

This afternoon we want to attack and win the game playing our way and make it an entertaining game to watch – which last week wasn't.


It's important that you maintain your backing of the team. The boys



# CHIEF FINANCE OFFICER TO M SCHOFIELD



It is a privilege to be making my debut in this section of the match programme today. I joined the club during the 2017/18 season and still occasionally have to pinch myself to believe what I have witnessed us achieve during that relatively short time.

It's an added little bonus that today coincides with a traditional, but now rare, Saturday 3pm kick-off and the opposition also provide a bit of personal nostalgia. My first real memories of falling in love with the game date back to the late eighties when both we and Sheffield Wednesday were competing in the top-flight, and although it was not one of the fixtures my dad brought me to watch at Kenilworth Road back in the day, writing these notes now brings back some fond football memories from those times.

Therefore, it gives me pleasure to welcome everyone associated with the Owls to Kenilworth Road this afternoon for this Championship fixture. Both clubs have experienced some turbulent periods in subsequent years but I, for one, am very much looking forward to what should be an exciting game, with the two teams level on points and having the opportunity to make a significant leap up the table with a win today.

But beyond the personal indulgence, and much more importantly, this is a

truly momentous time for the club itself. Yet another huge milestone for Power Court came last Friday, with the submission of the detailed planning application for our new stadium. At the time of writing, the submission is still being reviewed by Luton Borough Council's planning officers who will validate the application in the next week, at which point it will all be in the public domain for everyone to see.

Enormous efforts have gone into what is a hugely impressive piece of architecture, one that will embody the uniqueness of Luton – both the club and the town. Everyone at the club is excited to see this shared, with further details on the wider site to follow in due course. We all look forward to seeing the project spearhead the redevelopment of the town centre, helping to return it to all its former vibrant glory.

It would be fair to say that last Saturday's result at Millwall was welcomed with some sense of relief around the club. To finally chalk up the first win that

It's important that we managed to retain most of the squad that won so many admirers in the Premier League last season and it's also been pleasing to add some real depth. The squad looks in great shape for the demands of a long Championship season and it will be exciting to see what Rob and his staff can get out of this talented group now they are back to full strength and have so many more options available.

On that same subject, there was yet more good news this week

with the agreement of a new contract with Alfie Doughty, one of the key members of last season's Premier League squad. On the back of much speculation about his future, this was clearly a top priority for all parties and it was great to finally get this over the line.

Since our last home game here against Queens Park Rangers, we also announced the arrival of Yousuf Sajjad, who has joined us as player recruitment manager, where he will work alongside Phil Chapple, Jay Socik and Mick Harford in identifying our future new talent. Welcome, Yousuf!

For our part, my finance team and I are busy working on both the past - in terms of last year's Premier League accounts - and the future, where the club's

long-term investment strategy requires financial planning and funding. In one very significant way, these two things are linked, with the profits generated by our season in the Premier League and the subsequent parachute payments being fully reinvested in the playing squad, the club's existing infrastructure and, of course, the new stadium. With hindsight, it is tempting to wonder what might have been if we had spent more of this money during the last January transfer window, but it is impossible to say how that might have turned out.

What is certain is that we have stayed true to the principles that have brought the club so much recent success, by living within our means >

and always looking to get the most out of every resource at our disposal. You can all rest assured that while you may not necessarily agree with every decision we make, every decision is made with the longterm success and sustainability of Luton Town firmly in mind while protecting against the short-term thinking that so often blights the wider game.

It's an interesting time in the world of football finance right now - if that's not a contradiction in terms - with financial controls remaining a hot topic in the sports media. I spent a morning down at the EFL offices in London earlier this week as part of their working group on that particular subject. It was also a lively debate at the EFL CEO's meeting on Thursday, which Gary attended. Since the publication of the Fan Lead Review, the sustainability of football clubs has been the rightful primary focus

of the long-standing initiative's objectives. But somehow this needs to be reconciled with the need for a competitively balanced league, while also avoiding the creation of barriers to new investments in clubs.

Whichever angle you come at it from - and there are many different ways to run a football club - this is an extremely difficult circle to square. The good news for us is that we continue to be, by any definition, a good model for a sustainable football club, so while it is essential that we are at the table to have our views heard - and we will - we will continue to thrive whatever the ultimate outcome by being loyal to our principles.

Finally, I would like to pay tribute to former Hatter

Mick Cullen who passed away earlier this month. Those supporters of an older generation will remember his tricky wing play for us in the topflight in the 1950s. Before kick-off today there will be a moment's applause in Mick's honour.

But now for the best part of the job that any accountant could wish for, as all the reporting, modelling and planning my own exceptional team produce, is brought to life where it really counts - out on the pitch. So, fingers crossed for another strong performance, a little more luck in front of goal and a first home win of the season.

