture we have been looking forward to since winning promotion, and if the atmosphere for the draw against Sunderland and midweek victory over Southend is anything to go by, the old place will be rocking again today.

On Tuesday night I made four changes to the side that lost at Peterborough as I was bitterly disappointed with how we had performed in the first half of that defeat. Southend are a good side with a top manager in Chris Powell, but I thought we were magnificent from start to finish.

Ironically, we probably had less possession and chances against Southend than we did in the previous game, but we defended superbly against one of the more direct teams we'll come up against and could have won more convincingly if we'd taken a couple of our chances on the break in the second half, when some of our attacking play was outstanding.

The ability to rotate players is something we have worked towards over my two-and-a-half years here, with the depth and quality of players in the squad meaning I can pick any combination and be confident that I'm going to get a performance. The competition for each position is there for all to see.

Passionately

Finally, to you, the supporters. We know we need a new stadium for all sorts of reasons, but this place is brilliant when it's packed and when you respond so passionately to what you're seeing on the pitch, as was the case from minute one in midweek, it makes the hairs on the back of your neck stand up.

Please give it everything again today to help us build on the unbeaten start we've had here so far before we head back out on the road for a couple of weeks, when we know you'll be following us in great numbers as ever.

Enjoy the game.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER GARY SWEET

Here we go again! The second instalment of a home double-header, and if we all walk out of Kenilworth Road at teatime tonight with the same feeling as we did late on Tuesday, we'll have been treated to another enthralling 90 minutes of League One football.

Before I move on to our performances and results so far this season though, let me start by welcoming Shrewsbury Town to Bedfordshire. The Shrews won promotion in our first season back in the Football League having beaten us 2-0 in Shropshire and drawn 0-0 in front of the Sky cameras here with a certain James Collins leading their line.

They've become a well-established third tier side now and came close to pulling off one of the stories of the season when they reached the play-off final last time out. However, Shrewsbury are much changed this season having recruited a new manager in John Askey, and they come in search of their first victory – something we thankfully managed against Southend in midweek.

Evident

We've already seen a noticeable difference in standard between Leagues Two and One, although travelling to Portsmouth and Peterborough – the two clubs with 100 per cent records so far – as well as hosting the title favourites Sunderland, is as tough a start as we could have imagined. It's evident to the many who have attended so far that we probably deserve more points than we have accumulated.

Even though we know from our outstanding home record last season and unbeaten start to this one that this squad thrives the pressure of expectation here at Kenilworth Road, your patience will be needed. We won't have it all our own way, but we may find that having more adventurous visitors could suit us even more.

New players Matty Pearson, Sonny Bradley and Jorge Grant have already been welcomed in these pages by my colleagues this season, and we have already witnessed the reasons we brought them to the club. Welcome and well done, boys!

Experience

Off the field, we have a few changes too. We are delighted to welcome Paul Watson in to the football club as General Operations and Development Manager, working with me on developing both football and infrastructure projects. Paul's wealth of football and commercial experience will be immensely valuable.

Many of you who came to our public exhibitions a couple of years ago will know our property and planning consultant, Michael Moran.

Having now worked with us for over five years, I'm happy to report that Mike has now joined 2020 Developments permanently as Chief Operations Officer. Alongside me, Mike will continue to manage and progress our projects at Power Court and Newlands Park ensuring our planning applications are delivered.

It is almost becoming an annual event; for me to furnish you with an update as to the progress of our planning applications.

Having just passed our second anniversary of our submission for our schemes at Newlands Park and Power Court, we can feel your frustration and I can be confident that the piece I shall be writing

in my first programme notes of next season will be discussing more definite relocation plans.

And, with our progress on the pitch continuing, it is needed more than ever. With over 6.000 season ticket members, two very well attended home games where fewer than five per cent of our seats remained empty, a very impressive 5,750 in total travelling away and two occasions where demand has exceeded supply, there is no doubt we need a bigger facility.

Most of you will know from the local media that the final hurdle – in the shape of consultation on the Council's Retail Impact Assessment, as written by independent third-party specialists - is now closing during the next week.

Once all responses are properly considered by the planning officer, he will then write his committee report recommending to either support or oppose our applications at a Council committee meeting, which should now take place in a few weeks from then.

Challenge

Once a decision is finally made by our Councillors there will still be a few hurdles to jump while greater powers decide whether to review anything before we receive an official decision notice. And even after that, there will also be several design details and commercial agreements we'll need to reach with development partners before we put a spade in the ground, so, whilst we work as hard and speedily as we possibly can, we will still ask you to remain patient and faithful.

