

BOARDROOM DAVID WILKINSON



Good evening everyone and a very warm welcome to Kenilworth Road.

Tonight's visitors are Oxford United, who like us have suffered and recovered in recent years. They won the League Cup in 1986, but like us were unable to compete in Europe due to the ban on English clubs.

They were relegated from the top-flight in 1988, which began an 18-year decline culminating in them being the first major trophy winner to be banished to the Conference, where again, like us, they remained for five years. We last met each other at the end of the 2018/19 season when a 3-1 win here at the Kenny confirmed us as League One champions.

We have had some exciting encounters over the years. One that

particularly sticks in my mind was when we knocked them off the top of the Conference to win with two goals in injury time. The winner coming straight from a perfect corner by Keith Keane. Let's hope that that kind of magic is repeated tonight.

They are newly promoted but have an impressive set up with impressive training facilities near Cowley where Mick and I watched our under-21s play last week.

I'm writing these notes on Saturday morning with bleary eyes after a 10-hour return trip to see us well beaten at Plymouth. It was a very quiet drive home and for me the frustration remains this morning. I think we all know that we are better than we are showing so far this season, and I believe it will come. However, we all need to stick together to support Rob, the coaches

and the squad to pick up the form and generate the excitement that we are used to and expect.

It is no surprise that we have suffered a bit of a hangover from last season when we often played very well without a positive result and lost the winning habit. Momentum is so important both in games and in sequences of results. There are 117 points still to play for so let's play our part in getting as many of them as we can and remember that form is temporary while class is permanent.

We have quality people operating throughout the club, who, I'm sure, expect us to remain confident in their abilities to turn things round. We would not be where we are today by making kneejerk decisions. That has been the unsuccessful philosophy of others, who shall remain nameless.

As most of you are aware the main rationale for 2020 from the outset was to ensure the future of the Club by making it selfsustaining. This means not having to rely so much on central funding, player

sales and shareholder loans. The plan was to achieve this by getting back to the Championship and building a new stadium with significantly increased capacity along with sizeable hospitality space and other commercial opportunities.

This means that having achieved our first target of reaching the Championship earlier than planned it is now vital to complete our new stadium plans. When 2020 first became involved, the Club owned nothing, so apart from preserving our tenancy, we had to find and acquire land for our new home. We don't have a bottomless pit of money, but unlike many we are taking a long-term view. Anyone who cares to look at our accounts can see

that significant funds have already been provided for this purpose.

We didn't want to have a soulless bowl out of town because we believe, as local people, that we should be in the heart of our community and use the development to benefit the town we love. So we bought two pieces of land, one for the stadium and the other to enable it.

The Power Court site was particularly complicated both in terms of ownership titles and because it had been the site of a coke-fuelled power station and has the river Lea running through it. All this time Gary and his team were also building relationships with relevant parties to see what was possible.

Gary, Mike Moran and their team of consultants then worked towards an application for outline planning permission for which was granted by the Council in 2019.

While all this was going on we went through a financial crisis, Covid and Brexit and the original plans for the site at Junction 10 had to change so it was sold with the profit earmarked for Power Court.

To go from outline to detailed planning involves an enormous amount of work. There are 106 different documents relating to the application, which are now available for inspection on the Council website. If you get the chance, take a look. It is impressive.

It is with sadness that we place on record the passings of two life-long Hatters fans.


In loving memory of **Robert Grantham**, who sadly passed

Carlton Morris' double earned us our first home win of the season defeating Sheffield Wednesday last time out at Kenilworth Road.

The Hatters started strong under the afternoon sun, with Elijah Adebayo and Alfie Doughty immediately putting pressure on Wednesday's defence. However, the attacking intensity left gaps at the back, which Wednesday looked to exploit. Just over 10 minutes in, Yan Valery's cross was tipped away by Thomas Kaminski before Barry Bannan volleyed high and wide.