# REST IN PEACE



News has reached Kenilworth Road of the sad passing of 1950's winger Mick Cullen at the age of 93.

Born in Glasgow. Mick played junior football in the area and was just starting out as an apprentice sheet metal draughtsman when he was spotted by scout and ex-Town player Doug Gardiner who recommended the 17-year-old to the Hatters as a centre-forward, but manager Dally Duncan soon moved him out to the wing.

He made his League debut for the Town in a 3-1 defeat at Birmingham in April 1952 and starred for the Town as they won promotion to Division One (now Premier League) in 1955 and earned a Scottish cap against Austria a year later, the first Luton player to do so.

Surprisingly transferred to Grimsby in 1958, Mick then finished his career at Derby. Mick remained in Luton and worked at Vauxhall and the railway station car park and was a regular visitor to Kenilworth Road.

Latterly, Mick lived at Trefoil House Care Home in Luton where a delegation from the club, including fellow Scot Kal Naismith, visited him on his 90th birthday.

There will be a period of applause before kick-off to remember him. Rest in peace, Mick.

It is with regret to report the death of loyal Town supporter Philip Charleson following a short illness.

A supporter from the age of six, his uncle would take him during his younger years to nearly every match. However, if Phil found this was not possible, his mum was coerced into taking him.

As the years went by he became a season ticket holder and attended all away matches when he could.



# INS AND OUTS





Since our last home took place on transfer deadline, the club would like to place on record updates to the first team squad.

The Hatters have added **Victor Moses** to the squad – which you can read more on page 35 – and have agreed terms with midfielder **Lamine Fanne**.

Fanne, 20, who was born in Senegal before moving to Spain as a child, has agreed to join from Swedish top-flight club AIK.

Fanne has returned to Sweden where he will finish the season which ends in November and will come to Kenilworth Road permanently in January.

"Lamine is a really exciting young player that has been identified by the recruitment team, and kudos to them for their swift and decisive action," said manager Rob Edwards.

"He's one we all think has really high potential. He is a strong boy but can take the ball. He's more of a defensive midfielder and can be really comfortable holding the ball under pressure.

"He's aggressive and strong in the tackle, and is very skilful."

Meanwhile, **Chiedozie Ogbene** and **Andros Townsend** both left the club, moving to Ipswich and Antalyaspor respectively.

Young striker **Bim Pepple** joined Southend on a season-long loan while academy graduate **Jayden Luker** signed on loan for Grimsby.

The club also mutually agreed the termination of **Louis Watson's** contract.

The submission of detailed plans to Luton Borough Council is a defining milestone in the delivery of a sustainable long-term home for Luton Town Football Club, the increasing ambitions the Club has for its football team and as a vital catalyst

in marking a regenerative era for the town.

The hybrid application will provide full detail on the stadium and will also include an updated outline submission for the hotel and music venue. This pack, which includes a core Design and Access Statement supported by a variety of technical reports, was delivered to the Council's Planning Office on 13th September and will now be formally validated by officers once everything is found to be complete. This process could take up to two weeks and, once validated

all documents will be in the public domain.

# Gary Sweet, Chief Executive of Luton Town Football Club and 2020 Developments:

"This important announcement is a pivotal moment for all supporters, residents and businesses of Luton. It also marks an important milestone for everyone who has worked tirelessly and diligently on the project over the last few months to shape it masterfully into the magnificent building we have presented to the planning officers.

"Once our lives changed 16 months ago with promotion at Wembley, concurrent to the gargantuan task of getting Kenilworth Road Premier League ready - which naturally dominated our workload for most of last year - we decided to reassemble a design team to take a fresh look at the whole Power Court project from foundations upwards. All in light of the new ambition, we wanted to embrace for our Club going forwards, demonstrated by the proposal to build a 25,000 stadium capacity in one phase.

structured an elite design team of architects, engineers and technicians who have been working with us, crafting every floor and corner of our new stadium to a detailed stage such that it can now be submitted, publicly aired and presented as a well-prepared detailed design instruction for contractors.

"We hand-picked and

"I personally want to take this opportunity to give a huge thanks to the entire team of specialist technicians who have submerged themselves into this colossal task so efficiently and to do so by breaking the mould in stadium design. They have pushed the boundaries beyond the norm in order to remain loyal to our original desired look and feel and have incorporated more unique cultural characteristics that will make this a familiar home for us all."

Together with sustained progression on the pitch and re-stating the Club's cultural identity and community work off it, the delivery of a new home was going to be the key cornerstone to be accomplished when the 2020 group became custodians of the Club in 2008.