In summary, whilst the process has been prolonged due to the challenge placed upon the Council's planning department and scrutiny of various third parties, we're very happy with the position we are currently in and we're really looking forward to taking the next step. It's not a matter of 'if', it's just a matter of 'when'.

Meanwhile, we still have a duty to look after our lovely old girl, Kenilworth Road. Due to EFL rules we still have regulations to comply with. This week,

we signed a new ten-year rolling lease with Luton Council. This lease not only gives us the required security of tenure throughout our relocation phase. but it also sees an end to Luton Town's rent 'in-lieu or community contribution' contract as we have amicably agreed a fair commercial sum for our tenancy.

There's nothing to read between the lines here. Upon our relocation this lease will terminate allowing for the site to be developed for much needed community use and housing, as determined.

Proud

Finally, on behalf of everyone at the Club, I would like to formally congratulate vice president Emma Banks on the announcement that she will receive the MITS Award 2018, in recognition for her outstanding services to the global music industry.

Coincidentally, this is the identical award won by another vice president, Rob Stringer, only last year. Not only are we so proud to have such wonderful representation within the music industry but we are very confident no other club can boast having two MITS winners as such strong supporters.

Indeed, our strong links into the music business has also been boosted by the arrival of lan Montone as a new vice president to go with the ever-welcome support we receive from the likes of Cerys Matthews, Steve Abbott and the up-coming talent that is Tom Grennan, who we know well since his time with our academy. On that musical note. let's have plenty more of the supportive songs that bounced around the Kenny on Tuesday night. It was a great atmosphere that I know our players respond to on the pitch.

Come on you Hatters - more of the same today, please!


OPEN TRAINING SESSION ON TUESDAY

CLUB CHARITY OF THE YEAR LUTON FOODBANK

It was with great pleasure that we announced Luton Foodbank as the club Charity of the Year earlier this month.



The Luton Foodbank aims to eradicate food poverty in our town by handing out food parcels to families who are struggling with the pressures of low income.

It also works with partner organisations to support people so that they can take steps to overcome their issues. The charity has been serving the people of Luton for over five years, with the dayto-day operations of the Luton Foodbank run by a committed team, supported by a strong group of volunteers.

"We are quite a small charity but are lucky to have some great people working for us," said Liz Stringer, chairperson of the Luton Foodbank.

Attending the Southend match on Tuesday along with other board members, staff and volunteers (pictured right) Liz went on to thank the club.

"Furthermore, we have found that over the years that we have benefitted from the generous nature of people from our town. Luton Town adopting us as their Charity of the Year is a great example of that."

"We have people from all walks of life that give their free time to the charity, whether that be collecting food donations for us, or helping us in our warehouse operations."

One of the youngest supporters is Dirk Withnail (pictured far right with his father, Greg and brother, Jasper). In 2016, Dirk, then just ten years of age, raised over £1,000 for Luton Foodbank by completing the Ridgeway National Trail, a 139-kilometre walk between Avebury, in Wiltshire, and Ivinghoe Beacon, in Buckinghamshire.



Dirk was named Young Hero of the Year at the 2016 Luton & Bedfordshire Community Awards. He has also taken part in the Luton Foodbank Colour Run as a runner and as a helper, and has often used his pocket money to buy items for the charity.

"It is sad that in the world that we are living in that we still have people going hungry," said the 12-yearold.

"A few years ago, our family was struggling, so I know what it is like to be in that position. I'm glad a charity such as the Luton Foodbank exists as it does a great job in looking after those families."

Luton Foodbank service users are able to benefit from food parcels, which are supplied free of charge, are nutritionally balanced and appropriate to their needs.

In addition, the charity supports healthy eating initiatives in local schools as well as Fairtrade programmes.

WELCOME SHREWSBURY TOWN



The Hatters would like to extend a warm welcome to the staff, players and supporters of today's visitors, Shrewsbury Town.

How close can you go? It was a case of in any other year, this game probably wouldn't have happened. The Shrews amassed 87 points last season and somehow missed out on automatic promotion, with both Wigan Athletic and Blackburn Rovers beating them to the top two spots. They reached the play-off final – but a 2-1 defeat to Rotherham United defeat consigned them to another season in the third tier.

That was all achieved under former Grimsby Town boss Paul Hurst, who arrived at the Montgomery Waters Meadow with the club in a bit of relegation trouble, but he successfully guided them away from there before taking them so close to Championship football – as well as a Checkatrade Trophy final.

He departed in the summer, taking the job at Ipswich Town. He also took with him a couple of key players – Jon Nolan and Aristote Nsiala joining the Tractor Boys in a combined £2million deal. Last season's top scorer Stefan Payne has also moved on, signing for Bristol Rovers for an undisclosed fee.