Kaminski then made a series of crucial saves, first denying Michael Smith at close range and then Josh Windass from point-blank range, keeping the score level with some heroic goalkeeping.

As the first half progressed, the Town grew more dangerous, with Mark McGuinness winning aerial duels from set-pieces. Right before the break, an intricate passing move involving Marvelous Nakamba, Tahith Chong, and Doughty nearly set up Adebayo, but Town academy graduate Akin Famewo made a key interception.

The first half ended goalless, with neither side creating clear-cut chances, and Rob Edwards demanding more urgency for the second half.

Wednesday started the second half brightly, and in the 52nd minute, Valery's cross found an unmarked Bannan, who volleyed confidently into the bottom corner to give the visitors the lead.

Edwards reacted swiftly, bringing on three substitutes, including Tom Krauß for his debut. Minutes later, Doughty's free-kick led to a scramble in the box, and Di'Shon Bernard handled McGuinness' goal-bound header off the line. The Wednesday man was sent off, and the Town were awarded a penalty which Morris calmly slotted down the middle to level.

Victor Moses was introduced for his debut and added energy to the Hatters attack and with two minutes remaining, Doughty delivered another dangerous cross that wasn't cleared properly, allowing Morris to pounce and fire home the winner.

As the Town celebrated, Wednesday nearly equalised only for Kaminski to pull off another fine save from Svante Ingelsson's long-range effort.

After some game management in the corner, the final whistle blew, securing the first home win of the season.

The Town failed to make it three wins in a row as they were soundly beaten at Plymouth.

The Hatters, who saw three players substituted through injury in a 15-minute spell either side of half-time, were behind early and never recovered despite substitute Victor Moses' first goal for the club.

But Argyle, who in their last home game beat leaders Sunderland, got off to a flyer when Rami Al Hajj thundered a shot past Thomas Kaminski in the eighth minute after the Town failed to clear a pass into the box.

With their tails up the hosts should have doubled their lead four minutes later only for Michael Obefemi to shoot wide from 10 yards after being found by Morgan Whittaker's right-wing cross.

While the Hatters looked dangerous going forward, they could not profit from the mistakes in the Plymouth defence with Elijah Adebayo denied twice with shots that home defender Lewis Gibson blocked.

But while the Town struggled to create clear-cut chances, the home side were threatening whenever they poured forward, and the Hatters had Kaminski to thank for two fine saves to keep out the Pilgrims. Firstly the Belgian got down to deny goalscorer Al Hajj a second before using his feet to stop a goal-bound effort from home captain Joe Edwards five minutes before the break.

The half ended with Teden Mengi and Tahith Chong withdrawn with knocks and the Town's woes continued into the second period when Mads Andersen – on for Mengi – then limped off.

Half chances came and went as the Town chased an equaliser but the game seemed beyond Rob Edwards' men with 20 minutes left when Argyle substitute Ibrahim Cissoko finished brilliantly after taking Darko Gyabi's pass to make it 2-0.

However, almost immediately, the Hatters reduced the deficit to give them hope. Alfie Doughty's cross from the left swung into the path of Moses and he whipped a ferocious low shot past Dan Grimshaw at the near post.


With 19 minutes left on the clock, the Town went for the jugular with Edwards introducing Joe Taylor and Cauley Woodrow off the bench.


A series of corners put the home side under pressure but after Taylor swept a shot wide and Woodrow fired over the game was almost up.

Tonight we welcome Oxford United to Kenilworth Road for what is sure to be another terrific Championship clash.

Des Buckingham's side have had a solid start to the season and look to solidify their spot in the second tier.

The U's were promoted to the Championship last season following a victory against Bolton Wanderers at Wembley in the play-off final. However, since that glorious day in the sun for Oxford their squad has changed a fair bit.

There was plenty of movement in the summer window. Some of the names who have come in include Siriki Dembele, Idris El Mizouni, Louie Sibley, Jack Currie, Jamie Cumming, Will Vaulks and former Hatter Peter Kioso and Matt Ingram.