It was known from the very outset that identifying a site such as Power Court, with all its inherent technical and commercial challenges, was an ambitious ask – but the 2020 board was unwavering in its desire to embed the Football Club into the heart of the community and town. Furthermore, there was a robust belief that the technical brief that challenged the design team needed to include characteristics that embodied the atmosphere, intimacy and intensity of Kenilworth Road; that positive emotional spirit that has been precious to so many past generations will be carried forward for the future generations of Luton to enjoy in an innovative, modern form.

The Club will now focus on engaging with and assisting Luton Borough Council's officers to work towards a determination date before the end of the year, thereby enabling material stadium construction to commence on site within six months of such determination, as we move towards a target completion of 2027.

Michael Moran, Chief Operating Officer of 2020 Developments: "Beginning with the original purchase of this site back in 2016, it has been a long process of concluding all the various associated land deals and legal consents, outline planning applications and then the various infrastructure challenges of moving a major substation and diverting the River Lea.

"Together with the recent confirmation of planning approval for our earthworks and site remediation efforts, our project team are now fully engaged on a construction timeline that would complete in 2027.

"In addition to, we hope, a truly unique stadium that will resonate with all football supporters, we are committed to achieving a BREEAM 'Excellent' rating to demonstrate our intent to achieve a sustainable environment in support of the Luton 2040 initiative."

Chairman of Luton Town Football Club and 2020 Holdings, David Wilkinson:

"As an invested observer into this project it was staggering to see the amount of work that has gone into every detail, with such exceptional craftmanship.

"We appreciate some may be anxious to see some visible progress – as indeed we all are – but the sheer volume of forced changes brought about by society, politics, economic forces and our very own growth, has ultimately led to a bigger, better, more ambitious, more beautiful and more sustainable end product which we are all excited to present.

"We all need to positively get behind our team now to hope that, while we watch the cranes put the concrete and steel in place, the wonderful new stadium debuts as the home to a Premier League team."

The Town were narrowly beaten 2-1 by QPR as the visitors came back from a goal to win at Kenilworth Road.

The visitors had the first attempt of the game. The ball dropped to Michael Frey and he was able to find Kader Dembele who dragged his shot wide.

However, the Hatters took the lead in the 18th minute, a powerful header from Mark McGuinness was parried back into defender Jimmy Dunne who turned it into his own net.

The Town thought they had a penalty when Carlton Morris was deemed to be brought down following an Alfie Doughty free-kick from the edge of the Rs box, but the referee waved the protests away.

The Hatters would keep up the persistent attacks; this time Doughty finding space down the left side before whipping a delightful low cross across the face of the goal as Elijah Adebayo was unable to get enough on it to score.

It could have been a second on the half-hour mark when Adebayo was played through by Doughty but the shot was deflected just wide.

QPR had a couple of corners on the stroke of half-

Reece Burke made way at the break for Teden Mengi as the Town would start the strongest in the second half with Adebayo and Morris linking up well.

Rangers goalkeeper Paul Nardi prevented the Hatters from doubling the lead, a fantastic through ball from Shandon Baptiste found Adebayo but he was unable to put it through the keeper's legs.

The Rs would hit back on the hour mark making the most of the missed Luton chances, Nicolas Madsen tapping it in from six yards after a breakaway from Frey.

Rangers then took the lead minutes later with a cross from Kenneth Paal met by a clean volley from Frey.

The Town looked for an instant response. Adebayo yet again found space in behind the Rs defence, this time firing off a shot at the QPR goal which was saved comfortably at his near post.

It could have been three for the visitors, this time Dunne's header was cleared off the line by Thomas Kaminski before it was knocked out of play.

The Town then twice came close to finding a late equaliser. Firstly Morris' shot was saved well by Nardi before substitute Joe Taylor thought he had agonisingly over the crossbar.

It was achieved thanks to centre-half Teden Mengi's fine strike as early as the 10th minute and those vital pieces of Kaminski goalkeeping.

Showing three changes to the side that lost to QPR last time out, including a first start for Marvelous Nakamba in league action since December, the Town's enterprising start was rewarded thanks to the former Manchester United centre-half.

Alfie Doughty, employed in the right-wing-back role in the absence of the ill Reuell Walters, saw his shot saved. The Hatters remained patient when receiving the ball back, Liam Walsh - making his first start for the club laying the ball off to Mengi on the edge of the penalty area. The defender took aim early and his firm strike gave the unsighted Lukas Jensen no chance.

Ahead, the Town comfortably kept the Lions at arms' length and it was almost 2-0 on 22 minutes when Tahith Chong's wonderful shot on the turn back across goal rebounded off the post.

Whenever Millwall pushed forward the Hatters defence coped easily with the Lions' threat and moments before

half-time Mengi came close to doubling his tally when his low shot following a Town corner was kept out well by Jensen.