Salop have brought in a new manager in John Askey, who guided Macclesfield Town back into the EFL in the last campaign, and he's recruited well. Lincoln City captain Luke Waterfall was brought in as well as former Hatters striker Lee Angol and loanee Alex Gilliead. However, it hasn't been the start they would have hoped for. Defeats to Bradford and Charlton then successive goalless draws against Blackpool last Saturday and on their midweek trip to Doncaster.

A Conference side for a season in 2003-04, they spent a number of years plugging away in League Two, before going up in 2012, with their top scorer that season bagging 16 goals in all competitions – a certain James Collins.

The striker has had two spells with Salop, having left boyhood club Aston Villa for them in 2011, spending that promotion-winning season with the Shrews. He returned in 2014 after a spell in Scotland with Hibernian, his goals again propelling them to League One football under Micky Mellon.

A Macclesfield Town stalwart – both as a player and a manager – the 53-year-old clocked up 34 years with the Silkmen until he departed Moss Rose in the summer. After starting out at Port Vale, he joined Macc in 1984, going onto play for over 19 years for them, netting 106 goals in 490 appearances. He was appointed assistant manager following his retirement, taking the reins full-time in 2013, having had a brief spell in the 2003/04 season. He guided them back to the EFL last season after taking them to the FA Trophy Final the year before. He hasn't held back in his recruitment either, bringing in a number of signings as Salop try to match last season's third-place finish.

He signed for David Wagner's side having been at Oldham Athletic since a youth team player, and has gone onto make 14 appearances for his parent club, penning a new two-year contract at the John Smith's Stadium. The 22-year-old knows this level well, his time with the Latics saw him make 45 appearances in the third tier, before leaving in 2016. He has been first choice since his

arrival at Salop, keeping his first clean sheet of the campaign in the 0-0 draw at Blackpool last weekend.

GOALKEEPER STEVE ARNOLD AGE: 29

A summer signing after departing Barrow, the stopper signed a two-year deal with the Shrews. The ex-Stevenage man began his career at Norwich City.

DEFENDERS JAMES BOLTON AGE: 24

An ever-present for the Shrews last season, he joined Salop on a two-year deal for an



undisclosed fee from Gateshead in July 2017.

MAT SADLER AGE: 33

The club captain, he is now in his second spell with the club, having previously been on loan with Salop in 2010/11. Began his career at Birmingham City.

RYAN HAYNES AGE: 22

Haynes joined from League One rivals Coventry City this summer, having progressed through the youth ranks at the Ricoh Arena.

CLASSIC CLASH WITH THE SHREWS

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH DELVES INTO HIS ARCHIVES...

30TH APRIL 1982 • LUTON TOWN 4 SHREWSBURY TOWN 1

After winning 3-1 at Norwich over Christmas 1981, the Hatters found themselves sitting proud at the top of Division Two (now the Championship), seven points clear of the next side with two games in hand.

Unfortunately, bad weather then set in and it was to be over three weeks before another League game was played and in a frantic contest played on a sea of mud at The Valley, the Town fought out a 0-0 draw with Charlton in a less than convincing performance.

The free-flowing football which had been the Town's trademark in the period leading up to Christmas was no longer in evidence and was creating a few worries behind the scenes as the chasing pack began to close the gap.

Away wins turned into draws and the games at home were not easy on the eye as, although Oldham and Cambridge were seen off at Kenilworth Road, they were turgid affairs, leaving rumblings of fear that the Town's campaign would end in major disappointment after the brilliant start.

There then followed our worst spell of the campaign, with a string of five games without a win, culminating in the loss of top spot to Watford.

Supporters were beginning to sense the alarm bells ringing after the Hatters went down 4-3 at windswept Barnsley for our first defeat of the year, and nerves were really jangling when, from a leading 3-2 position at Crystal Palace, the Town were stung by a late equaliser.

A 0-0 draw at Derby and loss of top spot seemed to be the kick up the backside the players needed, and three days later pole position was regained

after Orient were seen off at Kenilworth Road. All was then set fair when the Town beat a physical Blackburn side at home the following Saturday to open up a lead again.

Over 4,000 Luton supporters made the short trip to Cambridge on Easter Saturday to witness a tense 1-1 draw before Norwich, on the crest of a wave, visited Kenilworth Road on the Monday and did everything but score in a one-sided first half.

The interval team talk, which went along the lines that the Canaries could not play any better in the second period, proved to be true as goals from Brian Stein and on-loan Billy Jennings settled the issue.


Then, in a terrific game at Kenilworth Road, Newcastle took a 2-0 lead before Brian Stein stepped up to win the match for the Hatters, scoring a hat-trick, including two of the poorest penalties ever seen on this ground!