Buckingham's side have started the season well - thanks to their fine home record that saw them win their first three games of the Championship season - following impressive victories over Norwich, Preston and Stoke.

Who else? A modern-day cult hero for both clubs, SDH helped Oxford to promotion in 2016 before heading to Kenilworth Road where he was part of the Town side that won back-to-back promotions. He notched 30 goals in 101 games for United and then struck 62 times in 170 games for the Hatters. He's now reunited with former Town boss Nathan Jones at Charlton.

UNITED HERO

John Aldridge joined United in March 1984 from Newport and, although sparingly used at first, the frontman formed a strong partnership with Billy Hamilton the following season. In 1984/85, Aldridge hit 34 goals, breaking Oxford's single-season scoring record and, more importantly, helped secure their promotion to the First Division.

In his first top-flight season, 'Aldo' netted 23 times, making him the division's thirdhighest scorer, behind Gary Lineker and Frank McAvennie. Aldridge also scored six goals in Oxford's League Cupwinning run, culminating in a 3–0 win over QPR in the 1986 final.

In total, the striker scored 90 times in 141

appearances for United and notably scored four goals against Gillingham and one in a win over Manchester United in Alex Ferguson's first game as manager before leaving for Liverpool.



FIXTURE FLASHBACK

TOWN 7-4 OXFORD 6TH FEBRUARY 1988

There might be over 1,000 mentions of our Conference meeting with the U's in tonight's programme, so let's steer attention a bit further back in time here shall we?

Back in the late 1980s both sides were in the top-flight, punching above their weight against the giants of English football.

In this helter-skelter meeting in February

1988, the two sides met in league action in what was dubbed a 'dress rehearsal' for the upcoming Littlewoods Cup semi-final meeting.

Neither side gave any clues ahead of the cup meetings, as an open game saw both defences all over the place.

Mark Stein scored his first league hat-trick, but Mick Harford, with a diving header, notches the Town's seventh and best goal of the game. Brian Stein and Darron McDonough are also on target.

After then seeing off Oxford in the league cup, the Town would lift the Littlewoods Cup at Wembley in the final and would end the league campaign ninth in the top-flight.



"I was out for four weeks, it wasn't so easy for me. But I'm happy I'm now on the pitch, I can see the fans and can celebrate with the fans. A perfect way to win."

Tom had only had a week training out on the grass before manager Rob Edwards pitched him into the heat of a Championship battle with the Owls.

"Last Monday was my first training session with the team, and after four weeks out I was so happy," he said. "It was a tough game today, it was not such a good game from us.

"But a win is a win, and now with two wins in a row, it's important for us. Now we celebrate and on Monday focus on the next game."

Asked what the manager said to him before he went out onto the Kenilworth Road pitch for the first time, Tom replied: "He said 'You are perfect for Luton! When I went like this to the fans (gesturing with his hands), I loved it.

"To celebrate with the fans and to see that they are very happy after the win, that is really important for me. I'm an aggressive player and that is what Rob wants. It's a perfect way to start with a win, and now let's focus on the game on Friday."

On his fitness, he added: "I feel really good. I had a good session in the four weeks here with the (strength & conditioning) coaches. Thursday was my first full training session with the team.

"Now these 30 minutes are really important for me and I can't wait to start with the team. I feel really fit."



For Kevin Foley, the 2004/05 season holds special significance, marking a time when a determined Town squad overcame the odds to secure promotion. Foley, a product of the academy, reflects on the memorable campaign, the hurdles he faced as a young player, and the unity that propelled the Hatters to success.

Kevin Foley's journey with the Hatters started at a young age. So when we caught up with him to discuss our promotion 20 years ago, nostalgia soon washed over the right-back.

"I came to the club when I was about nine," recalls Foley, now 39 and the Town's first team coach. "I had just started playing grassroots football a bit later than others. But soon after, in the first few games, I was scouted with two of my mates. We all went to train for six weeks. Luckily, I stayed on, but sadly, my two friends didn't make it. I stayed there until I was 22."