After the break, with Elijah Adebayo battling well in attack against the Millwall defence on his own, he was replaced with 20 minutes to go for Carlton Morris to make his 100th appearance in Luton colours and moments later Walsh spurned a good chance for 2-0, shooting straight down Jensen's throat.


That would prove to be the Hatters' final chance of the afternoon as Kaminski took centre stage. With nine minutes to go Macaulay Longstaff raced clear of the Town defence with only Kaminski to beat. With 1-1 at his mercy the Millwall substitute's low shot was denied by the outstretched right boot of the Hatters' Belgian international and the Hatters' lead stayed intact.

As time ticked down into five additional minutes it looked as though the Hatters had done enough - but there was to be one final chance for the hosts.

In the sixth added minute, a left-wing corner was met by a towering header from Lions sub Shaun Hutchinson. The ball flew towards the top corner - but just when you thought the Town would be deflated by a last-gasp equaliser, Kaminski stuck out a strong right hand to turn the ball away to safety and seconds later the referee blew for full-time.

Today, we welcome Sheffield Wednesday to Kenilworth Road who have travelled from Yorkshire for this second-tier fixture.

Danny Rohl's side finished 20th last season, surviving relegation in remarkable fashion having been in the relegation zone for large periods of the campaign.



# Football managers throw support behind dementia

# campaign for World Alzheimer's Month

Alzheimer's Society

Football managers across the men's and women's game, including Hatters boss Rob Edwards, are uniting behind a new campaign to raise awareness of dementia to mark World Alzheimer's Month.

Alzheimer's Society is working with the League Managers Association to encourage its members to wear the charity's forgetme-not pin badge at games during September. The Football Association, Premier League, Barclays Women's Super League, English Football League and Barclays Women's Championship are all backing the campaign.

The organisations are working together to raise awareness of dementia, the scale of the problem and the importance of diagnosis. By bringing attention to the problem, managers hope to help make sure every football fan learns the signs and symptoms of dementia, so they know what to look out for and where to go for help.

The initiative kicked off at England's UEFA Nations League games against Ireland and Finland on 7 September and 10



September respectively, in which interim head coach Lee Carsley and his coaching staff wore the distinctive blue badge. Alzheimer's Society is the official charity partner of The FA and recently announced the partnership has been extended for a fourth year.

Managers and coaching staff across the men's and women's club game have followed suit and have donned the badges during fixtures following the international break.

Dementia is the biggest health and social care issue of our time and the UK's biggest killer, yet still isn't the priority it needs to be. At least one in three people living with

dementia don't have a diagnosis – over 250,000 people across England, Wales and Northern Ireland. A diagnosis is vital to give people access to the care, treatment and support they desperately need.

LMA CEO, Richard Bevan OBE, said: "We're incredibly proud to be working alongside Alzheimer's Society and some of the game's biggest organisations to raise awareness of dementia. We know it is an issue that impacts a number of our members, as well as so many football fans across the country, Bringing the sport together in this way is hugely powerful, and we hope it can get

fans talking so we are all better equipped to spot the signs and symptoms of dementia."

The forget-me-not is a small blue flower that represents remembrance and is long-associated with dementia. People with the condition may experience memory loss, among other symptoms. If anyone would like to purchase a forget-me-not pin badge in support of the charity, they can do so by visiting the Alzheimer's Society online shop. 100 per cent of profits go towards helping fight dementia.

During World Alzheimer's Month, Alzheimer's Society is not only bringing football together, but also working across a number of other sports including cricket, rugby and golf. The charity works across multiple sports through Sport United Against Dementia (SUAD), a board of leading figures in the industry that works together to raise funds and awareness of dementia.

# Welcome VICTOR MOSES!

We welcomed a new face at Kenilworth Road last week in the shape of new signing Victor Moses.

The 33-year-old former Nigeria international has most recently been playing his football in Russia with Spartak Moscow, who he joined in 2021 after a successful loan spell from Chelsea in the 2020/21 campaign.

Born in Kaduna, Nigeria, Victor came to the UK as a boy and played for England from Under-16 to U21 while coming through the ranks at Crystal Palace, where he made 69 appearances and scored 11 goals for the then-Championship club.

He stepped up to the Premier League with a £2.5m move to Wigan Athletic in January 2010, netting nine times in 80 appearances before Chelsea paid £9m to sign him in the summer of 2012.

Moses was part of the squad that won the Europa League in 2012/13, but spent much of his nine years as a Chelsea player out on loan, playing for European giants Liverpool and Inter Milan, as well as domestically for West Ham and Stoke and in Turkey with Fenerbahce. In his time at Stamford Bridge, he made 128 appearances for the Blues, scoring 18 goals, and won the Premier League and FA Cup in successive years in 2017 and 2018, before moving permanently to Spartak for £4.5m in 2021, where he also won the Russian Cup.

