



Ellis was a real inspiration for me, the staff and the lads and I told him that. For a six-year-old boy to be so strong and resilient is a testament to his parents, Dean and Rachel. We all want to be able to take the pain away from our children, don't we?

There is nothing more important in life than family and health but

football probably comes next, doesn't it? On a day like today, on derby day, everyone here understands the importance of this fixture and we're one big family here at Luton Town.

I know I can't compare our difficult time on the pitch to Ellis' situation, but if there's anything we've learned from a six-year-old of his and his family's determination, it's sticking together. We are a family and it's important we all stick together - especially this afternoon.

The international break has allowed us time to focus on the training pitch and reiterate the message to the lads of the significance of this afternoon. Fortunately, we have several players in the squad who have experienced winning and losing in a Luton-Watford derby. They know the importance of today, and those who are new to the group have been informed just how much it means.

But words are all well and good - today we know

your demands. We need to come together. It's time to show it in a really crucial game.

Your noise can make a difference - previous derby matches here testify to that. So please get behind the lads as soon as you're in the ground and don't stop until the final whistle. This famous old ground won't have many more of these days so make the most of it and get behind us.

Finally my thanks to Ellis and his family and those at Sporting Wishes for arranging his trip to the training ground. If we're on the right side of a result this afternoon, that's for you, Ellis.

Indeed, David acknowledges in his recently released, and excellent, book that he's happy to have managed at the time he did. Having discussed the matter with them, both David and John have admitted that they would struggle with the instantaneous and intense scrutiny – often falsely negative – that exists in and around today's game, in general.

While we can't change social behaviour, those of us in the Club can and will remain united in our unwavering support of our squad and coaching team while we learn and progress to our next goal. I would urge every one of you all to join us.

It's within the very fabric of our Club culture to nurture and develop deep-rooted and ever-maintained values. With a respect for those people within our community fostering a track record for positivity, resilience, fighting back, overcoming those tough times and, ultimately, achieving what we've set out to do. We see ourselves as a big family, forging relationships amongst our kin on and off the pitch.

In absence of league matches, our Club's social media content this last couple of weeks has been dominated by stories of heartwarming positivity. From welcoming 20-year-old supporter Holly Hamill to The Brache to bravely share her mental health challenges with our first team squad, to the inspirational visit of sixyear-old Ellis Rudelhoff who, despite being diagnosed with a rare form of cancer, brought waves of joy across the faces of Rob and the players.

We're an essential part of what makes Luton such a unique town – as the world seemed to discover when we were promoted to the Premier League. We all connect!

This past month has also seen our staff run various daily distances to raise funds for Prostate Cancer UK, and last week our staff – including David Wilkinson, Mick Harford and Alex Lawless – joined the rest of the town to take part in the Love Luton runs.

The Hatters had to settle for a point after letting a two-goal lead slip at home to Oxford.

Jordan Clark had the first chance of the game shooting wide in the seventh minute before the visitors nearly took the lead moments later. Oxford worked the ball out to the left-hand side after a well-worked counter, with the ball was played across the face of the goal by Owen Dale but Teden Mengi made a last-ditch challenge to prevent a tap in.

But after 10 minutes, the Town led. Tom Krauß won the ball back inside the Oxford box and the ball fell kindly to Clark in front of goal. The skipper composed himself to finish smartly with his right foot for his first goal of the season.

Thomas Kaminski was called into action for the first time two minutes later. Idris El Mizouni's shot from the edge of the area deflected off of Mark McGuinness, but Kaminski was equal to it, making a great save. El Mizouni then had a shot on the rebound which was superbly cleared off the line by Mengi.

However, the Town didn't need long to score again to double their lead through Krauß. Oxford keeper Jamie Cumming failed to collect Reece Burke's long ball and Jacob Brown, making his first start since December last year, picked up the ball. He checked his right

shoulder to lay the ball off to Krauß who slotted the ball into the bottom right corner for the German's first goal in Luton colours.