From those early days, Foley could feel that the club was committed to developing young talent.

"Luton had a reputation for giving chances to

young players. You could see that – players like Matthew Taylor and Matthew Spring were all breaking through at the time. We knew there was a path to follow, and it gave us younger players a lot of encouragement."

The dressing room atmosphere was a tough one to navigate, however. "It was a great environment but a challenging one. You

were tested straight away. Thinking of the characters there like Kevin Nicholls and Steve Howard – they really put you through your paces. You either sank or swam, but I loved it."

Making the first team is never easy for a young player, and Foley experienced the pressure firsthand.

"When you got the chance to train with the first team, you really had to make it count. You didn't want to slip up but still had to prove yourself. It was a tough business, but it helped me grow."

His breakthrough, back in April 2003, came during a financially unstable period for the Hatters, which ironically would work to the advantage of Foley and his fellow academy graduates.

"There was a transfer embargo," he explains. "Mike Newell had a fresh look at the squad, and I began playing more friendlies and training with the first team. I quickly impressed him. I still remember standing in the tunnel before our first game of the season against Rushden. It was scorching hot, and I wasn't sure if I was ready. But as we walked out, I told myself I had to be. We won that game."

After a solid first season in 2003/04 in which the Hatters finished 10th, the 2004/05 season was one Foley will never forget. Led by Newell, the Town made a strong start, surprising both themselves and their supporters by winning the

first six games and going unbeaten until October

"I think we shocked everyone, including ourselves," Foley admits. "We had a solid season the year before, but 2004/05 was something special. During pre-season, we began to believe, 'We've got a real shot here."

Leadership and resilience were central to the team's success.

"We had leaders all over the pitch. Kevin Nicholls was always pushing me to get around him and support him, but he was fantastic for me. I learned so much from players like Chris Coyne and Steve Howard too. Our team managed itself in a way; there were leaders everywhere."

That unity carried the Town through challenging periods. Foley recalls a stretch when they lost three games in a row, sparking doubts about their promotion hopes. However, Newell's calm demeanour kept them on course, "The manager showed us a video of one of those losses and told us there wasn't much wrong. He kept us grounded, and we went on beat Bradford 4-0 in the next game."

23rd April 2005, is a date forever etched in Foley's memory. The Town headed to Wrexham on St George's Day knowing victory could hand them the League One title. Despite trailing 1-0 at half-time, the Hatters turned the game around with two goals from Chris Coyne and Curtis Davies to clinch the championship.

"That game confirmed the title," Foley recalls. "It was unreal. A few years earlier, I was still at school, and now I was playing for Luton, celebrating promotion in front of my family and friends. It felt like a dream."

The bond within the squad was instrumental to their success. Foley reflects on the camaraderie they shared both on and off the pitch. "We were in such a good rhythm that season. After every match, we'd celebrate together. Win or lose, we stuck together. It was a close-knit team, and even Mike Newell and Brian Stein were part of that."


For Foley, that promotion season wasn't just about winning; it was a pivotal moment in his career. It taught him the importance of teamwork, perseverance, and making the most of every opportunity.

"That season gave me a glimpse of what was possible. It was an incredible environment to be in, and I'm grateful to Luton for all the chances they gave me," he says.

"Playing for Luton as a local lad, getting promoted – it's something I'll always cherish."

Preserving and appreciating the heritage and history of Luton Town Football Club

When preparing these notes at Hatters' Heritage Towers we were racking our brains about which game to present.

We were hoping to feature a match dating back to the Victorian era, however, although Oxford United were founded in 1893 as Headington FC, adopting the name Oxford United in 1960. our first clash with the U's only came in Division Two during the 1970/71 season, a comfortable 4-0 victory for the Hatters with Matt Tees and Malcolm Macdonald both notching braces, against an Oxford United who had started the season unbeaten.