Next in line were Chelsea, who pulled in a crowd of 16,185 to Kenilworth Road and were fortunate to escape with a point from a 2-2 draw, as the Town laid siege on their goal for almost the whole match.

Despite the loss of two points, the Hatters were still pulling away from the pack and promotion was looking an increasing certainty.

The visit to Rotherham was seen as a tough test as the Millers had enjoyed a terrific second half to the season, and were seeking a first ever promotion to Division One. The match was petering out to a 2-2 draw when Rotherham were awarded a dubious penalty which was well saved by reserve goalkeeper, Alan Judge – effectively ending the Millers' promotion challenge.

When the dust had settled, it could be seen that a win over struggling Shrewsbury at Kenilworth Road the following Friday evening would clinch promotion back to the top flight.

A tense crowd of 14,563 gathered to watch and transmitted their anxiety on to the pitch, where it became obvious that the Shrews were hoping for a point.

Nerves were settled for a while when Brian Stein latched on to a route one clearance from goalkeeper Jake Findlay in the 14th minute to cleverly lob the Town into the lead.

The Hatters, however, failed to control the midfield and stuttered through the rest of the first half without playing any of the free-flowing football that had brought them to the gates of promotion.

Hearts sank when Ian Atkins, with just about the Shrews' only real attack of the game, equalised on the hour with a brilliant volley, but when Raddy Antic was brought on a few minutes later we started to look a team again.

It is now written in Kenilworth Road folklore as to how Ricky Hill ended the stalemate with a volley, after a corner was headed to him by Mal Donaghy in the 78th minute, and with the floodgates now open, goals from Steve White and David Moss secured a flattering victory. But did we care? We were up!

THE LAST TIME SHREWSBURY CAME TO TOWN

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH REPORTS ON THE SHREWS' LAST VISIT TO KENILWORTH ROAD

8TH JANUARY 2015

LUTON TOWN 0 SHREWSBURY TOWN 0 (LEAGUE 2)

In their first season back in the Football League the Town started off tentatively before hitting a run of form that saw them top the table in mid-November.

A narrow and undeserved defeat at Burton on 22nd November started a slump from which the team never fully recovered.

By the time of the visit of high-flying Shrewsbury on 8th January, the Hatters were still hovering around the play-off positions but a lack of goals was hindering any further progress.

Attempts were made to sign 33-year-old free agent Andy Johnson, but when that avenue looked closed Luton manager John Still brought in 21-year-old Jayden Stockley on loan from Bournemouth.

Stockley made his debut against the Shrews in a game that was shifted to a Thursday evening to accommodate the Sky TV cameras. The cameras affected the crowd with the result that only 7,666 were in attendance, the lowest of the season.

Shrewsbury made it pretty obvious from the start that they had come for a point, but their plans were almost upset when Jake Howells saw his shot come back into play off a post in the fourth minute.

Stockley led the line well but it was not until Shaun Whalley was introduced off the bench late on, and Shrews defender Nat Knight-Percival was dismissed for two yellow cards in quick succession, that the Town looked really threatening.


At the other end Luton goalkeeper Mark Tyler had a quiet night as Steve McNulty handled the threat of Shrewsbury danger man James Collins well.

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS PROFILES FOUR NOTABLE POST-WAR SHREWSBURY TOWN GOALSCORING PARTNERSHIPS

FRANK CLARKE & HARRY MIDDLETON

Striker Frank Clarke was leading marksman as Shrewsbury Town reached the FA Cup fifth round in 1965-66. The eldest of five footballing brothers, he joined Shrewsbury from Willenhall in November 1961 and also featured in their 1967-68 promotion near-miss. He netted 77 goals in 188 League games while at Gay Meadow before moving to QPR in February 1968, helping them clinch promotion to the top-flight.

Joining Ipswich Town in March 1970, he moved to Carlisle United August 1973 and was an important figure as they reached the top-flight in 1973-74. He later became a supervisor at the Adams Sports Centre in Wem.

Ex-England Youth forward Harry Middleton was Shrewsbury Town's leading marksman in 1963-64. Signing professional for Wolves in August 1954, he joined Scunthorpe United in September 1959 and moved to Portsmouth in June 1961. He featured in their 1961-62 Third Division title campaign, moving to Gay Meadow in February 1962. Scoring 36 times in 85 Third Division games for Salop, he joined Mansfield Town in November 1964 and was top scorer in their 1964-65 promotion near-miss, then played for Walsall, Worcester City and Tamworth. He later ran his own insurance brokers business in Tamworth.

ALF WOOD & GEORGE ANDREWS

Alf Wood was the Football League's joint leading marksman with 35 goals in 1971-72. An England Youth international, he turned professional with Manchester City in June 1963 and featured in their 1965-66 Second Division title campaign.