Just before the break, Oxford pulled a goal back. Tyler Goodrham, who had already sent a shot onto the roof of the Kenilworth Road end, made no mistake with this finish, his first-time effort curling beautifully into the top right corner beyond the reach of Thomas Kaminski.

The visitors then equalised 10 minutes after the restart through Rodrigues. Substitute Kyle Edwards sped down the right to cross for the unmarked Rodrigues to fire home.

The Hatters then had heroics from Kaminski to thank for keeping it level as Mark Harris, Goodrham and Edwards all fired consecutive shots at goal only for the Town stopper to make three incredible saves to keep the Hatters in the game.

The Town's task then became tougher with 13 minutes left on the clock when Liam Walsh was red-carded within a minute of his introduction from the bench after a lunging tackle on Siriki Dembele.

After the red card the Town re-organised and ended the better side with Elijah Adebayo denied a tap-in by Cumming's save in the closing stages but it finished all square.

The Town fell to another defeat on the road as a goal in each half from Jesurun Rak-Sakyi gave Sheffield United all three points.

It was uphill early on for the Hatters at Bramall Lane when Rak-Sakyi gave the hosts the lead in the 12th minute. Anel Ahmedhodzic hooked a ball into the Town box and after getting the better of Reuell Walters and Mark McGuinness, the winger blasted beyond Thomas Kaminski.

Clear-cut chances were at a real premium after the Blades' opener and it wasn't until the 34th minute that the hosts threatened again when Rak-Sakyi shot wide.

Two minutes later the Hatters had Kaminski to thank for keeping it 1-0 when his outstretched leg turned away a goal-bound shot from Kieffer Moore.

As half-time approached the Blades continued to push for a second. Kaminski beat away a piledriver from Vini Souza on 37 minutes before the goalkeeper then denied Rak-Sakyi once more after the winger had tiptoed into the box.

Behind at the break, the hosts started quickly at the beginning of the second half. Kaminski stopped Callum O'Hare's volley and Rak-Sakyi was then inches away from converting a dangerous low right-wing cross from Rhian Brewster. Back came the Town and, on 49 minutes, they forced their first real chance of the afternoon when Jordan Clark's shot was saved by Michael Cooper.

However, within three minutes of that opportunity, the hosts doubled their advantage. Rak-Sakyi received the ball in the box, drove down the right and buried a low shot through the legs of Kaminski.

The Town then needed their goalkeeper to prevent it becoming 3-0 on 56 minutes when Kaminski flung himself to his right to keep out Brewster's drive as the hosts looked to kill the game off.


Rob Edwards introduced Jacob Brown, Cauley Woodrow, Joe Taylor and Shandon Baptiste from the bench and, with 18 minutes left, the Town fashioned a chance but Clark was denied once more by Cooper.


The game was almost up for the Hatters on 77 minutes when Alfie Doughty and Clark failed to clear their lines on the edge of the box, enabling Vini Souza to charge into the box and fire a shot goalwards that came back off the post with Kaminski beaten.


Doughty came close to pulling back a consolation in injury time but Cooper was equal to it and that proved to be the final chance as the Town were left to reflect on a third defeat in four on the road in the Championship.

The Hatters host rivals Watford in what promises to be an exciting Championship derby at Kenilworth Road.

Tom Cleverley's side have had a decent start to the season and face the Hatters for the first time since April 2023.

The Hornets started the season well with wins against Millwall, Stoke and Derby before being defeated for the first time away at Sheffield United.

A draw against Coventry and a
4-1 away loss to Norwich was to
follow before a home win against
Sunderland. The Hornets suffered a
3-0 defeat away to Preston but went
on to beat Middlesbrough the next
week at home.

Over the summer, Tom Cleverley made a few new signings ahead of the campaign. Moussa Sissoko, Angelo Ogbonna, Yasser Larouci, Kevin Keben, Vakoun Issouf Bayo, Daniel Jebbison and Festy Ebosele all joined the club.

The Hornets also have former Hatter Tom Ince in their squad. Ince played for the Hatters briefly in 2021 before joining Watford in 2023.