There have been memorable clashes at the top of the English pyramid between these two sides too, with the 1987/88 season being of particular vintage to the Hatters faithful, with a 5-2 victory (and five separate goalscorers) at the Manor Ground. The goals kept flowing with Luton hitting seven in the return fixture at Kenilworth Road, with Mark Stein grabbing a hat-trick, Mick Harford bagging a brace with Brian Stein and Darron McDonough also helping

themselves to a goal apiece during a 7-4 victory, which was the dress rehearsal for the upcoming Littlewoods Cup semi-final, with the first leg kicking off just four days later.

However, the game we settled on is not as glamorous as a major cup semi-final or a top tier clash, considering all the divisions we have competed against Oxford United, but have chosen to feature the one that most Hatters have on record as the loudest they have heard Kenilworth Road in recent memory.

Luton Town 2-1 Oxford United, or the late late late show featuring local lad Keith Keane. After substitute Matthew Green's strike put Oxford ahead in the 74th minute just two minutes after coming on the pitch, it was looking like disappointment was on the cards against Chris Wilder's table topping Oxford.

But two late corners changed that. George Pilkington met Keane's flag-kick in the 93rd minute to make it 1-1, and then, in the 96th minute, the Hatters had another corner. Keane tried to find Pilkington at the back post, but the ball sailed straight in, taking the roof of Kenilworth Road. For his celebrations Keane was giving his marching orders, but this gave the fans a night under the lights fromthe Conference years that will live in the memory forever.



ON THIS DAY

We go back in time on this day in the Hatters' history books

A five-star performance got the Town back to winnings in the Conference against Barrow on this day in 2011.



After going three games without victory the Hatters came into the game with the Bluebirds in ninth place in the fifth tier, losing back-to-back games, at York and at home to Cambridge.

Yet Gary Brabin's side were in no mood to go easy against Barrow – not that the visitors read the script, taking an early lead through Jack Mackreth.

Robbie Willmott equalised after scoring the rebound from a penalty before the winger grabbed a second from close range to put the Hatters ahead.

Adam Watkins made it 3-1 with a cool finish before the Town found their stride in the second half with goals from James Dance – a fine hit from the edge of the box – and Amari Morgan-Smith sealing victory after rounding the keeper.

"We desperately wanted to get back to winning ways, but we equally wanted the performance as well. I am delighted with the performance and the result," said a happy Brabin afterwards.

"Apart from the early goal, when we were up against it, it was a good first half performance. In the second half we really got at them and made it count. It was a good 90 minutes."

The victory is the Hatters' biggest on 1st October and the only time they have scored more than three goals in a game.









ALSO ON 1ST OCTOBER...

The Hatters' first game played on this day was a 3-0 win over Gainsborough Trinity in 1898... We lost 3-1 at Manchester United in the top-flight in 1955 at Old Trafford... A David Moss penalty saw the Town beat Aston Villa 1-0 in the old First Division in 1983... Champions!

Over the course of the season we'll be looking back 20 years to the glorious League One championship winning season of 2004/05.

So many club league records were tumbled during a momentous campaign which was even more remarkable considering that the summer of 2003 saw the arrival of new 'owner' John Gurney and his crackpot ideas, which ultimately led to the Hatters needing to enter administrative receivership, with all its problems, to get rid of him. Club historian Roger Wash tells the story of a season to remember.



2004/05 history

With their unbeaten start to the league season still intact, manager Mike Newell was quick to praise the players and, given the injury problems that had bedevilled the side the previous year, commented that nine players had remained ever present during the opening eight games.

Ever mindful that the situation could swiftly change with injuries, suspensions and loss of form, Newell brought in forward Gary McSheffrey on a month's loan from Coventry. 'Little Sheff' had enjoyed a loan spall at Kenilworth Road the previous season, had been highly successful and had become an instant crowd favourite.

The next game on the road to promotion was a trip to Stockport where the home side boasted a forward in Warren Feeney who, if he wasn't already on Mike Newell's radar, certainly made himself known early on by turning the speedy Curtis Davies and going close with a fierce shot.