He joined Shrewsbury in June 1966 and starred as a central defender in their 1967-68 promotion nearmiss, netting 65 goals in 258 League games before moving to Millwall in June 1972. Later with Hull City, Middlesbrough, Walsall and Stafford Rangers, he became commercial manager at Birmingham City, then ran his own promotions business. He has settled in Sutton Coldfield.


Striker George Andrews was Shrewsbury Town's leading goalscorer in 1970-71. Signing professional for Luton Town in January 1960, he had spells with Dudley and Lower Gornal prior to joining Cardiff City in October 1965.

He was a League Cup semi-finalist in 1965-66 and moved to Southport in February 1967, helping to clinch promotion that season.

Following Terry Harkin to Shrewsbury for £10,000 in November 1969, he netted 49 goals in 124 League games before joining Walsall in January 1973, then played for Worcester, Telford, Oldswinford and Tipton where he worked for the local parks maintenance department.



RAY HAYWOOD & CHIC BATES

Striker Ray Haywood was ever-present top scorer in Shrewsbury Town's 1974-75 promotion triumph. He was a key figure as Stourbridge won promotion as champions of the Southern League's Division One North and were Welsh Cup finalists in 1973-74, moving to Shrewsbury with Chic Bates in May 1974. Scoring 27 goals in 87 League games, he joined Northampton Town in March 1977, then reunited with Allan Grundy at Kidderminster Harriers in October 1977. He was leading marksman in 1977-78, scoring as they took Cardiff City to a Welsh Cup quarter-final replay. Later at Hillingdon Borough, he returned to teaching and emigrated to the United States, settling in New Jersey.

Striker Bates was also ever-present in Shrewsbury Town's 1974-75 promotion success. Along with Haywood, he had starred as Stourbridge won promotion and reached the Welsh Cup final in 1973-74, moving to Shrewsbury with Haywood in May 1974. Leading marksman in 1976-77, he joined Swindon Town in January 1978 and moved via Bristol Rovers back to Shrewsbury in December 1980. He was player-boss from July 1984 until November 1987, plotting Salop's 1985 Welsh Cup final triumph. Later assisting Lou Macari at Swindon, Birmingham, Celtic and Stoke, becoming manager, he returned to Shrewsbury as head of youth strategy.



CARL GRIFFITHS & KEVIN SUMMERFIELD

Welsh U21 striker Carl Griffiths scored 30 League and Cup goals for Shrewsbury Town in 1992-93. He turned professional with Shrewsbury in September 1988 and featured in their 1993-94 Third Division title campaign, netting 54 goals in 143 League games before joining Manchester City in October 1993. He had spells with Portsmouth and Peterborough, moving to Leyton Orient in March 1997 and was top scorer in 1997-98. Joining Port Vale in March 1999, he rejoined Orient in December 1999 and helped reach the play-offs in 2000-01, then played for the Hatters, Harlow Town and Braintree. He managed Brentwood Town and Aveley.

Ex-England Youth international Kevin Summerfield starred in Shrewsbury Town's 1993-94 Third Division title triumph. He helped West Brom win the FA Youth Cup and joined Birmingham City in May 1982, then Walsall and Cardiff City before moving to Plymouth in December 1984. Helping win promotion in 1985-86 and take Everton to an FA Cup fourth round replay in 1988-89, he joined Shrewsbury in October 1990. He starred in their 1990-91 FA Cup run and 1993-94 Third Division title triumph, netting 22 goals in 163 League games. Rejoining Plymouth as youth coach, he has since held coaching posts at various clubs.

ON THE James Collins CENTRE SPOT

We asked for your questions on our social media channels to put to James Collins ahead of today's clash with his former club Shrewsbury Town. Here the 27-year-old striker is the latest Hatter to be put On The Centre Spot!

Hatters Hoare: How old were you when you knew you wanted to play football as a career? And if you weren't playing, what would you be doing for a living?

I first got into seven-a-side when I was seven or eight. The dad of one of my mates from school was setting up a team in Coventry, Morris Rangers, and asked me to come along. After a few games I started enjoying it and doing quite well, and it went from there. If I hadn't become a footballer, I always quite liked the idea of being a fireman. It's funny because my little boy really loves fire engines and Fireman Sam now – and I was the same when I was really young.

Itfc_news: What made you decide to come to Luton?

The gaffer was a big part. I had a couple of options, but then I met the gaffer and liked what he had to say, and the new training ground had just been built as well. Last season was the first full season we had in here at The Brache. I'd played against Luton a few times at Kenilworth Road and always found it an intimidating place to come. It's not too far from home for me as well, so everything ticked the boxes. It turned out to be a good move in the end because we achieved what we wanted to last year, and we want to do the same again this year.

baileyneale06: How did you feel after your first game for the Hatters?