Not since 2006 have the Town lost a home derby to the Hornets – admittedly we have only met twice here since we returned to the Football League in 2014. But both times saw the Hatters triumph, with James Collins scoring a penalty in a 1-0 win behind-closed-doors in April 2021 before goals from Gabe Osho and Allan Campbell scored in a 2-0 victory in April 2023.

Yet to miss a minute of league action for Watford so far this season. Scored in the Hornets' 5-0 win against Milton Keynes in the Carabao Cup in August.

RYAN ANDREWS

Youth product who came through the ranks at Watford before breaking into the first team in 2023.

MOUSSA SISSOKO

Former French international with over 70 caps. Has previous experience with Tottenham, Newcastle United and Nantes.

EDO KAYEMBE

Signed for Watford two years ago from K.A.S Eupen. Scored in Watford's recent 2-1 win against Middlesbrough.

Spells at Chelsea, Birmingham and OPR followed before he arrived at Kenilworth Road in the twilight of his career, impressing for a relegated-haunted Hatters side in 2007/08 where he scored a respectable 12 goals in 39 games.

HORNETS HERO

Having played the majority of his career at Vicarage Road, Tommy Mooney helped the Hornets to two

promotions, scoring goals in three divisions from League One to the Premier League - during his time at the club.



After signing from Southend in 1993, Mooney would go on and score 65 times in 288 games for the Hornets but it was his passion, commitment and aggressiveness that made him a darling for the Watford supporters.

Many believed his sheer determination made up for a supposed lack of natural skill but his performances belied that. His most famous goal for the Hornets was the winner at the Kop end in a 1-0 victory at Liverpool in the Premier League in 1999/2000.



Academy graduates represent Young Lions

Hatters academy graduates Zack Nelson and Joe Johnson added to their growing collection of England age group caps over the international break.

The Hatters duo went away with the Men's Elite League Squad (formerly Under-20s) and Under-19s respectively, and both gained further experience with their national teams - Zack winning his second and third caps, while Joe took his tally to 11 in total since his Under-17 debut a year ago.

Zack started as Paul Nevin's squad secured a 2-1 win over Italy in the Stadio Benito Stirpe last Thursday, with our

19-year-old playing the full 90 minutes as goals from Plymouth Argyle's Manchester City loanee Darko Gyabi and a late winner from Gent forward Max Dean secured all three points.

Zack then played his part as a 65th-minute substitute in Monday's 3-0 win over Czechia, with Dean scoring two more before assisting the third for Norwich City's Kaide Gordon at Doncaster's Eco-Power Stadium.

Joe travelled to Spain with the Under-19s and played his part in all three of Will Antwi's squad's friendlies over at the Marbella Sports Centre.

He went on as a 74thminute substitute in the 2-1 defeat to Portugal last Wednesday, before starting and playing the first 74 minutes of the 4-1 win over the Netherlands on Saturday.

Our 18-year-old defender then completed a successful camp by playing an hour in the 4-2 victory over France as the Young Lions wrapped up their preparations for the UEFA Euro Under-19 qualifiers that begin next month.

Meanwhile, midfielder Marvelous Nakamba captained Zimbabwe to a 1-0 victory over Namibia in a match played behind closed

doors at Johannesburg's Orlando Stadium, before being rested for Monday's return fixture at the same venue, which our Mary's Warriors won 3-1.

That triumph saw Zimbabwe return to second position in Group J of the 2025 Africa Cup of Nations qualifiers with eight points, two behind Cameroon who are on 10 points.

The top two teams from the group will qualify for the finals, with Zimbabwe now needing just two points from the remaining two games to secure their passage to the tournament in Morocco.

Defender Reece Burke says the Hatters need to stop being too nice ahead of today's derby

Reece Burke thinks the Town need to rediscover their horrible side after we went down 2-0 in our last match at Sheffield United two weeks ago.