Manager Rob Edwards said: "He gives us more strength in depth and versatility, because he's someone who can play both sides or as a number ten.

"He's played for so many different clubs in different ways and shapes, and under different managers, so he's tactically aware. We think he's someone who can provide some really good competition for us.

"I don't want to put too much pressure on him and expect too much too soon. He's not going to come in and start the games straight away. He's got to get used to what we do and how we play, but he's fit, he's able to come in and affect it now, and he definitely makes the squad stronger."

Including 38 caps for Nigeria and 29 for the England age groups, Victor's career spans almost 550 matches, 84 goals, and boasts appearances in two World Cups, the Africa Cup of Nations, Champions League and Europa League, a tournament in which he played in the 2019/20 final for Inter Milan, losing 3-2 to Sevilla.

Victor was excited after putting pen to paper and claiming squad number seven with the Hatters.

"I'm looking forward to it," said Victor in his first interview with LTFC+. "I had a few offers from Europe, but I said to my agent that I set my mind on staying over here, and here we are. I'm very pleased and honoured to be at this club and I just can't wait to get going.

"I spoke to Rob before I came, I spoke to the directors and they told me the plan and the history of the club, and I just want to be part of the success.

"I want to come here and enjoy my football, work hard for the club and for the team, and get back to where we belong in the Premier League."



# NEW DEAL FOR ALFIEL

We were delighted to announce Alfie Doughty pledged his long-term future to Luton Town by signing a new contract earlier this week.

The 24-year-old has impressed on both flanks, but predominantly as a left wing-back since arriving at Kenilworth Road from Stoke City just over two years ago.

After initially working his way to fitness from an injury suffered playing against the Hatters while on loan at Cardiff on Easter Monday 2022, Alfie made his Town debut in a 1-0 win at Norwich in early October that year and has missed just five of the Club's matches in all competitions since.

He has scored five times in 84 appearances, as well as providing countless assists while becoming a real fans' favourite for his work-

rate, pace, precision crossing and danger from set pieces.

After his impressive performances in the Premier League led to speculation of an England call-up last season, Alfie knows exactly the level he wants to get back to - with the Hatters.

"It's a relief," he said after putting pen to paper. "I've been trying to get this done, when I knew about my situation at the club and I wanted to stay, I want to get back into the Premier League with Luton, especially after this couple of years we've had. It's my third year now, I love the club and I'm happy to stay.

"There is a lot that has happened in these last two seasons. Getting signed, having a rough start just because of injuries, then finding my feet again, playing

rollercoaster.





Preserving and appreciating the heritage and history of Luton Town Football Club

The Hatters flew out of the blocks in the 1939/40 season, including a magnificent opening day win against Sheffield Wednesday on 26th August 1939. They were three-up before half-time thanks to goals from Hugh Billington (2) and Reg Stockhill.

However, the final whistle would not only signify confirmation of an impressive 3-0 victory, but also mark the end of League football at Kenilworth Road for seven long years.

A crowd of only 12,357, well down on the previous season's average, suggested that minds were elsewhere. Two more games would be played before war was declared at which point player contracts were immediately suspended and all competitions cancelled.

The Hatters sat top of the old second Division (now Championship) for the first time in their history when the league was abandoned. "It's a good thing for Hitler and his followers that none of them are within arm's length of Luton Town supporters; there would be a big spot of bother," wrote Crusader in that week's Luton News!

When the Football League resumed for the 1946/47 season, it was decided, for the sake of continuity, that the fixture list of the abandoned season would be repeated. Thus Sheffield Wednesday were the visitors once more as the campaign opened on the 31st August.

A far larger crowd of 21,105 was drawn with queues forming at the turnstiles. The day was sunny but the privations of post-war Britain were never far away. The Bobbers' Club were thanked for arranging a plentiful supply of tea despite rationing, though apologies were made for the need to charge sixpence given the inability to replace cups, which were also in short supply.

Along with Town manager George Martin, three players remained from the pre-war meeting. Hugh Billington and Horace Gager for Luton and Jackie Robinson for Wednesday. Indeed it was Jackie who scored Wednesday's only goal as Town ran out comfortable 4-1 winners. Mel Daniel. father of future Hatter Alan, was the star this time. He scored his first after just three minutes and completed his hattrick 15 minutes from time, with a strike from Billy Waugh having put Luton 2-1 up.

In his match report, Chiltern ascribed the win to Town's clever tactics. Wednesday, remembering the punishment handed out seven years previously, had closely marked Billington. To combat this Daniel was pushed further upfield to make use of the space created. "Splendid team work," the reporter enthused.

Four Luton players were lost between the two matches. Goalkeeper Joe Coen, who had played in the 1939 meeting, was killed in an aircraft training accident in Grantham in 1941. Charles Ladd, Charles Clark and James Gillespie also never came home.