The Town settled down and slowly took control of the game. A Steve Robinson corner smacked off the near post and a Steve Howard header was disallowed for pushing before the pressure finally told on 33 minutes with Robinson's superb volley from a Kevin Nicholls knock down breaking the deadlock.

Two minutes later Rowan Vine raced through to

latch on to a long ball from Kevin Foley to put the Town two up and when Ahmet Brkovic headed home on 54 minutes the convincing victory craved by Newell was on the cards.

The Town, however, much to Newell's disappointment, took their foot off the gas and allowed Rickie Lambert to fire in a spectacular 30yard free-kick 10 minutes from time.

"The opportunity to score a lot of goals doesn't come along that often and it would have shown that we meant business," said Newell afterwards but the Town were now seven points clear at the top so he could not moan too much!

During the week preceding the visit of Peterborough the Hatters strengthened their squad still further by offering professional contracts to two promising products who had come through the youth system. Leon Barnett and Calvin Andrew signed on the dotted line and both would go on to enjoy long careers.

Fifteen minutes into the clash with Posh the Town were forced into a change of personnel when goalkeeper Marlon Beresford limped off with a groin injury leading to Dino Seremet being handed his full home debut.

The change did not appear to affect the Town, however, as on 31 minutes

a spectacular overhead kick from Brkovic fell into the path of Vine who touched the ball home.

Peterborough boss Barry Fry obviously had words with his players at the interval as shortly after the break Curtis Woodhouse ghosted in to net from a cross from Steve lenkins.

The Town stepped up a gear after this setback and following a Nicholls drive which was palmed on to a post by future Hatter Mark Tyler, Paul Underwood netted a scruffy goal just before the hour mark.

The introduction of McSheffrey in the last quarter injected more urgency into the side which had started to drift and hit the bar with a fierce shot before going close with two further efforts.

"It's another win, but it's still not convincing," said Newell afterwards while his Peterborough counterpart, and selfconfessed Hatters fan Barry Fry said, "I think they will win the league by Christmas."

Newell was probably not relishing the long midweek trek to Swansea in the LDV Vans Trophy and signalled his indifference to the competition by making eleven changes to the side that had started the game against Peterborough.

In this, the Town's last ever trip to the Vetch Field, the 79 Town fans in the crowd of 3,559 who made the 450-mile round trip watched as Leon Barnett was dismissed after only 12 minutes for fouling former Hatter Adrian Forbes, who looked blatantly offside as he sped through.

The 10 men in the makeshift side did

remarkably well to hold off a Swansea outfit who had made only two changes from their previous game but were finally undone in the 90th minute when a cross was swept home past Seremet by substitute Kevin Nugent. A second goal followed seconds later with Sam Ricketts firing home from 15 yards.

Mike Newell said afterwards, "I don't like losing – whatever the competition," but was secretly glad that his 'first team' would be refreshed ready for the trip to second placed Tranmere the following Saturday.

During black history month we at Hatters' Heritage will be recounting some of the iconic black players who have turned out for Luton Town.

Where better to start than the first black player to pull on the jersey at Luton Town, Eddie Parris. Born in January 1911 in Pwllmeyric to a Welsh mother and a father, Eddie Senior, who had emigrated from Barbados in 1900 and would go on to serve in the British Army during World War One.

Eddie attracted the attention of local club Chepstow Town, joining them at the age of 16 as a tricky winger.

It was not long until Eddie came on the radar of Bradford Park Avenue, at the time playing in Division 2 (now the Championship), where he made over 100 appearances, as well attaining his solitary cap for Wales in a 4-0 loss to Ireland in 1931. Eddie was the first black player to turn out for the principality.

In 1934 Eddie transferred to Bournemouth & Boscombe to make a further century of appearances before transferring to Luton in 1937. However, Eddie was unable to recapture the form from his time at Bradford and Bournemouth, being limited to just seven appearances at Kenilworth Road, finding difficulty in nailing down a spot in a team that was about to win the Division Three (South) title.