Burke, who made his 90th appearance for the Hatters in the defeat at Bramall Lane, believes the Hatters need to stop being 'too nice' if they are to return to winning ways in the Championship – starting today against local rivals Watford.

"I'm sure the gaffer is going to go away and look at it, but we need to be horrible to play against. At the moment we're being too nice," said the defender.

"We need to start fighting and showing some fight in games, winning our duels, one v ones all over the pitch, second balls and getting in opposition faces as that's how we used to be and that's how the fans used to love watching it.

"The Kenny was always a difficult place to play and we were always difficult to play against and it was the same for me when I wasn't at Luton and we played against Luton. It was tough, so we need to start being more nasty. We need to go back to basics, do the basics well, be horrible to play against and especially at home. make it difficult for the opposition to come and play as that's what we need to get back."

Having arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2021, Burke knows full well how slowly the Town have started seasons in the past before finishing campaigns strongly. "It's been a slow start but I think for me I look at the boys in the changing room, I look at the squad we've got, even the players we managed to keep hold of and we've got more than enough," said Burke.

"That's why it's frustrating, especially from the fans' point of view as I'm sure they know we've got a good team. I know we've got a good team, we've got good players and we shouldn't be in the position that we are now, but we need to start doing the basics well as I think we've been too nice to play against recently. The main thing for us is trying to keep positive, being negative and keeping our heads down isn't going to change anything."

With the Town aiming to bounce back to winning

ways this afternoon, Burke says now is the time for everyone to stick together.

He said: "When you're out there, when you're going through a bad patch of games and results, it's tough.

"We need to be mentally strong, we need to stick together, as at the end of the day it's us, the players, the staff, everyone needs to be together. I can understand it's frustrating for the fans, but listen we don't want to lose games, so it's frustrating for us as well. There were a few words after the game, we know we have to be better."

LOVE FOOTBALL, PROTECT THE GAME

During Black History Month, we at Hatters' Heritage will be recounting some of the iconic black players who have turned out for Luton Town.

This week we will be taking a look at a modern-day legend in the ranks at Luton Town, Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu, who captured the hearts and minds of the world when he became the first player to go from non-league to the Premier League with one club.

Born in Hendon, Mpanzu joined Boreham Wood, trialling and then breaking into their first team at the age of 16 before West Ham, at that time competing in the Championship, signed him in 2011.

Although never making a league appearance for the Hammers, Mpanzu made his West Ham debut alongside future Hatter Dan Potts in a 2-0 League Cup win over Burnley. To continue his development, he moved to Kenilworth Road on loan in November 2013 making his debut against Staines in the FA Trophy just two days later. Mpanzu became an instant fans' favourite, but the Hatters faithful would have to wait to see more, when he was recalled by West Ham due to injuries in their first team squad.

However, with a route to the first team at the Boleyn Ground looking increasingly unlikely, early in 2014 Mpanzu took, in his own words, "a step out of his comfort zone" leaving behind the glitz and glamour of a Premier League training facility and replacing it with the portacabins and dog muck of Ely Way by joining the Town, still in the Conference, on a permanent basis, in a move that John Still described as a "major coup"

It also paid off instantly with a Conference title medal to his name by the end of that season, along with two goals, one in particular that Hatters fans recall as being amongst the best they saw during our Conference years: the half-volley in a late 2-1 victory at Dartford.

Each season with the club saw Mpanzu continue to grow into the new level the Town had attained, with more and more memorable goals scored each step of the way as we climbed the leagues. He left the Premier League as a 19-year-old for a new challenge, but Mpanzu blazed his path back to the Premier League as a 29-yearold, a modern day club legend and is now on the cusp of breaking into our all-time top 10 appearance list.

Preserving and appreciating the heritage and history of Luton Town Football Club

HOW THE RIVALRY BEGAN

By Brian Webb

St. Albans was Luton's main economic rival in the hat industry as in 1832 the city had 18 listed hat manufacturers, Luton had just 13. Local newspapers sniped at each other on this and every other subject including football.

The rivalry between football spectators was mentioned in a report from a January 1884 game between Luton Excelsior and St. Albans.