"People all over the world trust and pray that never again shall the flower of manhood be called upon to bear arms," was written in the programme notes, "but we have come through, and having done our duty let us to sport, and to the king of sports – Football."





# ON THIS DAY

We go back in time on this day in the Hatters' history books



The Hatters showed character and quality to twice come from behind to seal a dramatic 3-2 victory over Lincoln City in the Conference at Kenilworth Road on this day in 2013.

Trailing twice to the Imps, John Still's side were 2-1 behind with 13 minutes to go before their grandstand finish.

The Imps held a half-time lead but the Hatters flew out of the traps in the second half and striker Mark Cullen headed an equaliser just 43 seconds after the restart.

The visitors re-took the lead on 51 minutes through Ben Tomlinson's close range header but with the game within the Imps' grasp the Hatters won it.

Firstly a howler from Lincoln goalkeeper Paul Farman enabled Luke Guttridge's low free-kick to squirm through the keeper's legs for the equaliser on 77 minutes.

Then, three minutes later, Cullen scored his second: lashing home from six yards to spark Kenilworth Road into celebration.

# Champions!

Over the course of the season we'll be looking back 20 years to the glorious League One championship winning season of 2004/05.

So many club league records were tumbled during a momentous campaign which was even more remarkable considering that the summer of 2003 saw the arrival of new 'owner' John Gurney and his crackpot ideas, which ultimately led to the Hatters needing to enter administrative receivership, with all its problems, to get rid of him. Club historian Roger Wash tells the story of a season to remember.



# **2004/05 history**

Six straight wins meant that the football world was now looking at the Town. Unsurprisingly, Mike Newell was presented with the first League One manager of the month award by sponsors Coca-Cola and top scorer Steve Howard was pleased to receive the Powerade player of the month. The Hatters were now on a pinnacle waiting to be shot down.

Next up was the difficult trip to Sheffield Wednesday where a crowd of 20,806, which would turn out to be the biggest crowd that season to watch the Town, made it a raucous atmosphere.

Sadly, the game did not live up to the billing with the sides cancelling each other out. The Town, wearing a set of grey socks provided by Wednesday because of a colour clash, saw a Rowan Vine effort disallowed by a fussy referee and a Chris Coyne header hacked off the line - while at the other end a Chris Marsden shot cannoned off the woodwork.

Newell was satisfied with the point and the extension of the unbeaten run although he felt that the Town had enough of the play to take all three points.

With the news that 17-year-old Keith Keane had been awarded a two-year professional contract and that Vine had extended his loan spell form Portsmouth until the end of the season, the Town set off to Boston United to play a rescheduled Carling Cup game already knowing that the winners would take on Premier League Fulham in the next round.


Putting out a very strong side the Hatters went a goal down on 23 minutes when ex-Town loanee Courtney Pitt fired home. The Town bounced back and levelled through a Jason Lee own goal after the break but the same player put Boston ahead again soon after.

The Town equalised for a second time when Kevin Nicholls netted from the spot, sending former Hatter Nathan Abbey the wrong way, after Mark Greaves had fouled Vine in the box.

The Town hit the woodwork for a fourth time before a frantic finale saw Boston substitute Lee Thompson poke the ball home with his first touch only for Luton sub Enoch Showunmi to do the same moments later.

Thompson scored again in the fourth minute of extra time but try as they might, the Town could not force a fourth equaliser. 'Concentrate on the League' we all thought afterwards but it was still a disappointing defeat considering the chances made and spurned.

The visit of second place Chesterfield drew the largest attendance so far

with 7,532 hoping that the Town's table topping league run would continue.

The first half saw the Spireites set out to frustrate the Hatters which they succeeded in doing with the few chances produced being wasted by Vine. Despite this you could not fault the loanee's work rate and he did not let the misses put him off his game.

Vine's reward came four minutes into the second period when he latched on to a long clearance from Coyne and appeared to shove over Chesterfield defender Alan O'Hare in his pursuit of the ball before smacking home past Carl Muggleton in the Spireites goal.

The complaints from the Chesterfield players and

bench were long and loud but things did not get any better for them on 75 minutes when Steve Blatherwick was given a straight red for bringing down Vine who was through on goal.

To complete a miserable afternoon for Chesterfield their defender Shane Nicholson was dismissed after receiving a second yellow card in stoppage time.

Newell praised the team for their fantastic start to the season but then said: "It wasn't a convincing win in my eyes but the important thing is that we got the three points. We need to put the game out of reach of teams before we get to the 80 or 90 minute mark. At 1-0 Chesterfield are always in it."

Our focus today is on a shirt that pays homage to one of our absolute greats. I am of course talking about the 2020/21 away shirt.