It was surreal, really. To score a hat-trick on your debut – the first game of a new season – it was what dreams are made of. To play in front of a full house and to win 8-2 as well – to be a part of that – was amazing. The fans were great with me. We couldn't have got off to a better start.





Porek S Borino: What is Danny Hylton like as a strike partner compared to previous strike partners?

Hylts is a unique figure, isn't he? He is desperate to do well and score goals, and that's a good trait to have. He wants to be on the scoresheet, and I think every striker needs to be like that. We get called selfish as strikers, but he really wants to do so well for himself and the team, and he works so hard. He's good to play with because he takes a lot off the stick off the opposition, and fans, and it's not easy sometimes so the rest of us get away with a little bit. His record for this club and his work-rate is phenomenal, and that's why the fans love him. The lads do too. He's a big player for us.

ignition james_rutherford: Do you and Hylton have much chemistry off the pitch?

Yes, I get on really well with Hylts. A lot of people asked us that last year – 'do we get on?' And 'why do we not pass to each other?' Stuff like that, but I think that's just people picking up on stuff that's not really there. We have coffees together, we sit near each other in the dressing room. I think what it is, we both want to do so well and we push each other. He pushes me and I push him. We do gym work together, so we both bounce off each other because we both want to be the best. I think that's a good thing for the team.

■ QutonTownExile: Couple here: What is the best bit of advice you've received from Mick Harford since being at the club? And what do you think is the single most important attribute for a successful goalscorer in modern football?

That's a good question. I get on really well with Mick and he's been brilliant for me since I got here, always asking me how I'm doing and saying 'well done', asking me about what games were like. He's always in and around the boys and it's great



having him here because he's a legend, not only at this club but in football. We always pick Mick's brain about who we are going to be playing against, because he's been to watch them ahead of the game. That's the main advice he gives us. Most important attribute for a successful goalscorer... of course, you have to be able to put the ball in the net. If things aren't going well for you, just keep going and getting in the right areas, keep working hard and your chances will come. Eventually once they do go in, they'll keep going in. Just not getting yourself down if they don't.

Alan Cordt: Who is the most gifted player in the squad?


I'd say the most gifted footballer is probably Elliot Lee or Shins. Those two are both lovely footballers. They've both got great feet, great awareness. I'd say those two are a pleasure to watch in training when they are at it. Sometimes a bit annoying for us strikers because they keep hold of it for a bit too long! But when they are on form, the pair of them are something special.

☑ @SteveLTFC1: What's your best moment in the famous Hatters shirt? And what was the most important goal you scored in your career? Definitely Carlisle away. The coach journey home.

Definitely Carlisle away. The coach journey home. All the fans up there, during the game. Everything about it. On the pitch, we didn't know the results elsewhere so we didn't know what was going on at the final whistle, but then in the dressing room afterwards...it was just that relief that it was finally done. So many memories. When Olly Lee scored! I knew how he felt – and this answers the second part of the question – because I scored the goal that got Shrewsbury promoted out of League Two in 2011-12. We beat Dagenham 1-0 at home, and that goal secured my first-ever promotion. I was only 21, so I'd say that. It was an amazing feeling.

@BibleHatters: In training, who is the hardest defender to get past?

Pottsy is really good one-on-one, and JJ as well – but I'm not really a lad who gets running at players. I'm more, just getting myself in the box and holding it up, but all of our defenders are tough in training. We play an 1.1×1.1 on a Thursday and sometimes that's the hardest game of the week.

It was 19 league goals and 20 including the FA Cup one against Portsmouth! I enjoyed the Swindon one, and that was probably my best. But the one I enjoyed most was Coventry away because I'm a Cov boy, a Cov fan, all my family and friends were in the crowd. It was the equaliser in the last minute after we'd come back from 2-0 down. It doesn't get much better than that.

ignitial jamesball is there a competition with you and Hylton over who scores the most goals? No, not at all. Don't get me wrong, we both want

to finish top goalscorer. We both want to be up there in the league, and we talk about it all the time. We're always talking about other strikers at other clubs who are scoring goals, and compare ourselves, but it's not a competition between me and him. It never has been. We both just try and score as many as we can and we always say that if we are both in and around the double figures to 20 mark as individuals, then we'll succeed as a team.

mattm_01: What rating do you think your FIFA 19 card will be?


What was it last year – 71 or something? Is that's good or bad. I don't really play FIFA. Let's go with 71 again. It can't be any better or worse can it?

ELLIOT STRIKES TO HELP SINK SOUTHEND

Elliot Lee was delighted to score his first goal of the season when he slotted in from close range after just 90 seconds in Tuesday's win over Southend United.