To seek out regular first team football, Eddie moved on to Northampton Town with his football being disrupted due to the outbreak of World War 2, where he worked in a munitions factory, before playing for Bath City, Swansea Town and Cheltenham Town

during the war years and finishing up his career as a player/coach at Gloucester City, finishing his footballing career at the age of 37.

Staying in Gloucester, Eddie passed away in that city in February 1971 at the age of 60. Eddie Parris will forever be remembered as a trailblazer.

Unfortunately for the Hatters, straight from the kick-off, a defensive mix-up led to a Plymouth equaliser and the points were shared.



KEITH KEANE

A local boy who rose through the ranks at Luton after joining straight from school, Keith signed as a professional in August 2004, by which time he had 15 league appearances under his belt at Luton, since making his debut as a substitute in the LDV Vans Trophy against Rushden & Diamonds in November 2003.

Keith was a genuine utility player, initially starting out as a full-back, in place of Kevin Foley who had moved onto Wolves. He scored his first goal for Luton, a last-minute winner at home to Bristol City.

He was recognised with Republic of Ireland under 21 caps, as well as being named Young Player of the Season in 2005/06, winning goal of the season with his fine strike against West Bromwich Albion in 2006/07 and winning Luton Town Player of the Season in both 2007/08 and the 2008/09 seasons. The latter of these starting with a 30-point deduction, all-but relegating the Town before a ball had been kicked but ending with lifting the Johnstone Paint Trophy.

With the Hatters struggling to get out of non-league,

Keane was often tempted away by clubs as many as three divisions above the Hatters, but Keith remained committed to getting the Town back into the Football League.

His time at Luton will be remembered for his 98th minute winner in the 2009/10 season against promotion rivals, and our visitors tonight, Oxford United, where he scored directly from a corner in the 98th minute, and then was sent off for a second bookable offence due to his exuberant celebration.

However, his time at Kenilworth Road finally came to a close at the end of 2011/12 season after a second successive play-off final defeat.

Keith played 285 times for the Town in a decade of first team action, and upon the expiration of his contract, he joined League 1 Preston North End where he played 64 times, before a succession of loan moves to Crawley Town and Stevenage and then moving permanently to Cambridge and then Rochdale where he finished his professional career in 2018.



MY FAVOURITE GOAL...

Graham Custance explains his all-time favourite Luton Town goal

I have three memorable goals to choose from for different reasons. Having supported Luton since the 1960s when my late father took me to see us play against Barrow, (my great grandfather was pulled from the crowd to referee a match - but that's another story!).

Standing behind the goal when Brian Stein scored the winner at Wembley in 1988, our first major honour, I was exhausted having gone through so many emotions on that day with the ebb and flow of the game.

Another is being with my late father at Wembley when Claude Gnakpa scored the winner in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy Final in 2009 and seeing the look on his face at the final whistle.


The best though was the penalty shootout against Coventry – all six penalties for us were perfect and I had tears in my eyes when I realised we had been promoted to the Premier League. It was something I never thought I would see and sharing the feeling with my own children, who are now the next generation of Hatters.

My three children – Darren, Matthew and Joanne – had never seen the Town play in the same league as the big clubs and could only listen to my memories of David Pleat's teams in the 1980s. My wife Sue and our future son-inlaw Ollie completed the whole family group at Wembley that day. There was a huge buzz of nervous excitement as we all boarded the train to London hoping for a Luton win.

The atmosphere at Wembley was electric. The grave concern when Tom Lockyer was stretchered off, the jubilation when Jordan Clark scored that stunning goal, feeling completely flat when Coventry equalised, and then the disappointment when Joe Taylor's late goal was disallowed.

And so it went to penalties. Before every Coventry penalty I was just praying they would miss one, at the same time scarcely believing ours were so good. Dabo looked nervous as he took that final penalty, I just remember seeing it fly over the bar before becoming engulfed in a sea of orange.