The turn of the decade was an odd one; we could not watch football in stadiums so had to make do with iFollow and the radio. What wasn't odd, is this 1991/92-inspired away shirt.

Umbro made a triumphant return, taking over the reins from Puma. And my word, did they do an excellent job with this shirt.

It features a similar pattern style and colour combination to that of the 1991/92 home shirt, with a lovely V-neck blue and orange collar and blue trim on the sleeves. The Luton Town badge is heat pressed onto the shirt, with an embroidered Umbro badge.

Star Platforms, one of our current sleeve sponsors, have their blue and orange logo adorned on the front of the shirt. The colours of the sponsor and the theme of the shirt works so well.

But it's that pattern that really grabs your

attention. The blues, the oranges, the stripes, and the bold lines from the zig-zag type shapes.
Just brilliant!

There were two styles of this shirt. One being the standard league shirt, but we had Luton Foodbank on the left sleeve for our away FA Cup tie with Chelsea.

The Alzheimer's Society can provide a wide range of help and support for those with all types of dementia. Our staff will also be handing out a dementia symptoms checklist.

There are currently tens of thousands of people living with dementia in England without a diagnosis. Receiving a timely diagnosis can help people and their loved ones to plan for the future, receive emotional and practical support and better

manage symptoms. It can make dementia feel less daunting for those affected. For people experiencing the symptoms of dementia, being diagnosed at an earlier stage gives them a chance to adjust and get access to:

- Support. There is no cure for the diseases causing dementia yet, but there is lots of support that can help people live as well as possible. As well as helping people plan for the future (such as setting up power of attorney) and access therapies and support groups, diagnosis may also mean that people get access to medicines that can help manage symptoms.
- Benefits and protections. Being diagnosed with dementia means you



are protected from discrimination (being treated unfairly) at work by law. It can also give you access to financial benefits.

Information that will help people understand what you're going through. Dementia can cause changes in your mood and behaviour. If you have been feeling low, getting irritated easily, or acting differently, a diagnosis can help people understand what you have been

dealing with. They may be better able to support you.

 Time. Many people say that receiving an early diagnosis gave them time to develop coping strategies and to rearrange their lifestyles to spend more quality time with loved ones.

# SUPPORTERS' TRUST

#### with Membership Secretary David McCallum

We are very fortunate that we are in the minority of football clubs! Luton Town is run and managed by local people, passionate about the club and the local community, with a financial vision to be run in a sustainable manner, and for the interests of the club, the fans, and the community rather than many other clubs that have foreign or offhand owners with a focus of making money for their business or themselves.

Many of these clubs have withdrawn fans' concessions, increased gate prices beyond the scope of traditional fans, and are focussed on tourists as a strategy and destroying stadium atmospheres. Many have breached financial rules and suffered points deductions. Others have been taken over by equity houses with little regard for the fans or the game and suffered relegation as a consequence.

Because of mismanagement Luton Town suffered more than any other club with a 30-point deduction kicking us out of the football league. The Luton Town Supporters' Trust was formed from Trust in Luton and the Luton Town Supporters' Club merging and has a seat on the Club's board.

LTST has shares in LTFC and the legal right to veto any changes to our identity – name, nickname, colours, emblems etc, in case of future takeovers. It's essential that the Trust membership remains strong – the more members we have the louder our voice! Hence our motto 'Together We Are Stronger.'

LTST is also part of the FSA - Football Supporters' Association: Fair Game - pushing Parliament for the Football Governance Bill to be passed to ensure the survival and growth of smaller clubs. We fund and support the academy to invest in our vouth footballers and team through SOLYD (Supporters of Luton Youth Development), and support other local charities such as Beds Prostate Cancer.

We do fun things too. If you've never attended

the Presentation Evening at the end of the season then you're missing out! It's a fantastic opportunity to meet and chat to the players and management which is organised by the Trust and exclusive to Trust members. There are many more events too.

# MY FAVOURITE PLAYER...

# Bill Martindale chooses his all-time favourite player to have represented the Hatters

My passion for Luton
Town began in 1951 when
my father took me on the
321 bus from St Albans
to watch my first match
at the Kenny. I was nine
years old and so began
my Hatters adventure
that has continued for
over 72 years.

I first stood on the Kenilworth Road terrace, then had a season ticket in the Bobbers stand and now sit in Main Stand B. I'm now waiting in anticipation for a seat, without pillars to dodge, at Power Court.

Over seven decades I've experienced so many highs and lows as a Luton supporter as we never seem to do things the easy way. I've been privileged to watch many great players over the years, but if asked to name my favourite player, I'd find it impossible.

A few great players that come to mind include centre half Syd Owen, goalkeeper Ron Baynham, Bruce Rioch, who scored 24 goals for us, and Malcolm Macdonald or 'Supermac', who Luton switched from full-back to a free-scoring centre forward netting 58 times in 101 matches.