A deflected shot from Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu fell to him just outside the six-yard box, and the former Barnsley forward slotted in to help the Hatters pick up their first win in Sky Bet League One this season.

The 23-year-old, who has most recently been playing at the tip of the diamond just behind the strikers, started the game alongside Hylton in his natural position. As long as he is on the pitch, scoring goals and picking up three points along the way though, the striker is happy.

Lee said: "It's always great for one to land to you like that. I like to think I've got a habit of the ball coming to me in the box, but it's great to get off the mark. But the most important thing is the three points.

"The gaffer knows I am a striker, but I can play very well in the number 10 spot and I can play well on the left. As long as I am in the team I will give one hundred

per cent, I will try and score goals and I will try and create goals for the team.

"At the end of the day though, I am a striker. I want to score goals and I want to create goals.

"On a personal note, it is great to get off the mark. I felt in the first four games on an individual level I've been playing well, feeling fit and all I was missing was the goal.

"Obviously, we've had some disappointing results.

We don't feel that we deserved them but in football, sometimes you don't get what you deserve.

"On a team note, it was fantastic night for everyone. We feel like we worked for the win and we knew it was going to be a tough night, but we knew if we got off to good start then we would give ourselves the best chance, and we did that. I think we put in a thoroughly professional performance."

Lee's creativity in the area caused Southend more problems when he won a penalty in the 32nd minute. His strike partner, Hylton, stepped up to ensure that the Hatters remain unbeaten at Kenilworth Road this season.

After winning a penalty away at Peterborough that was swiftly overruled by the linesman, Lee was happy to assist Hylton who made it two goals in two games.

Lee added: "I saw the defender come in earlier and I thought he might have a little nibble again, and he hit me from the back. I think it was a little bit of redemption from Peterborough when I should have had another one.

"But what goes

around, comes around so luckily we got the decision and fair play to Hylts, he scored a great penalty."



HATTERS HERITAGE

Luton Town Football Club is now 133 years old and has been at the heart of the community for all this time - a longevity record which would be tough to beat.

1885

I can recall my grandfather regaling me with stories of games and incidents from his supporting life – Bob Hawkes, the club's first superstar; Andy Rennie, who used to swing his leg from the hip to produce rocket shots with a heavy leather football; Joe Payne, who netted ten goals in a game in 1936, and Jesse Pye, the finest footballer he

ever saw.

I just wish that I had the forethought and ability to record his memories, and those of his friends, for future generations to enjoy, but there is now a once in a lifetime opportunity to finally record, preserve and share all items of interest from the club's rich history. The Hatters Community Trust have received a grant award from the Heritage Lottery Fund to work in partnership with local schools to enable young people to learn about the heritage of the club.

The town has experienced massive demographic change in the last ten years with families in the town not being aware of the club's amazing 135-year history. While many families have strong ties with the club, many don't.

This project aims to bring Luton Town Football Club into every primary school classroom in Luton to let the next generation of supporters enjoy and celebrate our amazing heritage and to find out who we are, where we came from and where we're going!

The project will provide free schemes of work to over 20 local primary schools that will be a National Curriculum local history project enabling learning in subjects such as Literacy, Numeracy, Science, Geography, Music, Health, Citizenship and PE. Using the power of football and our brand, we will be engaging and motivating children, particularly 'less academic' children, to develop awareness of and pride in the history and heritage of Luton and Luton Town FC.

How many of our older readers can remember getting a wrap across the knuckles for 'decorating' exercise books with club crests and the like? Well, now imagine going to a modern history lesson in the new term to find your exercise book is covered



in Hatters memorabilia! Boy, times have changed and by celebrating our heritage locally, kids can get involved with the Hatters and learn at the same time. Anyone fancy going back to school?!

The benefits to the club of sharing our heritage, ensuring it is better shared and preserved, will be having our history legitimately placed within the school curriculum.

We'll be creating increased interest and enthusiasm among potential future supporters, members and players 'caught' at the right age, and also increasing knowledge, understanding and respect for the club, its history, heritage and importance to the local community.

We'll also have dozens of local teachers acting as agents for the club, promoting it to the next generation of supporters building on our already strong long-term partnerships with local schools.

The project has been a year in development and our new Community Engagement Officer will work with teachers, students and education experts to design and deliver our in-school learning activities.

We'll be piloting in at least two local schools and then delivering across 20 primary schools during the new academic year. This delivery will provide direct engagement with over 400 local primary school children and indirect engagement through school assembly presentations of over 1,800.

We're delighted to have attracted Hatters fan Natalie Holt, who was head of history at Challney Girls School last year, to lead the project along with David Cain, another Hatters Fan and historian who originally hails from Farley Hill, as consultant to the project.