After formation in 1885, Luton Town rose to become one of the best teams in the area. St. Albans, troubled by finances, faded and so did the rivalry. However, a game in November 1891 saw the birth of a new rivalry, this time with the West Herts Club and Ground based in Watford.

The game was coming to a close with West Herts 4-3 ahead. At this time, there were no goal nets and the crowd was held back by ropes around the pitch. In the last minute, a Luton header hit a spectator standing in the goalmouth and bounced away. The referee, a Luton club committee

member, refused to allow a goal (he later admitted he made an error).

The Watford newspapers gloated over the victory and made disparaging remarks towards the Luton club, The Luton newspapers replied thus setting the tone for the return game in January 1892. This time the referee was a West Herts man who gave a goal that no one appealed for. The Lutonians voiced their disapproval, but the Town men came back to draw the game.


As Luton Town entered the Southern League in

the autumn of 1894 they left Hertfordshire teams far behind. West Herts had entered a dismal period and their first two games of the 1897/98 season saw attendances of 128 and 134. They were in serious financial trouble with debts over £800. Their saviour would be Watford St. Mary's who were well-run club showing a profit three years running. In April 1898 West Herts and Watford St. Mary's agreed an amalgamation which the full council of the Football Association approved. A new club, Watford F.C., was formed on the 15th April 1898.

The first game between Luton Town and Watford took place on the 29th October 1898 at the Dunstable Road ground in the FA Cup. Although Watford were a new club, the rivalry transferred smoothly and two special trains brought nearly a thousand Watfordians to the Dunstable Road ground to see a 2-2 draw.






The Hatters recorded their biggestever win in the top flight on this day in 1985 as Southampton were blown away 7-0 at Kenilworth Road.


With every player on the top of his game, the score could easily have been 10, were it not for Peter Shilton in the Saints' goal.

Champions!

Over the course of the season we'll be looking back 20 years to the glorious League One championship winning season of 2004/05.

So many club league records were tumbled during a momentous campaign which was even more remarkable considering that the summer of 2003 saw the arrival of new 'owner' John Gurney and his crackpot ideas, which ultimately led to the Hatters needing to enter administrative receivership, with all its problems, to get rid of him. Club historian Roger Wash tells the story of a season to remember.



2004/05 history

Nine points clear at the top after 10 games the Town now needed to face possibly their biggest test of the season so far - a trip to second-placed Tranmere.

A healthy crowd of 10,884 greeted the Hatters with the home side certainly up for the game and putting the Town under some pressure during the first period. The Hatters held out until the 27th minute when Curtis Davies fouled overlapping full-back Ryan Taylor in the box.

Taylor, the regular
Tranmere penalty taker,
was injured in the clash
and went off the field
needing treatment
leaving lain Hume to
step up to take the spot
kick. This was brilliantly
saved by Luton's
Slovenian goalkeeper
Dino Seremet, who was
making his full league
debut in place of the
injured Marlon Beresford.

Joy in the Luton ranks quickly turned to despair when the referee, after conferring with his linesman, controversially ordered the penalty to be re-taken deeming that Seremet was off his line before the ball was kicked. Controversy doubled when Taylor was allowed back on the pitch to take the second kick. Seremet blocked the ball but Taylor, following up, tapped in the rebound.

Stung by this, and the determination to maintain their unbeaten record, the Town stepped up a gear and deservedly equalised on 76 minutes when Chris Coyne rose like a salmon at the far post to head home a free-kick from Kevin Nicholls.

After the game Hatters chairman Bill Tomlins announced that the club was close to submitting a planning application for a new ground to be situated by M1 Junction 10. He apologised that due to the long drawn-out saga of taking over the club the new ground completion was now likely to be pushed back a year to the summer of 2007!

Also in the headlines was the announcement of a new deal tabled for manager Mike Newell. With his current contract ending in the summer of 2005 and with Leicester now eying up the Luton supremo following their dismissal of Micky Adams, the Town were quickly trying to tie down the 39-year-old.