I guess while many would have heard of Owen, not many were as fortunate as myself to see him play so I'll elaborate on why I enjoyed him.

Syd was one of the greatest defenders to play for Luton.

Between 1947 and 1959, he played 423 league and cup games for the Hatters. He won three full international caps for England, and would have had more international recognition except for the great Billy Wright being England captain and centre-half at the time. He played in the 1954 World Cup and was the Football Writers' player of the year in 1959.

I was privileged to watch Syd play between 1951 and 1959. He was an exceptional centrehalf, a great leader who marshalled his defence, outstanding at heading the ball and had the skill of always being in the right place and the right time.

When the Luton manager Dally Duncan

left, Owen became player/manager for a short period and had the honour of being in charge for the 1959 cup final.

Was there ever a better Luton Town player? I don't think so!

I now live in Lincolnshire but I still make the 200mile round trip to join my daughter and grandsons at matches.

Following the Hatters is a lifelong commitment - long may it continue!

Just before the break McKay then netted her second and Luton's fourth. She picked up the ball on the right hand side and curled the ball magnificently into the top left corner.

With 20 minutes left of the match, McKay netted her first hat-trick back in Luton colours. Buttigieg picked up the ball on the left hand side and put in a wonderful delivery, which McKay fired past the keeper to add Luton's fifth of the afternoon to seal a comprehensive victory.

The Ladies are back in action tomorrow when they take on Bowers and Pitsea at Barton Rovers. Kick-off at Sharpenhoe Road is at 2pm.



Overall, his coaching skills and astute transfer dealings created a brand of attacking football that became the hallmark of his time at the club.

David has just published his autobiography, 'Just One More Goal,' and he is donating 50 per cent of all royalties to charities researching Motor Neurone Disease (MND).

Pleat, who also managed our visitors today Sheffield Wednesday, describes his years at Luton as the happiest of his long footballing career, beginning with his arrival from Nottingham Forest in 1964. "The club secretary, Bob Redhead, drove me to the Stockwood Park area when I got here and told me this is where Luton's new stadium would be built. Sixty years later, after many trials and

tribulations, Power Court is now on the horizon. The new stadium will be a tribute to the current board of directors, who will finally achieve the dream.

"When I signed as a young winger, I joined survivors of the 1959 Cup Final team, legends like Syd Owen, Dave Pacey, Bob Morton, Ron Baynham and Gordon Turner.

Although Turner missed the Final through injury, but the club was faltering.

"I was very lucky. My first chairman, Mr. Mortimer, had great faith in me as a manager even though it was tough trying to balance the books. Sadly, we were always sellers, victims of the big clubs. So many scouts enjoyed Luton's famed hospitality

with regular visits. I recall having to sell Paul and Ron Futcher to Man City, Andy King, a local boy to Everton, and Peter Anderson, who went to Anderlecht, all victims of our attempt to stay afloat later on.

"Harry Haslam was a man with a smile and a joke and a valuable mentor to me. The great comedian Eric Morecambe was always ready to bring humour to the club on television and the ground. And, of course, the club had wonderful leaders on the field.

"Brian Horton and Steve Foster were powerful characters in every way. And hats off to the loyal supporters who saw the club through its painful rehabilitation from non-league to the present day.

"Surely, reviving the club from the non-league through the Football League to the Premier League must be the greatest achievement of all. Luton also had to endure the harshest punishment of points. A terrible decision.

"Last season's narrow loss of Premier League status was a blow, but the team has won many friends, supporters, and respect far and wide. I have no doubt that Rob will keep them on an upward curve.

"The club retains its warmth and has never lost its charm. It is a club with camaraderie. The current directors under David Wilkinson and CEO Gary Sweet, have put it on a firm footing, so it will be in a good place at Power Court for the next generation of loyal Luton supporters who will continue to enjoy Luton's remarkable ride.

"I'm always made so welcome at Kenilworth Road, and I'm grateful. I learned so much here, and I'm delighted that I was able to play some part in the club's amazing journey. And I'm also flattered that anyone still remembers me!"

The Hatters make one of their longest journeys of the season the next time they head out on the road when they travel to Plymouth Argyle in the Championship next Friday.

Don't get us wrong here, Devon's a lovely part of the world and Plymouth a fine city. But to be 253 miles from home on a Friday night at the end of September... Let's just say at least we'll have the Saturday free to do that DIY around the house.

However the win over the Black Cats last weekend – who came into the game as the league leaders – will give Rooney's side a real confidence boost.

They will certainly need that once again this afternoon as they play the league's newest leaders once more – this time in the shape of West Brom. Argyle will be hoping they can do the trick against the Baggies at the Hawthorns before returning home for our meeting next Friday.