Supported by our existing schools' engagement

team led by James Hatch, the new team will have to design, develop and deliver the whole project from our existing archive, and we are grateful to Club historian Roger Wash for his input to date - with more to come we're sure!

As well as classroom delivery of the club's history and relationship with the Town, the project will train volunteers in oral history enabling them to support the school children to collect memories from older family members with the aim of creating podcasts for broadcast on local community radio.

We'll also be creating memory boxes for use within the community as well as producing a series of exhibitions to tour in schools and the local community.

Here's to celebrating our past and to celebrating the future!





WHO?

A club that continues to defy the odds, with Gareth Ainsworth leading his side to automatic promotion from League Two last season. One of the smallest budgets in the EFL has seen the Chairboys take on cast-offs from other teams at a similar level and reinvigorate them – Adebayo Akinfenwa a good example, banging in 36 goals in two seasons, now aged 36. In charge since 2012, Ainsworth saw his side bounce between promotion hopefuls to relegation contenders over the years, but his achievement of getting them up last season is one of the fairytales you won't hear as frequently, probably given Accrington's League Two title winning campaign.

STADIUM - ADAMS PARK

With a 9,500 capacity, Adams Park is a delightful little ground standing in between the rolling hills of the Chilterns. Built in 1990, it's located at the end of an industrial estate and now hosts Reading Women's home fixtures.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

Town and the Chairboys got one over each other last season – the Hatters snatching all three points from the jaws of defeat in a memorable 2-1 win at Adams Park, before the reverse fixture saw Ainsworth's team defeat the Hatters 3-2 at Kenilworth Road. Town have won 11 of the 25 meetings between the two, drawing nine and only losing five.

PUBS

At the stadium itself, Wycombe have the Scores Bar and Vere Suite, which welcome away supporters.

TRAVEL

A clear run on the M25 and then M40 would take about an hour, but we all know how likely it is the M25 is going to be a smooth trip. The train route from Luton takes you down into London and back out to Wycombe, and is about a four-and-a-half hour round trip.

RESULTS SO FAR

It's been a difficult beginning to life in League One so far this campaign for the Chairboys, as they sit 23rd in the third tier with two points to their name. A good point away on Tuesday night at Plymouth though has more than shown they are ready to take on some of the bigger players in this league. They're also through to the second round of the Carabao Cup, having beaten Charlton Athletic on penalties.

Now in the Wycombe ranks, Craig Mackail-Smith played for the Hatters between 2015-17, before his release last summer. He signed at Adams Park shortly before the 2017-18 campaign kicked off and he has netted ten goals in his time there so far.

The old cliché goes that the league table never lies. It's nonsense.

Even at the end of 46 games, it's arguable whether the League One standings would pass even a daytime TV Jeremy Kyle polygraph test, supposing that were at all possible (it's not, just in case you were hoping to tune into ITV to see Jezza bear-bait a set of statistics).

But the mathematicians among you could work out that, to try to predict each possible outcome of every game in a league, over the course of a campaign, would equate to a very large number – something akin to the amount of atoms in the universe.

So, after just four games, a matching haul of points is by no means an accurate representation of Luton's efforts.

And anyway, those of you mistakenly convinced that things even themselves out over the course of a season, and those more attuned to the sheer chaos of it all, will have likely all heard the same mantra, that the league table is not worth looking at until at least ten games in.

But, here we are, Luton are in 15th position and yet, there shouldn't be too much to worry about, especially as their return to the third tier after ten of the toughest years away, has been the epitome of the phrase, a baptism of fire.

And with the exception of getting burned for 45 minutes at Peterborough, the outlook is largely cheerful.

And no, I'm not still intoxicated from the League Two finale and subsequent celebrations.

There is a school of thought that cold hard results speak the whole truth and nothing but the truth, but try telling that to anyone who was at Portsmouth on the opening day of the season.

So, instead it was Tuesday's 2-0 triumph over Southend that stopped the clock at 3,797 days since Town's last League One triumph. It could've been 4-0 or 5-0 and it wouldn't have flattered Luton after a stellar second half.

More of the same today against Shrewsbury wouldn't go amiss. Nor would the continued renaissance of Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu, the ingenuity of Elliot Lee and a miserly defence that ensured the Shrimpers failed to hit the target once. And that's before you consider James Justin's fabulous midweek cameo, creating another conundrum.

Yet, having lost in the play-off final, you'd expect the Shrews to come good sooner rather than later, too. Preferably the latter.

There's a case to say that their current position in the relegation zone is another example of the League One telling a few fibs, early on.

Thankfully, for Town though, there has been enough evidence so far to suggest that the league table lie won't last long.