To avoid a clash with the England v Wales World Cup qualifier, the Town decided to switch their next home game with Hartlepool to the Friday night. Although they would be without Kevin Foley, due to his call-up to the Republic of Ireland under-21 squad, they would welcome back Steve Howard fresh from a one-match ban for accumulating five yellow cards.

A best of the season crowd, so far, of 7,865 gathered under the Kenilworth Road lights

to see the returning Howard head home his sixth goal of the season, converting Steve Robinson's corner at the back post on 36 minutes.

This came after Hartlepool enjoyed by far the better of the opening exchanges going close on three occasions in a five-minute spell with one of the chances being missed from 15 yards with the goal gaping.

The lead was eventually doubled six minutes into the second half when a cross from Sol Davis found Rowan Vine, who had just been awarded the League One Player of

the Month for September. His shot was parried by Pools goalkeeper Jim Provett straight to the onrushing Ahmet Brkovic who made no mistake.

The introduction of substitute Gary McSheffrey on 76 minutes saw the Coventry Ioanee display all his close control and skill to put the game to bed with a fine individual goal, slaloming through the Pools defence to side-foot home.

Newell was not pleased with the first-half performance and said so at the interval but was much more happy with the showing in the second period. "They were sharper and quicker to the second balls in the first half whereas the only time we looked threatening was from set-pieces, which was how we scored our goal," said the boss.

Newell added: "We played some better stuff in the second half and created chances. It will continue to get more and more difficult for us here, but if we keep playing like we did in the second half we could be on to a winner."

Town shirt collector, David Foxen, aka @lutontownkits, goes through his selection of shirts in orange, white, blue - and all colours in between.

Today's feature is another shirt that you have probably banished from your memories and long forgotten. It is the 2015/16 goalkeeper's shirt, but the pink version!

We had several different colourways for this template during this campaign, including navy blue and a green and black version, however, it's the bright pink number we are focusing on.

Manufactured by Fila, this shirt features a bright pink base with a chevron of light blue (I believe they call this "baby blue" when picking paint colours...!). This light blue also accents the side panels of the shirt, making it a nice contrast and distraction from the bright pink. In my opinion, this colour combination strangely works.

It features a very tight round neck and a cool hexagonal pattern on the underside of the long sleeves. You can't really see this pattern unless you lift the arms up, so it is something of a hidden gem. The sponsor for that season was the local college, Barnfield.

On the pitch, this shirt was worn by Elliot Justham and the goalkeeping icon, Mark Tyler. 2015/16 was an eventful season, and our 130th birthday! Maybe that's why Fila gave us bright pink, they were in a celebratory mood, those colours of course our first back in 1885.

It was the season that we said goodbye to a legend. John Still left us in December of 2015 to be replaced by a young, up-and-coming coach called Nathan Jones. He led us to an 11th place in League Two, our second season back in the Football League.

Tyler and Justham shared the goalkeeping duties wearing this template. Tyler unfortunately picked up an injury which restricted him to 27 league appearances, with Justham being called upon during Tyler's injury spells.

Both keepers both appeared to favour the green version of this kit, however, this lovely pink number was used mainly for away games, including at Northampton Town, when the Cobblers beat us 2-0 and won the league. Little did we know that success would be around the corner for us over the years that followed.

Kelvin Davis

Kelvin made his Luton Town debut while still a youth trainee, appearing between the sticks in a 2-2 draw at Stoke in May 1994, two months before signing a professional contract at Kenilworth Road.

It took some time for Kelvin to claim a regular goalkeeping slot, needing to understudy both Juergen Sommer and lan Feuer first, but once he became number once choice his shot stopping skills, allied to incredible reflexes, had the big clubs beating a path to Luton's door.

Among his highlights in Town colours was a crucial penalty save in a televised derby against Watford at Kenilworth Road in March 1996. That afternoon the Hatters led through Paul Telfer's goal before Kevin Phillips levelled for the Hornets. Davis brought down Peter Beadle for the penalty but the young stopper atoned by denying Gary Porter from 12 yards.