To share such a momentous occasion with my family was something so special and one that I will never forget. I had tears in my eyes at just what we had achieved and what this meant to all Luton Town supporters.

Lethal Luton Ladies overwhelm Chigwell

Luton Ladies kicked off their new FA Cup campaign last week with a dominant performance against tier-7 side Chigwell.

Last season's impressive cup run saw the Hatters reach the fourth round, where they faced WSL side Brighton.

Despite some resilient defending from Chigwell in the opening stages, Luton took just nine minutes to break the deadlock. Fiona Buttigieg scored directly from a corner, curling the ball into the top corner.

The Hatters' second goal came in the 15th minute when Jess McKay pounced on a loose ball at the back post, firing past the goalkeeper. Moments later, Bridget Adu nearly added a third, but her shot was blocked, and Elly Wade's follow-up header went wide.

At the 32-minute mark, Luton were awarded a penalty after Wade was tripped in the box. Tasha Fensome stepped up and confidently smashed the ball into the net, making it 3-0.



Less than a minute later, the Town struck again. Cesca Partridge netted the fourth, courtesy of McKay's pinpoint delivery, which Partridge controlled beautifully before finishing superbly.

Just before half-time, Fensome scored her second and Luton's fifth. Partridge played a fantastic ball out wide to Wade, who found McKay. McKay's shot was parried but Fensome was quickest to react, slotting the ball home from close range.

Luton showed no signs of letting up in the second half. Just three minutes after the restart Buttigieg's cross looped over the goalkeeper extending the lead to 6-0. Luton's seventh goal came from Partridge, whose composed finish into the bottom-left corner made it 7-0. Chigwell managed to hold at bay off for a while longer but in the 70th minute Fensome completed her hat-trick, slotting home a brilliant cross from Chloe Martin.

Just a minute later, Martin added another for the Hatters, as her shot deflected off a Chigwell defender and spun into the back of the net.

With 12 minutes remaining, Fensome scored her fourth goal of the match. Amber Leighton delivered a superb ball over the defence, and Fensome headed it over the keeper before guiding it into the net.

The final goal of the game came from Adu, who reacted quickest to a loose ball and headed in Luton's 11th, capping off a comprehensive 11-0 victory and a place in the next round.

Town shirt collector, David Foxen, aka @lutontownkits, goes through his selection of shirts in orange, white, blue – and all colours in between.

I honestly do not know if I love or hate this shirt. It divides opinion and I change my mind every time I look at it.

I am talking about our grey and blue, 1999/2001 third shirt. It was manufactured by Olympic Sport (OS) and is quite unique for a number of reasons.

Firstly, let's look at the design. It is grey, not a colour you would associate with Luton Town. The light grey then has lots of little holes in it, with a black layer just behind it, just to make it even weirder. Finally, we have blue pin stripes, a blue collar and blue neckline.

We have 'LTFC' embossed on the back of the collar, and the 90s Luton badge, complete with SKF sponsor.

The whole multiple fabric layering makes this shirt prone to snags and pulls, which means nowadays it is hard to find one in good condition. I cannot recall a shirt that has been made like this before, or since. The material

is also quite heavy, so I cannot imagine it was that comfortable for the players.

There was a famous case with Manchester United and a grey shirt; the players said they could not see each other on the pitch, so Sir Alex Ferguson made them switch at half-time after trailing 3-0 to Southampton.

Our grey number was used in such epic clashes as Sunderland 3-0 Luton in September 2000 in a League Cup tie and that is it! We had a noticeably young team that day, with the likes of Emmerson Boyce, Matthew Spring, Andre Scarlett, Peter Holmes, Trevor Kandol and Matthew Taylor appearing for the Hatters in this unique shirt.

So, where do you sit with this shirt? Are you on team "I love it," "I hate it," or, like myself, are you sat on the fence?

Either way, this is such a unique shirt, and it certainly deserves a bit of love!