Having surpassed a century of appearances for the Hatters, a £600,000 bid from Wimbledon took Kelvin into the top flight in 1999.

His career took him to Ipswich and Sunderland before finishing off at Southampton, his final appearance coming in the Premier League making it 687 career outings.

Kelvin joined the coaching staff at St Mary's after hanging up his gloves and is now manager at National League Eastleigh.



MY FAVOURITE GOAL...

A Hatters fan for five decades, Derek Sheppard looks back on a special derby day goal

Having supported Luton Town for over 50 years, I've seen many wonderful goals – ones that stand out not just for the movement, the build-up, the finish, the 30-yard bangers, but also for the significance a goal can bring with it.

Given who our opponents are today, and my role within the Supporters' Trust as SoLYD (Supporters of Luton Youth Development) secretary, why should I look anywhere else for my favourite than a great strike from a graduate of our youth and apprenticeship systems? Not only that, but a born and bred Lutonian playing for his hometown club, which makes it even more special.

Signed as a schoolboy at 14 having played for Lewsey Youth, this player is one of a small band of Lutonians who have actually made it through to the first team. James Justin, Kingsley Black, Mitchell Thomas and Wayne Turner. It's the latter who went from terrace boo boys target to legend with one glorious strike.

It's FA Cup 5th Round day, 9th March, 1985 – second replay to be precise – and Wayne's 24th birthday. He woke up full of flu but ended the day as a hero!

It had been a close tie across all three matches,

but in the 58th minute a superb 25-vard ball from Garry Parker split Watford's left-back and centre-back and into space inside the box - to be met by Turner running into the area. His crisp first-time shot was sent across the goalkeeper and nestled gloriously into the bottom right corner of the goal in front of the Oak Road - greeted by wild celebrations of course. It was the only goal of the game, and a turning point for Wayne, From zero to hero in one.

There's something extraspecial when one of our own scores against them down the road and that winning goal helped Luton Town to the semifinal of the FA Cup, where the Town dominated the eventual winners Everton, and came within five minutes of a second FA Cup final.

This was the start of five seasons when we had some great runs in cup competitions - three Wembley finals and another FA Cup semi-final. That's why I place Wayne's goal so high in my slowly fading memory. It's what it brought to the club in the years after rather than a flashy net-bulging 35-yarder.

Wayne now finds himself back at the club as Head of Academy Development. Wayne Turner he's one of our own!



A coolly converted penalty from Tasha Fensome earned Luton Town Ladies a narrow but crucial 1-0 win over Enfield Town Ladies at Barton on Sunday.

Co-managers Myles Maddix and Fadi Mazloum made four changes to the line-up following their dominant 5-0 victory against Dussindale and Hellesdon. Defensive trio Elly Wade, Tanya Blacksley, and Bridget Adu returned to the starting XI alongside midfielder Liz Mulvaney.

Luton were quick to assert themselves, creating their first chance just six minutes into the match. A well-placed ball over the top from Jess McKay found Tasha Fensome, but her effort flew just wide. Moments later, McKay had another attempt—this time striking a volley from outside the box that sailed over the bar.

Despite dominating early possession, clear opportunities remained elusive. The Hatters' best chance of the first half came 15 minutes in when Mulvaney won possession on the edge of Enfield's area. The ball broke kindly for Cesca Partridge, who found herself one-on-one with the goalkeeper, only to be denied by a crucial save.

The Town's pressure seemed to pay off in the 19th minute when Amber Leighton was brought down by the keeper inside the box, earning Luton a penalty. Partridge stepped up, but her spotkick was saved low to the keeper's left.

As the half progressed, Enfield began to find their footing. Their first venture into the Town penalty area was thwarted by a perfectly timed sliding tackle from captain Blacksley.

The second half mirrored the first, with Luton

dictating play but struggling to break down the visitors' resolute defence. However, the breakthrough finally came in the 77th minute after Enfield's attempt to play out from the back led to a defensive error. A mis-hit pass saw the ball bounce up and strike an Enfield defender's hand inside the area, gifting Luton another penalty. This time, Fensome took responsibility and calmly slotted the ball into the bottom left corner.

The Hatters came close to doubling their lead shortly after. A flurry of attempts from substitute Chloe Martin saw her first shot saved, and two more efforts blocked by a determined Enfield backline - highlighting their resilience in defence.

The Hatters are back in Championship action here at Kenilworth Road next week when Sunderland visit on Wednesday evening.

The Black Cats, who finished last season in 16th place, go into this weekend's fixtures as leaders of the Championship after an excellent start to the campaign under the new boss Régis Le Bris.

Le Bris, who joined from Ligue 1 side FC Lorient, has brought a fresh tactical approach to the Stadium of Light, and his influence has been felt early on. Sunderland won their first three Championship games without conceding a goal, including an impressive 4-0 victory over Sheffield Wednesday and a 1-0 triumph over Burnley.

Jobe Bellingham is no stranger to football fans - but not because of his older brother. Only 19, Jobe signed from Birmingham at the start of last season and scored seven times in his debut season on Wearside

Bellingham continues to play a leading role

alongside another young gun, 17-year-old Chris Rigg. The England youth international attacking midfielder has started this season in fantastic form, scoring twice, including the winning goal in the 1-0 victory over Middlesbrough last month.

With the young duo helping Sunderland solidify their credentials as promotion chasers, the Black Cats have made them one of the Championship's teams to watch this season, and their focus on playing fast-paced, pressing football under Le Bris has energised both players and supporters alike.

However, sustaining this momentum throughout a long and challenging campaign will be the real test for the Black Cats as they aim to secure promotion to the Premier League – starting today as they travel to Hull ahead of Wednesday's long trip down to Kenilworth Road.





We don't need a pep talk to get up for a game against Watford. When the fixture list came out in the summer, it was the first date I looked for and I'm sure any of you reading this did exactly the same.

It's not been the start to the season we wanted, but I always think through good times and bad, we're stronger when we tough it out together. No better way to remind ourselves of the good times than rewatching the goals from that famous win here at Kenilworth Road back in April 2023.

My cousin had booked the big box in the corner of the old Bobbers stand and I brought my nephew for his first experience of the derby. He wasn't even born the last time we'd hosted Watford at the Kenny! The 17-year wait was worth it - what an atmosphere! It was the best I had ever experienced. Only the Sunderland win in the

play-off semi-final has come close to matching it since.

The first goal epitomised the Hatters that season - a brilliant team goal, from Alfie's long throwin cleared out to Cody Drameh, swept to the right for Pelly who played a one-two with Locks and drilled the ball low across the face of goal for Gabe Osho to sweep home. The redemption celebration was even better, crying eyes and a kick of the advertising hoardings after that sending off in the reverse fixture we've erased from our memory!

Allan Campbell put the icing on the cake in added time after a deep corner from the right headed into the middle of the box by Morris, hit the

Scotsman's knee and he poked it into the back of the net. Euphoria – with a mixture of giddiness and relief. I had no voice left after that game – not great bearing in mind I talk for a living, but I didn't care!

The memory of that game always makes me smile. That victory moved us 12 points clear of those down the M1 and we went on a seven-game unbeaten run to confirm a third-place finish in the Championship. We all know what happened next.

So let's harness that winning feeling and the indescribable joy of beating them again. I know a win today could galvanise us and bring some much needed momentum. The emotion

of last season took a lot out of everyone, but we will get our mojo back. Everyone is working hard to get us back on track and in a tight league, things can turn around very quickly.

I'm not able to be there today but will be watching with anticipation while on air at Craven Cottage. My family are representing and are under strict instructions to help replicate that atmosphere from 18 months ago. This game means a lot, so let's get behind Rob and the team and make Kenilworth Road a hostile fortress again.

Derby day. We've had some good ones! Let's make this another. #COYH
